The effect of constructive thought energizes the thinker and he becomes open to the idealism of other artisans. Beatrice Chesebrough, in *Good Business*, indicated this vital truth with these words, "When the mind is inspired by good examples the hands get clearer direction and produce more perfect work."

In the region of our Soul's World, creative energies are everywhere pressing themselves into responsive outlets. These waves of creative force are surcharged by Archetypal images which are emanated and broadcast by pure, Perfected Beings to whom the wishes of God regarding His world are known.

A human being comes into superphysical attunement with the Soul Dimension through purified and purposeful living, as well as through specific techniques of meditation, and a conscious seeking to understand God's Will. His soul body is as a luminous antenna which responds to energies and powers to which he is agreeable by reason of idealism, or by choice. Through his radiant center, man feels impacts from Archetypal Orders which

seek him for the outlet or broadcasting of God's Will towards the improvement of all His Created Life.

In a recent issue of Mind Digest, Malcolm Schloss tells about a Franciscan monk who exerted a very benign power over the sick and the lame in that he was able to heal Finally the Abbot heard them. about the seeming miracles this saintly monk was causing. He visited the brother and asked him to give a detailed account of his spiritual exercises. He found that the healer practiced exactly what every other monk of his order had, in prayers and devotions. But the Abbot was not satisfied. The monk thought, and slowly answered, "I think not, Father, unless -ah, yes!" and his face beamed, "whenever I have nothing else to do that claims my attention, I repeat over and over, 'Thy will be done in earth as it is in heaven!"

Archetypal images cause man to feel a great consuming desire to become responsible for their High Orders. He may give his entire incarnation to the fulfillment of a specific goal, similar to that objective which filled Martin Luther as a desire to have religion pure and untainted. Hundreds of individuals, such as Luther, Dr. Granfel and Jane Adams, have felt comparable inward compulsions and have made themselves custodians of sacred, hu-

manitarian drives. Civilization has been advanced by the work of guided Workers for God.

Our distinct tastes and aspirations hold clues regarding our alignments to Bright Archetypal images we contact at our highest moments. They could and should form the basis of our personal endeavors towards the Good of Humanity. Until these compulsions of Spirit receive our sincerest attention and awaken our activity, everyday affairs and lesser desires could usurp the place of Holy Orders. For that reason we daily should dedicate ourselves to the soul's Inmost Urges and ever regard them as of first importance in thought and effort.

To illustrate how we may each respond to spiritual stimuli, let me tell you impersonally about the Inmost drives that spur my own individual consecrations. Listed briefly they appear to be:

- The desire to bring men closer to God by sincere living and by the Spoken and Written Word.
- 2. The desire to cause every person to realize the need and the beauty of loving each other as growing Sons and Daughters of Life.

3. The desire to help mankind live *peacefully*, free of selfish influences that deceitfully try to incite men to war for the sake of material profit.

4. The desire to protect and strive for the highest good of the Creatures in a way comparable to the care Angelic Hosts accord our human kingdom.

5. The desire to build my life according to the truth, beauty, order, and eternity of the Spirit Indwelling.

To achieve these aims one needs to be afire with transforming zeal. He must himself live close to God in an ever-increasing sense of spirit-

ual companionship.

In him the alchemy of love must be constantly exercised. No one is above or below the reaches of love. Humanity can best and most speedily make progress in a world fellowship of genuine brotherhood, where racial and religious differences are surmounted by Spiritual love and trust. In one of Gardner Hunting's articles in Good Business, he points to love's value in business relations. "I asked an old salesman in the furniture department of a fine department store: 'What is best for business—to make the customer like the goods, or like the store, or like you?' He grinned at me and said, 'Its best for business for me to like the customer!"

One who follows Love's Rule cannot agree to the tyranny and force of war. He hates no one, not even ambitious war-creators, for he is busy striving to bring others to a realization of the wisdom of peace.

It is odd that numerous human beings pray to the Supreme Benefactor to give them Divine and Angelic assistance, while on the human plane they are indifferent and heedless of the animal kingdom, below their own, which requires human administration and kindness.

Physical existence is strenuous enough without those confusions and complexities that low-level thinking and disorganized living creates. A man who chooses and endeavors to live in a peaceful, orderly, Truth-loving manner, keeps his own inner and outer habitation harmonized. Having accomplished cleanliness and order in his private thought and surroundings, he possesses knowledge by which his humanitarian labors will benefit.

"Without vision the people perish." Those Dreams of Spirit to which we give the utmost in our thoughts and our endeavors slowly become concrete achievements. Perhaps we may not complete our Dream in one lifetime, but if we have been sincerely enthusiastic, someone else will take the torch we were impelled to light, and carry on the unfolding of the Dream in his own way.

Before a Humanitarian Artisan leaves his earth duties for heavenly renewal, he will have reaped, to some extent, a double reward. His whole incarnation will have been warmed and fired with a holy vision that refined and gave purpose to his character and actions. If he has lived long enough he will see his Dream moving with ever-enlarging influence into the world of men. He has helped indeed to make clearer and more accessible God's Kingdom to the world of men.

Nature's Mantle of Beauty

OUR LOVELIEST FLOWER, perhaps is a lily-of-the-valley—found joyously by Jesus in lush creek beds and moist shady spots in spring. During those thirty silent years, preparing unconsciously for His earthsaving mission, such poetic words of sacred Scripture as "I am the rose of Sharon and the lily-of-the-valleys," must have made an impression very deep. For Jesus loved beauty of nature.

Then, too, in the prophecy of Hosea, come these words, "He shall grow as the lily." Israel, the Lord's Chosen, was to grow as beautifully and simply as that! How disappointing religious leaders of His day must have been in their artificiality of expensive dress!

One can imagine Jesus saying to a modern ecclesiastic of high station, or to a poor peasant girl full of hankering concern for fine clothes, "Consider the lilies-of-thevalley, how they grow! Even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these!"

With grace and color of wild flowers, Jesus had reverent wonder for the earth itself. Speaking of His sublime ideal, an actual kingdom of God, He said, why, it's just like casting seed into the ground and it springs up mysteriously; "for the earth bringeth forth fruit of herself." In fact, He added in another parable, the trouble with much seed is not enough earth; people have "no deepness of earth"—they are not close to the heart of Life in rich empowered soil. Even today we speak of "mother" earth. We find release from tension of any kind by working a while in gardens.

But in that dry parched Holy Land water came as a gift of God, bringing life and harvest. That is why Jesus conceives it as a symbol of renewal: "Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God!"6 He offers the half-breed woman living water, which shall be "a well of water springing up into everlasting life."7 Later He describes the simplest service in His name as a giving of cold water just a cup full. Through a faithful disciple would flow a veritable "river of living water."8 How fascinating these words are as we watch a fountain, cascade, or mighty waterfall!

There remains His love of wind—so refreshing in that hot sultry country with the lake far below sea level and Jordan running down its gorge into a sink of desert salt. Brother Lawrence speaks of Sister

Water and Brother Wind; but to Jesus freedom of wind to blow "where it listeth," uncontrolled by man, is analogous to the Spirit which comes as a second birth. So every prophet had become Godcontrolled. So all true mystics become possessed of God, either suddenly like St. Paul, or very gently and quietly like St. John. Wind reminded Him of a Divine breath.

It is memorable that Moses, great progenitor of the Hebrews, found direct contact with God on a mountain top in a wild storm of wind, thunder, and lightning. From Mt. Sinai came the ten basic moral laws of the old Testament. And from the Mount of Transfiguration, probably Mt. Hermon, snow-capped all year, north of the Lake, came that Divine guidance to Jesus which directed Him to the cross on Calvary. The revelation of our Bible takes place on mountain tops from Ararat to Zion-that "city set on an hill."10

Do we love nature as spiritually-minded followers of a Mystic Master? Rain is the revivifying action of God. To John Muir, mountains had clouds for halos and wind played upon pine needles as on a harp. We know that trees rise in vibration from willows, birch, and palm, to maple, elm, and oak—so on to pine, spruce, and redwood. So flowers and birds rise in vibra-

tion, giving us increased joy. Amiel wrote in his journal, "Mother of marvels, mystic and tender, why do we not live more in thee?" "Learn," he adds, "how to rejoice at each leaf awakened to life."

This might seem ultra-sensitive and poetic to some; yet the mystic philosopher Jacob Boehme wrote, "All about us is a wonderful Energy we call God." Beauty is a reflection of this. Religion is a capacity to sense fresh beauty with each day's waking—as Jesus did.

"Our elemental esthetic or creative sense must not be dulled by modern habits of life," wrote Dr. Alexis Carrell, "beauty is an inexhaustible source of happiness hidden everywhere."

Does anything give deeper satisfaction than appreciation of the beautiful in form, word, and deed? It is a well spring of inspiration. A health-giving, healing, curative effect imparts itself.

Whenever we see beauty of ocean, sunset, or cloud, loveliness of form, blossom, music, or movement, cadence of words or shimmer of light, we sense God's pervading Presence. He is within sunshine, shade, trunk, and bud; He is within moving water and air, charging the very earth.

To poet, mystic, or sincere disciple of Jesus the Christ, life is beautiful at every turn.

NATURE HAS VAST instruction to impart to man. The door to her mysteries is always ajar to those who rightly desire enlightenment. She does not teach through the use of a textbook, for her lessons are written in all living things. Not every inquiring student shall learn from her, for only the reverent and appreciative are initiated into her secrets. Those who do not see the Loveliness of Life as it exists everywhere cannot hope to sense the superphysical aspects of Nature. They need to learn to revel in the varied manifestations of beauty, color, and design of endless forms of being. When they can feel exultation from observing a perfect flower, mountain crests, or glorious sunsets, they can prepare to apply for tuition in Nature's university.

The foremost principle that Nature stresses in all the areas of this globe is that the sacred flame of Life is active everywhere, both in visible and invisible forms. Life is a holy, dynamic power which gives purpose to all the forms it infuses. Nothing is unworthy; all things are distinguished when they possess the godly life element. Realizing this, we cannot but feel a new respect for the most common things — stones, earth, and weeds.

A friend had this prime lesson

concerning Nature's evaluation of Life brought home to her quite forcefully one day. She was invited into a laboratory where an acquaintance made daily excursions into the wonders of science. He asked her what she would call the object he held in his hand. "It is a block of wood," said the puzzled visitor.

The student of science said, "Yes, it appears to be a piece of dead wood, but just look at it through this instrument, and then tell me what you see."

To the young woman's utter amazement, the magnifying lens disclosed motion in the wood, a slow moving of the grain that was motion, undeniably. It was no longer a specimen of inert wood but a living thing.

With light footsteps this beholder left that laboratory knowing greater reverence than she ever before had felt. She saw God in every fallen branch and leaf she observed on the campus. When passing a muddy puddle of water, the words of Emerson awakened in her memory: "In the scum of things something always sings."

Another noteworthy disclosure Nature invariably imparts to her students is this: Everything which lives either possesses Intelligence or is acted upon by Intelligence, However humble they may be on evolution's ladder, vines possess the innate instinct to seek sunlight, and they extend themselves through dark areas until sunlight is reached. This instinctive knowledge is a form of intelligence. Again, no one can look upon a many-faceted diamond with its flashing of many hues without marveling at the Mind which created it.

A third revelation the Spirit of Nature imparts is that much in the physical realm receives impetus and development through directing Intelligences from the superphysical side of existence. The trees we see, the sweep of the terrain, and the weather we enjoy, are all acted upon by higher dimensional Minds which work under unchangeable laws to keep the earth inhabited. In fact, all living things in Nature are touched by Intelligences whose missions revolve around their growth, development, and awakenment. In admiration of the forms we behold, we want to remember to salute those God-commissioned Beings who dwell on planes invisible to our physical perception. By saluting Them and appreciating Their ministrations we shall draw into a closer bond of acquaintanceship with these busy Servers.

Go to National Parks, not alone to see the outer beauty that they hold, but also to sense the inner Presences that guard and permeate the locality. You will gain much more from your pilgrimages by including a spiritual awareness of the Loving Minds that make the Nature Shrines places of peace.

Just as you find a different variey of trees, shrubs, or flowers in various areas, so do you come in contact with Nature Beings whose appearance, emanation, and service differ from range to range. Let your inner faculties of intuition and perception identify the invisible powers enveloping the places you visit. One forest will be charged with healing energies which are especially invigorating to the etheric body. Another mountain fastness will possess a strong current of reverence for God. Lake regions are usually attuned to radiations of peace. The open desert country quickens keenness of mind. These contrasting vibrations are largely due to the type of Beings which ensoul the various territories.

Because Mt. Lassen in Northern California is a volcanic site the Nature Spirits there are Fire and Earth Beings. Zion National Park contains great stately Angels of power whereas, not many miles away, Bryce Canyon National Park is inhabited by Presences which are particularly gentle and loving. At Mt. Rainier the whole country is dominated by the superior force of the advanced ego known as the Lord of the Mountain. The radiations of this national forest are very powerful, spiritually. Yet, hosts of human beings are not aware of them because of their own insensitiveness to high currents.

There are those who, knowing

of the superphysical aspect of Nature, appeal to God's Spirit in these Intelligences to help mankind. Indians are aware of these benevolent forces. In June 1936, the Navajos of Arizona prayed for much-needed rain, and it came within two hours in answer to their supplications. A month later, the Sioux Indians of South Dakota entreated the Rain Devas to send them showers. They had a response in a matter of minutes. We should pray for the particular weather that is needed in our community. We address our prayers to the Eternal God Spirit in this way:

"Infinite and Absolute Spirit, bless our region, and every community on earth which needs it, with showers of rain. Empower the Angels of Rain to replace the Angels of Calm during this period of necessity. For Thy answer we give thanks and praise in Christ's Name. Amen."

Those who realize they may ask for Nature's assistance see evidences of its responsiveness on every hand. One farmer prayed for rains and a good crop. He was answered with the best crop he had ever grown in his twenty-two years of farming.

Nature tells us that we can learn more of God by observing Him through His handiwork. She promises to initiate us into the wonders of Life when we appreciate Life around us everywhere-when our veneration for the Supreme Spirit includes the visible and invisible regions of being. She speaks to us in realization of this kind, "Look about you and profit by all you see. Whatever of good you find represented, you can become. Your character can be as strong as yonder stalwart pine. The light of day and the peace of night can radiate from your heart. Bless everything you behold and be prepared to receive my message."

True understanding of the wonders of Nature is evidenced by Elizabeth Browning in her words:

"Every common bush aftre with God,

But only he who sees takes off his shoes."

Novena for Becoming God-Centered

(Editor's Note: Prior to the 1946 Annual Pilgrimage, the author dedicated nine consecutive morning meditations to a Novena of Preparation. Soon afterward, during Pilgrimage week, she discovered a striking similarity in the teachings she had received in meditation to the main theme of the Pilgrimage lessons. You may use these excerpts from her Novena as a pattern for your own study periods for nine days.)

First Day

TO BE AWARE of your own God-Self, you must remain centered in God. When thought is turned completely on this center of your being, the spiritual identity as a God-Being becomes the true center. From this center, all the inner and outer experiences of life take their true place and are seen for their relative values.

The "Kingdom of God" lies in this heart of your being. In the Causal world the true center is always recognized and known. If the individual considers life from any lower plane, either the mental, emotional, or physical, it is immediately moving out of center and becoming unbalanced and distorted. The Kingdom of God is balance and harmony.

In this lies the solution to all problems: It is absolutely necessary to arrive at the Soul Level (Causal Plane) and view each difficulty from this eternal elevation. Peace exists on this high plane, and all problems find their solution in peace and in forgetfulness of the little self. Become God-Centered.

Second Day

TRUE FREEDOM EXISTS in God. It is the *little* self that is bound and limited. To remove the bonds it is only necessary to let the *True* Self take charge of one's life.

Releasement is two-fold: First, releasement of all persons and problems; and second, releasement of

the great Inner Self.

Habits are often strong bonds; you are chained by place and circumstances, you are slave to emotions and appetites, and you are caught and held in certain lines of thinking.

In meditation search out the jailers that hold you. Rise to your highest spiritual plane and there release them and let them go. Pray regularly that your releasement be complete and that you be permanently freed. Ask for guidance for new plans that will change and alter your life so that the old, binding ideas and routines shall be broken.

Be more quiet and tranquil; do not rush into things—tasks or conversations. Take your time. Of all problems and weaknesses say, "Lord, I am greater than this."

Release yourself from all old

thoughts and habits.

Third Day

WHEN YOU ALIGN your real Self with the God-Source, all the shadows of life—its sorrows, pain, and uncertainties—are lost in His Light. Strength and self-assurance make you eager to undertake your duties. You know that you are adequate to undertake your life work and to do it wonderfully and successfully.

The sense of completion—of being filled where you were empty ends all hungers and longings. All hurry and empty strivings drop away as you place yourself in your

Divine Center.

And what is the Center? It is the consciousness of your own God-Spirit—the knowing that you are God-engendered, God-mided, and God-illumined, and that God-in-you will fulfill your needs and your destiny.

A great peace calms the emotions and the mind, and you know that all is right in your life. There is courage and strength for the problem at hand. There is joy in living and doing. God is with you and makes you content. No need to seek release when living in the God-Center for there can be no fetters nor bars. You are free. Align yourself with God, daily and hourly.

Fourth Day

IN THE STILLNESS of the God Presence you recognize your God-Spirit. All is calm—an eternal calm. The Kingdom of God has never known storms or trouble. These are only on the planes of the lower self.

It is necessary to form habits of thought to keep the consciousness more firmly fixed in the eternal kingdom of spirit. When Jesus had mastered this and lived in the constant awareness of the Father, He said, "I have overcome the world."

Release all problems and live only in the *Now*. In one, small instant of time you can hold the realization of God and His Kingdom and of your own God-Self as be-

longing to this Kingdom.

You can and do release every person and every problem. God knows of them and how to care for them. All will be perfected. You have only this beautiful moment to live gloriously and jóyously. You, too, have overcome the world. You live only in the Now.

Fifth Day

BE GREAT. LIFT your love to that high level that is above personalities. Love everyone, always. Love the good that they stand for and the good that they do. All human beings have their frailties—their unperfected areas in development. Be understanding and loving when you see these. The God-Centered person neither condemns nor becomes personally involved, but is just and compassionate. When someone as-



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An Experiment In Music

I SPENT TWO and a half hours of piano practice this morning, mostly on the Warsaw Concerto which a pupil is studying—as I must keep a jump ahead of her! First I marked the problem passages that, if not executed perfectly, would spoil the musical flow. I set the metronome at fifty—very, very slow —and played each sixteenth note to that slow, monotonous beat. At a snail's pace, unhurried, the right finger on the right key, practice begun—the goal in mind, precision, perfection, mastery of the entire concerto. Little by little the metronome was moved to faster tempo, a notch at a time. Ease was coming, but only the metronome measured the progress as the fingers comprehended the intricate pattern and began to find their path over the keyboard with assurance. All mechanical so far, then gradually the subconscious mind took over the work, and mind and spirit were free to roam as the hands became automatic in their task.

From the worldly viewpoint, what a waste of time, all this dull practice! What possible value had all this drudgery and effort? As I practiced ploddingly and methodically I began conversing with the soul of my pupil for whom I was

preparing the way. What soul qualities had I used in these two laborious hours of practice? Will power, concentration, self-direction, patience, perseverance. I thought of the patience of God down through the ages, His *infinite* patience! The timing of the stars in their course, the law and order of the universe, this eternity-of-life going on and on from a limitless past to a limitless future, with the present moment being the bridge between.

In my own labors the endless drills, the tedious repetition and and technical performance is finished—and the labor of love becomes a bridge between this world and the invisible. The Spirit of Music suddenly enters in and breathes the breath of life into the performance, and the music now becomes a living, breathing thing. It is no longer outside oneself, but one is possessed by it, enfolded, completely surrounded and at one with the great outpouring of sound. Something of this is then passed on to the pupil to help her appropriate these soul qualities which will make of the dull practice period a shining hour of companionship with God. How to build these same qualities into her character to meet the challenge

passages and intricate problems as she makes her life journey? Everything she learns and masters in this field of music study is preparing her for mastery in the problems of of life, to overcome the difficult life, to bring harmony and beauty into all life's relationships.

That is why I believe music study can be used as one of the greatest character building influences in the life of the child.

JUST WHAT WAS the purport and goal of Christ's teachings? We know that this Emissary proclaimed a message that would change the course of human affairs if it were only accepted and applied as a reality rather than an idealistic belief. The basic objectives of these imperishable doctrines were designed to lift men into a higher level of consciousness—

- Where they would be just as conscious of God as they were of themselves.
- Where they would be in ceaseless communion with those active forces that labored for their good.
- Where health, gladness, prosperity, enlightenment and advancement were continual ex-

- pressions of highly motivated living.
- 4. Where peace would be a lasting experience because men knew themselves as brothers of the same Divine Creative Source.

When we take the illuminating advice of the Christ into our very bearts and live by it, all the negatives in us fall away from the presence of vigorous positives. It is not possible to realize God as equally present everywhere and feel loneliness, panic or despair. These converse attitudes exist only where the Divine Spirit's immediacy is not considered. Jesus taught us to dwell continually in an awareness of God's enfolding Spirit. Regardless of our circumstances, difficulties or

weaknesses, we are urged by our Wayshower to hold steadfastly to God's desire and ability to help us. Releasing our cares to the Eternal Spirit enables the Father to act upon them and upon us. When we give our attention to God ensouling and God indwelling we find courage, strength, wisdom and wondrous assistance flowing into our beings and affairs. Then, whether we must deliver a speech or rebuild our lives, we do our part with high resolve and faith because the Father is enabling and renewing us.

The application of the Christ teaching excludes any attitude but that which is Godly. Walking in the light of the Christ doctrine we follow the pattern of forgiveness, integrity, praise, gratitude and gladness for everything that comes to us—the lessons as well as the conquests. It is no more difficult to follow a single course of spiritual conduct than it is for us to be swayed, torn and tortured by a seesawing between the Christ principles in conduct and the human way. Our choice is to prove the Christ teachings in our own behavior, to face forward and not backward toward the lines of least resistance whose heart-breaking ways we know all too well from past enslavement.

The Christ directs us to that inner state of mind where the spirit within us governs our reactions according to its spiritual nature. So long as our thoughts and feelings are uncontrolled and unsublimated we exhibit pride, selfishness, tension and dependence on persons. We who strive to follow the path of Jesus no longer submit to the tyranny of destructive emotions, since our High Priest illustrated so challengingly the wisdom of checking and transmuting the negative human tendencies.

Clear and confident were the ringing tones of the Christos, "I am the way, the truth and the life." "He that believeth on me, the works that I do shall he do also: and greater works than these shall he do . . ." Jesus referred both to deeds nobly done and to acts of great faith that we should do in His Name. Most of us have accepted the character training of our Exemplar but we have failed, too many of us, to give great service to His cause of elevating the lives of human beings. We have done very little toward perfecting and wielding the powers of spiritual faith. Whether we pledge ourselves to the enlightening of persons, to the sponsoring of the clearance of slums, or to the rehabilitation of individuals we are guided to assist, we must do something for the benefit of humankind if we are to deserve the name of Christians. And in our own lives we must take steadfast hold of faith and use it in such a high way that by healing, protecting, enriching and overcoming, we prove our works by His.

After the ascension of Jesus, John and Peter went to the temple to pray. In nearing a gate called "Beautiful" they heard the cries of

a man calling for assistance. Because he was an invalid the man could not enter the court of the temple but he could beg others for offerings. Begging was this soul's whole purpose in life. John and Peter were looked upon as likely benefactors. Instead of agreeing with his dependent habit Peter said to the man, "Silver and gold have I none but such as I have give I unto thee . . . In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk."

The works and active trustfulness of the disciples inspired other individuals, not yet Masters, to increase their own efforts in the Christ Cause. The world would be a much more wretched one without the noble influence of persons such as St. Francis of Assisi, Florence Nightingale, George Muller and Father Damien who added their unselfish labors to its crucible.

"The natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God; for they are foolishness unto him: neither can he know them for they are spiritually discerned." "But the hour cometh and now is when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth: for the Father seeketh such to worship Him." "God is spirit: and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth." These verses disclose mysticism which the Christ taught to His inner group. They open up an undreamed-of world of spiritual experiences into which Jesus admits His apostles.

The Lord Jesus indicated throughout His ministry that those who approach God spiritually will gain illumination, gifts and powers of a spiritual nature. Job was also of this faith for he declared, "Yet in my flesh shall I see God." It was the belief of Jesus and His disciples that those who regenerated themselves through spiritual devotion would be prepared to be "in communion with the Saints" as well as the Angel Orders mentioned in the New Testament.

This mystical side of the Christ teachings has received but scant attention from the average Christian. Some persons consider this esoteric vein (so noticeable in the Revelations of St. John) to be merely superstition. Instead, these deeper experiences are the natural conclusions of a life consecrated to God. They cause the Christ teachings to lead us from our humanity to our state of Christhood. They also open the gates of knowledge and attunement with those higher attainments and Orders, which are not myths of fancy, but realities in the next dimensions of our unfoldments in Christship.

Paul well knew of the inner happenings which occur to an individual who follows the Christos. Because he had known a few of these enlightenments he admonished us, "I travail in birth again until Christ be formed in you." Regardless as to who or what we are, now is the time to make the teachings of the

Christ a reality in our lives! From the moment the realization of the significance of these verities awakens us, until we have accomplished the goal to which the Lord Jesus directs us, may we all be permitted to say, "I was not disobedient unto the heavenly vision."

A pertinent question—

Do Your Habits Need Watching?

PUBLIUS said, "Powerful, indeed, is the empire of habit."

When habits force us-involuntarily to perform acts or to think thoughts which are detrimental to our highest good, that is the time when habits need watching.

When we use bad habits as an excuse for lack of accomplishment, that is the time when habits need watching.

When we begin to boast about the acquiring of a bad habit or fool ourselves into believing that it is smart to be "one of the crowd," that is the time when habits need watching. Furthermore, these instances prove that we are fostering habits which need changing!

Psychologists believe that it is just as easy to develop beneficial habits as it is to become the victim of detrimental ones which rob us of happiness and progress in life. The practice of habits which bring mental health is even more enjoyable than the practice of those negative habits which lead to mental

stagnation and ill-health. But man is not always willing to submit himself to change until he is convinced that his investment of time and effort will prove valuable to himself.

As in the life of Vash Young, a drunkard sinks to the lowest depths of self-debasement when suddenly he sees what life can become. A spiritual awakening occurs, freeing him from enslavement and lifting him into a new life of resolution and worthwhile service.

A grouchy perfectionist selfrighteously scolds his friends so constantly that he finds himself living alone and disliking it. Realizing his plight, he decides to form the habit of looking at his friends and acquaintances through eyes of humility and genuine compassion.

Unwise food and tobacco habits are seldom changed until the resulting ill-health reminds us of our need for a carefully planned diet and freedom from nicotine.

Busy men and women fail to see the importance of regular meditation and prayer until faced by some insurmountable obstacle or a disconcerting problem.

Through the lack of understanding of the laws of habit, men who would otherwise be outstandingly successful sink to utter failure, and women who have the potential qualities for a charming life of accomplishment degenerate into social misfits.

During infancy and childhood the formation of our habits is dependent upon the guidance of our parents and teachers. Later in life, however, we are thrown upon our own and we must face the task of developing our mental habits.

It is imperative that we learn more about the tremendous influence of habits upon our everyday life. You may not have realized it, but you are largely a creature of repetition. If, when in private, you form traits you would not wish revealed in public, sooner or later you will be embarrassed by what you will say or do in an unguarded mo-If you have carelessly allowed personal customs to form without discrimination and wise selection, your life is like a ship without a helmsman. You would never knowingly board a ship without a helmsman—yet, how much more valuable is the vessel of your life! How much attention are you giving to the steering of your mind and the forming of good, beneficial habits? It is highly essential that you understand and rightly direct this potent force which can either help or harm you. It is one of the most rewarding studies that anyone can undertake. It should be a required subject in every training program.

What is the basis of habit? To what part of the mind is it related? The mental, emotional, and physical responses which we call habits find their motivating power in the portion of the mind termed the Instinctive or Subconscious Mind. Every man is created equal; and every man is furnished with an infallible agent of repetition that never sleeps—that is on the job twenty-four hours a day. Since the Instinctive Mind is incapable of returning to us anything with which we have not first supplied it, the responsibility rests upon us to furnish it with the impulses we want to receive back from it.

Dr. Rolf Alexander, in his book called "The Doctor Alone Can't Cure You," explains with remarkable clarity and revelation how the Instinctive Mind works tirelessly and devotedly to changing the body cells and organic functions to match the thoughts, positive or negative, which are held in the mind.

Dr. Coue's method really works! By the use of affirmation you can transform your whole life. If you think health and success ten minutes and then for the rest of the day affirm just the opposite in your body, actions and attitudes, your subconscious will act upon the predominant suggestion which is negative.

Your habit formations are similarly influenced. Each repetition of an act cuts a deeper groove on the "dictaphone" record of the subconscious, enabling it to play back its instinctive, habit response with greater clarity and intensity.

When you drive your automobile into the city, your subconscious mind does most of the driving. If it did not function, you would be a "nervous wreck" in a short time. Over a period of many driving experiences, repetition of movements and responses has taught the subconscious to guide your bodily actions in pressing the brake pedal, disengaging the clutch, and shifting the gears without conscious thought on your part. Have you ever noticed a back seat driver pressing his foot on the floor of the car as though he had some invisible brake pedal under his foot? The subconscious mind controlled his action.

Every time a stream cuts a deeper bed in the sand and rocks its likelihood of remaining in that channel is increased. It is the same with each repetition of thought or deed. In memorization work, this principle is active. Intense thought is like a rushing stream. It cuts deeper into the created channel or groove. Less intensive thought is like a gentle stream which must pass over the same route many more times in order to penetrate as deeply as the rushing stream or the intense thought.

If the groove is shallow, a thought strongly motivated by the Divine Will will not follow the previously created groove but will instead create a new pathway inaugurating a new habit response which will have precedence over the lesser one. If the behavior pattern is cut deeply by many repetitions, a weak thought will follow the path of least resistance and fail to make a change in the direction of the deeper habit pathway.

Edwin Booth never allowed his body to assume one ungraceful pose because he knew that off-stage habits would become on-stage acts. Some motion picture stars install large mirrors in their homes in order to watch themselves critically and to correct immediately any tendency to assume unbecoming poses.

If you don't manage your body, your subconscious mind will. Therefore it is important to train the subconscious to do a good job so that when you are off guard it will not embarrass you. You wish to train it so that it will guide your life along lines of healthy growth and happy progress.

With more knowledge of the power with which we have to deal in the establishment of good thought and action habits, it is easier to intelligently plan our work and strategy. When we wish to replace negative habits with beneficial ones, it is helpful to consider these

five points:

Recognize the Value of Change

Study the lives of successful men and women, and you will find that one of the main keys to their achievement is their well-formed habit of positive thinking.

The cadet from West Point has been thoroughly drilled in snappy posture — straight shoulders, carriage erect. When he graduates with a commission he is the very essence of poise and is a living example of the value of good habit development through a positive training program.

Ralph Waldo Trine was speaking of what any individual can achieve through the control of his habits when he said, "As man is in tune with the Infinite, he rises out of his own garden spot and mingles with the universe."

We believe that the coming man will no more allow negative thoughts of discord, pessimism, and disease to enter his mind than he would take poisonous liquids into his stomach.

The person who has formed the habit of thinking cheerful, hopeful, positive thoughts has a creative power that the pessimist never possesses. To recognize the value of changing from negative to positive habits gives one the incentive to search for ways to accomplish such a change.

Your Ability to Change

It is possible to change the character of the mind by habitually controlling the thought.

Attention, controlled by the divine will and directed by higher judgment, can so discipline the mind that it will dwell on higher ideals until positive thinking has become a habit.

When a man realizes that he is master of his thoughts, he knows that he can develop those habits he wants to affect his life. The subconscious is sure to return to him exactly the habit pictures and impulses he sends to it.

Determination Is an Aid

In order to achieve the proper degree of intensity in our right thinking, it is necessary for us to be highly motivated—linked up with high idealism. We can gain power of purpose by aligning ourselves with the omnipotent power of God within—the Divine Will within us. We must keep a goal in sight and keep working toward it. Soon obstacles will diminish and we shall achieve our objective.

Epictetus said, "Ordain for thyself forthwith a certain form and type of conduct which thou shalt maintain, both alone and, when it may chance, among men."

We can become masters of our thoughts; and thoughts are the dynamic recording devices which set habits in motion. Therefore we can become masters of the kingdom of our habits and captains of our lives.

Wise Planning

Wise planning enables you to distribute the load of new habit development at a pace you can certainly maintain. Set a reasonable goal, and then determine with intense desire to achieve that milepost. When that is reached, set your next marker at a reasonable distance and renew your determined pledge. Each time you keep your promise to yourself you will gain more confidence. The habit of keeping your vows will make the next assignment easier.

Knowledge of Progress

Knowledge of progress along the path toward complete mastery of your subconscious responses is helpful. It is encouraging to know that some growth is visible. must not become self-satisfied, nor over-confident. If we have missed the mark, we must aim a little higher, truer, and profit by the mistakes we made in previous attempts. Through trial and error we shall attain our objective. Though we fall time and time again, we shall succeed if we keep pressing on toward the ideal we have set as our goal.

It is humiliating to admit we possess a bad habit and have not found the strength of will to overcome it. Every time we nurse a weakness, we invite it to stay. Why be bogged down by a bad habit?

There is a saying: "Be kind to the old folks." Have you ever thought of being kind to the man or woman you will be in the distant tomorrow? If you want to be kind to yourself, try this training program:

Replace now old negative tendencies with new, vibrant, building habits.

Form the custom of producing beautiful pictures in your mind.

Start a "bad-habit" elimination fast. For one week or one month, deny your subconscious the right to indulge in health-destroying habits, temper and emotional tantrums, unwholesome thoughts, disease and poverty fears. Instead, allow the Christ-within to assume control.

Inaugurate a new, positive program of inspired living. Vision health, happiness, prosperity, love, and wisdom. Think and speak only of the positive, good conditions you wish to manifest! Then, you will find your habit life will undergo a remarkable transformation. You will be amazed at the ease with which your body and affairs resume their normal, healthy, joyous status!
