
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devil scoffing at the exorcist and promising he would have him—and the child as his help-mates in hell. When at the end, and the priest is exhausted, a loud noise, like a gunshot is heard, the battle is over, the boy sits up and smiles. He is free.

Now we can visualize the devil skulking away in wrath, pulling on his moustache, pulling in his horns, withdrawing to re-hone his spear and sharpen his tail. Away to search for new victims in the 3 billion-plus population.

Father Nicola, with four masters degrees, hopes to find a way to make people aware of demoniacal possession. What we really can be aware of is that in spite of college degrees, in spite of knowledge of parapsychology, the basic teachings of religion and superstition and mythology may have gotten there first, in which case "it's the Devil to pay."

Now if these experts are having one devil of a time dealing with an intangible, we can surely dismiss it. As Mark Twain said, "I'd like to meet this man, shake his tail, and hear his side of the story."

We cannot give Satan reality until we also establish his residence. Hell is generally considered his home, evidently down below, as this is where Billy Graham points when discussing The Devil. A literal Devil establishes a literal Hell. Down being the opposite of up, where else can an evangelist point when giving road-map instructions? Graham says, "God has gone to . . . to keep men out of Hell. It was created . . . for the Devil and his angels (Math. 25:41) and if any human goes there it is his free choice."

Well it is a subject for evangelists and Bible quoters. If Graham confines his sermons to earth, fine. But get him out in orbit on a moon shot, 50,000 miles away from terra firma to sermonize, it's going to be rough trying to point to either Heaven or Hell! But I'll bet you a cookie—er—a cube of sacramental bread, that he'd find a quote to cover it.

In a final observation, we can give credit to Readers Digest for a brief report in their News from the World of Medicine. Speaking of "Nancy" who suffered from twitches of eyes, mouth, neck and shoulders. She often grunted, barked or screamed. She suddenly burst out with four letter words that were embarrassing. These actions and obscenities diagnosed her disease as Tourettes Syndrome. She was 11 when it started seven years ago.

The article says that victims of this disorder in much earlier times would have been declared of "being possessed by the Devil." Now, thanks to a new drug, haloperidol, these people can pursue a useful life, if they do not forget to take the pill which is a "major tranquilizer." Maybe the name infers that the "halo" is replaced on the victims head!

Tourette's disease was evidently known for sometime, and not always considered a devilish problem, as the treatment was available in this country five years ago. It has revolutionized treatment of Tourette sufferers and is effective in 80% of all of these cases. Many show almost complete absence of symptoms.

In Nancy's case one of the typical symptoms was not reported. This was the vomiting of vile substance. How or why such material should portray demonic possession is beyond anyone's guess. Or that it is more vile than any other substance thrown off in nausea. However it must be very frustrating for a demon to wait around hoping that the patient will forget to take the pill!

Other blocks to free thinking came into discussion with Bob. I had often brought up a subject that I continually write about. He was weary of it. It was a tired problem that he had grown impatient with. He realized that it was important to always attempt to clarify it. But he also knew that man continually tries to find a way to punish himself. A way to seek reality and objectivity to a continuance after death. **Reincarnation**, an idea as old as mankind, has been their escape route. It lends a theory to the desire to return to earth-life; Karma as a reason for making the return. In Harold Sherman's, **YOU LIVE AFTER DEATH** (Fawcett pocket-book T2633) Sherman does an excellent job of explaining this and many other aspects of Soul-Analysis. One quote from the preface, "Arthur Ford, world famous medium, told me that in the thousands of communications he had received from the other side, that **there had not been one** reference to a reincarnative experience." What does this do to an alleged automatic writing contact, put into book form, supposedly from Ford?

Could Ford, from 1917 until his physical passing in early 1971 not have responded to this? Surely in his many, many sessions, emphasis, while in the body could have been made regarding any truth of **reincarnation**. Sherman's book cites many other reasonable arguments why men cling to reincarnation aside from *deja-vu*. Robert Macdonald, who in my opinion, represented true Spiritualism, realized that the dilution by Eastern religious ideas could only weaken our structure with its untruths. He was tired of talking about it, even as I have been. It becomes a chore to discuss in open forums and thought-exchange groups, this same subject that is continually brought up by provocateurs. It is of the same quality of arguing as to how many angels can dance on the head of a pin. If we will have progress within our cause, headway will come by more important and **verifiable** issues.

Spiritualism is not being smug or conceited in its unique position between science and religion. We have an advantage, an advantage that we cannot afford to jeopardize. It will be dangerous to deviate into the areas of conjecture and theory, to reach back into the murky past and annex, into our understanding, those beliefs that were born of superstition and of an age of fear.

We have a splendid foundation of evidence established by hard-working pioneers, by the dedication of those of our present generation. Even though the public has conceived the idea that our entire sum and substance lies with spirit-communication, we have vastly much more to offer.

We do have our roots in a kind of mysticism. We are exposed to the struggle for survival now being made by formalized religious groups. We are not of these. Many of us have come out of such groups, and loyalty to tradition is hard to break.

Our late President often discussed with me, his most intimate thoughts regarding the future of the Movement. He was aware of the dangers that threaten us from within our ranks. The danger of being swept into rigid God-concepts. Of being taken backward into guilt-laden, primitive thinking. Of conforming in order to appeal to potential followers. Of yielding to the temptation of seeking acceptance in other areas. But especially of being concerned that ritualized religion understood us, annexed our ideas, or adopted these as part of their expression.

Communion with the Unseen is part of our understanding. Both on an infinite level as well as the personal. The overcoming of the fear of our natural graduation into the next dimension. Our Rev. Macdonald evidently was impressed to speak on this subject when he addressed, for the last time, the congregation in March at the Spiritual Research Society. He could not have found a better anecdote than of the two caterpillars side by side, seeing a butterfly overhead. One saying to the other, "They'll never get me up in one of these devilish things!"

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SPIRITUALISM vs. ORTHODOXY

It's too bad that Stainton Moses' wonderful book "Spirit Teachings" was out of print for so long. It was written about a hundred years ago, and had been unavailable for some time. However it is on the bookshelves once again, and the recent perusal of that book triggered this article.

It so happens that for some years it has been my good fortune to have been a member of a group who have been listening to talks by members of a group of Spirit teachers calling themselves the Emperor Group. This makes the contents of the book more interesting, as what we have been hearing from the Emperor Group teachers is identical with the teachings in the book, as Emperor was the Spirit collaborator who brought to us on this earth plane these spiritual truths through the mediumship of the Rev. Stainton Moses, one of the outstanding mediums of the last century, and who, having joined the Emperor Group since his passing into the Spirit World, has come to us, among others, through the mediumship of Rev. Grace Gause, expounding the same teachings which his mediumship made possible over a hundred years ago. The Rev. Grace Gause lives at present in the San Francisco Peninsula area, and has been the channel for the Emperor Group for over thirty years in this area. She was, as a young woman in New York, associated with Dr. Titus Bull, President of the James H. Hyslop Psychical Research Foundation, and by her ability to contact Spirit doctors, helped Dr. Bull in his medical work. During the years since that time she has been a channel for this wonderful group of Spirit helpers.

As Stainton Moses was a minister in the Church of England, he therefore was naturally impregnated with the church doctrine, or what we would call the orthodox Christian viewpoint.

Emperor explains his relationship with Stainton Moses this way. We quote: "I, Emperor Servus Dei, chief of a band of forty-nine spirits, under whose guidance the others work, am come from the seventh sphere to work out the will of the Almighty. My mission is to impress this medium, which I will continue to do till his work is done on the earth plane,

Through our knowledge, we throw off the superstition, the shackles with which orthodoxy has held the minds of man ever since the beginning of organized religion. Churches and religious beliefs were originally intended not for the purpose and worship of the Great Spirit but to further the selfish desires and greed of men. For reference in more detail to this fact, I suggest you read "The Outline of History" written by H. G. Wells.

When Jesus, out of Love for his brothers, took on physical form, came to teach Truth and the way of life, these selfish men would have no part of Him. They feared Him, knowing that his logical, simple, beautiful teachings which

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appealed to so many of the common men, if allowed to run rampant, would destroy the security of the then governing bodies.

THE PRICE OF PEACE

Now that "active" hostilities have pretty well ceased in Viet Nam, there are many people leaning back, breathing sighs of relief, and relaxing in the feeling that "the war is over." As we read our papers and watch our T.V., however, it seems quite apparent that the strife in this country has not ended. There are, also, many "hot" spots in the world where man's inhumanity to man is still very evident, and if we become complacent and think it is "all over" we are only fooling ourselves.

Peace is a project for all! Peace does not come by Presidential decree and cannot be willed by Kings and Rulers. Peace must come from the hearts of men and must be felt within. Peace must be shared with ALL or it is not complete. We cannot, ever, let our guard down or become apathetic, for if we do the ground we have won will be entirely lost.

There are many who are returning from the battlefield and prisoner of war camps that have lived through atrocities far beyond our comprehension. These people are still in need of our help and our prayers. For these victims of war there lies ahead long periods of rehabilitation, and in some instances the battles fought on home soil will be as exacting as were the

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days, months and years spent in the places of strife. Families and friends of these returning soldiers are going to have to offer understanding and compassion far exceeding the norm, and the search for release from fear is a task requiring much effort, diligence and patience of the part of all.

Some may query just what this has to do with Lyceums and Lyceum work, yet peace is everyone's business and its responsibilities must be realized by all, and what better place for youth to learn of peace than the Lyceum. The first responsibility of peaceful thinking, however, must come from within and can be taught by no man. The groundwork though can and must be laid in our Churches and Lyceums.

True peace is an individual thing and must be felt individually before it can become a world reality. We must find ourselves; we must recognize our place in the universe; and we must contribute to universal progress if peace is to be felt and maintained. Spiritualism teaches us that we are instruments or channels through which Infinite power is amassed and distributed. We must, therefore, cultivate within ourselves those attributes which lead to inner calm, thereby making ourselves more fit to be these instruments.

Remember—all the peaceful words in the world mean nothing unless we live in accordance with them.

TWO QUESTIONS

We have had an unusually large number of visitors to our church lately. They frequently ask two questions: What do Spiritualists believe? and how do your mediums know the things they told me in their messages since what they said is known only to me and to no one else? It is sometimes amusing to watch the faces of newcomers from the rostrum. One can often see the eyes grow bigger and bigger while the faces show a picture of surprise and bafflement.

I, myself, had a challenging interview with such a person not long ago. The first question

was asked by a distinguished scientist. In some ways, the question was easy to answer because he was familiar with scientific principles and methods. The doctor's wife and daughter had consulted an extremely gifted medium and they came away from the consultation thoroughly shaken up. Much accurate information was received, including one very personal experience of which no one on earth knew except the person involved.

As an answer to the question: What do Spiritualists believe? We can take the essence of our Principles. It is probably best to state these Principles in our own words and try to make them as short and clear as possible. In my own experience with the Doctor, I said that we did not believe in a personal God; that is, the sort of god that is often shown as being jealous and vindictive and having all too human qualities. We believe in Divine Mind since we see Intelligence at work on all levels of nature—in the mineral kingdom, in plants, animals and in man. There is no point in the universe where law, order and intelligence are not in action. Also, there are no miracles but everything happens according to natural law.

I said that everywhere we see the principle of evolution at work in nature and in man himself. All these bodies, or forms, grow finer and more complex. It is logical to assume then, that man will pass at death into a fine and more spiritual state, continually developing and progressing with no eternal damnation for any soul. We know that, in nature, nothing can be destroyed or is lost, so we can safely believe that the most important part of man, his mind and spirit, cannot be destroyed either, but goes on to some higher level of being. And with that mind which persists after death, we can communicate.

For those who persist in maintaining that mind is seated somewhere in the brain, I reminded Doctor of something of which I am sure he was aware. There have been cases where autopsies showed patients with badly diseased or almost non-existent brains, yet these patients were alert and carried on their lives as usual up to the time of death. Also, the materialist who insists that the brain and body are the sum total of all of which we are composed cannot account for the evidence of people who have traveled long distances from their sleeping physical bodies or those under anaesthetic who have witnessed surgery on themselves. Here Doctor remarked that many times patients have told him of what they saw and heard in the operating theater and he knew positively that they were under anaesthetic and so could not be using the physical brain.

I went on to say that this mind of ours, this

soul, must follow spiritual law so the production of our happiness or unhappiness is in our own hands. We do not believe in a savior but must work out our own salvation. I was much pleased to see the Doctor kept nodding his head in agreement on every point. No doubt you could work out a better and clearer answer if you should be asked that first question.

Now as to the second: How do mediums get the information they give in messages? Strangers seem to be more familiar with the mental phases of mediumship rather than the physical, probably because their first contact is by means of a visit to a Spiritualist church or to a medium giving private consultation. Of course, those having mental phases of mediumship are more numerous too. We might mention some of the mental phases and explain that information is conveyed by spirit people to the mentality of the medium. In clairvoyance, the medium sees the spirit people or sees happenings in the spirit world or sees events in the past, present or future of the person consulting him. In clairaudience, the same process is at work except that one hears instead of sees. A psychometrist, when handed an article, is able to read the origin of the article or tell something about the person who handled it. That is: if a psychometrist is handed a bit of lava, he might actually see, with the spiritual eye, a volcano in eruption or he may be able to tell much about the person who owns the bit of lava. Prophecy, of course, refers to the gift of receiving knowledge of events involving numbers of people, national affairs or well known figures.

Less familiar to the newcomer are the physical phases: that is, those phases in which all present when the phenomena are produced are able to see or hear or feel the phenomena. Because they are so impressive, we might wish to list some of them. These would include the production of lights or transfiguration in which the face and figure of the medium becomes changed to the likeness of the contacting spirit. During materialization, the figures of spirit people are produced, sometimes very clearly

and these figures speak and move about. Then there are the phases of independent writing and speaking, levitation, apports, spirit photography and painting, slate writing, etc.

The great gift of spiritual healing is becoming better known now because the work of so many individuals and church groups outside of Spiritualism is receiving public notice by means of the news media.

Another phase is that of impressionism; that is, the medium "knows"—is convinced of the truth of what he feels. Here we should be on familiar ground with the questioner. Most people know the feeling of stepping into a room where there has been a quarrel. The very air seems saturated with ill feeling. Or, he may know at once, on meeting a stranger whether he is to be trusted or not. Telepathy is accepted too, usually. So we may go on from there and say that such mediumship consists of impressions received telepathically from the spirit side of life. We are all literally bombarded with impressions from the outside world as long as we are awake and the difference between the ideas that pop into our heads and mediumship is that the medium has a good average of accurate bits about people, personal relationships or coming events. All these involve matters about which he, in his ordinary state of mind, can have no knowledge. Therefore, some other agency must be at work and we say that spirit people convey this information to him. All this, of course, is a very simple explanation of what is a most complex undertaking, but it is usually enough for a start with a newcomer.

Now we know that in Spiritualist circles, spectacular phenomena has been produced. But this is not done to amaze, mystify, entertain or even console one person who has lost a loved one by death. It is done to prove that there is continuous life and to show us how to live this one on earth. The aim is to inspire us to more self-control and less selfishness; to give us a conviction of the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man. It should prompt us to serve God in the only way we can, by serving our brothers and sisters. Finally, it should set our feet on the path of greater awareness of the Presence of God. We should gradually experience the joy of living with God and walking with God every hour and every day of our lives and of walking hand in hand with those dear ones whose physical presence has passed from our view.

BELIEF

BELIEF in GOD (Father) is the key which opens the door to the kingdom. Until we believe that GOD exists, no communication is possible. "He that cometh to GOD must believe that He IS" says Paul.

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Belief in the CHRIST (Son) is equally essential, being the only direct contact with the Father. John tells us that "He that denieth the Son hath not the Father, but he that acknowledgeth the Son hath the Father also." Therefore it is absolutely necessary to realize and accept our divine origin and true relationship to GOD and to the CHRIST.

In the present dimension, LIFE responds to what we believe, hence the tremendous importance to believe and recognize the CHRIST in us to be the divine Self of every man. This is the first step which begins the way back to the Father's HOUSE. Study and meditation will eventually lead us to the point where BELIEF becomes Knowing, and Knowing becomes BEING the ultimate goal . . . Bible statements on Belief (among many) follow:—

"Fear not, only BELIEVE" . . . "He that BELIEVETH in Me HATH eternal LIFE" Pondering over these verses, the question arises, who and what to believe? Jesus gives the answer: "Ye believe in GOD, believe also in Me" and who is this Me? Paul declares:—"It is the Christ in you the hope of glory."

GOD having NO physical structure, being SPIRIT, so is the CHRIST, the I AM of you and me. Luke tells us plainly that "SPIRIT hath NOT flesh and bones." Therefore, of necessity, we are to "Cease from man whose breath is in his nostrils" and "PUT ON the New man" in GOD'S Image and likeness."

We read in Revelation:—"Behold, I have set before you, an open door which no one can shut." This door represents the CHRIST—the gateway to the celestial realm. "NO one cometh to GOD but BY THE CHRIST." (The Aquarian Gospel).

Jesus' specific mission was to reveal The CHRIST to be the "ONLY BEGOTTEN SON of GOD" wholly spiritual in nature. When Jesus asked the question:—"Whom say ye that I AM? Peter answered:—"Thou art The CHRIST the SON of GOD." Said Paul:—"I live, yet not I, but the CHRIST liveth in me." However, it is essential to differentiate between Jesus (son of man) and the CHRIST (Son of GOD) in order to grasp their respective missions. They fulfilled two distinct roles toward man's enlightenment . . . The CHRIST proved the line of communication with the Father to be always open . . . Jesus proved ONENESS with the Father to be ever present TRUTH which makes men free. Said he:—"I, and my Father are ONE, BELIEVE that I AM in the Father and the Father in Me" unless understood spiritually, Jesus' teaching seems contradictory. For instance, when speaking from his human self, he declared humbly:—"I, of mine own self can do nothing" but from his divine Self, he could say:—"I CAN DO all things THROUGH the CHRIST" . . . This applies to spiritual man

also.

The true meaning of the following two verses definitely prove the PREVIOUS existence of the CHRIST BEFORE manifesting through Jesus:—

"BEFORE Abraham was, I AM" and:—

"Father glorify me with the glory I HAD with thee BEFORE the world was." This "I" could not possibly refer to Jesus who was yet unborn. Jesus was physical, always pointing to the CHRIST, whereas the CHRIST IS spiritual, always pointing to GOD, thus clarifying the mystery concerning both.

It is readily seen that Jesus was a mystical illumined teacher and revelator. His dynamic message was unique, in that he revealed GOD to be a most loving, merciful and forgiving GOD, thus nullifying the belief in a vengeful and warlike Deity. He was rightfully called the "Prince of Peace." War was totally inimical to his tender nature, proving divine LOVE to be the golden chord which binds all humanity in true brotherhood.

In view of Jesus' admonition to love one another, as well as one's enemies, it is astonishing, to say the least, that it is largely ignored by certain of his professed followers. Also, passed over too lightly the fact that he possessed many psychic gifts, which he occasionally employed as the occasion arose. His transfiguration on the Mount, when conversing with Moses and Elias is most significant. This proves conclusively that communication with those already passed into SPIRIT is possible under certain favorable conditions. Credit belongs to Spiritualism for having given such proof to the world. Traditional religion claiming to possess the only form of true worship, fails to realize that GOD favors none over another. His all-encompassing LOVE flows equally on Saint and sinner alike.

The Ten Commandments pertain to moral

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Law only. It was given by Moses to be replaced later by "GRACE and TRUTH through Jesus the CHRIST." Both Paul and John state clearly that "CHRIST hath redeemed us from the curse of the Law." Believing this, we are no more under the Law, but under GRACE.

To clarify, true religion consists in obeying the first two great Commandments, namely to love GOD supremely, above all else, and love one's neighbor as oneself. However, man should be free to worship GOD in his own way. "Listening to the "Still small VOICE" within, receptive to divine guidance and inspiration, is by far, the highest form of prayer.

Jesus' teaching was thorough. He taught Allness to be the foundation of all Life, and death the illusion of mortal sense. Knowing GOD to be the ONLY power, he stripped all evil of its mesmeric hold over man, as it only has the power we give it. We do not abolish evil and death, their non-existence in GOD IS their abolition. To believe in sin, sickness and death, we become subject to them and their subsequent penalty. Happily, we may refuse to accept such a law, thereby avoiding its unpleasant reaction by righteous living.

Immunity from harm depends entirely upon renouncing the belief in two powers, namely Good and Evil, knowledge of which was forbidden according to Genesis. Cause and Effect become ONE when transmuted by LOVE. Insight will finally reveal that evil experiences can only occur in an unreal DREAM state. If it were not so, GOD would be responsible for all the ills and afflictions which plague mankind. This is inconceivable, for did not GOD

promise "Deliverance from all evil" His loving assurance that "ALL that I have is thine" cannot be surpassed. We do not have to ask GOD for what He has already given so lavishly and abundantly.

The mystery is somewhat dissipated when we realize that this present world is actually the Adamic dream world of mortal conception. True immaculate conception refers only to GOD'S creation of man "Made in His Image and likeness" NOT of "Flesh and Blood" says Paul to the Corinthians. In this dream state, the human mind is the source of all discordant thoughts. These negative thoughts appear again and again, until mind becomes a channel for the higher Self. Subdued and purified by TRUTH, it is absorbed in GOD-MIND.

When Jesus declared:—"Ye are the Light of the World" he was not referring to the disciples' personality, but to the CHRIST Light shining through them. 

WHITMAN, MASSACHUSETTS

Dear Reverend Stevens:

In May of 1958, I was informed by an eye specialist that I was beset with a serious eye condition known as Keratoconus Bi-Lateral which could lead to eventual blindness in both eyes, as time progresses unless I underwent a surgical procedure, the original diagnosis was later confirmed by several ophthalmologists at Walter Reed Army Hospital in Washington, D. C., where it was decided to perform a corneal transplant on the left eye on February 12, 1959. The operation at that time was considered to be a marginal success with the new cornea remaining relatively clear.

The vision in the right eye began to deteriorate in
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1962 and by 1966. on September 23rd the first graft was done on the right eye which turned out to be unsuccessful, leaving the central visual acuity at the 20/200ths level which if you interpret properly would indicate a condition of being almost blind. The second operation on the right eye was on May 27th of 1968 and the result after several months of followup was the rejection of the new graft by my body. The vision remained right around the 22/100ths mark with a lessening to the point of only having light perception.

Corneal transplant number three was placed in the right eye on May 8, 1971 and within a few days I was informed by the doctor that this graft went the way of the others and rejected with a visual field of 20/200ths. I gave up all hope of ever seeing out of the eye again until June of 1972 when I was introduced to the wonderful world of spirit at which time a steady improvement in vision to the present time has been noted where I now have 20/50 without correction and 20/25 with a contact lens inserted in the right eye.

The doctor was called and when I informed him that I could see out of the eye, the good man thought that I had lost my objectivity until slit-lamp and chart checks proved on a prima facie basis that I did in fact have vision in the eye. This as a testimonial to you Reverend Stevens, is only a simple token of the appreciation and eternal gratitude that will reside in my heart for all you have done for me and any remuneration, however great, would not even begin to repay the debt that I will always owe Spirit, our unseen helpers, whom I hope that in some small fashion I will be able to serve in a deserving manner.

For the ones on the higher side of life, may I close by saying, let the eternal Light of Spirit guide and keep you for all time. In the service of our infinite intelligence, may I remain yours in humbleness and utmost respect. God Bless You.

perience great difficulty in believing that mind is apart from the brain because he is in daily contact with the close workings of the two, but the physicist can understand this more easily because he is accustomed in dealing with imponderable and intangible energies, residing and active in space.

Because of the thinking of such individuals the question is often asked "what is the practical value of psychic phenomena even if true" and can be raised in many areas. Of what use are meteors and sun-spots—we know that they are phenomena and are observed when they occur. To the average individual it makes no difference what the structure of the atom is, it is a reality that they exist and to the man of science it is highly important which theory turns out to be correct. So, if psychic phenomena really exists (as we Spiritualists know that it does) it is highly important since it deals with human life and human destiny.

In the Soviet Union psychic phenomena is heavily endowed and it is a shame that in the United States the men in high places turn a deaf ear to the matter of investigating the workings of the spirit and the matter of psychic research because it is in this area that humanities of nations can blend into a better understanding of co-relationship among themselves.

Psychic research, and Spiritualism, does not consist of sitting around a table waiting for spirit messages but rather it represents a science upon which the whole cosmic philosophy is built. And psychical research and Spiritualism is the ONLY science which gives an answer to man's future. All other sciences deal with man's present or his past.

The physicist should more easily understand the working of the spirit since he does not expect to encounter invisible energies in space but rather the effect they have on matter. It is but a step away to witnessing the effect the invisible energy (spirit) manifests in the physical.

The day is dawning when the physical scientist will merge investigation of invisible energy with the spiritual scientist and then will come the breakdown of temples made of stone and mortar, and out of the rubble will come the foundation of all religions, the workings of the spirit, built upon the rock that Jesus spoke of when he asked of his disciples "who dost thou say that I am" and Peter said "Thou art the Christ"—to which Jesus said "Flesh and blood did not reveal this to thee, and upon this rock will I build my church." The solid rock of spiritual awareness, the psychic perception, the workings of spirit—the solid rock of truth.
