WHAT OF THE YEAR 1927?

Greetings.

Once more the Wheel of time turns round. Another year is finished and a new one commences. Honour and success to some, misfortune and disaster to others. And so time passes, and once again it is my privilege to wish my readers a Happy and Prosperous New Year.

Perhaps for once there may be brighter days in store, but methinks 'tis but the calm before the coming storm; a gentle breathing space wherein we may collect our forces, and reorganise our reserves in readiness for that which is to follow.

In this issue I propose to deal with the four quarterly figures, and in place of the usual horoscope of the month, to give the figure for the mutation conjunction of Jupiter and Saturn, of 26th January, 1842, and deal with its effects so far as the coming year is concerned.

The Year 1927.

Strictly speaking the Vernal Equinox is the commencement of the year, and I will take the Winter solstice first. The Sun enters Capricorn on December 22nd, 1896, at 2.34 p.m., when Gemini will be rising, and the Sun will be with Venus and the Dragon's Tail in the eighth house. This denotes deaths among people of rank and distinction, landowners, ladies of title, and much mortality generally. The position of Mercury, on the seventh cusp in trine with the Moon is favourable for trade relations with other countries, and foreign and colonial trade will receive an impetus. The position of the Moon

close to the fourth cusp in square to Mars threatens fires, seismic disasters and storms. Railway accidents are denoted. Educational affairs will become prominent. Mars, being part ruler of the sixth, in square to the Moon is evil for the public health, and threatens epidemic disorders, diphtheria, etc. The elevated position of Jupiter is favourable for the King and Government, but with Neptune in opposition, the revolutionary element will attempt discord and endeavour to foment strikes in the country. The position of Uranus in the eleventh denotes reformative measures in Parliament, and in all probability connected with public institutions. Mars in the twelfth denotes much crime, murders and outrages. A riot in a prison is not unlikely. Disturbances are shown in Ireland. troubles occur in India where Mars is culminating. Violent earthquakes are denoted in the 90th degree of both E. and W. Long.

The Vernal Equinox.

The solar ingress into Aries takes place just before 3 p.m. on March 21st, 1927, the Sun being again in the eighth house. As a fixed sign rises, the influence of this figure will last for the succeeding twelve months. The Sun has just separated from Uranus, and applies to the trine of Saturn.

Neptune rising denotes socialistic and revolutionary propaganda disseminated through the country. Trade will be good and the exchequer returns favourable, but there will be heavy expenditure in military matters, for Mercury ruler of the second conjoined with Jupiter is in

square to Mars. Saturn in the fourth house opposed to Mars denotes earthquakes and mining disasters, inclement weather and heavy gales. The Dragon's Tail in the fifth shows sickness among children, and losses in theatrical affairs. Colonial affairs will be successful, and a Royal journey abroad is not unlikely. The elevated position of Mars, in square to Mercury and Jupiter, denotes religious disputes, deaths of preachers, attacks against clerics and many libel and slander actions.

Mars culminating at Petrograd, and heavily afflicted denotes a reign of terror in Russia, fires, murders and rapine. Seismic troubles are denoted in 22 E. Long. Mars close to the ascendant of London will cause many disastrous fires, and a religious riot is indicated.

The Summer Solstice.

The Sun enters the sign Cancer at 10.22 a.m., on June 22nd, 1927, and will be placed in the twelfth house in square to the Moon, Jupiter and Uranus, the three latter being conjoined just below the cusp of the eighth house. A political or ministerial crisis is denoted from this position. Reforms are shown in Parliamentary affairs. The trine of Mercury in the eleventh to the Moon shows an active time in political circles. and important legislation is shown in the Commons. Saturn close to the fourth cusp denotes a cold summer and rain, also seismic troubles in the 4th degree of W. Long. A mining disaster is threatened. The conjunction of Mars and Venus on the cusp of the twelfth house. with Neptune in the same house points to much crime and murder, outrages against women, drugging and secret vices. Scandals are shown in workhouses and schools.

Grave troubles are shown in France and Italy. The culmination of Mars in 63 E. Long, and Neptune in 78 E. Long points to serious difficulties in the near East of Asia.

The Autumn Quarter.

The Sun enters the sign Libra at 1. 17. a.m. on September 24th 1927, and applies to the opposition of Uranus and conjunction of Mars. The ingress takes place in the third house. The Sun, however, has the sextile of Saturn. The position of Neptune on the second cusp shows fraud on the revenue, but the conjunction of the Moon and Venus in Virgo in the second house is beneficial for trade and the exchequer. Railway accidents are denoted and some danger of strikes. Saturn in the fifth denotes sickness among children, and troubles in theatrical affairs.

Colonial affairs will be disturbed, also shipping and religious matters. Deaths of artists and actors are denoted. The opposition of the Sun to Uranus, and its conjunction with Mars, ruler of the tenth is evil for Royalty and the Government and a crisis of some magnitude is threatened, but the sextile of Saturn to the Sun will enable the trouble to be overcome. Many marriages are shown, also state ceremonials. Legislation affecting land and the workers will be introduced. Hospitals will benefit greatly.

Great excitement is shown in this country. Storms are denoted in the Atlantic. Seismic troubles are shown in 40 E. Long.

The lunations for each month, and the special judgment on the conjunctions of Jupiter and Uranus, &c., will be given in the succeeding issues. Next month, the figure for the solar eclipse of January 3rd will be dealt with.


It appears to me that the best place to view the Total Eclipse will be off N. Russia in Emperor Nicholas II Land, where the duration of the Eclipse is almost at its longest. Northern Scandinavia would be more convenient and give good results.

HOROSCOPE OF THE MONTH.

By E. H. BAILEY, F.A.S.

THE GREAT MUTATION.

The figure appended herewith is that of the Mutation conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter, which took place on 26th January, 1842, at 5h. 28m. 44s. a.m. at London. This figure has been utilised for the purpose of Mundane predictions, by treating it as a horoscope and calculating the directions therefrom. On two previous occasions, I have made it the basis of my annual forecast in these pages, and I again use it in conjunction with the ordinary forecasts on the previous pages.



A very considerable amount of remarkable information can be drawn from this map, and those who have a copy of the Lecture on "World Periods and Cycles," by Sepharial, will find much that is interesting and instructive therein.

As an instance of some of the directions from this figure, we find that the Ascendant conjunction Jupiter and Saturn measures to the Indian mutiny. Ascendant conjunction Mars with the Boer War, and the M.C. to the conjunction of Jupiter and Saturn to the Great War. A detailed list of directions will be found in "Transits and Planetary Periods," by Sepharial, to which my readers are referred.

I am using the Radix system of directing for my predictions, as I am satisfied that it is by far the most reliable method extant, and my opinion is confirmed by many others who have used the system.

The meridian is now in parallel with Venus. This is a very favourable influence for the country and people generally. It will benefit Royalty, ladies of title, and also children and theatrical matters. The ascendant is in sextile to Uranus. This denotes reform in hospitals and institutions, astrological and metaphysical developments, electrification of railways, and developments in electrical and scientific affairs. Jupiter transits Uranus in April, an important month.

The Sun has just left the square of the radical Moon. This was exact at the fall of 1925, and co-incided with the death of Queen Alexandra. It has also just left the square of the Nodes, and the conjunction of the fourth cusp. This has probably had a close connection with the general strike and coal dispute.

The Part of Fortune has been in parallel with Noptune during 1926, which well accounts for the strikes, and Russian intrigue.

Mercury has progressed to a square of the Sun. This is not good for the revenue and trade, denoting losses, decrease of receipts, and danger of increased taxation.

Uranus has progressed to the sixth house, and has just left the square of Mars, an indication of lawlessness and rioting among the workers, and now forms a trine of Neptune, which points to a better understanding between the employers and the workers, autocracy ## and democracy ## being in good aspect.

Jupiter and Saturn have progressed to the third degree of Aries, where they receive the conjunctions of Jupiter and Uranus in July and August, 1927, a sure indication of important reforms, political developments and notable occurrences.

The total eclipse of the Sun of January 3rd, falls close to Saturn and Jupiter, stirring up trouble in India and Mexico, and probably Greece. The solar eclipse of June 29th, is in opposition to the great conjunction, and denotes foreign complications and international disputes.

August appears to be an unpleasant month, for Mars will be in transit over the progressed secondary Moon, which will then be in square with Uranus and opposition Mars. Strikes and disorders are shown and danger of railway accidents.

THE KALEIDOSCOPE.

By SEPHARIAL.

A REMARKABLE HOROSCOPE.—That Mrs. Besant was due to make some sort of stir in the world was obvious from the horoscope of her birth. In the subjoined figure we find no less than six of the planets in cardinal signs, and the question is as to how many of these, if any but Jupiter and the Moon were in angles. For it should be noted that the exact time of her birth is not agreed upon among those who have attempted her horoscope. It has been variously given as from 5.25 onwards. All estimates concur in the view that the sign Aries was rising,

ing sign is of the martial type associated with the pioneer tendency. But as we all know too much limelight is not good for the vision, and Mrs. Besant very wisely seeks a good deal of retirement and seclusion, and knows when to disappear from the scene and let the other players have a chance. The abnormal number of retrograde planets will not escape the notice of the astrological student. This with the culmination of Neptune and the presence of three malefic planets in the 12th house of the heavens, is a warning which ought to have engaged the P.T.S., whose

with Mars, its ruler in the sign Taurus. It hap pens to be a sign of short ascension, and a considerable difference in the rising degree of that sign, would not make a great deal of difference in the time of birth, which does not appear to have been accurately taken at the time. There is, however, an arc of four planets which culminates with Neptune, which planet afflicts the Sun, Moon, Mercury, and possibly the ascendant also, and is retrograde in the house of hidden (occult) enemies. I could put my hand on the personality by whom this surcharge of evil is dominating the life of the "Protector." There is something Cromwellian about this title, and there can be little doubt that Mrs. Besant has "a passion for reforming the world," to quote one of her early critics. It is certain that nobody with so many planets in cardinal signs could fail of catching the public eye, and more especially so when the ris-

excursions into the domain of the occult are at all times dangerous, and may yet prove to be disastrous. This retrogradation of the planets is in strange conflict with the more progressive indications of the horoscope, and cannot but give rise to many vicissitudes and adversities on the uphill gradient Mrs. Besant has elected to attempt. The immediate rising of the planet Uranus in direct opposition to the planet Mercury is thoroughly characteristic of her independence and waywardness, and will account for the many alienations she has effected in regard to both persons and places. It cannot be truly said that the affections of the planet Mercury tend to mental stability, for while separating from the planet Venus it has the quadrature of both Moon and Jupiter, the direct opposition of Uranus, and the sesquare of both Neptune and Saturn. Fortunately the ruler of the horoscope, Mars, is in

sextile to both Moon and Jupiter, which helps towards a final security of position, but being retrograde and in the sign of its debility (Taurus) its influence is not so strong as would normally be the case. One cannot but speculate upon the question as to what Mrs. Besaut might not have achieved, had not so many planets affected her life from movable signs, had she been able to confirm her early promise of Christian zeal, had she been suitably and happily married, had she envisaged more clearly the destiny of the British nation throughout the world, or had evinced a more tractable spirit. As a true child of Benjamin in the morning of life she will devour the prey, and in the evening will divide the spoil, for leadership and popularity have penalties that are all their own.

THE SANE OUTLOOK.—In the New Britannica, Sir Ian Hamilton has made these sane observations regarding the inevitableness of war under certain conditions. He says: "Because good Europeans hate war in 1926 it does not follow that they hated war in 1914, or that they will hate it in 1964. Because Sir Bedivere has flung Excalibur far out into the mire, let no one imagine that the glamour of the sword is for ever quenched. Against that spiritual symbol, the shield of Locarno, welded by the spectre of the falling franc, will form a poor protection. day, pacifists speak to the converted, but their young sons have been born with the old instincts. Those who have seen with their own eyes and suffered in their own bodies know the ugly truths of war, but they cannot convey their knowledge to the younger generation. The old lack imagination to tell; the young lack imagination to believe. Nothing will stop war save the Second Advent of Christ."

In saying this he has said enough, and has said it truly, but not with that inclusiveness that is due to all haters of war, whether they be European or Asiatic, American or African, for there are good men in all lands who lament war as a fever and contagion of hell, and the greatest of all woes that can befall humanity, because it is the only one that engenners mutual hate. A touch of Nature, whether it brings famine, plague, blight, fire, flood or cataclysm, makes the whole world kin; but war sets nation against nation, kingdom against kingdom, and father against son. It is the mightiest weapon of the Antichrist. And when Sir Ian cautiously deferred the outbreak of war to so distant a date as 1964, we may be assured that he was writing circumspectly, and with intention not to alarm. But what follows is perspicuous of his inmost thoughts and premonitions. "The year 1926 finds war in the melting-pot—Great Britain and the United States should use the respite to overhaul their machinery. Let neither of those great, but strangely improvident nations imagine that because they mean to do the right thing by humanity, they will on that account escape the challenge of the sword."

We know Sir Ian to be too good a General to imagine that machinery overhauled in the peace days of 1926, if such there really be, would avail in the least degree in the warfare of 1964, supposing that such a state exists at that date. What really seems to be the burden of Sir Ian's exhortation is, that as war is the last arbitrament to which the evolution and experience of six thousand years has led us, it is finally imposed upon us as a penalty of existence, but that while recognising its inevitability, we must so fully equip ourselves as to be in a position to offer it the most effectual resistance. This, in short is the war against war, which is supposed to have been fought out in 1914-18. But that world war was fought with the wrong kind of weapons, and in the wrong spirit. "Hatred does not cease by hatred, hatred ceases by love." So much we have learned from the Gospel of Christ-"on earth Peace, goodwill towards man." We have yet need to learn how rightly to love so that the goodwill of Heaven may be reflected in the relations of man towards man. In the present state of the world war is inevitable. Of that there can be no doubt. All the world is arming, and quite obviously not for self-defence alone, though even that would betray a state of mind which is far removed from that goodwill that is born of mutual trust and brotherly love. For "perfect love casteth out fear." Fear and hatred are twinborn, they are both children of the darkness. Sudden conversions are individual, and not collective. The man is not born who is either wise enough or powerful enough to make war unthinkable, and therefore improbable. The world is thinking war, and thought is the motive power of the world. Our bounden duty as a nation is to be prepared for it, as the strong man armed that keepeth the gates of the city, that he who abideth therein may sleep in peace. The answer to the poised spear is the shield. Great Britain's answer to the world menace is its Heaven-sent destiny. If the Word, its witness in Stone, and its witness in the heavens have spoken truly-and who is foolish enough to doubt it?—then the world's last tribulation will begin in 1928. Therefore it is wrong for us to think in terms of 1964, when the question of national equipment and preparedness for war is raised. Whensoever our nation has had occasion to challenge the enemy, it has

ever ended with the words: "All's well." That reveals the sense of security which possesses the mind of our "strangely improvident nation." It voices our faith in a Providence greater than human, and our faith in the great destiny that is imposed upon us: "As Thou didst promise to our forefathers, Abraham and his seed forever." Let us be sincere about this. With the Word and its witnesses before us, it is the only sane outlook.

LATE PYRAMID REVELATIONS.—The intention of the Pyramid to define the scheme of things in terms of the solar year is externally evident from the fact that the mean circumference of its base line is 36,524 inches, the value in days of 100 solar years. Also that its height of 5,813 is the radius of a circle, whose circumference is equal to the four sides of a square, the circle was 36,524 inches. In thus finding a circle whose circumference is equal to the four sides of a square, the circle was squared, and the value of PI was determined. It is now known that the relations of the diameter of a circle to its circumference are as 3.1416 to 1. order to obtain this exact height of the structure, it was necessary to observe a certain slope of its sides from the base to the apex. This involved an intimate knowledge of the properties of a right-angled triangle, such as is formed by the perpendicular height, the half length of the base line, and the length of the slope side. obtain that exact length of the slope side, the square on which was equal to the sum of the squares on the perpendicular and the base, it would be necessary to observe a definite angle of inclination. It is, therefore, obvious that the builders were fully informed in plane and spherical trigonometry. But when it is asserted, as it most emphatically is, that the predestined history of a selected people answers exactly to the internal passage system of the Pyramid on the same standard unit of one inch to the year, we are facing a claim that is of the most portentous nature, such that, if proved to be true, must revolutionise the whole outlook of our race upon human policy in relation to the revealed plan and purpose of God. The fact that this revelation has been reserved until the end of the Dispensation is of itself significant. It shows that man was intended to aspire to self-development and self-expression in blissful ignorance of a settled order of things to the realisation of which the whole of his efforts were unconsciously directed. It is in short the revelation of God's Way with man, a measure of freedom, a measure of responsibility, limited only by a circle of necessity within which he is bound to act. Human destiny is encircled by Divine Love, and this wall of defence around the Citadel is capable of indefinite expansion and enlargement as the needs of man's spiritual development may require. Thus, the Circle of Necessity is a wall protecting, and not a prison confining the soul of man. Are these Assuredly facts portrayed in the Pyramid? they are. If we reconstruct the edifice on its own basis of solar-year dimensions we shall find that, despite the ravages of time and faults due to attrition, vandalism and seismic disturbances, the structure of the Pyramid, as we now know it, comes as closely to that design as the most careful handiwork of the watchmaker, and expert surveys reveal the fact that the measurements are such as to leave no doubt that the intention of the builder was to define certain geometrical relations in all parts of the structure, which are not only cosmical, but also prophetically human. The inevitable conclusion is that man is governed by cosmical laws, and that all is hedged by a Divinity, "which shapes our ends, rough-hew them how we may."

INTERIOR MEASURES.—The following simple facts will carry their own significance to the discerning mind. The Passage System of the Great Pyramid is on the scale of one inch to the year (Solar measure) or one inch to the month (Lunar measure). There are thus two witnesses to the chronological scheme of the Great Pyramid, and as such they are constantly called into requisition in the prophetic Word of God. ordinances of the Sun and Moon are the only measures of time known to us. On this basis we find that all the sloping passages are solar and the only passage that is horizontal is lunar. In the former case we have the inch to the year measure and in the latter the inch to the month measure. From this standard of measurement there is no departure. From the Flood -2343 to the Birth of Christ is 2,340 years. From the Birth of Christ to the end of the Age is 2,340 The terminal period is 143 years, and this is half the displacement factor of 286 years (inches) defined by the position of the Passages from the north and south central plane of the Pyramid. From the Exodus-1486 to the centre of the Portcullis (Christ) "No one cometh unto the Father but by me," is 3,487½ inches. Immediately below the Portcullis, and at the same distance below the base of the Pyramid as the Portcullis is above it, is the Pit, which is therefore 3,487½ inches from the defined date of the Exodus. The definition of the Exodus is the junction of the Ascending and Descending Passages, the parting of the ways. The Antechamber

is 116.26 inches in length. This is the diameter of a circle of 365.24 inches and defines the solar year. Its radius is 58.13 which is one hundredth part of the height of the Pyramid of 5,813 inches. But also it is the exact measure of 3,487 days in months of 30 days, twelve such months going to the circle of 360, which is a prophetic year. The exodus date -1486 is the centre of a circle which on a radius of 3,487½ inches cuts through the centre of the Portcullis (Christ) and through the centre of the Pit (Satan) and is tangent to the vertical of the South wall of the King's Chamber, which defines the end of the Age. If the plane of the King's Chamber floor is extended northwards to meet the plane of the axis of the Descending Passage when extended northwards, the two lines meet at a point which exactly defines the position of the Pole Star (Alpha Draconis) at date -2143, which is exactly 200 years after the Flood. The measure $3,487\frac{1}{2}$ is the radius of a circle whose circumference is 21,913 inches and this divided by 60 gives the year value 365.2 (days). The Exodus, is therefore, the central fact of the present Dispensation of the world. It is the line of demarcation between the Old World and the New World, and its level on the 5th course of masonry defines the line of demarcation between the superior and inferior worlds. The circle of necessity of which this incident is the centre, limits the operation of the natural law to the date 11th July, 1920, when, according to the lunar measure of one inch to the month, the progress of British-Israel brings us to the Portcullis. From this point onwards the Captain takes the helm in person and presides over the destinies of the Anglo-Saxon race. this point also He is opposed by the Prince of the Powers of the Air. It will be due to this Divine Hand upon the helm that we shall weather the storm. From 11th July, 1920, to the Whit-Sunday, 5th June, 1927, will measure 2,520 days or seven "times." This is the period of preparation for that "time of tribulation such as was not since the world began." The Sun and Moon in their orbits perform their revolutions and come together again to within one-thousand of a second of time in 1,040 years. From the founding of Babylon at the full Moon of April -2228 to the same full Moon in A.D. 1932, is exactly four times this period. That Full Moon will take place at the vernal equinox. From the date 1st December, 1925, when the signing of the Treaty of Locarno was affected as a human shield against the uplifted spear, to the 6th October, 1928 are 1,040 days, from the 6th October, 1928, to the vernal equinox of March, 1932 are 1,260 days. The explicit period of Daniel's prophecy

is 1,260 days; another explicit period is 2,300 days. The difference of these periods is 1,040 days. The measure from the Exodus level to the King's Chamber floor level is 1701.87 inches. The added height of the King's Chamber is 230.386 inches. Their sum is 1932.25. By the same measure of one inch per month we come under the protection of the King's Chamber North Wall, in March, 1932.

ECLIPSE INDICATIONS.—In connection with the Great War of 1914-1918, it was found that what I characterised as the War eclipse was a lunar eclipse on the 12th March, 1914. It very significantly fell in opposition to the Midheaven of the ex-Kaiser's horoscope of birth in Pisces 21 degrees. That this was the war eclipse is determined by the fact that Mars was in transit over the line of that eclipse at the end of July, 1914, when the war began and was also in transit over the same line again in March, 1918, when the last great offensive was launched by the Central Powers. That it would fail and end in disaster, so far as Germany was concerned, was indicated by the opposition of Mars and the eclipsed Moon to the Midheaven of the ex-Kaiser's horoscope. This eclipse was followed by a large eclipse of the Sun on the 21st August. There was no transit over the line of the eclipse until Mars reached Aquarius 28, when it formed the opposition to the eclipse. But this did not prevent the scattering of crowns and sceptres in December, 1918, when Saturn crossed the place of this eclipse for the first time, following the opposition of Uranus in June of the same year. For it was observed that the solar eclipse fell on the place of the great star Regulus, the ruler.

Similarly it is observed that at the end of 1927 there is an eclipse of the Moon which is the veritable tocsin of war in the Near East, for at that eclipse the planets Mars and Saturn are forming a conjunction, Saturn being in Sagittarius 11, while Mars has just entered the same sign and is conjoined with Saturn in the 13th degree close to the line of the eclipse. Mars will actually transit this line on the 30th December. This eclipse is the more remarkable because it falls on the place of significant planets in the horoscopes of Great Britain's ruler (King George) and Italy's virtual ruler (Mussolini). Rome is under the sign of the Dragon (Scorpio) and the power to tread upon scorpions was given to the sons of Benjamin.

A comparison of the two horoscopes shows the factors disposed as follows:—

England—Sun in Gemini 12.26, Mars in Leo 5.35.

Italy-Mars in Gemini 13.9, Sun in Leo 6.0. The eclipse therefore falls in conjunction with the Sun in the Royal horoscope, and with Mars in that of the Duce. The eclipse is rendered the more significant because it has the combined trausit of two malefic planets. Saturn will transit the line of the eclipse on the 20th January, 1928. The beginning of the end is here. Now my readers will observe that I have for some time past called attention to this singularly malefic horoscope of the Italian leader wherein the Moon is besieged by the malefic planets Mars and Saturn, in the violent sign Gemini. If France should tire of her "white elephant" in Syria and barter her mandate for a wider field of enterprise in northern Africa, then the rise of "the little horn" of the prophecies will be synchronous with the realisation of that Romanus redivivus of which Mussolini dreams, and it will rise in Syria already separated from Turkey as was prophesied.

The eclipse will be followed by one of the Sun on Christmas Eve, 1927, when Saturn and Mars will be nearly conjoined and rising at Smyrna. It falls on the Midheaven of the horoscope of King George V. and has the transit of Mars on the 20th January, 1928. This is an important and critical date. Reference to the ingress of the Sun into Capricorn on the 22nd December, 1927, shows the action of Mars and Saturn to be centred in the region between 30 and 36 degrees East longitude. There can be little doubt that the Arab community will be caught in a great maelstrom which in process of time will sweep the world.

POWER OF THE BEAST.—A correspondent sends me the following notes in reference to the present working power of 666 in the world. The General Strike began in this country on the 4th May, 1926. It ended on the 20th November, when the prolongation of the Coal Strike was called off by "Comrade" Cook. This shows the Strike to have lasted just 6.66 months. The head of the beast is in Moscow but its paws are set upon different parts of the world as occasion serves, and one of them has been pressing heavily on the heart of "John Citizen." The Trade Union Congress figures which were printed at the beginning of the General Strike were 3,653,529 votes in favour of a strike. The number is just 1/13th of the population of the British Isles. Thirteen is the Hebriac number of negation and is defined in the Kabalah as "the Reaping Skeleton" or Death. The present population of these islands is the area of a circle whose diameter is 7777, equal to 47,502,350, and the

thirteenth part is 3.654.026, which is filled by the ifs of our British Constitution, or shall we say the population of the Irish Free State. Another singular fact emerges from the duration of the general strike which lasted from the 4th May, for 8½ days, or 7½ working days, as one of these days was Sunday, which is always a Restday. As "one day for a year" has been given to us by Divine ordination, it follows that 1/24th part of a year is equal to one hour, and on this reckoning the hour equals 15.22 days of the vear-circle, so that half an hour equals 7.61 days of the year circle. Thus there was a literal "silence in heaven for the space of about half an hour," and we see that prophecy has its workaday fulfilment for the man who watches the clock equally as for him who marks the slow movement of the hands upon the great dial of the Universe.

PLANETARY PERIODS.—In connection with the forthcoming conjunction of Saturn and Mars in the sign Sagittarius, it may be well to remind students of Astrology that this sign is associated with the 9th House and that it denotes religious matters, teleological subjects, foreign affairs, and long distance or other-world communications. The last conjunction in this sign took place in December, 1899, and after a lapse of a little over 28 years it will recur in almost the same longitude. The conjunction is formed in successive signs of the zodiac in about every two years. We witnessed the effects of its operation in Japan when it was operating from the sign Libra, which rules that country. Passing into Scorpio at the end of 1925, it was followed by great floods in Bombay, which is under the rule of that sign, and also a considerable revolt and internecine strife in Brazil. The next conjunction of Saturn and Mars in Sagittarius will take place on the 26th December 1927, at 52 minutes past noon. Their longitude will then be Sagittarius 12° 53'. The Act of Uniformity passed by the first Parliament of Charles II in 1662 was attended by a conjunction of these planets in Sagittarius. After a period of 265 years we find them again in conjunction in the same sign and simultaneously we are faced by some remarkable happenings in the ecclesiastical world, the first being a revision of the Prayer Book and Psalter and the next being the repeal of the Roman Catholic Disabilities Act. Both will conspire to undermine the prestige of the Anglican Church and to give Romanism a more powerful lever on the public mind. There was a conjunction of the planets Uranus and Jupiter in the 3rd degree of Aries in February, 1845. There will be another in the same place in both

July and September, 1927. In 1845 Queen Victoria reigned over Great Britain and her horoscope reveals no point of rapport with this position in Aries 3. But now King George V. reigns and his Ascendant is in Aries 3. Hence the significance of this conjunction. It denotes great reforms in the Constitution and Laws of the country. These indications assume a critical significance in September, when Mars will oppose both Uranus and Jupiter on the occasion of their second conjunction this year. What has been called the epoch of Industrial Science began in the year 1844. After a period of 83 years it would appear that we are on the eve of a period of Disintegration, and as it is ever easier to destroy than to build, the period of its operation will accordingly be shortened. It has been truly said that "If God does not intervene, the human race must ere long be plunged into an era of disaster unparalleled in human historybecause science, once devoted predominantly to preservation, is now chiefly devoted to annihilation, despite the fact that at no time in history have preventive and remedial science made greater strides towards the betterment of the race." This is true, and the last great war brought the ugly fact to our recognition. ultimate appeal of every nation is to the sword and destruction. To-day we have whippet tanks which, behind a smoke screen of their own making, run like motor cars, artillery with a range of over 100 miles, aeroplanes that drop bombs with four tons of death-dealing charge, machine-guns which splutter certain death at the rate of 100 shots per second, and poison-gases which can strike the population of whole towns with blindness, asphyxiation and even catalepsy. These are all the works of destruction which man has planned against his fellow man, and they are Satanic in their origin, in their operation and in their effects. Yet with these same weapons will God establish Himself in the earth -and God is Love. Russia is stirring up racial hatred, inciting the black and yellow peoples against the white, intent on bringing down the Christian nations and all those ideals for which they stand, and primarily Great Britain. Why? Because Russia is the willing instrument of the Antichrist. But who is stirring up Christendom? Least of all the clergy, those blind leaders of the blind who know not to interpret the prophecies, who look askance at the miracles which are all around them even now, and who have bartered their birthright for a mess of pottage and exchanged the revelation of God's Word for the manmade theories of the carnal minded. Our case seems almost hopeless and would be wholly so if

Heaven should leave us to our own devices. But beyond the smoke of the Armageddon, on the other side of the River of Knowledge, there is a land that is waiting for workers, a land that is worth the winning, a kingdom where Christ is King. If I did not believe this, then the revelation of the Word, the Pyramid and the Stars has no consent or meaning and has but served to make me thrice a fool. But it is written: "In the mouth of two Witnesses or three shall every word be established." And thus I have found it.

THE SIGNAL BOX.—From the indications current, it appears that the Reaper will be exceptionally busy between the 6th and 15th. During the same interval the Government will score a victory and will get strong opposition from the Bolsheviks. The 17th is adverse for Labour conditions and for Publishing and Broadcasting. The end of the month shows public stir and protest against the Government, and a remarkable increase in hidden violence and incendiary acts. Earthquakes and storms occur about the 3rd, snow on the 10th, and the rest of the month will be very cold and searching, but fuel and food plentiful.



The ordinary chart of descent (Fig. 1.) is an extremely remarkable one, the whole of the librations, with the exception of the tenth, being on one side of the line of impulse from epoch to

birth, and in addition, as in all irregular epochs, there are two points where the Moon's librations continue instead of returning.

The entire ten librations fall in the sign Sagittarius, the sign connected with the hips and thighs, and it is with these two parts of the body where the malformation exists, the two thigh bones being fixed at an angle with the body, causing the "knees to meet and lap over each



other when he walks." The abnormality would not have appeared had the librations crossed equally over the line of impulse from epoch to birth, but the fact that with one exception, including two central points (4th and 9th), they were all outside the line, was a direct proof of

some malformation or abnormality in that part of the body ruled by the sign in which the librations fell.

Now the converse chart of descent (Fig. 2.) though not so irregular shows two centre points (1st and 6th), where the librations continue instead of reversing, and are all found in the sign Scorpio, a sign typical of deformities and dwarfness. At the librations of August 25th, October 19th, January 8th, and March 5th Neptune is in close opposition to the Moon. At the end of October, Mars crosses the line of impulse in conjunction with the Sun.

So here again is a further vindication of the laws of the epoch, and of the paramount importance of the chart of descent in the verification of abnormalities and malformations.

15.—When I use the term "Fixed Zodiac," I refer to what is called the Zodiac of the Constellations, as distinct from the movable Zodiac, that of the Signs. Mr. Bennet uses the same term in his book, so why does he query my use of it.

Pars. 16, 17, 18.—I am very pleased to see this disclosure, as it gives me an opportunity of proving Mr. Bennet's imperfect knowledge of Astronomical mathematics. The position of the star Hamal, for 1920 was R.A. 30.39.53. 1 Declination 23. 5. 5.3 N. and its longitude was Taurus, 6.32, not Taurus 0 as stated by Mr. Bennet (par. 17). I am using the 1920 figures, as they are given in Robson's Fixed Stars, which Mr. Bennet later on refers to. Now Mr. Bennet contends that the star Hamal was at the Vernal Equinox about the beginning of the Age of This, however, is pure supposition, and is controverted by calculation. By simply taking the Annual variation in R.A. of this star (50.7), it would require a period of 2,177 years to cover the distance in R.A. between its present position and the Equinox.

Assuming, therefore, that the Aquarian Age does commence in 1944, this would bring the Piscian age as commencing in 233 s.c. But the use of the Annual variation in R.A. alone is erroneous and moreover, Precession is an ecliptic or longitudal measurement, and not one by R.A. Therefore, in order to compute the position of this star at the commencement of the Piscian

Age, it is necessary to know the exact date; to reduce both R.A. and Dec., by their respective annual variations, for the number of years required, and then with the new R.A. and Dec., to find the longitude corresponding thereto.

Mr. Robson in his book, page 106 gives this rule and also gives a rough and ready rule of subtracting 50½" for each year before 1920 from the longitude (not the R.A.), by which latter rule, it will be found that Hamal was on the Equinox 2,631 years previous to 1920, or B.C. 711. Mr. Bennet's errors entirely destroy his contentions.

The remaining pars 18 to 21 are too ambiguously worded to need much comment. It stands to reason that the space from the present Vernal Equinox towards the star Hamal is covered by the 30 of the first sign Aries, and 6½ degrees of the sign Taurus, in which space are most of the stars of the constellation Pisces, and a few of the stars of Aries.

Following on this argument (par 20), the space from the Equinox in the direction of the star Sadalmelik, would be the twelfth sign Pisces and would cover a few stars of constellation Pisces, and many of the stars of the constellation Aquarius. All star maps will prove these points.

This completes my criticism of the first part of Mr. Bennet's reply. In the next issue I shall alter my procedure, and take each paragraph of Mr. Bennet's reply and insert my criticism thereof after it. This will show the two sides of the question at once.

A very important point arises in connection with the influence of these mid-points, and one which requires a considerable degree of judgment on the part of the student.

The two planets involved may be either (a) in evil aspect; (b) in good aspect, and (c) in no aspect. When in evil aspect, the direction will be particularly evil, unless the two planets be benefics when the influence will be less evil. When in good aspect, the direction will be powerful for good, unless the planets are malefics, when the influence will be less benefic. When in no aspect at birth, the force of the direction will depend on the radical position of the two planets.

Suppose Venus and Jupiter be in square aspect at birth, when one of the significators comes to the mid-point of the two planets, the force of the direction will be moderately evil. If it had been Mars and Saturn, Sun and Saturn, or Moon and Saturn, then the direction would be extremely powerful for evil. If the two planets were not in aspect at birth, the force of the direction would depend on the radical position of the two planets involved.

Similarly, if the meridian or ascendant came to the mid-point of the Sun and Jupiter, these two being in good aspect at birth, then the direction would be a very powerful and benefic one. If Mars and Saturn were in trine, the direction of a significator would be moderately good. If the two planets were not in aspect, then the direction would depend on the radical position and aspects of the two planets involved.

This brings us to the more important question of what would transpire when the two planets involved were of a contrary nature. Say Mars square Jupiter, and their mid-point directed to a significator. In this case it would be extremely evil, but if the planets were in good aspect, moderately benefic.

The final consideration is which are the strongest mid-points. This is as follows:—

1. The mid-point between the luminaries is the most important, and directions to it have a far-reaching effect.

- 2. The mid-points between the Sun and planets, and Moon and planets, come next in power.
- 3. The mid-points between Fortuna and planets rank third in power, and
- 4. Those between planets alone are the weakest of all.

In the next issue I propose to give some further illustrations of "mid-point" directions from well known horoscopes.

The Great Eclipse of 1927 By VILLAGER.

The year of the Great Eclipse has arrived and one wonders how many of the people, who live in the Central Eclipse area will see the Total Eclipse of the Sun on June 29th, 1927. What it portends for England, Wales and Scandinavia, I will leave to abler and more expert pens to describe, my only object in writing this article being, to give the Pressure distribution and the probable weather on the morning of the Eclipse.

During the latter part of June, we usually find that an anti-cyclone or high barometer readings are situated off our S.W. or W. coasts, winds are Westerly, but occasionally the highest barometer readings are off our Western coasts, winds are then more Northerly and cool with temperatures below normal. During the few days previous to the Eclipse, we shall find an anticyclone centred off the West coast of Ireland with the barometer about 1,030 millibars or 30.4 inches, over the Southern parts of Scandinavia and North Germany will be a large low pressure area with the barometer falling slowly and extending its influence further West, on the evening of the 28th (evening previous to Eclipse) the barometer will have fallen to 1,012 millibars 29.90 inches, over most of Great Britain, and probably nearly all Ireland, lower readings over the North Sea, cloudy skies will be general, with some rain falling over most of Britain, Ireland may escape. During the night the central area of the low pressure will probably extend further S. to Dover Straits, and the morning of the Eclipse will find dull, leaden skies, obscuring the view of the Great Eclipse which many of us have been looking forward to, for so many years, it is certainly very disappointing to be baulked by clouds.

Perhaps it will be possible to get above the clouds, say in North Wales, where Snowden 3,571 above sea level rears its head, the total eclipse here only being of a few seconds duration, other peaks in that neighbourhood, nearer the Merioneth border would perhaps give better results. Further N.E. we come to the Pennines and here in North West Yorkshire, the Penyghent and Gt. Whernside rear their peaks, both being almost on the Central Eclipse line, these may be possible view places above the clouds, though not as high as North Wales. It should be understood that the cloudy area on the
