PROBLEM WITHOUT ANSWERS

WHAT IS THE advantage of a Ph.D.? Science Fortnightly asks this question seriously in a recent editorial discussing our rigid educational system. The Fortnightly quotes a British scholar, Dr. Liam Hudson of the Research Unit on Intellectual Development, Psychological Laboratory, Cambridge University.

The doctorate, Dr. Hudson says, is now a "meal ticket". And its biggest problem is that it is not often earned by a young scientist before he reaches the age of 24.

Yet Darwin already had "wasted" five years before he set sail aboard the *Beagle* at 22. Einstein had published his reputation-establishing papers before he was 25. Newton had reached all his scientific conclusions before he was 22. Most physicists now hold that a man's most creative years are behind him when he reaches 30.

Dr. Hudson demonstrates that just about every widely held attitude toward educational practices is fallacious.

He insists that teachers cannot predict which of their students are most gifted. He insists that psychological testing methods are notoriously wrong. IQ tests are miserable indicators of later success. All that is needed to do original work, apparently, is a certain minimum IQ ---and a surprisingly low one at that. Above a low level the indicators of "intelligence" testing appear to be fallacious.

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goals. This technique focuses your force into a blazing power beam. Whatever you desire, you have merely to focus this power upon it, and it will be yours.


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Einstein was distressingly lazy. somewhat eccentric, competent in mathematics and eager but not very skilled in physics. It was suggested that he try something "less taxing" than his chosen field of study.

What Dr. Hudson seems to be saying, it seems to us, is that our educational system puts our most creative young minds into a straitjacket, requires them to follow a rigid formal course of study, and releases them to the world after two things have happened to them:

1. They are too old to be truly creative any longer.

2. They are rigidly molded into a pattern that inhibits their creativity in the same sense that Einstein (who never wrote a Ph.D. thesis) was inhibited by the rigid demands of his examinations and curricula.

This rigidity, drilled into young scientists at an early age, is another reason, of course, that they can't accept the findings of unorthodox researchers.

FROM ART TO SCIENCE?

BUT ONCE IN a while there is a break-through. The U.S. Government's Department Of Health Education and Welfare is about to set forth on a research project into palmistry!

The department, contradicting everything we have said in the pre-

ceding paragraphs, reports there is enough evidence to warrant research on whether palmistry can predict a baby's future. At a minimum, the question is, can palmistry predict the child's later susceptibility to mental illness, heart ailments, cancer and some other diseases?

Already published data suggests there is some correlation between finger and palm prints and certain neurological diseases. Dr. Fred Rosner, who will supervise the study, states:

"Unusual patterns have been reported in patients with organic brain syndrome, neuroses, various congenital and genetic diseases, diplegia, congenital heart disease, and schizophrenia.

If certain types of mental abnormalities, not usually detectable at birth, could be discovered early enough, by the palm-reading technique for example, the problem might be arrested.



TN THE MIDDLE of November Peter Hurkos, the Dutch-born psychic, was found guilty in Milwaukee Federal Court of impersonating an FBI agent.

As we have mentioned before in this column, Peter Hurkos is an able psychic whose personality occasionally involves him in difficulties. His conviction impugns his judgment but not his psychic abilities.

FOR THOSE WHO believe sometimes it does rain fish, we wish to report two recent events. In Calhoun, Ky., Gordon McLaughlin found a live, five and threequarter-inch catfish flopping in his orchard after a rainstorm. It was a mile from the nearest pond or stream.

On Monday, November 9, Allen Holmes was walking home from school after a rainstorm in Del Rosa, Calif. Across the street from his home, Allen found a small bass floating in the gutter. He thought it was dead at first but put it in a pan of water and the fish revived and began to swim around. The "experts" in the area speculated that perhaps it had come from a privately stocked pond in the Del Rosa area — which had overflowed. We think it probably fell with the rain.

DISAPPEARANCE OF CHARLES HOLDEN

CHARLES F. HOLDEN, 78, was a retired paint contractor in Oakland, Calif. One day in October Holden set forth on a weeklong hunting trip with his son, Albert, and brother-in-law, Robert Rigor. Holden planned only to paint and sketch.

The trio stopped on the highway about 27 miles east of Crescent City, Calif., at 2:00 P.M. on October 11. While the two younger men scouted about, Holden sketched.

"I glanced back as we started out," Albert said, "and saw him starting to sketch. That was the last time I saw him."

Albert and Rigor returned after about 45 minutes. They saw absolutely no trace of Holden—not a scrap of pastel or even a cigaret butt.

The area was scoured by 75 deputies and forestry officials. No trace of Holden had been found as of this writing. Deputy David Grenbemer said, "It is physically impossible for him to be up there. If he had fallen into the brush or if he had wandered away—any


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distance—we would have found him."

"I just can't believe it," Albert says. "There's no explanation."

LESSONS FROM WITCH DOCTORS

PERHAPS YOU know someone who is feeling mentally disturbed. If so, too bad he's not a primitive man or woman able to participate in a rousing witch doctor ceremony.

It works, say two psychiatrists of Lima, Peru, who spoke at the third Latin American Congress of Psychiatrists meeting there.

Dr. Max Silva and Dr. Moises Lemlig of Lima say that primitive witch doctors in the Peruvian jungles are years ahead of us in some phases of group therapy. And their treatment in some respects is surprisingly "modern".

The curandero, says Dr. Lemlig, uses every trick in his magical bag to gain the confidence of his patients and to get them to reveal their symptoms. In the jungles the witch doctors dance wildly, give the patients doses of tranquilizing drugs, and encourage them to shed their inhibitions by joining him.

After this the witch doctors find it easier to delve into the troubled thoughts of the patients. Among the drugs they use are potions from the ayahuasco plant, which has no after-effects and is not habit-forming. Persons who drink this concoction experience floating sensations and a slowing up of time.

One unusual facet of the treatment is the method of payment. Curanderos don't charge for treatment—only for cures.

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periodically since October, 1959. The dog was not seen after fairly large numbers of Atomic Energy Commission researchers began working on a special project at Mauna Loa.

The little white dog, so shy no one ever has been able to approach him, fascinates Hawaiians because of a local legend which says that he is Pele's dog and his appearance heralds a volcanic eruption. The dog's first two appearances in 1959 and 1961 came shortly before Kilauea erupted. But in the past year or so glimpses of him have not been followed by an eruption.

TRACKS IN THE SNOW

PETER TAYLOR, leader of an Australian expedition to the Himalayan peak of Langtang Lirung, returned to Calcutta late in October with photos of perfect footprints he came upon at 19,000 to 20,000 feet in Western Nepal.

The footprints, which may be those of an "abominable snowman", were nine inches long, five inches wide and four-toed. They were an even three to four feet apart. Beside them were smaller footprints of a dog or fox which either accompanied the creature or followed it. The footprints were very fresh when discovered and followed along the southwest ridge of Mount Lirung for about a half mile. Fateh Bahadur Limbu, the Nepalese Government liaison officer who occompanied the expedition, said he saw similar footprints on October 13 about a mile from the base camp. Taylor photographed his prints on October 3.

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It's hard to know what to believe among the science-fictions that are coming out of Russia these days, but the Associated Press reports from Moscow that the USSR has sent a photographic party into a remote section of the North Caucasus to check on repeated reports of a strange wild people living in the forests.

The magazine *The Week* said that scientists had received 300 reports of sightings of the creatures over a five-year period. Even a Major General, claiming he had seen one of them, described it as taller than six feet, walking with a stoop, with arms hanging loosely to the knees.

"Their language," the eyewitness said, "is an unintelligible grunt."

From this safe distance we must remain skeptical of reports that sound too much like the old-fashioned conventionalized concepts of Neanderthal man. Possibly Neanderthal man did or still does survive, but modern physical anthropologists have begun to conclude that he was not a separate species, that he did not walk with a stoop

MARINE LONG NECKS AGAIN?

NOTHER RUSSIAN report is A helping to confirm Ivan T. Sanderson's view that an unknown species of long-necked seal-like creature is responsible for many of the marine monster and sea serpent reports that still come flooding across our desk.

Reuters now has given us more details of a sighting in Lake Haivr in Siberia by several Russian geologists recently.

The creature was described as having a small head set on a long. gleaming neck, jet black skin and a vertical fin on its back. Members of the Moscow expedition say they saw the animal twice, once it spent a long time on the shore and on a second occasion it surfaced in the middle of the lake and beat its long tail on the water. A sketch from an Associated Press wirephoto shows a primitive drawing that looks like most other drawings of these creatures you have seen.

From Johannesburg, South Africa, we hear there's a bellowing snake-headed creature in the lake behind the Vaal Dam. Witnesses say it has a flat head about eight inches wide, and that it is about 20 to 25 feet long. Something quite

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IN THE QUINCY GRAVEYARD


QUITE A DIFFERENT sort of beast, monster, entity or hoax supposedly has been lurking in the shadows of St. Mary's Cemetery, West Quincy, Mass.

For some time, around the middle of November, there were reports of a dark mysterious creature coming out of a nearby swamp and racing about among the tombstones. There are a number of reports; they do not agree. Dave Beaton of the Boston *Traveler* suggested that "the monster appears to change shape."

Eighteen-year-old Toni Ruggiano told Beaton: "I came home from a date Friday night (November 13) and my brothers told me they had heard some noises up at the cemetery. We went up there and we spotted something behind a headstone, peering out at us. It was about as big as a mongrel dog then. It appeared to have a head but not feet, and it was shaped like a blob.

"As we watched it, it seemed to get smaller. It moved behind a headstone, to the top of it, and appeared to be floating.

"We went back home to get my parents and my uncle, and took them to the cemetery. My uncle spotted it about 15 yards from the place I had seen it. It was small





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then, about the size of a baseball."

The next day Miss Ruggiano's 14-year-old brother Andy explored the cemetery and found something "slimy and smelly on a rock."

A crowd was on hand at the cemetery the following night. One witness, who insisted on anonymity, declared he chased a creature there Saturday night. "If it had arms or legs it would have been shaped like a dog," he said. "For a while it seemed to be jumping around on the top of a tombstone, and then it appeared to float in the air . . . We could hear it running around between the tombstones. We just got glimpses of it. It was moving pretty fast. When we tried to spot it with a flashlight, the thing screeched." Unfortunately, that's the last report we have.

RAIN OF STONES

POLTERGEIST activity in the Phillipines, we have noticed, often takes the form of stonethrowing. At Marilao, Bulacan, there was an incident in late October. It has peculiar overtones.

Residents of Marilao have noticed that the stone-throwing activity always is centered around 14-yearold Ernesto Rabanzos, a waif who had lived with Ildefonso Santos for the past two years. The presence of Ernesto in certain houses, it has been observed, causes a rain of

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
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stones there during the night.

During Ernesto's life with the Santos family stones rained down on the house night after night. Finally Santos filed criminal charges against several neighbors whom he accused of malicious mischief.

Then Ernesto moved in with Councilor Nemesia Santiago, a civic leader. From that day, her house was bombarded with stones. The councilor could not accuse Ernesto of this mischief, though, because he always was asleep in the house when the events occurred. The police investigated but the stones kept falling.

The parish priest then was called in and he agreed to assume responsibility for Ernesto. The day Ernesto moved into the convent, stones pelted down on the convent, church and the chandeliers. At least two persons, Antonio Sumala and Donato Fernandez were hit.

The priest tried blessing the church to exorcise the evil spirits but the stones kept falling. At last report he was planning to refer Ernesto to Boys Town in Marikina, Rizal.

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THE ORGUEIL HOAX

ON MAY 14, 1864, the famous Orgueil shower of meteorites occurred in France. The fall ironically came at a period when the great Louis Pasteur was involved in a scientific controversy in France. Pasteur was arguing that life could not arise spontaneously but could only come from other life.

Two of the stones that fell in the Orgueil shower were turned over to the Musee d'Histoire Naturelle at Montauban, France, by Maitre Fenie, mayor of Campsas. These two stones were stored in a sealed, glass, display jar from 1864 until the spring of 1962. At that time the jar was opened by Albert Cavaille' of the Montauban museum. The smaller of the two stones, weighing 34 grams, was sent to the Enrico Fermi Institute, University of Chicago, for analysis in connection with the claim that meteorites from the Orgueil shower contain evidence of extraterrestrial life.

What the team of scientists found is that someone had tampered with the fragment of meteorite between the time it fell in France and the time it was placed in the sealed glass jar. Some one had inserted bits of plant, a few fragments of coal, and held the whole thing together with glue. In addition the entire outside surface of the samples was fused as a meteorite which had sped through the air would be. To make the matter even more complicated, the bulk of the samples was meteoritic material of the actual Orgueil fall.

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to trace the origins of the contaminating materials.

In the context of history, there seems little doubt that the hoax was perpetrated in an attempt to embarrass Pasteur's claim that life could not arise spontaneously.

But the further irony is that the Orgueil meteorite has been used as a prime example to prove that fossil life exists in space. The larger sample of meteorite from the same jar was sent to Dr. Bartholomew Nagy, of Fordham University, who has argued that microscopic objects found in the samples may be evidence of life elsewhere.

Fragments of the Orgueil meteorite exist in many museums. The problem now becomes one of which were deliberately contaminated and which were not. Even the discoverers of the hoax admit that it does not bear directly on alleged fossils in other fragments of the meteorite.

CURE AT FATIMA

THE SHRINE of Our Lady of Fatima, like the shrine at Lourdes, is developing a reputation as a place for healings.

A recent case now being studied by the medical staff of the hospital at Fatima, deals with the reported instantaneous recovery of a paralytic pilgrim during the Eucharistic blessing at the shrine last June 13.

According to The Miraculous Medal, Manuel Correia de Veiga, a Portuguese, who emigrated from the Azores to the United States in 1952, and who now lives in Salem, Mass., six years ago suffered a spine fracture in a factory accident, despite several operations he remained paralyzed from the waist down and was confined to his wheel chair.

Veiga was accompanied to Fatima by his daughter and arrived at the shrine just in time for the traditional Mass for the sick on June 13, the 47th anniversary of the alleged second appearance of the Virgin in 1917.

After the Mass, as the sick were being blessed, Veiga leaped to his feet unaided and was able to walk in the procession that ended the ceremonies.

NOTES ON FATE

 Near Chino, Calif., a newspaper boy won a free airplane ride in a subscription contest and was killed when the plane crashed.

Mrs. Hazel Glass Dunford, 70, of Lynchburg, Va. was watching the World Series on television when she heard a strange noise across the street. She got up to look out the window just as a tractor-trailer slammed into her home crushing the very chair in which she had been sitting.

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The Entombed Miners' STAIRCASE to HEAVEN

Buried alive 390 feet deep in the earth, two coal miners shared experiences unique in human history.

By Bill Schmeer

E ARLY ON AUGUST 3, 1963, three men turned their backs on the morning sun and disappeared into the blackness of an old, independently-operated coal mine at Sheppton, Pa. Fourteen days later two of the men would step back into the sunlight, bringing with them an astounding report of a continuous, collective hallucination which the editors of FATE assure me is unmatched in the annals of psychic research.

To give a name, "collective hallucination", to the experiences David Fellin and Henry Throne shared in their accidental tomb 390 feet deep in the earth is certainly not to explain the phenomena. This scientific description indicates that the two men simultaneously saw objects which in fact had no reality. But has science catalogued all aspects of reality?

I can only warn the reader that the two central figures in this report object vehemently to inferences that they imagined any part of the story they are revealing in full detail for the first time on these pages.

FATE actually started to work on this story when Associated Press bulletins issued during the rescue operations hinted that the cave-in victims were experiencing unusual phenomena. Subsequent newspaper stories indicated that both survivors claimed their temporary tomb was illuminated by a strange light of unknown origin; that they had seen two men dressed like power company linemen; that they saw white marble stairs leading out of the mine; and that Pope John XXIII was present with them in the mine.

Little further detail was forthcoming on these reports and a FATE reporter sent to the scene found the survivors unable to talk to him because the Associated Press had bought exclusive "rights" to this news story.

However, after the first anni-

versary of the accident I was able to conduct independent interviews with both of the survivors. Neither man is yet aware that I have interviewed his companion and I doubt that they have spent any significant period of time together putting their views into agreement since each has a rather wary attitude toward the other. So, you, the reader, are really the first authority to study the degree of correspondence existing between the memories of these two survivors of

one of the most terrifying experiences men have ever lived through.

The two men, along with co-worker Louis Bova, just had filled a rail car called a mine buggy with coal and had sent it up the nearly vertical shaft of the old mine. Fellin, 58, a veteran of 43 years of mining, was foreman and co-owner of the mine; Throne, 28, had been on the job only two months; Bova, 43, was a thoroughly experienced miner.

The buggy of coal was drawn to the mouth of the shaft by the winch operator dumped and headed back down the hole. Halfway down the buggy stopped. The operator tried again. Again the car stopped. The winchman knew there had been a cave-in and he raced away for help.

At the bottom of the shaft, the cave-in had begun with a roar of splintering timber and the crash of falling rock. The three men working there jumped for their lives. Two to one side of the shaft, and one to the other.

Fellin and Throne were the two who jumped together to the same side of the shaft. They found themselves uninjured, but in cramped quarters. Taking stock of their survival equipment, they found that besides their own hands and legs, they had only their miner's lamps, a little water in a jug, a broken axe, a crowbar, an old saw and a rasp.

The men were near the 390foot level of the mine, which, ironically, put Dave Fellin just a few hundred yards from his own house where his wife Anna waited for his return.

In addition to these scanty tools, the men did have the advantage of Dave Fellin's years of experience underground, his courageous attitude, and his fund of general knowledge.

Young Hank Throne, like Fellin a native of the immediate neighborhood, had his youth and strength to put into the battle for their lives. Hank had worked only five years in coal mines, but he earlier gained valuable experiences during an eight-year tour of duty in the Army. Hank also had a wife waiting for him back on top.


Both men knew that essentially it was futile to try to dig out with the tools at hand, but the veteran Fellin was determined to try. Together they began to inch their way up the side of the debris-clogged shaft, hoping against hope that they would meet a rescue party working its way down from the top.

After wracking efforts, they fought their way to a gangway 30 to 40 feet above their starting point. This gangway was an old working area with no outlet, but there was room to move around, so the miners decided to rest until they could determine which way the activity was going on the surface.

Their morale might have been shattered had they known that the

authorities planning their rescue were unable to mount any effort as long as rock and debris continued to plummet from the sides of the shaft to the bottom.

While waiting for some evidence of a rescue attempt, Fellin and Throne went on with their own attempts to reach the third miner, Lou Bova, trapped somewhere on the other side of the shaft. At one point Dave Fellin thought he heard Lou yell, "Come for me. I'm hit (or hurt)!" Dave asked Lou to give the miner's rap, a signal of two long and three short raps. He asked for this signal because Bova contracted laryngitis easily. Fellin called several times, and he believes that Bova answered once with the miner's signal. But there were no further signals or calls and Bova's body never has been recovered. Three days after the cave-in started, state and private mine experts decided that rescue of any survivors was impossible, and recommended the mine shaft be filled and a new shaft dug to recover the bodies. However, the families of all three miners were convinced their men were alive, and they prevented this drastic action which would mean death to any living thing trapped in the old shaft.

Joe Fellin, Dave's brother, was more than just convinced that his brother survived, he claimed he "knew it" although he had been estranged from his brother. The men, though living close to one another, had not spoken in 20 years. Himself an old hand in the Pennsylvania anthracite fields, Joe believed that if a shaft could be drilled just beyond the main slope of the mine, the trapped men could be rescued.

Saturday, the fifth day following the cave-in, a giant drilling rig was assembled over the spot selected by Joe Fellin. It was put to work drilling a six-inch hole to a gangway Joe claimed existed 390 feet below.

Around midnight Saturday the desired depth was reached and the drill bit was withdrawn. One of the rescue workers leaned into the mouth of the bore hole and called down. To his great surprise he got an answer! An engineer from a radio news mobile unit immediately stripped the hardware from all his microphone cables, spliced them together and dropped a mike down the hole. Dave Fellin then made his first contact with the outside world since Tuesday morning, five days before.

After drilling this first hole, which was used as a supply and communications line, three heartbreaking attempts were made at drilling a rescue shaft. One attempt missed the underground cavern, one attempt almost caved in the roof of the miner's refuge, and the third try finally succeeded. After 14 days underground, the men were eased to the surface, one at a time, in a parachute harness.

When they reached the top, the two were rushed to a hospital where Fellin requested a psychiatric examination—his experiences had caused him to fear the loss of his sanity—and where Throne received treatment for a hand injured striking something that sceptics claim he imagined.

Examination by two psychiatrists confirmed that both Fellin and Throne were mentally alert and competent. But no examination then or now can establish the reality, or non-reality, of the experiences that remain the most vivid memories held by the two principals in this dramatic event. Here, then, are the details of the entombment that

hitherto have remained unspoken.


As a general description of the strange events 390 feet below the surface of the earth, Dave Fellin told me, "Pope John and the cross was there all the time. But these other things kept jumping across. They would come like a movie. First there was these men with lights and after awhile the steps would come . . . It was real. Both of us were seeing it and we knew they was live people. We know that."

Pope John first appeared to the men during their second 24 hours underground. The Pope and a gold cross appeared on the cavern wall behind Fellin, but Hank Throne was the first to mention the apparition. Throne, a Protestant, did not recognize the figure, and asked Fellin who it was. Fellin, a Roman Catholic, identified the figure but avoided looking at its face. Fellin had been aware of the presence, but had not spoken of it for fear that he was seeing things.

Both men volunteered to me that they had seen Pope John in their tomb. Hank Throne described the figure's face as smiling and happy. Dave Fellin never saw the face because he did not attempt to look. But by casting his glance downward he saw a foot and part of a leg.

Both men independently agreed that the Pope stayed with them until the successful escape shaft broke through to them. They also agreed that the shaft broke through at the exact spot where the figure of the Pope had been seen throughout their trials.

A gold cross became visible to the men at the same time they first saw the Pope. There is some variation in their descriptions of this appearance. Fellin saw it as smooth bands of gold metal. He described the members of the cross as being straight with squared ends, except that the left side of the transverse

beam curved upward at its outer extremity.

Throne described the members of the cross as having rounded ends. He also described the transverse beam as curving down on the left side and up on the right side. The upper end of the vertical member, he said, curved slightly to the right above the intersection with the transverse.

After the Pope and the cross, "... there was these men with lights."

Dave Fellin told me that the men came in a chariot-like vehicle which had no horses to draw it. Only the top parts of their bodies could be seen and then only in profile. The men wore lights on their foreheads. The lights were in the shape of funnels, Dave said, with the narrow end of the funnelshape emitting waves of light, as opposed to narrow beams.

Hank Throne said he first saw these men unreeling wire from a spool. He said they wore utility belts, miner's lamps with battery packs, and looked like "ordinary guys." It was Hank who labeled them "linemen." Hank asked them to bring light into the cavern and they responded by disappearing for about an hour.

But buried 390 feet in the earth, the men did have light. Dave Fellin recalls that, "It was a bluish light. Sort of like steam. The whole room, the whole area was filled up with steam, and you could see shadows."

Fellin said the light would start from a point the size of a match head and would grow until it filled the room. It was soft light, he noted, but bright enough to read his watch by or to see to take care of Throne's injured hand. Fellin has asked sceptics to explain the amount of work he and Throne did, difficult work such as placing timbers to prop the ceiling of the mine shaft, if the only light they could see by was a product of their imaginations?

Fellin also added that when the light came, and it appeared to him only intermittently, it seemed to lift the men from their underground chamber to a place where they could see for miles.

Hank Throne's recollection was that the bluish light was there all the time, not just intermittently. Hank said the light was bright enough to read a watch by, and that it had no apparent source but filled the entire area.

Throughout their entire 14-day entrapment, the only event that either man admits was frightening was the sudden appearance of a set of white marble stairs that seemed to lead up and out of the rock-crowded mine shaft.

Dave Fellin said the stairs were white marble, 10 to 12 feet wide, and straight and steep. He thought they went right up until they disappeared from sight.

Hank Throne described the stairs as white marble, but he thought they were "three to four people wide." He also recalled them as being 12 to 14 in number, and narrowing toward the top.

Hank wanted to climb the stairs, but Dave Fellin objected. Dave was afraid that if they went up the steps it would be the end of them. Specifically, Dave thought the steps led to Heaven. The men's recollections are in absolute agreement on this exchange.

Although the men were trapped for more than five-and-a-half days before there was any real reason to expect rescue, this was the only incident that made them fearful. They are in agreement that one reason for the absence of fear during the ordeal was that three men had come to them with a tablet or plaque which showed they would survive.

In describing this incident, Dave Fellin said, "I don't remember what day it was. I was just thinking. 'Is any of us going to get out?' And the minute I thought that, why the three men came, one with the plaque."

Fellin described these men as ruggedly handsome, about six feet three inches tall, with bronze-colored skins and very slightly pointed ears. He said they had thin lips, "normal" eyes, and that their physical condition reminded him of football players. The only costume he described was a wide head band, open on top to reveal dark, straight hair.

Dave described the plaque as being orange in color; about eight by 11 inches on the face and threefourths of an inch thick.

Hank Throne described the three visitors as having high cheek bones, Caucasian eyes, and thin lips. He said their skin was darker on the hands and toes than on the faces. Their hair, he said, was ear-length, combed back at the top and left to fall at the sides. He said they wore nothing on their heads, but were robed in green-gray garments similar to Japanese kimonos and wore open sandals on their feet.

The plaque, Hank recalled, was triangular, almost heart-shaped. He estimated its dimensions as about 16 inches long and 24 inches wide. Its color was blue, and it was covered with rows of holes with pegs about the size of a cigarette filling most of the holes.

One row of holes was open and one of the three visitors asked Dave Fellin to put a peg in a hole. As Dave plugged in his peg the board got darker. Hank refused to place a peg when he was asked.

Fellin told me there were names on the plaque, and that he tried to see if his and Throne's names were included. But when the visitors agreed to show the plaque to Fellin, "... there was nobody's name on there. It was empty. So I knew me and Hank was gonna come out." Having thus reassured Dave and Hank, the three visitors vanished.

Both men later saw other groups of mysterious people in idyllic scenes—people who seemed to glow with an aura of beauty. During one episode Dave and Hank report having had the feeling of walking through the scene until they reached the white marble stairs they had seen before. They saw people going up the stairs to a set of double doors closed across the top of the steps.

Some of those who went up the stairs were admitted through the doors, others were not. Hank Throne wanted to go up the steps, but Dave told him not to go. Hank asked for a tool. He was going to break down the doors. As Hank hammered at the doors the scene suddenly disappeared and Hank hit the wall of the mine shaft, injuring his hand. Everything then went dark in the shaft for 30 minutes to an hour.

This was the last major event before the drill first broke through to the men. However, as soon as the communications hole was established a new sight was seen by both men: small, child-like creatures that danced around the communications shaft each time that food was sent down by the rescue party.

Both men agree that these figures could be seen even in the full light of flashlights furnished by the rescue team. Although some writers have described these figures as angels, neither man used that word in our interviews.

Both men also agree that on another occasion a figure both identify as an American Indian chief stood in the communications shaft for several hours.

These were the only phenomena experienced during the first three days after contact was re-established with the outside world. Except, of course, for the figure of Pope John which remained visible to the men until the final moments of rescue.

However, three days after the communications shaft came through the men witnessed a scene in which the figures appeared ugly and grotesque, rather than happy and contented as they had been in every previous instance.

All of the details of this scene are from the interviews with Dave Fellin. Hank Throne did not volunteer any information on this specific episode.

Fellin recounted to me a scene in which he and Throne saw people walking toward them in pairs —sometimes two men, sometimes

two women, sometimes a man and a woman.

As the figures approached they became altered and grotesque. Faces became distorted, arms and legs dropped away.

From this confrontation, Fellin turned aside and walked, or believes he walked, into another scene where he saw a beautiful garden. The people in this scene looked like ordinary mortals, he said, but beauty seemed to flow from their bodies.

All the figures Dave saw in this scene were adults, there were no children. Figures moved into the scene and took seats at tables in groups of three and four. Some of the figures would pause on entering the scene to look toward the two trapped men, "Like they were judging," Dave remembered.

The garden stretched as far as Dave's eye could see, in fact he thought he could see as far as California. Dave said that he felt as though he could leave his body and look back to see himself sitting on the mine floor.

Fellin recognized the faces of at least 12 people in this scene. Some were friends no longer living, but others were still alive when I interviewed Dave. Dave made no effort to communicate with any of these figures.


This was the final event before rescue. After hospitalization, and after medical authorities had assured themselves that both men were sound in body and mind, Dave Fellin and Hank Throne picked up the threads of their lives.

Hank Throne went back to mining for a brief time after the accident, but now works on a bridgebuilding project on the Interstate Highway System, near Hazleton, Pa. Hank continues to be a regular church attendant, but he has not become more nor less religious.

Dave Fellin also went back into the mines after the accident, but his job ran out and for the first time in his life he is now working outside the mines, driving a school bus. Dave, too, remains only an ordinary church-goer.

Fellin and Throne merged from their joint tomb victorious over incredible mental and physical punishment. But the cruelest blow was yet to be struck—the blow aimed at their integrity by lesser men who could not believe.

The frustration this breeds is evident in Dave Fellin who insisted on a psychiatric examination after the rescue, and who has offered in my presence to be tested or examined by anyone who doesn't believe him. And I will be swift to testify that Dave's offer is as sincere as his belief that every detail he put into the report you have just read is a true and accurate statement of fact.




Photographed from Brazilian Navy training ship on IGY mission, UFO approaches Trindade Island from the east. Inset in upper right shows enlargement of object.

Brazilian OFFICIAL REPORT on the TRINDADE UFO

ONE OCTOBER afternoon in 1964 I received in the mail a large manila envelope from a South American country. It was plastered with stamps and labeled Air Mail. Opening it I found eight photographs which I immediately recognized as four prints and four enlargements of the famous IGY

(International Geophysical Year) photos. I had seen some of these photos as long ago as 1960, from another source. An additional print was of the back side of one of the photographs showing its military classification—*Confidential*.

I shuffled through the remainder of the envelope's contents and soon

realized that I held in my hands the secret report from the Chief of the Brazilian Navy High Command to the Navy Minister of Brazil. Here was the information turned over to the Brazilian House of Representatives in February, 1958, during the Brazilian Press' campaign to get the facts about the IGY photos. The brief letter which accompanied the photographs and report read:

"Dear Mrs. Lorenzen:

"I have recently read your excellent book The Great Flying Saucer Hoax* which I obtained from a fellow UAO enthusiast in this country. Because you performed such a great service in documenting the Brazilian sightings, specifically the Trindade Island IGY incident, I have decided to send to you copies of correspondence relating to the IGY incident and photos which I have kept all

This book is available from Mrs. Lorenzen, 4145 E. Desert Pl., Tuscon, Ariz. this while in my personal files.

"I am a retired Brazilian Navy Officer now living in——(deletions are to protect the identity of the sender). I have only four requests which I am certain you will fulfill, being aware of your reputation as an honest and honorable person:

"1. Do not divulge my name or location or any information which might lead to my identity.

"2. Please try to publish in your Bulletin or elsewhere this information and clear up the confusion about the Trindade IGY photos.

"3 After Copyright, please destroy the documents and destroy this letter.

"4. Send a copy of the text of the enclosed documents to the NICAP in Washington, D.C. I would like as many people as possible to know about this information and I understand they are interested in the UAO's, also you mention them in your book.

"I will possibly not know of any results you may have but I think the truth about the Trindade photos has been very much misrepresented and confused and I must make this effort.

"Yours,

"

I realized I had on hand the material to set at rest all the doubts surrounding the famous IGY photographs. And further, the information contained in my anonymous contributor's envelope matched the information APRO had gleaned in six years of investigation.


Perhaps a brief account of the IGY incident is in order:

At 12:12 P.M. on January 16, 1958, a Brazilian training ship, the *Almirante Saldanha*, prepared to leave the rocky island of Trindade, in the Atlantic Ocean off the coast of Brazil. The ship was participating in certain International Geophysical Year projects. A lifeboat drill had been conducted prior to casting off and had been photographed by Almiro Barauna, photographer, ex-newsman, and an expert in marine photography. He was on board at the request of the Brazilian Navy.

The sky was overcast but visibility was good. A strange object, something like a flattened sphere surrounded by a circular rim, was sighted simultaneously by civilians and crew members on the deck of the ship. The UAO (unidentified aerial object, the offical Brazilian military designation for "flying saucer") approached from the east in a dead east-west trajectory, made a turn over Desejado Peak on Trindade Island and proceeded into the ENE at high speed.

The object was photographed by Barauna and one photo was carried by world press wires after its release to the Brazilian press by the

President of Brazil. And herein lies the tale!

APRO's Brazilian representative, Dr. Olavo T. Fontes, painstakingly documented the Trindade incident, even managing to obtain first print copies of the photos as well as details of the incident itself. These were published in the January, March and May issues of the APRO Bulletin for 1960.

In 1963 Dr. Donald Menzel, Director of the Harvard College Observatory, published a book titled *The World Of Flying Saucers* which purported to lay at rest for all time belief in the existence of unconventional aerial objects or

flying saucers. Menzel relies heavily on the use of ridicule of those with whom he does not agree, and in many instances either he did not have access to the facts concerning certain incidents or did not choose to make use of them. The Trindade IGY incident is one which Menzel attempts to discredit, devoting a large part of his book to this one specific incident. His reasons for discounting the IGY photos appear to be a matter of his own opinion and the opinions of some unnamed astronomers with whom he talked during a visit to Rio de Janeiro in February, 1963.

Dr. Menzel, perhaps inadvertent-

ly, infers that only Barauna and his friend, Captain Jose Teobaldo Viegas, (AF, Retired) saw the object. This, of course, is not true. And further refutation of Dr. Menzel's thesis is contained in the official Brazilian Report.

Because the document is lengthy and repetitious, I will give only the evidence concerning the authenticity of the photographs. The first is a letter from Rear Admiral Luiz Felippe Pinto da Luz, Subchief of Intelligence, to the Vice Chief of the Navy High Command. It is labeled "Internal Communication, Confidential, No. 0043" and contains suggested procedures he thinks should be initiated on Trindade Island for photographing any future UFO fly-overs, for a search to determine whether any UFO's had landed, and for a careful watch of certain instruments to determine whether the UFO's had affected them. This letter is dated February 6, 1958.


Second is a letter, dated February 13, 1958, from Fleet Admiral Antonio Maria de Carvalho, Chief of the Navy High Command, to the General Director for Hydrography and Navigation. The subject of the letter is designated "Phenomena observed over the Trindade Island (Recommendations about), No. 0089 (M-20)" and is classified Confidential. Admiral de Carvalho enclosed the four photographs taken by Barauna and concludes, "the existence of personal reports and of photographic evidence of very great value considering the circumstances involved, permit the admission that there are indications of the existence of unidentified aerial objects." De Carvalho also suggests that the Island of Trindade be alerted to attempt further photographs of these things, that the effect on instruments be carefully noted, and that such further information be forwarded to him, de Carvalho, at the Navy High Command.

My package also included a letter from M. Sunderland, Captain, U.S. Navy, U.S. Naval Attache at the U.S. Embassy in Rio de Janeiro, dated February 21, 1958, to Pinto da Luz of the Navy Intelligence Department. This letter requested copies of the photographs, saying, "it seems to me that if this occurred as stated in today's paper, there must have been good reliable and intelligent witnesses to make a good proof in this case."

A copy of the letter, dated February 25, 1958, with which Pinto da Luz replied to Sunderland, enclosing four copies of the Trindade photographs, is also in my possession.

Most important, however, is a six-page document, with a covering letter from Admiral de Carvalho to the Navy Minister, No. 0098

(M-20), dated March 3, 1958, perpetrated. From what APRO alreporting the UFO sightings at the ready knows about the photos and Island of Trindade. This document, the supporting data of the confidenclassified Confidential, was turned over to the Brazilian House of Representatives after they clamored for a review of the whole Trindade case. It was compiled by Jose Geraldo Brandao, Corvette Captain, Intelligence Service. In it the Trindade Incident, the photographs, and the possibility of a hoax are explored thoroughly.

It is Menzel's contention that the photos probably are the result of a double exposure. He contends they are a hoax without giving us any clue as to how the hoax was

tial Brazilian report now in my hands, we can deduce, as the Brazilian Navy apparently did, that it would have taken an amazing set of coincidences to perpetrate a hoax in this case. The Brazilian officials were sufficiently impressed by the photographs and the testimony of the many witnesses to set up an elaborate plan for observing and recording future UFO sightings, if anv.

Almiro Barauna took the pictures amid excited pushing and shoving on the deck of the Almirante Saldanha. He was so upset by the event (as was everyone else involved) that it took him an hour to calm down to the point where he could develop the negatives. When he was able he went to the ship's darkroom clad only in "T" shirt and shorts, and accompanied by the commander of the ship, Carlos Alberto Ferreiro Bacellar. Captain Viegas held the flashlight while Barauna developed the negatives. Commander Bacellar waited just outside the darkroom door. There was no positive paper with which to make prints so Barauna developed the negatives and brought them out for inspection. While the negatives were still wet from the photographic solution Bacellar saw the strange-shaped objects on the negatives and noted their positions in the sky in relation to the island. The negatives were viewed by everyone who had been on deck and had seen the object, and these persons identified the object on the negatives as the one they had seen little more than an hour before.

In his statement to the press Barauna stated that the ship's dentist, Lieutenant Homero, had almost tripped on a cable in his haste to point out the object so that Barauna would photograph it. While the Navy Report does not mention Homero, it does say, in Paragraph IV: "The UAO alarm was given simultaneously by members of the crew in the stern and the bow of the ship." Paragraph 1 XI of the Navy Report states: "A strong emotional upset was observed in all persons who sighted the object, including the photographer, civilians and members of the ship's crew." This pretty well contradicts Menzel's inference that only Barauna and his friend Viegas saw the UAO.

The same Navy Report that does not mention that Lieutenant Homero saw the UAO does state that Commander Bacellar did not see it. Frankly, I believe this is not significant, for Bacellar, being the Commander, commanded the attention. Nevertheless, it is significant that Homero did not come forward during press interviews to bear witness to what he saw. Possibly he was the only Navy officer who observed the object and Navy officials instructed him not to talk about it.

No attempt was made by Brazilian officials to take the negatives from Barauna. He disembarked and went home to Rio where he made prints and several enlargements in his own photolab. Bacellar showed up two days later and asked for prints and still later, before a Navy investigation commission, identified the objects on the prints and negatives as the same images he had seen on the still wet negatives on the ship. Even certain features of the island which showed up in the pictures were identical in relation to the objects, according to Commander Bacellar. This information was published in *O Cruzeiro*, in May, 1958, in an article containing Bacellar's complete statement concerning the Trindade UAO.

The Navy Report contains brief descriptions of sightings of UAO over Trindade prior to the IGY incident and lists Trindade's "own Military Commander and another witness" in an observation of "a phenomenon not explainable on the basis of atmospheric or astronomical conditions." It also states that examinations by the Hydrography and Navigation Department's technician and by technicians from the *Cruzeiro do Sul Aerophotogrammetric* Service revealed:

"1. The technician from the Navy's HND, after examination of the negatives, affirms that they were natural.

"2. The technicians from the *Cruzeiro do Sul Aerophotogramme-*. *tric* Service, after miscroscopic examinations to verify the granulation, analysis of signals, ("analysis of signals" may be a mistaken translation—Author.), verification of luminosity and details of outlines, affirmed:

(a) There was not any sign of photomontage" (a technique in which a combination of one or more photographs are used as background and other objects are superimposed and the whole rephotographed) "in the negatives mentioned; all the evidence indicating they are in fact negatives of an object really photographed; (b) The hypothesis of a photomontage contrived after the sighting is definitely excluded; (c) It is impossible to prove either the existence or the nonexistence of a previous photomontage which requires, however, a high-precision technique and favorable circumstances to its execution."

There are only two ways in which the pictures could be a hoax: either through a photomontage or a double exposure. It cannot be a double exposure because the granulation tests indicated that the negative was normal—a double exposure would have been detected by discrepancies in granulation. So we are left with the possibility of a photomontage.

In order to accomplish a photomontage Barauna would have had to get photo images of the object in four positions, photographs of Trindade Island taken from a distance exactly matching the distance and position of the *Almirante Saldanha* from the island, then combine the two in a painstaking operation and rephotograph this composite picture.

Barauna also would have had to be a very lucky man. He would have had to count on something

resembling the object in his composite being visible in the sky during the time he was on the ship leaving the island; he would have had to leave several frames of this same film blank so that he could take pictures of the lifeboat drill first and then pretend to take pictures of the island; and he would have run the risk of inadvertently ruining his original composite due to the pushing and shoving during the excitement of the sighting. The exposed negatives of the composite would necessarily have been in the camera during the incident on the Almirante Saldanha, for they were on the same roll of film used to photograph the lifeboat drill. Further, the photos of the lifeboat drill were on the first frames of that roll of film, followed by the pictures of the UAO. Commander Bacellar noted this when he looked at the negatives Barauna brought wet from the darkroom.

The Brazilian Navy concluded a photomontage could not have been made after the sighting for the obvious reason that the negatives, developed aboard the ship shortly after the sighting, showed the objects already on the film.

We are left with one logical conclusion: the photos were taken of an object in the sky which flew in from the east, hovered over the island, then flew back into the east at high speed. The Navy Report tends to view the witnesses' testimony as verification of the photographs but it should be the other way around. A number of individuals sighted an object which they could not identify as a conventional object, and photographs taken at the time establish the correctness of the eyewitnesses' impression.

In his "analysis" of the IGY incident and photographs Dr. Menzel cites an occasion (which I have not been able to verify and for which he gives no source) when Barauna made a composite hoax picture, apparently as a practical joke. However, even if this is true it is hard to see what bearing it has on the incidents at Trindade. Menzel apparently feels that if a photographer ever has made a montage (and there is hardly a professional photographer alive who has not at some time or other faked a photograph for one reason or another) this is reason enough for insinuating that he is a liar and a cheat, which Barauna would have to be if he actually perpetrated a hoax at Trindade. He also would have to be something of a genius and gifted with more than a little precognition.

With the approval of the Navy Ministry Commander Bacellar made the following statements to the press: "An unidentified aerial object was really seen by some people on the deck of the NE Almirante Saldanha ... I saw the film (taken by Barauna) immediately after it was developed, still wet, and making a careful examination, I was able to determine: (a) that the pictures preceding the sequence connected with the object's passage corresponded with scenes taken aboard a few minutes before the incident; (b) that, in the pictures connected with the sighting, was visible, in different positions, an image looking like the object seen later on the copies, with details which only the enlargements made afterward showed more clearly; (c) and that the two photos lost by Barauna because he was too nervous, or because he was pushed by other excited people around him showed the sea and part of the island's mountains: (d) the negatives referred to were seen by many people aboard."

Admiral Gerson de Macedo Soares, Navy General Secretary, made the following statement to *O Globo*, a Rio newspaper, "I do not see any reason to doubt the reports of reliable witnesses. Personally, I believe in the reality of the flying saucers, even if they come from another planet."

Admiral Alves Camera, the Navy Minister, told the United Press on February 24 "that he didn't believe in flying saucers before, but after Barauna's photographic evidence he was convinced." He also said, "The Navy has a big secret which cannot be released because it cannot be explained."

Even the final two paragraphs of the Navy Report read:

"4-E: That, finally, the existence of personal reports and of photographic evidence, of certain value considering the circumstances involved, permit the admission that there are indications of the existence of unidentified aerial objects.

"5. The last of the conclusions listed above permits me to suggest to Your Excellency that this High Command must take into consideration all the information to be obtained about the present subject in order to be able to reach conclusions beyond any doubt."

Dr. Menzel reprinted in his book the text of a Brazilian Navy Press Release, from which the following paragraph was missing: "This Ministry sees no reason to forbid the publication of pictures of said object, taken by Mr. Almiro Barauna, who was at the Island of Trindade as a guest of the Navy, in the presence of a number of elements from the NE Almirante Saldanha garrison, aboard that ship from which the photos were taken." This paragraph indicates, again, the presence of more than the two witnesses Menzel mentions.

The last paragraph in this same release poses an even greater mystery. In Menzel's version three words have been *inserted* by someone and six have been *left out*, changing the entire meaning of the paragraph. The sentence reads correctly: "Evidently, this Ministry cannot make any statement about the object sighted over the Island of Trindade, for the photos do not constitute enough evidence for such a purpose."

Menzel's version reads: "Clearly, this Ministry cannot make any statement about the *reality of the* object, for the photos do not constitute enough evidence for such a purpose." The words, "sighted over the Island of Trindade" have been omitted and the words "reality of the" have been inserted, thus effectively changing an official Brazilian Navy press release.

The text of the Navy Confidential Report, now in my hands, clarifies not only the fact that there were many witnesses but also makes clear that the official position was that the IGY photographs were valuable photographic evidence. The IGY Trindade photographs remain among the best evidence for the existence of unconventional aerial objects which has come to public attention.

HYPNOSIS AIDS HAY FEVER SUFFERERS

TESTS indicating that hypnosis benefits hay fever and asthma sufferers both physically and psychologically recently were reported in the *British Medical Journal* by Dr. Lionel Fry, Dr. A. A. Mason and Dr. R. S. Bruce Pearson of King's College Hospital in London.

In the tests persons who had shown positive reactions to injected extracts of pollen or house dust were hypnotized and subjected to skin prick tests. The resulting red spot or weal was found to be significantly smaller than in unhypnotized subjects.

Three tests were given at two-week intervals to 47 subjects divided into two groups. One group was told that when they were tested again, they would not respond as previously with swelling, redness, burning and itching. They were told they would display no reaction at all.

Another hypnotized group, given no suggestions, nevertheless displayed less skin reaction. The researchers concluded that these subjects evidently had been aware that the effect of hypnosis was to be measured by the size of skin reactions and may have inferred that there was some therapeutic significance.

Suggestions that injections in one arm would show a different reaction from the other had no effect. Both arms showed less redness and swelling from skin pricks.



I Saw the Reenactment of a FARM TRAGEDY

IN MY LIFE there has been a series of unexplainable occurrences. I am assured that I have stepped backward and forward in time. This is beyond my comprehension, but through no will of my own, the veil apparently has been rent. At no time have the events seemed absurd or mysterious but I have no answer for how or

why these experiences have taken place.

One of the most vivid came to me during the depression. From necessity my family and I lived at an old, abandoned sheep ranch. We occupied it through the courtesy of Willard Hunt, one of several owners of large acreage thereabouts. In the early days it had belonged to a family named Vencil. It was oneand-a-half miles on the new road from Milton, Calif., and once had been a productive farm. The Vencils had raised hay, rye, some wheat, garden stuff, fruit trees, cattle, horses, sheep, and pigs. But when we lived there Milton was only a wide spot in the road with a small store, a post office, a Nazarene church, a country school with one teacher and eight to 10 pupils.

We moved to the sheep ranch early in 1938 while the hills were verdant. California is always green in the winter and the hills turn burned and brown in summer A subdued hush surrounded the house which squatted in the middle of the land. Worm-eaten fruit trees crowded the vard and two overhanging mulberry trees all but hid the front porch. The main part of the house had been solidly built, probably 50 years before. But the long dark kitchen and the little bedroom at the end of the dismal living room apparently had been added as an afterthought.

The well was on the farside of the house thus necessitating long hauling of domestic water. From the well one could see the pond, now long dry and surrounded by dead tree trunks and stumps, dried weeds and brambles. As often as I looked at it while pumping my bucket of water I always felt a thrill of dread. Yet, silence and peace lay upon the land.

During the day while my husband was away, working on mine leases, and the three older girls were at school I would put the baby to sleep in his crib on the front porch and the four-year-old out to play. I would sit watching the winding road that ended at the cattle guard on the highway. Wishful thinking never brought anyone down that road. And I never grew used to the stillness.

One late spring day in 1938 while the babies were on the front porch I went out the back door intending to pump a bucket of fresh water. I reached the corner of the house and the boughs of a dying peach tree, with its few valiant blossoms, touched my shoulder. I suddenly was caught up in time. Everything seemed changed. I could not move a muscle, yet I felt no fear.

The back screen door which sagged on its hinges suddenly squawked open as though thrust by a heavy hand. A woman in an ankle-length black dress with a gathered white apron tied around her middle, hurtled through the door onto the path beside me. Her hair was skewered tight on top of her head. Her flushed face was perspiring. She wiped flour from her hands onto her apron, and with a jerk apparently settled the bottom of a corset she wore. Alarm was in her every movement. At the same time an over-

powering smell of fresh baked bread swept around me, together with the more delicate odor of freshpicked strawberries.

In that instant I felt more than heard the pounding of feet. Up from the pond came two small boys. The suspenders of their overalls were slipping off their shoulders; their bare feet made swirls in the dust. I saw their silent cry as they threw themselves in anguish on the woman.

Looking beyond them I could see three men approaching. The man in the rear carried two pitchforks across his shoulder. The foremost two men carried a dripping burden between them, a young girl, possibly 14. Her slender neck was hanging back and the ends of her long blonde hair trailed on the ground. One of the boys held the screen wide. The woman took one look at the girl and ran in ahead of the man. The screen door shut with a snap.

Quickly I followed. I opened the door and found myself in an unfamiliar kitchen. On the red checked table cloth on the table sat a large blue bowl of fresh strawberries; on the breadboard loaves of bread were cooling; on the polished stove a pot of stew bubbled.

I followed the trail of water into the living room and paused at the open door to the little bedroom. The woman was stripping the white counterpane and pillow sham. A red deer was embroidered on the sham. The men eased their burden down upon the sheets. The girl's long hair, muddied and entwined with pieces of vine and leaves, fell free of the bed and dragged on the floor. I saw the drip of water. One foot and slender leg appeared unnaturally bent as though it had been held for sometime in a distorted position. The four adults wept while the boys looked on in wildeyed terror.

Suddenly I felt myself coming up from what seemed layers of ether. I still held the bucket in my hand and I stood alone on the dusty path. I blinked in the sun.

I could hear the laughter of my four-year-old from where he played on the front porch. I went to the screen door. It hung loosely on its hinges as usual. There was no odor of fresh baked bread or strawberries, no water on the floor. In the small bedroom the bunks were as neatly spread with blue spreads as they had been in the early morning.

That evening I told my husband of my experience. He was accustomed to me "seeing" things. He merely chucked me under the chin and smiled when I asked if he thought the old ranch was haunted.

Several weeks later proof came of the reality of what I had seen.

My husband picked up a man, Mr. Vencil, a wanderer, and brought him home for a night's rest and a hot meal. He had been across the lands and now had come home to the hills of California. He ate sparingly of our simple meal, all the while glancing from my husband to me. Then, seemingly with great effort, he told us that once he had lived on this ranch when it was most productive. His brother had owned it then. His sister-in-law was a good woman deeply immersed in religion, almost a fanatic. She had allowed no Sunday work, but once, because of weather conditions, the men had not listened to her and had gone about the last of the having. Like a woman possessed she then had taken up chores she would not ordinarily have done on Sunday. She had set the boys to berry picking and had let her daughter, who was a poor swimmer. go to the pond. The girl had drowned. He described the way they had brought her up from the bottom of the pond with pitchforks. He said they had carried her into the small bedroom. She was prepared at home for burial and taken to the cemetery in Jenny Lind, Calif. I understood from Mr. Vencil that some years afterward she was moved to a family plot in Stockton. Her drowning occurred in summer, 1904 or 1905.

The Sunday after the girl drowned the men did not work. The mother put her three remaining children in a horse-drawn carriage and started over the hill for church services in Milton. On the hill above the pond something frightened the team. They ran away, upsetting the buggy. One of the boys I had "seen" was injured and the baby, about a year old, who I had not "seen", was killed. Thus they had a second death and funeral just one

After this series of tragedies many other things began to go wrongwith the crops and with the stock. The mother became exceedingly depressed, feeling she had brought about the tragedy because of breaking the Sabbath with work. Finally her husband sold the ranch and they moved to Oakland. Both parents were dead when I met Mr. Vencil, who was between 60 and 65 years old in 1938.

FORECAST DISEASE?

Subtle changes in the way you sign your name may reveal malignant disease undetected by doctors.

A^S YOUR MOVING FINGER writes does it reveal more accurately than a medical laboratory the onset of pathological disease?

For several years investigations have been going on to determine if handwriting can be used to diagnose disease. The American Cancer Society became interested in ideas advanced by Alfred Kanfer who was one of several active in this research. At a result the American Cancer Society as well as the late Thomas H. Hall, Jr. each made a grant to Mr. Kanfer. A paper entitled Observations on Disturbances in Neuromuscular Coordination in Patients with Malignant Disease covers this research. Alfred Kanfer and Daniel F. Gasten, M.D., are the authors of this paper published in the Bulletin of the Hospital for Joint Diseases.

The original committee which undertook this research consisted of Alfred Kanfer, Dr. Daniel F. Gasten (Chairman), Dr. Martin Clyman, Dr. Gustave Steinberg, Dr. Howard Rosen, Dr. Louis Kagen and Dr. Ralph Mishkin.

Between the years 1945 and 1957 over 10,000 specimens of handwriting were examined by this committee. Hundreds of variations in handwriting were reduced to 12 well defined criteria to which these specimens of handwriting were subjected to examination. The data obtained have a high degree of statistical and practical value.

The method developed for obtaining the specimens was simple. The specimens were written with a standard pointed pen and ink and not with a ball point pen. The specimens were written on ordinary white bond paper of average thickness, not so heavy as to prevent the transmission of light. A standard laboratory microscope or a microscopic camera for permanent records were used in the examinations.

The specimens of only a few words were acceptable but it was found that a person's signature, being almost automatic, presented much better material for examination and study.

During this research three distinct classifications of handwriting resulted, the Normal, the Abnormal-Early, and the Abnormal-Late.

The *Normal* handwriting consists of a constant pattern without regard to the age, sex or education of the person. There is a free, fluid, continuous flow of ink in all strokes and in changing from upstrokes to downstrokes as well as in connecting strokes and loops.

"This writing movement" reported Kanfer and Gasten, "requires a coordination of neuromuscular activity on a fine, or microscopic scale, consisting of alternate processes of flexion and extension without significant pause, in a rhythmically repeated pattern of transition between antagonistic movements. Furthermore, in exact correspondence with kinesilogical movements the downstrokes of each letter are formed with greater though involuntary or unconscious physiological force and are therefore slightly heavier than the upstrokes. The latter, representing an extension movement, are correspendingly lighter in this free flow of movement and require the expenditure of less force. Thus the first principle of the normal handwriting motion is slightly heavier downstrokes alternating with slightly lighter upstrokes."

The Abnormal-Early classification of handwriting indicates the development of a diseased state. clinically called malignancy. The fine neuromuscular coordination no longer shows in the handwriting. The gradual and normal alternations in the handwriting are replaced by insidious aberrations. The specimens show a resistance to the normal free flowing movements of normal handwriting. This condition shows in heavier downstrokes and lighter upstrokes with a noticeable hesitation in the connecting strokes.

The researchers reported after studies made repeatedly that this Abnormal-Early classification of handwriting indicates the presence of disease months and even years prior to the clinical detection of malignancy.

The researchers summed up the changes from Normal to Abnormal-Early as follows:

"(a) Heavy pressure on downstrokes and light pressure in upstrokes in a ratio of greater than three or four to one whereas in the normal the ratio is approximately of the order of two to one. "(b) Sudden shift from heavier downstrokes to lighter upstrokes replaces the gradual change of normal writing.

"(c) Occasional individual strokes may show interruption in continuity of ink flow (segmentation).

"(d) Normal oval shapes are replaced by stiffer, angular or straight lines and forms, particularly in the loopings and connecting strokes.

"(e) Increasing variations in size and separation of letters."

The third classification of handwriting, Abnormal-Late, shows various deteriorations in the handwriting and is generally found in persons with clinically detectable malignancy.

In general the handwriting presents a picture of exaggerated force. The continuous and even ink flow is absent. Such writing under microscopic examination shows each stroke to be made up of minute specks of ink rather than the solid lines.

The researchers summed up the changes evident in the Abnormal-Late classification of handwriting as follows:

"The essential characteristics of this Syndrome of Rigidity and Segmentation are:

"(a) Each individual stroke shows irregular ink distribution, with irregularities of width and serrations of the borders.

"(b) Upstrokes and downstrokes

are of equal density and width.

"(c) Pressure is usually extremely heavy but, on occasion, it may be abnormally light.

"(d) The letters are stiff and angular and the ovals of hyperbolic loops are replaced by straight lines and angles, or by extremely wide circular forms. The letters frequently are almost shapeless.

"(e) There is a marked variation in the size of letters and the distances between them."

The authors of the paper cite several case histories on the basis of the examination of patient's handwriting. Four of them are especially interesting in that they show that examination of the handwriting indicates a malignancy long before its discovery by clinical examination.

The first case history is of a person who died at the age of 33 years of carcinoma with metastases. This person first was admitted to the hospital at the age of 27 with a laceration of the leg. Two years later this person again was admitted to the hospital with a laceration of a finger. The authors wrote:

The syndrome of rigidity is manifest (in the signature) by heavy, wide strokes, absence of variation between up and down strokes, and some serrations of the edges . . . One is forced to speculate upon the significance of the changes (from previous admission), which should have suggested a complete diagnostic investigation prior to the onset of clinical signs of malignancy.

The next is a case history of three women admitted to the hospital with clinical and pathological diagnosis of benign breast tumors. The authors wrote:

"Each specimen, however, shows the syndrome of sudden change suggesting a cautious prognostic approach."

Ten, six and seven years later each patient again was admitted to the hospital with clinical carcinoma of the breast, the same breast in each case.

Another case history concerns two people. In each instance the signatures under examination showed early changes with marked contrast between up and down strokes, wide spread of line, and sudden change, all evidence of malignant disease prior to its discovery by clinical examination.

Seven and 17 years later these patients returned to the hospital with clinical malignancy.

The last case history, of special interest, concerns three people admitted to the hospital with benign gall bladder disease. The signatures of two of them are interesting. One shows, as the authors report, "sudden change, contrasting strokes and increased pressure. This patient was readmitted five years later with a carcinoma of the colon." In the third person "the signature shows complete rigidity in an advanced form. As expected this patient returned to the hospital only two years later with carcinoma of the colon."

All during this extended research, the researchers not only studied handwriting specimens but also continually revaluated the criteria they used in the study of handwriting specimens. As a result there was a continuous refinement of examination methods and of the criteria used. The authors summed up the final results of this dual study as follows:

"In 1952, a selected series of 175 specimens was submitted to the modified test, and percentages of 96 and 84 of correct diagnosis in malignancy and benign disease respectively were achieved. These results represented considerable improvement in accuracy and consistency and were corroborated by a study of 1,975 consecutive cases admitted to the hospital in 1953."

Although these results indicate that Mr. Kanfer and Dr. Gasten had a number of interesting successes in applying their tests, the American Cancer Society does not find the results to be conclusive. The Society makes this careful statement about the Kanfer-Gasten work, "The results of several trials were not conclusive—they did not

prove that the test is useful. However, neither did the study prove that Mr. Kanfer's theory is without merit. If new evidence appears to lend further support to the theory, it will be given careful consideration. Or, for that matter, any evidence on any theory which might contribute to a solution of the cancer problem, always will be carefully weighed by persons qualified to determine its merit."



THE COIN FORETOLD DEATH By William Wilshire

Under the authority of Maximilian, who ruled as Emperor of Mexico, having been placed on the throne by Napoleon III in 1864, silver dollars were coined in Mexico City in 1867. The die featured the full face of the emperor.

The first coin, a worker in the mint noticed, showed a gash in the emperor's forehead. Each successive coin showed a larger and clearer gash. The 36th dollar produced was so badly mangled that the coinage was stopped. One of the workers, much frightened, took this silver dollar to Empress Carlotta.

The workers interpreted the uncanny and unaccountable event as prophetic, and in Mexico City the belief was widely discussed that the young monarch, who was nearing his 36th birthday, was to meet a tragic death. The mint was in charge of an American, who gathered up several of the mangled silver dollars.

Maximilian was executed by a firing squad at the age of 36 — one bullet gashing his forehead exactly as the coin had shown.

The story broke in 1870 when Dr. I. E. Nagle in Pennsylvania came into possession of one of the coins and learned of its history. Newspapers of the day published articles on the doctor and his coin, which since has disappeared.

Coin collectors still go to Mexico and search for one of the fateful coins. Collectors in Mexico have been watching for a Maximilian dollar for many years. Estimates as to the price the coin would fetch run as high as \$100,000.

People in Mexico City at the time shunned the mangled silver dollars in the superstitious fear that possession might visit tragedy upon them. IN THE SUMMER of 1950 I lived in a big old home which had been turned into a rooming house and filled with retired men, a few old maids, and me. I was 21, the youngest roomer occupying a room there. But the old men adored me and I felt protected in this environment. And I was happy because I was in love.

Space Age Christianity

I AM CONVINCED there are ways in which our great admiration for science, and our dogmatic exclusion of all non-scientific aspects of reality have become a secret snare and delusion for us. Subtly and without our realization of what was happening to us, this exclusive passion for one very fruitful access to reality has been slowly excluding us from other older routes which used to provide the framework within which man's life was lived and nourished with power from on high. It is this dogmatic rejection of all which lies outside the domain of science that constitutes its peril. Just because an entire culture, or even a whole age like our own, loses the capacity to respond to any but one aspect of reality does not change the structure of reality itself. That which is and exists does not cease to be simply because people cease to believe in it.

Two inherent dangers in science

exist, both of which have been largely realized in this century of its cultural fruition and triumph. The first of these arises out of the inherent limitation imposed on science by the fact that it is restricted to the study of nature. The other arises out of its necessary confinement to those aspects of nature which are regular, coherent, and repeatable at will. The more our knowledge of the natural has grown, the more we have lost our former capacity to respond to supernatural reality transcendent to nature. The more we have discovered of the lawful and dependable undergirding of events, the more the capacity we formerly had to discern the divine hand in the great turning points of life and history has faded. Yet these decisive events are essentially indeterminate and singular, and so beyond the reach of science to make lawful and predictable. As a result the rise of science has brought with it an ever increasing imprisonment of the mind and spirit of man in space, time, and matter.

It is this imprisonment of the spirit of man, this total bondage to the here and now, which seems to me to set the stage for the next great development. The 20th Century, for all the glory of its scientific achievement, is a kind of dark age. The renaissance or rediscovery of lost capacities of response to transcendent reality which alone will liberate the spirit of man from this bondage may well prove to be the distinguishing work of the 21st Century. At least, while we are all trying our hand at gazing in the crystal ball, such possibility has as much to recommend it as those depicted at scientific exhibits, or prophesied from time to time in the daily press.

Toward the end of the last century a mathematical romance was published in England under the title Flatland. Written by the mathematician Edwin Abbott, it is the story of one Mr. A. Square who inhabited a two dimensional world of infinite extent. All objects and persons in Flatland had only length and breadth but no thickness. Yet the Flatlanders themselves, apart from A. Square, were not conscious of this as a limitation. It seemed reasonable and obvious to them that everything which existed should be contained within their two-dimensional domain. They

could not even imagine a direction along which a perpendicular to Flatland would lie. The central part of the story concerns a visit to A. Square from a spacelander, a sphere, who suddenly appeared in his living room one evening as a circle of varying size. All that was visible of him was his intersection with Flatland, and that is of course a circle. Yet the circle miraculously appeared and disappeared in A. Square's living room. All the sphere had to do to make this happen was to exercise his three-dimensional capacity to move toward or away from Flatland along a perpendicular to it.

A very interesting conversation ensues between the square and the circle. At the end of it, A. Square, assisted by the sphere, is jerked with a traumatic effort right out of Flatland into the surrounding space. In his amazing journey he is able to perceive the whole of his Flatland domain spread out before him. He sees, moreover, the insides of things. Houses and rooms and people are completely open to his inspection and examination. It becomes clear to him, as it could never have been before, that his entire natural world of two dimensions is simply immersed in space. Every point of Flatland was in immediate contact with the far wider and freer realities of space. To be born into Flatland was to enter upon a

mode of existence severely limited by comparison with the wider freedom and potentiality of spatial existence. Yet every object in Flatland was nevertheless always in immediate contact with this transcendent domain, for wherever one went it was always right there perpendicular to him. When A. Square returned from his journey, he was bursting with his desire to make these aspects clear to his fellow Flatlanders. They, however, scorned such strange notions and ended up by locking him up for the rest of his life

The significance of this romance is that it suggests how the whole space-time universe within which we have entered upon our existence is similarly limited and similarly immersed in a larger reality. Yet for most of his life on this planet man has always thought of this earthly mode of existence as one immersed in a higher transcendent reality which was everywhere and always in immediate contact with him. The natural was immersed in the supernatural, and the temporal in the eternal. In opening up the vast reaches of space and equally vast spans of time to our apprehension, science has seemed to banish the supernatural and the transcendent. One can imagine a similar age in the history of Flatland, a golden age of science and discovery when Flatlander astronomers showed that Flatland extended in every direction for billions of light years. In such an age a Flatland Khrushchev or Titov might even announce that there was no heaven, or paradise, or angels because they had made a trip in a two-dimensional rocket and had not been able to find them anywhere in Flatland. The more remarkable and wonderful the discoveries made by Flatlander scientists in such an age, the more unnecessarily tragic would be the complete imprisonment within their own two-dimensional domain to which they would condemn their contemporaries.

Just such a tragedy is the complete imprisonment of modern man within our domain of space, time, and matter. We should know that the whole space-time continuum is immersed in a higher reality transcendent to it. We should know this from the whole weight of the accumulated experience and witness of the race. Think of what men have known in former ages of the power and reality of spirit, of the awesome experience of the holy. and of the awareness of the divine presence. Consider in the light of the analogy with Flatland the meaning of these verses from the 139th Psalm:

Whither shall I go then from thy Spirit? or whither shall I go then from thy presence?

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If I climb up into heaven thou art there: if I go down to hell, thou art there also.

If I take the wings of the morning, and remain in the uttermost parts of the sea;

Even there also shall thy hand lead me, and thy right hand shall hold me.

Colonel John H. Glenn, Jr., expressed this same thought after his rocket trip. It is clear that however far we may venture into space, our relationship to the transcendent realities in which we are all immersed will be exactly the same as it is here. In order to really reach heaven, Mr. Khrushchev and his scientists would have to learn how to shoot rockets perpendicular to the whole space-time continuum, right out of our domain of existence. But there is no way in which science can learn or teach us how to do that. In order to learn something of heaven and eternity and of the relation in which nature stands to supernature, one has to turn from the scientific heritage to the great religious heritage of the West. And that is precisely what 20th Century man is unable to do any more.

There are many evidences of the extent to which 20th Century culture has built barriers which effectively shield us from any apprehension of transcendental reality. One of these is the character of education. It is instructive to examine the content and implied or unexpressed assumptions of both secondary school and college courses, not only in the sciences but in philosophy, history, and literature as well. The spirit which pervades all of them is the demand that all proper knowledge and admissable explanation be in terms of objects and events within space and time. The supernatural and transcendent are everywhere regarded as mere inner subjective states with no external reference in reality. It is often pointed out that science has "liberated" man from age old superstitions and fears, from supposedly false interpretations of phenomena as gods and demons.

There is just enough truth in such an attitude to make each new generation educated in this manner that much less aware of the extent to which they are being made immune to any effective response to reality beyond space and time. No scientific basis whatever exists for the universal assumption that explanation for everything the which is and happens in space and time must be found within space and time. Yet the sheer unanimity of agreement on this axiom of the entire educational process gives it an unassailable dogmatic force. In liberating man from false superstitions, science has unwittingly locked him securely in another prison of its own making. This prison is the exclusive bondage to nature and the natural. Modern man cannot even conceive any longer of any possible way of escape from nature. He cannot imagine any place transcendent to nature where he might go if he were to leave it. In many ways this bondage is worse than the ancient bondages from which science has liberated man.

Another way to see this point is to consider what the 20th Century has done to the arts. As far back as we have any record of human culture at all, art and poetry have been the means by which men have communicated with each other their experience of supernatural and transcendent reality. The arts are the vehicle by means of which men communicate the inexpressible and share a common experience of the reality of things invisible and unseen. In any previous age when supernatural reality was as much a common property and heritage of the whole of culture as the world of nature, they had a public function as important as that of the expository and logical use of language and mathematics by which men share their knowledge of the visible, natural world.

But in this age which has lost all effective contact with transcendent reality, there is nothing external to man left to communicate.

Another way in which the bondage of our age to the here and now is especially manifest appears in its attitude toward death. Someone has said that just as the unmentionable topic for the Victorian 19th Century was sex, so the unmentionable topic for the golden age of science in the 20th Century is death. It is easy to see why it should be. For if there is no way to escape from space, time, and matter, if nothing exists outside of, or transcendent to, nature, then there is no longer any mystery about death. What happens to those who die in such an exclusively natural world is quite clear and easily verified. Modern man knows this in his heart, and it is here that the prison within which his culture has so securely bound him becomes most poignantly terrible and unbearable for him. Small wonder that he cannot bring himself to mention or even think about the subject of death!

Yet the transcendent reality in which the space-time continuum is immersed remains just as real as it ever was. It is not affected in any way by the loss of the capacity of 20th-Century man to apprehend it and respond to it. The answer to death has been given concretely in the real history of this earth through the empty tomb and the resurrected Christ. That astounding event, of such ultimate sig-

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nificance and import, is just as true as it ever was. The fact of it is in no way affected by the 20th Century's widespread disbelief in it.

. Yet the significance of this supernatural event lies precisely in making manifest to us the possibility of escaping from our bondage to space, time, and matter. For the Lord clearly rose from death into a very different state of being from that which he voluntarily assumed in the Incarnation, when the Word was made flesh and dwelt among us under the same limitations which we are under in this world. Just as the sphere was able to enter or leave Flatland at will, and appear to the Flatlanders as the circle which was all that could be seen of him within the limitations of a two-dimensional mode of existence, so the risen Christ could enter or leave our space-time domain at will, and appear or disappear to his disciples in the body which they had known and loved. And just as the sphere was able to assist the square in escaping from his confinement to Flatland into the wider freedom of space, so our Lord stands ready to raise all who believe in Him, just as He was raised, right out of space and time into the wider freedom of eternity and the transcendent domain within which space is immersed.

In an age which has lost all effective contact with the supernatural, and cannot even imagine any reality beyond space and time, the Resurrection naturally seems absurd and must be interpreted as a peculiar subjective hallucination of those who witnessed it. Yet it remains the most important fact of all history for man to know and respond. to. It is just as true today as it was then that God intended it "to give light to them that sit in darkness, and in the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace", as the Benedictus puts it.

I am persuaded that man is not doomed to remain indefinitely within this prison wrought by science. Even now one senses a great worldwide longing of the human spirit to escape from it. The pressure of this longing can only increase as the remainder of this century unfolds. I

For its contemporaries, it is always too small and inconspicuous to be seen or appreciated. Yet the chosen few who make up the early renaissance, men living in the prevailing dark age around them, do sense it and discern something of its power to finally transform the culture within which it has taken root. This is my own feeling about my ministry. I think of myself as a renaissance man in the vanguard of a growing world-wide movement of rediscovery. I do not think that I shall see its fruits, but I rejoice that God in the mystery of His grace should have touched me in the midstream of life and permitted me to see so clearly what still remains hidden from the majority of my contemporaries.


This then is what I see when I gaze into the crystal ball and try to discern what will be the dominant character of Century 21. There are still nearly four decades left in this century, and it will certainly take at least that long for what I discern to become generally detectable. But after that, as the 21st Century unfolds, I feel confident that it will more and more be recognized as the century during which man regained his lost capacity to apprehend and respond to that reality all around him which is transcendent to space and time. At the same time it will be a century marked everywhere by science and technology. During the next four decades, the whole earth will certainly become fully industrialized, and science will bring forth innumerable new marvels scarcely imaginable now. But that will simply be the world in which 21st-Century man finds himself. He will see his world as the great achievement of the 20th Century. For him the renaissance I have described, by then in full swing, will be the distinctive achievement which history and destiny holds out to him. And so Century 21 will not, I am convinced, see in science its distinctive mission as we in the 20th Century do. Rather for 21st-Century man the ever widening horizons of the rediscovery of the richness and depth of supernatural reality will provide his challenge and his mission for achievement.

Since I know that I am an early renaissance man, I do not expect many of my contemporaries to share my vision, or to agree that

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what I discern has anything at all to do with what will really happen in the 21st Century. We all see different things when we look into the crystal ball, and I am well aware that very few indeed see what I see. Moreover, I am also under an obligation to share with you something of my profound conviction that that which I discern is really the true key to Century 21, even though at this stage it remains hidden from most. Finally it must be evident to all of you by now how deeply I desire and long to share with you, and with everyone for whom God gives me the opportunity, the excitement and thrill of this venture for rediscovering that which so many in our day have lost and, even without knowing it, desire so desperately to have again.

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PREDICTION OF AN INNER VOICE By Raymond C. Otto

A N AMAZING incident occurred in the life of Joseph Bentonelli, the Metropolitan and Chicago Opera star. In 1926, Oklahoma-born Bentonelli had completed his music studies in Nice, France, and was anxiously awaiting his first opera contract. It was the big chance he had worked for years to achieve.

One day he told a friend that if he didn't get the contract, he would destroy himself. Suddenly, a voice came to Bentonelli. "Don't worry," it said. "You will get your contract."

"It's Jerry Osborne, my good friend in America," the astonished Bentonelli said. "I could never mistake the voice. It's the same as when I last saw him four years ago." Bentonelli's friends advised him to see a psychiatrist. But he was convinced he had heard Osborne, although Osborne knew nothing about the opera contract and was thousands of miles away. What's more, Bentonelli now felt sure the contract would arrive and he stopped worrying.

It did arrive in the mail a few days later. And at the same time, incredibly, came a strange letter from Osborne.

"Out of a clear sky," Osborne wrote, "your name came to my mind and with it the definite impression that you would receive an opera contract that you have wanted.

"It seemed that you were quite anxious about it, and I sat down to write you, to tell you not to worry."

BOMBED BY METEORS

Steamer caught in meteor shower was imperiled by a huge saucer-shaped missile which crashed flaming into the sea.

I THINK THAT in the light of the frequent disappearance of vessels at sea during fine weather, often without ever a trace being found, that this old news item, from the *New York Times* of November 5, 1906, is worth reviewing.

This is the full report, as it appeared. I have checked it against the original on microfilm. And further research has shown that the *SS St. Andrew* was listed in the

"due-to-arrive" columns of preceding days.

The New York Times story bore this head: "A Shower Of Meteors Around The St. Andrew". This is the story that was published, on the front page:

"When the Phoenix Line Steamship St. Andrew arrived from Antwerp yesterday, Captain Fitzgerald reported that the steamer had passed through a meteoric shower at 4:30 O'clock on Tuesday (October 30) about 600 miles northeast of Cape Race. The largest meteor observed fell into the sea less than a mile away. Had it struck the *St*. *Andrew* all hands would have perished.

"Yesterday afternoon Chief Officer V.E. Spencer, who was on the bridge when the meteors appeared, told what he saw there.

"'On Tuesday afternoon,' said Mr. Spencer, 'the weather was clear and bright, although there was little sunshine. Just after one bell, 4:30 O'clock, I saw three meteors fall into the water dead ahead of the ship one after another at a distance of about five miles. Although it was daylight, they left a red streak in the air from zenith to the horizon.

"'Simultaneously the third engineer shouted to me. I then saw a huge meteor on the port beam falling in a zig-zag manner less than a mile away to the southward. We could distinctly hear the hissing of water as it touched. It fell with a rocking motion leaving a broad red streak in its wake. The meteor must have weighed several tons, and appeared to be 10 to 15 feet in diameter. It was saucer shaped which probably accounted for the peculiar rocking motion.

"'When the mass of metal struck the water the spray and steam rose to a height of at least 40 feet, and for a few moments looked like the mouth of a crater. If it had been night, the meteor would have illuminated the sea for 50 or 60 miles. The hissing sound, like escaping steam, when it struck the water was so loud that the chief engineer turned out of his berth and came on deck, thinking the sound came from the engine room. I have seen meteors all over the world, but never such a large one as this.'

"Asked what would have happened if the meteor tumbled on the *St. Andrew*, Mr. Spencer said: 'The ship would have been burned out immediately and every soul on board destroyed. I have no doubt that many of the vessels which have been lost at sea in apparently fine weather have been destroyed by falling meteors.'

"Captain Russ of the Hamburg American Steamer *Brazilia*, which arrived yesterday, about the same time as the *St. Andrew*, reported having seen a large meteor at 7:00 P.M. on Tuesday, October 30, in latitude 47° N. and longitude 48° W. This is believed to be part of the intermittent meteoric shower observed by the *St. Andrew* earlier in the evening."

It is interesting to note (Fort 273) that an enormous object was seen to *rise* out of the sea off Cape Race on November 12, 1887. Others had been seen in 1845 (274).

Also, of special interest in this

report is the fact that the word "saucer" is used. Donald Keyhoe gave the Dennison, Tex., UFO

sighting of January 1878 as the first report in which the word "saucer" appears. Is this the second?



ANCIENT MAN'S FIRST METAL TOOLS

THAT ARE believed to be man's first metal tools, made of copper, reportedly have been discovered by members of an international archeological expedition in Turkey. Dr. Robert J. Braidwood of the University of Chicago's Oriental Institute announced that the tools and what appear to be three metal pins or awls date back almost 9,000 years. This date sets back by approximately 1,000 years the earliest previous date for ancient man's first deliberate use of metal.

The expedition, co-directed by Dr. Braidwood and Prof. Halet Cambel of the University of Istanbul, unearthed the objects at a site called Cayonu, about three miles southeast of Ergani, a town in southeastern Turkey. This location, Dr. Braidwood said, bears evidence of human habitation for at lease 100,000 years.

Although corroded, the pins show overlapping layers of metal, suggesting that they were cold-hammered into shape from nuggets of pure copper. Dr. Braidwood believes they were used as simple tools, most likely for piercing small holes. The metal from which they were formed apparently came from a nearby copper lode, which Dr. Braidwood said still is being mined today.

He considers the discovery an exciting one, since it foreshadows the true beginnings of metallurgy and "shows us the moment when man might first have begun to feel the properties of metal as metal rather than as stone."

JACK WEBBER . . . Reluctant Medium

Heavy tables floated and sewed clothing was removed from his body during seances by bound Welsh coal miner.

JOHN BORDEN WEBBER was a Welsh coal miner who reluctantly left the mines to become a medium and the subject of some of the best-documented psychic research of all time.

Materialization phenomena were Webber's forte, and he became the first medium in history to produce materialization phenomena that could be recorded photographically.

Born in Wales in 1907, Jack Webber died March 9, 1940. From his childhood he worked as a coal miner. He was an unlettered man, and his first introduction to psychic investigations came at home seances held by his fiancee's family. Webber was a sceptic and attended the seances just to keep company with his girl. One evening Jack thought he would play a joke on the family and attempted to manipulate a table. To his consternation the table refused to cheat and gave him a message describing the exact location of a lost purse containing quite a sum of money.

Without any particular effort at development Webber soon found that he had a spirit guide. His guide told him where to find the body of a man who had been missing for several days. Sceptical friends laughed at Jack's message but a search proved his information correct.

A short time later he told a fellow workman that a man, who had been in seemingly good health a few hours before, had just died. This message also proved true.

Jack then was urged by his guide, by means of a message given through table tipping, to develop his powers.

Spirits took control of Jack and he had some difficult moments when he was unable to control the violent actions of his physical body. However, at the end of two years his development was almost perfect. This can be known by the fact that he never used any form of cabinet. Researchers always have been suspicious of cabinets, especially in the medium's home or in his own seance room. Jack nearly always held his seances away from home, and in places where he had not been before.

At first his control confined Jack's psychic powers to healing through spirit-prescribed herbs, which Jack himself gathered and dispensed. Webber's best friend, Stanley Croft, had a daughter who apparently was about to die from blood poisoning in her scalp — a very dangerous location for an infection. Jack's guide diagnosed the trouble, prescribed a remedy and the girl was healed, after her physicians had given up hope for her.


The next stage of Jack's development was a difficult one, for spirit voices would not let him sleep, and spirit hands jerked the bedding from his bed. Jack pleaded to be let alone, to be permitted to rest. Harry Edwards, world-famous psychic healer, became interested in Webber and with considerable difficulty persuaded Jack to give up his job as a low-paid miner and come to London.

The phenomena that came through Jack at the London seances were so remarkable that Leon Isaacs, a man skilled in infra-red photography, was engaged to record them on film. The use of infra-red lighting and special film allowed photographs to be taken throughout Webber's seances. Webber normally required a darkened room, although lights were frequently allowed for brief periods. Even in the darkened room the infra-red flash bulbs radiated enough visible light to make the phenomena visible to every member of the seance circle. Therefore, there was little possibility of the fraudulent production of levitations and materializations. The sitters saw the medium, watched the levitations, materializations, astral projections and apportations as the photographer shot his pictures.

During a typical seance Webber was seated in a heavy arm chair. Researchers supplied their own rope and did a good job of tying each of his arms and legs to the chair. The ropes were drawn so tight that sometimes they partially cut off the circulation of the medium's blood. The rope was passed

around his body and torso several times, tied, and the ends sewed together and sealed.

The base of Webber's thumbs were tied with a weak thread to prevent any suspicion of the use of pantograph tongs in a three-way simultaneous levitation of trumpets or phosphorescent wood plaques which occurred during seances. The lapels of Webber's suit coat were sewed together with strong cord. All ropes were tied over his clothing, including over his coat sleeves.

Repeatedly during seances the guide would call for the white lights and when they were turned on the medium would be seen sitting in his chair, fully controlled. The guide then would call, "Lights off," and within two seconds of darkness, after which the guide again called "Lights on", it would be found that the medium had disappeared, leaving the tied ropes in place.

The lights would be turned off and, two seconds later when the guide called, "Lights on," Jack Webber was back in the chair, completely immobolized by the ropes which had originally been tied tightly around him. After such a seance it sometimes took 10 minutes to remove Webber's bonds.

In June, 1939, three executives of the British Broadcasting Corporation attended a Webber seance. Great care was taken to eliminate any possibility of fraud.

After the ropes were tied, cotton cords were passed through the button holes of Webber's coat and tied to each button. A small red bulb remained burning and a bright white light could be switched on in a matter of seconds. Webber went into trance. The B.B.C. investigators carefully checked every detail of the controls. The white light was switched off for about five seconds; when it came back on Webber's coat had been removed from his body, although the ropes which tied his body, including his arms, also had encompassed his clothing. Nevertheless, the coat now lay upon his lap.

Mr. Lot de Biniere, of the B.B.C., examined everything and declared himself stumped. The white lights were turned off for another five seconds and when they came back on Webber again was wearing his coat. Mr. de Biniere examined the ropes, the cords, the threads, the coat, and stated he was satisfied this could not have been accomplished by normal means.

The B.B.C. was not the only news media to be overwhelmingly impressed by Jack Webber's powers. One London reporter accompanied his story of a Webber seance with the following sworn affidavit:

"I, Bernard Gray, of 27, Barn Rise, Wembly Park, in the County of Middlesex, journalist, make oath and say as follows:

"1. That my description of the incidents enumerated in the article written by me hereunto annexed and marked 'B.G.' to appear in the Sunday issue of the *Sunday Pictorial* of the twentyeighth of May, 1939, under the heading of 'I Swear I Saw It Happen' is true.

"2. I further make oath and say the incidents so described in the article did occur in my presence."

Bernard Grav stated in his article, "I trussed Jack Webber to his chair with double knots that a sailor once taught me. In addition I tied lengths of household cotton from the ropes to the chair legs. I sewed up the front of his jacket with strong thread. Webber was entranced. Things began to happen immediately. Happenings which I personally can only compare with the miracles of the New Testament. There was the appearance in mid-air, so to speak, of a perfect human face. Before me rose a kind of luminous slate. It moved, by invisible means, to face the medium and show that he

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is still roped and tied and immobilized.

"The phosphorescent tablet moved to me. A fog appeared on its surface. Mr. Edwards told me it was ectoplasm and to look intently at it. The ectoplasm formed into a luminous halo. Dim features appeared. They became plainer. There's the nose, and—yes the mouth. The eyes, and, My God!, the eyelids are moving. Then the whole face is clear and distinct. It was the face of a very old lady. 'Try to speak to us,' said Harry Edwards.

"'My boy, my boy,' whispered a woman's voice. 'I cannot stay. I just wanted you to see me. God bless you, my boy.'"

Gray wrote that everybody in the circle saw all of this.

Gray then described the removal and return of the medium's jacket, just as the B.B.C. agents had seen and described it. He added, "Every word I have written is true. My friends will think I've gone crazy—I say I saw it happen!"

One of the most satirical and sceptical newspaper men in the world was the London *Daily Mirror* writer who signed himself *Cassandra*. By a mere accident he attended a Jack Webber seance in North London, having been asked by a friend to transport Leon Isaacs' infra-red photographic equipment to the sitting.

After the seance *Cassandra* wrote, "I claim I can bring as much scepticism to bear on spiritualism as any newspaper writer living, and that's a powerful load of scepticism. I haven't got an open mind on the subject—I'm a violent, prejudiced unbeliever with a limitless ability to leer at the unknown. At least, I was until last Saturday. And I got a swift, sharp ugly jolt that shook most of my pet sneers out of their sockets."

Cassandra then proceeded to describe a typical Jack Webber seance. He described the levitation of a heavy table, stated that he saw it in motion by the red light from the infra-red flash bulbs, and that he also saw a book that stood upon the table while it was levitated as high as the heads of the sitters. He wrote that during this time the medium was clearly to be seen sitting, tied in his bonds. *Cassandra* continued, "I pledge my word that not a soul in the room touched it (the table).

"What- price cynicism? What price heresy? Don't ask me what it means, but they can't tell me now that these strange and terrifying things don't happen. I was there. I saw them.

"I went to scoff. But the laugh is sliding slowly round to the other side of my face." (Signed) Cassandra. Jack Webber's seances, usually held in private homes or public halls, were witnessed by countless persons. Not one ever accused Webber of fraud. If, like *Cassandra*, they went to scoff, they came away fully assured that, at least,

they had witnessed things for which they had no explanation.

THE GHOST OF FOSTER'S TAVERN

STRANGE tales are told about a large, Colonialstyle house in Spartanburg, S.C., which once was a stagecoach stop known as Foster's Tavern. These were summed up in an article by Jack Moffitt in the Spartanburg Herald for August 24, 1964.

The building is estimated to be 163 years old, and according to legend it was the scene of a suicide by hanging in the middle 1800's. James Ruff, who has lived in the house with his wife since 1936, told Moffitt of hearing footsteps late at night, sometimes while reading in the parlor on the first floor.

The sounds, Ruff stated, come from the hall just outside the door. Although he often has leaped up and thrown open the door, he has seen nothing. He admitted that he was the only person who has heard the footsteps, which he said have been audible on all three floors of the house.

Ruff told Moffitt of a strange experience related by Mrs. Ruff's aunt. She was half asleep in one of the first floor bedrooms when a bright apparition, which she described as an angel, descended the rear staircase and entered her room. It sat on the bed and engaged her in a conversation which she did not reveal.

Although Ruff does not claim that stories about the house being haunted are true, he pointed out that horses never fail to shy when they pass it and dogs shiver when they come no further than the front porch.

THE OUTSTRETCHED HAND By Anita Stanley

IN 1941 I WAS planning to have an eye specialist remove a cyst from my eye. When the time came I lay down; Dr. Duncan swabbed the spot with ether, reached for a scalpel, and said, "This will take just a moment."

He returned that evening, grim and evasive. Later he would have to tell Mom that Grandmother had stepped on a rusty nail and blood poison had set in.

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
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Early the next morning Mom's youngest brother, Arch, came to tell her, as gently as possible, that Grandmother was dead.

A second later I heard the voice of a fair-haired, blue-eyed young man. He was in a rowboat. "Hang on," he said. "I'll pull you over."


Gratefully I grasped the stern of the boat. We reached the breakwater, and with a word of thanks I scrambled up the rocks. "It's time you got here," Mildred said.

BOYHOOD WITH GURDJIEFF, by Fritz Peters. E. P. Dutton & Co., New York, 1964. 176 pages, \$3.95.

What a character! These three words might suffice fairly well as a review of this book, except for the part played by Fritz Peters himself. Placed at "The Gurdjieff Institute for the Harmonious Development of Man" (Fontainebleau, France) in 1924 at the age of 11, he spent the better part of four years there in close association with the man he had been told was "at least a 'prophet'—at most, something very close to the 'second coming of Christ.'"

Readers who (like this reviewer) have known of G. I. Gurdjieff only vaguely as a mysterious, enigmatic teacher using unorthodox methods will find that he comes very much alive in this book, but remains just as enigmatic as ever.

As an account of an unusual childhood spent in the company of a most unusual man, this is a strongly engrossing tale told with a considerable sense of humor. Fritz Peters, who has written other books, including one for children, has succeeded remarkably well in recapturing his childhood; Boyhood With *Gurdjieff* is a boy's-eye view of Gurdjieff.

Gurdijeff proved to be a hard master, whose teaching as far as the boy was concerned seems to have consisted mainly of occasional "pearls" and supposedly beneficial experience, with too little formal instruction to prepare him adequately for "outside" resumption of studies suitable to his age. Indeed. it was a life very full of physical work. The book is not one from which to gain any very comprehensive conception of Gurdjieff's philosophy: rather, one gets brief glimpses of it. Only in the last few pages is there anything very concentrated. The boy was then helping with translation into English of parts of a Gurdjieff book, All and Everything. He was told that the purpose in writing the book "was to destroy forever the habitual values and ideas of people, which prevented them from understanding reality or living according to 'cosmic laws.""

Fritz had started out idolizing Gurdjieff but he ended his stay at the Institute plagued by various questions. For one thing, he could not see that the students in resi-

A rather headstrong boy, he finally "spoke up" to Gurdjieff when being chided, saving that he did not regard him as God, "and that whoever he was he was not necessarily always right about everything." Gurdjieff denied regarding himself as God, vet he is indeed portraved as a Jovian type - supremely confident of his own wisdom and near omniscience; at the same time earthy. enjoying coarse humor, sometimes spinning a tall tale with obvious relish, and sometimes indulging in Olympian wrath, which however he apparently could turn off at will.

A powerful, magnetic personality possessed of vision different from that of other men, he may have been a genius yet he could cut a ludricrous figure at times — as when he took a carload of his household on an outing to Vichy. That excursion, told in detail, reads like something out of *Alice in Wonderland* only funnier.—*Harold Steinour*.

MORE ASTRAL PROJECTIONS, by Robert Crookall. Aquarian Press, London, 1964. 154 pages, 30s. (about \$4.50).

This is the third book on astral projection by the tireless British paleontologist and psychic researcher. It is essentially a sequel to *The Study and Practice of Astral Projection* (earlier reviewed by this reviewer) and exhibits most of the same strengths and weaknesses.

Some 222 "cases" of astral projection are cited in some 119 pages (some of the cases describe more than one experience, while some

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REX CAMPBELL P. O. Box 1011 F Thousand Oaks, Calif. 91360 represent second-hand commentary on other's experiences), so most of the accounts are brief.

Again Dr. Crookall has chosen to include every single experience that could conceivably be interpreted as astral projection, however vague or lacking in detail. His reason for so doing is two-fold: first, he seeks to establish that astral projection occurs frequently and among ordinary persons; and, second, he wants to put "on the record" a number of unpublished cases sent him in letters.

This reviewer remains of the opinion that this policy confuses the issue and that a much stronger case could be built upon a fewer number of cases given in greater detail. Dr. Crookall himself admits nearly as much when he attempts to apply statistics to the cases in his "Conclusions". His analysis is perforce limited to the most detailed accounts. The cases show an impressive correspondence in details which is obscured by burying them among unspecific accounts of "astral journeys" and clairvoyant visions of distant scenes.

A word of caution: this study is highly specialized and quite difficult to follow without the background of Crookall's earlier books. The cumulative effect of his studies is far more impressive than the individual volumes taken separately, and much credit is due Dr. Crookall for the important research he is undertaking.—David Techter.

THE PROSPERITY SECRET OF THE AGES, by Catherine Ponder. Prentice-Hall, Inc., Englewood Cliffs, N. J., 1964. 216 pages, \$4.95.

Several issues back I had the


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pleasure of reviewing Mrs. Ponder's best seller, *The Dynamic Laws* of *Prosperity*. This new book is even better, and it is not repetitive beyond stressing again what occultists call the Divine Harmony within and behind life.

Critics of metaphysical therapy object that its claims in regard to health, wealth and happiness are Pollyanna dreams, and that man must live by the sweat of his brow, accepting tribulation as the natural order of things. Those versed in occult as well as orthodox wisdom will both agree and disagree with this view.

A certain amount of self-suggestion is involved in self-uplift techniques and this can be carried to the point where one sees the world through rose-tinted glasses of illusion. Then there is the old law of cause and effect operating on every level of manifestation — impersonal and inexorable as the tides. There is no getting around it by faith, hope or charity. It's simply there and won't go away.

There also is the matter of individual human temperament. We all are unique beings, each representative of his own special pattern of components. Lobster, for example, agrees with Mr. A and gives Mr. B hives.

But this by no means is to deny that attempts at self-uplift are desirable or beneficial. Obviously they are, and Mrs. Ponder presents techniques which require going to no extremes.

She writes, "There is only one presence and one power in my life — God." Occultly speaking, she is correct, provided we define God as the ever-enduring life, substance

and consciousness of the Infinite Whole, the All-in-All, from which all things come and back to which they ultimately return.

Mrs. Ponder goes back to Genesis and offers an ancient Golden Key: instead of criticizing and condemning persons, things and conditions, bless them. "I begin now to bless everything in my life as God, God, God."

Simple? But then life itself is fundamentally simple; it is man with his confused, complex thinking who turns the harmony of things into chaos.

The book contains 15 chapters. One, "Seven Secret Attitudes for Success," is worth the price of the book, and the other chapters are a bonus. Other themes covered are Magnetic Prayer, Perfect Health, An Ancient Secret for Happy Living, Overcoming Hardships, Occult Power for Success, Your Master Demonstration, The Power of Joy and Beauty, Overcoming Injustice, and Sexual Sublimation.



This book is overwhelming. Its 620 close-printed pages may well represent a lifetime of work, and would take the rest of this reviewer's lifetime to fully digest. To do his research the author went to Greece, mastered the language and

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SAUCERS AND INERTIA

I read with interest the note to my speculative article in the December issue by Science Editor Henry A. Bott. I am glad that the article didn't seem entirely implausible to him. I should have mentioned the conservation of energy question specifically and should have gone into it more carefully.

On the question of experimental verification, you might be interested in a paper by Dr. Erwin J. Saxl, entitled An Electrically Charged Torque Pendulum, in Nature, Vol. 203, No. 4941 (July 11, 1964), pages 136-38. It appears to me that an electromagnetic screening of gravity may be shown in the experiment he describes.

Dr. Saxl found that when the pendulum was electrically charged and put in a charged cage, it slowed down. The interpretation he drew was that the gravitational and inertial mass of the instrument was being affected by the charge, although he did not speculate how. It is entirely possible that the electric charge in fact shielded the pendulum from gravity and/or inertia, and thus influenced its behavior. An electrical field, after all, is a



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
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first cousin of a magnetic field.

There is a mention of E. E. Smith's name in a new book by Arthur C. Clarke. However, it was in the context of an explanation of the alternate theory of why the saucers do not fly apart (i.e., that they generate a field of some sort which binds or grips each atom of them in place, so that they are forced to move in a given direction with any given momentum. This theory was developed by Lt. Plantier and Hermann Oberth. I did not mention it because I wanted to send a copy of my article to Dr. Oberth, whom I much admire.

It seems to me, however, that there are grave difficulties with the "force field" alternative. One of them is that the relation of the "binding effect" to gravity is not clear. In fact, if the saucers generate a massive gravitational field, which holds their atoms in place, this would tend to attract the earth - and hence we are not helped in flight over a large body. One would seem to have to postulate two fields - and by the principle of Occam's Razor (choosing the simplest of two hypotheses - Ed.) the Smith-Evans suggestion would seem to be better.

The hypothesis that the gravitational mass of the saucers is artificially reduced may explain two interesting characteristics of their flight, i.e., the falling leaf maneuver and the slow clockwise or counter-clockwise spin often noticed when they are hovering. In the first case, a light object in a medium will oscillate as it falls. A leaf or a piece of paper will exhibit this if dropped from a height. 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and forth as it sinks. The mechanics of this wave motion are complex, but the phenomena are common enough.

Now, if the saucers are heavy objects whose gravitational mass has been reduced, we might expect them to behave in exactly the same way when they were allowed to fall in the atmosphere towards the earth. Second, a light object, such as a piece of paper in the air, will be caught by air currents and will be blown around at various angles. The same thing might happen to the saucers; they might be flown from the plane their operators wished to maintain. However, a gyroscopic spin might stabilize the device in the desired plane, although the centrifugal force is itself a result of inertia.

In both of these observations the assumption must be made that the air molecules are allowed to strike the saucer without being deprived of all their inertial properties, an assumption not made in my article. Such a contradiction may possibly be reconciled by speculating that the gravity-inertia screen is variable, that its strength may be increased or reduced, perhaps by altering its effective distance from the heavy parts of the saucer.— Gordon H. Evans, Hudson, N.Y.

INERTIA THEORY

It is gratifying that FATE is devoting some space to the how and why of UFO operation with the idea that perhaps someone will hit on the scientific principles on which these vehicles operate.

In the December issue the article Flying Saucers, Propulsion and Relativity, by Gordon H. Evans, is a

commendable work, showing active thought. It is entirely possible that his theories are valid; however, may I present these thoughts on the propulsion problem.

Suppose we had some way of projecting a magnetic field ahead of the vehicle, or in the direction we wanted it to go. Suppose this force affects every molecule of matter equally within the vehicles, including the vehicle; then we would have no inertia or "G" force effect when or decelerating accelerating or changing direction. This attracting force would attract everything, including the body fluids and the circulatory system of a human, with no resulting G or inertia effect; because everything would be attracted equally in a given direction, which is unlike the action effects on an auto passenger with every new change of direction or motion.

As to the force, is it possible that a beam of some sort is projected ahead of the vehicle; perhaps through some mechanism that acts like a magnifying glass to converge the beam at some point ahead of the vehicle to attract the vehicle toward it (like the carrot on a stick in front of a horse, to make him move in a given direction)? Or it could be that two beams, one projecting at either side of the vehicle and intersecting ahead of it, would create an attracting force.

But I am inclined to feel that the force is static electricity. You may recall rubbing your pencil on your school desk and then attracting paper pellets with it. These static electric charges may be produced by a speedily moving belt from which the charge is removed, to the surface of the saucer. This belt

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Of the many articles on saucers which have appeared in FATE, all the characteristics mentioned by the viewers leads me to the conclusion that the force is produced by static electricity. This would explain the glowing colors on the surface of the saucers and the whining sound of the high speed moving belts producing static electricity — and also, apparently, no effects of inertia on the saucer or the occupants.

I hope these thoughts may lead to some research into this area.— Sam Kanter (Inventor of Patented Kanter Flight Simulator, 1941-45), Los Angeles, Calif.

SHIP'S UFO ESCORT

I read with interest the UFO article by Richard D. Osborn in the November issue.

You may be interested to learn that an object of the same description accompanied the S.S. President Wilson from San Francisco to Los Angeles on November 21-22, 1964.

This object changed position quickly in different directions, traveled from one to three miles at a time without lights, then suddenly flashed on, blinked off and on, and glowed from dull orange to a pulsating deep red color.

Larger than a small plane, the object was from 50 to 90 feet in diameter. It no doubt appeared on radar since it frequently changed positions, so that at different times it was ahead of or behind the *Wilson*, or moving parallel to it on the land side.



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It accompanied the ship for hours, flying at an altitude of from 50 to 300 feet. I watched the object from 10:30 P.M. to 3:00 A.M., finally got tired and went to bed.

No doubt the captain and crew observed the object and could tell you more about it, unless military security prevented them.

I believe the object was a military craft — definitely a piece of war equipment.

The object's closest approach to the ship was about half a mile and it generally remained at a greater distance than that — perhaps a mile away. I had the feeling that the ship was under scrutiny for some military reason and that the object was under orders to see the ship to Los Angeles and out to sea.

There was no sign of the object the next day, but when the *Wilson* left Los Angeles I had the impression that a telepathic-like signal was sent, such as might involve an underwater submersible.

Soft lights appeared over the ship at sea and flashed momentaritly at times. There was no further appearance of the object all the way to Honolulu.—Johan Eichelberger, Honolulu, Hawaii.

TIME LIMIT ON BURIALS

In the interest of accuracy I feel that a statement made by Coral E. Lorenzen in her reply to Lucy Grant should be corrected (October, 1964, issue, page 113). The statement made by Mrs. Lorenzen is: "This is one reason for the three-day limit on burying bodies in the U.S.A. even with our advanced embalming methods and refrigerated vaults."

As a licensed and practicing embalmer and funeral director, I can state with certainty that there is no such thing as a three-day limit for holding dead human bodies before burial. It is not unusual for persons to die at a considerable distance from the location where burial will take place. When this happens it is common to have a public viewing both at the place of death and the place of burial. Often this involves a period considerably longer than three days.

In areas where cemeteries are closed on Sundays, it is not uncommon for persons who die on Thurs-

Practically all city and county morgues are equipped to hold unidentified and unclaimed bodies for a much longer period if necessary.

I am totally unfamiliar with burial customs in Argentina. However, I will agree that in a warm, humid climate burial of an unembalmed body within 24 hours would be a virtual necessity .- Charles P. Gillen, Warren, O.

WILCOX FARM CRITICS ANSWERED

Just picked up my copy of the December issue of FATE and note it contains three letters with reference to my article on the Gary Wilcox incident. I see we have aroused some critics.

Two of the letters were from persons who are interested in Garv Wilcox as a farmer, and since they sound skeptical and/or indignant. I wish to straighten out a few facts, as their points are well taken.

I never said that Garv Wilcox milked 150 cows three times a day. In the first paragraph of my submitted manuscript, I said that Gary milked the cows three times a day. This is true. I don't know how many cows he milks, as this number was not mentioned. In my accompanying letter I said his dairy numbered over 100, including much young stock. This is something elseentirely, as young stock is not milked.

Also, both letters regarding the farming aspects questioned the fact that Garv farms his 300 acres alone. These 300 acres are not all tillable - there is woodland on the property and probably some acres untillable for other reasons.

In fact, in the manuscript I could have mentioned that he farms two places — separated by some miles, which complicates matters a bit for him. The only help he had that I knew of was a schoolboy who helped him with the barn chores after school.


My husband and I discussed the one letter which stated that it would take 10 men to do the work. Since my husband was raised on a farm and knows whereof he speaks, he said this statement was ridiculous. I don't know what farm economics are in other areas, but around here more than two men working a farm is very unusual.

One letter went into detail about handling of the milk — separating the cream, and so on. Whole milk is shipped to creameries here, the butterfat content is tested at the creamery and farmers are paid on the basis of this as well as other qualities.

I'm sorry that these two writers based the credibility of my story on the foregoing points. I hope this sets them straight.

UFO sightings in this area have diminished but have not ceased. There is the landed space ship and occupant seen by five young children in Conklin, N.Y. Another incident involved two space ships landed in a field not far from the Wilcox farm, witnessed by a young married woman, who stopped her car and ran to a neighbor's house for a camera to photograph them. When she returned outdoors, they were gone.

Still another landing reportedly was witnessed by a man and his wife not far from Newark Valley. A particularly interesting incident

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
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
