FLYING OBJECTS? SCRUB 'EM, AIR FORCE URGES--Dayton, Ohio--The Air Force doesn't believe in flying objects. That's not just a snap conclusion, but is based on the investigation of more than 9,000 reported unidentified flying objects by "Project Blue Book," the Air Force's--and in fact the government's--agency charged with analysis of aerial phenomena. "There is nothing to indicate that any of these phenomena are extraterrestrial in nature," said Maj. Hector Quintanilla, Jr., a serious, 42-year-old physicist in charge of the project. JESUIT SAW 'UFOs' IN ARGENTINA-(NC)--A Jesuit priest-astronomer here said he has seen unidentified flying objects in Argentine skies. Father Benito Reyna, S.J., is professor of mathematics at Salvador University in Buenos Aires and an astronomer with more than 30 years experience. "The first time I saw UFOs I was in Cordoba," Father Reyna told newsmen. "With the help of my telescope I was able to follow their flight clearly and to note their shape and color, predominantly white, yellow, red and blue hues. Then last March I saw them on two successive nights in San Miguel. At that time Echo II was orbiting the earth and I believe the crew of the flying objects was closely following the U.S. man-made satellite to study its characteristics. We are not certain of the existence of other intelligent beings similar to ourselves but, on the other hand, we have no evidence to the contrary," said Father Reyna. The priest's statements coincided with the claim of an Argentine professional photographer, Hugo Taboada of Bahia Blanca, to have obtained a picture of a flying object. Other people in the city of Bahia Blanca say they have seen the UFOs and the Argentine naval base on the Orkney islands reported "unidentified objects" during the second week of July. 'FLYING-OBJECT' ENCOUNTER REPORTED EAST OF KENT, WASHINGTON--By Fran Bingaman--Unidentified Flying Objects have been reported in many points throughout the United States in the last several weeks. In a sincere interview at The Kent News-Journal office last week, a Maple Valley woman told of a harrowing experience late the night of July 2 in which she said her car was stopped by what can only be described as an unidentified flying object approximately five miles east of Kent. Mrs. A.W. Brundage said she was driving home from her job at the Olympic View Nursing Home near Midway, where she works the 3 p.m. to 11 p.m. shift. "It was a quiet night," she recalls, "and I was listening to the radio. I hadn't met a car since I left Kent. I always drive out the Middle Road (Southeast 256th Street) to Foss's Corner and then cut over to my home near Shadow Lake. But that night I went straight past the corner, continuing on the Middle Road. I'll never know why." Mrs. Brundage said she thinks it

must have been nearing 11:30 by then. "I had gone only a short way, about a block past an old barn on the right--when suddenly the car stopped dead in the road. It all happened so fast. The car stopped and then there was this shining thing over the hood. I thought I must have hit something. It was sort of orange and glowing. For a moment I wondered if it was a meteor but then I realized it wasn't falling on my car. It was just hovering there, only a few inches above the hood, and it seemed to be spinning slowly. It reminded me of a child's top. "I was terrified. I was sure I'd had it. And I wondered when that thing was going to come through the windshield. I was so scared I was numb. I just sat there and wondered what would happen next."

Mrs. Brundage said the object seemed to be about as wide as the hood of the 1961 Impala she was driving, and considerably wider than it was deep. "I was so scared it's hard to be sure, but I know it reminded me of a top, a child's top." She said the object hovered over her car "for what seemed like forever," but what she later figured must have been only about two minutes, and then with what she describes as a "sort of whistling swish," it swept over the trees on her left and was gone. Then my lights came back on and the radio began to play. Until then I hadn't realized they'd been off. It sort of snapped me back and I found I was still gripping the steering wheel. The car motor was dead but the ignition key was still on. I might have killed the motor myself, I'll never be sure." Mrs. Brundage said it took about three tries before the car motor turned over and started. "I watched for that thing all the way home. But I didn't see it again." When she reached home Mrs. Brundage rushed in to tell her children what had happened. Her husband, who also works swing shift, was not yet there. "My son, Wayne, just looked at me. 'I believe you, Mom,' he said, 'but that's my car' and he went running out to look at it." The car did not appear to be damaged in any way, but the next morning the battery was completely dead. "We finally ended up buying a new battery," Mrs. Brundage said. They also discovered that the clock in the car was about two minutes slow. "It had been set just that morning and always keeps perfect time. That's when we decided that it must have only been about two minutes that the object was over the car. It seemed like much longer. I thought that thing would never go away." Mrs. Brundage said her wrist watch was also two minutes slow. When her husband got home he insisted that she call the State Patrol. I called them and they offered to send out a car. I told them I didn't think they'd find anything by then, but I did think they ought to know it had happened. Finally the man asked, 'How much have you been drinking?' I told my husband they'd just laugh at me--and they did." Mrs. Brundage said she had heard and read UFO stories before the encounter. "At first I thought they were crazy but then there was so many I decided they must be seeing something. But you really can't quite believe it until it happens to you. "If it happened again I think I might get nosy. I might try to get out of the car for a better look. But then I might be too scared, I don't know." UFO SPOTTED NEAR RURAL SHADE, TEXAS--Quite a few Kerensites are scanning the skies these nights looking for "UFO" or Unidentified Flying Objects." But one young man won't be looking for them any more. William Howell of Rural Shade, was returning to his home Monday about 11:15 p.m. when one made a "swoop" at him. On Tuesday morning William was still nervous and shaking as he recalled the incident. He had two of his brothers children in the car with him, both asleep. As he neared "Foggy Hill" he noticed a bright object in the sky to the southeast. He said it seemed to head directly for his car, emitting a bluish light. The light became so bright that the entire car seemed bathed in a blue haze. The object then seemed to turn to the southwest and made off in a burst of speed. If the UFO was a meteor it should have landed with a big noise. It didn't. William said he had his car windows up and the radio playing, and he didn't hear a thing. THIRTY UFOs REPORTED OVER WARREN AIR FORCE BASE--A newspaper in Greenville, South Carolina told the Denver Post that a man at Warren Air Force Base in Cheyenne, Wyoming had telephoned Greenville to report about 30 craft hovering over the air base. Four persons working at Warren AFB in Cheyenne--including a navigation officer--reportedly saw the 30 huge cylinder-shaped objects about 5:30 a.m. Sunday. A reporter for the Greenville, S.C., News said a caller from Cheyenne told him the objects had a glass-enclosed cockpit and were topped with an antenna device with a revolving red light. He said some of the objects landed, but when dawn came they flew toward the sun--in formation--at tremendous speed. Cheyenne police and Wyoming Highway Patrol officials said they had received no calls on any such sightings, but an Air Force spokesman said the reports were "under investigation." MYSTERIOUS CRAFT 'NO MIRAGE,' SAYS AIR FORCE LOOKOUT--Oklahoma City (UPI)--An experienced Air Force weather observer said today an unidentified flying object he spotted over Norman Sunday night "was no mirage." The observer, who used 10-power binoculars and a 40-power telescope for the sightings, said the object followed an orbital path across the sky. "It was tilted at about 45 degrees and then straightened out so I got a good look at it," said the observer, who asked to remain anonymous because of Air Force stands on the mysterious objects. "It looked like Saturn with a flat top and flat bottom. It was not a true sphere. There were two rings around it and the rings were a part of the main body; they were not separated from it," he said. He estimated the object was "at least twice the size of a Boeing 707." The man said he had seen mirages before "and this was no mirage. The impression was too clear--there was no mistiness, no shimmering, no wavering motion. "It was a distinct image--as clear as a person's face," he said. UFO ON GOLF COURSE DISAPPEARS WHEN APPROACHED--Three young Grand Forks girls pulled their car over along Belmont Road about 11:30 p.m. Sunday to admire what they said at first looked like a "gorgeous" harvest moon nestled down for the night in the Lincoln Park golf course. They were stunned a moment later when they noticed the moon in the western sky behind them. "It was a weird feeling, I'll tell you that much," said 21-year-old Sylvia Hoialmen, one of the girls who later reported to police the sighting of a strange object on the golf course. Sylvia said the object, which she described as circular and transparent, was about a block and a half into the golf course from the pumping station near 15th Ave. S. "It blinked black and white," she said, and "you could see little figures inside." The figures, she added, could not be distinguished clearly. Becky Evanson, 21, said the object looked to her "just like the moon when it's huge and when real yellow--a clear yellow kind of. Something was moving inside like a silhouette." Becky said three men, none of whom the girls could identify, had also stopped their car when the girls drove up and were also watching the object.

"We said what is it?" Miss Evanson said. "They said we saw this light in the sky. I don't know if they saw it come down. They talked as though they thought it came from the sky." The men informed the girls they had been watching the object for about a half hour. Becky Aanestad, 21, described the object as transparent and "just the color of the harvest moon. It was real pretty--I don't know whatever it could be." After watching the object for five or 10 minutes the girls decided to drive over to Miss Evanson's home to call the police. When they returned the object was gone. The three men, who also had been watching told the girls that when he ran it "seemed like he never got any closer to it. All of a sudden he heard a bang, then a noise," Miss Evanson said, and "it just blew up kind of. He was kind of flabbergasted, and the cops came and looked around but they didn't find anything," Miss Evanson said. The girls also talked with a boy and a girl on a motorcycle who also saw the object. The cyclist shined his light on the object as the other youth ran toward the object, and the youth's silhouette could be seen. The cyclist told the girls they saw a little red light in the object and that when the light pointed in one direction "it looked like the object would bounce and roll in that direction. RADAR SPOTS UFO IN WYNNEWOOD, OKLAHOMA AREA--This is a flying object story with radar proof. Night Policeman Louis Sikes and his wife first sighted the strange object in the sky about 1:05 a.m. It was bright, emitted red, white and blue lights. Sikes notified the Sheriff's office in Sulphur which, in turn, radioed the highway patrol. Sikes said the object hovered near Wynnewood about 45 minutes before vanishing. The highway patrol reported radar fixed the location about five miles north-east of Wynnewood and an altitude of 8,000 feet. Sikes said he could not hear any engine noise. The object was picked up on radar scopes at Tinker field in Oklahoma City and at Carswell air base at Fort Worth, Texas, the patrol said, then disappeared. A few minutes later, the patrol reported, the object appeared on radar screens again and was tracked to a point 29 miles south of Tinker field where it disappeared permanently. The patrol said an airliner was flying in the vicinity of Wynnewood at the time of the sighting, but no one on the plane saw the object. Mrs. Sikes said she and her husband were in the yard of their home when they happened to see the bright object in the sky to the northeast. "It definitely was putting out colored lights," Mrs. Sikes said Saturday. "We did not see it leave." She said it did not appear to be in motion. Source: The Democrat--Pauls Valley, Oklahoma--8/1/65.

FARM WORKER "SEES" BEINGS FROM OUTER SPACE--BUT THEY FLEE--Three strange beings from outer space landed on a farm labourer's corn patch at Caracas, Venezuela, but took off hurriedly when approached, according to the latest stream of "flying object" spottings reported by South American newspapers. The farm worker, who lives on the outskirts of Caracas, told reporters of a "mysterious round object" that whipped the three beings back into space and left a 40-yard circular scorch mark on his corn plot. Chilean newspapers reported that three Air Force pilots were among dozens of witnesses who reported what appeared to be an "invasion" of unidentified flying objects in the skies above Santiago on Thursday night. MYSTERY OBJECT BUZZES COUPLE--A girl was taken to an Ambleside youth hostel in a state of severe shock early yesterday. She had been walking over the fells with a friend when they were allegedly buzzed by a mysterious, cigar-shaped object. The incident led to a thorough search of the area by two mountain rescue teams yesterday. Mr. Michael Dean, of Horton Green, Bradford, and Miss Molly Petherick, of Skipton Road, Keighley, were taking a walk over the fells shortly before midnight when they were buzzed by the cigar-shaped object, which they described as "glowing fiery red with sparks and making a horrible noise." Miss Petherick was taken back to the Loughrigg Brow youth hostel, where the couple were staying, suffering from severe shock. Meanwhile, Michael Dean alerted the police and showed them where he had seen the strange craft. Later, the Keswick Mountain Rescue Team joined forces with an RAF team to comb the area, but nothing was found. The RAF team will continue to search the fells today. However, a policeman, who took part in yesterday's search, said the cattle in the area were very restless "as if something had recently agitated them." Before leaving the Lake District yesterday, Mr. Dean described the object as being like a huge zeppelin with what appeared to be electric lights along its side. CHASES 'THING'--VETERAN SHAMOKIN, PENNSYLVANIA PILOT SIGHTS UFO--A veteran Shamokin aircraft pilot and two persons aboard his twin-engine plane spotted a mysterious flying object Wednesday night while flying between Wilkes-Barre and Hazleton. "I've never seen anything like it," said Ray Hoffman, Elysburg, in describing the experience. "If ever I had any doubts about reports of mysterious flying objects, they are gone now." Hoffman was flying a chartered flight from Kennedy International Airport to Hazleton. As he approached Wilkes-Barre, radio control contacted him that a lighted object was spotted by someone moving very slowly between Wilkes-Barre and Hazleton. After landing at Wilkes-Barre where two passengers were discharged from his plane, Hoffman began another leg of the journey to Hazleton, with Dale Dockey and daughter, Ellen, of Berwick aboard the plane. "We were about 30 miles southeast of the landing field when the three of us saw the light around 10:30 p.m." Hoffman said. "It was a bright light, large in size and certainly didn't look like any aircraft." The veteran pilot reported that he maneuvered his plane and headed toward the object. He was within five miles of it when the mysterious object veered to the side and sped off toward the northeast "at a speed three times as fast as we could travel."

Hoffman told a newsman that he was unable to close the gap between his plane and the unidentified flying object. Before he could get close enough, Hoffman said the object sped away and was out of sight within several minutes. "We followed it toward Red Rock and I had the throttle of my plane wide open," Hoffman said. "I was going about 230 miles per hour and couldn't catch up with it." Report of the sighting was made by Hoffman to Wilkes-Barre flight service which in turn reported the incident to federal authorities. Asked whether the lighted object could have been a reflection from the ground or sky, Hoffman remarked that "I'm very satisfied to believe that it was not any kind of reflection and certainly was not an aircraft." He said the light appeared much larger than a position light on any known aircraft in service today. Hoffman, who owns and operates the Shamokin Flying Service at Shamokin Airport, has been a licensed pilot since 1934. "I've had many friends tell me of sighting these mysterious objects" he said. "And all of these people are very responsible. From what my passengers and I experienced I am convinced that the light was caused by something other than another aircraft or a reflection." 39-INCH 'UFO' PILOT SPOKE SPANISH!--Buenos Aires, Sun.--The Argentine magazine Atlantida today quoted shopkeeper Felipe Martinez as saying a 39-inch-tall flying object pilot told him his people would make "full contact with mankind on December 3." This was the latest of a series of flying object stories reported through the southern countries of South America in the past five weeks. To each report, the Argentine National Observatory at La Plata replied: "There are no such things as flying objects." According to Atlantida, Senor Martinez says he has talked twice to a flying object man. He said that at the second meeting, arranged after the first, the space visitor told him--presumably in Spanish--that his people were friendly to earthbound mortals and would prove it when they landed on December 3. Yas Narita's bean field, near Kent at 7 a.m. that day reported to Kent police and the Washington State Patrol an experience which left them shaken--and you can take the report written by police any way you wish: "Victim: Earth People. Complainants, Ellen Grace Ryerson, 16, and Laura Jean Ryerson, 13, said that at 7 a.m. Friday, they arrived at Yas Narita's bean field on the Russell Road, alighted from their car, and observed three strange persons, not of human breed. The girls got out of the car and started to walk into the bean field when approached by three individuals. Their attention was drawn by the strange dress and white-domed heads and protruding eyes of the individuals. The girls ran about 50 feet past the three and looked back and found they were gone. They described the individuals as between 5'2" and 5'5" tall, and their heads had white tops where humans have hair, with very large pores and a large protrusion on back of the head. The eyes were large and protruding and the face had no expression." In one report the girls said the lower face appeared to be very tanned. In a report to the Washington State Patrol they said the faces were grey like stone. The individuals wore purple armless v-neck jerseys with white shirts underneath, they told police. COLORFUL UFOs OVER CHILE--A Santiago message said flying objects in a wide range of colors--red, orange, violet and green--were reported to be roaming Chilean skies today. A few even landed--according to eye-witnesses. Villagers at Belluco, in Chile's southern Puerto Monte zone, said they saw a strange apparatus land in the village for five minutes yesterday morning. Then it took off and landed further away. More than 15 people said they saw the strange object, and it gave off a dazzling violet light. As they stood and watched, they said the object took off without a sound. A woman driving to Valparaiso at night reported finding herself picked out by a "Powerful green beam of light coming from a motionless object on the highway." Fifteen miles outside Balmaceda a businessman reported an orange, rhomboid-shaped object traveling about 1,000 ft. above the ground and giving off rays of light. Engineer Carlos Videva told about seeing an object touch down on a beach near Chanaral, about 529 miles north of Santiago. This one gave off a reddish light. WHERE FLYING OBJECTS DROP IN FOR EVENING 'HOVER PARTIES'--An Argentine newspaper has a story to cap the big crop of "flying object" reports in Latin America--the tale of a flying object base. The accounts in the evening paper, La Razon, says that almost every evening several UFOs gather in a remote valley among the Cordobas. They arrive after dusk, sometimes five at a time, and hover a short distance from the ground at the bottom of the valley.
