Masonic Honor Falls.

Wells, who when he died was a "high" Mason, in good standing in the lodge, had been killed and buried in the same lodge as Bro. Mason, and as a finale, how her house was forcibly entered by this said high Mason, when she was visited at his home. For this she reported the fact to her brother, to the constancy of which she depends upon the lodge for protection, but to see if there was any honor or in the institution. All Masons who have passed the Master Mason's degree are sworn to protect the constancy of Mason's wife and children (whether they do others or not) and she wished to know what disposition was made by the ancient and honorable fraternity of such brethren who violated, or attempted to violate the above oath, by his expressions. She was told that the constancy could not be, and that the offending brother would be attacked; to the committee to be appointed by the lodge to hear her grievances, and action would be taken in the matter. Instead of this, they have done nothing, but tried to smooth over the matter, and they have been so far from remaining a good standing yet, to all appearances (Has had his day, I suppose, and this constituted a "good Mason"). NEWS SUMMARY.

CHICAGO.—Last Wednesday a disastrous fire broke out in the southwest part of the city, which destroyed a large number of the starting point of the great fire. A high south-west wind and low wooden buildings with their close proximity to the flames overcame only by the severest exertion by the Fire Department. Three blocks of the city were burned, amounting to three whole blocks. The loss, which fell on many poor families, is estimated at \$1,200,000. The fire was caused by a lighted candle left burning. It was in reality turned over to the fire-keepers, and was extinguished by a large majority. The destruction, etc., were too numerous to mention.
