THE STORY BEHIND THE COVER

Early in June, 1965 an increase in UFO sightings occurred first in Europe and then in the United States. The sighting of strange objects increased with each day until the night of Sunday, August 1st, 1965 when several thousand unidentifiable objects were sighted over the central part of the United States.

Radio and television programs were interrupted as persons dashed outside to get a glimpse of the strange objects. Squadrons of eighteen disks were sighted over Brazil's Parana state and Tulsa, Oklahoma. Ten UFO's were sighted over Lake Superior flying in a V-formation at 9,000 mph. Four UFO's were sighted over Oklahoma City and Cape Kennedy flying in a diamond formation, 6,000 mph. Their origin was unknown.

The UFO's appeared to be bright lights, but when observed through telescopes had a large dome on top and were almost flat on bottom. They were estimated to be some 40-60 feet across and flying at altitudes of 10,000 to 22,000 ft. in close and loose formations. They flashed red, green, blue and white lights.

The spectacular color photo used on the cover was obtained by Alan Smith, Tulsa Oklahoma at approximately 1:45 a.m. on August 2, 1965. IIOUFO first learned about the photo approximately 10 days after it was taken, but was unable to obtain it for evaluation. The UFO changed color from white, to red to blue green. The lights pulsated with a high whining sound. The UFO moved in jerky manner. When the sound would get louder, the light would get brighter and the object would speed up.

Photo analysis by John Gumm, IIOUFO Scientific Panel member and Oklahoma Journal photographer showed that the camera had a focus lens with a shutter speed of 1-50th of a second and a relative aperture of F:11. The film used was Kodacolor X having speed of ASA 64. Approximate focal length of the camera lens is 2¼ inches or 60mm.

"This gives the object an arbitrary size of 50 feet indiameter. Measuring the image size on the film (4.5mm) the object would have to be less than a mile from the camera." "Measuring the density of the image on the film," Gumm continued, "the brightness of the object could be relatively twice that of a full moon." Alan's father who has worked for American Airlines for 17 years estimated the object to be approximately 50 ft. across flying about 5-8000 ft.

'Saucer' Sighted

TEXARKANA, Ark. (Staff)—A red, yellow and blue object which "seemed to alternate colors" has been spotted here by two local women.

A sighting Friday that lasted nearly one minute was reported by Mrs. J. E. Magee and her sister, Mrs. Lucille Paul. "It was about one-third as large as the sun," Mrs. Magee said.

The single report was the first since an epidemic of sightings plagued the area in August, according to the editor of the *Texarkana Gazette*.

Reds Fire Moonport

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet Union Monday launched a space station weighing nearly 1 1/2 tons "towards the moon" to mark the eighth anniversary of its pioneer Sputnik 1 satellite.

The official Tass news agency said the moon shot, named Luna 7, was 41,813 miles from earth late Monday and was moving in a trajectory "close to the prescribed one."

Luna 7 was the third Soviet moon shot this year. One of the earlier probes was an admitted failure and the second also apparently failed.

Soviet authorities did not announce what Luna 7 was expected to accomplish beyond scientific exploration. But Western experts speculated it might attempt a soft landing on the moon.

U.S. Insane, Welch Claims

The founder and president of the John Birch Society Monday night described the U.S. as one vast insane asylum and charged the country's civil rights movement is Communist-inspired.

Robert Welch's remarks met with loud applause, standing ovations and cheers of nearly 700 persons at a society meeting in Municipal Auditorium.

Speaking on "A Touch of Sanity," Welch told the audience, "The whole country is one vast insane asylum and its letting the worst patients run the place."

Welch dwelled at length on Algeria's struggle for freedom and independence, paralleling it with the Negro revolution in America.

"The civil rights movement is being developed, promoted, controlled and run by Communists for Communist purposes," said Welch. His remarks "met with audience cheers."

Welch insisted the rash of Negro riots also are Communist-backed and designed "to terrorize Negroes from opposing" the civil rights movement.

He said the scenes in Harlem and the South do not make sense "unless you see what communism is trying to accomplish." Operating under the guise of a Negro revolution, he said, the result is the

killing of thousands of whites by a few criminal Negroes that the Communists can inflame.

"The Communists have no interest in the welfare of the Negro," said Welch.

The gray-haired Birch Society leader said that 95 per cent of all people supporting the civil rights movement do so for idealistic reasons. He added, "If 20 per cent of the American people realized that the civil rights movement is part of the Communist conspiracy, it would collapse in three months."

The duty of the John Birch Society is to bring basic sanity back to the American people, he said.

First Night Color Shot Of Flying Saucer Bared

At approximately 1:45 a.m. on August 2, Alan Smith, 14, standing in the back yard of his Tulsa home, pointed his small camera toward the darkened sky and clicked the shutter.

The image he recorded on the color negative may become the most famous photograph of our age.

Young Smith was sighting his camera at an unidentified flying object in the sky. He and his father had observed the UFOs August 1 and this night were prepared.

The image he got is believed to be the first night color picture of what is commonly called a flying saucer. The picture is eerie. The consequences of the one-in-a-million shot are far-reaching.

The negative shows a yellow, blue and whitish egg-shaped object, clearly defined in the sky. Protruding from the object are three tiny fingers which many have speculated may be the propulsion system. They could have been something else.

The picture was taken on a night when a rash of UFOs were sighted in Tulsa, Oklahoma City, Norman and other places throughout the southwest.

These were explained away by the Air Force as stars, planets, light reflections and even airplanes moving in the sky.

Smith's picture resembles most of these. This is how he describes the events leading up to the picture:

"The first night it came over fairly low, but so fast that it just looked like a bright light—about 25 times the size of a star—moving from north to south."

"There had been a rash of sightings of unexplained objects for a week in Oklahoma—particularly in Tulsa—but this was the closest UFO that my family had ever seen."

Alan said the second night he and his family were ready. He had loaded his official Boy Scout camera (620) with Kodachrome X high speed film.

"This time it moved from

west to east. From my back yard, it looked to be the size of a baseball or soccer ball. "It again appeared as a ball of light, but moved slower than it did the first night. It was changing color from white, to red to blue-green. It's light pulsed with a high whining sound on living from it. As the sound grew louder, the light was brighter. It gave us the creeps."

Five persons in the immediate vicinity saw the object that second night.

They included Alan; his father, A. J. Smith, 43, a Tulsa electrician; his sister, when it was almost directly overhead—about 11 American Airlines in Tulsa;

his sister, Sheri J. Holt, 18; Sherry's husband, Tom Holt, 18, and a neighbor boy, Darrell Brimmer, 15. Also's family lives at 4719 S. 29 W. Tulsa. The Smiths' family lives at 4715 S. 29 W.

Smith, his son and daughter and her husband and the neighbor youngster all gave the same basic description of the light in the sky but pointed out that it did not appear the same as it does in Alan's color picture.

"It was just a blob of light," his sister says. When it was almost directly overhead—about 11

90,000 Hear Pope's Mass In Ball Park

Peace Plea Of Pontiff Stirs Crowd

NEW YORK (UPI)—Pope Paul VI climaxed a day of spectacle and emotion Monday night with a ritual of exquisite beauty in the bursting arena of Yankee stadium focused on his frail figure in the white robes of peace.

The appeal of the sky pontiff brought crowds of at least four million to the sidewalk of New York's great melting pot and 90,000 more jammed the stadium to see the pilgrim Pope of the Roman Catholic Church celebrate mass on the spot where Babe Ruth held sway.

Paul came to this most poignant of the world's cities with a cry for peace. And, for the most, the crowds were curiously subdued and in awe at the sight of the pontiff, his face occasionally wreathed in a smile and his arms extended in embrace or raised in benediction.

His stay came to a stirring climax in the cold night at the great ball arena, packed with the greatest crowd in its 42-year history as men and women of all faiths watched the Pope celebrate the mass.

The spectacle was telecast throughout the United States and sent by Early Bird Satellite live to a potential 44 million viewers in Europe and behind the Iron Curtain.

Standing in an open car, the Pope circled one and a half times around the stadium more accustomed to the likes

Pope Says Peace Key To Survival

NEW YORK (UPI)—Pope Paul VI warned the United Nations during a historic 14-hour visit to the United States Monday that mankind must find permanent peace or perish. President Johnson said the pontiff's peace pilgrimage "may be just what the world needs."

Crowds of at least four million hailed the pontiff as he made history's first papal visit to the United States. He came here as a pilgrim to plead for peace before the United Nations; but the emotional highspot of the visit was a mass Monday night at Yankee Stadium.

It was a long and tiring day for the frail 68-year-old pontiff who was up before dawn at the Vatican and arrived here at 7:25 a.m. CST. Before his departure Monday night he completed a rigorous schedule probably never before equaled by a reigning Pope.

The Pope's plane lifted off at 9:29 p.m. CST.

He rode in a 24-mile motorcade through New York, spoke at the United Nations, conferred with the President, made 11 speeches, talked with Jewish and Protestant leaders, celebrated a mass and delivered a sermon at Yankee Stadium and visited the Vatican pavilion at the World's Fair.

He was greeted by a sea of flags and cheers of the world's fair.

Warm Up Due Today

Crowd Subdued

4 Million Cheer Pope

NEW YORK (UPI)—A shy man in the white robes of peace came to this most poignant of the world's cities today and smiled through sidewalks of New York with a vast but subdued crowd of more than four million.

Police Commissioner Vincent Broderick estimated in early evening that 4 million people had seen the Pope during the day.

The sight of the frail figure of Pope Paul VI, his face occasionally wreathed in a smile and his arms extended in embrace or raised in benediction, brought a sense of awe to the great melting pot.

There was a scene of standing applause that brought tears to many eyes inside usually hushed St. Patrick's Cathedral.

Flying Saucers: Where Do They Come From?

Editor's Note: This is the first of a series of informational articles on flying saucers written by Hayden Hewes, Oklahoma City, director of Interplanetary Intelligence and Unidentified Flying Objects, Office of Defense Organization to determine the origin of unidentified flying objects.

"I have examined all the arguments supporting and denying the existence of flying saucers, and it is my conclusion that UFOs do exist, are very real and are spacecrafts from another or more than one other solar system. They are possibly manned by intelligent observers who are members of a race carrying long-range scientific investigations of our earth for centuries."

This is the comment of Prof. Hermann Oberth, an internationally known authority on rockets and space, in his publication, "Unidentified Flying Saucers Revisited." Agreeing with him is Prof. Charles A. Mancy, head of the Department of Physics, Delaware College, Ohio. He maintains that "after intensive, unbiased study of UFOs or flying saucer phenomena over a period of several years, I am convinced that there is massive documentary evidence confirming UFO reality."

Their tremendous speed, intricate maneuvers, unique shapes and other outstanding features prove that they are not earth-made," he concluded in the same review.

Today, as we explore outer space, some of our leading scientists and astronomers agree that millions of other worlds must exist and that some may contain civilizations further advanced than our own.

Some contend the phenomenon of unidentified flying objects (UFOs), commonly called the "flying saucer," is a manifestation of other civilizations. Others, with equal conviction, believe that the explanation for their existence lies in the realm of the natural sciences.

What has been said has led to the resolution of this controversial question: "The debate centers around the degree and type of proof needed to determine the answer."

First, what constitutes proof? Does a UFO have to land on the Pentagon lawn or is it proof when an authentic photograph is obtained in the presence of five witnesses (as was the case with the photograph published Tuesday morning by The Journal), while several thousand persons are reporting the objects over a wide-state area? (Is it proof when a ground radar station detects a UFO, sends a ray to intercept it, only to have the UFO streak away at phenomenal speed?)

The answer to these questions may be the solution to the UFO mystery. If it is assumed that UFOs exist, as Alberti Chop, public

affairs director of National Aeronautics and Space Administration says, "I've been convinced for a long time that the 'saucer' are interplanetary. We're being watched by beings from outer space." (Article, U. S. Commemoration of the UFO Sightings, by Maj. Donald K. Keyboe)

The first question then arises: what are they?

Air Force regulation 200.2, of Sept. 14, 1960, defines UFOs as "aerobatic objects which by performance aerodynamic characteristics, or unusual features, does not conform to any presently known aircraft or missile type, or which cannot be positively identified as familiar objects. Familiar objects include balloons, astronomical bodies, meteorological and optical phenomena, birds, kites and so forth."

A common characteristic of a UFO is that of a "saucer" shape, although elongated cigar-shaped, lens-shaped and egg-shaped objects are reported frequently.

The questions also proposed here are: "Where are they from and why are they here?"

Theories on their origin are many. Dr. Donald Menzel, professor of astronomy at Harvard, has theorized in his book, "Flying Saucers" 1953, that the vast majority of UFO reports can be explained as phenomena of a natural origin, such as temperature inversions and planets refracted in the atmosphere, misinterpreted through misperception or ignorance of the observer.

Dr. Menzel feels that most UFO reports are sincere and well-meaning but feels that a thorough study of reports will reveal a natural basis of origin.

Many agree with Dr. Menzel but also believe that some UFOs are machines constructed and controlled by human beings, as a government top secret project. In 1960 the navy built and flew a saucer-shaped craft called the X-47. In 1960, the U. S. Air Force financed the building of a saucer-shaped craft in Canada but this was abandoned as a failure in late 1961. A third theory is that UFOs are life-forms or animals crea-

tures indigenous to rarified atmosphere or space itself, while still others believe that there is a subterranean world on this planet. Others believe that UFOs are from a different time, a different dimension.

One of the most popular theories on the origin of UFOs is that they are alien-constructed vehicles under some form of intelligent control.

Dr. Harrison Brown of the California Inst. of Technology and former secretary of the National Academy of Sciences is reported to have said that recent investigation indicates that thousands of planets in the Milky Way might be inhabited by beings who are the intellectual equivalent of man.

His conclusions were based on calculations indicating that very rarely every variable or should have a planetary system. Some of the planets within our galaxy are believed to have the right amount of life-giving light and may possibly have temperatures similar to those of earth and Mars.

The prominent Soviet astronomer, Dr. V. J. Krasovskiy, claims that "Personally, I cannot venture to categorically reject the somewhat fantastic possibility that rational beings may even be living on Mars."

Dr. Carl Sagan, an astrophysicist, is reported to have said that "earth may have been visited many times by various galactic civilizations during geological times and it is not out of the question that artifacts of these visits still exist."

Rear Admiral Delmer Fabry, in the article on comorbidity of UFO sightings, is quoted as saying that "reliable reports indicate that unidentified objects are coming into our atmosphere at very high speeds and that they are controlled."

Vice Admiral R. H. Hillenboester, former CIA official, is reported to have said that he believes the "unknown objects are operating under intelligent control. It is imperative that we learn where they come from."

'Flying Saucers' Seen Since Biblical Times

Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of articles on flying saucers as cited by Hayden Hewes, director of the Interplanetary Intelligence and Unidentified Flying Objects, Office of Defense Organization.

Since the beginning of time strange objects have been sighted in the sky by almost all civilizations of the earth, reports indicate.

Before Atlantis allegedly was submerged beneath the Atlantic ocean in 9600 B.C. airframe aerial vehicles were reportedly described. Called the "vima" or "vima," they resemble the UFOs of today. W. S. Elliott who, in 1895 wrote "The Story of Atlantis," describes these "vimas" as, apparently seamless and perfectly smooth, and they glided in the dark as if coated with luminous paint."

UFO sightings also were recorded in the Royal Annals of Thutmose III of Egypt (1504-1450 B. C. in ancient Egypt. The objects were described as a "circle of fire that was coming in the sky, had no heat, it had no voice. They were more numerous than anything. They were sailing in the sky, to the limits of heaven . . . after supper they went up

higher directed toward the South." The "Ramagana," classic of ancient India, describes another type of aerial device called "De Nar Calatral" or "pusaka." "The car resembling a bright cloud in the sky, is in the city of Lanka, the car rose up into the higher atmosphere." In the old language of Sanskrit, "Samarangana Sutrodhara" described the transportation of his sky in the following words, "Four strong mercury containers

must be built into the interior structure. When these have been heated by controlled fire from the iron containers the vima develops thunder-power through the mercury. And at once becomes pear! in the sky." It goes on to say, "By means of these machines, human beings can fly in the air and heavenly beings can come down to earth."

Such volumes of early history as the "Tibetan, and Kantua, P. C. Roy's "Drom Parva," the 3000 year old "Alahabara," the "Vishnu Purana," A. Bailey's "A Treatise on Cosmic Fire," and the "Emperor's Cap-Histories" relate UFO reports that nearly parallel current reports.

In more recent times, we may possibly find the greatest evidence of UFOs in the Holy Bible, in the First Chapter of the book of Ezekiel we find such an account.

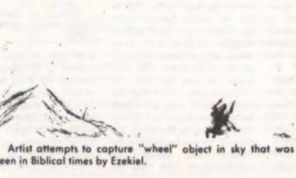
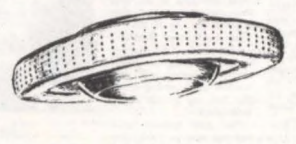
Verses 6-7-10-11 and verse 15 "The appearance of the wheels and their work was like unto the colour of a beryl, and their appearance and their work was as it were a wheel in the middle of a wheel."

It is unusual that the BOSTON TRAVELER on May 5, 1952 carried the story from the sighting of a UFO, "A whining sound was noticed and a bright silvery object descended at great speed then hovered in midair, it appeared to be a large rotating ring with the sky visible through the center."

Verses 18, reads: "Their rings, they were so high that they were dreadful; and their rings were full of eyes round about them four."

As the civilizations of the earth grew and developed, so did an increase in the number of UFO reports. An excellent account of ancient UFO observations can be found in the book "Flying Saucers on the Attack," by Harold T. Wilkins, the Citadel Press.

In more recent times, on Nov. 15, 1899, an enormous "star" white, then red and blue, was seen moving like a kite in the sky, near the moon, at 7 p. m. The sighting, occurred over Douire, France. That was 66 years ago, two months ago apparently the same or a similar object was again seen and photographed by Alan Smith, of Tulsa.

If we grant as a premise that UFOs have material reality, we must then contemplate what motivation may prompt their actions. Basically, three theories have been advanced to explain the existence of the strange objects on earth. The first theory contends that UFOs are in and about the atmosphere of earth for the purpose of reconnaissance. G. D. Fletcher, of the Kenya Astronomical Association, postulates a theory that flying saucers "are steadily mapping every part of our earth," much like our Ranger and Mariner space projects are doing. The supposition is that since the mid-1840's, because of nuclear weapons tests and other similar activities, the beings who are responsible for the activities of the UFOs are more interested in what

is transpiring on earth than they were formerly. Have they become concerned that we are going to bring our wars and nuclear weapons into a peaceful space society?

Hypothesis No. 2 is that the UFOs are desirous of engaging in hostilities against the people of earth. Flying saucer researcher George D. Fawcett writes: "It is my present belief, in keeping with the Air Force announcement that the UFOs are serious business, that they have a right to be because the flying saucers are hostile."

Fawcett bases his case on the listing of a number of incidents involving UFOs which have occurred throughout the years. Included in these cases involving illness on the part of observers and of apparent harmful effects of UFOs on aircraft.

A third and more startling hypothesis is that the denizens of other worlds are desirous of establishing a colony on the planet Earth. Who is to say which, if any of these theories is correct? Are these transport vehicles to the planet earth? Are there reasons for at-

tack? It appears that the first concept is best, reconnaissance. Just as we ourselves study the microscopic world to see what exists there, it appears that somebody is studying us.

Ufology, the scientific investigation of unidentified flying objects, is the purpose of the Interplanetary Intelligence of Unidentified Flying Objects.

Saucers Viewing 'War Games'?

It appears there was an increase in the number of UFO reports during World War II. In the winter of 1940-41, hundreds of allied airmen had encountered flying discs and spheres which were nicknamed "foo-fighters" over Nazi-occupied Europe.

In one case, a B29 bomber reportedly was followed by a formation of 15 discs. Crews at first feared they were a new Nazi weapon, but there was no attack.

Later, a B29 crew reported seeing a similar object while on a bombing run to Japan. After the war, American intelligence found the Nazis and Japanese were as puzzled as the U.S. was. The UFO sightings were blamed on "pilot fatigue" and delusions.

In 1946 the "foo-fighter" radio was kept alive by reported sightings over Europe, at sea and even over the U.S. On Aug. 1, 1948, Capt. Jack E. Puchert, of the army air camp, sighted a large rocket-shaped object over Florida's east coast.

Two years after the first atomic bombs were exploded, hundreds of high-speed, fast-moving discs and rocket-type machines were reported all over the world. In the United States more than 200 were reported by air force, navy, and airline pilots, by missile experts, airport tower operators and other trained observers.

A businessman from Boise, Idaho, who was also an amateur aviation enthusiast, was flying his small plane to Yakima, Wash. His name was Kenneth Arnold and the date was June 30, 1947. As he approached Mt. Rainier, he cruised along admiring the magnificent peaks. Suddenly he said he saw a chain of saucer-like aircraft speeding across the mountain tops. He saw them for about three minutes. He estimated the objects were flying at a distance of 30-35 miles beyond him.

"THEY WERE a chain of saucer-like things at least five miles long, swooping in and out of the high mountains. They were flat like a piepan and no shiny they reflected the sun like a mirror. I never saw anything so fast." Arnold guessed their speed to be 3,200 m.p.h. This was when the term "Flying Saucer" was coined.

ON JUNE 22, three days after the Arnold sighting, the air force said, "We have no idea what they are." Seriously concerned, they ordered their pilots to down a UFO for examination, by shooting, or by ramming into it, if it was not identified.

On July 3, 1947 the air force headquarters told the press, "The 'saucers' are hallucinations, an investigation is needed." That Monday at Wright-Patterson AFB, a senior officer said, "The air force is making a serious investigation."

In March, 1950, the Pentagon cleared an article by Commander R. B. McLaughlin, USAF, then in charge of many guided-missile tests at White Sands. Commander McLaughlin discussed several UFO sightings, one of an object tracked 18,000 m.p.h.

SERIOUS CONCERN was fully reactivated as air force headquarters in 1952. This was partly caused by impressive military sightings, including a filmed encounter at White Sands.

And then in 1953 it really broke loose. This year the greatest number of verified UFO sightings were reported. Air Force Secretary Finletter said, "These people are not crackpots; they are seeing something. There are flying saucers sightings the air force are unable to explain."

In New, 1953, the air force was seriously worried by the loss of an F80 jet and its two-man crew. An official statement from Texas AFB said the jet was followed by radar until it merged with an object over Lake Superior. The object was not identified, nor was any trace of the jet or its crew ever found.

UFO SIGHTINGS were in and out of the papers until Nov. 2, 1957 when an increase of "flap" occurred near Leveland, Texas. The UFOs were plentiful. Many UFO researchers believe that the increase in sightings in 1957 was because of the hydrogen bomb tests and that the 1957 increase was caused by man's first major step into space with Sputnik.

Then on June 23, 1958 at Valmado, France, Maurice Masse reported an object on the ground. The UFO was about the size of an automobile, shaped like a rugby ball and supported on four cylindrical legs (Oklahoma Journal story Monday, July 5, 1965).

On July 3, 1958 satellite officials and scientific personnel observed a UFO for approximately 20 minutes. The UFO was reported glowing with a white light on a circular-embossed surface at a high rate of speed. The same day, Boston Aires reported two multi-colored UFOs. Photographs were obtained.

ON JULY 19, 1958 The Azores Islands reported a mysterious UFO over the airport that stopped all electro-magnetic clocks. The following day, Portugal fishermen sighted a UFO that was shaped like a red dish turned upside down.

On July 15, 1958 the Canberra, Australia tracking station reported that a UFO created a magnetic field for Mariner 2.

THEN REPORTS started coming in from the eastern part of the United States. On July 17, the Weymouth Naval Air Station reported that several residents spotted two round white discs flying together at low altitudes. On July 30, a Boston woman on a pilot reported sighting a UFO at 10:30 p.m.

She described it as flying with a "buzzy" motion. Another UFO was observed the following night about 12:30 a.m. It was described as having "a definite glow of red and green lights. These appeared moving around the object."

JULY 22, 1958, UFOs were described as "brighter than a star" with red and white lights.

Then on July 21, 1958 a UFO was sighted over Coonahama, New South Wales hovering near a farmyard, the UFO had three red protrusions, one from the top and two from the bottom.

Then on August 1, the sites of Oklahoma and the surrounding states were invaded.

At 1:05 a.m. on the morning of July 23 the UFO came back to Oklahoma. A Wynwood police officer, Lewis Sikes, 29, reported an unidentified flying object approximately 25-30 degrees NE of Wynwood. Officer Sikes did not realize that the UFO was also being watched simultaneously by radar from Tinker AFB, Oklahoma City and Cleveland AFB, Fort Worth, Texas.

THE OKLAHOMA Highway Patrol tower located near Edmond had been receiving UFO reports since 6:30 p.m. So far they had received in the neighborhood of 25-30 reports. The UFO's were tracked from Purcell north to Norman to Channing and south to Muskogee and Shawnee. Shawnee reported that the UFO's were flying in a diamond type formation. Curtis reported four of the UFO's. Tinker AFB, stated they had four UFO's on radar at 22,000 ft. which coincided with visual sightings.

THE AIR FORCE in its announcement in Washington said initial study of the kind of sightings indicated the sightings were "astronomical in nature." "The objects observed may have been the planet Jupiter or stars Rigel, Capella, Betelgeuse or Aldebaran which were visible."

DALE JOHNSON, IIOUPO Scientific Team member and Associate Director of the Kirpatrick Planetarium located in Oklahoma City said it is a "pity" because the air force get its information. "Robert Riser of the Oklahoma Science and Arts Foundation, Kirpatrick Planetarium said observers certain did not see the planets and stars the air force claim. "That is far from the truth as you can get," Riser said. "Remember," "Evidence of UFOs."

What's Answer To UFO Debate?

What grounds can be set for the resolution of the controversial flying saucer dispute? The whole debate centers around the degree and type of proof needed to establish their existence.

Basically there are three types of UFO reports: (1) UFOs observed by the unaided human senses (2) UFOs sighted by instruments and (3) UFOs detected by the human senses and substantiated by instruments.

Another way of analyzing

UFO sightings is to consider what they affect. A sighting may affect only the human senses; it may affect machines or instruments, (leave an image on film or show up on radar or cause electro-magnetic (EM) interference in an automobile) or it may affect nature (markings, or substances on the ground. ELECTRO-MAGNETIC EFFECTS: The aphenomena was first widely reported during the widespread UFO sightings in Nov., 1957, in which a UFO was reported at the time electrical circuitry was disrupted.

On Aug. 28, 1946, near two Jima, a C47 had engine trouble, and at altitude as three UFOs were reportedly observed from the plane. In September, 1952, Korea, navy planes on a mission approached by two large discs, their radar jammed, radio transmitter blocked by buzzing noise each time a new frequency was tried. On Jan. 9, 1952, Kerrville, Tex. an odd "roaring" interference came on radio as a UFO was reported circling the town. On

the night of Oct. 15, 1948 in Japan, an air force F41 interceptor tracked and saw visually a UFO-shaped like "a rifle bullet." On one pass, the F41 got close enough to see the silhouette 30-30 feet long. The UFO was between 5,000 and 6,000 feet traveling 200 m.p.h. and accelerated to 1,200 m.p.h.

During the fall of 1949 at a key atomic base five UFOs in formation were clocked covering 200 miles in less than four minutes. (about 400 m.p.h.). On July 14, 1951, at White Sands, New Mexico, a UFO sped near a B29, tracked on radar. During the fall of 1951 over 14 navy radars tracked UFOs circling above the fleet, up to 1000 m.p.h. at 5000 feet.

The most famous radar sighting was in Washington D. C. on July 19-20, 1952 at the air traffic control center at Washington National Airport. At 12:40 a.m. seven sharp blips suddenly appeared on the radar scope. The UFO separated, two flew over the White House, a third near the capital both over prohibited areas. At Andrews AFB across the Potomac in Maryland the objects were also tracked on radar. Their speed was calculated at 7,200 mph. At

5:30 a.m. a radio engineer named E. W. Chambers was leaving the WNC transmitter station when he said he saw five of the huge discs circling in a loose formation. As he watched, he said, the discs tilted upwards and climbed steeply into the sky. Then on July 28 at 10:06 p.m., a formation of objects descended on Washington for the second time. Again Andrews and Washington's airports confirmed the 'saucers' maneuvers. On March 28, 1957 Pan American Airways flight No. 208A, saw pulsating UFO, radar it got ensnared.

Six months later on Oct. 29, 1957, near London, England, a UFO was sighted by a pilot over an atomic base. The UFO was tracked on radar, lights dimmed as the object sped away.

On Dec. 29, 1957 two high speed UFOs were tracked by navy operators at the Patuxent Naval Air Station, Md. at 4000 m.p.h.

During the recent wave of sightings the Wichita Kan. Weather Bureau radarscope showed UFO's. John Shackley, Wichita weatherman, tracked "them" at different times between 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. Aug. 1, "mostly on the south side of the city." The Tulsa photo was taken the following night.

UFO PHOTOGRAPHERS: There are many photo-graphs of unidentified flying objects. A still photograph purported to show a UFO is, at most, approximately as reliable as the person who took it. If the witness is a reputable person and all pertinent data is provided, his photograph deserves careful analysis. It is only when a photograph is vouchered for by reliable witnesses that it becomes important as evidence.

On March 28, 1957 Pan American Airways flight No. 208A, saw pulsating UFO, radar it got ensnared. IIOUPO has more than 2,000 UFO photos on file in New Jersey. The Fortgum is reported to have 50,000. Still photographs can be made very easily. In general, movie films are more valuable because they are more difficult to fake, and more apt to analyze independently of the character of the witness.

On July 3, 1953 Warren Oficer Newhouse saw and shot color 16MM movie of a UFO near Trenton, Utah. One of the best movies ever taken of UFOs. It was used in the 1956 movie "UFO."

Shinichi Tetsudo photographed a capsule-shaped object near Coonahama Whang Beach at 11:30 a.m. on Aug. 10, 1957.

One of the most famous UFO photographs was obtained on Jan. 16, 1958 from the deck of the Brazilian CV ship 'Almirante Saldanha' by a retired Brazilian air force officer, Capt. Jose T. Vargas. Four photographs were obtained of a Saturn-shaped UFO.

Between 2:10 p.m. and 2:20 p.m. July 28, 1959, Ray Stanford in the presence of other witnesses obtained simultaneous telephoto color movies (one 16MM and the other 8MM) of a tubular shaped object over Corpus Christi, Tex., which shows a navy jet diving on the UFO passing within a few hundred feet of the object. The UFO was some 10 times as long as the wingspan of the jet interceptor.

Movies can be faked, but have two movies of the same object with the same reference objects, and one hand held while the other was on a tripod them to prove no double exposure was done. The UFO was between 20 - 25,000 feet in the jettifield control. For those interested in seeing the film it will be shown at 8 p.m. Friday night, New Age Center, 146 NE 16th.

SOUND: The idea that UFOs are silent is true in general. Although in a surprising number of cases, however, UFOs have noises of some kind. Of the many on record on July 17, 1959 at Blenheim, New Zealand a disc shaped UFO was observed traveling below treeline. It descended, hovered, low humming sound, rose vertically at high speed with "high pitched whine."

So as one can see the evidence for the existence of UFOs is great. Monday: "If There An Air Force Conspiracy?"

Does Air Force Withhold UFO Information

Editor's Note: This is the fifth article in a series on the flying saucers written by Hayden Hewes, director of Interplanetary Investigations of the Oklahoma Journal.

Some weeks after the UFOs were seen on June 24, 1947, the air force established a project to investigate and analyze all UFO reports.

Its code name was "Project Blackbook." It has been identified in the past as "Project Sign" and "Project Grudge" because they do not receive individual attention from the air force, they contend that we are withholding vital information. Maj. Gen. W. P. Fisher, director of Intelligence Liaison to Sen. Harry F. Byrd, writes in his book, "UFO Evidence, Off the other hand Dwayne Jordan, the former AF headquarters intelligence monitor, UFO project says, "The air force is still withholding information on UFO sighting reports."

Since the air force UFO investigation project started it has investigated some 2,277 UFO reports. And these are only UFO reports that are sent to the Air Force by the observer. Of these all but 667 are identified planes, birds, stars, houses, misinterpreted objects.

It appears to some that the air force explains away UFO sightings for various reasons. According to the January, 1965, Project Blackbook report, "There are no UFO photographs, maps, charts or graphs of unidentified flying objects. The only photographs that have been submitted have been determined to be misinterpretations of natural or conventional objects or hoaxes. I can not help but wonder how the air force will explain the Tulsa photograph. Perhaps the air force knows something so startling that it fears the public would be panicked."

Perhaps the air force is afraid that the public, if told many UFO stories might be to believe UFOs are Russian weapons. I can not say what the air force motives are, but I

do know that UFOs are real and a scientific investigation is necessary. In late 1957, during the Lovell, Texas, sightings, I became interested in UFOs. To learn more about the subject I got with an air force reserve officer, William F. Hofer and organized a semi-formal UFO investigation organization which was named the Interplanetary Intelligence of Unidentified Flying Objects, (IIOU UFO).

In 1958 a constitution was drawn up and increased our correspondence. The purpose: to add what information we could to help solve the mystery of the ages in an unbiased investigation. We now have some 3,100 members with a state headquarters in 41 states and foreign correspondents in over 30 countries. We are looking for a scientific panel of known scientists in many fields.

Several air force files are at IIOU UFO headquarters.

I do feel that the air force is suppressing some information. Persons familiar with government operations will know what that information is and why it is being withheld. Almost everyone in Oklahoma is aware of the increase in UFO sightings last August 1, 1965. The Air Force explained

them as a meteor which was not even visible in Oklahoma at that time.

If they have explained away sightings without apparent ridiculous explanations, what have they done with the other 6,000 which they have explained?" The 1964 radar sightings in Washington D. C. were determined to be false radar images. And Captain Mantell was killed while chasing the plane Venus."

To better inform the public the IIOU UFO in May, 1965, began the bi-monthly publication "Interplanetary Intelligence Report". IIOU UFO without flying saucers.

In the IIR both the civilian and military side in an observation is given so the reader can come to his or her own conclusions. For those interested a copy is available upon request.

As Sen. Stuart Symington

said, "The public should be given all information which would not adversely affect our national security." This is what we are trying to do with the IIR. We are trying to educate the general public as to what evidence is available on the subject of unidentified flying objects so they can draw their own conclusions.

Last Of A Series UFO Evidence Is Convincing

After eight years of investigation and research on the subject of unidentified flying objects, I have come to many conclusions.

Frankly, when I started my investigations back in 1957, I was a little skeptical. I had not heard much about them so I decided to learn what I could. I wondered if flying saucers are real, but by the evidence has slowly crystallized until now, in my opinion, there is no doubt as to their existence.

As far as I am concerned it is no longer a question of whether there are "unknown objects" in our atmosphere. To me the only questions that remain are: What are they, where are they from and why are they here?

It appears that all the available evidence indicates an "intelligence" behind their control, and by now since our astronauts are venturing into space the belief that their control is interplanetary and that the earth has been and is under a peaceful surveillance is no longer incredible.

The air force evaluation of the photo may add more information to the "air force censorship" file.

As for Alan Smith, in my opinion he is sincere and a good, reliable and reputable witness as were the other witnesses. In my opinion Alan is telling the truth.

The subject of UFOlogy is an idea in the past week as to the evidence to UFO. The field of UFOlogy is like a tree, there are many branches and each is a theory. We did not discuss possible power sources and whether there was any evidence that contact has been made with this advanced race.

THE AUGUST WAVE

(Editor's note: The following article was compiled by Mr. Page D. Waller, Assistant Director, Division of Public Information, Department of Public Safety, from teletype information on the recent August wave of UFO reports.)

The information presented here comes from teletype information first relayed into the Oklahoma Highway Patrol Communications Network Center located near Edmond, Oklahoma, from the various highway patrol headquarters over the state. This information was then relayed to the Weather Wire teletype system and fed to both wire services as well as all major newspapers, television and radio stations across the state of Oklahoma.

The first message on UFOs came in on July 31st 7:32 P.M. The message went like this: "At approximately 1:30 A.M. on July 31st, a Wynnewood (Oklahoma) police officer, Lewis Sikes, observed an object in the sky at approximately 10,000 feet about five miles northeast of Wynnewood emitting a red, blue and white light. The officer could not hear any engine noise whatsoever. The object appeared to hover in the one spot and the officer observed it for 45 minutes before reporting it to the Oklahoma Highway Patrol Communication Tower at Edmond. Tinker Field was advised of the information and they made a radar check and came up with a fix at the location given at 8,000 feet.

Tinker checked with Fort Sill and other government installations as to air traffic within the area given. None was reported. At this time Carswell Air Force Base aimed their radar at the same location and came up with the same fix as Tinker. Both of the bases tracked the object to a point 15 miles southwest of Tinker Field at which time it disappeared from both radar scopes. It was picked up again just a few minutes later and tracked to a location 29 miles south of Tinker Field at which time

it was lost again and not relocated. When the object was first located on radar, there was a Braniff Airliner passing in the vicinity of Wynnewood at 5,000 feet but the airliner could not make visual contact with the object. As of now said object has not been resighted nor is there any other information available as to the nature of it. Authority: Oklahoma Highway Patrol Tower and Tinker Air Force Base, Oklahoma."

This was the first of the reports. It was the only one the patrol received on Saturday, July 31st, 1965. Sunday, August 1st, 1965, was a different story. At 9:19 P.M. August 1, 1965, the following message went out from the highway patrol tower reference: Unidentified Flying Objects. (Editor's note: This was when IIOUFO learned about the sightings.)

"Since 8:00 P.M. date, the tower has received in the neighborhood of 25 to 30 visual sightings, many by police officers and highway patrol troopers of various unidentified flying objects from the Purcell area north thru the Norman area to Chandler and back south through Meeker and Shawnee.

Three Shawnee officers and their captain have four of the objects in sight at this time, also another has cropped up from the south of Tecumseh and is apparently going to fly directly over Shawnee. The sightings vary from one to four of the objects at various times, starting in a reddish color and varying to a white and blue luster. Shawnee reports the objects seem to be flying four to a formation in a diamond-type formation.

Tinker Air Force Base has had from one to four of them on radar at a time, and they advise they are flying very high, at approximately 22,000 feet, which seems to coincide with the visual sightings, all of which are 'very high-flying objects'."

Other reports the same night went like this: "Sheriffs Office, Chandler.

reports two UFO objects in the sky northwest of Chandler—OHP unit checking it out." "P.D. Norman and P.D. Purcell have spotted a UFO, stationary object, between Norman and Purcell — northwest of Purcell and southwest of Norman — Tinker AFB looking at it — or attempting to do so at this time with radar — Wichita Falls, Texas, also notified to look." "UFO reported seen 16 miles east of Forgan at 9:30 P.M. headed in a southeasterly direction—subject name Carl Broadfoot, address Liberal, Kansas — apparently this same object came over Guymon about five minutes later — had party call headquarters and advise of UFO south of Guymon — advised it looked like large comet with fireworks but was too high for plane and there were no stars around it — party did not give name. OHP Guymon End."

Although there were numerous other reports from other sources which did not reach the patrol, those above were all of the reports which moved on the highway patrol wire on August 1st. On Monday, August 2nd, 1965, the following reports moved on the wire. At 2:00 P.M. August 2nd, the following message moved on the wire: "Report of another UFO, information relayed from police department Cushing to OHP Pawnee district headquarters, a Mr. J. C. Knoch and his son advise they sighted another UFO northeast of Cushing at 12:50 P.M. date, was circular in shape had black stripes or black windows didn't know which. No size or any other information given. Subject's address is 123 North Lynwood in Cushing, telephone CApitol 5-3327. Authority: P.D. Cushing and OHP Pawnee." At 3:41 P.M. the following information moved on the wire from Oklahoma Department of Public Safety Headquarters in Oklahoma City. The report came from a phone call. "Four boys sighted a silver with black striped triangular shaped on S.E. 44, in Oklahoma City, at 3:30 P.M. The boys reported that the object they sighted was glowing. They said it was traveling east and disappeared

into the clouds. Authority: Roger Smith at OR 7-2516 in Oklahoma City, for more information."

Another later report went like this: "Have another report of a UFO over Norman Max Westheimer Field, northwest of Westheimer Field traveling in a northwesterly direction from 12:00 P.M. straight up . . . At a high rate of speed, report comes from the police department Norman, reported by three people now at the sheriff's office in Norman, who reported they have lost sight of it as it traveled out of sight northwest of the city." At 9:31 P.M. the following moved on the wire from the Durant patrol headquarters: "Trooper No. 226, Obert Bennett, OHP Unit 101, is north of Tishomingo at this time and has a green UFO sighted traveling in a northeasterly direction pretty high up . . . He advised a jet plane is also flying in the general direction and seems pretty close to the object. Also — the security officer at Tinker Field reports he has been swamped with calls the past hour from people reporting UFOs." The following moved on the wire at 10:38 P.M. "Have a report from the Norman Police Department, they advise a Charles Boyd, of Cleveland County, Norman, just called in on a citizens band and has confirmation by four other people at the scene of a UFO, a white globe, thirty to forty feet in diameter, twenty degrees above the horizon east southeast of Norman at this time . . . The subjects are viewing the object, which appears to move forward, backward, then up and down, through a tripod mounted 160 power telescope. Authority P.D. Norman."

At 10:53 P.M. on August 2nd, this report moved: "Have a report from several citizens in Woodward at 10:30 P.M. headed southwest from Woodward. This was reported by several different sources, then verified by Woodward police officer Jim Peak, who advised the object was moving southwest at about the speed of a propeller driven aircraft.

However, it was an all-over red globe, and did not resemble an airplane or an airplane's flashing running lights. Oklahoma DPS Clear Opr. Jim West."

This was all of the reports received on August 2nd. On Tuesday, August 3rd, the Oklahoma Department of Public Safety Headquarters in Oklahoma City received several reports but we do not have the text of those messages to report. However, they did follow the same pattern as the other reports. On the night of Wednesday, August 4th, the following messages moved on the wire: "Wayne Harrison of Edmond called the Edmond P.D. and advised them that he was out looking to the northeast when he spotted four red objects which looked like they were approaching Edmond. He called four members of the family out and they all saw what he saw. The objects appeared to be approaching and growing larger then they suddenly dimmed. they later reappeared and seemed to be farther away, again they reappeared this time closer than they appeared to be at first. All of this happened at about 8:30 P.M.

Another message read like this: "Twenty-five people at a church in Cushing all watched several UFOs. Sometimes they would stay stationary then would move at a high rate of speed. Were moving south for a while then stopped and stood still for some time, then were joined by two others and moved to the west at high speeds then turned and traveled east for a while then stopped com-

pletely and stood still then went east and suddenly disappeared from sight. The first ones were orange lights, the ones that joined them had red and green lights like airplanes. P.D. Cushing also observed the same things." The last message of the night read like this: "Unit 8 at Hobart has reported spotting a UFO flying north from Granite, flying rather high - usual description white with red on black."

Cushing has reported four of the objects, two to the south of Cushing and two to the west, flying in a southerly direction. Oklahoma Highway Patrol Units No. 30 and No. 40 have also made visual sightings. Reports have come from individuals: Mrs. Bill Tipton, one and a half miles west of Davenport on U.S. 66, and various others. Also have reports from a Paul Frazier at 1927 South Gary, Tulsa, and a police officer Tulsa.

At 9:04 P.M. the same date the following moved on the wire: "At 8:57 P.M. date from P.D. Norman, a report of one UFO of the same general description as the ones over Shawnee, headed in a northerly direction from the northwest part of the city." At 9:24 P.M. this message moved: "Tulsa OHP reports that the UFO that supposedly landed in Tulsa has gone at this time . . . The object was described as a greenish-white color, approximately eight feet across, as seen from a distance of approximately on block, according to Mr. Howard(who reported it. He ad-

vised it left before he got off the telephone from reporting it. Authority: OHP Tulsa."

The night of August 5th marked the conclusion of reports of UFOs sighted and reported to the Oklahoma Highway Patrol and the Oklahoma Department of Public Safety.

On Thursday, August 5th, a fruit stand employee reported to the Department of Public Safety that a motorist stopped at the stand located in the northeast part of Oklahoma City to buy some fruit. The motorist said as she was approaching Oklahoma City from the west on U.S. 66 she saw a UFO flying slowly over a pasture. She said it was silver in color with orange stripes on it and it seemed to be spinning like a top. She said it was approximately 500 feet high and about the size of a washtub. She made the sighting of the bowl-shaped object at about 10:00 A.M.

At 8:44 P.M. on August 5th, the following message went out on the a report from Tulsa, a subject named Monty Howard, at 5610 West Tenth Street, Tulsa, says a green UFO just landed in his field back of his house and is still there at this time."

At 8:49 P.M. the following message moved on the wire: "Have a report from Unit Seventeen at Seminole of a UFO that is hovering over a field approximately fifteen miles southwest of Seminole and is traveling up and down from approximately two hundred feet altitude to approximately one thousand feet altitude. Also, Shawnee P.D. advised he has had approximately thirty calls reporting four or five flying objects which appear to lighted globes, traveling northwest from Shawnee. The people calling in report they make no conventional noise such as an aircraft does, but rather make a humming noise. There were four objects, greenish to white in color at approximately four thousand feet, estimated by a private plane which observed the objects, and they are traveling singly at about one minute intervals."

In my last article, I stated no one had as yet proved the impossibility of the interplanetary origin of the Unidentified Flying Object. Yet there is, to be perfectly honest, a great weight of argument against this theory. I should like to devote this column to a discussion of the difficulties of the interplanetary hypothesis.

To postulate this theory, one naturally assumes that UFO's are operated, controlled, or piloted by sentient or thinking beings. Yet the hard fact remains that the existence of sentient life on any other planet has yet to be proven. The probability of life on Mercury or on any trans-Martian planet is so slight as to not merit present consideration. The existence of sentient life on Venus is possible, but not probably; moreover, such beings, covered by a perpetual thick overcast, would almost certainly lack the curiosity about the stellar universe that has driven men ever upward since the days of the Icarus legend. Such beings could readily attain technological advance equal to ours in its general level, but be unaware of the existence of the stellar universe.

Mars presents quite a different problem; in September, 1959 based on thirty minutes research, I was able to write a five-page letter to the editorial staff of a national magazine on the riddle of Mars — the literature and evidence is that extensive. I do not have here the time or space to recount this data: but enough evidence has accumulated, especially in the past century, to make the possibility of sentient Martian life something that cannot be ruled out a priori. There is the great mystery of canals (an inaccurate translation of the cavali or "channels"). Such great of Mars study as Percival Lowell and E. C. Slipher swore they had seen the canals. Others of equal repute deny

their existence. Both Marconi and Tesla believed they had received intelligent radio messages from the Red Planet. Mars' two satellites, Phobos and Deimos were discovered by Asaph Hall in 1877, as though they had never existed before; in 1959, D. S. Shklovsky, a soviet astronomer, stated that they were decaying in their orbits as de artificial satellites. Mars' elliptical orbit causes it to be nearest to Earth when it is in "apposition" — about every two years. At several of the appositions, UFO sightings have increased noticeably. Yet at others, including the very close apposition of 1956, no increase in sightings was noted. Mars is universally accepted today as being the home of vegetative life. Yet it could also harbor sentient life ifg one supposes such life to be vastly different from that on Earth due to Mars' climate, its shortage of water and its lack of oxygen. Perhaps the July pass of Mariner IV will give further evidence on this matter.

The problems in postulating the origin of the UFO on a planet and outside the solar system, are, to the incredible distances involved, seemingly insurmountable. Such beings would have had to have mastered propulsion systems far beyond anything we can project today. They would either have to live in colonies with a complete reproductive cycle or else have life spans for beyond ours. Thus communication problems would be great.

An argument for the overcoming of every one of these obstacles can be made. I do not believe this to be a prima facie case against interplanetary UFO's. But it is well to give these problems serious thought before committing oneself to the interplanetary theory irrevocably.

Air Saucer Mystery Stirs Row

Controversy continued today over pictures of a "flying saucer" reported taken near El Toro Marine Base by Rex Heflin, Orange County Highway Department investigator.

Heflin told The Herald-Examiner he had received a call from a man identifying himself as a colonel with NORAD (North American Air Defense), asking him to refrain from comment at present.

The highway investigator said he intended to check the validity of the call later today.

Heflin, 37, Monday released three photos of "a silver object" he spotted at 11:30 a.m. Aug. 3 while working in an area between the El Toro Base and the nearby Marine Corps Air Facility.

Neither air station reported any unidentified objects on the radar that day.

He told investigators he "glimpsed the silver object and estimated it to be 30 feet in diameter and about eight feet thick."

'NO SOUND'

Heflin said it was visible for about 15 seconds and moved from west to east, accelerating at about the same speed as a jet plane.

AIR FORCE UFO INVESTIGATION PROJECT BLUE BOOK

The United States Air Force has the responsibility under the Department of Defense for the investigation of unidentified flying objects (UFO's). The name of this program, which has been operation since 1948, is Project Blue Book. It has been identified in the past as Project Sign and Project Grudge.

Air Force interest in unidentified flying objects is related directly to the Air Force responsibility for the air defense of the United States. Procedures for this program are established by Air Force Regulation 200-2.

The objectives of Project Blue Book are two-fold: first, to determine whether UFO's pose a threat to the security of the United States; and, second, to determine whether UFO's exhibit any unique scientific information or advanced technology which could contribute to scientific or technical research. In the course of accomplishing these objects, Project Blue Book strives to identify and explain all UFO sightings reported to the Air Force.

The Air Force no longer possesses and thus does not have available for distribution outdated reports on Project Sign, Project Grudge, Blue Book Special Report No. 14 and outdated Project Blue Book press releases. Non-military UFO publications should be requested from the publisher and, not the Air Force.

(Editor's note: This is the second in a series obtained from the 1965 Project Blue Book, released by SAFOI, Washington, D.C.)

How the program is conducted;

The Air Force investigation program is conducted in three phases. The first includes receipt of UFO reports and initial investigation of the reports. The Air Force base nearest the location of a reported sighting is charged with the responsibility of investigating the sighting and forwarding the information to the Pro-

ject Blue Book Office at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio.

If the initial investigation does not reveal a positive identification or explanation, a second phase of more intensive analysis is conducted by the Project Blue Book Office. Each case is objectively and scientifically analyzed and, if necessary, all of the scientific facilities available to the Air Force can be used to assist in arriving at an identification or explanation. All personnel associated with the investigation, analysis, and evaluation efforts of the project view each report with a scientific approach and an open mind.

The third phase of the program is dissemination of information concerning UFO sightings, evaluations, and statistics. This is accomplished by the Office of Information of the Office of the Secretary of the Air Force.

The Air Force defines and unidentified object as any aerial object which the observer is unable to identify.

Reports of unfamiliar objects in the sky are submitted to the Air Force from many sources. These sources include military and civilian pilots, weather observers, amateur astronomers, business and professional men and women, and housewives, ect.

Frequently such objects as missiles, balloons, birds, kites, searchlights, aircraft navigation and anti-collision beacons, jet engine exhaust, condensation trails, astronomical bodies and meteorological phenomena are mistakenly reported as unidentified flying objects.

The Air Force groups its evaluations of UFO reports under three general headings: (1) identified, (2) insufficient data, and (3) unidentified. In the next issue an explanation of the three groups.

AIR FORCE INVESTIGATION RESULTS

According to information received from Project Blue Book Headquarters, at Wright-Patterson many of the UFO sightings published in the September issue of the IIR, under "The Invasion Begins" has been explained.

The Wynnewood, Oklahoma sighting on July 31st (This issue page 10) has been identified as the star Capella. The radar returns that Carswell AFB picked up were only micro-waved radar returns that were picked up at Tinker AFB. Ft. Worth reported that no unusual returns were picked up by them. The radar returns that were picked up by Tinker AFB were identified as a balloon that was launched from Will Rogers World Airport located in Oklahoma City. All other returns from the Oklahoma area appeared as stationary returns. The radar returns from the 746th AC&W Sq. near Oklahoma City was estimated at 10,000 ft. elevation, range 20 miles to the South. The object was tracked to a range of 29 miles at an azimuth of 205 degrees.

"The majority of the visual reports were to the East and to the Northeast of Oklahoma City." "Our" as stated by Major Quintanilla, release on the cause of the initial reports stands as correct." (Published in the September issue of the IIR page 19). "This evaluation was of multiple sightings from the Cheyenne, Wyoming, Colorado and Nebraska area on the night of the 31st of July. These sightings were made between 2 a.m. and dawn and consisted of 75 reports by military and civilian personnel. At the time of the Air Force release we had no knowledge of reports from the Oklahoma area." (HIOUFO Director notified by telephone Wright-Patterson AFB on the morning of August 2nd of the recent sightings. But a full report was delayed for several days. As soon as the Air Force investigation results

were released Hayden Hewes again notified Wright-Patterson AFB, to the effect that most of the people in Oklahoma weren't going for the Air Force explanation. At which time he was told that this did not apply to Oklahoma. That the Oklahoma sightings were just coming in.) "Whoever made the mistake assumed that this release covered all sightings throughout the midwest. The Air Force made a mistake in not specifically stating that the reports were from Wyoming, Nebraska and Colorado."

3. June 29, 1965. UFO landed in Valensole, France and was observed by Mr. Maurice Masse. As Masse approached the craft two "beings" were also sighted. The UFO was supported on girderlike legs. The ground was packed hard as concrete when the UFO took off. Full story in the July IIR.

#3—Date Thursday morning 1 July, 1965

4. July 3, 1965, Antarctic. Argentine, British and Chilean military and scientific personnel observed a UFO for approximately 20 minutes. The UFO was reported "glowing with a white light cruising in a northeast-southwest direction at a high rate of speed." The UFO flew a zigzag course and seemed at times to hang suspended in the air. British personnel reported the UFO was green.

#4—Evaluated by Chilean Astronomer as refractions of stars and/or planets.

6. July 5, 1965, Fort Pierce, Fla. Undersea UFO was photographed by Dr. Dmitri Rebikoff. The pear-shaped UFO was sighted beneath several schools of fish. Full story in the July IIR.

#6—Underwater floating object.

7. July 9, 1965, Azores. Airport officials told of a mysterious UFO that stopped all electro-magnetic watches at the Santa Maria airport when it flew slowly over.

#7—Visual observation of a balloon. Clock stopping due to electrician pulling the plug.

16. July 17, 1965, persons in Ohio, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, and Maryland sighted unidentified flying objects similar to the sightings earlier over the Azores and Portugal.

#16—Was observed July 12th and identified as upper air research balloon.

18. July 19, 1965, Higham, Mass. A four-armed luminous object was sighted by five persons for nearly an hour. "It hovered low over the western horizon and seemed to have four arms of three lights each radiating from it. The object remained stationary for about 45 minutes.

#18—The report submitted to the Air Force by Raymond E. Fowler, who evaluated the sighting as the planet venus.

25. July 22, 1965. Pittsburgh, Penn. A flashing UFO which appeared as a silver circle with an orange tail was sighted over a three county area. It was also reported by many as being triangled shaped.

#25—Evaluated by astronomers at the Allegheny Observatory who observed the object at the time of the time of the sightings as meteors.

34. July 31, 1965. At approximately 8:00 p.m. enroute to Oklahoma City several persons observed a bright light traveling north, toward Oklahoma City. The UFO was observed for about two minutes. During this time it flashed a red light several times.

#34—Possible aircraft?

'SAUCERS' REPORTED

Unidentified flying objects obviously were floating over the Oklahoma City metropolitan area again Tuesday night.

The journal received a rash of calls between 7 and 8 p.m.

A Midwest City girl said she saw a white object with a light behind it blinking red and blue. The object appeared in the northeast and moved in no particular direction, Mary Hassell, 13, of 4105 SE 43, said. Five other persons, including her mother; father and younger sister and brother, saw the light, she said.

Two persons reported seeing a "bright light" in the southwest part of the city between 7:10 and 7:50 p.m. Both said they watched the object in the sky and it appeared to be above Will Rogers field.

They also said it was not plane landing lights. One watcher, Janice Rose, 18, of 1616 Skip, Del City, said her father had watched similar object about a week ago.

Another caller said he had seen a round "white object" in the western skies moving, stopping and then finally disappearing behind the trees.

Another person reported sighting an object in the southeast about 40 degrees above the horizon. He said it flashed red, yellow and green lights.

These objects, however, were not confirmed by police as the August rash was.

'MARTIAN' IS A MONKEY

ATLANTA, July 10, 1953 — A young barber said today he shaved a dead monkey and passed it off as a visitor from outer space to win a \$10 bet that he couldn't get his picture in the papers.

Ed Watters, twenty-eight, won the bet. His picture was widely used locally and was transmitted to newspapers throughout the country yesterday.

But the monkey cost him \$50, and a judge fined him \$40 today for obstructing a highway while staging a fake incident designed to support his story about a flying saucer and mysterious "little men" from another world.

Word had got around that a glowing red "saucer" carrying "little men" from outer space had landed on a highway Tuesday night. Watters produced a twenty-one-inch long, four-pound "creature" that he said he killed with his pick-up truck while other similar things hopped into the saucer and flew away in a blaze of light.


An Emory University anatomy professor declared the "space man" was an earth monkey. Later, Dr. Herman Jones, head of the state crime laboratory, performed an autopsy and came to the same conclusion.

The barber took the blame for it all to spare his two companions. Cobb County Superior Judge James T. Manning fined Watters \$40 after he was picked up on a warrant charging cruelty to animals. The cruelty charge was dismissed when Police Chief John Lee found the monkey was killed in another county. Chief Lee said Watters told him he bought the monkey in Atlanta, anesthetized it with ether and killed it with a blow on the head. Then he shaved the animal and amputated its tail, the chief related.

I. During the past week press activity concerning unidentified flying objects has increased noticeably with the most apparent case in which press publicity was given being centered around the Atlanta, Georgia, area. In substance this sighting concerns three men traveling along in a car near Atlanta and reportedly sighting a flying disk with three creatures attempting to enter it as the car approached. The three men stated that two of the unknowns got back into the "saucer" but the third was hit by their car. They took this object back to Atlanta with them and one of the observers, Mr. E. E. Waters, displayed it in his barber shop window.

Upon investigation by the 35th Air Division, Intelligence Office, and pressure from local and national news agencies, Waters confessed the whole story to be a hoax in an attempt to gain publicity. The unknown creature which he had reportedly hit with his car was in fact a monkey which he had shaved. A local pet shop reported that three monkeys had recently escaped so that the issue about the story being a hoax was never in doubt.

Waters stated that before his planned sighting, he had attempted to spread stories of the flying saucers and found people very eager to transmit his rumors.

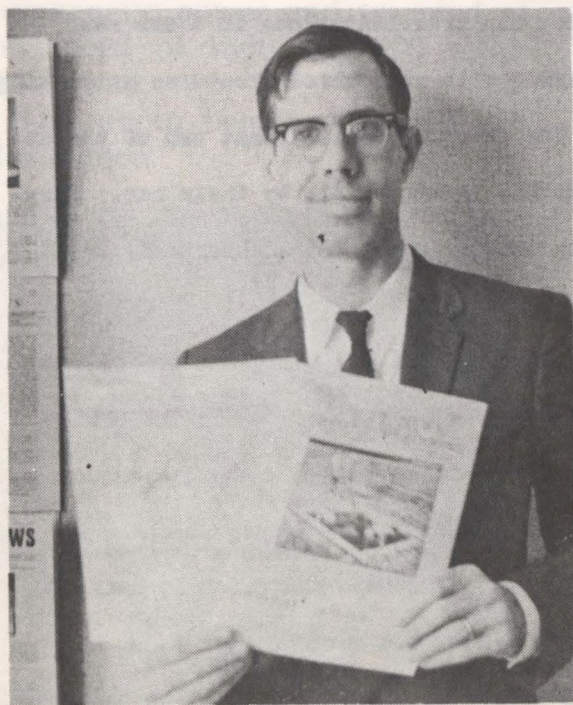

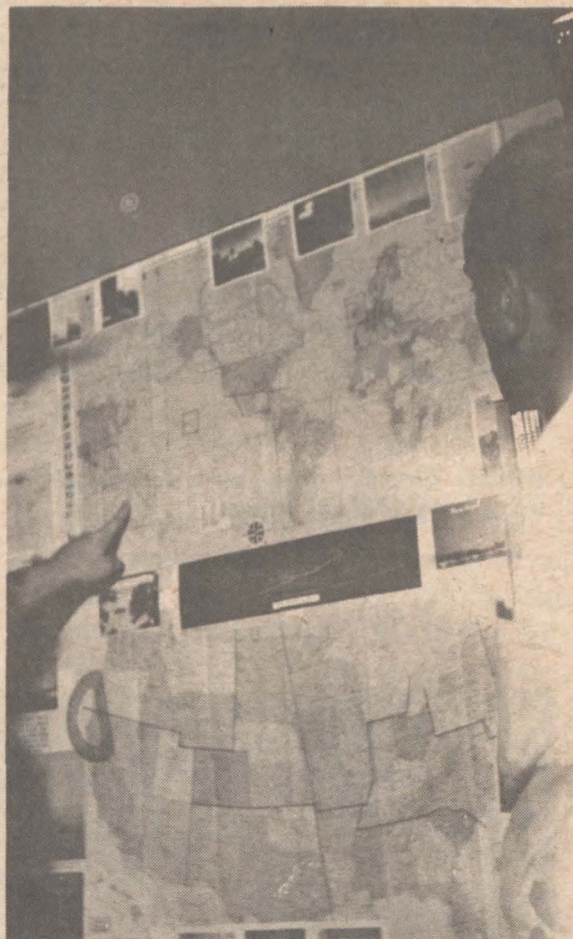

"It made no sound," he said. "but a beam of white light rotated underneath the saucer."

Authoritative sources confirmed his claim that "the light was visible in the last of the three pictures, using a magnifying glass." The "saucer" was slightly tipped in the third picture, revealing its underside.

The county employe said he carried the camera as part of his work. Photographers said it would have been possible to take the three pictures within 15 seconds with the camera Heflin carries.

'RADIO DIED'

Heflin, who says he "doesn't believe in flying saucers," said that during his sighting of the object he tried to contact his base station in Santa Ana.

He said: "The radio went dead twice while I was trying to contact the station, but it has worked ever since without trouble."

The incident occurred during a period when numerous sightings of UFO's (unidentified flying objects) were reported throughout the Midwestern and Southeastern sections of the country.

Heflin said he is willing to take a lie detector test regarding the pictures.

He said the NORAD officer tentatively set up a meeting for tonight or Thursday night in Santa Ana.

Officials at the El Toro Base said they were copying the pictures for a full report to the 11th Naval District in San Diego. The report will eventually reach Washington.

Oklahoma City's Rare Visitor From Space

Little did Rick Barnes realize that before the night of November 6th, 1964 was over he would witness an occurrence seldom seen in most lifetimes. About midnight Mr. Barnes went out to his car and observed a "shooting star" about the size of a basketball go overhead. It made no sound, was a blue-green in color and disappeared behind a row of houses. Next he saw a shower of sparks and heard an explosion. The first question that entered his mind was, "What had landed?"

Early the next morning with the help of a good friend, Mr. Bruce Baskerville, they searched the 300 acre area there they thought the object landed. While crossing a creek, which cuts across the field they noticed an odd looking object half submerged in the creek.

A telephone call was placed to the Kirkpatrick Planetarium and Mr. Dale Johnson, went out to investi-

gate. The main object weighted approximately 21 pounds. A search of the area the following day uncovered a small burned area 24"x36" in which over 200 small fragments were found. Approximately 800 yards away hundreds of fragments were found in the street which apparently broke off during the last moments of flight.

Preliminary analysis of the 21 pound object indicated there was a strong possibility it was a meteorite. The main fragment was sent to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration Lab at Houston, Texas. The result of a very preliminary examination by X-ray diffraction and optical methods showed the specimen not to be a meteorite. The specimen appeared to be a fragment of ordinary "Scoriaceous basalt" similar to rocks found in the surface lava flows in New Mexico. Also preliminary examination by the Smithsonian Institution, United State National Museum in Washington classified it as an artificial product rather than a meteorite. A spectrographic semi-quantative analysis by the U.S. Air Force indentified the 16 elements in the objects.

The Smithsonian Institution suggested that the wrong object had been recovered. So the case reopened and a fragment that was recovered from the small burned area was sent to IIOUFO scientific panel member N. N. Kohanowski, associate professor of mining and geology, at the University of North Dakota.

"I have advanced the study of the specimen sent in by you as far as the material lasted. I simply ran out of the white matter filling the cavities of the rock before completing the chemical analysis. There was, however, enough of the "hard rock" phase to complete the examination.

The fragment was 5/16 th of an inch long. Dark gray in color, scoriatic in structure and with amydales of a friable white material. All in all, your specimen resembled closely what is known in terrestrial petrography as "amydoloidal melaphyre." This term has now become antiquated since it embodies rocks of rather wide variation in composition.

On a detailed examination this specimen, however, differs, considerably from all forms of terrestrial petrography.

When examined under a binocular microscope at 40 X magnification, the walls of cavities were found to be lined with triangular faces of magnetite, this fact according for rather strong magnetism of the specimen. Such cavities were filled with a friable white mass which obviously consisted of several minerals: two or more white ones, some limonite (yellow powder) and rather well formed crystals of forsterite (Olivine). A drop of concentrated hydrochloric acid placed onto this fragment on cold has completely dissolved the white minerals and decomposed the olivine. This dissolution was accompanied with a vigorous effervescence indicating presence of carbonic acid radicals. Calcium and sodium were identified chemically in that drop of solution but by the time the drop has been consumed.

After the above mentioned acid treatment, the specimen was washed and a thin section prepared from it: a slice of the rock only 0.0012 of an inch thick and sealed between glass plates.

Since in preparation of this thin section the gas bubbles of the rock were ground to a mere outline, magnetite lining such cavities has become all but ground off. The mass of the rock then showed to consist of: Urbanite, which is a manganese rich aegirine, Clinostatite, Forsterite (Olivine), Plagioclase—a few thin laths and one fairly large rhomb with isotropic (dark) core. Unidentified fine grained material—NOT glass.

I may add that both urbanite and clinostatite are monoclinic pyroxenes. The rhomb of plagioclase was possibly oligoclase formed at the expense of whatever existed at the core of that grain.

The above mentioned composition does not fit any form in classification of terrestrial rocks. We cannot call it "amygdaloidal olivine basalt" since the specimen contains very little plagioclase and no feldspathoids. Therefore, I will use the older and now antiquated name of "amygdaloidal melaphyre" to approximately define this rock."

"I have entertained several intriguing speculations in regard to precedence of that specimen.

I think that we can rule out the possibility that you picked up some fragments of terrestrial rocks that became scattered by the impact of that meteorite. To the best of my knowledge melaphyres do not outcrop in vicinity of Oklahoma City. Also, the fragments were much too fresh to have laid for years on the surface of the Earth.

The fragments like the one I have could not have chipped off or spalled off the outer surface of a meteorite since the minerals of the fragments were not altered by heat of friction between the air and the rushing meteorite. The filling of cavities would have been destroyed—calcite decomposed and crystalline olivine fused to beads.

The possibility that would probably fit best is that the meteorite was originally quite bit larger and that its outer portions spalled off. This fragment thus came from the interior of the meteorite where the meteorite was cracking due to sudden expansion of heated crust. Fragments corresponding to the heated discoloration and by rounding.

To my knowledge it is the second occurrence of amygdaloidal melaphyre among meteorites but then our knowledge of meteorites is rather scant—only about 1600 meteorites have been catalogued so far."

UFOs Photographed at GT-5 Launch

LENSMAN GETS PHOTOGRAPHS OF UFOs AT GEMINI LAUNCH

MALABAR—The Gemini 5 flight that took astronauts Cooper and Conrad on their record-breaking eight-day orbit may have attracted—more not from earthlings.

According to James R. Peek, 47, of Township Road, at least three, possibly four, unidentified flying objects were seen by him in the vicinity of the Cape within seconds of lift-off.

Now he has pictures to prove it.

Peek, a senior engineering laboratory technician, optics expert, and experienced amateur photographer, was out on his front lawn like thousands of other Brevard residents that historic morning.

But in his case, he got there a few seconds too late to see the actual lift-off. He says he had his camera all set to grab a few pictures of the launch, but having missed it, was not going to take any photographs. As he was about to return to his house, he says he saw an object traveling at very high speed moving in a westerly direction in the vicinity of the launch area.

"It looked like a silver or brilliant green phosphorescent light just east of the contrail left by the rocket," Peek said.

"It made a sort of S-turn in and around the contrail, became elliptical in shape as turned, then changed into a clearly defined disc."

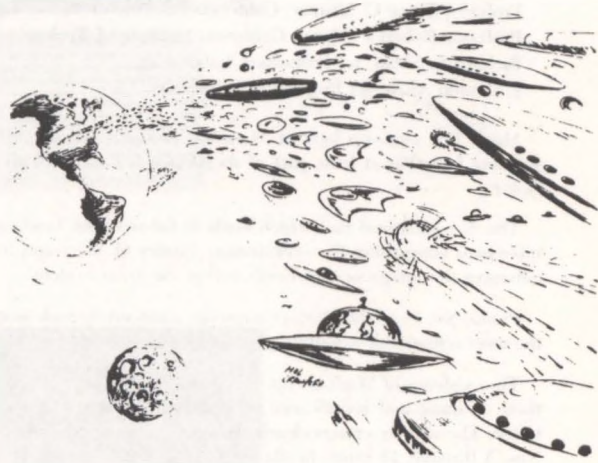
Peek hastily aimed his 35mm camera fitted with a 35mm lens at object and took a picture. The object vanished towards the south.

Peek said he tried to take another couple of shots of the object before it vanished, but owing to the small view afforded in his camera viewfinder, was not sure that he was successful.

But when his color film returned from the processors, he saw that he had been more successful than he thought.

His first shot shows a light green blur across the transparency, but the second shows not one object, but three of them.

Peek said the brilliance of the objects was not due to reflected sunlight, but came from the objects themselves.

Initial Scientific Interpretation of Mariner IV Photography

Man's first close-up look at Mars has revealed the scientifically startling fact that at least part of its surface is covered with large craters.

This is a profound fact which leads to far-reaching fundamental inferences concerning the evolutionary history of Mars and further enhances the uniqueness of Earth within the Solar System.

Frame No. 11 of the Mariner sequence must surely rank as one of the most remarkable scientific photographs of this age.

The existence of Martian craters is demonstrated beyond question; their meaning and significance is, of course, a matter of interpretation. The seventy craters clearly distinguishable on Mariner photos Nos. 5 through 15 range in diameter from 3 to 75 miles. It seems likely that smaller craters exist, and there also may be still larger ones than those photographed, since the Mariner photographs, in total, sampled only about one percent of the Martian surface.

The observed craters have rims rising a few hundred feet above the surrounding surface and depths of a few thousand feet below the rims. Crater walls so far measured seem to slope at angles up to about 10 degrees.

The number of large craters per unit area of the Martian surface is closely comparable to that of the densely cratered upland areas of the Moon.

If the Mariner sample is representative of the Martian surface, the total number of craters of the sizes so far observed is more than 10,000 compared to a mere handful on Earth.

In appearance, the Martian craters closely resemble impact craters on Earth, both artificial and natural, and the craters of the Moon. Craters of widely different degree of preservation, and presumably age, are distinguishable.

A few elongated diffuse markings are present on the Mariner photos, but at this early stage of analysis no conclusions can be offered concerning them. On Frame No. 13, one such feature looks like a part of the edge of a very large crater and, perhaps significantly, lies near the border of a Martian dark area.

In southern sub-polar latitudes, where the season is late mid-winter, some craters appear to be rimmed with frost, particularly in Frame No. 14.

Some mention must be made of features looked for but not seen on the Mariner photos. Although the flight line crossed several "canals," sketched from time to time on maps of Mars, no trace of these features was discernible. It should be remembered in this respect that the visibility of many Martian surface features, including the "canals," is variable with time.

No Earth-like features, such as mountain chains, great valleys, ocean basins or continental masses were recognized.

Clouds were not identified, and the flight path did not cross either polar cap.

The following are some of the fundamental inferences to be drawn from the Mariner IV photos:

1. In terms of its evolutionary history, Mars is more Moon-like than Earth-like. Nonetheless, because it has an atmosphere, Mars may shed much light on early phases of Earth's history.

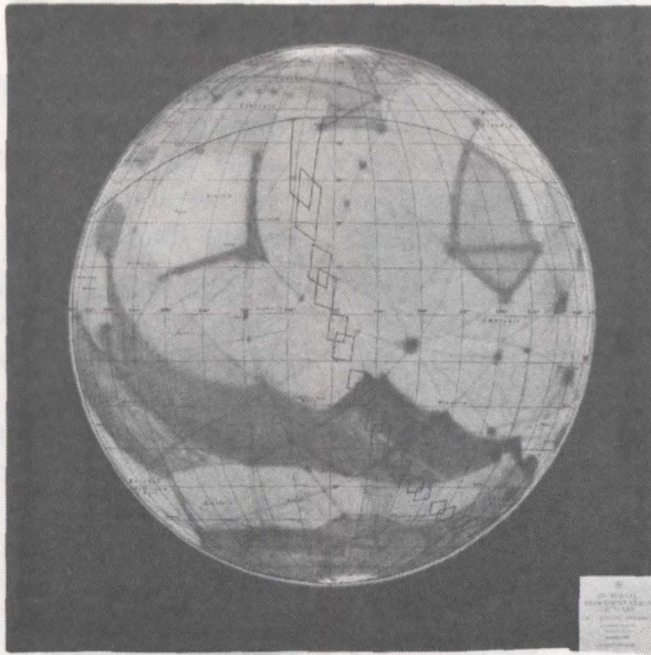
2. Reasoning by analogy with the Moon, much of the heavily cratered surface of Mars must be very ancient—perhaps two to five billion years old.

3. The remarkable state of preservation of such an ancient surface leads us to the inference that no atmosphere significantly denser than the present very thin one has characterized the planet since that surface was born. Similarly, it is difficult to believe that free water in quantities sufficient to form streams or to fill oceans could have existed anywhere on Mars since that time. The presence of such amounts of water (and consequent atmosphere) would have caused severe erosion over the entire surface.

4. The principal topographic features of Mars photographed by Mariner have not been produced by stress and deformation originating within the planet, in distinction to the case of the Earth. Earth is internally dynamic, giving rise to mountains, continents, and other features, while evidently Mars has long been inactive. The lack of internal activity is also consistent with the absence of a significant magnetic field on Mars, as was determined by the Mariner magnetometer experiment.

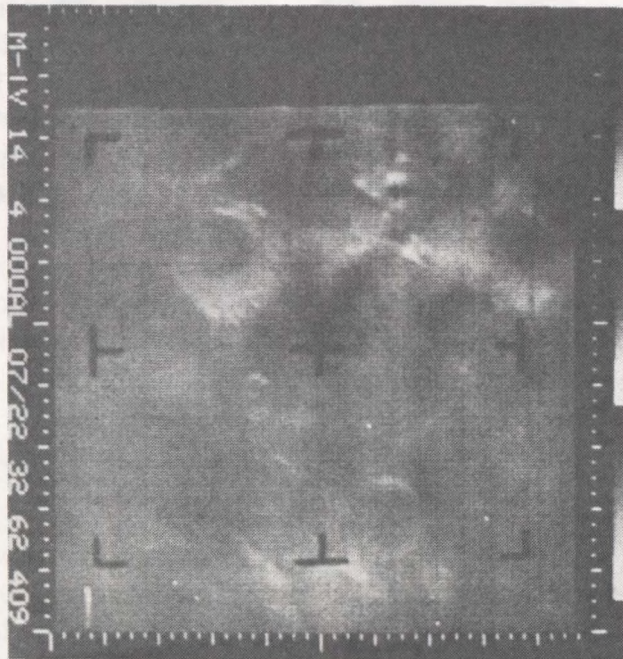
5. As we had anticipated, Mariner photos neither demonstrate nor preclude the possible existence of life on Mars. The search for a fossil record does appear less promising if Martian oceans never existed. On the other hand, if the Martian surface is truly in its primitive form, that surface may prove to be the best—perhaps the only—place in the Solar System still preserving clues to original organic development, traces of which have long since disappeared from Earth.

The Mariner photos will profoundly affect scientific views about the origin and evolution of planetary bodies in the Solar System.



This Mars map shows the area on the planet's surface covered in 21 pictures and a fraction of a 22nd picture taken by Mariner IV's television camera on July 14, 1965, and recorded on tape for playback to space communications stations on Earth. The total area photographed was about 600,000 square miles, approximately one percent of the entire Martian surface. Mariner's camera scanned from north to south, recording pairs of overlapping pictures in a red-green, green-red filter sequence. The first picture, which captured the limb of Mars against the background of space, was taken from a slant range of 10,500 miles. The closest distance between the camera and the area photographed was 7,400 miles. Mariner IV was launched from Cape Kennedy November 28, 1964, it flew by Mars on the 228th day of the mission at a closest approach distance of 6,118 miles. Picture playback began the following day—July 15, 1965—and was completed July 24. The second playback of the pictures ended August 2, the 297th day of flight, when Mariner's telemetry system was returned to cruise mode to obtain additional fields and particle measurements and spacecraft engineering information. Planetary science data, including the TV pictures, were transmitted to Earth over distances ranging from 134 million to 150 million miles.

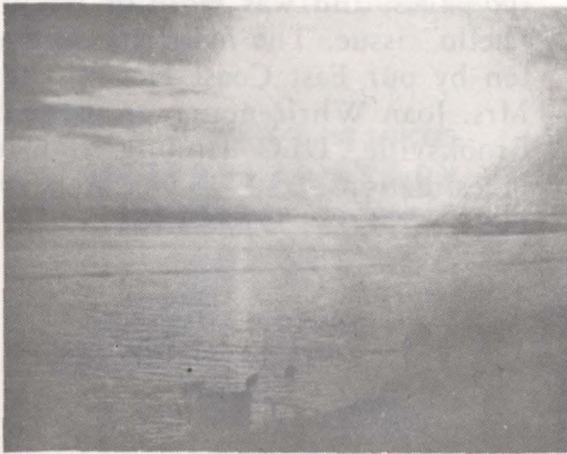
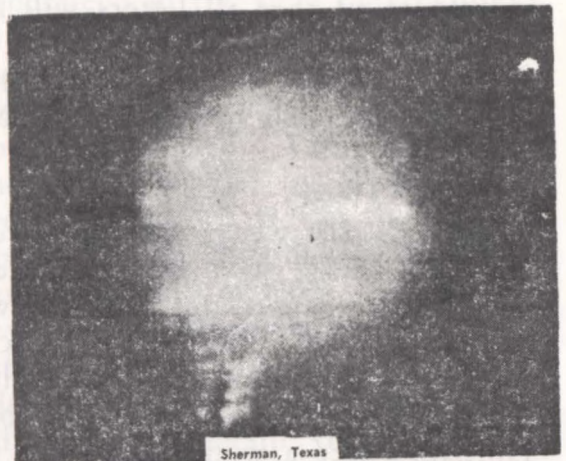

'Flying Saucer' Photographed By California Man



Rex Heflin, an Orange County highway department investigator who said he did not believe in flying saucers, photographed a saucer-shaped flying object that has still to be identified. The picture was taken while Heflin was working near the Santa Ana Marine Corps Air Facility. He used a polaroid camera and estimated the object was 30 feet in diameter and eight feet thick and visible for 15 seconds. Heflin said the object made no noise and had a beam of light rotating underneath it. A Marine base radar operator failed to report any unidentified object sightings the day Heflin took the picture during the recent rash of UFO sightings in the western part of the United States. Dear Mr. Hewes:

Just this past week, two reports of "flying saucers" have been reported in local newspapers and during news broadcasts over Radio South Africa. The first report was from the city of Pietermanitzburg, 50 miles from Durban where a woman was said to have seen a huge red ball hover in the sky for three minutes. After it disappeared behind a hill, it returned and was visible for about 30 seconds. Then it vanished altogether. This incident was on 11 September, 1965.

The second incident took place a few days ago (letter dated 21 September) near Poetoria. Two members of the S. A. Police Patrol four miles from Silverton near Poetoria reported seeing an object landing in the middle of the tar highway.

Two or three days ago a newspaper report said the "sighting" was a hoax. Another newspaper report said tests on tar taken from the area where the object is supposed to have landed showed no trace of gamma rays or radioactivity. Another test proved that samples of tar taken from the area burned by the so-called "saucer" showed that gasoline was used.

Although the Interplanetetary Intelligence of Unidentified Flying Objects was organized in 1957 the official publication did not begin until May, 1965. Vol. 1, No. 1 was six pages, and was more or less our "hello" issue. The main article written by our East Coast Headquarters, Mrs. Joan Whrireneur was about the Brooksville, UFO landing and her investigations. Vol. 1, No. 1, is sold out.

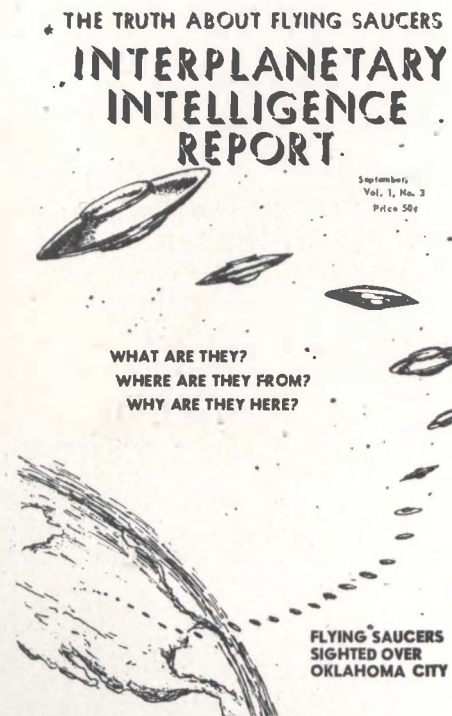

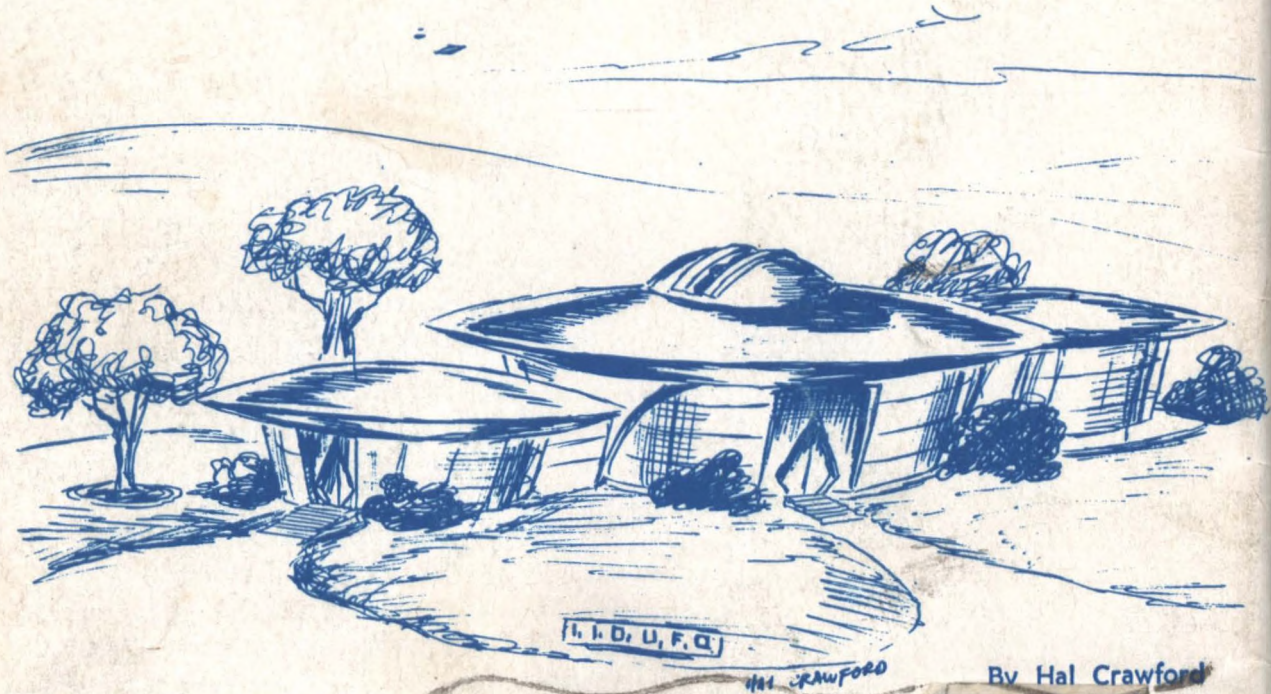
