The Aquarian Age.

The reply of Mr. J. R. Bennet to my comments in the August issue of the JOURNAL on this subject, commences in this issue. Owing to the length of the article sent, I am inserting it in sections, with my replies thereto. I regret that valuable space has to be taken up, but I have informed Mr. Bennet that with the conclusion of his article and my replies thereto, the discussion must be closed.

A Serious Complaint.

During the month of September, I received certain complaints which show the very serious harm that is being done by incompetent people posing as teachers of the Science. Three students, quite strangers to me, wrote to the effect that after attending classes, etc., for instruction in Astrology, they were very dissatisfied at the progress made, and considered they were not being properly taught. I asked them to give me written replies to some six or seven very ordinary questions in the elementary side of the science. The replies received from the three students, together with certain other information, were sufficient to show that it was not due to lack of ability on their part, for they were people of more than average intelligence, but to the absolute incompetence as well as the lack of knowledge of their teachers.

While on this sublect, may I point out for the

benefit of those anxious to learn the science, that the classes held by the British Astrological Society, and the Astrological Lodge of the T.S., are conducted by fully competent teachers, and the instruction given at such classes is of the highest and best.

While mentioning this matter, attention should also be called to certain books which have been published during the last two or three years, which contain appalling mis-statements in regard to Astrology. In one which I have before me, reference is made to Mercury in Gemini throwing a trine to the Sun, and Mercury in Pisces squaring the Sun. As Mercury is never more than 28 degrees from the Sun, it can never form either a trine or a square, the only aspects possible being a conjunction and a parallel. In the same work a map drawn for 1 p.m. has the Sun on the meridian, where it would never be at that time. In another work we are told that the meaning of aspects is the distance between planets, houses and Zodiacal signs. mis-statement is that the Sun to be in the first house shows that one was born in the morning about 8 to 9 a.m. This is some of the trash which is being put forward as scientific astrology at the present time, and I am bound to warn my readers against being misled by these erroneous statements. I am always willing to give advice as to the best books for study, and readers have only to write to me thereon.

THE INFLUENCE OF NEPTUNE.

It is a recognised fact in astrology that each planet represents a certain principle, and the principle of Neptune is that of "Inversion." It stands for maya or delusion, inversion or introversion. What I mean by these last two words is: turning upside down, throwing things crosswise, jumbling them up, throw into confusion, upset, make chaotic and misleading, twist and distort, hence its effects on all matters and things it comes in touch with are clearly indicated to those who have eyes to see and ears to hear.

Neptune is the planet of degeneracy. It saps the vitality and draws away the life forces in a seductive manner. It may be likened to the vampire bat which fixes its probiscus in the body of its victim and gradually draws the blood from the body. Its action is neurotic, soporific and stupifying. It conduces to self-deception, self-delusion, the inability to distinguish between the real and unreal, the true and false.

Neptune is the planet of Ideals, not necessarily evil ones, but often of a very wonderful and beautiful character, and which if properly carried out would, and could be of immense value to the moral and intellectual forces of humanity. But Neptunian ideals possess claims, pretences, innocence and glamour which cover their real nature.

The Socialists' Utopia, the wonderful Promised Land where freedom in all its illusiveness exists is purely Neptunian, an inverted idea and a putrid conception of what is unnatural. Believe it or not as you like, there is no such thing as Freedom in the Universe. The planetary orbs as they circle round the Sun are bound by a force which they cannot resist. So it is in and with all What Freedom exists where a man is bound to strike because his Union or his leaders tell him. What Freedom exists where a workman must be forcibly prevented from working when he desires to do so. The whole idea is deceptive, misleading and pernicious. It enslaves the mind and morals, it twines its tendrils round the soul and drags it to perdition.

Now, before dealing with certain specific matters in which the influence of Neptune is so remarkably in evidence, I propose to give a brief outline of the chief effects of this planet, when in each of the twelve houses of the horoscope.


HOROSCOPE OF THE MONTH.

"E. M. DELAFIELD."

The subject of our study for the present month is the horoscope of "E. M. Delafield," who was born at Brighton, on June 9th, 1890, at 8.30 a.m. The time rectified by the epoch is 8h. 25m. 57s. a.m. for which the map below is drawn.

The middle degrees of Leo rise, with the Sun, ruler of the ascendant in Gemini in the eleventh house, separating from the square of the Moon



and trine of Jupiter, and applying to the trine Uranus. The Moon is in Pisces in trine to Venus in Cancer, and sextile to Fortuna in the tenth.

The subject of our study is a novelist and has published fourteen novels, the first in March, 1917. Here we have Mercury, dignified in Gemini, in conjunction with Neptune, and opposed to Mars. The conjunction of Mercury with Neptune is a typical aspect for a writer, giving the ability to weave plots, strong intention and imagination. It gives a distinct "esthetic" tendency, with mystical beliefs and ideals not in harmony with present day methods.

The navamsa sub-division is very well illustrated. The meridian is in a Scorpio navamsa, Mercury is in a Scorpio navamsa, as also is Venus

Mercury's position on the cusp of the eleventh

brings in an Aquarius-Gemini sub-influence, which is further indicative of literary talent.

She is a very fluent speaker and does a lot of work for the Women's Institute movement, and is a member of the National Council. Mercury conjoined with Neptune in Gemini would give abilities for public speaking, and would no doubt give a good deal of inspirational ability.

Marriage took place on July 17th, 1919, under the directions of Sun conjunction Venus R. and Jupiter, on the cusp of the seventh, conjunction Moon R.

The pre-natal epoch took place on September 7th, 1889, at 5.8 a.m., Virgo 11.7 rising. Mercury ruler being in Libra, trine Moon in Aquarius, sextile Venus in Leo, and trine Neptune in Gemini on the meridian. These influences are more typical of our subject's literary and other activities; and is again a proof of the power of the epoch in such matters.

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THE KALEIDOSCOPE.

MORE PYRAMID MEASURES. — The fundamental fact of the Pyramid intention explicit in the structure of this "witness unto the Lord in Egypt, in the midst of the land and on the borders thereof" is that its base circumference answers to the value of 100 tropical years The height of the Pyramid is 5.813 inches. If this be taken as the radius of a circle, the circumference of that circle will be 36524.2 The value of the tropical year is 365.242 The average length of the four base lines of the Pyramid is 9,131 inches, which is 36524/4. It is found also that the height of the King's Chamber is 19.1113 feet or 229.3356 inches. The square of 19.1113 is 365.242, so that the year value is again produced. Mensuration shows that the whole period of the Pyramid revelation is conveyed by a single line, which stretches from zero to its culmination at the highest point of the South wall of the King's Chamber. Zero in the Pyramid scheme is denoted by the intersection of the Ascending Passage, produced to meet the side slope of the building. Thus from the Great Step northwards and downwards, through the Grand Gallery and Ascending Passage, onwards at the same level to the place where this descent meets the north side of the Pyramid, is one continuous line, which intersects the N. side at zero. which is dated -3999, 24th October, a date which I have already made familiar to my read-If we continue the Ascending Passage and Grand Gallery floor line southwards, we cut through the floor of the Horizontal Passage leading to the King's Chamber at a point that is 72 inches from the Great Step perpendicular, and continuing onwards and upwards the same line pa-ses under the centre of the Portcullis at date 6000 from zero, which is the year 2001 A.D. From this point upwards to the height of the King's Chamber is theoretically 480 inches, so that the whole period from zero to the terminus is 6,480 inches or years. This is the extent of the Age, which is one-fourth of the period of 25,920 vears, known as the Great Year of Plato. There are four ages in the Great Year. It has been found that this chronological line of 6,480 years is divided into distinct periods, which have repeated confirmation in the Word, and are indeed of Divine institution. Prophecy presents the vi w that we are now in the last Age of the world, and in the sixth millennium of that Age.

The Age embraces 7,000 years, one thousand years to each Day, of which six are working days, and the Seventh is the Sabbath. The seventh Seventh is a Sabbatical day or a Sabbath of sabbaths, i.e., a Jubilee. This conception is borne out in the chronology of the Pyramid.

Starting from zero -3999, we cover the first period of 1,260 years in the days of Noah. Note that Noah was 480 years of age when the warning of the Flood was given, and was 600 at the time of the Flood. The measure of 1,260 years from zero brings us to the vertical of the North entrance of the Pyramid. From this point a further 1,260 years brings us to the junction of the Ascending and Descending Passages, which coincides with the year -1480, and the Exodus out of Egypt, the institution of the Mosaic Law and the forty year's pilgrimage. A further 480 years brings us to the year -1000, which is the date of the Dedication of the Temple built by Solomon the King. From that date to the completion of the Second Temple is 480 years. further 1,260 years brings us to the settlement of Israel in "the Isles of the North West" in the 8th century. Another 1,260 years concludes the period of 6,000 years immediately beneath the centre of the Portcullis in the Horizontal Passage, answering to the year 2001 A.D. Finally, from this point to the extreme height of the South Wall of the King's Chamber, beyond and above which there is no extension of the line, a measure of 480 inches brings us to the year 2481 A.D., which is the end of the 6,480 years.

From this it will be seen that all measures are referred to the slope line of the Pyramid from zero to the culminating level of the King's Chamber roof. It will also be seen that the periods of 1260 + 1260 + 480 or 3,000 years, bring us to the central historical fact of the Dedication of the temple of God in Jerusalem, which Scripture informs us was begun to be built just 480 years from the date of the Exodus, i.e., in the year -1006, and as it was seven years in building, it was finished and dedicated in the year -999, which we call 1000 B.C. Thus 3,000 out of the six thousand years expired. The Temple was destroyed by Nebuchadnezzar in -583, and 64 years later the Second Temple was founded, in the second year of Darius (Artaxerxes), which was the year -519. It is here noted that the Shekinah departed from the Temple six years.

before its destruction by Nebuchadnezzar, and therefore in the year -589, and this was the beginning of the "seventy years indignation," which concluded with the founding of the Second Temple in the year -519. But this "seventy years" is seen to reappear as the seventy "sevens," or weeks of Daniel, equal to 490 years, and again as the seventy periods or "seven times" equal to 2,520 years. That is why, taking the date -589 from the departure of the Shekinah, the year A.D. 1931 concludes the full period of the "seven times," which were to pass over Israel before the Presence was again to be manifested, and Israel received back into favour with the Lord. For this reason the year 1932 is regarded as the beginning of a period of restoration and adjustment, which extends over 65 years, during which the world will be under the direct guidance and control of the Lord God of Israel, so that in the year A.D. 1997, three thousand years from the Dedication of the Temple of Solomon, and two thousand from the Nativity. the world will be fit to enter upon the millennial reign of the Prince of Peace.

TERMINAL DATA.—It has been shown that the features of the Horizontal Passage leading to the King's Chamber of the Pyramid have direct reference to the concluding events of the period through which the world is now passing. Any student of Pyramidology will know that the First Low Passage is 51.25 inches in extent, and that the Second Low Passage is twice that length, namely 101.75, the extent of the two passages being 153 inches, significant of those braves who "joined the ranks and filled up the breaches in the battle of the Lord," and of others who shall hereafter do so to their lasting glory. The two passages are separated by the Bridge, the Portcullis, and the grooved antechamber. incident of the beginning of the First passage with the date 4th August, 1914, and its termination at date, 11th November, 1918, shows that the special lunar dating is superposed upon, and overrules the solar dating, applicable to the Age to which it belongs. For on the horizontal passage, the measure of time is one inch to the month, while on the sloping line chronology it is one inch to the year, as we have seen. And since it has been found that the measure from the Great Step to the beginning of the First Low Passage is 60.25 inches, it is clear that the dating of the Great Step face is 27th July, 1909, and this is five years (sixty months) and 7-8 days from 4th August, 1914. It was found that the entire length of the horizontal course from the beginning of the First Low Passage to the en

trance to the King's Chamber is 267.75 inches. This is divided into sections of 51.25, 38.25, 76.50, and 101.75, wherein 51.25 and 101.75 making together 153 inches are represented by the two Low Passages or periods of active Tribulation. The first of these due to the First Low Passage extends over 51.25 months or 4 years 3 months 7-8 days, and being added to 27th July, indicates 11th November, 1918, which brought the end of the Great War. Then follows a period denoted by 114.75 inches. This is divided into three parts, namely, the Bridge and Portcullis 38.25 inches, and the Antechamber or Courtyard, 76.50, the first section being one-third of the interval, and exactly one-seventh of the whole period of 267.75 months, and the second being two-thirds of the interval and exactly twosevenths of whole period. These divisions are not accidental, but are within the prophetic design. By adding 38.25 to the date of the end of the Great War we arrive at the 19-20th January, 1922. This is marked by the first of the Grooves immediately behind the Portcullis. The remaining distance between the Portcullis and the Second Low Passage is 76.5, and this brings us to the date 4th June, 1928. On this date there is an eclipse of the Moon in Sagittarius 13, which is destined to bring together all the forces of evil and destruction that the powers of the world can command. It is well known to my readers that an eclipse is rendered actively significant by reason of transits that are subsequently made over the line of eclipse. Let it be observed therefore, that Saturn will be stationary in Sagittarius 13 in August, 1918, and that Mars will transit the opposition point at the end of the month. Hence the two great malefic planets, Saturn and Mars, will form their opposition on the line of eclipse before the end of August, 1928. The world will enter upon its Great Tribulation. Concerning the final period of 101.75, this is equivalent to 8 years 5 months 22½ days and would, according to normal measure of time, carry us on to the date November 26-27th, 1936. Whatever other interpreters may have to say on the point, I personally hold to the promise of Christ in regard to this period of Tribulation "such as never was since the world began, nor ever shall be," that it shall be shortened, "for unless those days be shortened there were left no flesh living upon the earth," and when our Lord appears, and them that be with Him, it is not to an empty world that He will come.

I am aware that these values are new, that they are subversive of much that has been written about the Pyramid in relation to Latter day prophecies, but I believe them to be grounded in fact, and so present them. The outstanding features of this new interpretation are (a) that the first low passage is half the extent of the second low passage and that the two together make up the number of 153 inches (b) that the Bridge of limestone to granite and the Portcullis, together measuring 38.25 inches is one-half of the extent of the Courtyard 76.6 inches, (c) that the added length of the second low passage of 101.75 inches makes a total of 267.75 inches, from the beginning of the first low passage, of which length the Antechamber (Bridge, Portcullis and Courtyard) occupy exactly three-sevenths. are fully aware that the Pyramid, as at present existing, does not answer exactly to these measurements, nor does it answer exactly to those of any other interpretation, the whole system of Pyramidology being based on a projected "intention" of the Builder, which, however accurately it may have been effected originally, is now obscured by attrition, subsidence and vandalism to an extent which, while leaving the obvious intention of the Builder fully revealed, allows of considerable latitude in regard to fractional measurements, thus affecting the time element of interpretation. I would wish my readers to bear these facts in mind. The significance of the number 153 has already been pointed out. It is the number of Fishes brought up out of the sea from the right side of the ship, and this number cannot be completed until those of the Elect who are required to pass through the Tribulation shall have done so, for the second Low Passage is essential to the completion of the number 153. Its parts are 10 and 7, both Divine Numbers, denoting respectively celestial and terrestrial completion. Ten and Seven are 17. Three times 17 make 51, the number of the first passage; six times 17 are 102, the number of the second Low Passage; and 9 times 17 are 153, the number of the two passages taken together. we take the time interval between -3999 and A.D. 1932, we find it to be 5931, and this divided by 17 gives the length in inches from the junction of the passage slope with the horizontal floor to the South Wall of the King's Chamber, namely 348 inches, measured horizontally.

The conclusion to which all Pyramidists must come, therefore, is that the edifice affords no measure from which prophecy can be made after the lunar measures ending 1936 A.D., or the solar measures ending 2341 A.D., but that at whatsoever time the Divine Intervention may occur to bring about the Millennium on earth, all prophecy on the lunar scale will be irrelevant, and finally so in regard to the solar scale some one hundred years or more before the expiry of the Age. What

bearing this has upon the prophecy of Esdras, I am not in a position to state, but it is said: "And within four hundred years shall my Son Jesus appear and them that be with Him" (Esdras II, 7, 28).

It will be observed that 6,480 years is 432 solar cycles of 15 years each, 1,260 years being equal to 84 (12×7) cycles of 15, and 480 years equal to 32 cycles of 15. Again, the Age of 6,480 years is equal to 6 "days" of 1,040 years (the perfect luni-solar cycle) plus 6 periods of testing, each of 40 years.

THE REAPER.—The time for building has gone, the summer is spent and the time of the Reaping draws nigh. There is a nexus between all forms of life from the etherial highest to the material lowest. There is a nexus between mind and body throughout all nature, both universally and individually. He who denies this interaction of the Universal Mind and the body of Nature is but ill prepared to explain the devastations that are continually taking place in various parts of the world. Admit that Mind and Matter have mutual reactions one upon the other, that Mind is continuous of Mind throughout the universe, and that Matter is continuous of Matter, and we shall have little difficulty in admitting that what the prophets refer to as the "judgments of God" and "the wrath of God," may find physical expression in earthquakes, fires, floods, hurricanes and devastating storms. In a word, we shall recognise that "the covert agreement" between God and Nature is not a figment of the mystical minds of ancient philosophers, but a veritable fact in human experience. It was long ago prophesied in Theosophical circles that the cyclic wave of life impulse which some five thousand years ago arose in the Far East and flooded westward as far as the Caspian Sea, and thence swept onward through Assvria, Egypt, Greece, Rome, Gaul and Britain until it reached the western shores of the Atlantic, would come again, and when the life-wave swept over Japan and that country suddenly sprang like Minerva, full-armed from the brow of Jove, ready to take its place as one of the great powers of the world, with whom the Western World was eager to conclude a treaty in defence of its commerce and political life, the Theosophist smiled and with an air of superior wisdom, exclaimed: "I told you so"! But what the Theosophists did not know and what their preceptors could not tell them was, that the time for the building of new empires is gone, the day is far spent and the night is at hand. There will be no Sun that can rise upon a world that is governed by the Mongols. Tokyo

spread itself abroad with all the blandishments of an effete civilisation, it bathed itself in materialism. Japan had ambitions about which she made no secret. They were severely shaken by the great earthquake of 1st September, 1923, which laid the Capital city in ruins. Phenixlike she rose from her ashes, only to be devastated by fire. Then came the destruction of Osaka, the great commercial centre of Nippon, followed by great hurricanes, and a further outburst of volcanic energy in Hokkaido. Mean while, China is completing its own ruin by internal strife and political suicide. Despite the machinations of renegades and seditionists, India is beginning to understand that her future lies in loyal alliance and co-operation with the people of the Sitaráj.

Turning to the western world, in Europe there is an armed truce by which the Powers are prevented from open conflict. The Treaty of Locarno threatens the peace of Europe at every turn of the political wheel. Only to the United States of America, great with the spoils of war, can we turn with any sense of stability. Exempt from European treaties, self-supporting to the greatest possible extent, equipped as any Vulcan for the enterprise of either peace or war, even she is restricted by the instability of the industrial markets of the world and the insecurity of the European fiscal position. Yet she is not exempt from the warning. But recently the favoured resort of her millionaire sons was devastated by a great hurricane and tidal wave due to submarine earthquake. This was the answer of the Great Mind to the great Unmindful. Let her regard the warning lest a worst thing happen to her.

MATHEMATICAL VERITIES.—It is the custom to presume that figures cannot err and that the laws of notation and enumeration are fully explicit and wholly dependable. Such is not the case. It has been said that the value of Pi, which expresses the relations of the diameter of a circle to its circumference, is an approximation only. So indeed it is and must ever remain so while we use decimals to express proportional parts of unity. Thus we all know that if we divide one into seven equal parts, each will be 1/7th of unity. This is expressed in decimals by 0.142857 (to infinity). Also we know that 3/7ths and 4/7ths make seven 7ths or unity. But when they are expressed as decimals and added we are faced by this remarkable anomaly.

3/7ths equals 0.428571 (to infinity) 4/7ths equals 0.571428 (to infinity) 7/7ths equals 0.999999 (to infinity)

In other words, decimals fail to express true values. Yet when we come to the question of Pi valuation, we find it derived from various factors as 357/113,20612/6561, or as suggested by the Pyramid values as derived by me, 357.357/113.75 exactly, which gives value of Pi 3.1416 without remainder. These values are directly derived from the symmetrical Pyramid theory, and on examination I think it will be found that this definite value of Pi answers all the tests that can be devised.

Let us admit that the details of the Pyramid are "built up on the value of the solar year, and that they are not derived from any actual measurements taken." Where do we stand? The solar year is variously given by different authorities, and all values are subject to a variation which is differently expressed by these same authorities. My own belief is that there is only one true value for the mean solar year, and that it is not subject to any variation whatsoever, the relations of the Sun and Moon in their apparent motions being equally constant. If, therefore, we examine the Pyramid proportions as defined by the solar year, we are immediately up against a series of anomalies which require explanation. Take, for instance, the entire length of the upward passage slope from zero where it meets the side slope of the Pyramid to its termination at the extreme height of the South wall of the King's Chamber, we shall find that from the point where it cuts through the floor of the Horizontal Passage to its southern extremity, it forms the hypotenuse of a rightangled triangle of which the base is the H.P., and the perpendicular is the height of the King's Chamber. These two are thus given in "The Great Pyramid," base 344".566, height 230".389. Now the sum of their squares will be the square formed on the hypotenuse. Their sum is 171,734".799677 and the square root of this number is 414".4 nearly, equal to 114 years 5 months nearly. This being added to 2nd December, 1924, the date assigned to the intersection of the passage slope and horizontal floor, brings us to the end of April, 2338 A.D., as the terminal point of the inch-year measure of the entire passage slope. This date has no relativity, so far as I can discover, to any of the prophetic periods. It leaves the 6,000 years far behind and does not complete the 7,000 years from the epoch 3999 or 4,000 A.D. But if we assume that the entire period of 6,480 years, which is just one quarter of the Great Year of 25,920 years, during which latter period the precession passes through its phases and presents a mean of 50" per year, we find that the Pyramid

accommodates itself to the subdivisions of definite prophetic periods, and fills the hiatus entirely. The position as we have it to-day is this: The Great Pyramid is built up on the basis of what we believe to be the true mean value of the solar year, and although none of the actual measurements of its parts and passages is in strict accord with the values thence derived, it was evidently the intention of the Builder that all measurements should do so. And with that position we shall have to content ourselves, until we have decided whether the true length of the solar year has been finally determined or not, and whether its mean value is to be taken, or its actual value at the time of the Pyramid's construction. But whatever else we may decide in regard to Pyramid interpretation, we shall come to the conclusion that the true value of Pi is 3.1416 and that this ratio is fundamental to all celestial motions and their mathematical expressions. To-day we are in the position of demonstrating the functions of a Pyramid that does not exist, except in terms of an astronomical theory.

CYCLIC PERIODS.—As I have shown elsewhere repeatedly, the ancients had definite cyclic periods which were based on the Great Year and the Circle. The planetary period is 36 years, which is 1/10th of the circle of 360. cycle of seven planets is 252 years, which is 1/10th of the "seven times" or period of 2,520 years. The revolution of the 12 signs is 4,320 years, which is one-sixth of the Great Year or 25,920 years, and nine periods of 480 years. The great epochs of the prophetic record are allied to this initial 36 year cycle. Thus from the Adamic Epoch -3999 to the Flood -2343 is a period of 1,656 years, confirmed by Biblical genealogies, and is exactly 46 periods of 36 years. From the Flood -2343 to the Nativity -3, is a period of 2,340 years, and exactly 65 periods of 36 years. From Adam to Christ is a period of 3,996 years, or exactly 111 periods of 36 years. It may not, therefore, be a matter of surprise to observe that from the Nativity to the year 2337 complete, there are 2,340 years, which is exactly 65 periods of 36 years each.

The ancients had four great Ages which they called respectively the Gold, Silver, Copper and Iron ages. These find their reflection in the prophetic scheme in the Four great "Kingdoms" of the Babylonian, Medo-Persian, Greek and Roman Empires in Daniel's prophecy. Each Age was 6,480 years and the four Ages thus totalled to 25,920 years, which is the Great Year. The concept required that these Ages

followed a definite progression over a period of 60 planetary cycles of 432 years, i.e., 25,920 years, half of which was an involutionary period of creative activity, the other half being an evolutionary period of development. The periods thus instituted were Gold 5,184, Silver 3,888, Copper 2,592, Iron 1,296. Thus, 30 periods of 432 years or 12,960 years were employed in the process of spiritual precipitation and a like period in the process of sublimation. If we examine these periods we shall find that they are all based on the circle of 360 or 6 times 60, twelve circles giving 4,320, one-tenth of which is 432 or twelve times 36. Then 5,184 years is twelve times 432, 3,888 is nine times 432, 2,592 is six times 432, and 1,296 is three times 432. is an arithmetical progression of 12, 9, 6, 3, which when reduced to its simplest form is 4, 3, 2, 1 or 10. Hence are the $6 \times 6 \times 10$ or 360 degrees of the circle or days in the prophetic year. And 36 multiplied by 360 is the whole period of spiritual precipation, equivalent to 180 degrees since each period or Age has its dual aspect of precipitation and sublimation and 6,480 divided by 36 is 180, while 72 by 360 is the period of 12,960 years.

Thus some of the loftiest thoughts of the Kabalists and some of the keenest perceptions of the prophets are reduced to their numerical equivalents in the circle of existence.

THE GREAT STEP.—A singular feature of the Pyramid is that of the Great Step which lifts from the sloping floor of the Grand Gallery to the Horizontal Passage. Various measurements have been made by several explorers and in effect it is found that, apart from the incident of wear and tear, the East and West sides of the Step are not of uniform height. The Step now measures a mean height of 36 inches within a tenth of an inch. The Grand Gallery floor slope, cuts into the Horizontal or Great Step floor level at a distance of 80".852 from the Great Step face, forming the hypotenuse of a right-angled triangle. Examination of the features of this triangle show that the nearest whole numbers of inches in its three sides are 36, 72 and 81. It is believed that the intention was to define the length of 1,000 lunations in solar years, for it is found that the exact length of 80".852 is equal to 29503.588/365.242. The value of the lunation according to Daniel's implicit period is 29.530588, and the value for 1,000 lunations is therefore 29530.588, while the solar year, derived from the same source is 365.242 days. Hence the time interval derived is 80.852 years of 80y. 10m. 7d. Now from the Pyramid zero to the Great Step is 5842.34 years, and when measured from the Adamic Epoch, 24th October, -3999, gives date 1844, 26th January. From this date onwards the value 80.852 measures to 3rd December, 1924.

Presuming the whole number values of the Great Step measurements to be intentional, we find that the square of 36 or 1,296, added to the square of 72 or 5,184, gives 6,480, which is the number of years in the Age, or quarter of the Great Year. It will be observed that twice the square of 36 or 1,296 is 2,592, which is 1/10th of the Great Year, and that half the square of 72 or 5,184 is 2,592, again 1/10th of the Great Year. This seems to indicate that the measures of 36 and 72 were intended.

POINTS TO PONDER.—I invite my readers to give thought to the following statements which are advanced as facts:—

All bodies are of the same apparent size at a distance of 37 times their own diameters.

The Moon's diameter subtends an angle of 31' 16" at its mean distance from the earth.

The Sun's diameter subtends an angle of 32' 2" at its mean distance from the earth.

These angles are formed on the earth's centre.

The distance of either of these bodies from that centre will determine its actual diameter.

Luminous bodies become visible to us first only at that point where their rays impinge upon the earth's atmosphere.

Outside of the earth's atmosphere there is no such thing as light as we know it.

The etheric wave from a transmitting station becomes audible to us first only when it is intercepted by a "detector." In regard to light our atmospheric envelope is that detector. It receives the etheric wave and splits it up into what we call "light."

Mankind has never seen the Sun at a distance of 91 or more millions of miles, nor has he ever seen the Moon at a distance of over 240 thousand miles. All that he has ever seen is the image of the Sun or Moon at the limit of the earth's atmosphere. Outside this limit the Sun is "a rayless orb floating in a black conclave."

At certain points in their apparent orbits the Sun and Moon appear to be of exactly the same size. According to the law of optics the Sun is then just 37 times its diameter further from us than the Moon.

The differences of density, temperature and saturation of the various layers of the atmosphere preclude any estimate of the extent of the atmosphere by means of the barometer. Hence

we are unable to say with any certainty what the depth of our atmosphere may be.

THE SIGNAL BOX.—From the Autumnal Ingress we may expect a crisis to arise between the 11th and 19th November, when the Sun comes into adverse aspect with Saturn, Mars, Neptune and Jupiter successively, followed by a square of the ascendant to the Moon on the 22nd. The month promises to be one of exceptional adversity, for Mars was rising in opposition to Saturn at the Ingress, while at the lunation of the 5th, Mars will be in opposition to the luminaries and to Venus, and in quadrature to Jupiter. There will be a financial crisis and much alarm in trading circles, while there is little doubt that fire, flood and earthquake will cause great loss of life and property. In the Balkans, especially in Bulgaria, political excitement will run high. Earthquake disasters may be expected in about 42 and 132 East, and in 48 and 138 West longitudes. Violent storms will affect some parts of the temperate zone on the 4th to 7th inst., while

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

The ordinary chart of descent, that of the Moon at the epoch to the descendant at birth, exhibits a somewhat lopsided figure, the librations being in the proportion of 30 to 11, as shown in Fig. 1.

On December 12th, 1909, there was a partial eclipse of the Sun in ‡ 20 close to the Moon's libration of December 13th. On March 31st, 1910, Mars was in Il exactly in opposition to the Moon. On April 28th, 1910, Mars was in ‡ 28 close to the lunar libration of that date.

The contra-chart of descent, showing the transfer of the Moon at birth to the descendant of the epoch, is a much more lopsided and remarkable figure as will be observed from Fig. 2.

At two librations—excluding the fifth—the librations are on the wrong side of the line of central impulse, while the librations themselves are in the proportion of 13 to 1, a most abnormal figure

At the libration of September 1st, Mars is in γ 6 close to the Moon and the line of central impulse. On November 23rd, 3 is in γ 1 close to the central line. On December 20th, Mars was conjoined with the Moon close to the central point.

As the librations in Fig. 2 are abnormal to the extent named and fall in the sign Aries, they show the cause of the trouble to lie in the brain, and in all probability, as already mentioned, is due to the destruction of one side of the speech centre of the brain. As the exact date of the shock to the mother is not known it is not possible

to go further, but it looks as though it would be about the middle of December, following the eclipse of the Sun, and the position of Mars on the central point on December 20th, 1909.

Since writing the above, I have heard from my correspondent, who states, as far as he can remember, that the fright to the mother took place about the fifth month. This agrees with the two influences named, and is another clear illustration of the power of the epoch, and the chart of descent in determining these abnormalities.

Examination of the alternative chart of descent, the one below, is quite sufficient proof, when taken in conjunction with other similar figures, that when the librations extend all on one side of line of central impulse, that some abnormality is certain to exist.

THE RIDDLE OF THE AQUARIAN AGE. By J. R. BENNET.

- 1. The author's answer to E. H. Bailey's further criticism in the British Journal of Astrology (August, 1926), of the author's first reply which appeared in the July issue of the same. In the August issue of the British Journal of Astrology, the editor, Mr. E. H. Bailey, offered to reserve space for my reply. I must thank him for the consideration shown me, and now take advantage of the offer.
- 2. Although certain important matters were held in reserve in my first reply, and whilst I requested a written promise from Mr. Bailey to the effect that he would not in the event of my giving further information to him confidentially, divulge what was told him until I had written a second work, I will now forego that demand and no longer withhold such light as has been my privilege to receive. The amount of time and study which Mr. Bailey has devoted in trying to solve the riddle of "The Riddle of the Aquarian Age" gives evidence that his attitude of opposition to me is not prejudicial.
- 3. In making disclosures herein, which simply dissolve all arguments against my contention that a new age is upon us and rule out further criticism of my intention; it is not of great importance to the final issue, whether I fully answer all the points raised by Mr. Bailey in his last critique; however many of such serve to make clear much that might otherwise remain obscure. I have decided to utilise them in connection with the disclosures, and it is necessary for readers to follow the text closely in order that their judgment may not be disturbed by the verdict which Mr. Bailey has pronounced on mv astronomical attainments in his critique (August last). In using the words has arrived in his statement "that he holds no brief against the supposition that the Aquarian Age has arrived," Mr. Bailey cannot, nor can anyone else expect the whole world to be suddenly re-organised in twenty-four hours. I have given an interval in my book of twenty-four years, demonstrating 1920 A.D. terminals and A.D. 1944 institutional; and when a door is opening and we are about to enter a house, we must pass through the portals to do so.
- 4. In his last criticism (August) Mr. Bailey begins the second portion (par. 2) of the critique

by stating that the point in the debate is the present position of the Vernal Equinox.

5. Till now (the stage now reached in the debate) this has not been so on my part, since I have proceeded on different grounds regarding the relationship of stars of the constellation Aquarius, and I have not debated the position of some stars of the constellation of Pisces as being at the Vernal Equinoxial point, because the map in my book distinctly displays some stars of Pisces lying across this 21st March point.

6. There is no contention at all about the circumstance which is obvious, and I made enquiries from Greenwich Observatory, regarding stars of the constellation Pisces before making any diagram.

7. But the presence of some stars of Pisces at the Equinoxial point does not prevent stars other than those of the constellation Pisces taking up a similar position.

8. Mr. Bailey's assumption tends to place me in a wrong light and might lead many to suppose that I was attempting to misrepresent the actual position at the Vernal Equinox, which does not solely condition it as Pisceau.

9. In another paragraph (his critique) Mr. Bailey proceeds—that we are discussing whether the Vernal Equinox has actually precessed into the Sign (not constellation) of Aquarius, and has reached a point more than thirty degrees from the commencement of the Sign Aries of the Fixed zodiac.

10. (Fixed Zodiac). I must point out that the European Mathematical Zodiac constituted on a gradually shifting Vernal Equinox is not a Fixed Zodiac. This was illustrated in the B.J.A. by Vascoro (July 1924). Owing to precession of the Equinoxes, none of the mathematical signs of 30 degrees, each of the European Zodiac are fixed, not even the first sign Aries, although there is a fixed constellation of stars called Aries.

11. The Vernal Equinox which gradually shifts each year slightly, constitutes the starting point Zero Sign Aries.

12. In the 3rd Volume, Secret Doctrine, it is stated "The Astronomers of Europe change westward the beginning of Aries and of all other signs every year."

13. When Mr. Bailey states "the position of the Equinox is determined by Sign alone," this statement is a contradiction in terms the reverse of which is true, i.e.—the Equinox determines the signs of the European Zodiac, and the position of the Equinox is referred to the constellations.

14. It is perfectly obvious that the Vernal Equinox never can precess, did precess or will precess into the European Zodiacal Sign (not con-

stellation) Aquarius, because its eleventh portion nominated Aquarius, is part of the body composing this zodiac of which the Sign Aries the head is constituted by the Vernal Equinox, whose movement brings the same movement to every other sign.

- 15. If Mr. Bailey refers to a Fixed Zodiac, then it must be some other than the European Zodiac, and belonging to another race.
- 16. This determination brings me to a disclosure, and to show that there is only one manner in which the European Zodiac can be considered to have fixity, and this is by being referable to a fixed star. This fixed star is Hamal signifying "The Lamb (Hamal) the Shepherd of the Zodiac and the antagonist of the snake." (For reference see 3rd volume, Secret Doctrine, page 321).
- 17. The position of the fixed star Hamal thus gives us a fixed reference for our shifting Zodiac. It is a large star in the constellation of Aries marked (a) Arietis (see Bernard's Nautical Charts, 1925), and is referred to on page 34 of the "Riddle of the Aquarian Age," as being now about thirty degrees measured along the Celestial Equator from the Vernal Equinox, where it would have formerly stood about the beginning of the Age of Pisces. Its right ascension is over thirty degrees as shown on the Bernard's Nautical Chart. and its zodiacal position shown on Philips Planisphere of both hemispheres is seen to be aligned thirty degrees from the Vernal Equinox at 0 degrees of the European Zodiacal sign Taurus. A reckoning on its annual variation in right ascension is also made in my book (page 73), and it is also marked on the map therein, on which it will be noticed no ancient twelfth Sign is marked, but a space has been left blank on the map. map showing one end of the Ancient Eleventh division at the Vernal Equinox.
- 18. By virtue of the biblical words "the last shall be first and the first shall be last," the twelfth Ancient division under the New Dispensation, which Christ inaugurated and brought into being becomes the first sign, starting at the Star Hamal (the Lamb), the symbol of the Shepherd of the Zodiac.
- 19. Beginning then at the Star Hamal, as instating the first sign of a new Zodiacal dispensation, a twelfth mathematical division or sign therefrom consequently defines the space of 30 degrees lying between Hamal and the present Vernal Equinox in which space be most of the stars of the constellation of Pisces.
- 20. In consistence with this, and in consequence of which, the beginning of the Eleventh of New

Dispensation occupies the space defined by the Vernal Equinox at one extremity and extending to about Alpha Aquarie called Sadalmelik (a third Mag. star of the constellation of Aquarius), which star, I pointed out before, has 0 degrees of declination (I shall refer to the matter of declination again), and 330°-25 R.A., lying about 30 degrees in distance along the Celestial Equator from the Vernal Equinox.

21. This teaching is not directed as an argument to convince Mr. Bailey, because I shall meet his argument presently on his own ground.

The remarks on pages 27 and 28 of this issue comprise the first part of Mr. Bennet's reply, and in the next issue I propose to deal with each paragraph in detail, for which purpose a number has been affixed to each.—Editor.

MID-DISTANCES.

(Continued from p. 11.)

The mid point, or mid-distance between the luminaries is not determined in the same way as those between the luminaries and the planets, as explained in the last issue. The determining factor is derived from the interchange of the Moon and ascendant in the pre-natal Epoch, except that the horoscopical Sun is substituted for the ascendant. Now there are four points where the mid-distance between the luminaries can fall, and these four points are regulated as follows:—

- 1. When the Moon is increasing at birth (both above and below).
 - (a) When the interchange of the Moon and ascendant is regular, the centre point is the actual mid-distance of the luminaries.
 - (b) When the Moon at birth sets at the epoch, take the opposite place of the Moon at birth, and find the mid-point between such opposite point and the Sun.
 - (c) When the Moon's birth place rises at the epoch, but the Moon at the epoch is found in the descendant of the horoscope, take the opposite longitude of the Sun and find the mid-point between that and the radical longitude of the Moon.
 - (d) When both factors (Moon and ascendant) are reversed at the epoch, take the opposite longitudes of the luminaries and calculate the mid-distance between them. It will be exactly opposite to 1 (a).
- 2. When the Moon is decreasing (either above or below).
 - (a) When both Moon and ascendant at birth are reversed at the epoch, so the opposite points of the Moon and Sun should be taken and the mid-point then found. It will be exactly opposite to 1 (a).
 - (b) When the Moon at birth rises at the epoch, the Moon is found in the descendant, take the Moon's place at birth, and the opposite longitude of the Sun, and find the middistance between the two. The point thus found will be exactly opposite to 1 (b).
 - (c) When the Moon's birth-place sets at the epoch, and the Moon is found at the epoch in the ascendant of the horoscope, find the distance between the opposite longitude of the Moon and the radical longitude of the

- Sun. The point found will be exactly opposite to 1(c).
- (d) When both factors at birth, are reversed at the epoch, the radical longitudes of the luminaries are to be taken, and the midpoint calculated. The point thus found will be the same as 1 (a), and exactly opposite to 1 (d).

There will be of course, occasional variation, but these will be readily determined from the horoscope. The rules were given in the Nov. issue for 1924, but in this issue I have elaborated them to make the necessary calculations more easier of understanding.

Some illustrations of how to find these points were given in the Nov., 1924 issue, but as they will be referred to later, it is not necessary to give further particulars.
