At present, this drug is not employed so recklessly, yet its baneful effects may still be seen in obstinate cases of rheumatism and neuralgia. Chronic invalids may frequently attribute the cause of their ailments to the use of mineral poison.

## Health Department.

## A RED NOSE.

FROM DR. ALLINSON'S ESSAYS.

The abnormal redness of the nose to which many are subject is seen in different degrees. Some have more or less redness only at the tip, others have it at the end of the nose, and some from the base to the tip. In some it is chronic, in others it only comes on after meals, in a warm room, if excited, or after exposure to to the sun, wind or very cold weather. A very advanced state of affairs is when this organ is not only always red but enlarged as well, a condition known as "grog blossoms," which is a variety of acne. To many this complaint is only temporary, coming and going several times a day, but in others it is always more or less present, and made worse by various circumstances.

Symptoms.—We have the varying states of redness mentioned above. Some have a redness after every meal, if at all excited, if they think that others are looking at or noticing them, if they go into a warm room, or if exposed to the sun. a cold wind, or frosty weather. After exposure to any of these causes the nose becomes bright red, tingles, burns, and smarts with shooting pains, the face and forehead may also become red, the person feels uneasy, the heart beats quicker than usual, and often a perspiration will break out. After a period varying from one to two hours the redness goes away, only to return after the next meal. This condition of affairs may last many years, unless the diet and habits are so changed as to get rid of it. This complaint is chiefly seen in the youth of either sex, and it often lasts quite to middle life. Both sexes are subject to it, but in women a chronic redness is more common. The "grog blossoms" are noticed hesitation in pronouncing Prof. Haddock amongst the intemperate, either men or women.

CAUSES .- An excess of waste matter in the system is the primary cause, the secondary ones being exposure to

warmth, sun, cold, air, or excitement. Overfeeding causes many cases; hot fluids and foods make natters worse, as do all kinds of peppery and hot condiments. The foods which chiefly give rise to the complaint are the sweet, fat, and rich ones; such are sweet foods and drinks, fried things, greasy dishes, pastry, and cakes. The fluids which lead to this trouble are tea and coffee, and next in injurious effects are all hot drinks, even plain hot water will help to cause it. Bad air and insufficient exercise, not unfrequently aid to bring it about, as thereby waste matters are allowed to accummulate in the system, and so start it off if the conditions are favorable.

CURE.-Cut the meals down to three a day, take them at intervals of five or more hours, take all the food and drinks cool. Do not eat fle-h meat more than three times a week, and have only the lean of it. Better still, avoid it altogether. Sweet puddings, cakes, pastry, fried foods, dried fruits, and all acid things, like rhubarb, green gooseberries, and unripe plums must not be eaten, as much sugar has to be taken with them to make them palatable. Strictly avoid tea and coffee, first, because they are irritants to the nervous system; secondly, because they are usually drank hot, and, lastly, because much sugar is used with them. Drink cool. and not too sweet, cocoa, or mossena, milk and water, bran tea. or barley water at meals. Keep the windows open three inches night and day in all weather, and take at least two hours' open-air exercise daily. Do not overeat, and be careful to adhere to the diet and rules advised, and cure will undoubtedly result.

Each lesson takes one hour. Some students take two lessons per day, others one, others still only one per week. In these private lessons, students may choose their own time.

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
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
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
