The Halifax By Election Prediction

The remarkable prediction made by M. C. E. Mitchell of Halifax, a provincial member of the British Astrological Society, as to the result of



the recent by-election at Halifax is a standing testimony to the truth of Astrology and a deadly blow to opponents of and scoffers at our great science.

The following is the story of the prediction as reported in the *Halifax Daily Courier* and *Guardian* of Monday July 16th. 1928.

"At the end of last month, by request of Mr.

Chas. E. Mitchell, Delph-Street, Halifax, whose astrological researches have so often interested our readers, we obtained the dates and hours of birth of the three candidates of the Halifax by-election. These we submitted to Mr. Mitchell, and on July 4th he had completed the casting of the horoscopes, and worked out the respective chances of the candidates. On that day, nomination day, he sent these results to us and to Ald. Longbottom, Major Barnes and Major Crossley.

These forecasts, completed on nomination day, after some fourteen hours' work on each, provide one more instance of successful application of this science. They also show Mr. Mitchell's sincerity and faith. The British Astrological Society was very interested in the test, and Mr. Mitchell certainly stood to lose a great deal if his calculations had not been correct. But, completely confident, he sent the following telegram to the Editor of a contemporary on the morning of Friday last: "Have calculated horoscopes candidates, Halifax election. Predict Longbottom wins." His faith has been vindicated in no uncertain manner, and our readers will be interested in reading the calculation which, until now, it would have been ill-advised for us to divulge."

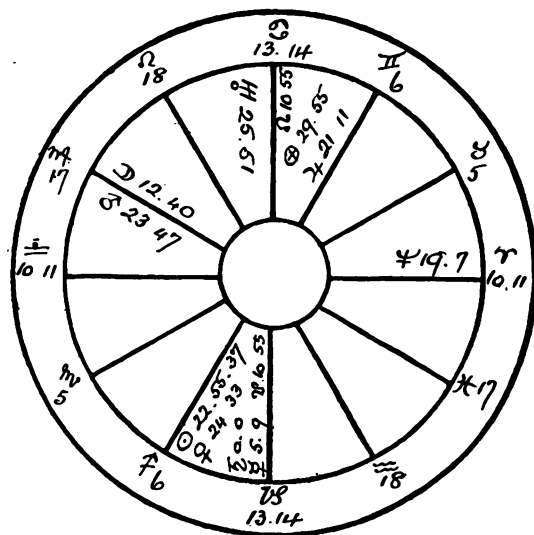
The three candidates at the election were Major Harry Barnes, (Liberal), Major Frank Crossley, (Conservative) and Alderman A. W. Longbottom, (Labour) and their horoscopes with Mr. Mitchell's comments and additional notes on the horoscopes and directions by myself are appended.

Major Barnes was born on December 15th, 1870, at 1.30 a.m., in the Isle of Wight. Corrected by the epoch, the exact time was 1h. 28m. 38s. a.m. The following is the map.

Mr. Mitchell's remarks on this horoscope were:—

"The chart of Major Barnes does not seem to be by any means a good one, and I certainly cannot see how he can hope to be successful with so many adverse influences in his life."

The maps shows Neptune setting in square to Uranus and the Sun and Venus conjoined in



square to Mars. Although the Sun was in true to Jupiter, Mars was in square to the Nodes, and Mercury opposed to Uranus, and the Moon was exactly square Uranus R and Mercury P, a clear indication of failure and reversal at the polls.

The horoscope is not wholly bad for civic and political success, for the Dragon's Head and Uranus are culminating in Cancer, the sign of the public, the former in sextile to the Moon and the latter in sextile to Uranus. Major Barnes will eventually be successful in attaining Parliamentary rank, but the present time was a terribly inauspicious one, for although the Sun was in trine to Jupiter, the opposition of Mercury to Uranus, and the Moon by secondary motion in square to Uranus R and Mercury P, made it impossible for him to have been successful. He will have better success in this direction in 1930 or 1932.

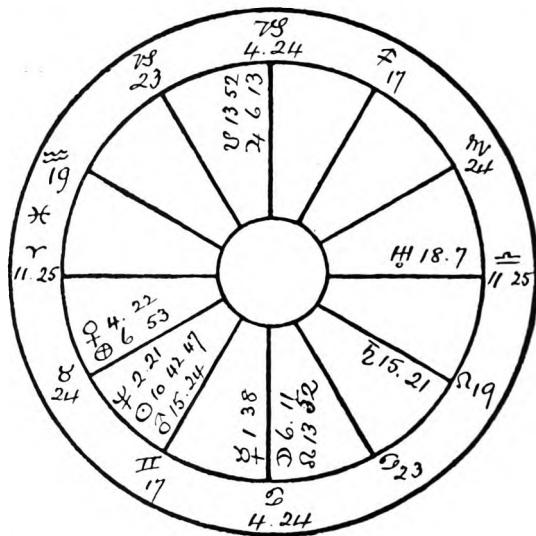
Major Crossley was born on June 1st, 1889 at 1.40 a.m. at London. The rectified time is only 14s. later, for which the second map is drawn.

Mr. Mitchell's comments were:—

"Major Crossley's Jupiter is in a poor sign, and, with opposition of the Moon, shows lack of public favour. He will not succeed."

Jupiter and the Dragon's Tail were both in the tenth, the Moon being in exact opposition to Jupiter, and Uranus in the seventh squaring the nodes.

At the time of the election the Sun was exactly



square Uranus, semisquare Neptune, clear indications of reversals. Mars was also square the radical ascendant. The Moon by secondary direction was opposition Sun R and by mean motion was conjunction Saturn.

The day of the election was an evil one for Major Crossley as the M.C. of the diurnal horoscope was exactly opposition Saturn R.

Major Crossley will have better success in 1930, as his ascendant will then be directed to the trine of Uranus, and Fortuna in conjunction with the Dragon's Head. His horoscope is not so successful a one as Major Barnes, for although Jupiter is elevated in trine to Venus and the part of Fortune, the opposition of the Moon from Cancer, the sign of the public, and the elevated position of Canda do not allow of much continued success. Still I consider 1930 should see his success in political affairs.

Alderman Longbottom was born at Halifax on May 25th, 1883, at 4 a.m. Calculation shows the correct time to have been 10m. 4s. later, and the horoscope is as below.

Mr. Mitchell's prediction was as follows:—

"I find Ald. Longbottom has the best influences and directions operating at present. He has many powerful directions, such as Sun conjunction and Par. Jupiter, and this signifies honours, The numbers ruling his life are 5 and 7.

He will actually be elected on the 14th day (14-5 when reduced to a single number) of the 7th month. The year of his birth is 1883; add

their own signs and one exalted, and to this fact alone success is due. In fact, it is recorded that Alderman Longbottom has never been defeated at any election he had taken part in.

A singular fact is to be noted in all three horoscopes, viz., the positions of the Moon, Uranus and Mercury, apart from other planets in cardinal signs. In Simmonites "Arcana" it is laid down that these three planets in cardinal signs "make the mind active in political matters," and this is borne out in these three horoscopes.

Major Barnes had ♄ in ☊ and ♃ in ♏.

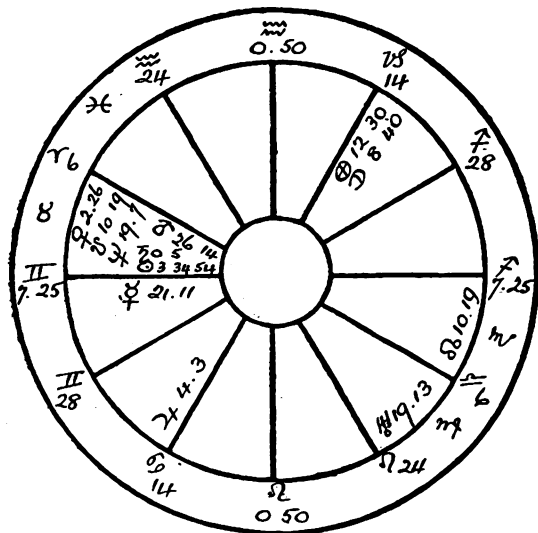
Major Crossley had ♄ in ♈ and the ♃ and ♃ in ☊.

Alderman Longbottom had the ♃ in ♏.

The story of this remarkable episode, one of the finest proofs of Astrology will go far to improve the status of the science and help towards its recognition.

In conclusion may I add my congratulation to Mr. Mitchell for his successful prediction, and the best of thanks to the Editor of the *Halifax Daily Courier and Guardian*, for his unbiassed attitude towards the science in allowing the publication of the prediction.

these numbers together, add seven for July, and 14 for date of election, and the result is 41, which is again 5 when reduced to a single number.

On July 14th he will be able to add two more letters to his name."

In this horoscope seven planets are found in the ascending position of the map, Mars, Venus and Mercury being in their own signs and Jupiter exalted, a clear proof of power, popularity and success.

At the time of the election the ascendant had progressed to the sextiles of Uranus and Neptune, these planets being almost exactly in trine at birth. The Sun was in parallel Jupiter R, and only just separated from conjunction Jupiter P.

The day of the election was a fortunate one for the Alderman, the Ascdt. of the diurnal Horoscope being ☊ 23°, with the Sun in 21° and Venus in 25° of the same sign and the M.C. in ♋ 23 in trine to both.

It is not often that one finds a horoscope with so many planets dignified, there being three in

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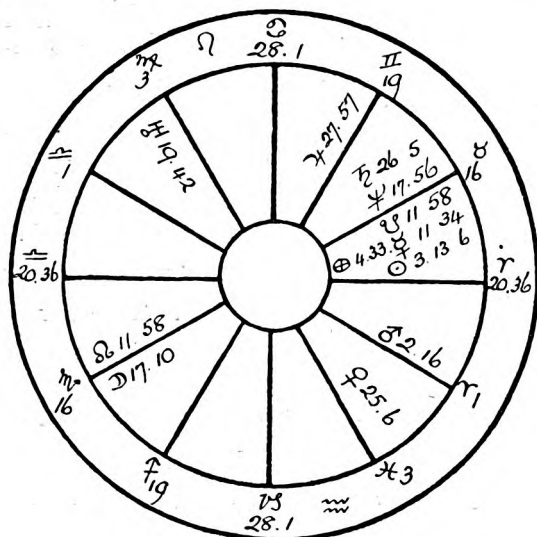
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HOROSCOPE OF THE MONTH.

MR. C. E. MITCHELL

I feel that it is only right that the Horoscope of Mr. C. E. Mitchell, the author of the predictions respecting the Halifax bye-election should be given in these pages, and I therefore append it. The birth data are as follows: 23rd April, 1883, Halifax, at 6h. 2m. 13s. p.m. rectified time.



I had the pleasure of calculating Mr. Mitchell's horoscope several years ago, and was then fully aware of his interest in, and ability for, astrology. He was born under the third decanate of the sign Libra, bringing in the influence of Jupiter in Gemini in the ninth house. The Moon has the conjunction of the Dragon's Head, the sextile of Uranus and the opposition of Neptune. Mars and Venus are both dignified, the former being sesquiquare to the Moon, and the latter in sextile to Saturn and square to Jupiter. The Sun is conjoined with Fortuna in the seventh.

Mr. Mitchell, according to the *Halifax Courier and Guardian*, is "a local man in the best sense of the word, for he was born and bred and has lived in this town for the past 45 years, but he is well-known throughout the country for his interest in astrology. In 1908 he set up in the bill-posting business, but the European war brought heavy losses, and he became employed

in a local munitions factory. Then he once more entered upon bill-posting, and is now the inspector for the West Riding area for a London firm. This he regards as his main employment, but, as a hobby, he has taken up the study of astrology with great enthusiasm. His experiences in this direction extend over some 15 years. In 1918 he joined the Astrological College and is a member of the British Astrological Society, but he has largely taught himself by constant application to the science. The success of his calculations has been proved by many a correct forecasting of events, and has brought him a wide and deserved reputation. Though often requested to give lectures he has consistently refused, preferring not to make money out of his powers, but he has had many tokens of gratitude presented to him by men who have followed his advice and benefited thereby. He works out his own horoscope for the immediate future, and states that has always been a wonderful guide to him. It now tells him that within three years he will have removed from Halifax to take up some position of importance and responsibility. Probably, at the same time, he will inherit money. In all this he is quietly confident. His mother, who is now 83 years old, is still healthy and able, and places great confidence in her son's astrological powers. His father was the well-known Halifax macebearer of a past generation. Mr. Mitchell has also had several curious experiences in the spiritual world, and is a firm believer in the possibility of communion with the departed. He does not know what the planetary influences are, but what they do. And in the same way he cannot see the water which has boiled away in steam, though he knows it to be all around him, just as he knows the departed spirits are all around. If his forecasts prove correct in his own life, Halifax will, in three years, have lost a most interesting citizen."

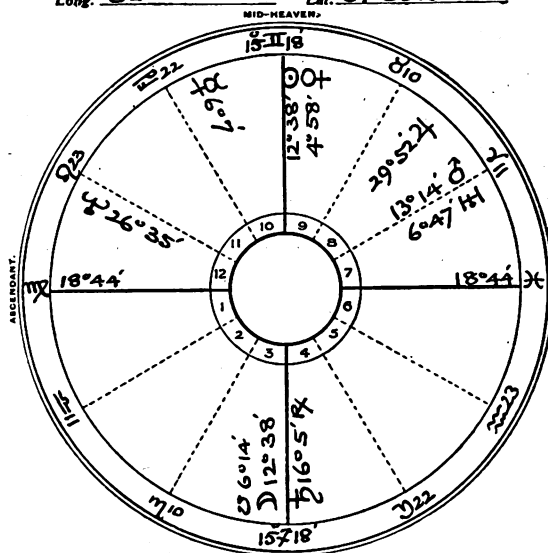

ANNIVERSARY ECLIPSE.—The universe is governed from centres, and whether it be the man, the king, president, or yet the heart of a daisy, the destiny of that centre is vested in its connectedness with the primordial centres of cosmic energy, the sun and moon. Solar eclipses are held to indicate kings and rulers, while those of the moon are pertinent to the people at large. There was an eclipse on the 12th of March 1914, which I characterised as the War Eclipse. It fell in direct opposition to the midheaven of the ex-Kaiser's horoscope of birth. The first transit of Mars over the line of eclipse was 31st July 1914, and the last was on the 22nd March 1918. Thus the outbreak of the war and the concluding phrase of it at the launching of the last great offensive by the Germans at the vernal equinox of 1918, were clearly defined. It will be seen, therefore, that eclipses do not operate immediately, except in regards to their seismic effects, but wait for the transits of the major planets. In the Great War portents the eclipse of the moon waited for 140 days, and it was 144 days before we came into the arena. These facts may serve to indicate why, despite the misplaced vaticinations of a leading exponent of Pyramidology, no national event of any great importance occurred on the 29th May. There was no attendant celestial indication of a crisis at that date. The subjoined map of the heavens for the middle of the lunar eclipse of 3rd June 1928, will serve its purpose for the next four years and should be preserved for reference. It shows the full moon eclipsed in the second decanate of Sagittarius, separating from its descending Node and applying to conjunction with Saturn, and its position indicates severally the breaking down of transports, foreign complications, ecclesiastical disturbances and changes, popular tumults, a general exodus and vacation of sites, subsidences, mining disasters, telegraphic and other long-distance means of communication inhibited, insurance rates changed and many risks annulled. Especially it disposes to disaster in Great Britain and more especially in the Capital City and the district of Westminster and a general fall in property values throughout the country. In Bombay it threatens popular risings and many grave disturbances among the people. Its influence is inimical to all who had birth about the 3rd June and 4th December in any year.

Mercury is the ruler of the horoscope and is situated in the place of the recent solar total eclipse of the 29th June, 1927, which traversed Europe and was central at noon on the meridian of 83°55' East longitude, defining India. As this is reflected by Mercury in the present horoscope, in quadrature to Uranus and Mars, it surely defines great mortality with violence in India. Saturn's position on the lower meridian defines the eastern parts of England as being in danger of heavy visitations. The positions of

Uranus and Mars in the martial sign Aries on the cusp of the 8th division of the heavens indicates sudden alarms and widespread mortality. From this eclipse America will effect a change of financial policy and a change of government which will prove disastrous, for Saturn holds the meridian of the New York geodetic horoscope at this eclipse, while the local map shows Uranus and Mars in the midheaven in quadrature to Mercury.

The importance of this eclipse at the present time lies in the circumstance of the current transits. Mars and Saturn form their opposition from Gemini 12.38 and Sagittarius 12.38 on the

29th August, and are thus opposed exactly on the line of the eclipse. This date marks the end of the "grooves" in the Great Pyramid Last Low Passage, and denotes the "taking away of that (Hand) which restraineth." Yet will He watch over the destinies of our people and mercifully direct our ways. For it written that while the sun and moon keep their appointed paths the Lord will not cease to be mindful of His promise. In this eclipse of the moon we see the beginning of that time of "testing" which is coming upon all the world. In August 1914 there was a large eclipse of the sun in the regal sign Leo and in close conjunction with the great star Regulus (the deputy Ruler). The injunction was that these kings of the earth should "occupy until I come." In 1933 there will occur the maximum phase of this eclipse in conjunction with Regulus. In 1914 to 1918, the four-year eclipse period of influence, seven kings lost their crowns. In 1933 every king will have gone except one who holds the throne in custody for the King of kings, whose name is spoken. We have not finished with the solar eclipse of 29th June 1927 until the middle of the year 1931. Its preliminary message to us was given in January 1928 when Mars passed the line of eclipse. Westminster was flooded, Field-Marshal Earl Haig passed away, and the Court presently went into mourning for the late Duke of Richmond. The next transit of Mars will not occur until October. This will bring the preliminary lunar indications of 3rd June into effect. The planet Mars will be in irregular transit of the eclipse lines during the whole period of August to December, stirring up the inflammable material of diplomatic conversations in the various centres of Europe affected by the solar eclipse of December 1927, and the preceding one of 29th June 1927. Then will follow a very remarkable phenomenon.

THE GREAT MUTATION—Every astrological student will know what is meant by this term—the Great Mutation. For the benefit of those who are not informed in our terminology I may say the circle of conjunctions effected by Saturn and Jupiter, the two great planets of the system, extends over the period of 960 years, during which period the conjunctions fall successively in the four trigons ruling the "elements" of fire, earth, air and water. These changes of sign are called Mutations, and occur every 240 years. The conjunctions are now falling in the earthy trigon of Capricorn, Taurus and Virgo and will so continue for another 150 years from now. The last Mutation had place at the end of January in the year 1842, when the planets

Saturn and Jupiter were conjoined for the first time in 960 years in the sign Capricorn. The longitude of conjunction was Capricorn 8° 54'. It will therefore be seen that the solar eclipse of 29th June, 1927, fell in close opposition to the Mutation conjunction, being in Cancer 6° 32'. The transit of Mars over that eclipse line tends to bring the latent potentialities of the Mutation into play. But this is not what I have in mind, at the moment. I am concerned with the approaching opposition of Mars and Saturn in the 25th degrees of Gemini and Sagittarius, which happens in the first week of the year 1929. Indeed there is need for concern, seeing that this 25th degree of Sagittarius was rising on London at the exact time of the Mutation of 1842 and therefore the opposition of the two planets will fall exactly on the horizon of the horoscope for London. Geodetically they are referred to longitude 85 East (India), 175 East (New Zealand), 5 West (S.W. England, and Portugal) and 95 West (America). We have already seen that the solar eclipse of June, 1927, was central in longitude 85 East, and it is therefore certain that this opposition will stir up strife in India. Its special significance to Great Britain lies, however, in the position of this configuration of the mutually antagonistic planets Mars and Saturn on the ascendant and descendant of the London horoscope for the Mutation. It localises the conflict both by longitude and latitude as centred upon London.

BOOKS WORTH READING—"A Theory of the Solar System" (Quarto, pp 88, with numerous diagrams) by P. J. Harwood. Price 10/- Copies can be obtained from the author or through booksellers. This work aims at a new theory of cosmic activity and is based primarily on electro-magnetic phenomena by which it is demonstrated that there is a mechanical cause of rotation in the sun, in whose magnetic field the planets are suspended. The author deals also with comets, the earth and the moon, in regard to which latter body we have the unique statement that there is no rotation of that body and it seems that the author is at pains to elaborate a theory to account for a phenomenon which does not exist. The whole of the work is extremely suggestive and widely controversial, but has the distinction of a strong intellectual appeal and will be found to stimulate thought by almost every paragraph. Anything in the nature of a mechanical solution of the Cosmos, where mechanism is not the ultimate expression of a spiritual force, is essentially non-human; and while it is useless to approach this work without a

preliminary training in electro-dynamics, it is at least satisfactory that the author opens his new thesis with a quotation from the Gospels and a comment by Leonardo da Vinci : "Except ye become as little children, ye shall in no wise enter the kingdom of Heaven"—"Nor into the kingdom of knowledge either." This, I presume, is the teachable spirit which we are asked to adopt in regard to the new theory of the Solar System. Albeit the day is late and the age grows old, we are all young enough to go to school while the light serves. It is only a question as to which Gemaliel shall teach us.

"THE GREAT LAW" (vol. 2) by Hamish MacHuisdean—Glasgow: Fraser Edwards & Co., 141, Bath Street. Those who have read the "conversations" of the first volume of this work, will be prepared for much new light on old truths, and they will not be disappointed in the second volume of this exposition, which, I may say, is altogether more explicit, definite, and luminous than the first. It is written in a much better literary style, the author having largely submitted to the use of plain English instead of Gaelic. There is numerology enough to satisfy even the most voracious of kabalists, and diagrams which will delight the hearts of those who have an eye for plans, elevations, and other architectural matters applied to ancient landmarks such as the Great Pyramid, Stonehenge, and various rock-hewn temples; and tumuli. It takes quite an effort, however, to disentangle the essentials from the heap of verbiage in which they are wrapped up, a form of cryptography which is rather too much at variance with the main purpose of the work to recommend it to the general reader. As one among many this attempt to present the esoterics of the Scripture to the lay mind strikes me as somewhat abortive; and I am candidly of opinion that the material is good enough to merit a different form of presentation, but that it will fail to arrest the respectful attention of many earnest truth-seekers on the score of its entire lack of constructive thought. It may be described as a revelation without a Gospel. Many itching ears will be tickled by this exposition of the undefined "Great Law," but not a soul will be raised up or comforted by this array of numerics, problematic philology and doubtful mensuration. You will read the book with interest because of its quaint suggestiveness and apparent candour, you will be intrigued by its startling deductions, but withal you will say at the end of it—*cui bono?* Which seems to make a third volume necessary.

PYRAMID PROPHECY.—One of the most interesting facts arising out of what is called the "reconstruction" of the Pyramid on the theoretical basis is that it is possible to take any height and any base length, providing it is so proportioned that the height is the radius of a circle whose circumference is equal to that of the base, and this requires only that the slope side of the structure shall be $51^{\circ} 51' 14.5''$. It would, therefore, be possible to identify the base circumference of the Pyramid with several definite measures, one of which (the solar century) has been adopted by Davidson. That it is not the only one possible is amply indicated by the fact that the reconstruction necessary to effect an identity, does not correspond with the required measure, nor with the measure obtained from survey. The question then arises as to whether, in the event of our taking the *modern* value of the solar year, we are doing what is quite right. The ancient solar year was appreciably longer by more than one-twentieth of an hour. I find on calculation that the actual difference is at the rate of one-twentieth of a second per year, including precession, based on the present mean value of the solar year 365.242264 days.

This gives the ancient year as 365.24464 days, nearer to $365\frac{1}{4}$ days than at present. The difference is due to what is called the diminution of the earth's eccentricity, the orbit tending gradually, under the stress of gravitation, to the circular form, so nearly effected in the case of Venus. What I have referred to as the stress of gravitation is resolvable under the dynamic law to (a) shrinkage of the earth's body, (b) increase of response to gravitational impulse, (c) gradual arrestation of the earth's axial rotation, (d) increase of response to gravitational impulse on this account also. I do not hold myself to a confirmation of this theory, but it may suffice to cover the outstanding fact of the shortening year-length. This seems to be required by eclipse phenomena in ancient times and is applied by modern astronomers as a centennial equation in terms of t^2 . But I have yet to be assured that our modern astronomers are on the right path. From what I can see they are on a path which at a remote epoch diverges from the true, and becomes increasingly divergent as time goes on. According to their own theory there must be an epoch at which the normal or true path is crossed by that required by the theoretical equation, but they conveniently make that zero point to coincide with the modern date, and hence the lines diverge outwards into the past; while if we put it the other way about, and make the divergence at its maximum at modern date, there will be

found reason for the suggestion that the modern equation when divided by the centuries involved, requires the rectification of the presumed year-length as a mean for all years, all other equations being due to what is called interaction. However that may be, it is of singular interest to observe that this value of the ancient year 365.24464 is immediately derivable from certain fixed mathematical laws. Thus the square of 9 is 81, and the square of 81 is 6561, and this multiplied by Pi (3.1416) makes it the diameter of a circle whose circumference is 20612. Now 20.612 is the length of the ancient Hebrew cubit, as determined by Newton and Seyffarth, and the French explorations of ancient monuments. It is given as 1.71766 feet which as nearly as possible is expressed by the number 20.612 inches. Taking this as a circumference, the diameter will be 6561. Now if we take the Cubit as the basis of the Pyramid structure we shall get the side length equals 9131.116 inches, equal to 443 cubits exactly. The circumference will then be 4 times that number, or 36524.464, which is the ancient century circle, made up by a measure of 1772 cubits. Then we have the proportion 36524.464 : 9131.116 : 20612 : 6561. So that 1,000 cubits becomes the standard of the century circle. What place does this hold in the Pyramid structure? The King's Chamber, which represents the "Kingdom of the Father" and to which as to "that one, divine, far-off event" the whole creation moves, is a Chamber of 206.12 inches in width, and 412.24 inches in length. It is thus exactly 10 cubits wide and 20 cubits long, and contains two exact squares of 10 cubits each. Into either of these squares we can put a circle the diameter of which will be 65.61 inches, and this is reproduced as a time measure in the height of the great Step, at the rate of an inch per year. Now the theoretical height of the Pyramid on this basis is 5812.876 inches, as compared with the modern theoretical height of 5813 inches, and the length of the Antechamber will be 116.26, and with the "grooves" added, will be 119.06. My theory requires that this value should be 119.09 inches. Thus 206.12 by $4\frac{2}{3}$ equals 206.12 by 16, divided by 9, which equals 366.4355, which gives the circular value of the century 36643.55 from which take Ancient century value 36524.46

Difference	119.09 taken as Circular units.
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These, at the rate of an inch per year, measuring 9.924 years or inches, constitute a section of the First Low Passage, here enlarged 12 times to bring out the detail of this important phase in

the world's progress, as already explained (*see* B.J.A., July, 1928). Hence they have to be considered as 119.09 circular months. A circular month is one-twelfth of the circle of 360 and is equal to 30 circular days. These have to be converted into terms of our year of 365 $\frac{1}{4}$ days to get the dating indicated. Then 119.09 by 30, divided by 30.437 will give 117.38 inches or months, and the date 22nd August, 1928. But if we refer the circular century to the modern value of the century, 36524.22, we get a difference of 119.33, and this reduced to the secular year gives the date 29th August, 1928, which is precisely what I require for the fulfilment of that "gradual withdrawal" of the Protecting Hand, which has thus far upheld us since the Armistice of November, 1918, the "taking away" of which protection is indicated clearly enough in the gradual deepening of the grooves from date 29th May to 29th August. I am waiting, therefore, not only the confirmation of the astral signature set upon the date 29th August, but also the confirmation of the ancient year-length, the circular year of 366.4355, and the value of the ancient cubit 20.612 inches on which this computation is based, and on which the Pyramid was intended to be constructed. It is of interest to observe that the difference of the ancient and modern year-length requires that in the days of the Pyramid construction the precession of the equinoxes was only 48" per year, whereas it is now 50", the gradual increase having been noted ever since the days of Ptolemy who compared the records of Timocharis with those of Hipparchus, and these again with his own observations. According to Bentley, the Hindus of the 12th century B.C. determined the precession to the rather more than 48 $\frac{1}{2}$ seconds per year on the basis of a tropical year which was 1 m. 18 secs. longer than at present, which obviously is as near the truth as may be required.

CRITICAL DAYS.—As was fully expected, the 6th August did not pass without bringing its burden of troubles, and it seems to have been well defined as a day of shocks. It happened to be Bank Holiday Monday, which, despite the open weather giving joy and health to millions of workers, was filled with disasters attendant upon modern methods of "herding." America learned with consternation of the Treaty framed by France and Great Britain which provides for the combine of naval forces in the event of war. This necessarily forces America to further production if she wishes to emulate a two-power standard. But as Great Britain is already a two-power standard, this will make a three-power

standard for America to reach. Simultaneously we hear of a terrific hurricane having swept Florida and the S.E. coast of America causing immense loss and devastation. There was also a bear "ramp" on the New York Stock Exchange. Italy has been visited by an earthquake, the loss of a submarine with thirty lives, and is now threatened with a war-cloud on the other side of the Adriatic. This would give Mussolini his opportunity of settling accounts with Jugo-Slavia. Croatia has renounced the Belgrade authority and the death of M. Raditch on the 8th August, following the assassination of his nephew and another Croatian Deputy, when M. Raditch himself was wounded, cannot fail to create bitter resentment in Croatia, while it is certain that Jugo-Slavia will resist the separation that has been decided upon. Italy's policy at this juncture will need watching carefully. If the crisis occurs, Italy will probably be asked by the Powers to deal with its neighbours. This delegation of powers is to be anticipated. In any event it will result in Italy's favour.

Simultaneously the "conversations" with Ibn Saud and the Emir Feisal of Iraq have broken down. There is now every likelihood of hostilities being resumed and defensive measures being adopted by Iraq. This ancient country of Mesopotamia is destined to be "the place of the judgment of My People," as the name foretells. A great earthquake occurred on the 5th August on the island of Paloeweh in the Dutch East Indies, and the eruption of the volcano Rokatinda destroyed six villages by fire and further casualties resulted from the accompanying earthquake, the loss of life being upwards of a thousand, while over six hundred were injured by missiles from the volcano. The seaboard was submerged and nine native boats foundered with their crews.

There were evident signs that the forces of evil have broken out in many parts of the world. But men do not trace the connectedness of these evils with their collective state of mind, they have lost the keys of security. The Ancients understood that God, Man and Earth were Spirit, Soul and Body. When we recognise that Man is mind (Sansk. *man*, to think; *manas*, mind) and that Earth is body, and that they act and react upon one another and are both subject to the control of the Spirit, then we shall learn that obedience to the Spiritual Law is the only security of peace and prosperity in the earth. When the Spiritual Law became out-realised in the material world, God set the sun, moon and planets in the heavens and said: "Let them be for signs."

On the 6th, Mars made transit of the recent

eclipse in the Pleiades (19th May) which I gave as a date of "the warning" to the nations. Is the blindness of Israel incurable? On the same date Mars was in quadrature to Neptune and on the 9th, Mercury was square to Jupiter, and on the 10th, Venus conjunct Neptune. Batavia (Batu-ya) the condemned place, seems to have registered the worst effects as it answers to the longitude on which Neptune and Mars formed their geodetic parallel when at quadrature, and it may be noted that at the total solar eclipse of 19th May last, Mars and Uranus held the nadir of Batavia.

A GRIM JOKE.—Unfortunately a misprint occurred on p. 165, col. 1, of the August issue of the B.J.A., where November of the year 1918 is described as the time of "the cessation of *hospitalities*," instead of hostilities as appears in the same paragraph. This forecast had nothing to do with hospitals, nor hospitalities extended to us by France, and though we look for the day when humanity will have ceased to need the one, we look at the same time to a widening of national hospitalities which will eventually make of our dismembered family one united body when "all nations shall be one people and of one language, and there shall be one Ruler over all the earth." May every November in every year be a month of "hospitalities."

MYSTERY OF NUMBERS—The equatorial diameter of the earth is given as $7926\frac{1}{2}$ miles. The entire length of the passage to the King's Chamber, from the top of the Great Step to the King's Chamber entrance is 330.27 inches. Multiplied by 24, the number of hours in the day, the result is 7926.48 inches. Here there is an interchange of lineal measure at the rate of an inch per mile with a time measure at the rate of an inch per day.

The value of 1,000 cubits in inches is 20612. Taking this as a circle its diameter will be 6561 inches. Then 20612 is to 6561 as 355 to 113. The interval between the Feast of Pentecost and the Feast of Trumpets, which are the beginning and end of the Dispensation, is 113 days. The first Pentecost was when Jehovah Elohim (the Lord God) created Man and "breathed into his nostrils the breath of lives and he became a *living Soul*," the last Trumpet when the Lord comes into His kingdom on earth and "the earth has become the kingdom of the Lord and His saints." The interval is 6,000 years. Then 20612, 355, and 6,000 are all equivalent circular values, while 6561, 113 and 1909.86 are equivalent diameter values. Here we see how the Great

Step comes to be dated, for 1909.86 is A.M. 5908.86, and being set off from the autumnal equinox (now falling on September 22/23) the measure of 5,908yrs. 10mos. 10ds. gives the date 1909, August 2/3. This shows that the Great Step is to be regarded as a diameter, a great Equator of the World, a symbol of the Christ, the Mediator. As such it responds to a circle of 113 of which the diameter is 36.

Names have their numerical values and these are employed in the Scriptures under a key which is accessible to every British reader, the numerical key being British. The Bible contains God's Covenant, and the British or Covenant Man is the appointed custodian of that testament which was commanded to be given out "unto all the world." This has been done. The numerical key informs us that there have always been Two Witnesses, just as there were two creations, the Elohist and the Jehovistic; two redemptions, the particular one of Israel, the general one of "all in Christ"; two Testaments, the Old and the New; two Olive Trees, Judah and Ephraim; two Candlesticks, bearing the twilights of the Mosiac and Christian dispensations; and the Two Witnesses at the Transfiguration, Moses and Elias; and there will be two Judgments. The key tells us also that Moses equals 71 and Elias equals 46, and the two working together make a sum of 117 and the word of the one is deed of the other, counsel and administration going hand in hand, as from the Lord. Hence arises the glyph of the triple manifestation of the Transfiguration of the Lord with Moses on the one hand and Elias on the other, and thus the 3×117 produces the perfect 351. It is reflected in the number 153 (thus 351.153) which is the number of Great fishes brought into the net from the right side of the the Ship by the power of the Word, and it is also the sum of the two measures of tribulation through which the Covenanters have to pass on the last stretch of the journey home to the Kingdom of their Lord. These two tribulations are for separate kinds of people, but their sum values are 52 and 101 making in all 153.

THE SIGNAL BOX.—A storm and earthquake period falls at the beginning of this month, storms being prevalent on the 4th and earthquakes about the 8th. These will be of great severity, and are likely to affect places in Brazil, Spain, Borneo, Sumatra and Japan. Saturn in Sagittarius, with Mars in transit over the line of eclipse (December 8th, 1927), on the 3rd and 4th inst., is inimical to Egypt, and also the Arab countries. The eclipse was in 83° West, and the sign of eclipse was Gemini, so that America will

have its full share of troubles this month. After the 9th heat will begin to increase and may continue to the 22nd. The end of the month is colder, with misty mornings and nights, low visibility generally during the last week. Storm periods, 4th, 8th-10th, and 23rd. At the lunation Saturn is in 58 E., and Mars on the midheaven in 67 E., the luminaries being in square aspect to Mars, Persia and Afghanistan being subject thereby to disturbances, and the latter country to warlike activities.

At Home there are signs of agitation and excitement, especially in regard to property and financial affairs. Expenditure on munitions will be heavy, and taxation will cut the throat of industry. Many cases of robbery with violence occur. Railways and coasting vessels, transports generally will make a considerable harvest. Property will be in danger of destruction in some parts, and generally will be depreciated. Fevers will affect the populace, and typhoid threatens to increase largely this month. Some strife among workers on questions of value. Hurt to aeronauts is shown. The enemy prospers exceedingly, and strife in India will favour his plans. Insurances increase in volume and cost. Shipping disasters are shown. Russia now holds our rulers with the hidden hand, and anxiety in high places undermines the confidence of the people. The Exchequer returns will be bad for the month, and outgoings will be heavy. The month generally is very ominous of great disasters. The Reaper now bends to the scythe, for the grain is ripe to the harvest.

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THE ASTROLOGICAL CONGRESS.

ANOTHER BRILLIANT SUCCESS.

NEW HEADQUARTERS ACQUIRED.

The second Annual Astrological Congress was held at the New Oxford Galleries, 77, New Oxford St., W.C. on Thursday 23rd July 1928, Mr. E. H. Bailey, President of the British Astrological Society in the Chair.

The proceedings commenced shortly after 2.30. p.m. with a short speech by the Chairman, in which he regretted the necessity of holding the congress so late in the year, and also the lack of co-operation and assistance of other Astrologers in London. He mentioned that several had written expressing their regret at being unable to attend, and offering their good wishes for the success of the Congress. He further stated that more than twenty special invitations had been sent to the leading Astrologers in London, but at least 75 per cent. of these had not accepted the invitation nor acknowledged its receipt, a statement which evoked expressions of surprise and disgust from those present. In spite of this, he added, he intended to make the congress an annual event, and did not intend to be deterred from the plans he had made in regard to the Science, and he felt sure that, with the help of many loyal friends and students of the science, success would attend his efforts.

He then formally moved the adoption of the report of the special Committee appointed at last year's Congress, (see July B.J.A. page 155), pointing out that the British Astrological Society in order to carry out the report, had inaugurated a "Million Penny Fund" and had in the short period of six months raised nearly 4,000 pence. The motion having been seconded, and several questions satisfactorily answered, it was put to the meeting and carried unanimously.

The Chairman then reported that he had that morning received a letter from Mr. A. E. Ellis, stating that his house at 45 Lancaster Gate, met all the requirements of the report, and offered the facilities of a Lecture room, Reading room, Library of Occult Literature, Café and good address. Mr. Ellis who was present gave a short description of the rooms available, stating that he was enthusiastic in what was suggested by the report and was prepared to give all the help he could. At the request of the Meeting the Chairman accompanied Mr. Ellis and inspected the rooms during the tea interval.

During the afternoon, several details in regard to the proposals were discussed, and unanimous decisions arrived at. The Chairman also addressed the meeting on the subject of certain erroneous theories which were at present being put forward in regard to the rulership of the signs, hypothetical planets, etc., all of which called for the most stringent opposition on the part of all bona-fide students of the science.

The evening session at which quite 100 people were present was marked with much enthusiasm. The Chairman reported on this visit to 45 Lancaster Gate, and stated that the rooms offered were exceptionally suitable for the purposes required; and as the terms of hiring were so remarkably generous, he moved that the offer be accepted, and that the British Astrological Society take possession of them as their headquarters from the commencement of the Autumn session, a suitable time astrologically being selected in the interval for the formal opening. Also that the warmest thanks of the meeting be accorded to Mr. Ellis for his most magnanimous offer. The resolution was duly seconded and carried with acclamation.

The new session of the Society will therefore commence on Sept. 20th, and the lecture and classes will be continued every Thursday evening as before. The complete Library of the Society is to be transferred to the new rooms, and the reading room will be open every day, in accordance with Clause 2 of the Report. The Executive Council of the Society was appointed the Committee to carry out the plans, on the proposal of Mr. T. W. Reed, seconded by Mr. G. R. Warwick.

The Chairman then submitted a proposal to the Congress approving the formation of a Bureau or Academy of Astrologers, similar to the American Academy of Astrologers, and that an invitation be sent to a number of Astrologers of approved status to become the first members and have a controlling interest in the management of the Science in England. He stated that seven astrologers were necessary to form this Bureau or Academy in the first instance and that the Congress should now formally submit the names of those to whom invitations could be sent.

He stated that this step was essential in connection with the extension and development of astrology throughout the country, and in order to prevent the exploitation of the science by pretenders, a fact which as Editor of the British Journal of Astrology he had considerable evidence of, and detailed a number of glaring cases which had come under his notice.

A number of well-known astrologers were formally proposed for the purpose, and it was resolved

that they be invited to meet and discuss the proposal.

The question of Incorporation was then discussed, and Mr. Ellis having stated that this could be done, he having had experience in similar matters, it was resolved that the British Institute of Mental Science Inc. be approached with a view to that institution being taken over by the British Astrological Society, and the certificate of incorporation being transferred to them and in the event of this not being agreed to, that incorporation be applied for in the ordinary manner.

As a result of the Meeting and as an eloquent testimony to the enthusiasm which prevailed eighteen new members of the British Astrological Society were enrolled.

The business part of the agenda having been completed at 9. p.m. the Chairman was requested to address the meeting on the probable effects which would arise in the world at large when Neptune would be passing through the sign Virgo. A full report of this address with additional comments will appear in the next issue.

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A Direction Test.

By E. H. BAILEY.

It may be considered that the results of this test have not been at all conclusive or convincing. This is partially true only, and evidently lies in the fact that there is some flaw or missing link in the matter, which has hitherto escaped detection.

The question of the Rotary horoscope which has been given considerable attention is the chief point in the matter, and this Rotary system which is in reality the old "Process" system adapted to modern horoscopes, must, in my opinion, be used in its original conception, if it is to be of actual use and value.

The further question of Ptolemy's Lunar Horoscope must also not be neglected, but here again, the adaption of this to the modern method of house division appears to require further consideration.

The proceeding of "putting old wine into new bottles" is one which cannot be recommended, and if we are to make use of the ancient methods of time measurement we must use these ancient methods in their entirety and not pick out one half and try to adapt it to modern conceptions and methods, and ignore the other half.

The directions of Fortuna itself must be reconsidered. I have hitherto suggested that this point should progress at the same rate as the ascendant. I am not now so sure about it, and am inclined to consider that it should progress by mean motion. In the horoscope under review, $\oplus \odot \text{♂ R}$ measures $67^{\circ} 36'$ only $5'$ more than the mean arc for death. I have noticed this in a number of horoscopes.

Another and equally important point in connection with the rotary system is that the planets should be given the same rotary motion as the meridian, viz: 30° per year, both from their radical and progressed places. In the horoscope under review, the radical Mars at the time of death was $\odot \text{♂ R}$. At the time of marriage Venus was in sextile to the Moon R. The progressed Fortuna was also conjunction Moon R. at the time of death, sextile ♂ R at the birth of the eldest son.

In the next volume, I propose to extend this test in a new direction, and adopt some new and original methods which have never yet been made use of. Also I propose to draw up the horoscope according to the ancient method, in

DIURNAL INFLUENCES.

By T. MORTON.

Most students of astrology believe that the daily aspects between the Moon and Planets are of value as a guide in one's daily affairs. I have come to the conclusion myself, that much will depend on whether the Planet in aspect to the Moon, happens to be in transit over a vital point in the Birth Horoscope, the Progressed, Lunar, or Diurnal. I've always been keen on the science in the light of a Daily Guide, and if it could be shown how it could be used in this respect, Astrology would make progress by leaps and bounds. I am only an experimental student, but I have ideas. The diurnal horoscope, Sepharial's discovery, is said to be useful in ascertaining the good and evil days, in ascertaining these, chief note is paid to the transit of Planets over the M.C. and Ascendant. However, it has always appeared illogical to my mind to observe transits to the above named cusps and rule out of existence other cusps. Provided there is a method whereby the true cusps can be found for the other ten cusps, we ought to find these cusps just as important as the M.C. and Ascendant, and in the light of a daily guide many more indications would arise. I feel that if horoscopes were erected according to the method of Porphyrius, whether Radical, Progressed, Lunar, or Diurnal, we should be drawing nearer to true Horoscopes, and consequently true Astrology. I don't know whose discovery the Lunar Horoscope is, but I have a lot of faith in it, and I feel that when the M.C. and Ascendant are ascertained, that if the cusps between the angles are calculated according to the method of Porphyrius it would be more potent. I don't want to encroach upon your time, but I would like to write a few lines re the Diurnal Horoscope. First of all the horoscope (diurnal) could be erected, the cusps between the angles according to Porphyrius. The Moon being a swift-moving body, actions could be regulated to the hour during which it formed an exact aspect to any planet in transit over the diurnal cusp. If the Moon is of any value, the best time to use it, is during the hour it forms an aspect. The daily motion of Fortuna, its conjunctions with the various cusps, and the aspects of the Moon to it on certain days, may prove of value to any of us acting during certain hours.

Note: The Lunar Horoscope referred to herein is the Lunar Equivalent or Monthly Horoscope.
