With tremendous yet methodical and deliberate activity, the marvelous vibrations of the Infinite Energy, Your own Life-forces,—are here, fashioning all spheres of Existence.

The scientists of to-day find they have to discard many of the teachings of the old schools. They have to work in new ways, making entirely new experiments, since many of the old "discoveries" have not uncovered anything. Just take a glance at the wealthy classes as a whole; they do not enjoy life; existence to them is a bore; they lack appreciation,—which is necessary to happiness; they are blind to the value of life's good things. Learn the true worth of money first, learn to be in all conditions yourself the master,—then proceed to work, and draw upon the bank of the Infinite Opulence.

It is not worth your while to worry over others' impositions. Don't be too easy. Be just to yourself; even if you do have to give offense. Never mind about "giving the other cheek," and all that kind of talk, (which may be right enough within limits!)

There are times when you need to quietly drop some of your old accquaintances; that is when they expect too much. For myself I find I have plenty to keep me busy returning kindnesses from my friends, without even thinking about idle and therefore helpless people.

#### Fear Not

In most lives Fear is the supreme tyrant. Hardly a day is passed by most persons without the discomfort, pain, or torture of fear. The rich fear poverty. The poor fear worse poverty. The healthy fear sick-The sick fear death. The well fear death when they think of it. The wife and mother fears what would occur should the bread-winner die. The husband and father fears for wife and children. Most persons fear what people will say, and dare not be themselves. Some fear loss of work. Others fear work. At every flash of lightning some are afraid. Some fear ghosts, some fear God, and some are afraid of going to hell, though to observe the way they live one would not suspect it. The child fears the parent. The wife fears the husband. The husband fears the wife. The employed fears the employer. The employer fears the employed. The householder fears the burglar. The burglar fears the police. Most of us fear we know not what. Some fear their fears.

And yet there is nothing to be afraid of. God is love. He makes no mistakes, and allows none to be made. All is good. "God saw everything that he had made, and behold, it was very good,"(Gen. 1:31). There is but one power in the universe, and that power is kind; kinder to us than we are to ourselves. Life is good. Death, if possible, is better. It is not an end, but a beginning. It is not a pit, but a door. I have planted a seed and discovered how death leads on to birth. A birth is a coming forth from a death. A death is a going on to a birth. There are deaths, but there is no death. We have died and been born

many times, and have yet many deaths and births to perform, and should not fear them. Riches are good. Poverty is good. In some cases riches or poverty seem to be a curse, to be feared, though I have never met any one who feared riches: but the curse is only a seeming. Evil is but an appearance. Nothing but good is real. Evil is transient. Good is eternal. Sorrow is a blessing. It is good when our loved ones die; for them and us. If it does not seem so, it is because we have fear instead of faith. Had it not been good they would have lived. "All things work together for good," not only to those who love God, but to those who do not, or think they do not. Sickness is unnecessary, but if it comes it is a blessing. The good is there for you, if you will. Sin is a bless-It is a temporary mistake, but we learn through our mistakes what we should otherwise never know.

Most of the things we fear never occur. We have often feared death, but here we are. The illness did not turn out to be typhoid fever, or pneumonia, or consumption, or small-pox. After all our fears, it was only a cold. We did not become bankrupt; help was nearer than we thought. The baby lived, though we feared it would not. Last year we thought that by this time we should be worse off than we are. all were in the poor house who feared to be, poor houses would become great cities. You thought that when you had to move from your house into an apartment, and from that into a flat, and from six rooms into four, you would be miserable, but you have learned, or you will learn, that happiness comes of what you are, and not of what you have, or of where or in what degree of respectability you live. Nothing outside of yourself can injure you, and you cannot injure yourself for long.

Fear is a false prophet, a liar; but, when yeilded to, it has this power: It can help to bring to pass what it

prophesies. "The thing which I greatly feared is come upon me," said Job. When Peter, walking on the water, began to be afraid, he began to sink. The woman who looked under her bed each night for twenty-five years expecting to find a burglar, at last found him. Her fear invited him. The power of good is so strong that if you have faith in it nothing can prevail against it. Mountains can easily be moved by it. It is so strong that even your fears cannot bring misfortunes upon you once in a hundred times trying, but, if you continue to entertain fear as a welcome and honored guest, by-and-by the thing you fear will come upon you, because you fear IT.

Fear weakens the mind. He who fears that he will fail cannot succeed. He who fears hell is in hell. "Fear hath torment." Fear weakens the body. The coward trembles in his knees. The blood flees from his face. Hair has been known to turn gray in a few hours through fear. A man was blind-folded and pricked in the arm, heard water dripping in a basin, was told that it was his blood, that he was dying, and he died—of fear. In every epidemic fear invites the disease, so that it is an adage that fear kills more than

the plague.

Why be dominated by this tyrant? Cast him out. Front him and he will flee from you. When Grant, at the head of his first regiment, went to meet a Southern colonel at the head of his regiment, he was afraid; but when he found the Southern camp deserted he realized that the other man was more afraid of him, and he never knew fear again. When Christian faced the lions in his path he found them chained. Do the thing you fear to do. Think the thought you fear to think. Be what you fear to be. All the lions you will ever meet are chained. There is no devil, no hell, no evil, except as you create them by your fears. There is but one power, and it is on your side; for

you, near you, about you, within you. Trust it. Trust yourself. Trust the universe. Trust God. All is good, everywhere, all the time. Have faith. And again I say unto you, have faith. And after that have faith.

#### DESERT THE SWEAT SHOPS!

The smoke, dirt, closeness, foul air, long hours of tedious toilsome routine, unfair wages considering what is produced, the sense of servitude, the crushing of ambition and aspiration, the stamping out of self-respect, the tendency to rouse one's animal nature beyond its proper sphere of action, the fears and suspicions on all sides, the unintermittent slavery,—these are some of the things that should make men give up their employment, and enter into some work more in accord with their higher mental development.

This is not to say one should take a step without seeing some little way clear, (though even this should be done in some cases) but let the first step appear, which it will if you think and look around, then launch out into conditions better suited to your ideals. Say: I am my own master, and will henceforth cooperate with others, but never again place myself in

the position of a slave.

You will continue to be miserable as long as your interests are confined to your personal self, or even to your family and acquaintances. You must recognize your eternal relationship to all if you would have peace of mind; it is the "separation" idea that causes discomfort. Live for all!

### The Cry of Want

From all parts of the earth, from all forms of life, ascends a cry of want,—the same cry that has been raised for countless centuries. It is the appeal of evolution, and begins with the first embryonic birth of consciousness in nature. It is the expression of the desire for growth and development,—the supplication for greater abundance of life.

There is dissatisfaction everywhere and always; for as fast as one desire is satisfied, others present them-

selves.

This discontentment is the salvation of the race. In lower forms of life the cry of want is mostly limited to the narrow demands of material sustenance. The rich man to-day with all his treasures—and they are real treasures—is just as discontented as his poorer neighbor. Wealth only seems to bring more responsibilities and anxieties. The things which might bring happiness cause misery, since they are placed out of their proper position;—they are allowed to be masters where

they should be slaves.

Money is a good slave, but a terrible master. It must be used, and not allowed to rest idle, if we are to be truly benefitted with it. Those who have an accumulation of money which is not required for the satisfaction of their reasonable desires, should for their own sakes rid themselves of it; an overplus becomes a burden.

The Natural Justice cannot be cheated. The disgraceful luxury of the rich, side by side with the filth and ignorance of the poor, is a blot on the Image of

And our charitable institutions,—insulting beggarly make-believes as many of them are! These inventions, above all others created by a bare-faced plutoc-
