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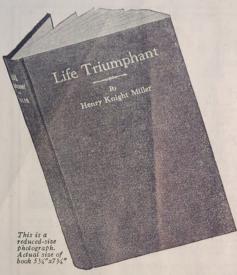
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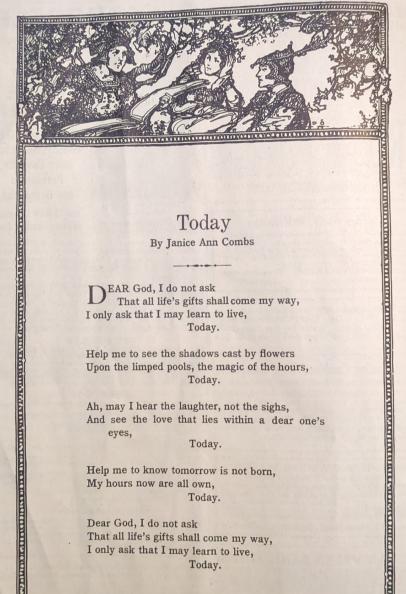

The Healing Method of Jesus Christ.

JESUS the Christ left to the world the Perfect Prayer: The Lord's Prayer; and a clear statement of his Healing Method.

For Jesus' Healing Method read Mark 11:22 to 26 inclusive.

Jesus begins by saying, "Have faith in God."

And he adds, "Whosoever shall say unto this mountain, Be thou removed, and be thou cast into the sea; and shall not doubt in his heart, but shall believe that these things which he sayeth shall come to pass; he shall have whatsoever he sayeth."

And then he adds his Healing Method: "What things soever ye desire, when ye pray believe that ye receive them, and ye shall have them."

Note that WHATSOEVER beginning: no limitation in that word—what things soever ye desire. That includes every conceivable thing that you can think of as desirable!

Then he adds: "When ye pray believe that ye receive them." Note that this is a present tense statement—believe that ye receive them, then and there, from God the Infinite Spirit to whom you are praying. And immediately he says: "And ye shall have them." Note the future tense of that "shall have."

What is previous?

What is praying? Can you conceive of "praying" without, asking somebody to give you something definite, some THING, something that has form? Of course not. When you pray to God you ask him to give you something that

has form-a dress, a pair of shoes for the small boy, a sum of money that is neededand so on.

Up to about sixty years ago the Christian world regarded the word prayer as synonymous with petition. "Oh, God, gimme!"-was the whole prayer.

But Iesus added something to the petition: When ye petition God for anything, believe that ye receive it. And you

shall have it.

Now let me put it into terms of modern psychology, like this: Whatsoever thing you desire, when you picture it to God and ask him to give it to you, picture yourself receiving it from Him then and there, taking it into your own spiritual hands, and thanking Him for the gift. "And you shall have it," said Jesus.

Very simple method, is it not? fectly practical for anybody to use that

method and prove it for himself.

Is that all there is to the method? No, there is one other thing necessary, and Jesus stated it in the words following, in the 25th verse: "And when ye stand praying, forgive, if ye have aught against any: that your Father also which is in heaven (within you) may forgive you your tresbasses."

Forgiving others releases your own mental tensions so that you may RECEIVE

from God that which you ask.

So, when you are about to pray, be sure you first ask the Spirit to remind you of the names of your "enemies," or who seem to be great trials to you, and then forgive them, one by one, definitely blessing them and giving your love to them to fill the lack that you have seemed to see in each. See them whole before God and in your own eyes, thanking God that he is, then and there, their wholeness, and vours.

Then picture to God the thing you desire for yourselt, or your loved ones. And believe or declare that you receive the thing

you ask.

Next, see that you pray for EVERY ONE IN THE WORLD to receive, if they desire, those same blessings you have asked for yourself and your loved ones. Picture yourself receiving from God the fulness of what you pray for, for all the world. Thank Him. Go on your way

rejoicing.

End your prayer with the Lord's Prayer, taking pains to note that this prayer has in it no me's, no I's, no mine's. In that prayer Jesus claimed for all the world just exactly what he claimed for himself and his beloved apostles.

Here Is Something for Boys and Girls Who Want to Get On.

IT was Paul who admonished us that I whatsoever things are true, beautiful, of good report, we are to think on these

things. (Phil. 4:8)

Thinking on these things brings into our consciousness and into our lives the "fruits of the Spirit," which are "love, joy, peace, long suffering, gentleness, meekness, goodness, faith and temperance."

And if Jesus was right, as we believe He was, then the "thinking on these things" will bring to pass that which He showed when He said, "Seek ye FIRST the kingdom of heaven (in the things upon which you think and work) and all these (good) THINGS shall be added unto you."

(Gal. 5:22, 23)

A good example of a man who made good by "thinking on these things" systematically was Marshall Field. He began as a poor boy in New England and became a great merchant prince in Chicago. The inspiration of religion The charm and effectiveness of enthusiasm

The enthusiasm must come from the heart, it must be natural. Otherwise it will not be a "charm"—it will not "work." It must be truth-telling enthusiasm, and "nothing in excess," as Athens inculcated.

By systematic thinking upon all these fourteen dominant ideas you become like them, more and more, every day in every

way.

In proportion as you trust your dominant ideas, you can BE YOURSELF and ex-

press day by day your own genius.

"Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy MIGHT." (Ec. 9:10) And thy MIGHT comes from dwelling daily with these fourteen dominant ideas.

Think on these things, and you will become de-hypnotized from the I-can'ts, the don'ts, the what's-the-use's, the cynicisms and doubts of yourself and the other shrivelling and devitalizing ideas which spring up from a more or less buried inferiority complex.

So shall you find your inferiority complex dissolving day by day in every wayit will give place to a healthy plexus—your real self.

Your dominant ideas are YOU. Cultivate God ideas, God qualities. Make them dominant. Think upon them, and express them in even the littlest things you do.

To do a little thing in the spirit of truth to the dominant ideas of your life, is to be great as God is great; as Jesus

Christ was great.

P. S. It is never too late to take the above advice and put it into daily practice. Years have nothing to do with it! As long as you want to progress, and will keep on practicing at it, you will grow.

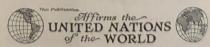

He was a most hideous sight to look upon and my heart ached for him. I refused to dismiss him from my mina but prayed for him with every ounce of faith in my soul.

Trying to shut my eyes to the hideous sights all around me, I went each day to the porch and felt myself regaining strength steadily although I had stopped praying for myself and spent all my prayers on my family and the man who had become another victim to the menacing hand of death. Try as I did to become hardened to the sorrow around me, I could not forget the young boy who lay in his room with his leg smashed. I later found out that this boy had been in there about sixteen months, with no hopes of getting out with both legs. I could not bear to think about such a young fellow losing his leg. I lengthened my prayers. "Oh! God, let the end of his suffering come soon. Please take him to his home in Heaven or to his home on earth where his loved ones wait for him."

Time passed, and I watched the progress of my two friends, neither of whom knew of my existence and do not to this day. It was miraculous! That is all I can say. I cannot make you understand the joy, the satisfaction and the complete happiness I experienced as I watched that man sit up in bed and stretch his arms with amazement as, day by day, the pain left them less twisted. The time came when I saw the family of this man come and take him home. I think I have never known greater

happiness than I knew that day.

Not long after this event, I saw my little friend of the crushed foot in a wheel chair, his foot bound up and held in place with splints to protect it. I was a little surprised, a few days later, to note that they had taken off the splints and most of the binding. In a very short time, he was walking with the aid of crutches. I then bade this very happy person good-bye and watched him join his astonished family, with thanks in my heart to the Great God for answering my prayers and giving me the testimony that has turned my whole

WERE I to ask what the world needs most of every person who comes to me for help, the majority would quickly respond: "Money!" That, however, would not be the answer. Money is a necessity, as we all know. Yet, it is a long way from being a vital need. What the world needs most to perfect its magnificent possibilities is faith, love and joy. Every one possesses faith in a greater or lesser degree. Without faith; however limited the amount may be, the ordinary functions of life would be impossible. Few lives are so impoverished as never to have experienced love. But, there are thousands who never cultivate the daily and hourly habit of joy.

There is nothing in the world which will pay as tremendous dividends, socially, spiritually and financially, as the constant practice of joyous enthusiasm and anticipation. The one who makes gladness a part of his daily ritual will find business coming to him, instead of his having to go after it. This attitude, held unwaveringly, will draw tenants to vacant apartments, offers of desired positions to waiting applicants, money to lean pocketbooks, and turn what otherwise might be the keenest of disappointments into triumphs of achieve-

Like a highly charged steel, attracting and holding only that which is magnetized to its own unit of force, joy attracts only good. It gives its faithful disciples an entirely new outlook upon life. It imparts sufficient energy, serenity, courage and faith to keep worry, fear and mental friction at bay. Friends will seek and fortune smile upon the habitual cultivator of joy.

The reason for this is easily found. The person holding this attitude is always expecting the good, always keyed to the exact note which draws to him with the surety of the magnet attracting the needle, the coveted friend, position, or whatever he may desire. My own experience with this practice has been so gratifying that I honestly believe that there are few things—within the scope of reason—which cannot

be demonstrated by generating the right amount of joyous enthusiasm.

Trying to accomplish results under pressure of will power, or attempting to apply spiritual laws in order to force demonstrations into existence by emphatic repeating of affirmations (however powerful those statements of truth may be), is pretty apt to develop tenseness. When that happens, anxiety appears, as a natural sequence. This destroys the creative attitude, which is never the case when the joyous outlook is present.

It is easy enough to create the glad anticipation that seldom fails to produce speedy and satisfactory conclusions. If you are in urgent need of money, imagine several thousand dollars coming unexpectedly into your possession! Picture to yourself exactly how you would feel if that event took place! Paint your emotion in glowing colors! Get into the thrill of it! Let blithe, entrancing, intoxicating gladness have full sway over you! Do not do it once or twice and let it end there! Keep persistently at it, day after day. Make it so real, so vivid that you are able to store up a large reserve on which you can constantly draw.

When using this attitude to rent suites, houses or rooms, become as still physically and mentally as possible. This is necessary that the thought of the Spirit of the Lord going before you, reaching the hearts and the minds of the tenants (who need what you have to offer, as much as you desire to offer it) may fill you with such a feeling of holy joy, and such a vivid sense of success that your desire will speedily manifest itself. Continue to act your part in joyous imagination, making it as real as if the prospective tenants were present in the flesh! After once beginning this practice, hold to it until it manifests itself before your eyes.

If it is a position that you wish to demonstrate, keep the corners of your mouth turned joyously and expectantly up, while you proceed to fill in every detail. Visualize offers of the position coming to you! Hear yourself accepting!

Put the glad notes in your voice as you answer! Feel your pleasure and extreme satisfaction at again being an active unit in the world's gigantic working force!

You must feell It is feeling that is of vital importance, first, last and always. Feeling joy is what changes a plain.

"Is Not This the Carpenter's Son?"

Revealing another step in the thought processes of Jesus, and showing how it applies to you

A T one time in the ongoing of Jesus there formed about him a group of people from his own town. They had heard a great deal about their home town boy, what a great man he had become, and consequently they were a little jealous of him. They went out to see him, question him, try him, heckle him. Nonplussed at the power and beauty of the man, they asked: "Is not this the carpenter's son?" Is this not the boy we have known all our lives? We know his sisters, brothers, his family; we know that he has not been away to college; where, then, does he get all these airs?

This word picture of an event is not merely a dialogue and report of a happening concerning the man, Jesus of Nazareth; it is a vivid word picture of a mental process with which every one of us is only too familiar, first as it concerns our friends and relatives and further as it concerns our own inner self.

Every one knows that if you look at a house from any angle that there are other angles to that house—your eye sees but one side of the house, but your *mind knows* that the house has other sides and that it looks different from each of these other sides.

The cosmic truth which Jesus dramatized for you, the mighty cosmic fact about you, looks different from different sides; hence, in the telling of this story there occurs in the Christine dialogues many word pictures, all dramatizing the same event but explaining it and dramatizing it from different

sides; and this is so because different minds approach any truth from different angles so the truth itself must have word pictures painted in consciousness which each will recognize from the side from which he makes his approach.

This same mental attitude is again approached in these words: "The stone the builders rejected"—and . . . "This is one of whom it is written, behold I send my messenger before thy face, which shall prepare thy way before thee" . . . and again—"For I say unto you, among them that are born of women, there hath not risen a greater than John the Baptist but he that is least in the kingdom of God is greater than he."

It will be recalled that, in the first case mentioned, those who lived in Nazareth received no healing "because of little faith"; that is, because they could not see the indwelling Christ in the man. All "they" could see (and identify) was . . . ". . the carpenter's son."

It will be recalled also that John, great as he was, lost his head—was beheaded.

In the modern world, we see those who "strain at a gnat, and swallow a camel"; those who refuse to recognize the God within because their eyes are glued to the . . . "carpenter's son"; those who are constantly losing their heads because they refuse to mind their own business. You will recall, of course, that John was cast into prison and later lost his head because he sought to tell a man what was right and wrong to do. He was not

satisfied with doing something himself, but he demanded that Herod stop living with his brother Philip's wife—as if it were any of John's business with whose wife Herod lived. John, great as he was, could not see the God in Herod. All he could see in Herod was a moral misstep (sin).

John, great as he was, great as were his words, failed to catch their significance as related to himself. For he said, in effect, "I confess, I am not he (the Christ) . . . 'He who cometh after me is mightier

than I.'"

After all his preaching he was unable to see that the inner light was given him for but one purpose—to see the same light in

the other fellow.

His mind was so warped with the vision of sin and evil, his training had been so persistent in pointing out the faults of others, his mind had been so saturated with the idea that *conduct* determines the action of Omnipotence, that he *lost his*

head—literally.

How is your mind? Just why are you seeking the inner light? Just what are you going to do with it when you perceive it? Are you going to use this inner light to make more plain and more visible to your mind the faults of your relatives and neighbors? If so—watch your step—especially watch your tongue—lest you, too, be "cast into prison" and later lose

your head—as did John.

It seems from this Christine dialogue that it does not make much difference how much you know unless you use some of it on yourself. In fact, the Living Presence of Jesus Christ in you has but one task—to save you. This same Christ is in all the Herods you will ever find, and, regardless of whose wife they have or what name you give the sin you see them doing, it is the business of their indwelling Christ to save them—not yours. Is not this the carpenter's son? What do you see in your enemy? The indwelling Christ or the sinner? Don't answer me—answer yourself.

In your own ongoing, you will find that you will always miss that which you seek if, like the home town folks of Jesus' time, you see only "the carpenter's son" in your wife, husband, son, daughter, friend, neighbor,

enemy.

In your own ongoing, you will always discover that, no matter to what heights of intellectual perception you rise—regard-

less of how wise your words may become—you will find yourself cast into a mental prison house from whence you will emerge only to have your mental head cut off, unless you stop your silly effort to save others and start out doing a little saving for yourself. Not until your religion works on your heart and mind to the extent that it will cause you to see the Christ in all men, will you escape the "rejection" of the stone, will you receive the blessings of home town folks who are proud of their home town boy instead of ashamed of him.

Of such, Jesus himself said: "He that falleth on this stone shall be broken to pieces; but on whomsoever it shall fall it will scatter as dust." This stone which the builders of all the futile Babels the world has ever known have rejected, is the knowledge and the mental ability to see the God in Mankind. The totality of Christ in every human being you see. Whomsoever shall fall into this mental pit

shall be scattered as dust.

Next time you find your mind criticizing those nearest to you (or anyone else for that matter)—say—out loud—"is this the carpenter's son or is this the Christ of God?" It will be your own fault if you get cast

into prison and lose your head.

Jesus himself brought this mental law and its consequences to our minds in another way; he said: "Judge not according to appearances—but judge right judgment." When your mind reacts to the teaching of the world, your mind is being acted upon by negative suggestions—you are permitting yourself to be hypnotized by what appears in your environment.

If you wanted to build a house, and were to buy a building lot, would you let your mind be hypnotized by the rough surface of the building lot? Or would you permit yourself to be hypnotized into the belief that you would never have a house because there was no house now on the lot? Cer-

tainly not.

In this case, your mind would easily "see" that the lot was good because it was the place where your house was to stand. You would realize that it would require the accumulation of building material placed upon the lot, then the work of the carpenter to fabricate that material and put it together. All the time this process was going on, your mind would be "seeing" the completed house; your mind would be "seeing" just how you could further

beautify it; what furniture would go into each room; just how the lawn could be beautified and just how each piece of shrubbery would be placed. In short, your mind would all the time be centralized, focused, fixed upon the *objective*, upon the *finished product* of your labors.

Yet, after you have your house completed and have moved in with your family, you are not happy. Why? Because you have not used as much good common sense in handling the mental house building as you did in handling the building of your material house. While your mind is able to fall automatically into line with the cosmic law in regard to building your material house, you refuse to follow the same system in the more important matter of your mental household.

After your house is finished and you have moved in, your mind grasps the fact that the finished product is the result of a process in time—the materials have formed themselves into the shape and likeness or image of the picture you held in your mind

of a house.

When Jesus went back to his home town and his neighbors gathered about him, their minds had not been so trained that they could see that his preaching and teaching of new ideals was but the process of gathering together the material for a mental house, and that the ideal he spoke forth was but a description of what his character would be when *finished*.

First must be the *image*; then, by a mental process, the *likeness*, the fulfilled

and accomplished character.

Many times you have heard it said of someone that "he does not practice what he preaches." He could not; it is an impossibility; you might just as well expect a person to show you an empty building lot and then, when he describes what he is to build there, be able to just say "hocuspocus, presto, change" and there would stand the house all finished and furnished and a fire burning in the grate!

You would *never* see your house actually built, however, if your mind allowed itself to be hypnotized by the appearance of a vacant building lot. There *must* be an image, a picture in the mind, of *what is*

to be built there.

And, whenever you are seeing the carpenter's son in your wife, husband, son, daughter or neighbor, you are demanding of them what is impossible of anyone—you are asking that the laws of the cosmos stand aside and nullify themselves to furnish you with a "sign"—you are identifying yourself as one without mental equipment, as one of the rabble.

Only those who are mentally dead can "practice what they preach"; only those who lack that mental vitality made possible by the use of imagination can live in their environment without desire for change; and this is true because life itself consists of constant change. By some inner process known only to God himself, every conceivable element of the cosmos is in a state of constant change, flux, movement, growth, transmutation. And what ". . . doth appear" is the effect of a cause, and that which doth appear is not made of that which doth appear.

Since all life is mental and the sum total of all of our reactions which we call our lives exists within our own minds, it is obvious that our own nature can change to advantage by the mental ability to "see" the best possible in everyone and everything. We are hopeless until we can see in "the carpenter's son"—the Christ of God.

Our own happiness depends entirely upon our reactions to our environment and these reactions exist only in our own minds. Through this known fact about ourselves we may begin to glimpse the depth, height, width and wisdom of those simple mental laws taught us by pondering the drama of this Carpenter of Nazareth.

Let us remember that every time we fail to see the Christ in our wife, husband, son, daughter, neighbor or enemy that we are announcing to the world that we are yet too weak to build a character like His, by and through our own efforts, and are demanding that someone else show it forth. At the crucifixion, the "rabble" reviled Jesus and mocked him and said: "If thou be the Son of God come down from the cross"—and . . . "He saved others; himself he cannot save." They spoke three days too soon.

The whole Christine story dramatizes this idea in powerful language. The whole world consciousness is organized along negative lines—how can we "save" (?) the sinner except we show him the error of his ways? We must see his sin, call him a sinner, brand him a sinner and compel him by force of law to go about shouting, "Unclean! Unclean! Unclean!"

Against this traditional trend of thought,

established throughout the centuries and worshipped because of its antiquity, looms the life of "the carpenter's son." The lesson it teaches us is that the way to "save" the other fellow is not to see his sin or show him the error of his ways but to see in him the Christ of God.

This teaching is radical, that is, it is radically different from all traditional teachings. It is so different and so radical and calls for so much self-effort on the part of the individual that the individual does not want to make the mental effort to apply it. So, we go stumbling along, crushing blossoms with our clumsy feet, crucifying the Christ in others, mocking him, reviling him, striking him in the face (mind); every one of us is guilty of this

mistreatment of the Holy One of God, every one of us asks over and over again "Is not this the 'carpenter's son'?" Every one of us cries out with savage hate, "Away with him, crucify him." We do this every time we fail to see or make the effort to see the Christ of God in every carpenter's son. This carpenter's son said: "Judge not lest ye be judged" . . . and . . . "How wilt thou say to thy brother, Let me pull out the mote out of thine eye; and, behold, a beam is in thine own eye?"

The Christ of God (in you) brings you this message today: "Paul, Paul, why persecutest thou me?" and I, your messenger, leave you this: "IS NOT THIS

Nerves and the Busy Day

A new method of approach to your work which produces surprisingly good results

H OW many times a day, especially a busy day, do you, O mother of small children, find yourself uttering snappishly such phrases as, "John, stop that!" "Mary, behave yourself!" "Put that away!"—and literally, hundreds of others?

But did you ever stop to think, at the close of the day, when you were worn to a rag, every nerve in your body on edge, how much of that fatigue you have brought upon yourself by just those little phrases? Of course, your attitude was back of your words. You had a great deal to do. You were hurrying at top speed. Every fiber of your body was taut with strain. You felt you had to have some outlet. To smile or say a calm pleasant word you would have thought a physical impossibility. You did not try. When you spoke to the children, you released a little of your pent-up nerve force by snapping at them. If one of them did something over which you could raise your voice and actually scold, you were subconsciously glad. The very act of exhausting some of the "compressed nerves" seemed to rest you, to give you more energy. At the end of such a day, have you ever taken account of how much of yourself you grated away, or counted the rough, unlovely stones you built, during those trying hours, into the edifice of your children's lives?

We are all human. Each of us has days such as these, when it seems that we simply must give way to our feelings. Let us pause for a moment and consider: does

it really pay? Do we gain enough so that we can afford to grind ourselves and to deny our children the peace, beauty and harmony to which they have a right?

If you are master of yourself, you are master of everything about you. If you allow your nerves to master you, you will be master of nothing. You will be only

a driven thing.

And so, the next time you have an unusually hard day's work before you, suppose you try a new method of approach. Suppose when you awaken in the morning you do not think with dread about the tasks awaiting you. Do not draw your face into a tense line and begin, as soon as you arise, to hurry. Make up your mind, as soon as you realize that you have a hard day's work to do, that you are going to get through it with the least amount of strain possible. The athlete who is about to make a long run does not stiffen himself with dread before he starts. He relaxes and prepares to make a long, loping, steady start. There will be time enough to summon all his strength and power if he needs a burst of speed at the end. Hurry is strain. It calls for nervous tension; and that, above all, you are going to avoid. You may work fast, but you will not allow yourself to hurry. "How can I help it?" you ask, "I have so much to do."

In the first place, be sure that it *must* all be done. Be sure that each piece of work you have planned is more important to the well-being of your family than a

wife and mother who is in condition to be a companion. Granting that everything you have planned is, as you thought, necessary, the way to keep from hurry is to plan your work, calmly and sensibly, at the beginning of the day. Know what you are going to do and in what order

you are going to do it.

Having done your planning wisely and well, go about your work but do not think about it. There are very few household tasks that require concentrated thought. Resolve to think only of pleasant things. How easily the morning's work slips out of the way if one is looking forward to a pleasant social affair during the afternoon or evening. Have you never noticed how easy it is to work, and how much less tiring, if your mind is filled with anticipation? Make use of the idea. It makes no difference what you think about, if it gives you pleasure. You may build as many castles in Spain as you choose. Happy are you, indeed, if your mind is stored with things which, when you turn to them, open to you a path of delight along which you may travel.

I know one woman who makes it a point to learn some bit of poetry or a favorite quotation every time she irons. Ironing was her most disagreeable task, once upon a time. Then, one day, to take her mind off from the drudgery and pass the time a little more pleasantly, she propped something she had wished to memorize before her. She was so delighted with the result of her experiment that she has repeated it each week ever since. She watches, during the intervening days, for what she wants to make use of the next time. Ironing day has come to be something almost looked forward to. If your thoughts make your work slip by as happily as do those of this woman, you may be physically tired at the end of the day, but you will know no nervous exhaustion. You will not be snappish and irritable. In fact, from your very wanderings down rich mind paths, you will probably have a bouquet of gay flowers, instead of cross words and frowns, to give your family at the end of the day.

If you can maintain an attitude of happy efficiency instead of the wasteful nervousness of hurry and anxiety, you will be astonished at how well the children behave during this busy day of yours. How little trouble they will cause! Children,

young children especially, are little nerve barometers. They are susceptible to, and reflect, mental atmosphere. If the atmosphere about them is placid and normal, they are pretty apt to be happy and contented. If it is charged with pent-up nerves, they are very likely restless and irritable, too. Never drop a harsh, snappy sentence into a group of children playing contentedly unless you want to change the entire character of their play immediately.

For your own sake as well as theirs, avoid the cross word during the busy day. You may have to speak firmly,—what mother does not?—but how infinitely much more you will accomplish by the firm word than by the shrewish one. No matter how impatient you may be, keep calm. Realize that you are dealing with normal, wholesome, playing children, not malicious young imps who are to be pounced upon and fairly torn limb from limb. Remember that to speak firmly, expecting the child to do what you request, will help the development of the best within him. To antagonize him because you are tired and cross brings out the worst.

What if you become hurried and tense without realizing it? Having made the bad beginning, is there a way to make amends? There is! But it is surprisingly hard, no matter how simple it may sound. We are perverse creatures, sometimes. Having allowed ourselves to become tense and shrewish, it is unbelievably difficult even to smile. But that is the remedy. Make yourself smile and say some pleasant,—genuinely pleasant thing to the children. You will be astonished at how quickly the tension snaps. Then it rests with you whether you go on for the rest of the day calm and pleasant, getting through it with the least possible wear upon yourself and your little ones, or whether you go back to the tense, nervous, cross being you were, and thus write a day of unhappiness into the lives of yourself and your family.

The story of the mother who made her child sing any unpleasant thing she heard him say to the tune of Yankee Doodle, is an old one. What a pity that some one cannot force each of us to do the same. How quickly the skies would clear, our impatience and irritation disappear. How

many nerves would be saved.

Everything has its price. Nothing

worth having is attained without cost. "If I must half kill myself with work, I certainly am not going to take it as though I liked it," I actually heard a woman say. What a pity! She had no beautiful ideal in regard to her home making. She would rather feel the temporary satisfaction of venting her overwrought feelings than to enjoy the sweet contentment of one who overcomes and forgets herself in the making of a tranquil,

beautiful, friendly home in which dwell peace, love and harmony.

If you have, in your heart, a lovely shrine dedicated to the ideal of a real home, a place where adults find rest and shelter and inspiration, and where children's lives develop and come to bloom in the atmosphere of love, sympathy and kindness,—then self-control or self-determination, in the face of any amount of hard work, is a small price to pay.

It is not easy, however, to concentrate your thoughts on one particular wish, and to blot everything else out of the mind. Many men and most women find it next to impossible to make a definite affirmation for twenty or thirty minutes without allowing the mind to wander.

No sooner do you get into a comfortably relaxed position and begin your affirmations, than you begin to think of other things—that letter you should have written; what you are going to have for breakfast the next morning; whether Johnny's cold will be better to-morrow. If, when making your affirmations, you find your mind wandering in this way, you may just as well stop as your efforts will be in vain. Complete unqualified concentration is absolutely necessary for success. Can such power be developed?

Yes, any man or woman can achieve this power, if he will make the right effort. In observing the following instructions, do not try to reason out the why and the wherefore. It would require many years of intense study of Metaphysics to be able to scientifically understand why these simple exercises have such a tremendous effect upon the mind. Simply do as you are told and have faith.

Read inspiring literature. Study the biographies of such men and women as Abraham Lincoln, Helen Keller, Jacob Riis, Henry Ford, Jane Addams and Elias Howe. These people attained success in spite of difficulties that taxed their endur-

ance to the limit.

Concentration Exercises

Buy a small photograph of Abraham Lincoln. Place this in a prominent position in your bedroom. Beneath the picture write the words, "He did it. Why can't I? I can and I will." Every morning, before you start out for the day, look at that picture of Abraham Lincoln. Think of the terrible difficulties he overcame. Grit your teeth. Dig the nails of your fingers into the palms of your hands and say audibly, with all the determination of which you are capable, "He did it. Why can't I? I can and I will."

Before retiring at night, stand in front of the mirror and look at your eyes. Do not focus your attention on the root of the nose or between the eyes, but look as if you wanted to drive your gaze right through to the wall behind. Do not open your eyes wider than usual. Do not stare. Look naturally, but fixedly. Look in this manner as long as you can without blinking. As soon as you blink your eyes *once*, stop immediately and suspend the exercise until

the next time.

To the beginner, it is next to impossible to do this for more than a minute. With a little practice, you will be able to do it for much longer. Do this night and morning until you can look at yourself for five minutes without blinking.

A Second Concentration Exercise

When you are able to do this, do the following exercise every day for a week. Go into a room, alone, and look at the photograph of any man or woman whom you know. Speak to it in a firm, positive commanding voice. Talk to it as if he

were stubborn and refused to do what you want him to do. Speak two or three sentences about any topic that suits the occasion and conclude with, "You will do as I say. You cannot refuse. You will do

it."

After practicing this for a week, start talking to people you meet in the same forceful way. You need not be loud or domineering, but speak with an absolute self-confidence in your voice. Remember that a loud coarse voice is used to cover up a lack of courage. Any person endowed with true intelligent courage never raises his voice in ordinary conversation. Say quietly, "I wish you would do this for me." Put emphasis on the word "wish." It will sound like a command. Speak quietly, but positively and firmly.

The Third Exercise for Concentration

When you have made satisfactory progress with the above exercises, proceed with the following. Sit or stand absolutely motionless, except for your breathing, for one to five minutes at a time. Do this often.

Inhale gradually for ten seconds; then exhale in the same way and time.

Look at a picture critically. Then close

your eyes and mentally reconstruct it.
Close your eyes and construct the face of

a friend, feature by feature.

There are no special instructions as to the order in which you should practice the last four exercises. You may use one or all of them. It is necessary, however, to do them with all the intensity of which you are capable and as often as possible. You will feel a change come over you.

When your change is apparent to you, test your progress by the following and last exercise. Fix a concentrated gaze on the person sitting in front of you and *will* that he turn around or put his hand on his neck

or head.

In practicing the exercises for the development of concentration, the following rules must be rigidly observed:

1. You must be alone.

2. You must keep it secret.

3. You must have faith.

Many people have extremely negative personalities. If you come under that category, do not expect to develop your power in one week or even in one month. It may take you three months, six months or even longer. But, if you persevere, you must win out.

How I Gained My Greatest Ambition

I WAS born in the most mountainous section of northern Alabama. A little one room log cabin on Lookout Mountain first gave me shelter. In those days Lookout Mountain was very thinly settled. Stretches of from five to fifteen miles lay between the houses.

I was the youngest child of a family of six children at that time. Later, there were born three more children. My father lived at this place until I was three years old. Then he, being a tenant farmer, moved five miles north where we lived for four years. Then he purchased one hundred and sixty acres of farm land and moved on it.

Alabama did not have any long term free schools then. The only schools we had held session for three months in the winter. So, by the time I reached seven years of age, that being the lawful school age, all the older children had quit going and none of the younger children was old enough to go. The nearest school was three miles away with two creeks to cross and there was no one to go and come with me. My father and mother were afraid to risk having me go alone so they did not insist on me going until I was larger. But by that time, I did not want to go. I thought I was too large to enter school and that the other children would

make fun of me for being so large and not being able to read and write. My father and mother were very lenient with me, and since there was no compulsory school law in Alabama, they did not force me to go. Thus, I grew up and never attended

school a day in my life.

Little did I realize what a great opportunity I was letting slip by. As I grew older, I began to realize what an education meant and what I had missed by not taking advantage of the opportunity afforded me. During the years when I should have been in school, I was out roaming through the mountain forest singing and playing with the wild birds, flowers, animals, and the singing brooks. After I became large enough, I was put to work on the farm.

Ever since I can remember. I have liked to hear my mother read love and adventure stories. About the time I reached the age of sixteen years, however, one of my brothers became very sick and did not recover for several weeks. During the time he was sick, my mother could do nothing except look after him. I began to realize that I should not always have my mother to read for me. I began to try to learn to read for myself and it was not long before I could read pretty well. I learned to read in a detective story book. After learning to read, I read any and all books and magazines I could get hold of. Among the books I read was the book of all books—the Bible. In two years, after I had learned to read, I had read the Bible from cover to cover.

One day, after I had been reading a very absorbing love story, I went out into the forest where I could be alone and think back over the story I had been reading. While out there in the forest amid the scenes of nature, there arose within me an ambition to become an author. As the years passed, that ambition became the one great ambition of my life. While there in the forest that day, I thought, "How can I, an uneducated boy, ever hope to become an author?" But as I asked myself this question, something within me seemed to whisper and say, "Press on, you will never know until you try." So, as I further thought upon the matter, I realized that to become an author I must first learn to write. At that time I could not write my own name. From then on, I did not let an opportunity slip

by which afforded any chance of learning. Every old hand-written letter I could get I would save and copy it. It was not long before I could write a very legible hand.

Every day as I performed my daily task on the farm, I would visualize myself as being an author and writing stories. I would go about with that picture in my mind. I do not know why I did this because, at that time, I had never read or

heard of New Thought.

The first instructive material I ever bought was a mail order course teaching how to write photo-plays. I purchased it on thirty-days credit and by the time the thirty days was out, I still did not have the money to pay for it. I wrote the company and asked for more time. They granted it and before it was out I had finished working in my father's crop and had looked for other work. But I could not find anything to do except cut cordwood at fifty cents per cord for an old man. I talked it over with my youngest brother and we took the job. We were to receive fifty cents per cord and were to share equal in our earnings. At the end of a week, we had cut six and one-half cords of wood. I borrowed my brother's half and payed for my first educational course.

When I had studied the course, I realized that to make my work look more professional I must have a typewriter. But as I was farming and had no money at that time of the year I thought I could not get one. After the crops were gathered in the fall, I still did not have enough money to buy one. I worked two more years on the farm and then left for a small town where I began work in a hosiery mill. After working one year in the hosiery mill, I purchased a rebuilt typewriter on the installment plan. Then began my hardest work. I would work all day in the mill and study at night until eleven

and twelve o'clock.

All day while I was at work I would visualize myself sitting at the typewriter and writing stories and articles. I even went so far as to visualize myself mailing my finished stories and articles to the editors and receiving the checks for them. But still I did not know that visualization was the great process that was making me succeed. Later, when I began to study New Thought, I learned that I had unknowingly been using a great

process which had been in use since before

the world began.

At the time I got the typewriter I did not know anything about how to write the English language correctly. I did not even know where to use a capital letter; the meaning of any of the marks of punctuation. I did not know where one sentence should stop and another begin. After I got the typewriter, I realized that to become an author I must learn something about English, so I began to study it. I would sit up late at night to study and practice writing on the typewriter. When all the rest of the little village was hushed in slumber, I was burning the midnight oil. By the flickering light of a brass lamp is where I got what education I have. I have never been in any of the famous halls of learning or any of the great educational institutions. But by the grace and power of God, I am what

When I started to read New Thought,

I began to use Affirmations in connection with visualization. Each night after I had been studying the technique of creative writing and had been practicing on the typewriter, I would fall asleep, visualizing myself as sitting at the typewriter writing stories and articles. I would affirm the following: God is in me and seeking to express himself through me to all mankind. Using this affirmation, I found that ideas would come to me faster and I could write faster and better than I ever could.

After I had finished my first article and sent it on its way, I patiently awaited a hearing from it. In about ten days I received a letter from the editor stating that he liked my article very much and was enclosing a check to pay for same. After ten years I had gained the greatest

ambition of my life.

What I have accomplished, anyone can accomplish, if he goes about it in the right way. The Bible says: "With God there is nothing impossible."

The Soul Power Which Gives You Dominion (Self-Assertion)

RULE and dominion over all things! Rule and dominion! Given by God to man from the moment God created man! Rule and dominion over all things which God created, and God himself has proclaimed that everything he created

is very good.

Why, then, are we such slaves of our own inefficiency and dependency, slaves out of work, slaves without abundance, slaves to other people's opinions, slaves with lack of love and friendship, slaves of social and economic and industrial systems we do not like? And worst of all, slaves of our own self-imposed slavery of subserviency!

God gave you rule and dominion. None of you has ever lost it; but most of you

have never used it!

Since you want to become conscious of this divine rule and dominion, and want to use it now, *how* can you attain it?

Can you attain it by strong affirmation of the *mind?* Or must you go deep down to

the powers of the soul?

You have been told in Truth that you may have spiritual dominion, if you believe that you have it, and if you mentally assert and affirm your belief. But you have tried that method, have you not? And some of you must admit that you are not yet the spiritual ruler of your universe, dominating all things in your life!

The *Truth* of the divinity of the soul and its rule and dominion are unquestionable. But the *method* which you have

been using may have been wrong.

When you seek to attain rule and dominion by mentally asserting, "I have rule and dominion over all things," your mind acts as a battering ram and it hits the stone wall of the affirmations of all others, each of whom is also asserting, "I am dominant."

Such mental self-assertion is not the true self-assertion which leads to rule and dominion, for God never intended us to be mental battering rams. Instead, God made us children of love, loving one another.

Moreover, all such mental self-assertion is pretense! You would not use such a positive battering ram method unless, deep in your heart, you felt that you were not dominant. When you mentally affirm your dominance by this mental method you hurt only yourself, and do not even dent the stone walls against which your affirmations batter.

In time, your own mind—if you are truly honest with yourself—begins to rebel against this mental battering, especially when, after long earnest effort, you find that this method does not bring you the rule and dominion you desire.

What, then, is the true basis of your dominance and rule of all things? The Great Truth is that spiritual dominion is the self-assertion of *yourself*, instead of the self-assertion of your *mind*.

There is a difference: Self-assertion of yourself is the quiet expanding consciousness of your instinctive soul powers awakened to do something; self-assertion of your mind is the ramming and battering of a thought of dominance, directed against things or conditions or people. "I-am-that-I-am" means more than

"I-am-that-I-am" means more than mere mental recognition of power. It means power itself; and such strength resides only in the instinctive powers of the soul.

Why does the method of self-assertion of a thought of dominion cause reactions and prevent you from attaining the results you desire? Why does the method of self-assertion of soul power make you a god?

The reasons are:

First, asserting a thought of power intensifies and limits, and leads to mental conceit, which always causes reaction.

Second, self-assertion of soul power makes the mind humble and yet it *expands* the consciousness of the soul and its activity.

One limits; the other expands!

For instance, when you mentally assert, "I am all abundance," or "I am all abundance," you intensify your thought. That is good, if not carried to extremes. But the more you intensify a thought, the more you are likely to limit; for anything that is intensified is limited.

On the other hand, use of the self-assertive power—asserting the *feeling-power* of the soul—*expands* the soul.

Let me make this clear by two illustra-

tions:

First, use self-assertive thought. Assert, "I am divine and I possess all knowledge of the universe." If you repeat this statement and repeat it positively a hundred times, you will make your thought very intense. But others will soon think that you are mighty conceited, because they will know that if you possessed all knowledge of the universe you would know enough not to be wasting time in asserting the fact. Moreover, such mental self-assertion does not increase your knowledge of the universe, and it does not expand your soul. It merely intensifies your pretence of your thought about it.

Now second, self-assert the power of your soul. Self-assertion means that the soul expands its powers out beyond itself, that it reaches out from its inner center to that which is limitless in consciousness. The greatest consciousness of power expands to the limits of the universe.

So try this method: Lie out on the grass at night time, and stop all positive assertion of thought. Look at the stars—those directly above you, those in the section of the south sky, those in the west sky, those in the sky to the east, and those in the sky to the north. *Feel* the power of the infinity and magnitude of the universe.

Then discover some little spot of hazy light. It will be so many billions of miles away that your mind cannot conceive the distance. That spot of light is a great cluster of stars, and the hazy spot you see is the blended light of many stars. If you could journey away out there, to that dim hazy spot of light, and stop at one of its stars for breakfast, and then fly faster than even Lindbergh or Hawkes have flown by airplane—a thousand times faster—it would take you more than twenty million years before you could reach the next star for lunch.

As you recognize the immensity of the universe, you expand yourself—you assert yourself outward into the universe, so that your consciousness reaches out to stars scores of billions of miles away and hundreds of millions of miles from each other.

This is real self-assertion of soul power.

It is so different from mind self-assertion, that it almost stops thought. It makes you feel God and his immensity and power. It gives you the feeling of immensity of power although, at the same time, it makes you feel very small. That is good, too, for when you become humble in the midst of God's creation, you recognize the immensity of its power, and you can turn it to your own use, for you recognize your own place as a part of it.

Think of the power of your rule and dominion in this way: the gigantic power of a Niagara—the power of its water flowing-tons and tons every hour-is made up of the power of millions of millions of little drops. Think of yourself as one drop in the great stream of God, in the Niagara of Spirit flowing out from

God.

One little drop of water has no great power in itself. Even Jesus said, "I of myself can do nothing." But each drop of water of a Niagara has all the power of millions of drops back of it, all the power of millions of drops ahead of it, all pushed and pulled together by the infinite power of the stream. Hence, every drop, although small in itself, has infinite power as part of the great Niagara.

In the Niagara of the Spirit, every soul has infinite power in flowing out with all other souls from God. Consequently, the real self-assertion of rule and dominion which you want is not mere self-assertion

of thought. Such thought assertion of dominion intensifies and limits. Moreover, it makes you batter against all other souls of the universe, and makes you try to separate yourself from them in your effort to attain rule and dominion.

What you do want is the spiritual self-assertion of soul power which expands and includes the whole. The self-assertion of soul power—as when you look at the stars-makes you silent and reverent within the inner consciousness of your soul, and you do not talk much about it. You use the power, and get results. It gives you Rule and Dominion over all things, and that means dominion over all things.

Such rule and dominion is attained by expanding your soul consciousness until you feel that you are one with the universe. Your dominion becomes not only conscious power within yourself but self-evident power to others. Then, there is no reaction against your rule and dominion in handling and acquiring the things you want in this life, and no reaction in living

and associating with others.

Attain rule and dominion, first, by expanding your self-assertive power to recognize its oneness with all the power of the universe, and then, second, by realizing that you are a drop in the Great Niagara of God, surrounded by all the power of all the drops of the Stream of the Infinite!

Subconscious Mind Treatment for Obsession

Methods which brought complete healing after 5 years of suffering

"I HAVE come to you with a purpose," he said gently, "that is very private." "Well, what is it?" I asked, evincing a sympathetic interest as the man was one of my friends and there were signs of worry and distress in his face.

"It is a case of obsession," Mr. J-

(for so shall I call him) stated.

"Obsession?"

"Yes-obsession by an evil spirit. It is a very serious case.'

"What makes you so certain that it

is very serious?"

"Because," he replied, "it has been persisting for the past five years without yielding to any treatment. It has now

reached the climax. The victim is being mercilessly tormented by the monster.

"Who is the victim in this case?"

"My own poor wife," he confessed miserably.

"How old is she?" I asked him, after trying to assure him that the case was not entirely hopeless.

"Thirty.

"Have you any children?"

"No; and I am afraid that I shall never have any through her. She is reduced to a skeleton. If this condition continues. I have but little hope that she will live much longer." He tried, somewhat unsuccessfully, to suppress the emotions that were struggling in his breast.

"How long has she been the victim of

this obsession?" I inquired. "For the past five years."

Mr. I- returned several times to discuss his wife's case with me, and one day asked me to come with him to see her. There was an atmosphere of sadness pervading the whole home because of the poor woman's condition.

Obsession is Caused by Fear

I examined the patient at great length. Finally I said to the husband, "Do you not think that obsession by an evil spirit is the same as obsession by a baseless fear?"

Mr. I— looked at me a moment as if he were trying to get my meaning quite clear in his own mind, so I explained: "Fear of this kind will work havoc upon the victim. Whenever one is said to be obsessed by an evil spirit, the point for us to note is that the real cause of obsession can be traced in the nature of the victim himself. The truth about the victim is that he is obsessed-not by any power outside of him—but by his own irrational fear The evil spirits which the victim believes are possessing him, are nothing more than the imaginary entities created by his own fear emotions.'

Mr. J— still seemed rather doubtful of what I had been telling him, so I proceeded to enlarge upon the subject. "Without a doubt, your wife is obsessed by a baseless fear which has originated in her consciousness—a condition of disease or a morbid state of mind has been obsessing her for the past five years. It has cast a spell of hypnosis upon her. Her sufferings are due to the fact that she has abused

her imagination and that she believes and fears that she is being controlled by an evil spirit." I paused for a moment before continuing.

The Obsessed Person is a Dreamer

The person constantly obsessed by the fear of some imaginary evil is a dreamer. He is devoid of the feeling that he is living in a practical, matter-of-fact world. He is apt to feel even imaginary conditions to be real, since he is not a rational being governed by his own will. A fear condition in consciousness may be the cause of shocking emotional experiences that have a purely imaginary basis. An emotion that expresses intense fear is a powerful explosive—so powerful that it can blow out a whole fortress. A fear explosive is powerful enough to blow out the human fortress—the body, including the mechanism of the mind.

"Your wife belongs to the negative type," "By nature and by disposi-I resumed. tion she is nervous, timid and sensitive. I should think that before she fell a victim to this malady she must have been abnormally sensitive. I should think that you have contributed the largest share to the origin of the trouble. Without realizing that your wife is timid and nervous by disposition, you have filled her mind with occult stories, fantastic tales, ghost stories and stories about haunted houses

and about disembodied spirits."

I then suggested to Mr. J— that he tell me something of the circumstances under which his wife first fell a victim to this

condition.

"One evening five years ago," he began, "just after the first attack, I asked my wife what had troubled her. She told me that she had been all alone in the home. Even the servants were out. She entered the library, which she found in darkness, and she fancied that she saw a figure moving toward her from behind. A chilling sensation pervaded her body and at once she had an attack of delirium and a fit. A month later we moved to another house where we have been living since."

"Why," I interrupted, "what induced you to vacate that house?"

"Out of consideration for my wife's condition," he replied. "There was a rumor that it was haunted. Not being superstitious, of course I did not believe it; but we thought it best to move."

"Had any tragedy occurred in the house

before you bought it?"

"Yes," he replied, somewhat sorrowfully, "a tragedy occurred in it three months before—there in that room where my wife had the attack. The father of the man from whom we purchased the house had committed suicide. In the middle of the night he shot himself and in the morning his people found him in a pool of blood, quite dead. It was a ghastly shocking affair for them. He had committed suicide because his liabilities were heavy and he did not want to see the ruin of his family."

How the Obsession Was Created

I shook my head as though at last I could see light in the analysis of the prob-"When your wife went into your library it was dark, so naturally she was afraid. She suddenly remembered the tragic incident that occurred in that room several years before. In a moment, all that you told her about the tragedy flashed through her mind. The fear that she was in a haunted room dominated her, completely paralyzing her senses. Her reaction to that experience unnerved her both mentally and physically and robbed her of her power of control over herself. It is useless to ask your wife what is troubling her, as she is incapable of giving you any answer that is rational."

Mr. J— was quite astonished and he asked anxiously, "How can she be freed

from such a condition?'

A Case for Spiritual Healing Methods

"This is a case in which spiritual healing methods should be applied," I replied. "Otherwise the patient cannot be freed from the obsession."

"What would you suggest, then?" he

eagerly interrupted.

"To free your wife from the trouble forever, I should suggest that she be treated metaphysically for a period of three or four weeks. The particular form of metaphysical treatment that should be given her at this stage consists in the application of absent healing methods; in other words, subconscious mind healing. What is called 'Intercessory Prayer' on behalf of a soul in distress is one form of absent healing. Best results will be obtained in every case of absent healing if the patient is kept in complete ignorance of it until

the period of treatment is over. An abnormal person will not co-operate with the healer; he will not be receptive to instructions; he will often even offer resistance to the treatment; he is not in a condition to receive explanations." I paused a moment.

Then continuing, "As your wife is abnormal, she is not receptive to instructions. Her conscious mind cannot accept anything. Her subconscious mind, however, is receptive, and it will yield to treatment through absent healing methods if you will fulfill certain conditions. The emotion that is obsessing your wife in her subconscious mind is the intense feeling that she is controlled by an evil spirit. There are several conditions that you must observe while your wife is under treatment. Under no circumstances should the fact that you are treating her be made known to her. In the future, never ask her any questions relative to her condition. Treat her as if she were normal in every way. Do not tell her anything that would excite her in any manner." I hesitated a moment before going on in order to more firmly impress my instructions on his mind.

Then I proceeded, "As I have told you before, due to your wife's present condition, her conscious mind is not receptive and cannot, therefore, be controlled. But her *subconscious* mind is *entirely* receptive to suggestions, and it can be easily controlled by the suggestions or ideas implanted in it. The subconscious mind completely dominates the conscious mind. By implanting certain Truth ideas through suggestions, we shall reach deep down into your wife's subconscious mind and we shall eliminate all fear conditions."

He was thoroughly absorbed with what I said and he asked eagerly, "Just

how is she to be treated?"

How I Taught the Husband to Apps the Subconscious Healing Method

"We are both to be the operators," I replied. "Through suggestions, I shall treat the patient for one hour every night for a period of three weeks. The time will be from eight to nine. You will cooperate with me every night. The formula for metaphysical treatment consists in using dynamic suggestions to impress certain vital Truth ideas in the subconscious mind. Beginning tomorrow, I want you to give your wife this treatment

twice every day for three or four weeks. Devote an hour to the treatment each time. Choose a time convenient for you in the morning, but, in the night, choose an hour when she is fast asleep. When you are treating her in this way, you should sit by her side and, without disturbing her sleep in any manner, concentrate your mind upon her and do not let extraneous thoughts cross your mind."

I went on to give him the exact method of treatment, saying, "I am going to give you some statements of Truth which you are to repeat forcibly, but slowly and silently, without waking your wife, for at least an hour. Keep your gaze and attention fixed upon the patient; use the statements understandingly; let the vital truth in each unfold in your mind. Another important condition that you must fulfill is to picture within yourself, while repeating the statements of Truth, that your wife is normal and healthy in every way and that she is free from any kind of obsession. Be convinced that her subconscious mind is obedient to you, that it is under your perfect control, that it is entirely receptive to your treatment and that every statement becomes impressed in it. Remember," I warned him, 'this is most essential.

"Of course, the patient should not even suspect that you are doing something for her. Watch the results while the treatment is in process, but do not worry about them in the middle of the treatment. Treat her with patience and a hopeful attitude of mind, even if you do not obtain any favorable result in the course of your treatment. Without faith, remember, you can accomplish nothing. Particularly in this kind of treatment, one must have faith in the infinite efficacy of the treatment given the patient. Therefore, I advise you thave dynamic faith in yourself as the healer, and in the treatment that you give and in your divine capacity to heal

"In the morning you can treat the patient in the same manner in your room, the only difference being that, in this case, you do not have the patient before you. Retire into the silence of your room at the same hour every morning. Be seated on a chair and get sufficiently relaxed. Mentally conceive and imagine that you are sitting by the side of the patient, who is fast asleep. Then, imagining that your

whole attention is centered upon her, give her the treatment in the same manner, fulfilling all the other conditions of the night treatment. See that you get no disturbance in any way while engaged in this work.

The Divine Spirit of Eternal Good has now freed you from all imaginary obsessions. The Divine Spirit has now freed you from all false fears and irrational beliefs. Your subconscious mind is now free. You are free from nervousness and timidity. You are thoroughly rational and normal in every way. You cannot be obsessed by evil that is unreal. You cannot be afraid of anything in your life because God, The Omnipotent Divine Spirit, is always with you. You are now intensely conscious of the presence of the Divine Spirit within you. You are now receptive to my directions. Your subconscious mind is now receptive to the Truth ideas that are now implanted in it. You are now sleeping like a child, protected by the angels of God. Your health is perfect. Your digestion is good. You are active and energetic, bubbling with new life and vitality.'

How I, Myself, Treated the Patient by the Absent Healing Method

The above are the statements of Truth that I gave my friend to use daily in connection with the treatment of his wife. I used the same statements every night while giving the patient absent treatment, although it was necessary for me to change the expression, "You, my dear wife," into "You, my dear lady." From eight to nine every evening for a period of three weeks, I gave the treatment. CONCENTRATION AND PROSPERITY

A N English psychologist has described an interesting experiment which he makes with his audiences. He asks each one to hold up one finger about six inches in front of his nose and another finger about a foot, and to observe that whenever the gaze is fixed upon one finger the other looks double.

The lecturer then points out that as it is with the physical vision, so it is also with the mental vision: One sees most clearly the object upon which the eye or thought

is focussed.

In the field of consciousness, one sees a truth most clearly when the mind is most completely concentrated upon it. An inventor solves his mechanical problems through keeping his mind concentrated upon them. Einstein builds his remarkable theories concerning the structure of the universe through intense and prolonged concentration.

The same principle applies to the solution of your prosperity problem. If your mind is distracted with a thousand and one worries and fears, how can you expect to demonstrate prosperity? You are concentrating upon your worries, not upon your financial problem. You are using the marvelous power of imagination to create conditions which make more and more remote the solution of your problem. You may recall the old story about the foolish fellow and the lost horse. Everyone in the village was looking for the horse, but the foolish fellow found him. When they asked him how he did it, he replied, "Well, I just thought where I would go if I was a horse, and then I went there and found him.'

Just imagine where you would go if you were prosperity. You would not go to an individual who was absorbed in thinking only about his troubles, would you? You would not go to one who was so self-centered that he never gave a thought to what the people around him might want

in the way of service and might be willing to pay for. You would not go to one who never acted to bring about the prosperity he claimed to desire.

You will find prosperity haunting the neighborhood of those who study the desires and needs of their prospective patrons and how they can meet those desires and needs with service—with action—which will command a financial return.

There are billions of money lying idle that would be spent if the desires and needs of the owners were appealed to with articles and service created with sufficient skill and

inventiveness.

A homely illustration of this truth is found in the story of a prosperity demonstration told by Pauline Cleaver in one of her books. A down-and-outer was sitting on a bench in Central Park, New York. Something about the man impressed Mrs. Cleaver and she engaged him in conversation. The upshot was that she induced him to start out the next day as a dog washer—not a very unique occupation, but it lifted the hobo to prosperity and enabled him to graduate from a park bench to a home of his own and a business that made him independent.

How was this change produced? By concentration. In this lance, it was Mrs. Cleaver who did the concentrating. She did not focus all her thought upon the man's ragged clothes and need for food and a bath. Instead, she mentally surveyed the needs and desires of the ped to his neighborhood. As she talked to him she observed the many dogs being and on leashes for an airing in the park. From this it was only a step to the thought that these dogs had to be washed, that few people liked to wash dogs, that servants detested it, that they were in a wealthy neighborhood where people could well afford to pay to have their dogs washed and that if one could offer a skilled service of this sort it would bring a good financial return.

And it did!

Now what is concentration? According to the simplest psychological explanation it is only another name for interest. If you are interested in a subject it is easy to give it your attention, and to keep on doing so. And this is concentration.

If your interest lies in going over and over the difficulties of your financial problem, then your concentration will cling to this negative and non-constructive day dreaming. If your interest is directed to studying the needs and desires of the people in your environment, and finding ways in which you can meet their needs and desires with paying service, then your mind will be concentrated upon working out your financial problem and you will surely succeed in making headway.

WORDS AND THEIR POWER

MANY readers of New Thought literature become confused upon the matter of affirmations. An affirmation does not possess any power in and of itself. It is, however, an effective instrument of

power if used with understanding.

It is the mental attitude, and the feeling, of the individual using the affirmation which makes it effective or the reverse. To affirm health mechanically and indifferently, while still maintaining the attitudes and the habits which create disease, does not bring healing. To affirm health while the subconscious mind really desires the condition of disease to continue is likewise a futile proceeding. In numberless cases where the individual is using the illness as a means of escape from some unpleasant condition, he will declare, and earnestly believe in, his desire for health, while actually his subconscious mind clings tenaciously to the condition of disease because it makes it unnecessary for him to meet a situation which he feels is too difficult for his powers or which calls for effort which he is disinclined to put forth. The child's dishwashing headache is a simple illustration of this situation. Hundreds of thousands of adults are following the same infantile line of conduct.

To be effective the affirmation must have behind it the earnest, united desire and purpose of the individual; his mental attitude must be in line with his affirma-

Every individual is following some one supreme or master desire in his life. If his affirmation is not in harmony with this supreme desire, this master pattern in his life, the affirmation will be rendered impotent before it is even formulated in his thought. The master desire or aim, rules, and ideas which are contrary to the ruling desire are taboo so far as the individual's

real life is concerned.

Words possess power only when they are sped by a corresponding emotion. Withdraw the backing of emotion, or the attitude which creates the proper feeling to go with the words, they fall dead from the lips. "The letter killeth but the spirit giveth life." Deep sincerity is the essence of power where words are concerned. Unless you are really united in your own thought and feeling regarding the truth of your affirmation, and your desire to have it become manifest as reality, do not waste time in repeating it. Unless you really desire a thing enough to work for it, do not expect to bring it into your life through affirmation. Unless you are willing to face all the responsibilities of love and a home. do not expect to demonstrate these things through affirmation.

To affirm that which you do not really and sincerely desire, with united mind and feeling, is to imitate the futile caper of the clown who tries to escape through the barrier of his own hands clasped in front of him.

To us, this is a great allegory of truth, transforming and freeing us from the slavery to which we have unwittingly committed ourselves. The two points are these: Limitations are self-made and freedom to be ourselves is the normal and healthy condition.

One of the great prisons we frequently create is ill health. Our belief in it creates it as our under-

br. Van Eeden writes: "As a matter of fact, the doctor never cures a disease; he enables the body to cure itself by assisting it in the struggle against hostile influences or disturbances. Even the surgeon does no more than remove obstacles; the cells of the body do the really curative work. In this work, they are directed and assisted by what we call the psyche, that part of the body which is not directly perceptible to the senses.

HE charge against St. Paul and his fellow Christians was that they turned the world upside down.

This is the criticism that most of us make when we first hear the tenets of New Thought. But our

censure is shortsighted.

Take the economic principles of New Thought. They are founded on the statement from the Sermon on the Mount: "Whatsoever things ye desire, believe that ye have them, etc." The old thought would have us continually saving up for the rainy day. An ancient saw declares that a heavy table makes a light legacy. We do not drive our motors with set little pil as possible, we give them plants. with as little oil as possible, we give them plenty, knowing that a machine kept in good condition will last longer and give better service than if neglected. It is the same with our minds and spirits. A free, strainless and pleasant way of living increases our intelligence and prolongs our usefulness. On the other hand, stinting ourselves and denying normal appetites make for old age, inefficiency and inadaptability.

Take, also, the teaching about the sinner. In the old thought, the conviction of sin was a necessity. They were the lucky ones among the penitents who really enjoyed self-condemnation. Today, we know that if we look upon ourselves as criminal, we cannot help but act as outlaws. Conviction makes the sinner.

Christ taught that man was one with the Father. His crime was not that he thought too highly of himself but that he had not thought highly enough. His impulses are not misleading temptations to be destroyed but promptings from the Cosmic to be carried into completion. Self-condemnation gives place to self-esteem and self-fighting is replaced by self-expressing.

The outcome was that I discovered my senior warden and enjoyed a rare friendship with him for many years, a friendship founded on the very teachings that I had foolishly feared he might oppose.

ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS

Mrs. J. B.—There are many kinds of Eczema, appearing from various causes. The case of your fourteen-year-old daughter is one of the chronic, squamous variety, and was caused by skin irritation plus wrong diet. Cleanse the parts with boric acid wash and apply oxide-of-zinc ointment. Use a teaspoonful of boric acid to a pint of warm water and cleanse daily. Do not use soap on the afflicted parts.

Your child's constipation can be cured if you will give her juice of one lemon in a pint of water an hour before breakfast. Omit the biscuits and eggs for breakfast. Give her cereal, milk, and toast, and any stewed fruit that she likes. I think you are giving her the right food for her other meals, since you say that you serve plenty of greens. See that she gets a great deal of raw foods, such as ripe fruits and fresh vegetables. Do not give her blood medicines of any kind. Stop the arsenic.

Mrs. G. J. E.—There are three things to do when confronted with the problem of sterility. First: Find out from a physician whether or not you are anatomically normal. This you have done. Second: Learn to treat yourself metaphysically until you have learned to relax and to trust God. Judging from your letter I should say that you have also accomplished this. Now, the third thing to consider is diet. Diet not only affects the physical development of women, but it very often determines whether or not women can have children. Sometimes people are inclined to challenge this statement. It is human nature to be "down" on

a thing that one is not "up" on. It is, however, not theory, but a well-known biological fact, proved by scientific experiments with animals, and with women, that sterility may be caused by a deficiency of vitamins A and D. A deficiency in calcium and iron may also be responsible for sterility. I refer you to the Journal of the American Medical Association, if you want authority on this subject, which was thoroughly discussed at the 18th annual session of the American Medical Association held in Portland, Ore., in July, 1929. You will find vitamin A in butter, milk and greens. Vitamin D is found in fresh young carrots, young turnips, green peas, fresh string beans, egg yolk and cod liver oil. You will find iron in Irish moss, artichokes, tomatoes, onions, raisins, green peas, strawberries, and natural rice. Calcium is found in milk, cottage cheese, natural grains, lemons, apricots, and currants. Do not pin your faith to a turnip and a few tomatoes, but eat a generous amount of all of the foods mentioned here. If you want additional authority on this subject, read article 336 by Alfred W. on this subject, read article 336 by Alired W. McCann, which appeared in the Daily Mirror, N. Y. City, sometime in the year 1929. Here this great food chemist tells of Dr. Macomber's experiment in treating 206 sterile women. In all cases he found great deficiency in vitamins A and D, also in calcium and iron. After giving these women the proper diet, 40 of the 206 became mothers within a period of two years. within a period of two years.

By putting yourself in a state of subcon-Your poor little William is not permitted to walk around the block on a damp day without being muffled up to his ears; little Elsie is mollycoddled until she is so finicky that she will not step a foot on the damp grass for fear of taking cold. Children who are the most guarded and protected are the who are the most guarded and protected are the most vulnerable beings on earth. I could give you many sad examples of over sensitive, fearful youngsters who have been ill half their lives simply because their mothers incessantly fussed, warned and over-clothed them. Do you know that we find more sickly children in the homes of the rich than

in those in the poorer districts? Well, it is a fact. Very young children should be shielded and safeguarded, and older ones also—up to a point—but not in such a way as to lessen their courage and independence, and to cause them to become over-tender. Laws of hygiene are God's laws. Such laws should be carefully taught to children before the age of ten years. After that, give the child a chance to act for himself. I advise you to let William and Elsie depend upon their own brains, and develop a little self-confidence. Give them plenty of eliminative foods, such as raw, or slightly cooked vegetables and fresh fruits, and natural cereals. Permit them to play out of doors for a short time in damp weather, and gradually you will toughen them so that they will not take cold. Above all things, avoid making negative suggestions, such as: "Don't climb that tree—you will fall. Don't run in that damp grass—it is sure to make you ill."

Mrs. O. H. M.—The problem of how to handle a disobedient boy has been discussed several times in this department. You will do well to read some of the back numbers of Nautilus. You say fore, I am glad to answer your letter. You say that punishment does no good. This is usually the case in a child of eight years. I would have you see your problem from several angles, and in as extended vision as possible. What is the most important thing you are trying to do for your boy? Is it not to develop his character and to help him to build a strong personality? You want him to be courageous, active in the right way, filled with self-confidence, and able to adapt himself to life in its various phases. The man of strong character is more important than the boy who obeys you in every detail. Now, in certain instances, and at a certain age, disobedience may be the better way to produce a strong character than forced obedience. By being disobedient and hurting himself, your son will learn through experience that your mature judgment was better than his. He will gradually desire to consult you before he enters into any new activities, while at the same time, he is developing his own judgment. A child three years old must naturally be more rigidly guided and guarded. But even a very young child should not be given unnecessary commands. Let your boy at all times feel your love for him. Talk to him about the necessity for obedience rather than about duty. He should be taught to realize that the path of obedience is the one that he will eventually most enjoy. Do everything in your power to have him associate with well-trained boys a little older than himself. He may be the type of child who will take advice from older children rather than from a parent. Remember: "Precept is instruction writers." ten in the sand. The tide flows over it and the record is gone. Example is graven on the rock, and the record is not soon lost."

MRS. C. B. G.—So many young girls have said: "My mother never understood me." This is the way your 16-year-old daughter feels, and this is why she does not give you her confidence. Psychologists are apt to blame the parents when a real confidence does not exist between them and their children. It may be that you have not been willing to take the time to make a real companion of your child. Here is an example of what

I mean. My sister tells me of a certain mother who will drop everything and listen to her son when she realizes that it means a great deal to him. One day he came home from school at noon quite excited. and said that the butterfly had come out of its chrysalis, and was drying its wings. The boy's teacher was taking it to her home, but he begged her to wait on a street corner until he could run and bring his mother to see the butterfly. mother was getting lunch but she threw off her apron, and went at once. Lunch could wait— this was important. "Oh, Mother, I just couldn't bear for you not to see it!" exclaimed her son, joyfully leading the way to the new-born butterfly. Here is a story illustrating what we mean by companionship. Be willing to enter into the little joys and sorrows of your daughter and she will give you her confidence. Somehow you have lost it and will have to regain it gradually. It may be you lost it the day your child tried to ask you about sex life, and you scolded her for talking about such things. It is not too late. Come down off your pedestal of superiority, and see life from your Lucille's point of view.

MRS. L. W.—If you had told me a little more about your four-year-old daughter I could have given you a more satisfactory answer. You merely ask what to do for this child who is "backward" in playing with other children until she gets acquainted. I infer that she is merely bashful, which means that she is self-conscious in the presence of strangers. She may have an inferiority complex from too many "don'ts," or because of some unhappy experience, she may actually fear strangers. In either case, you should teach her that God is in everybody and in herself, therefore, she should love all people. Invite as many children as possible to come and play with her. Ignore the fact that she is shy. Do not speak of it before her. All things being equal, the brunette child is always more bashful than the blonde, and a mother should take her child's type into consideration. Do not expect her to be as bold as a broad-faced child with a convex profile if your child happens to belong to an opposite type. Do what I suggest, and with the aid of time and your child's experience she will gradually overcome her timidity.

Mrs. S. V. S.—Here are two affirmations for an expectant mother: "'The Great Physician'— even Christ—will deliver my child safely when my time normally comes. Wrong suggestion from whatever source cannot impose on me the belief of fear. I am passing through a natural experience, and Infinite Love protects me and my baby." Also: "My new baby is God's creation. What God creates, He protects. Baby and I are safe, and established in the harmony of Divine Mind."

J. S. B.—There must be something wrong with the doctor who told you, "Everybody past forty or fifty has hardening of the arteries." It is the only fair way to treat any woman. If it will make it any easier for you, I'll tell you that six out of every ten women in the world are in the same kind of a predicament that you are in. They can't make their husbands understand how they feel about those things, and that's the reason why so many women have left home for a job and money of their own. Phillips Russell's Emerson of Today.

To cap the climax, I have been reading a biography of Ralph Waldo Emerson: Emerson, The Wisest American, by Phillips Russell, author of Benjamin Franklin, John Paul Jones, etc. Truly, this book is Emerson—all of him: the prophet, the teacher, the sage and the human being, representing the acme of all that Nordic, protestant, Calvanistically disciplined America had to offer to the history of man.

Emerson alone would be interesting company for a long journey but in this biography you meet his friends too. In fact the literary life of the 19th century is interwoven with this life of America's

wisest citizen.

This new life of America's leading thinker explains his career and relation to his time in the light of today. Emersonianism is reweighed and revalued. So says the publisher's reviewer and I agree with him 100%.

I have always known that Emerson, in his writings, gave to the American people the religious philosophy which we now recognize as the religious side of the New Thought movement—including all of its various sects, cults and coteries of adherence, from Christian Science clear down the line to the latest school recognized by the I.
