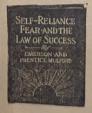

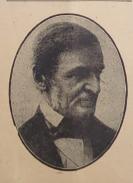

Gossip.

THERE is gossip and gossip.
But all gossip is good.

It comes from the same place: the moving of Life or God to self-expression and the understanding of other fellow-expression.

Without gossip is no progress in understanding.

Without gossip is no thinking together.

By gossip we learn good and evil in self and others, and instinctively we love and emulate the good and abhor the evil.

All gossip is good gossip in exactly the same way that all people are good people.

Back of Gossip.

THE difference between so-called bad people and the rest of us is the difference in Point of View and the consequent Aim or Intention.

When a person's Point of View is based on the idea that the world is "bad" he naturally AIMS to destroy, to tear down. He does it habitually, without stopping to think. And his gossip reveals him.

When a person takes his stand on ALL-IS-GOOD his view of things is different: he sees the world good and

he thinks, works, prays and talks good, instead of evil.

Some of the time, not all of the time: for his ideals are always in advance of his ability to express. That is what keeps him trying.

The one who thinks and speaks from the vantage ground of All-Good sees a perfectly good world in *the* green-apple stage, fast ripening to the image and likeness of its ideal.

He sees all things working together for good.

He sees the good builder building good.

He sees the good destroyer destroying that which can and must be destroyed.

He gossips about all these things in the light of good.

He sees all things working for good, and it is the most absorbing and exciting thing in all creation, the most interesting thing to talk about.

He wonders if you see it in the same light he does: if you do, he wants to talk it over and rejoice with you; if you don't, he wants to show you THE TRUTH about it and thus achieve the same end: to enjoy the bliss of seeing the truth together.

That is the end, the aim, the soul-intention, the irresistible attraction in all gossip: TO ENJOY SEEING THE TRUTH TOGETHER.

How to See Through Gossip.

OF COURSE nobody sees all the truth any of the time, nor any of the truth all the time. Wherefore we all gossip short of the truth at times, in spite of our best aims.

Therefore our gossip is sometimes a destroying flame in which reputations

shrivel: for reputations can shrivel, though characters cannot.

The Hebrew gossips left Jesus' reputation in shreds, but his character showed the more golden to Pilate and the world.

And the Jews are still feeling the unjust malice of that gossip! The sting to Jesus was soon over, for he knew that they knew not what they did. The sting is in believing evil is intended and God is futile! Jesus knew better.

Why resent that which riddles reputations only to reveal the gold of character?

Nevertheless, sometimes it were better for the malicious gossip that a millstone be hanged about his neck and he be cast into the sea—before he catches the full kick back of his own self-generated malice.

The INTENTION of gossip is the soul of it. What is the INTENTION of the gossip you speak?

The WILL-TO-GOOD of the listener to gossip is the soul that sees through the gossip to the TRUTH beneath, that creates the GOOD CONSTRUCTION to think upon and act upon.

And the WILL-TO-GOOD is always Love, Good Will to all.

And the merely idle gossip? Oh, the malice-goblins 'll get him if he don't watch out. He's on the road where malice-goblins grow.

All gossip works for good, but some kinds of gossip work faster, straighter and more pleasurably than others, and there's no kick back.

That's the kind of gossip I AIM to tell.

God and godlets, please forgive me when my aim is poor.

What is Truth About Gossip?

Then pass on what your own soul commends as God's Truth—provided you find God's Good Reason for passing it on.

Truth, instead of damning not-truth. It's like the miner panning gold: the Water of Life washes away the idle gossip and the bad gossip, and only the Golden Gossip lives in the golden chambers of memory.

And in time the Golden Gossip finds its way into the Golden Books of men, where our children and our children's children Enjoy its Truth Together forever; enjoy its humanness, which is to say its greenness, as well as its ripe divinity.

And so it is "revealed" unto me that gossip is not only not evil: it is the great virtue by which we reveal ourselves to each other; and find our image and likeness in each other; and our oneness in the One God or Good.

- 5. Send the check to payee pinned or clipped to a letter, or a form slip filled in

with (a) amount of check, (b) date of bill which the check pays, and (c) the statement, "Send payment by check, which receipts itself. Mark number and date of check on the bill and put it in your file for reference."

Scat pacifism into the cellar until we've made the world safe for it to live in.

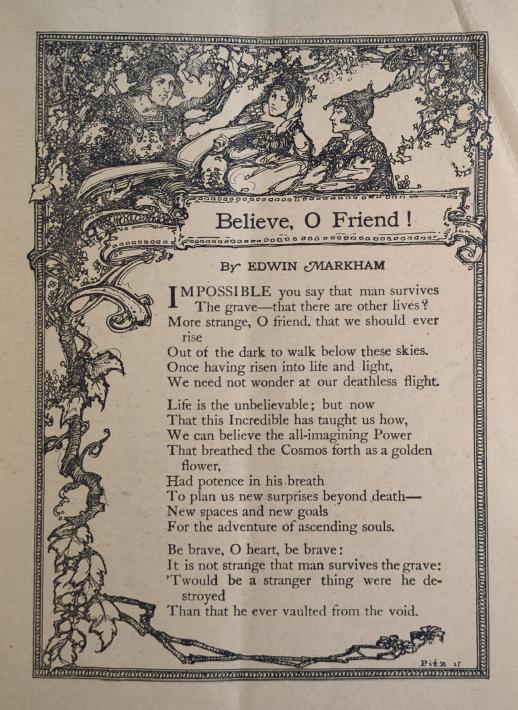

THE SPIRIT IN WHICH YOU WORK

TEAR my native home in the New Hampshire mountains there was a beautiful brook of sparkling water which came tumbling down a mountain side. I used to think the brook was happy because the sparkling water leaped so buoyantly from rock to rock and ledge to ledge on its way to the valley. It was evidently fed by a wonderful spring way up the heights. But at the bottom of the mountain this brook ran into a valley from which it had no outlet, and there the water which fed it underwent a remarkable transformation. It lost its sparkle. Its wonderful fascinating music, as it tumbled over rocks and leaped down the waterfalls, all ceased. A green scum gathered on its surface. Frogs, lizards, water snakes, turtles, muskrats, all sorts of vermin and insects gathered there, until what had once been a thing of joy and beauty became a most repulsive sight. In summer time the pool would almost dry up and become a foul malarial swamp.

As long as the brook was working, while it tumbled over the rocks and down the mountain side, singing as it went, it was pure, sparkling, and apparently joyous and happy, but when its activity ceased it began to deteriorate. Its whole nature was changed. It lost its freshness and beauty and became a source of disease.

This is practically what would happen to the human race if man should cease to work. Where growth activity stops degeneration begins. But for our day's work, the necessity of regular, systematic exercise of our faculties, we would revert to barbarism. "Use or lose" is Nature's motto. Everything that is not in use deteriorates. Everything that is idle is already on the way to the scrapheap.

In the Creator's plan of the universe activity, motion, was evidently intended to be a great purifying, beautifying, efficiency-developing force of the world. Normal work everywhere and always improves human beings, educates, trains and enlarges them, while idleness everywhere and always causes deterioration, just as the mountain brook deteriorated when it ceased to fulfill its purpose—to move forward toward the great sea.

"He who loves work gains all the favor of the gods," says Dr. Frank Crane.

Instead of being a curse, work is man's greatest blessing. There is no one thing that has ever done so much for humanity, that has given so much happiness, saved so many human beings from despair, and kept so many from suicide; no one thing that has called forth so many hidden resources, developed and strengthened so many powers of mind and body as has work.

Dr. Richard C. Cabot of the Harvard Medical School says: "A human being is a creature who cannot be healthy or happy or useful unless his balance is preserved by motion, by change, by action, by progress." In other words, no

man or woman can be healthy, happy or useful if not engaged in useful, productive work, work that will be of some service to mankind.

Many people have a sort of vague impression that a happy, constructive life is a thing apart from the day's work. that it is a mystical something, determined largely by fate or destiny. truth is, it depends entirely on how we manipulate our personal assets. material of which success and happiness are built is in our own hands. building is the work of every day. It consists in living life up to its maximum possibility of good. There is no unnatural straining and striving in this. It is a simple matter of honest, earnest, persistent endeavor every day; of always trying to better our best and to make our highest moment permanent.

The enjoyment which comes from travel, from viewing works of art, from reading, from social intercourse with friends, from the opera, from the theater, is a temporary thing in life; but the man who loves his work has a daily enjoyment, a perpetual pleasure which never fails him.

People who shirk work and make pleasure the object of their lives never find real pleasure or happiness. I have watched pleasure hunters travel over the world, trying to find new sensations, new excitements, new pleasures, but their faces always indicate that there is something lacking, some great gap which all the money which they can expend in chasing pleasures will never fill.

The human machine was made for action, was designed to perform useful work, and there can be no happiness for an able-bodied man or woman outside of an industrious life. We cannot cheat nature. If we would be happy, we must conform to nature's laws. Work and play are the great balance wheels

of man's being. We were not made for perpetual playing, any more than for perpetual work. You can no more be happy without first earning your pleasure by doing your legitimate share of the world's work than you can enjoy your dinner without being hungry.

If after being wrecked at sea, you should manage to climb upon a great raft which your fellow passengers had made out of floating pieces of the wrecked ship; if you should take the most comfortable position, and eat all the food and drink all the water you wanted,—even though the workers went hungry and thirsty,—while you refused to do your share of the necessary work in the desperate effort to get ashore, how do you think your companions would feel? Would they not be justified in throwing you overboard?

Now the human race is on a great world raft, flying at lightning speed through space, and the work of every human being on board is necessary to keep the raft headed in the right direction, and always moving toward its appointed goal.

"Work cannot be evaded without serious spiritual loss," says Hamilton W. Mabie; "for work is the most general and the most searching method of education to which men are subject. process which is educational in a way at once so deep and rich must, in the nature of things, form part of the spiritual order of life; for education is always spiritual in its results. Christ's life among men was one of toil; he was bred to a trade and practised it; his labors were manifold and continuous: and in word, deed and habit he identified himself with those who work. Many of his most beautiful parables grew out of his familiarity with the tasks of the shepherd and husbandmen; many of the deepest truths he gave to his disciples were made real and comprehensible by the imagery of the working life in the fields and at home; and when he said, 'My Father worketh hitherto, and I work,' he not only gave a divine sanction to work, but he made it a part of the divine life.''

But for the blessing of work the human mind would go to pieces. It is good, honest, regular work that preserves the physical and mental balance and keeps us in a normal condition.

God's medicine is work that we love. God's plan for man's development, his growth in mental and physical power and resourcefulness, is work.

The human being who does not contribute his quota to the great forward movement of humanity becomes a parasite, the lowest and most degraded form of vegetable or animal life. In America we call the human parasite a "loafer." Josh Billings, in his homely vernacular, gives a good description of this creature.

"The loafer," he says, "iz a human being who occupies all grades in society, from the judge on the bench klean down to the ragged thing in britches who leans against a lamp-post and fites flys in August.

"He has hiz big circle ov friends, whare hiz koarse jests are re-echoed, and whare to be in hiz konfidence iz kon-

sidered an honor.

"He iz not always destitute ov kommon sense, and quite often iz the author ov jests which pass upon the unwary for humor and even wit.

"He haz no pride that is worthy, and haz no delikasy that enny boddy kan

hurt.

"During hiz boyhood he kills kats and sells their hides to the hatters, and robs all the hen's nests and arly apple trees in the naborhood.

"During his middle age he begs all the tobacco he uses, and drinks all the cheap whiskey he kan at sumboddy else's expense. "During hiz old age he winters in the almshouse, and summers in the sugar hogsheds, and, when he comes tew die, he is buried in a dich, like an omnibus hoss, aith hiz old shoes on.

"This iz a trew ackount ov the life and adventures ov the ordinary loafer, and yet there are thousands ov human kritters coming onto the platform ov life every six months whoze only ambishun iz to be successful loafers.

"The loafer kares nothing for publik opinyun, and this, alone, will make any man a loafer.

"The loafer rather covets disgrace ov all kinds, and, when a man gits az low down az this, he haz got az low down az he kan git without digging."

Only a small percentage of the sons and daughters of millionaires could get a living today if they were suddenly thrown upon their own resources. Many of them if they were suddenly to lose their property, could not get a five dollar a week job. They are undeveloped; their characters are flabby, they lack stamina, have practically no initiative, are almost powerless when it comes to self reliance; helping themselves, because they have not been trained to work; their self-reliance has never been developed. Measured by all that constitutes the full grown man and woman, these rich drones would rank very low.

The idle life is the weak, useless life. No mental or moral stamina can be built up without systematic employment, and a worthy aim. No matter how much money you may have, you are growing weaker, you are deteriorating, you are a little less of a man for every idle day you spend when you are able to work.

Work keeps people normal and happy, but idleness attracts all sorts of vicious, dangerous and destructive things. Inherited wealth which does away with the necessity of work is often

the worst possible curse to the inheritor. If Harry K. Thaw had been obliged to make his own way in the world, to do his own struggling, there is every probability that he would not have led the degenerate life which led to his nine years' terrible experience in an insane asylum, and the later miserable occurrence which followed. He would have been much happier and very much more of a man than he is today, because he would have developed his better qualities. He would have been more normal because he would have been compelled to live a more normal life. The simple life with its legitimate portion of good, honest work would have made him a useful citizen.

Take any idly inclined young fellow with a personal income of eighty thousand dollars, free from all restraint, with full liberty to do as he pleased, and think of the army of vagabondsthe idle, useless, aimless, dissolute people he would inevitably attract! Just as an electric light in the summer time attracts bugs and beetles and all sorts of insects, so will any idle youth with a great fortune attract dangerous associates, and draw to himself a multitude of temptations which a poor boy with an ambition to make something of himself, and struggling to make his own way in the world, will escape.

Nothing is truer than that an idle brain is the devil's workshop. Here is where the great tempter gets in his work. Here is where vicious habits originate; here is where the baser passions and desires are born and grow to maturity.

When a person is at work he is comparatively free from the vicious temptations that assail the idle. But when he ceases to work, or when he is idle because his father is rich, then the trouble begins. Then the tempter gets in his work. He lures the idler to vicious resorts, to get with bad people, with the

loafers, and the purposeless nobodies. And how quickly one's standards drop, one's ambition and high ideals become blurred when drawn into bad company, into the haunts of vice and idleness!

On the other hand how seldom a useful and happily employed person does anything vicious! How seldom any criminal tendencies develop under such conditions! The vicious tendencies and nearly all of the harmful things are hatched in idle brains.

There is an upward tendency in the life of the happy worker. With him everything is climbing to a higher level, while idleness is always dropping to lower levels.

"For there is," as Carlyle says, "a perennial nobleness, and even sacredness in work. Were he never so benighted, forgetful of his high calling, there is always hope in a man that actually and earnestly works; in idleness alone is there perpetual despair. Work, never so Mammonish, mean, is in communication with Nature: the real desire to get work done will itself lead one more and more to truth—to Nature's appointments and regulations, which are truth."

No amount of money will purchase immunity from God's laws. Who violates the work law, which is the fundamental law of life, pays the penalty in corresponding weakness of character, mendeterioration, mental flabbiness. Live the idle life and you will tend to become backboneless, spineless, staminaless and characterless. You can never develop the grand qualities which belong to the superb life without exercising them. You will be an infant in your initiative, an infant in your executive ability, an infant in your judgment, an infant in your power to decide. In fact, you will be a mental infant unless you do a man's or a woman's work in the world.

This direct influence is one of the most important things we have "in the house": our house of life, as initial capital which may most effectively and adequately be used for accomplishment, and working according to its decrees we may be "gay" before our daily doings and thus secure the high potency of some of Nature's finest forces, elation, joy, satisfaction.

A certain railroad company has a rule that before any one shall be appointed to a responsible position on its route it shall be ascertained that he has no domestic trouble or is placed in any circumstances which would tend to render him morose, forgetful or absentminded. This road demands full efficiency, occult powers put to their best use, and recognizes the fact that only such men as can be "gay" before their work are adequate to its requirements.

What are the force trumps to be played to make life a satisfactory game for you? They are the spirit of you lived out from the center of you as the rose pulses forth from the center of the bud: your tastes, your talents, your convictions, which, if given their legitimate place and prominence will lead to your work, to the constant growing towards your desired goal. They are the natural, spontaneous things which stamp you as a unique creation of God, bound to think the unique thoughts and to do the unique deeds which are yours and belong to no other.

One who is trying to live his life according to another's pattern, or who is here and there tacking on "shreds and patches" of imitation and make-believe, is stultifying his own design, making a crazy quilt of emotions and struggles, entirely missing a harmonious whole. He is letting his own force trumps lie on

the table while he plays, and very badly plays, another's hand.

Perhaps on no reef have more soul boats been wrecked than on that of supposed gentility. Let all the gods be thanked that with skin-tight trousers, hoop skirts and Grecian bends we have shaken off the idea that occupations make or unmake "gentlemen" and "ladies," and have taken on the knowledge that one degrades or ennobles his work, not his work him.

An ambitious woman decided that her son should become a banker and a shining light in society. Regardless of his protests she secured for him a position in a leading bank, decked him out in fashionable apparel, and had him installed in a position which she decided had all the marks of a gentlemanly profession. She was soon surprised to see him drooping, wilted, irritable, and still more surprised when one day she received from him a letter which read:

"To me the bank game is not worth playing. I'm going in for something that has always set up a longing in my wish-bone: farming in some shape. The hand I hold may be all two-spots, but they're trumps to me, and I'll be happier with such tricks as they'll take than I would be playing another fellow's hand though he held both bowers and all the aces."

Through the blitheness of cloudless weather and the fogs of gray days that young man, clothed in khaki trousers and blue flannel shirt, sings and dreams as he rides behind two horses of a big milk and fruit ranch while he plans how he shall buy and equip his own ranch. He has "access to true wisdom." He has claimed the occupation that claimed him and is "gay," and therefore efficient, before it.

"Once upon a time" in a little Maine village there lived a gentlewoman who was suddenly thrown upon her own resources. As she must work it was decided by all her closest friends that her occupation must be "genteel." Although she had not attended school for thirty years and disliked the close contact of children, it was felt that teaching was the only thing which would be a becoming employment for one of her station and former mode of life, "Madam Pratt's Private School" was announced and two-score pupils secured. six months thereafter Madam was in lively torment and her students "having the time of their lives," scoffing at her misgovernment, mocking at her oldfashioned pronunciation, laughing at her ancient methods, all the time "sensing" her dislike for "young people" and returning it with treble interest.

Will they come true? Do they come true? So much depends on the clearness with which the dream voice speaks to us.

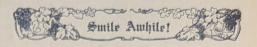

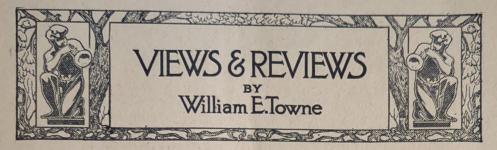

I N all scientific research everywhere, the basic principle is:

There is only one power, which is omnipresent and ever active.

This one power you are constantly using, either consciously or unconsciously, through THINKING,—"Stepping Stones to Success."



Are You Dissatisfied?

There is a "divine discontent" that acts as a sort of irritant to induce action.

And there is a nagging, nerve-wearying paralysing discontent, an habitual fretting and resistance, that simply cuts one off from life and joy and leads toward disease and death.

The discontent that seeks and sees a remedy, that results in constructive action, is good. The life urge in its manifestation always brings a degree of discontent with thngs as they are.

But when this discontent is not coupled with action, when it is allowed to degenerate into a sullen resistance to conditions, one soon loses his power of adjustment and begins to travel toward the negative side of life and away from the life of power and success.

Real power and real success are largely the product of one's ability to adjust to circumstances and environment. The weak and unsuccessful simply wilt or blindly resist in the face of obstacles. The wise and the strong find a way around or over by using their adaptive powers and their constructive ability.

If your best efforts fail before some particular obstacle, then *let go* and adjust to it instead of going on sullenly resisting what you cannot overcome.

When your attention is concentrated upon resistance, without constructive effort or ideal, your forces are simply going to waste.

Focus them upon some constructive action. If you cannot find a way around or over the thing that opposes you, ignore it and turn your forces into some other channel but do not keep on wasting time and energy in merely sulking.

Power is developed by action preceded by constructive thought.

Power is dissipated by sulkiness toward life and intense resistance to obstacles. The tide of your forces soon runs low if you repress them and refuse to give them a channel of expression.

It is self-expression, constructive action, achievement, experience that brings power and freedom.

Much of our dissatisfaction is mere fretful resistance and due simply to a bad habit of thought.

For instance, I have before me a letter from a woman who says: "I have been married almost thirty years and every day I am more and more dissatisfied with myself and the way I am obliged to live. I have five healthy children and a healthy husband. We have managed to save considerable money." There are many mothers who would feel that, given these conditions and a husband of good habits, they could manage to be fairly contented, but this woman finds that she is "constantly at war" with herself. Now many of the things she desires are perfectly reasonable and even justly due her, but what a waste of energy to spend thirty years worrying about them.



One of the chief obstacles to her getting what she desires is her husband's attitude towards spending money. But if she had let go mentally and adjusted herself, for the time, to conditions which it seemed she could not change and worked with her husband mentally, who knows to what extent his attitude might have been guided and changed. Read "Evolution of a Real Marriage," in May, 1917, Nautilus, for an illustration of what can be accomplished in this line.

Resistance without constructive aim simply leads away from the things we want and defeats our desires and purposes or rather leads to a lack of desire and purpose.

What to Do With a Wandering Mind.

Perhaps your mind wanders because you give it nothing to do.

The habit of letting the thought drift wheresoever it will into all sorts of idle picturings and useless reproductions of past scenes and experiences is very general. Concentration will aid in directing the mind into productive, creative channels at will. Concentration is mostly a matter of using a little will power and using it persistently.

In all mental training it is the repetition of the desired thoughts until the right mental habits have been formed that brings the results. The big result is built upon a whole lot of small and seemingly insignificant victories.

So it is in developing concentration. A few moments of idle, useless thoughts seem of small account, but these moments repeated finally result in a vicious cycle of thought habits which one would be glad to get rid of. Concentration is developed in the wrong direction. Replace the undesirable thoughts with some subject you want to focus your mind upon and then keep bringing your thoughts back to your subject. You can soon develop concentration if you really want to.

The great reason so many try to develop concentration and fail is because they are not willing to do the simple preliminary work, to make the needed effort of will to direct the mind instead of allowing it to drift in the thought cycles already formed. The method is so simple that they will not adopt it. They are looking for something wonderful and intricate that will give them an immediate short-cut to the desired results, like the poor and ignorant African who searches for "learning pills" by means of which he hopes to immediately open the doors of knowledge.

When you are alone, give your mind something to think about that is worth while.

John C. Calhoun told a friend that he "had early subjected his mind to such a rigid course of discipline, and had persisted without faltering until he had acquired a perfect control over it; that he could now confine it to any subject as long as he pleased without wandering even for a moment; that it was his habit, when he set out alone for a walk or a ride, to select a subject for reflection, and that he never suffered his attention to wander from it until he was satisfied with its examination."

Psychic Sources of Success and Happiness.

It is well to be dissatisfied, because that means progress, advancement, improvement.



If you are wholly satisfied with yourself or your environment you are stagnant, a slave to thought habits, and you are facing toward death instead of toward life. For to be wholly satisfied means that you have lost the vision of greater things, that faith has been allowed to die within you.

But discontent is another matter—worry and uneasiness without constructive action, resistance to environment which for the time being you cannot seem to change, etc. This is destructive. It acts destructively upon the body. It acts even more destructively upon success and character. It binds one to the very things he least desires—or the things he thinks he least desires.

Discontent and blind unreasoning mental resistance to conditions acts as a psychic poison. It begets nervousness, indecision, lack of will power, high blood pressure and hardening of the arteries, according to some of the best medical psychologists who have spent years in studying mental phenomena.

Fortunately it is within our power to entertain power building, health and happiness creating thoughts in place of discontent breeding ideas, and these health and power thoughts actually and literally have the ability to chemicalize the physical body and make the man who habitually entertains them a far more efficient, healthy and happy being. In the wonderful chemical laboratory of the mind these thoughts generate the emotions which transform the body, act as a great stimulus to health and increase efficiency and action power.

Listen to what a well-known physician and member of the American Medical Association, William S. Sadler, M. D.,

has to say on these points in his book, "The Psychology of Faith and Fear": "We have observed patients within one month's time, as a result of increased courage and an improved feeling of general well-being, increase their lung capacity fifteen to twenty per cent." And again: "Drugs and other agencies possess the power of greatly stimulating and marvelously arousing certain debilitated and weakened nerve centers. It is now known that the mind-the willpossesses similar power. * * * Psychic influences are undoubtedly able to hasten the process of repair and encourage the work of healing, following both accidental wounds and surgical operations. * * * The mind possesses almost unlimited power which can be exercised toward the prevention of dyspepsia and the improvement of digestion. * * * Mental influences are able to increase or decrease both the quality and the quantity of nearly all the digestive secretions. * * * Mental courage augments muscular strength. * * The psychic state has the ability to increase fatigue, or to enhance rest. * * * The mind is more powerful in overcoming drug habits than any other single agency. * * * Happiness has its origin and existence only in the mind."

If you want success and health, entertain the thoughts from which health and success are generated. The power of choice is yours. Use it.

Behind the Scenes in Germany.

Ambassador Gerard in his "My Four Years in Germany" (published by George H. Doran Co., New York), clears up much in connection with the war



which has long puzzled us. He reveals through the published official documents and his own experiences in Germany some of the reasons which made war with the United States inevitable.

He proves that the German leaders carefully and systematically cultivated a sentiment among the people for a war with America.

He records the personal threats of the Kaiser, "America had better look out after this war," and "I shall stand no nonsense from America after the war," backed by similar sentiments from many prominent German officials.

Nothing in this interesting book is better worthy of study than the chapter which deals with "Hate." Here we have a key to a portion of the German psychology which has puzzled the world. I quote from page 308: "Hate in Germany is cultivated as a noble passion, and, during the war, divines and generals vied with each other in its praise. Early in 1917, the Prussian General in command at Limburg made a speech in which he extolled the advantages of hate, and said there was nothing like getting up in the morning after having passed a night in thought and dreams of hate."

After this we are not surprised at the following incident, related on page 166. Mr. Gerard had learned of many instances where it was claimed the civil population had annoyed war prisoners. So he was especially pleased one day to read in the official newspaper, the North German Gazette, an item describing in detail the punishment (imprisonment) meted out to certain civilians who had "been guilty of improper con-

duct towards prisoners of war." Upon investigation he learned that the "improper conduct''-which brought substantial terms of imprisonment as punishment along with an exhortation that their names might "be held up to the contempt of all future generations of Germans''-this awful conduct consisted in giving something to eat and drink to a few hungry and suffering war prisoners who were passing through the town where the incident occurred. Neither are we astonished to learn further that Lissauer was specially honored, and decorated by the Kaiser, for writing his famous "Hymn of Hate."

On the interesting question of who started the war Mr. Gerard offers substantial light in the shape of the Kaiser's personal note to President Wilson, published in facsimile on pages 433 to 438. This naive document is another good illustration of the peculiarities of German psychology, for it goes far to prove the contention of the nations engaged in the war against Germany that upon Germany alone rests the responsibility for the beginning of that war.

Regarding Germany's ambitious plans for world conquest, too, Mr. Gerard offers much illuminating and interesting evidence, including statements by no less a personage than the Crown Prince, who frankly outlined to an American woman Germany's plan to gain dominion over the world, including America.

This book should be read by every American, that we may understand "where we are at" in this war.

HOW I BECAME WHAT I AM BY C. H. T.

000

ONE has to be personal if he has set out to write under such a title. At the risk of appearing blatantly egotistical, may I say that I am what the world, I suppose, calls successful? But in my own heart I know that I am not. I have simply done the best I could, and tried to show those whose lives have crossed mine how to do the same.

I earn a good living—sufficient for all my wants, which are few and simple. I count among my greatest blessings my hosts of friends; and—I love my work. In the words of Browning, I "do that which some men dream of all their lives." To love one's work! Could mortal ask more?

In my youth I discovered that my greatest fault was impatience. I could never play a game without wishing to win it. I could not seem to stand defeat, though I think I always managed to cover my humiliation. I soon saw

that I would have to conquer this failing. It got me nowhere. I am a person of instant decisions myself; and I expect others to give me what I give them. But I learned that this is asking too much of one's fellows.

I took stock of myself. I had few talents; but I had a great love for music, a love of the beautiful, and a quick appreciation of the best work of the masters. I was not a strong child. Illness followed illness, and three times I have been close to death. I dreamed a lot. I read all the poetry I could lay my hands upon, and at sixteen I had published some verse of my own in papers not usually open to one so young. I found that through words -particularly through words that rhymed-I could express my inmost thoughts far better than in any other way; and I determined to keep at it until I had acquired some technique. I wanted fame, not fortune. I read only the great poets. The smell of printers' ink fascinated me, and along with my desire for production came another and equally strong desire-to be an editor. I had to earn my own living when I was still very young; and I was wise enough to realize that through poetry I could not make even my salt. So I studied the magazines diligently, and always ahead of me there was a light that urged me on, a still small voice that told me nothing was impossible.

I prepared for college. I had a wonderful father, a man of scholarly attainments who had written a Latin grammar and a series of arithmetics. But I hated mathematics, and but for him I should have failed always in my examinations. To my father, now passed on, I owe much. To our home, poor as we were, came people of culture-men and women of distinction; and I was allowed to sit in the room and listen to their conversation. I had a retentive memory. And I had, fortunately, access to a splendid library. If I heard a certain book referred to, I would quietly look it up. New worlds were thus opened to me. Literature was like wine in my veins. I liked biography and history best, but I also liked the great novelists and essayists.

Though a mathematician, my father was also a writer; but oddly enough he abominated poetry. It was from my mother's side of the house that I got my love of song. Rhythm in words—how it appealed to me! But the stern rhythm of figures—I could not tolerate it. I suffered—no one knows how much—over algebra and calculus in those early days.

One day a wise friend said to me: "You want to be a literary man? Well, don't bother with figures. You will always be able to count all the money you earn!"

I took his advice. It was the best I ever had given me; for half the struggle of human existence lies in our inability to discard the non-essentials. We waste years in tragic endeavor that will lead us nowhere in the end. For that reason I think that our system of education is all wrong. Of what use to a poet is cube root? If one's taste runs to languages, cultivate it, to the exclusion of every other road to learning.

Then I became ill; and the regret of my life is that I could not finish my college course. But I had no time for regrets. When I recovered financial disaster descended upon us, and I had to do my little share to keep the family going.

I was then only eighteen. I began sending my verses to the best magazines. With startling regularity they came back. One day I received five dollars from a literary journal known the world over for its discrimination in the selection of its poetic contributions. I was thrilled—but humble. But I knew in my heart that my luck was not an accident. I had worked hard over that lyric, and perhaps I had earned my reward.

I am not so much a believer in luck as I amin a divinity that shapes our ends. To a certain extent we are the masters of our fate, the captains of our souls. The man who waits for inspiration will seldom find it. I believe in the gospel of work; and I know that while a mysterious force does come to the artist every now and then, almost holding the pen that flies across the page or the brush before the canvas, there is another force, definite and concrete, that can be drawn upon at will, and made man's very slave. The sluggard used to wait, at evening, for someone to fetch a candle; now we turn on the electric switch and flood our room with light. There are electric switches in our bodies. It is only occasionally that we have to call on the Divine Electrician to repair them.

The family began to take me seriously, though not too seriously. Why is it that the poetic impulse is always a matter for banter? A youngster may be an artist, a musician, a sculptor, and not be laughed at. But a poet!—it is unthinkable! Perhaps the very fact that for a long time I had to do my scribbling in secret was the best thing that could have happened to me. My art, as I chose to call it, became my dearest friend. Oh, those guarded meetings, those trysts with the Muse! I can never forget them. And how many friends, in the years to come, they were to make for me!

I knew no one in editorial work. How, then, was I to achieve my dearest dream? My frail health had made it necessary for me to spend over a year in the country; and during that year I read-and read. My father tutored me for a few hours each day. I formed a sensitive taste, and I committed to memory long passages from the poets, and sang them to myself at night, alone under the eaves, when the rain rushed by or the white moon sailed through heaven. I was deliriously happy. I was young-and, best of all, I knew it. I also knew that youth would go; that this time of dream and delight could not last forever. The world was a place to fight in. I had my part in the great struggle. I must go forth with others to battle.

I went back to New York. A brother-a lawyer-told me of a client of his who would give me a place if I learned stenography and could act as his private secretary. I would get twelve dollars a week. I was so happy that I did not even ask the nature of the client's business. Somehow, I supposed he was an editor, or at least an author. He was a pump manufacturer! But I sailed in, and learned shorthand in three months, without an instructor. Anyone can do it. I worked hard, in a miserable factory building on the outskirts of the city. But here my impatience bothered me. "You are a poet," said an interior, egotistical voice. "This is not what you should be doing. Get out of it!"

I became restless and miserable. I became introspective. I analyzed the motives of everybody with whom I came in contact, and I analyzed myself minutely. I crossed every bridge before I came to it. I worried over trivialities. I made mountains of trouble out of molehills of nothing. And I felt—I confess it with deep shame—that I was too good for my job!

Then, one day, when I was particularly morose and discontented, I was sent into the very heart of that factory, on some errand, and I saw the men sweating-it was a blistering summer day-and I got a first-hand view of Life as it is to the great majority of mortals. I was only nineteen, remember, and I had not learned to be a philosopher. I saw tragic faces working over great machines, and boys too young to be lifting heavy rods of iron and steel. I grew ashamed of myself. What had I to complain of, sitting in a cool office, with an electric fan blowing near my desk, writing a few letters a day, going home early to books and friends I loved? I was reborn in that hour; and from that first glimpse of a dim, hot, thundering foundry, the so-called "common people" have meant more to me than the stars.

In my discontent I did not know that things were shaping themselves for me. I know it now. I had talked of a little magazine to be started by the pump manufacturer, to be circulated as a news bulletin solely among his employees in other cities. It actually came into existence. My letters had evidently been well written, well punctuated; for I was chosen as the editor. That, I think, was the happiest day of my life. An editor—so soon!

I learned about make-up and cuts, printers and types. And I read the proof and edited

all the copy, and talked long with the head of a neighboring composing room, and learned to love every man who helped me get out that little eight-page paper.

Always, since that day in the foundry, as I have said, I have been interested in the real workers of the world. On an ocean liner it is not my fellow passengers who interest me most, but the stokers in the hole who cause the ship to move. I count among one of my best friends a certain printer man who not only makes books, but loves them. I made his acquaintance back in those early days.

In the meantime I kept at my writing. How impatient I was to be a real author! But here was a healthy impatience, unlike the former demon that had tortured me. Little cheques began to float in. In a year or so the big pump business was consolidated with another, and I saw the end of my little, but greatly loved, periodical. I had to scurry about for a new job.

I heard of an editor who wanted a secretary. I went bravely to him, with no letter of introduction, and told him of my desire to enter his employ. He took me, on trial. I remained a year, with periods of both happiness and unhappiness. This editor was a man of violent temper, who, in a passion brought on by nothing at all, would not listen to reason. He almost broke me down. But I learned much from him, for to his house came all the great writers of the day, and I listened to and absorbed engrossing conversations on literature and the other arts. The atmosphere was good for me; but I could not stand the strain of my employer's moods. I wanted to be a real editor; so one day one of the magazines that had been printing a few of my poems took me on as a reader of manuscripts-at ten dollars a week less than I had been receiving! Some of my friends told me I was quite mad to accept such an offer. But I wanted the added experience, and I wanted to get out of secretarial work. Within ten months after I went to this magazine the editor-in-chief died, and I was promoted to assistant editor, at double the salary I had been getting. It was a stroke of luck, if you will; but it was a new periodical, and I had worked hard to make a go of it. I had given all my evenings, Sundays, holidays. And somehow I could not help feeling that, after all, I had earned my good fortune.

Someone has said that life is nothing but discovering the truth of platitudes. We cast

our bread upon the waters—and after many days it returns to us. We don't believe that in our youth. We say, "What's the use," and laugh at the thought that it is more blessed to give than to receive.

If you give of your best self, good will come back to you. And what is good but God? I can remember having to forego a longed-for and much-needed vacation in those days because of extra work to be done. Gladly I gave it up; and five years later I was sent on a six weeks' trip abroad, with all my expenses paid! And, looking back, I know that what I learned through that extra labor was the stepping stone that brought me to the job that, in turn, brought me the journey to Europe.

To everyone of us there comes, at times, a mysterious Expert Accountant, who demands that we take stock of our equipment, render a statement to Him, spread all our cards on the table, and let Him see how we stand. This process corresponds to the spring housecleaning, to the planting of seeds in the garden in April, to the stock taking in large businesses.

What was I truly worth? Was it better for me, now that I was pretty well established in editorial work, to give up the writing of verse, and devote my whole life to editing? If I did both, when would I have time for relaxation, for my own reading, so essential to me, for the social duties that become more exacting as a man grows older?

I confess that for a while I thought that the writing of verse would hurt me in my more nerve-trying work. People would not take me seriously in one field or the other. Was I endeavoring, selfishly, to serve two masters? I had better concentrate. I told myself, on the better-paying job. I was a pretty good business man by this time-that is, I was a good business man for everyone but myself !- and the writing of poetry did not seem a very businesslike occupation! Then I woke up, and was ashamed of thoughts like these. If I wrote only for money I could well abandon my verse; but so long as it came from my heart it was my duty to keep on, to chirp my little song. I could keep my own soul in tune, if I could do nothing more. I must sing if I had to; if the urge was not sufficient, then I must remain silent.

Well, I have gone on singing, as best I might, and I have gone on editing as best I

might, too. What is the result? I am everlastingly busy. I never ride on a train but I write a poem. The rhythm of the cars sends rhythm through my mind, through my whole being. I am never bored; and I am never alone. I have cultivated concentration of thought—a difficult thing for me to do, for I am naturally of a nervous disposition. I can write anywhere—on my lap, in a crowd, on the back of an envelope, on the floor, in a sleeping-car berth. And I divide my time so that I have time for everything. They say it takes a busy man to write a letter. It takes a busy man to write a poem, too.

I lead two wonderful lives. I can drop my work at the office like a garment, because I have trained myself to do so, and haunt, like the night-jar, the woods of song in the evening. I am a gregarious animal, who loves his fellowmen, so that my days are full indeed. I walk in the woods when the mood is on me; I climb skyscrapers with as much delight as I climb mountains; for I feel-yes, I knowthat beauty is everywhere, in the teeming city as well as in the open country, in the blue lights of Broadway, as well as on the sea beneath the stars. And I try to tell of what I myself have experienced, for I find then that I tell of what you have experienced; for are we not all much alike? And are we not here to fight our big battles, together, through mutual understanding?

We find ourselves through silence. "The hills are mute, yet how they speak of God!" If only we could learn that if we will remain still the stars themselves will come down to us. Oh, the energy in quiet, in self-communion! The deepest love is a silent love. How many of us can keep still—and listen?

The world is wonderful—if we will only have the eyes to see. I am happy because a cobblestone is as interesting to me as a flower; a 'bus ride as thrilling as an ocean voyage. And remember, now that I happen to edit one of the big magazines of the country, I have only a feeling of humility in the face of what God has given me; a pride, not in myself, but in my work; a joy in service and in restored health; a profound belief that there are other worlds to conquer after this; and ecstacy in the knowledge that a few of my poor songs have reached the hearts of some of my fellow mortals.

I haven't done much. If I should sign my name you would know that!

M ANY striking instances of the power of that Thought which we call New have come under my personal observation, but the three following cases will, perhaps, cover a larger field than others.

A boy of ten was brought to me one day by his mother, who was in great distress. "I think it only fair to state," she said, "that I have little understanding of New Thought, and not an atom of faith in it—it is only a last resort. My son has been coughing for weeks; he neither eats nor sleeps, or lets us sleep. What do you think you can do for him?"

The boy, Clarence A., was a thin, nervous little chap, very evidently under the psychology of his mother's fear and worry, as children are only too prone to be. We exchanged a friendly smile, and in that smile was born the assurance in both my mind and his that he was not only open to the Word of Truth, but that he was in that instant "healed"! It was really the mother who needed help. However, I asked Clarence to

lie down on the couch and relax entirely and completely, and told the mother that the case was out of her hands-she had no responsibility, and nothing to fear. She sat quietly, more or less amused by the whole proceeding, apparently, but not interfering in any way, and while for perhaps ten minutes I silently told Clarence the TRUTH about himself, he slept peacefully. At the end of that time he awoke with a look of new life and joy in his eyes, and they were dismissed with the injunction to report the next morning.

Early the next day the mother phoned to say, "Well, I am forced to believe that there is something in New Thought, for Clarence slept sweetly all night long, and never disturbed us once." Nor did the cough return. Immediately the tension of the mother's mind was loosened the boy was free. This is invariably the case in children's ailments: it is the anxious parent who needs reminding that the Law of Rightness is the only real law in the universe. The child is closer to harmony and truth than the "grown-ups," for they are, indeed "of the Kingdom of Heaven," and partake of it in mind. In this particular case the mother said she had no faith-but she had enough to bring her there, which was the necessary "grain of seed."

For several years I was associated with one of the Truth Centers in Southern California, and during that time had considerable of the visiting of patients too ill to come to us for This, of course, had its drawtreatment. backs, and I had just finished saying to a friend, "If I were doing an entirely independent work, I should never go out to students. but do the work absently," when the telephone rang. I answered it, and found the call was for someone to go immediately to see a man with appendicitis-and the case was assigned to me!

I found the patient, Mr. W., a young man under sentence of death from the attending physician, unless he submitted to an operation at once. He had refused to do this, and had dismissed the doctor. Mr. W.'s wife had been greatly helped some years previous by mental treatment, but he himself had never thought much about it. In this extremity, however, he did think very earnestly, and had finally said—"Call a teacher. I have decided that nothing but the power of God can cure me, and I am going to rely on that and nothing else."

Truly, man's extremity is God's opportunity,

for the very first treatment left Mr. W. entirely freed from pain, rested, serene, and absolutely confident of recovery. I called the next morning, to find him bolstered up in a big chair, sitting on the porch in the sunshine. and eating a breakfast composed of things the physician would have been horrified to see!

In one week, instead of six as he had been warned would be his fate under the best of conditions, Mr. W. was back in active work, and is still hale and hearty after five years have gone by, never having had any recurrence of the attack.

The statement used in this case was one declaring the Christ mind to be his mind, and operating in him to manifest externally IT-SELF. "LET that mind be in you!"

The third case was one of spiritual rebirth -a case of the Prodigal Son coming to himself, and in that coming beholding literally a new heaven and a new earth-a state of mind that made possible a new life, which he has proven for over four years.

When Mr. D. first came he was, as he expressed it, "Down and out." He had tramped the streets for three nights, sleeping for an hour or two in doorways or in the park, until "moved on" by the authorities; he was penniless, hungry, hopeless and helpless; in a strange town far from home. Truly, in a Far Country, separated from his Good!

His was a pitifully common story. A man of unusual gifts and abilities; a splendid salesman, a convincing talker, great intuitive powers; but to counter-balance these things, a perfect passion for gaming, and a desire for the fleeting "punch" that whisky gives.

As he was wandering the streets he had been attracted by the sign in front of the house, and followed his impulse to come to the door. He grasped at the truths presented him, as a starving man grasps food. It almost seemed, watching his acceptance of the statements made, as if his readiness to believe must be a pose, so complete and simple was it. Again the childlike attitude of mind, without which none can "enter in" to understanding.

Mr. D. had never done manual labor, but clerical work was almost impossible to secure at that time, and he said he was ready and willing to do anything. Through the lovingkindness of an interested man and wife, Mr. D. was taken into their home as a guest, and there helped financially, physically and spiritually to get on his feet and regain his

self-respect.

Later, night work was procured for him, which he performed faithfully. His little family joined him, and for the first time in many years the wife knew peace; knew what it was to be free from anxiety as to what condition the husband might come home in, and finally came to realize that this was not a case of temporary reformation, an hysteric reaction following debauch, but a genuine example of a "twice-born" man. It took time for her to believe this—she reasoned from past experience that it would not last. "I wish I could believe," she said, "but you will see!" Now she is confident and unafraid, as is the man.

"I say unto you that joy shall be in heaven over one, who, having missed the mark of his high calling, tries again, and *succeeds*, more than over ninety and nine of those who have never diverged from the way of life, and therefore have not known the need or the joy of returning!"

AST month I promised you some gossip and some "revelations" about gossip. and some "revelations" about gossip. You will find the "revelations" in my editorials in this Nautilus, and here is the gossip. Just a nice little postscript instalment of it,

over the tea-cups:

That was not only the best Alliance Congress yet, from the point of view of the New Thought movement at large, it also was the most delightful and interesting one, with a much larger number of good speakers than at any of the other Congresses that we have attended. The "New Speaker's Day" was great, and brought forth several exceptionally good addresses. Some of these speakers will certainly be "called" at large to speak at the next Congress. And I think "New Speaker's Day" will be an institution of Alliance Congresses hereafter, so successful was this

Among the personalities that came to us through this occasion was the honorable Robert Whitaker of Los Gatos, Cal. But he could not speak at that meeting because his train did not arrive until the next day!—so he delivered his address on "New Thought— Shall It Speak as a Voice of New Sectarianism, or as The Voice of All Truth and All Humanity?" at the last Sunday morning session. I was not there to hear him, because I was speaking for Dr. Schroeder in his beautiful new church of Practical Christianity. But when I came back everybody was exclaiming over how perfectly fine Mr. Whitaker's address was. All California knows Robert Whitaker and his splendid People's Institute at Los Gatos. In addition to this Mr. Whitaker is a poet and writer of distinction, a genial friend, and as good looking as he is well speaking. Yes, I heard him speak, briefly, at some of the other sessions.

Another real personage who emerged at that new speaker's meeting was that charming Mrs. Mary L. S. Butterworth, who gave a ten minutes' talk on "Our Great, Big and Noble Work of the New Thought." She is a live wire, an inspiring personality with a message of universal love. Also she is a singer with a beautiful voice, with which she charmed the Alliance, as well as Dr. Schroeder's church on Sunday morning. She is recording secretary for the Germantown branch of that wonderful Philadelphia orchestra of which Stokowski is the leader. She says this is the most wonderful orchestra in the country now. Privately I think it will

have to go some to beat Stransky's New York Philharmonic, which came to Holyoke last night for its sixth annual concert.

To go back to Mrs. Butterworth, she is also a director of the Matinee Musical Club, the largest musical club in the east, with over 700 members. And chairman of the music committee of the Philadelphia chapter of the D. A. R., largest in Pennsylvania, with 450 members. So you see, she is a real musician. And she is leader of the New Thought Unity Center at 432 Presser building, Philadelphia, and of the Germantown New Thought Unity Center, which opened in October, 1916, and has double-tripled its membership and has \$300 surplus in its treasury! The Philadel-phia Center was reorganized on a democratic basis in October, 1916, and they have all sorts of interesting activities, including Sunday evening public meetings, noon meetings at 12.30, and a paid secretary, Mrs. C. D. Pollard, and \$500 in the treasury! Mrs. Butterworth teaches a Bible class of 69 members. And the best of these centers is that they have a lot of other live wires besides Mrs. Butterworth—among them Mrs. Theodore Presser, whose husband owns the Presser building. Mrs. Butterworth is beautiful and And she has at least two other beautiful and dear friends associated with her, and they all three went on the same train with us to the Congress. So we got quite well acquainted. One of the friends is Mrs. George Omerly, secretary and treasurer of the Germantown center; the other is Mrs. Kenton Warne (wife of the Philadelphia banker), whose work with children, and her acceptance of the office of chairman of the Children's Committee of the Alliance I told you about last month.

Another new ten-minutes speaker was Ida Jane Ayres of Indianapolis, another live wire personality and a practical business woman, who gave us a fine address on "New Thought in the Business World." She was a coworker with Mrs. Militz at one time, and is devoted to the New Thought. Her address "tasted like more," and everybody was delighted to vote for her as a Field Secretary for the Alliance. Here's hoping she will be

kept very busy.

Then there was that pretty and delightful little Miss Mida Sharpe of Melbourne, Australia, who spoke charmingly on "Divine Ir-responsibility." After the Alliance she went down to New Orleans with another of our

distinguished new speakers, Mrs. Eleanor G. Graham of New Orleans.

Mrs. Graham is another charming and forceful and beautiful new personality, and her address on "The Democracy of New Thought" was warmly received. They say Mrs. Graham is a prominent Federation of Clubs' woman in the South, and for a year or so she has been vice-president for the Alliance, for her state.

Then there was Dr. Julia Seton's splendid daughter, Juno Walton, D. D. S., of Chicago, who spoke well on "The Eternal Balance." Dr. Walton is a young woman of power, and everybody smiled to see the delightful resemblance to her mother, with whom she is a strong co-worker in the New Civilization

Churches.

The one man who appeared on the regular program of new speakers was Mr. Emil Clifford Hartmann of Kansas City, Divine Science teacher, a fine big young German in appearance, whose address on "Knowing Jesus Christ" was approved by many.

All these who appeared on New Speaker's Day were unusually good, with messages and personalities that would command a hearing before any intelligent audience. Not one that would make anybody even think of "the hook"! I have no doubt that they will be called for on next year's program. But how are they going to find room for them all on the program? That question becomes more of a rub every year. New Thought is certainly developing a remarkably large number of very good speakers, and the Alliance is providing ever increasing audiences to hear them.

But those were not the only new speakers who appeared before the Alliance: the new speakers far outnumbered the old ones, and I am not sure that in the aggregate at least they did not outweigh them in interest. I will tell you about them next time, and also about the "old reliables." But just now I must use my space to tell you an interesting

incident that is too good to keep:

I want to tell you about a couple who came and spoke to me after the question meeting on the last Saturday night: Mr. and Mrs. Leon Greenbaum, P. C. S. Mr. and Mrs. Greenbaum have been regular Christian Science practitioners for twelve years. For the last two years they have been persona non grata with Mrs. Eddy's church, because Mr. Greenbaum and his people refused longer to be bound by the ever-increasing prohibitions of the C. S. church. Since then Mr. Greenbaum has been calling himself "Primitive Christian Science practitioner, teacher and lecturer," and he has been doing the unforgivable thing of expounding from "Science and Health" and the Bible. Lese-majeste in the Christian Science church consists in expounding "Science and Health." A practitioner is not permitted to teach at all: he is permitted only to point to some sentence or paragraph in Mrs. Eddy's book, that will answer your question. At the Congress and since, I have been hearing of a lot of others who are com-

ing out of the C. S. church, because they refuse to be bound longer by this and other limitations set forth by the mother church as LAWS for all practitioners. Good for Mr. and Mrs. Greenbaum, and for all the other dissenters from the limitations imposed upon Christian Science by the present wholly masculine law-givers of that church. Perhaps if a few more "regulars" dissent and refuse to obey foolish prohibitions the masculine management will begin to unbend and relax and recall its verbotens.

Which reminds me that in management the Christian Science church and the I. N. T. A. are exact opposites: the C. S. church is managed by a few men with the women left out; while the I. N. T. A. is ruled by majority vote of all its members present and voting. The C. S. management is limiting the expression of individual revelation, in order to build a more powerful organization; the I. N. T. A. works to free all its individuals to unlimited self-expression. With the C. S. church it is a case of the people for the church: with the Alliance it is a case of the Alliance for every person in it. The Christian Science church will go the way of all churches unless it democratizes itself to allow freedom of expression to all its members, with government by representatives elected by and responsible to its people. Only under that sort of regime can a church really grow in wisdom and in truth. It takes all the people to get all the wisdom from God.

To return to Mr. Greenbaum: one of the questions that was put up to me to answer at that question meeting on the last Saturday night, was this: "What is the difference between Christian Science and New Thought?" I answered it to the effect that Christian Science is to New Thought as the part is to the whole; that New Thought includes all the constructive, metaphysical truth that Mrs. Eddy taught, and it includes the realm of "commonsense" as well; that New Thought includes in its kingdom all metaphysical truth, and in addition it includes the physics which metaphysics meets. It stands firmly on the statement that ALL is good, that ALL works for good. And I told the story of what I learned from a C. S. regular of Kansas City. See my editorials in Nau-

tilus for July, 1916.

After the meeting was over I saw coming toward me a big man who looked like "somebody in particular," and by his side was a nice-looking and well-dressed woman who reminded me a little of Helen Van Anderson-Gordon, or that beautiful soul, Mrs. John M. McGonigle of Pittsburgh. They made themselves acquainted as Mr. and Mrs. Greenbaum, and Mr. Greenbaum told me their experience in the C. S. church. Then he made this statement: "I came to this meeting out of curiosity, and I find that we as protestants against the Eddy church government, belong in this New Thought Alliance. We fit right here. I had supposed that we stood alone in the world, and I find that New Thought is

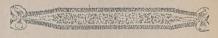

The seed of opportunity is thought -ideas, and knowledge is the best fertilizer; it leads to an opening up of better things in only one way-through growth.

Why not spread a little nourishment on the opportunities you already have? There isn't much of anything that is alive and young that may not grow bigger if we give it a better chance—"Youth is an attitude, not a condition."

Fulfillment of desire is not given on the instant of conception. Large opportunity is worthless to those who have not grown up to it. Nature provides milk for babies; of what use is corned beef and cabbage to a newborn child? Progress is merely a habit of growth. Happiness lies in accretion; the growing years are the happy years. B. A. W.—If I were in your place I would advertise in the best daily paper in my own city, or of any other city in which I was willing to locate, for the kind of a position I desired. It would not be necessary to give your name. You could have the replies sent in care of the newspaper in which the advertisement appeared. In the advertisement I would state my experience and qualifications. I believe that the experience you have had will make you valuable to other firms who want that particular kind of assistance, and if the salary you are receiving is really less than is being paid elsewhere for similar work, you ought to have no great difficulty in making a change which would be advantageous to you.

F. R. M.—You are building and maintaining the thought fences which keep you away from success. Your belief in heredity, your belief in your own capacity for failure (which in your case seems to amount to almost a pride in your own lack of ability), your attitude of aloofness towards the world in general, all serve to keep you right where you are. Instead of cultivating your self-confidence and your creative ability, you are cultivating and nourishing your own doubt of yourself and your own limitations. If you want to earn more you must make more of yourself. Instead of doing this you are making less of yourself day by day. You are setting your face towards failure and of course you are realizing it. So long as you are bent on failure you cannot be a very valuable assistant to anyone. In the matter of applying New Thought, take just one simple, plain statement at a time and try to apply it in your own life. Surely you can find something in the New Thought books

and magazines which you have read which you can understand and apply. Take that one you can understand and apply. Take that one thing, no matter how simple and insignificant it may be and apply it in your own life and live up to it; then, if you will keep on with your study you will find something else which you can understand and apply. The trouble is that you try to grab the whole thing at once, instead of taking just one detail at a time. One other thing, you need to get rid of your attitude of criticism towards other needs. You cannot know all of the details people. You cannot know all of the details connected with their lives. It is easy to criticize others but it is not so easy to live up to all the rules on your own account. Suggestion cannot help you unless you change your entire mental attitude towards the world in general and towards people. The world does not run to lay its gifts at the feet of one who is so super-jealous of his own rights and has such an exaggerated sense of what is due him from others. There are many opportunities in the world today for those who look for them and who are willing to give real service. When you can give the world something it desires and needs, it will reward you well. I know of a man over 70 years of age who, without a cent of capital beyond what was needed to pay his railroad fare, left the east and went to California, where he made good and succeeded in earning a living for himself and his family. You are much younger than that, and there are many more opportunities now than when this man started in. For instance, there are very fine opportunities for anyone who is willing to work at poultry raising, market gardening and truck farming. Suppose you spend a little more time in looking for some of these opportunities of which you might avail yourself and in studying out ways and means by which you can take advantage of them.

H. Y.—I think your first problem is to make a better use of your time. Almost everyone is very wasteful of time. I would suggest that you get the little book entitled "How to Live on Twenty-four Hours a Day," 56c. Geo. H. Doran Co., New York. It will give you much valuable information on how to make a more economical use of your time. In regard to the money question I would suggest that you go to your city library and consult a file of the Ladies' Home Journal. A year or so ago they published a valuable series of articles on "How I Helped My Husband to Earn More Money." You can get many good ideas from these articles, and it would be well worth your time to read them. As to the way in which you yourself can earn some money no one can advise you intelligently. Look around you and see if you can find some need that you can meet. I know of women who make a good income by selling canned fruit, jellies, etc. Others go into the poultry business on a small scale and make a very respectable income in that way. One woman who has written her experiences for The Nautilus has made a very good business out of collecting bills for the

business men and the professional men of her town. She began by collecting bills for her physician. She makes these collections on a commission basis and makes quite good money at it. Sometimes she makes as much as \$10 a day. The work is healthy, as it keeps one out-of-doors and provided one has a knack for meeting people and can talk with them without antagonizing them it does not require any unusual ability in any way. As to what your particular talent may be that is something that no one can decide for you especially unless they have an intimate personal acquaintance with you.

J. M. S.—If you are uncertain as to just what your talent is, the best thing to do is to pitch into the work nearest at hand and stick to it until you get a "strong" leading in some other direction. Success is a matter of "making good." Begin right where you are—until you know what you want to do, then begin to work toward the desired end. Yes, I think many people have a variety of talents, any one of which they might cultivate successfully. If you want to become an illustrator it seems to me that the commonsense thing for you to do is to make good at your present work until you have saved enough money to pay for a course at some reliable school. I am unable to tell you the kind of training you need, but you can get information regarding schools by writing to The School Bureau, Literary Digest, 354-360 Fourth Ave., New York City. Tell them the kind of a school you want and they will be able to put you in touch with one or more. Success is built by doing well a great number of small and seemingly insignificant acts. The place to begin is right where you are. If you want more success you must make more of yourself. You must get in the habit of meeting and conquering the obstacles which confront you every day and every hour of your life. You cannot become a master while drifting or while you are shirking the little duties which come before you day by day and hour by hour.

MRS. W. E. C.—Write down each night a list of the principal things you want to accomplish on the following day and the time you will devote to each of them. Then live up to your program. Check off each item when completed. The mere fact that you have a program to follow will act as a strong suggestion to accomplishment. The psychological effect of a program of action must be somewhat like that of competition. When you are working from a program you have an aim, a definite object. You are competing with time and you naturally try to live up to your schedule. You know how much better a child will work if he is given a definite stunt to be accomplished. This plan of action is the best means I know of for self-training that will help you to "deliver the goods."

In carrying out your program of course it is necessary to train yourself to attention and concentration upon your work, from which

interest will follow.

THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT IS IN URGENT NEED of thousands of typewriter operators and stenographers and typewriters. All who pass examinations for the departments and offices at Washington, D. C., are assured of certification for appointment. It is the manifest duty of citizens with this special knowledge to use it at this time where it will be of most value to the government. Women especially are urged to undertake this office work. Those who have not the required training are encouraged to undergo instruction at once.

Examinations for the departmental service, for both men and women, are held every Tuesday, in 450 of the principal cities of the United States, and applications may be filed with the commission at Washington, D. C., at any time.

The entrance salary ranges from \$1,000 to \$1,200 a year. Advancement of capable employes to higher salaries is reasonably rapid.

Applicants must have reached their eighteenth birthday on the date of the examination.

Carruth, manager of the tests department, will conduct the class in chemistry. The purpose of the school is to increase the efficiency of the employes and to prepare them for advancement—Springfield Republican.

In a sense far more tragic, far more terrible than Taft could have dreamed six years ago, Canada has been crowded by unseen forces to the veritable "parting of the ways." The fierce light flashed back by the experiences of these days upon the developments of the past half-dozen years reveals the secret and stealthy growth to alarming power of a hydra-headed monster, industrial, economic, social and political, a monster ruthless as any Prussianism, deadly to the democratic ideal as any divine right of kings. It is the invisible imperium of organized and selfish money power. It is the grasping hand of hard-featured special privilege, with its interlocked businesses, that plays both political parties, milks the blood of both, but is loyal to neither. It is the calculated patriotism of lip, that overtops all other voices in singing "God Save the King," but whose itching fingers plunder the pockets of the people.

In days like these, a sharpened point and a new pertinence are given to words spoken to a select company of Toronto's well-to-do several years ago by the late Earl Grey before he retired from the governor-generalship of Canada. Out of his open and democratic soul he warned Canadians against the perils of plutocratic power in this Dominion, when, as he foresaw, the historic dictum of Abraham Lincoln would be so perverted that democracy would be made to mean "the government of the people by the rascals for the

In Canada, as in every other country under heaven, there is, for the people, no lasting hope in the rule of the autocrats and the despots. Not less power, but more power, must be in the hands of the people. The people must be not only king, but, in their spirit and purpose and services, they must be kingly. If the red hand of revolution is to be turned back, and its menace averted, the right hand of Parliament must smash the impudent face of plutocracy, and put the nose of the political grafter forever out of joint. Do less, and democracy cannot survive the war-time strain. When the nation is at war against autocracy in Europe, the people of Canada must be king in Canada's national life.—Toronto Globe.

Twelve Vassar College girls this summer did a remarkable thing. They produced enough vegetables and grain to carry the eleven hundred students, the faculty, the employes and the live stock through until another harvest. Up with the hired men in the morning, they clothed themselves in bloomers and middy jackets, and went into the fields of the 740-acre college farm each day. For eight hours every day they worked as hard as their strength permitted, doing all the things the men did. Not until every acre had given forth its full yield did these patriotic young women call their summer's work finished. Five of these twelve girls have promised to come to the Eastern States Exposition and Dairy Show. Every day from the opening of the exposition until the close, these girls, dressed in their bloomers and middies, will give actual demonstrations of the manner in which they and their companions made the Vassar farm produce so abundantly in this year of extraordinary food requirements. No more inspiring thing has been done anywhere in the United States than stands to the credit of the Vassar unit. No other opportunity will be offered anywhere else in the United States to actually see these girls in action. If for no other reason, you ought to come to the Exposition to watch these girls plow, harrow, plant and sow, cultivate and reap, and be inspired by their example to bend your every energy to both produce and conserve food, that this nation may be the more speedily victorious in the war "to make the world safe for democracy."—Eastern States News, Springfield, Mass.

New York, October 18:—The Farmers' Non-Partisan League of North Dakota and Minnesota, the Missouri State Federation of Labor and the Michigan State Federation of Labor are among the many strong organizations that have adopted resolutions within the past few weeks urging taxation of land values as a means of raising war revenue. Louis F. Post, assistant secretary of labor, tells why land values should be taxed by the Federal Government and how this policy would work out, in an article contributed to The Public, of New York. Mr. Post's article will be brought to the attention of congressmen and other officials at Washington, and will be used as the chief document in a campaign to induce action along the lines urged by him. He says in part: That in financing our war for democracy democratic principles demand, besides rejection of long-time bonds and of direct taxes, the adoption of taxation of privileges in preference to every other variety of direct taxes, is a conclusion the correctness of which will be confirmed upon reasonable reflection. Let it be understood in passing that the last dollar of every fortune and of every income, little as well as big, and earned as well as unearned, saving only enough for a meager living, must be given up if necessary to sustain our men at the front while their lives are in the balance for our country's cause. But let us not wholly ignore the equities. We must no longer cling to the undemocratic custom of needlessly making no discrimination between parasitical profits and earned incomes—or of professing to make none while in fact favoring the former.—People's News Service.

Why is the Large Intestine Five Feet Long?

By R. W. Lockwood

Modern Science Declares That If Nature Had Made the Colon Shorter, Half the Ills of Mankind Would Not Exist—How Medical Science Now Combats This Problem

A VERY remarkable book, "Colon Cleanliness," has recently been published by Martin's Method, Inc. 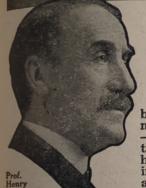

to the magazine. The directions were to put one penny in an envelope, "as the money-seed," for a definite purpose, and bless it every morning and night, and thank God for the increase. You ended your article with

the concise direction, "Try it."

I took you at your word; I tried it. The first week the result was nil, but at the end of the third week that envelope contained \$43.11. This is the way it came. I received an entirely unexpected call over the telephone, from the treasurer of a large packing and canning company, asking if I would like to make a little extra money. If so, I should call at his office within an hour. In one hour from that time I was engaged to make out the payroll and superintend the payment of three canning crews that had just arrived by ship from the salmon packing season in Alaska. I never requested this position, nor had I ever done such work before. It came unsolicited; lasted one week, and netted me \$43.00. The ten cents I found the second day I went to work, upon the sidewalk.

The company gave me thirty-five dollars. Five dollars I received from an outfitting concern, who had outfitted most of the men at the beginning of the season, and were waiting to collect their money. The Chinese who held the canning contract presented me with three dollars more. I should also mention that the outfitters took me to a fine restaurant and payed for my lunch. 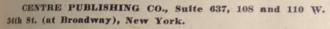

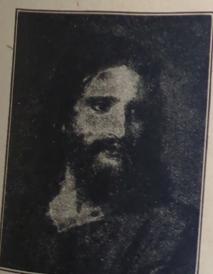

Work is the only thing that can redeem you from constant retrogression. Even though you may have inherited superb qualities from your father and mother, they will gradually deteriorate unless you exercise them, unless you strengthen and enlarge them by legitimate exercise under a worthy motive.

We all come naked into the world, and it owes us nothing but what we honestly win on our own initiative. The world owes us a living only in the same sense that the soil owes us a crop, or the gold and silver mines owe the miner a living. Before we can get the crop we must do our share in preparing the soil, in ploughing, planting, harrowing, cultivating, reaping. The precious metals would stay forever in the bowels of the earth if the miner did not do his part.

standing for what we are standing for; we want to come in and be one with you. It was what you said about Christian Science and New Thought that showed me where we stand."

These are Mr. Greenbaum's words, as nearly as my wide-awake interest—which is the secret of good memory—could record them. You may be sure that I did what an individual could toward extending the "right hand of Alliance fellowship" to Mr. and Mrs. Greenbaum, Primitive Christian Scientists.

Since the Congress I have heard about these two people, from various correspondents in St. Louis. They say Mr. and Mrs. Greenbaum have a large following, that they are highly thought of and influential in the city. They hold public church services, their textbooks are Mrs. Eddy's "Science and Health" and the Bible. And Mr. Greenbaum has established "The Primitive C. S. Publishing Co.," at 4700 McPherson Ave., St. Louis. And they call their church "The First Primitive Church of Christ Scientist in St. Louis." An extract from the church manual says this: "The members of this church shall be privileged (according to their desire) to unite t'e three functions in one in their individual field of action:"-the functions of preaching, teaching and healing, in conformity with Matthew 28:19, 20, and Mark 16:15, 17, 18,
