THE EDITOR'S OBSERVATORY

ANCIENT VERSUS MODERN ASTROLOGY.

When one reads the ancient works on Astrology, not only the mediaeval tomes of three to six hundred years ago, but the translation of earlier works, containing the accumulated experience of centuries, one cannot fail to be struck with the vast difference which lies between the ancient teaching and the so-called astrology of the present day. In the ancient teaching astrology was put forward as a science; every fact was capable of demonstration and proof, every law and canon was supported by fact. The mathematical part of the science was exact and complete. It was no haphazard, approximation of positions, or loose methods of computation, as though it did not matter whether a cusp or a planetary longitude was correct or not. No loose theories existed; no fantastic conglomeration of erroneous numerical values and manipulation of figures, to make simple folk think there was some peculiar or occult significance therein.

What do we find in much of the present day astrology?

There is a deliberate attempt to upset the ancient laws and canons. New fangled sign

rulerships are invented; imaginary planets glimmer down from the firmament; rules are invented which have neither a scientific nor a common-sense basis. Then we have Sun-sign Astrology in which the day of birth only is required and the true time of birth is not considered a necessity, and in which predictions (?) are invented from the planets transiting the signs from the Sun. I once heard it said that when Jupiter passed through the seventh sign from the Sun it denoted marriage. Then we are told that a person is born under the sign in which the Sun is placed, and the planet ruling that sign is the person's ruling planet, all of which is absolutely incorrect and false. We are further told that everyone born under the same Sun sign will have the same birthday information regardless of the day of birth, another incorrect and false teaching. Other specious and misleading teaching is being given out at the present day, and verily we can use the words of Carlyle that astrology is becoming a "heterogeneous mass of clotted bosh," and we should not be far from the truth.

The unfortunate part of the matter is that the ordinary man-in-the-street is being misled by this erroneous teaching, as he has no opportunity of getting in touch with the real

astrology, and in many cases where he has sufficient common sense, he regards astrology as pure superstition and he cannot be blamed for so doing.

None of this trash is found in the works of the old astrologers, nor in certain of the present day writers. What the old sages had to tell us was told in language of an elevated and poetical character, and was full of wisdom. The present day astro-jazz comedian and crooner has nothing of any value to tell us, and stutters badly in doing it.

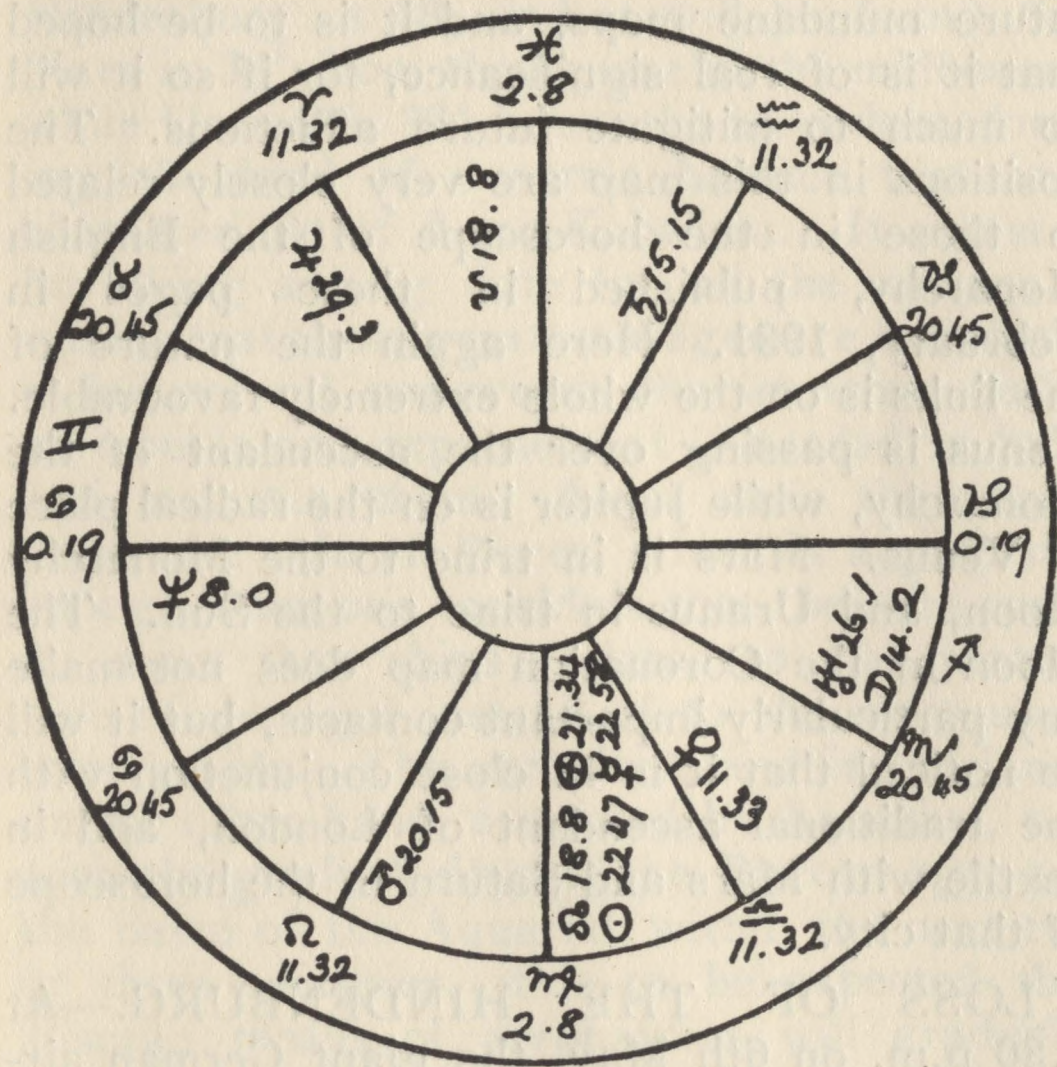

HOROSCOPE OF THE MONTH

By E. H. BAILEY

THE PRINCE OF PIEDMONT.

The Prince of Piedmont, heir to the throne of Italy was born on 15th September, 1904, at 11 p.m. at Racconigi, Latitude 44. 48N. Longitude 7. 40E. This is standard time, and corresponds to 10 p.m. G.M.T., or Local time 10h. 30m. 36s. p.m. There is always some difficulty in dealing with foreign birth times, as they are usually given to the nearest quarter hour, and unless we assume a short period Epoch, for which there is no authority, we do not get an exact confirmation of this time. Personally, I consider the time correct by a normal epoch to be 11h. 10m. 57s. Standard time, or L.M.T. 10h. 41m. 33s. p.m. Local time, and for this time I have drawn the accompanying map.



The sign Cancer rising, with the Moon in Sagittarius, agrees better with the personal appearance than the end of Gemini with Mercury in Virgo. The horoscope is not a very kingly one, with the Dragon's Tail in the tenth, but Jupiter which disposes of this point, is in a Sagittarius sub-division of Aries, and the sub-division of Pisces on the meridian is ruled by the Moon in Sagittarius. Three planets, Saturn, Mercury and Venus are essentially dignified, the first named being in

its own sub-division, while Mars is in the Aries decanate of Leo. These factors make the horoscope much stronger than it otherwise appears.

On the other hand the aspects are very contradictory. The Moon is in sextile to Venus and Saturn, the two latter being in trine, and is also in trine with Mars, which opposes Saturn. Venus however has a square of Neptune. The Sun and Mercury are conjoined in Virgo, with the Dragon's Head and Fortuna, but are squared by Uranus just below the seventh cusp.

When this horoscope was first published, a number of absurd statements were made concerning it, one being that he was physically incapable of marriage and that marriage arrangements would fall through. Events have proved this to be wrong as he has married and has issue. The horoscope is certainly not a very good one, but with three dignified planets, much of the evil is mitigated. The remarks mentioned were not made in the B.J.A.

In view of the international situation, and the position of Italy therein, the main object of using this horoscope was for the purpose of throwing some light on the subject.

At the present time we find the meridian forming the sesquisquare of Mars, while Mars is in conjunction with the Sun and Mercury in the fourth house, an influence brought into power during the latter half of September, 1936.

On the other hand, the Sun and Mercury hour, and unless we assume a short period to are both forming the sextile with Uranus, the Dragon's Head is in sextile to Mars, and the part of Fortuna is just separating from the trine of Saturn.

Jupiter in square to the meridian Saturn conjoined with the Dragon's Tail Uranus in semisquare with the Moon are other directions in operation during the twelve months from June 1st, 1937.

The secondary Moon is now forming the trine of the progressed Sun and Mercury and sextile of Uranus and will shortly be forming a sextile with the radical Jupiter and then a

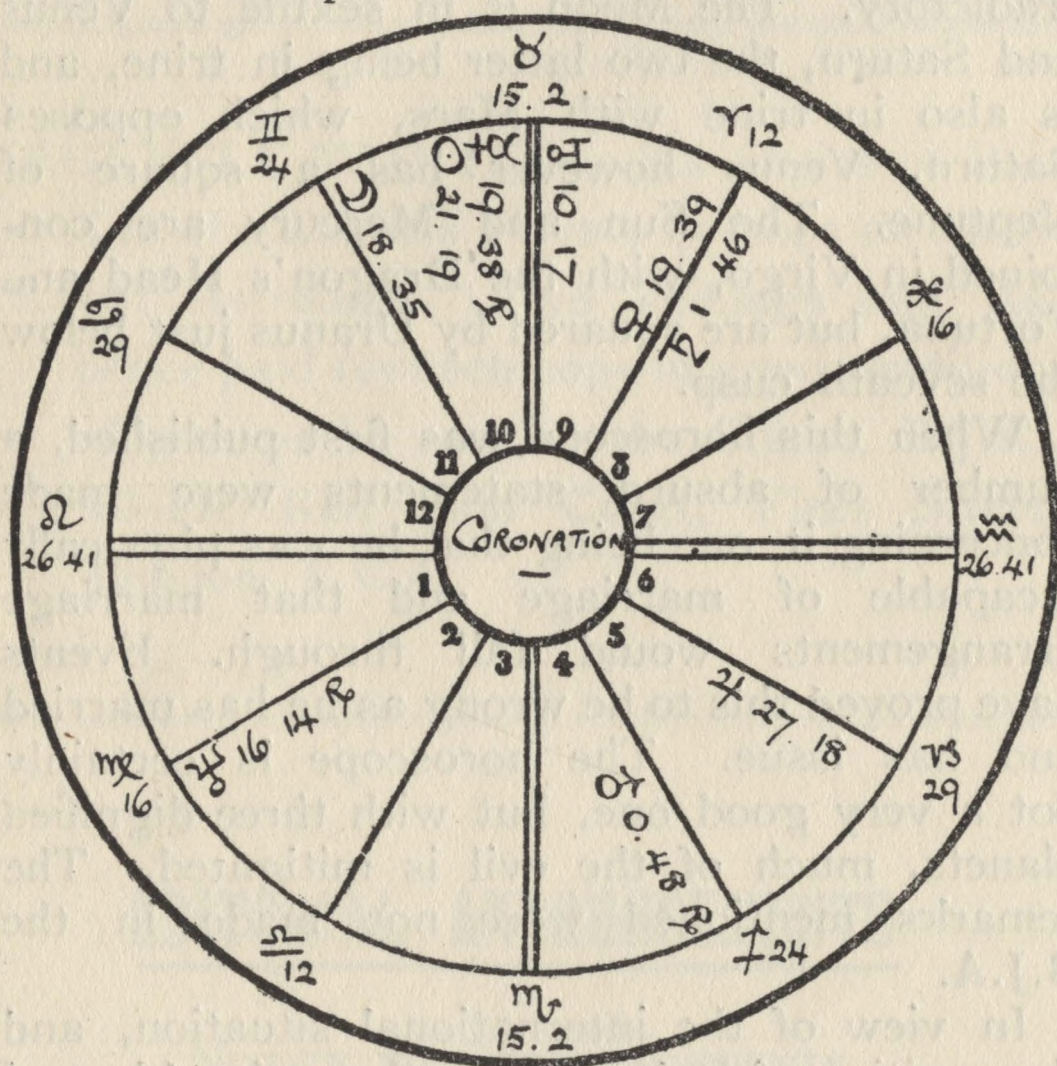

THE KALEIDOSCOPE

THE CORONATION.—Those readers who took the trouble to time the Coronation Ceremony in Westminster Abbey on 12th May, will know that the Crown was placed upon the King's head at 0.31 p.m. (Summer Time).

The horoscope for this moment is as follows :



The value of the Coronation ceremony from an astrological point of view is not easy to assess. Actually the change of reign takes place at the death of the previous King, or, as in this case, at his abdication, and it seems to me that is the true moment for which the horoscope of the ensuing reign should be cast. The Coronation ceremony is, no doubt, the official recognition and acceptance of the new King, but he would still be just as much King without a ceremonial Coronation, and therefore it seems unlikely that the act is a very important one for astrological purposes. However it is all to the good that the Coronation map should be of such a favourable nature as it is. Readers of my new book on Electional Astrology will see that I stated there that at the time of a Coronation Leo should be rising, with the Sun in Taurus in the tenth house, and the Moon strong in the ascendant in favourable aspect with, and received by Venus, Jupiter, or Mercury. In this map Leo rises and the Sun is in Taurus in the tenth house as specified. The Moon is not in the ascendant, but it is in

Gemini in sextile to Venus, and is received in the terms of that planet. Thus the main considerations are quite as they should be. The Sun, which is the natural significator of the King is in semi-sextile to Venus, and in trine to Jupiter and Neptune. The aspect to Venus is thrown from the ninth house, and is a favourable augury for our relations with the Empire during the reign. The trines from Neptune and Jupiter are also particularly fortunate, for they involve the signs Virgo and Capricorn, and the second and sixth houses thus, with the Sun in Taurus in the tenth, linking up all the material signs and houses in the map. This leads one to expect that the King's influence will mean a return to prosperity, and greater peace among the workers and industries. In fact the whole horoscope is a much better one than would be expected in view of future mundane maps, and it is to be hoped that it is of real significance, for if so it will do much to mitigate future afflictions. The positions in this map are very closely related to those in the horoscope of the English Monarchy, published in these pages in February, 1931. Here again the nature of the links is on the whole extremely favourable. Venus is passing over the ascendant of the Monarchy, while Jupiter is on the radical place of Venus. Mars is in trine to the Monarchy Moon, and Uranus in trine to the Sun. The Moon in the Coronation map does not make any particularly important contacts, but it will be noticed that it is in close conjunction with the traditional ascendant of London, and in sextile with Mars and Saturn in the horoscope of that city.

LOSS OF THE HINDENBURG.—At 7.30 p.m. on 6th May, the giant German airship Hindenburg exploded in mid-air when about to moor at Lakehurst, New Jersey, and crashed to the ground in flames. The Hindenburg began its maiden voyage on 31st March, 1936 at 4.30 a.m. G.M.T. from Friedrichshafen. At this time Sagittarius 26 was culminating, and Pisces 21 was rising, with Venus and Saturn in conjunction just above the ascendant, both in opposition to Neptune setting. Saturn rising in Pisces is itself a bad influence for ships of all kinds, but it is of even greater importance

to see that Mars is in no aspect with the Moon and the ascendant at the time of building, launching, or beginning a voyage, for this indicates that the ship will eventually be burnt. Here we find Mars in Aries in the ascendant in square to the Moon in Cancer, and to make matters worse Mars is ruler of the eighth house, that of death. The Moon is strong by sign, and Jupiter is culminating, which tends to improve the map to some extent, and no doubt served to delay the disaster that was threatened. The angles of this figure have come in for considerable affliction. Three months afterwards the Sun was eclipsed in opposition to the midheaven, and at the end of 1936 another solar eclipse fell in close square to the ascendant. The minor arc for the date of the disaster was $14^{\circ} 30'$, which shows the midheaven in square with the Sun; the Sun in square with the Moon; the Moon in sesquare with Jupiter; and Mars separating from the semisquare of the midheaven. The Sun by transit had just passed over the directional Mars, and the previous Full Moon fell in opposition to the radical Uranus. Both Mars and Uranus are of great importance in the map, not only astrologically but from the point of view of Kabbalism also. The number of the Hindenburg is 38, and it will be found that Mars is 38° from the square of the midheaven, while Uranus is 38° below the ascendant, forming the kind of dynamic balance that is a characteristic of Astro-Kabbalism. It seems to be taking a long time for all the nations to realise that these great sausages are essentially a failure and not worth the immense outlay of trouble and expense that is needed to build and maintain them. As a class they come under the rule of Pisces, which is appropriate enough when one considers that they are really no more than ships; related to the gaseous side of the sign instead of to the more usual watery side. The aeroplane and its variants, on the other hand, are ruled by Aquarius, and with the gradual close of the Piscean age, and the dawn of the Aquarian within the next two or three centuries, it is to be expected that Piscean means of aeronautics will gradually give way to the Aquarian aviation which will steadily improve in every way. The present time, as I pointed out a few months ago, is, of course, decidedly against aviation owing to the passage of Uranus through the earthy sign Taurus. During its stay there we may expect a continuance of the steady series of aeroplane crashes that have marked the period since it entered the sign, but after it leaves it the way

will be clear for improvements and developments possibly beginning with the inauguration of a regular trans-Atlantic service in 1942.

DEATH OF LORD SNOWDEN.—Lord Snowden, who died through a heart attack in the early morning of 15th May, was born at 3h. 1m. 54s. p.m. on 18th July, 1864, at Cowling, Yorks. The full horoscope will be found in the pages of this JOURNAL for August, 1930. Jupiter was almost exactly on the ascendant in Scorpio, and this offset many of the afflictions in the map. The ruling planet Mars was in its detriment in the sixth house, that of health the Sun was in conjunction with the ruler of the sixth in a weak sign, and the Moon was in its detriment afflicted by Saturn and Neptune, all these influences being marked indications of the weak health from which Lord Snowden suffered for many years. The height of his career was reached when the midheaven came to the conjunction of Jupiter at the time of the Hague Conference and, as predicted at the time, this was virtually the end of his political career. The directions for the date of death were of a striking nature. By Primary motion the ascendant was in conjunction with the Moon, while the converse midheaven was in conjunction with Uranus, which occupied the eighth house at birth. The Sun had come to the opposition of Neptune, and the Moon by major motion was in square to Uranus. Finally, and probably most important of all, Mars had progressed to the opposition of the Moon, which, in view of the fact that the ascendant was in conjunction with that luminary, means that the opposition took place right across the line of the horizon. According to the newspaper accounts Lord Snowden died shortly after 4.30 a.m., and we find that at 4.45 a.m. the line of this opposition fell exactly along the meridian. The chief transit was the stationary position of Jupiter in opposition to the Sun. This is a very common and important point, which hitherto has, I believe, escaped mention. I have many times observed that an invalid will pull through quite serious transits until the day a planet becomes stationary. That is the critical point when death occurs, or the illness takes a turn for the better.

THE 'BUS STRIKE.—At the moment of writing, London is in the throes of a 'bus strike which began at 0.0 a.m. (Summer Time) on 1st May. Indications of a strike have been present in numerous mundane maps lately, and the actual event came without the slightest element of surprise. One of the earlier signs was in

the map for the solar eclipse of 13th December last. Here Neptune was rising within a degree of the ascendant, and was closely opposed by Saturn, ruler of the sixth house, that of the workers. The eclipse itself fell in Sagittarius, one of the transport signs, and on the cusp of the fourth house at London in square to both Neptune and Saturn. The horoscope for the Aries ingress showed Mercury and Saturn in conjunction in Pisces in the third house, in opposition to Neptune. Here the influences of Saturn, Neptune and the sign Pisces, all of which are of a restricting nature are concentrated on Mercury and the third house, both of which rule 'buses and transport. Finally the new Moon of 11th April showed Saturn in the twelfth house in semi-square with Mercury and Uranus, the planet of strikes, which were in conjunction in the ascendant. On the day of the strike the Sun had separated by only a few minutes from the conjunction of Uranus; Mercury had just turned retrograde; and at the moment when the strike officially began the exact place of the December eclipse was rising. The directions from this horoscope show the midheaven in opposition to Uranus and the Sun on 13th May which is near enough to the Coronation to be appropriate. This is followed by ascendant conjunction Moon on the 17th, ascendant trine Uranus on the 19th, midheaven opposition Mercury on the 26th, and ascendant conjunction Jupiter on the 31st, so that the influences are conducive to peace from the 17th onwards.

THE METHODS OF NOSTRADAMUS.—Several writers, including myself, have discussed the world horoscope from time to time, and there is a general idea that the cyclic methods that have been explained were those utilised by the great Nostradamus. This is by no means correct, for Nostradamus had a complete knowledge of a mighty Kabalistic system that is almost entirely unknown at the present day. It is, however, possible to disentangle certain pointers to these methods by means of a careful study of his writings and I propose to mention a few that I have succeeded in unravelling. For the benefit of those who have never seen a copy of *The Prophecies of Michael Nostradamus*, either in the mediaeval French or in the English translation of 1672, I should perhaps mention that they consist of twelve "centuries" or groups of one hundred prophetic verses, some of which are incomplete, and in addition a few odd verses, together with an epistle to his son Caesar, and another to King Henry II of France. The nature of the lan-

guage employed is usually vague in the highest degree, and gives no hint whatever as to the source of the prophecy or the date at which its fulfilment is to be expected, but here and there he lets fall an astrological expression which is sometimes of value, though usually it gives little help. Thus a quite typical example of the general style of Nostradamus' more enlightening quatrains is number 65 of the second century which reads as follows: "The Park enclineth to great calamity, which shall be through Hesperia and Insubria, The Fire in the Ship, Plague, and Captivity, Mercury in Aries, Saturn shall wither." From this sample the student will realise why nobody has yet found the whole key to the system used. It appears to be a secret system that was known to the ancients, including, no doubt, some of the Biblical prophets, and was not a discovery made by Nostradamus. In fact he tells his son "And although this occult Philosophy was not forbidden. I could never be persuaded to meddle with it, although many volumes concerning that art, which hath been concealed a great while, were presented to me; but fearing what might happen, after I had read them, I presented them to Vulcan." And later he says "I have burnt them all to ashes." Most of the commentators have assumed that the planetary positions mentioned in the stanzas refer to real astronomical configurations but this is due chiefly to their ignorance of astrology, for it is abundantly clear that the system employed is a Kabalistic one, which utilises planetary periods, constellations, the lunar mansions, and the changes in the inclination of the earth's axis. The most illuminating passages in the writings of Nostradamus, if indeed any of them can be considered illuminating, occur in the two dedicatory epistles to Caesar Nostradamus and Henry II, for these contain the key to the system wrapped up in vague and almost incomprehensible language. Space is too limited this month to quote these passages, and I must return to their consideration later.

SENSITIVE POINTS

EIGHTH HOUSE PARTS.

(Continued from Page 148.)

1. *Part of Death.* Formula: Ascendant + cusp of eighth house - Moon. (Unchanged at night.) This is the usual point, and is to be employed chiefly in association with directions and transits.

2. *Part of the Planet of Death or Part of the Occasion of Death.* Formula: Saturn + cusp of eighth house - Moon. (Unchanged at night.) The distinction between this point and the previous one seems rather fine. On the face of it, it would appear that this point refers to the conditions surrounding death, whereas the former refers to the nature of death, but the distinction is not very well supported in practice, and it is likely that the present point is merely a variant of the first, possibly arising through faulty copying.

3. *Part of the Mortal or Killing Planet.* Formula: Ascendant + Moon - Lord of Ascendant. (Reverse at night.) The factors here all relate to the physical body, and any planet in evil aspect to this point might well threaten the life. The chief value of this point is in relation to the radical horoscope, and in picking out a planet therein that is likely to be dangerous by direction.

4. *Part of the Perilous or Most Dangerous Year or of Death, Poverty, or all other Misfortunes.* There are two main variants of this rather overloaded point. (a) Formula: Ascendant + lord of eighth house - Saturn. This is Gadbury's version.

(b) Formula: Ascendant + lord of the previous new or full Moon - Saturn. This is sometimes called the *Part of the Planet of the Year of Death*. Both variants are to be retained unchanged at night. There are also minor variants of (b). Albumasar uses the place of the previous lunation itself instead of that of its lord, while some of the French authorities give the formula in its reversed form. In fact the whole thing is in a mess, and needs straightening out by numerous experiments. Even when that is done it is necessary to find out exactly what the point refers to, for it is unlikely to cover all the varied and manifold evils that its title leads us to expect.

5. *Part of Envies or Part of Murder.* Formula: Mercury + Mars - Saturn. (Reverse at night.) This is a universal part and practically unaffected by the time of birth.

NINTH HOUSE PARTS.

Only three sensitive points relating to ninth house affairs are given by the authors under consideration.

1. *Part of Religion or Part of Faith or Good Manners.* Formula: Ascendant + Mercury - Moon. This is to be unchanged at night according to Gadbury, but reversed according to the French authors.

2. *Part of Journeys by Water or Part of Voyages.* Formula: Ascendant + Cancer 15° - Saturn. If Saturn is situated in Cancer 15, that point alone constitutes the Part. This is one of the series of exaltation points, Cancer 15 being the exaltation of Jupiter. Some authors say it should be reversed at night.

3. *Part of Travels by Land.* Formula: Ascendant + cusp of ninth house - lord of ninth house. (Unchanged at night.) In connection with all the cuspal points, or those that use the cusps of the succedent and cadent houses it should be remembered that they were not originally applied to the Placidian cusps, and may therefore be misleading if inserted in maps erected from the Tables of Houses in common use.

TENTH HOUSE PARTS.

There is a much longer list of Parts relating to this house than to any other and our authors enumerate nineteen, which are briefly as follows:—

1. *Part of Nobility or Honour.* Formula: By day, Ascendant + Aries 19° - Sun; by night, Ascendant + Taurus 3° - Moon. If the Sun or Moon as the case may be, happens to occupy the specified degree (which is its exaltation position) it alone is taken as the sensitive point.

2. *Part of Sudden Advancement.* Formula: Ascendant + Fortuna - Saturn. If Saturn is combust, substitute Jupiter. (Reverse at night.)

3. *Part of Magistery, Profession, and Action.* Formula: Ascendant + Moon - Saturn. (Authorities differ as to its reversal at night.)

4. *Part of Industry or Part of the Industry of the Hands.* Formula: Ascendant + Venus - Mercury. (Unchanged at night.)

5. *Part of Honour and Proceeds from the Profession.* Formula: Ascendant + cusp of tenth house - Sun. (Unchanged at night.)

6. *Part of Felicity and Profit.* Formula: Ascendant + Jupiter - Fortuna. (Reverse at night.)

7. *Part of Estimation.* Formula: Ascendant + Sun - Mercury. (Unchanged at night.)

8. *Part of Merchandise.* Formula: Ascendant + Fortuna - Part of Spirit. (Unchanged at night.)

9. *Part of Mother.* Formula: Ascendant + Moon - Venus. (Reverse at night.)

10. *Part of the Grandmother.* Formula: Ascendant + Dispositor of the Moon - Venus.

All the points that have so far been considered relate to Natal Astrology, and I have purposely omitted all consideration of those belonging to the Mundane, Meteorological, Horary, Commercial, and Electional branches of Astrology, which are given by other authors. But certain of the writers with whom I am at present concerned place a few Parts under the tenth house that belong more properly to Mundane Astrology, and for the sake of dealing with their work completely, I include them in the present series.

11. *Part of Magistrates.* Formula: Ascendant + Mars - Mercury. (Reverse at night.)

12. *Part of Government and Seat of War or Part of War.* Formula: Ascendant + Saturn - Mars. (Reverse at night.) This refers to the Government and country against which war is being waged. Thus in the horoscope for the entry of the Sun into Aries in 1914 this point fell in Gemini 16 in conjunction with Saturn in the twelfth house. The middle decanate of Gemini contains the ascendant of Berlin, and it is also interesting to note, that Sagittarius 16, the opposition to this point, was the ascendant of the Archduke Franz Ferdinand, whose murder was the primary cause of the war.

13. *Part of Conquest.* Formula: Ascendant + Saturn - Sun. (Reverse at night.)

14. *Part of Peace.* Formula: Ascendant + Jupiter - Venus. (Reverse at night.) In the horoscope for the declaration of war by Great Britain in 1914, this point fell in the beginning of Capricorn, and it was rising at the time of the Armistice.

15. *Part of Government or Part of Kings.* Formula: Ascendant + Moon - Mars. This point is stated to require reversal at night, but I have found a fixed formula give rather better results. Thus at the New Moon of 25th December, 1935, the point fell in Gemini 15.31 in close square to Neptune and in semi-square to Uranus. On 20th January following, the

day upon which King George V died, Jupiter and Neptune were close to their square in Sagittarius-Virgo 16, while the point itself by direction had come to the exact opposition of the lunation.

16. *Part of Determination whether there will be a King or not.* Formula: Jupiter + cusp of tenth house - Sun. This is a universal part, and is to be kept unchanged at night.

17. *Part of the Deeds of the King.* The formula for this is the same as that for the Part of Honour. (No. 1 above.)

18. *Part of the Beginning and Strength of a Reign.* Formula: Moon + Leo 15° - Sun. This is to be calculated from the horoscope for the accession, and is to be unchanged at night. It is said that, it should be directed by the profectional method.

19. *Part of the Duration of the Reign.* Formula: Sun + Cancer 15° - Moon. (Unchanged at night.) This is also to be applied to the map for accession, and to be directed by Profections. In the map for the accession of King Edward VIII, this point fell in Leo 27. By profectional direction no very significant result is obtained, but by more usual methods we find that it had progressed to the conjunction of Mars and Saturn in the fifth house at the date of abdication.

ELEVENTH HOUSE PARTS.

1. *Part of Friends.* Formula: Ascendant + Moon - Mercury. (Unchanged at night.) One author gives this formula in the reversed form, but presumably by mistake.

2. *Part of Honourable and Illustrious Acquaintance or Companions.* Formula: Ascendant + Sun - Fortuna. (Reverse at night.)

3. *Part of the Result of Friendship.* Formula: Ascendant + Part of Spirit - Fortuna. (Reverse at night.)

4. *Part of Praise.* Formula: Ascendant + Venus - Jupiter. (Unchanged at night.)

5. *Part of Hope.* Formula: Ascendant + Venus - Saturn. (Unchanged at night.)

TWELFTH HOUSE PARTS.

1. *Part of Enemies or Part of Private or Secret Enemies.* Formula: Ascendant + cusp of twelfth house - lord of twelfth house. (Unchanged at night.)

2. *Second Part of Enemies.* Formula: Ascendant + Mars - Saturn. (Reverse at night.) This is the same as the Part of Illness.

THE HOUSES OF THE HEAVENS

By E. H. BAILEY.

As I have already stated, there is no authority whatever for attributing the method of Porphyry to the Neo-platonist of that name, who lived A.D. 233-304. The method was known to the Hindu sages hundreds of years before that time, and as stated, probably owes its origin to Porphyrius, a Chaldean, who lived about 2200 B.C. It is one of the ancient Hindu methods and has the authority of tradition.

This method consists of computing the meridian and ascendant in the orthodox manner, and then dividing each quadrant of the map into three equal parts *in the ecliptic*. The cusps of the 12th and 2nd will be 60 degrees apart, and those of the 11th and 3rd, 120 degrees apart. The method of calculation was explained in the August, 1936, issue of the JOURNAL, page 212. The cusps of the houses are taken as the centres, and the influence of each cusp extends half-way to the next. This method is wholly of Hindu origin, and is explained in the *Brihat Jataka* and in the *Sripatipadhita*.

It should be stressed that this method is purely one of ecliptic division and has no relation to the equator or to right ascension. The circle defining the cusps are drawn between the north and south poles and not between the north and south points of the horizon.

As a result of this division, each house lies partly above and partly below the horizon.

The best way of illustrating the method of Porphyry, as extended by the Hindus, and explained in the last chapter, is to take a figure for the latitude of London, with Aries 0° on the M.C. The ascendant is ♋ 26° 36' and the distances from the M.C. to the Ascendant, and from the Ascendant to the fourth cusp are divided into three equal parts in the ecliptic, giving the longitudes of the several cusps as follows:—

The Hindu astrologers extend this division in two ways.

1. By a division of the distance between each cusp into two equal parts. The cusps of the houses as shown above, are considered the centres, and the influence of each house extends to the midway point between each cusp. Thus, the distance between the tenth and eleventh is 38° 52', half of which is 19° 26', so that Aries 19° 26' is the dividing line between these two houses. Similarly with the other houses. This division gives rise to the following tabulation:

In this tabular arrangement is shown the two halves and the commencement, centre and end of each house. The centre point is the cusp as recognised.

2. The second division adopted by the Hindus is to divide the distance covered by each house into three equal parts. Thus, in the eleventh house the following would be obtained:—

This would make ♉ 8.52 the exact centre of the 2nd part, and the three parts would be of equal length.

By this division we obtain the three spheres of planetary influence, increasing, culminating and decreasing.

In all cases the four angles always contain 30 degrees, the other houses of varying distances depending on the distance of the angles from each other. Thus in the case of the 10th and 4th houses in the above illustration, there is 19.26 on one side of the cusp and 10.34 on the other. In the case of the 1st and 7th houses the same two unequal portions occur.

In these cases it appears that the only way to deal with the matter is to take two-thirds of each portion separately, in the following manner:—

This month I will give two illustrations of epochs in which both the Moon and Ascendant are found in sex areas. The first is that of the Queen of Spain, born 3.45 p.m., October 24th, 1887. Lat. 57.2 N. Long. 3.12 W.

The Moon is above and increasing and the period will be less than 273 days. Ten revolutions of the Moon measure to 24th January, 1887, and the epoch will fall before noon on the 27th. The Moon, increasing at birth, its longitude will rise at:

This shows the birth to have taken place 4m. 33s. earlier than the recorded time. In the figure for the epoch a female area is rising and the Moon, although in a male area, is in a female quadrant agreeing with the sex.

In this case the epoch is computed by the rules for the ordinary regular epoch.

Case 2. The late Mr. G. R. Sims (Dagonel of "The Referee") born in London on September 2nd, 1847, at 6 p.m.

R.A.M.C. : 16h. 45m. 2s.

Ascendant : 18.53 ♀ Female.

Moon : 20.20 ☿ Female.

This is an ordinary regular epoch of the fourth order. Both factors are female, but as the count is made from the Moon to the descendant, and the Moon's place sets, the sex positions are reversed at the epoch. The index date is December 3rd, 1846, and the Moon is found in the descendant before noon on the 8th

The Moon's longitude is then 18.22 ☿, the descendant of the horoscope. This point sets with a sidereal time of 16h. 43m. 54s. or 1m. 8s. less than at the recorded time, showing the true moment of birth to be 5h. 58m. 52s. p.m.

exactly as to the cusps being the centres of the houses. It states that Bhaskara Charyar defines Bhava Chakra as follows:—

"The point where the ecliptic cuts the horizon in the east is known as eastern or rising Lagna, and in the west as the western or setting Lagna, and the points where the meridian of the place cuts the ecliptic are known as Madhya or middle Lagnas, the 10th and 4th Lagnas. These four points are respectively the middle points of the 1st, 7th, 10th and 4th Bhavas."

Further information is given in the Brihat Jataka, showing how the houses are bisected into two parts, one on each side of the central point, in exactly the same manner as I have described. It is therefore clearly proved that this method was in vogue in India many hundreds of years ago, and long before the time of Porphyry.

THE INFLUENCE OF THE PLANETS

JUPITER.

The planet Jupiter is the planet of Power and Expansion and in the horoscope its position and aspects show the general good fortune and worldly position.

It is the planet of expansion and progress and denotes the line of least resistance along which the actions should be determined.

When ruling the ascending sign or rising at birth and well placed it gives plenty of life and vitality; a noble-minded, generous and hopeful disposition, and makes a person very sincere, benevolent, just and honourable, but with a tendency at times to pride, ostentation and hauteur. It gives good social qualities and those born under the influence of this planet can be affable, courteous and amiable, and their naturally hopeful and buoyant manner will win them friends, and the confidence of others who wish them well. They will have good fortune and success, more or less, in life and need never fear the hand of an adverse fate, and the more hopeful they become the more they will respond to its benefic influence. There is a tendency to take a philosophical view of life, possess a strong religious spirit and incline towards the higher life. The planet Jupiter is the most fortunate planet for social and worldly affairs, but to come under its influence sympathy, hope and benevolence, must be cultivated.

Its best position is in the sign Cancer wherein it is exalted and its influence then is more refined and expansive. It is also strongly placed in Sagittarius and Pisces, signs which it has rulership over. It is also powerful in Aries and Leo but of very little power in Gemini, Virgo and Capricorn.

The following is a general idea of the influence of this planet when placed in each of the twelve signs.

ARIES.—Generous, candid, ardent and high minded, strongly inclined to science, literature, religion and study. Amusements and occupations founded on these will have attention. Pecuniary success is indicated in matters of personal merit. Some tendency to impulse and impatience.

CANCER.—Success in public undertakings. The emotional side of the nature is strong, and there is a good intuition and imagination. Sensitive, desirous of being friends with all. Love of domesticity idealistic and fond of art, with a good financial and economical view of things.

LEO.—Sincere, generous and magnanimous, ambitious, with a love of power, dignity, pomp and display. A great sense of self-esteem, and love of popularity. Fitted for some public work, government employ. Inclined to exaggeration and ostentation. Fondness for being at the head of things.

VIRGO.—Methodical, prudent and tactful. Gain by leading others more than by personal work. Apt at investigating, practical, well fitted for business affairs, matter of fact, taking an intellectual or even materialistic view of things rather than a devotional. Very interested in everything that is generally useful.

LIBRA.—Generally good for marriage and partnership, favours sincerity and religious feeling, and gives an imaginative and artistic or poetical nature. Conscientious and philanthropic, sociable in intercourse with others, and popular. Some tendency to self-indulgence.

SCORPIO.—Activity, self-confidence, fruitful mind, firmly set on its subject. Gives ardour, perseverance, generosity and enthusiasm. Resourceful and practical in realising ideals. Love of mysteries, secret and occult things. Strengthens the emotional and imaginative side of the nature. Some danger of indulgence.

SAGITTARIUS.—Love of outdoor life, and the beauties of nature. A care-free existence, simplicity of life and conditions. Gives tolerance, generosity, devotion, with sane ideas regarding economics and social conditions. Contributes to general good fortune and success, but inclines to extravagance and gambling.

CAPRICORN.—Some measure of power, popularity and esteem, with success in public or governmental work. Inclines to philosophy, contemplation and religion. Frugal and careful with money. A gift for organisation,

self-reliant, reliable and conventional. Ambitious, but inclined to be selfish and narrow.

AQUARIUS.—Good and sincere friends, with pleasure and benefit from them. Favourable for enterprises along social, educational and philosophical lines. Inclined to public occupations and social work. Good intuition, original and independent views. Tactful in business, optimistic, inspired, original.

PISCES.—Charitable, kind and unassuming, easily influenced and somewhat restless and undecided. Idealistic, charitable and hospitable. Sincere religious beliefs, mediumistic tendencies. Devotion and feeling for art are found. Fond of luxury in the home. Some tendency to doubt and self-indulgence.

When rising at birth and unafflicted it promises a rise in life and success in enterprises, with respect from others and popularity. When in the fourth house it brings gain through inheritance and most success at the close of life. Success in homeland rather than abroad. When in the seventh house it promises a successful marriage both socially and financially. Gain through partnership and public work. When in the tenth house it brings opportunities to achieve success and wealth in professional affairs and occupation.

From a health point of view, Jupiter governs the arterial system, liver, blood and the adrenals. It causes pleurisy, blood disorders, liver complaints, kidney disorders, and complaints arising from over-indulgence in food and drink.

In Mundane Astrology it rules the Magistracy, judges, bankers, clerics, people of position, tin, jewellery.

THE TWELVE SIGNS

IX SAGITTARIUS.

The celestial sign Sagittarius rising upon the eastern horizon at the moment of birth, gives a frank, open, honest and generous nature, a keen sense of justice, a mind which is clear and quick at apprehending things; and a disposition hopeful, joyous and independent. There are two sides to the nature, one side bold and fearless, the other sensitive and impressionable, and this duality often tends to give an irritable and restless tendency. Though simple in their mode of life, ingenious and versatile, Sagittarius people are fond of liberty and independence, and fret very much when in uncongenial surroundings, or under restraint. Their keen sense of justice and sympathetic disposition will not allow them to stand by and see others imposed upon or harshly treated. They have a peaceful and philosophical frame of mind, and are orderly and systematic, and through these qualities and their generosity and frankness, they can make much progress in life. There is however a strong tendency to be thoughtless, reckless and erratic, and these are faults which, unless controlled, will bring misfortune. They should never overdo things physically, or undertake too much work, as there is a liability to suffer through over exertion. The planet ruling the sign Sagittarius is Jupiter, the lord of increase.

FIRST DECANATE.—The first decanate of the sign rising brings out the full Sagittarian or Jupiter influence and the tendencies above mentioned will be shown completely. There is a tendency however, to be too independent, proud and arrogant, especially if Jupiter is badly aspected. It generally gives good fortune in life, and the help and association of females of good position.

SECOND DECANATE.—The second decanate of the sign rising gives an Aries sub-influence, increasing the intellectual ability, but giving a tendency to adopt original methods. It increases the impressionability and impulsiveness, and may cause rebelliousness, and a desire to break away from the control of others and become self-willed.

THIRD DECANATE.—The third decanate of the sign on the ascendant brings a Leo or Solar influence into the life, expanding the emotions and broadening the sympathies. There is a

love of pride, grandeur and display, also a love of honour and all things that are straightforward, honest and sincere.

The sign Sagittarius is a fiery, mutable and motive sign. It is the upper right hand of the mutable cross, and the upper right hand end of the fiery triplicity. It governs the hips and thighs and has a rule over the motive temperament.

When the first decanate of the sign is rising the full Sagittarian influence is shown, and the motive temperament predominates. A planet in the ninth house of the horoscope throws an influence into the ascendant. When the second decanate of the sign rises, an Aries, sub-influence is brought into play, and any planet in the sign Aries will throw its influence into the ascendant. The motive mental temperament is then in evidence, brain and motion working together. When the third decanate of the sign rises, a Leo sub-influence is brought into play and any planet in the sign Leo of the fifth house will throw its influence into the ascendant. When this decanate rises, the motive vital temperament will predominate, motion and vitality being conjoined.

The sign Sagittarius is divided into nine subdivisions of 3.20' each commencing with the sign Aries and ending with Sagittarius.

Thus there are three sub-divisions in each decanate.

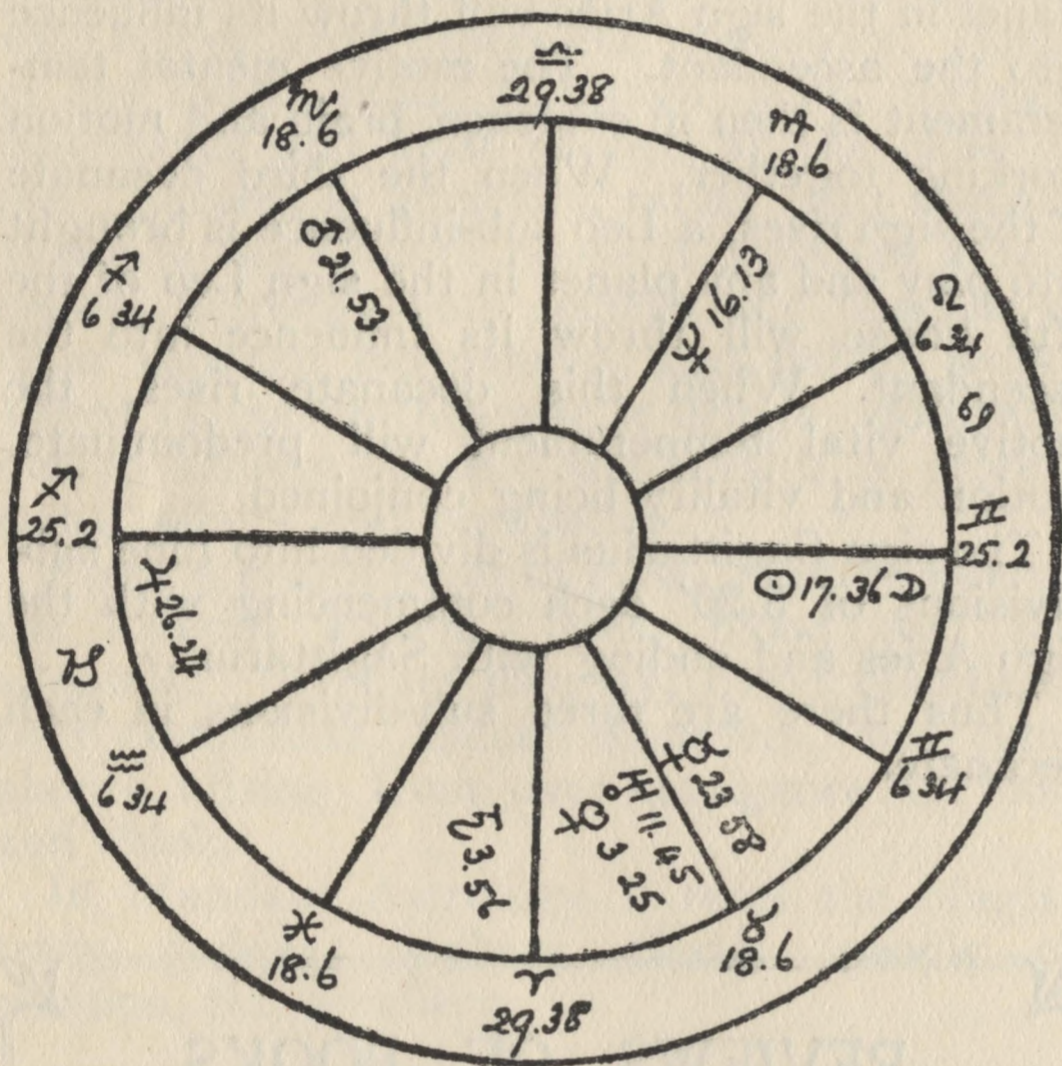

MUNDANE ASTROLOGY

By E. H. BAILEY

THE JUNE LUNATION

The new Moon of June 8th is a total eclipse of the Sun, but not visible in this country, being central over the Southern Pacific Ocean. The figure appended below shows the luminaries at London just below the seventh cusp separating from the square of Neptune on the ninth cusp. Mars is in the eleventh house in opposition to Mercury in the fifth, but Jupiter is just above the second cusp in sextile to Mars and trine to Mercury.



A solar eclipse falling in the second decanate of Gemini is said to cause piracies, thefts and robberies, and as it falls on the ascendant of London we may expect to hear of many crimes of this nature in the metropolis. The position of Saturn in Aries in the third is evil for railways and transport affairs, and there are dangers of further strikes as well as a serious railway accident. With Venus in the fourth house in Taurus an improvement is shown in agricultural affairs and brighter weather may be expected. The position of Mercury in the fifth opposed to Mars is ominous of accidents and cases of cruelty to children. Disputes occur in theatrical circles, with the possibility of an accident to a noted actor. The position of the luminaries in square to Neptune in the ninth brings difficulties in connection with religion and legal affairs. Socialistic and Communist propaganda in shipping and dock-

yards may precipitate a strike in those circles. Venus, ruler of the tenth strongly placed, is beneficial for the Government and Royalty. Many public ceremonials will be held. Mars in the eleventh opposed to Mercury will cause acrimonious debates in the Commons and more than one member will be suspended. The sextile of Jupiter to Mars and its trine with Mercury will benefit trade and commerce and exchequer receipts will be abundant. Hospitals and institutions will also benefit from these same aspects.

Saturn now in Aries will bring depression in this country and railway stocks will have a considerable fall. An eclipse falling in a human sign threatens epidemic sickness. Dope smuggling will come to light. The position of Uranus threatens seismic troubles in 12 E. long. Similar disasters are threatened in 24 E. Mars culminates in 22 E. a warning of troubles and personal danger to rulers in the Balkans.

THE MOON'S NODES

From B.J.A. January, 1923.

“When the Moon gathers and reflects the solar light upon earth, at her ascending Node, this borrowed light is similar in many respects to the direct rays of the Sun, and wherever the Head of the Dragon falls in the signs or houses of the map, its effect upon the affairs with which it is connected will be like that of the Sun in Aries, the point of exaltation. It advances and accelerates personal matters in as great a degree as does Jupiter the Greater Fortune of the mundane figure, and lubricates the machinery of manifestation wherever it is placed, increasing the strength of the benefic planets with which it may be aspected, and rendering less malignant the influence of the malefic planets brought under its forceful sway. But always in opposition to this is the deadly Tail, switching the life out of every good influence within its orb of aspect, and, as it would seem, working directly against the force of the Head, in subtle determination to nullify its power and undo whatever the better part may succeed in doing for the native's weal. Thus is the lower nature ever warring against the higher, the Tail seeking to defy and defeat the plan of the Head. Its influence corresponds to that of Saturn, and when in conjunction with a planet, it exerts an influence of suppression and obstruction similar to the chill blasts of winter under the saturnine spell of the Great Tester of the Soul.”

ASTROLOGY AND THE KABALAH

If the family name reduces to a total of 15 the planet Saturn will play a very important part and the members of these families will not have too easy a time. There will be an encountering of many difficulties and obstructions, and the trend of events will test the powers of endurance and fortitude of each member of the family, not necessarily in the same way or with the same trend of affairs, but always drawing out the principle that there is a testing of the strength of character. Much will naturally depend upon the individual horoscope, the position and aspects of Saturn. If this planet is well placed by sign and house and well aspected then the trials and difficulties will be surmounted and the endurance and fortitude will be sufficient to enable the native to win through and to gain by the lessons learned. Even if Saturn is badly aspected but well placed by sign then although the fight will be harder, the battle with circumstances can still be won, but should Saturn be badly placed by sign and badly aspected then there is likely to be some lack of resistance and endurance and the native will either give way to certain temptations or will experience many difficulties preventing progress from being made. The principle of Fate will always play a part in the lives of people whose family name reaches 15, and the only way in which progress will be made will be through sheer persistence, hard work and unselfish endeavour. These people should never rely upon the element of luck as they are not likely to have much. What they obtain will be the results of their own efforts. From the more favourable standpoint they are able to carry out duties and responsibilities and will have a deal of trust and confidence placed in them whilst they can reach very high positions in public, business and political life because, despite the element of fate, they will always be ambitious.

When the number 16 is reached by reduction the planet Mars exercises power. This is another very powerful number for both good and ill, and much will depend upon the position and aspects of this planet at birth, but from a general standpoint the family history will show conditions of tragedy or catastrophe

alternating with conditions of fame. The principle of courage will usually be very pronounced whilst the individual members as a rule will always be active and energetic, ready to take risks if necessary and sometimes even when they are not required will usually have the courage of their own convictions to do things and can set an example of leadership in their own particular sphere of life. When they apply themselves to business matters they can push ahead and make progress, overcoming difficulties and combining force with diplomacy. At times they may be associated with military or kindred affairs and should Mars be well placed will gain honours and distinction, but in the event of Mars being ill-placed the element of accident or catastrophe can become very prominent and death, suicide, murder or assassination can occur. Naturally Mars would have to be extremely badly placed for these latter significations to manifest but with a partially debilitated or afflicted Mars there is shown to be a danger of accidents whilst there will be a deal of friction and disturbance affecting those conditions of life over which Mars rules by sign and house.

The number 17 when influencing the family name gives very favourable influence. It brings in the vibration of the sign Gemini and the principles of Truth, Hope and Faith will be very pronounced. Members of these families will be intellectually and even artistically inclined whilst there will be ability for literary and artistic work and a considerable amount of travel will be undertaken, mainly of a short distance character. They will be able to associate and fraternize with others and can take part in municipal and public affairs. There will usually be a degree of restlessness and changeability and a necessity for adhering to objectives once they are set. Cheerfulness and companionship will be keynotes of their life, from a general standpoint and they can display a degree of mental brilliancy early in life which with training and persistence can be directed into many beneficial channels. Sometimes however certain members have not the degree of persistence or the capacity for sticking things and this would be shown by planets in this sign being adversely aspected or by Mercury the ruler of the sign being badly placed or aspected and hence these members whilst starting well would not fulfil their early promise but would, as it were, fade out of the more important

THE CHART OF A CAVALIER

This is the horoscope of a great horseman, A. T. Tschiffeley, Esq., the man who rode 10,000 miles from Buenos Ayres to Washington, accompanied only by his two horses, Mancha and Gato. This long journey, which took from April, 1925, to August, 1928, is fully described in his book, "Tschiffeley's Ride: Ten Thousand Miles in the Saddle from Southern Cross to Pole Star."

The Ascendant is Aquarius, the sign of "The Man," and Saturn is the Ruling Planet, both in the sign Scorpio, which points to the tenacity, determination, patience and endurance experienced in the long trail, and the romantic side of his nature in such an adventurous and hazardous undertaking: bearing the aspect of the days of old, and cavalier champions. We find our native with a well-balanced temperament, the vital quality predominating showing him to be one of strong will-power, fixity of purpose and realisation of intention. The three orbs in Cardinal signs, makes evident the pioneering spirit, adventurous nature and the strong and forceful personality. The native was born at Zofingue, Switzerland, 47 N. 17: 7 E. 57, on the 7th May, 1895, at 0.46 a.m.

In 1932 he meets another of the world's greatest horsemen, the late R. B. Cunningham-Graham, with the aspect of ☽△☉, and gets married and publishes his first book under the vibrations of ♀♂♂: ☽△♄. And now this courageous cavalier is writing the biography of his great friend, the most romantic, patriotic gentleman of his period, Don Roberto: as the Spaniards named their esteemed and grand friend. This work will be looked forward to as being the life of the most adventurous spirit of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, one of the finest writers of his age, prolific and profuse; leaving books and writings that will go down to posterity. This ranchero, man-before-the-mast, patriot, litterateur, socialist, humanitarian, rebel and nobleman will have his life recorded by his friend and authorised biographer, his kindred spirit, Mr. Tschiffeley. N'ly. winds, thundery showers, especially in E. half of England and N'rn. Scotland; may be ground frost early in some inland areas, cold; sea rough in Channel. 8th. Cool Arctic winds blowing S'wards across these islands may turn more N.W'ly. later; mainly fine; local showers in our E. districts. 9th. A Westerly type seems to be in operation; most places will have showers, but E. and N.E. of England may have most sunshine; cool or rather cool. 10th. Most areas will experience considerable rain with the usual lack of sunshine; S.W. to S. winds. 11th. W. to N.W. winds, scattered showers, sunny intervals, some improvement in conditions. 12th. Fine and sunny over S.E. and E. England, but a belt of rain from W. will probably reach S.W., Wales and N'rn. England before the close; rain over S. Ireland most of day; most of Scotland will have rain later. 13th. The cooler W'ly. winds will not push far S.; most places will have considerable sunshine, but showers are likely in W. half of S. Britain, with squally conditions in N. Scotland. 14th. 3. *Part of Large Animals.* Formula: Ascendant + cusp of twelfth house - lord of twelfth house. (Unchanged at night.)

4. *Part of Imprisonment, Sorrow, and Captivity.* Formula: Ascendant + Fortuna - Part of Spirit. (Unchanged at night.)

5. *Part of Prisons.* Formula: Ascendant + Fortuna - Saturn. (Reverse at night.)

This concludes my present outline of the theory and use of the Sensitive Points, together with the formulæ for one hundred and four of the chief Parts. There are still a great many left for consideration, but my examination has not yet covered all those already mentioned above, and further treatment will have to be in book form at a later date.

REPORTS OF MEETINGS.

On April 22nd, Mr. E. W. Whitman gave a Lecture on the Horoscopes of the King and Queen and pointed out the various influences in operation during the present period. An interesting discussion followed the Lecture.

On April 29th a discussion took place on the question of Eastern and Western Methods of Astrology, by an example horoscope on the blackboard between Mr. R. Woods and Mr. E. H. Bailey. Time did not permit of the completion of the discussion.

On May 6th Miss J. Harrap, an Associate of the British Biochemic Association gave a Lecture on "Astrology as an aid to Diagnosis." This was illustrated by several horoscopes, and a very interesting and instructive evening was held.

On May 13th, in the absence of the Lecturer for the evening, Mr. E. H. Bailey spoke on several astrological matters. The subject of the rising degree and its position in the decanates and sub-divisions of the signs. The question of the Moon's Nodes was also dealt with and that of personal appearance, as shown from the decanates of the signs, and three great divisions of mental, motive and vital.

On May 20th, Mr. E. H. Bailey gave a detailed explanation of the influence of the Moon's nodes, and quoted from ancient and mediaeval authorities, and from his own personal investigations he gave a description of influence of the Head and Tail in each of the twelve houses, and when conjoined with the planets. He also drew attention to the Moon's position in relation to its Nodes, and gave a number of remarkable illustrations of its particular influence from authentic horoscopes.
