"STILL ACHIEVING, STILL PURSUING."

For ages man has propounded the question of Job. If a man die will he live again, and from the beginning of time religions throughout the world, primitive and modern, Pagan and Christian have taught and spoke of the immortality of the soul and the life beyond the grave. Psychic phenomena and spiritual revelations have been recorded by man from time immemorial, but scientific

proof of the existence and personal identity of the individual was not established until after the rappings at Hydesville. It was on the 31st of March, 1848, that this divine revelation was given to humanity through the Fox Sisters. (And a child shall lead them.)

Modern Spiritualism did not come to man by mere chance. Its coming was predicted to the world by that great philosopher and seer, Andrew Jackson Davis. The prophetic power of Davis, also known as the Poughkeepsie Seer, can only be gotten over by the skeptic if he ignores the record. Before 1856, he prophesied the coming of the motor car and of the typewriter. He predicted the coming of Modern Spiritualism in 1847, according to Doyle, but we have it on good authority that the following predictions were made by Davis in 1829 or 1830. "Mines of treasure will be discovered in the earth, and Floods of Spiritual Light will descend from Heaven." Both of these vast outpourings were where it was predicted to occur in the year 1848. The authenticity together with the date of this prophecy have been confirmed by numerous communications from various Shaker Communities, and in further corroboration of its truth we call your attention to the fact that the discovery of gold in California and the breaking out of Spiritualism through the Hydesville rappings occurred in 1847-1848.

Where due credit is given the Fox Sisters in establishing a code which brought about inter-world communication and aroused the curiosity of material scientists to a degree where they deemed it necessary to investigate the phenomena of Spiritualism, and though many of them entered the seance room biased and with a preconceived idea of what they were going to find. The return of Spirit entities is now an established fact, scientifically proven by such men as Sir William Crookes, Prof. Wallace, Oliver Lodge, Conan Doyle and many others too numerous to mention. It was Davis who played a major part in establishing Spiritualism as a Philosophy and Religion. A very interesting fact can be found among the personal notes of Davis, March 31, 1848, he wrote, "About daylight this morning a warm breathing passed over my face and I heard a voice, tender and strong, saying, Brother, the good work has begun—behold a living demonstration is born." Davis says he was left wondering what could be meant by such a message, but it was soon learned that it was the beginning of the mighty movement in which he was to act as the prophet.

Spiritualism, the Religion, based on natural laws (which are the laws of God) has no creed. It does not attempt to dogmatize the intellect, but as the science of life here and hereafter is founded on facts and offers satisfactory demonstrations in place of faith and belief.

Mistaken identity does not destroy realities, neither does incapacity to understand, dissipate intellectual and spiritual facts. Today Spiritualism is being taught and accepted throughout the civilized world. It has been tried and accepted by millions in our own United States, whose numbers include Authors, Editors, Doc-

After an absence of thirty-two years we are coming back to the City of Angels for our eighty-first convention, and we come with mixed emotions because of the loss of our esteemed late President, Robert J. Macdonald. Always with sudden changes of this nature it is a serious time, for we must evaluate the accomplishments of the past and we must plot our course for the future, and

it is how we meet these changes that determines the character of the organization.

The tiny rivulet that we call the Psychic Stream has expanded into a mighty ocean where stormy billows have beat on every shore of earth and swept over every city, town and hamlet, for today the word "psychic" is a household word, and today the Spiritualists have a challenge.

In reviewing the organization of the N.S.A.C. we have come to the point of leadership of all Spiritualist organizations, for researchers, authors and publicists turn to the N.S.A.C. for factual information pertaining to Spiritualism. We have seen many churches close their doors because they were built around the individual medium; we have seen State Associations close because of weak leadership, but in spite of this we have new churches springing up throughout the country; there are areas of virgin interest in Spiritualism, and in this respect we can honestly say that Spiritualism has grown and flowered in the minds of humanity, but we must meet the challenge of the times and move in the direction of progress.

As foretold by one of our early pioneers, we are moving into the third fifty year cycle in Spiritualism when we come into a fuller realization of our link with the universe and the Divine, and Spiritualism will blossom in its full beauty and be known for its true value to the world. This will not come about, however, if the Spiritualist is to go far afield from the original tenets set down by the founders of Modern Spiritualism. I will quote a very prominent individual, a world traveller in the interest of Parapsychology, in a letter received a short time ago, and how true this is we will let you be the judge—quote: "I feel that well disciplined and controlled Spiritualism has a great deal to offer the world, and I do all I can to promote

Spiritualism. If Spiritualists were to stick to the original tenets of Spiritualism and not promote reincarnation, life readings, astrology and all other occult fads, and put forth their efforts and energies in proving immortality, not "fortune-telling", Spiritualism would make more progress with the clergy and other conservative thinkers". Let us look in the mirror and determine if these remarks apply to us or not.

As we have stated many times—we have come a long way from the days of persecution, ridicule and scorn, but where are we going! This is the question—"where are we going"!

We must be realistic as an organization and ask where Spiritualism stands in the realm of religion. Are we standing still while our orthodox brothers are moving rapidly ahead in the avenues that the Spiritualist should be moving? We Spiritualists are pioneers in the avenues of spiritual science and in the avenues of scientific advancement materially yet we offer nothing in the way of researching our own phenomena, yet physical science is forging ahead in the direction of the spiritual science and one day the merging will take place. When that takes place what will the role of the Spiritualist be!

"Unconventional healing" is being studied by the medical field, regardless of being a physician, an osteopath, chiropractor or a natureopath. The medical field is moving ahead in the field of "psychotherapy" and mental hygiene is a field that the Spiritualist can give thought to, for treating the illness of the mind, emotional disturbances of the body is one of the loftiest phases of mediumship. We have established a Healing Center and prayer groups are springing up all over the country but this is not sufficient to bring our religion into full bloom.

Are we too prone to stay smug in our own little corner expecting the world to beat a path to our doors while our Christian brethren open up what they term "Psychic Studies Institute" which educates the public (in their own way) to the workings of the spirit.

Our educational system must be expanded to meet the changing and challenging times. No longer can we remain stagnant in our activities with our teaching system. Correspondence courses are not sufficient, for the mere answering of questions does not qualify an individual to be a minister of Spiritualism. An active Spiritualist College should be activated to provide practical experience for those individuals interested in becoming ministers of Spiritualism, and the close contact of teacher and student provides a better education than mere writing answers to questions. We have churches crying desperately for ministers and with a large file of Reverends we fail to provide ministers for established churches.

In accepting a challenge to move forward we must not lose sight of the fact that our fore-

fathers in Spiritualism established a religion distinct and apart from every other religion. They threw the shackles of fear and superstition from their shoulders and passed on to later generations a Truth that made us free. As our late President expressed in his last convention message, his worry was about the bringing of orthodox practices into Spiritualism and the familiar sights along with the old familiar forms of worship injected into the religion. Spiritualists have too long been on the defensive and the time has come for Spiritualists to take the initiative and present Spiritualism as it really is—free of paganistic sacraments and practices. We wonder, when we enter many of our Spiritualist services today and see the images and hear the supplications to a personal deity—are we in a Spiritualist church or an orthodox church with the messages tacked on. Spiritualism appears to be Spiritism in many of our churches.

We have functioned in a loose and permissive manner as an organization, not being close to our churches. Where there are State Associations we have "passed the buck", speaking in the vernacular, and the national organization has been blamed many times when disagreements arise in local groups, and where there are State Associations, the manner in which problems have been resolved has been in rather a dictatorial manner instead of resolving issues for the greatest good of all concerned. Even minorities have a right to be heard in a democratic organization.

In a long tour of our churches from coast to coast, and from last September until this convention, we have listened to, and witnessed, many facets of our weaknesses, and many lay members hesitate to voice their constructive criticism because of not being heard. It is a suggestion at this time, that any member of our churches who has a constructive suggestion to offer that might bring about progressive changes may send the suggestion to the President, who in turn will submit them to the National Board for study and serious consideration.

Your N.S.A.C. moved into virgin territory this year by holding their spring Board meeting in Atlanta, Georgia where there is no National Spiritualist Church. A great deal of interest was generated which will spread to neighboring vicinities. This is real missionary work.

Promotional activities have been taking place under the direction of our Promotional Director, the Reverend Evelyn Muse. Mrs. Muse, along with the Reverend D. Mona Berry held Seminars in Indiana and Iowa and by the time this goes to print, in Michigan. The Fourth Spiritualist Church of Camden, N.J. held a three day Seminar at which your President attended. Under their direction a special promotional meeting was held in Trenton, N.J. and the

Trenton Times furnished, gratis, publicity that would cost thousands of dollars. The reaction to all of these Seminars have been heartwarming. Along with these promotional activities a Pilgrimage to the Cathedral of the Pines at Rindge, N.H. was held at which time your President and Larry Clark officiated. Great interest was manifested in the healing session held at the close of the service.

Many of our members are moving in the area of schools, colleges and universities and this is all excellent work being done. It is discovered that scientists, educators, researchers and the like are more interested in the scientific investigations than in the religious aspect of Spiritualism. Is this because the phenomena as presented by our mediums smacks of "fortune-telling" rather than the proving of the continuity of life? We have read that this is the reason. We know that proof of the continuity of life is a salient part of our religion but we wonder if we are not playing a "numbers game" when we put more stress on the quantity of messages rather than the quality. All message services held during the week tend to attract a larger attendance than the devotional service on Sunday and the giving of only messages without a few minutes of the scientific philosophy sacrifices the spiritual depth of the church, for those who go only for the message and are never seen at the church on Sunday do not add to the spiritual structure of the church.

As a science, Spiritualism has not gone far enough to be reduced to a system, but it has gone too far to accept the dogmatic and conservative methods of stereotyped material science only, whether in medicine, theology, mind or matter. Let it be remembered that the main influence which Spiritualism primarily exerts is on individual character. Outer space experiments have brought the world a knowledge of scientific facts that Spiritualists have been preaching and teaching for one hundred and twenty-five years—that of "inner space" and our link with the universe. Every Spiritualist stands at the threshold of that vast temple of science which conceals the mighty laws that govern the universe of the mind, and all the invisible forces kindred with it. It is to this end that we Spiritualists step over the threshold and continue our place as the leading Spiritualist organization that we urge moving ahead in the field of spiritual science that we have so long pioneered in. Let the Spiritualist church fling wide the door of knowledge and impart the wisdom expressed by the immortal Ella Wheeler Wilcox in her poem "On To The Heights" in which she closes with the words "Go claim the vast stupendous whole—On To The Heights, Oh Immortal Soul".

SECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT

To the Officers and Delegates of the 81st. Annual Convention of the National Spiritualist Association of Churches,
Greetings:

We are again assembled in Convention, this year in the State of California. This is the Fourth N. S. A. C. Convention to be held in this State, the Third in the City of Los Angeles and the first to be held in California in Thirty Two Years.

Last year I reported to You on the purchase of the property in Cassadaga, Florida for a Headquarters Building and an Office for the Secretary. Due to the inability to procure qualified labor the remodeling of this building has been slow. However at this time the room that has been set aside for a Library Room is finished except for the installing of shelving. This will be done as soon as the man doing the job can procure the proper material. When this project is completed, the enclosed front porch will then be finished off with paneling and a new ceiling with the proper lighting arrangement. This then will be used as the book store for the N. S. A. C.

At the writing of this report, many of the Charters have not made their Annual Reports. Last year following the closing of the N. S. A. C. books a great many reports came in, these will show on this years Auxiliary Committee report and therefor will not give a true report of the status of this Association for the fiscal year 1972-73. I suggest that the Secretary's of the State Associations and the directly Affiliated Charters be more prompt in filing their reports so that the business of the year can be filed in the current year that it is reported to this office.

Again this year there has been many inquiries from individuals regarding Ordination by Sanction. Your N. S. A. C. Board has passed

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a ruling that for any person to receive an Ordination by Sanction, they must first apply for and complete the General Course that is prescribed by the N. S. A. C. and then they must pass an examination that is satisfactory to the Examining Committee of the N. S. A. C.

Last year at the Convention, the Rev. Clara Senior who held the rights to the printing and sale of the Lena Barnes Jeffs books, turned these rights over to this Association. Several of this set of twelve books have been re-printed during the year and the demand for these books has been very good. Last spring Rev. Francis A. Bond who held the copyright to the Encyclopedia of Biblical Spiritualism (Two Volumes) by Moses Hull, assigned this copyright to the N. S. A. C.—These have also re-printed during the year. The N. S. A. C. Manual, The Spiritualist Hymnal, Mediumship And Its Laws by Hudson Tuttle has also been re-printed along with many other smaller books and pamphlets that are carried in the book store.

The news media and television has been respectful of our Religion during the past year. There are a great many inquiries for materials that deal with the Religion of Spiritualism from College Groups and other Religious Groups.

Again this Spring, Rev. Evelyn Muse our Director of Promotional Activities conducted several Seminars throughout the United States. The response was exceptionally good and a great deal of interest was created with the Seminars. The Healing Center, Catherine Schneider, Chairlady reports a great deal of interest in the Center and many inquiries are received each month by the Center.

Ministers ordained during the year are: Arthur D. Willis, San Diego, California; Peggy Kann, Alameda, California; Marilyn Awtry, Alexandria, Virginia; Joseph H. Merrill, Lily Dale, New York; Lillian Greer, Escondido, California and Louise Lang Smith, Hawthorne, New Jersey.

N. S. T. Degree was conferred on Florence E. Statkiewicz, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

New Charters issued during the year were to: The Spiritualist Center, Los Angeles, California; The Church of Two Worlds, N.S.A.C., San Leandro, California; The Spiritualist Church of Awareness, Vacaville, California; The First Spiritualist Church, Derry, New Hampshire.

PRACTICE WHAT YOU PREACH

It has come to my attention lately that there have been instances where decorum has not reigned supreme on our platforms. This is something that cannot be tolerated, as we have proven truths to present and if we do not do it in as fine a manner as possible, then we are selling ourselves short and not getting our message across in all its beauty.

The purpose of the Lyceum is to prepare leaders, teachers, workers and Spiritualists of the future. If we are to do this, we must never lose sight of our standards, and if anything, our qualifications must become more stringent as time goes on. If we become lax and put quantity ahead of quality we are taking backward steps. Life, we know, is constant progress, and there is no room for retrogression.

If we are to teach and train our new workers, we must do so not by lessons in the classroom alone, but by example as well. We cannot have double standards. We cannot teach one thing and practice another. The popular poet of recent years, Edgar Guest, wrote: "I'd rather see a sermon than hear one". We must, therefore, live our sermons as well as preach them.

We teach of Brotherly Love. If we believe in the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man, then we must treat all units of creation with the same respect and dignity that we ourselves would like to have. In no way, then, does this include being disrespectful to those who attend our services. There is no excuse good enough to warrant being unkind to another.

We must realize that many times people come to our Churches and meetings because they are seeking. They are dissatisfied with their present knowledge and wish to reach out and find new truths. Oftimes there is an aura of fear surrounding these visitors to our services, and rather than being unkind, we must stretch forth the hand of friendship and understanding and gently lead them on. WE realize there is nothing to fear with spirit communication, but to those who are not familiar with the beauties

and comfort and peace of our religion there is an element of darkness, and it is very natural to fear the unknown. The way to lead another out of the darkness is not by intimidating them, but by exercising patience and forbearance, and replacing mystery with knowledge.

A few of the specific occasions that I personally witnessed were such that if I were a "newcomer" I would not return. Even being a dyed in the wool Spiritualist, I found myself shuddering. Especially would I have turned my back on further searching if the remarks had been directed to me, but even having them said to another, in a public auditorium, would have been enough to turn me away.

We must never lose sight of two very important facts

1. Mediumship, regardless of the phase, does not make us one bit better than anyone else. Mediumship is not a gift that makes the one practicing it rise "head and shoulders" above everyone else. It is a NATURAL FACULTY. It should be used, not to hurt, not to tear down and destroy, but to help and uplift.
2. Our Churches and meetings are of a religious nature, and should be treated with a sacredness. The real value of going to church is evidenced by the feeling of inner peace and comfort that should be found by attending and participating in the service. The Church service and platform should never be used as a showroom, where one or two persons can demonstrate their importance.

In no way do I advocate that we have to be stodgy, long-faced and pious. On the contrary—I firmly believe that life is to be lived and enjoyed. A smile or a laugh can be uplifting, and is no more out of place in church than anywhere else—but let us keep it within reason.

I truly believe in freedom! I firmly believe in the exercise of individual personality! Our freedom, though, ceases to exist and be freedom when it impinges upon another's well being and right to individual expression.

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HOW TO CONQUER PROBLEMS AND SUCCEED

When the earth gets too rough and tough for many of us, we feel like resigning from the human race, and going elsewhere if we could. But it seems that we just have to stay and keep on doing our part in helping make a new world here and now. It was Samuel Clemens, Mark Twain, who declared that he had had many troubles in this world, the most of which had never happened, but at the

time he had been concerned about them.

It was Emerson who said, "Man is a god in ruins." We can agree to that. He often learns by his own mistakes. It is man's business to find a place in this world, and to live and work constructively.

Life has taught us that nothing happens by chance, or is accidental, in God's universe, that He is a God of law and order, omnipotent. Changes have to occur and are God at work. Light and darkness are part of the same thing to God, though different to humanity. Growth in understanding, according to conditions, is necessary, if we are to conquer problems and succeed.

God has no limitations, as we understand them, and can do what is best and necessary for everyone. Man is part of God and nature, and a wise man learns from his mistakes. It has taken 100 years for people to understand. Man's relationship, and the part we call environment, is now man's greatest problem, and the only room or space God cares about seems to be found in man's heart. If puzzled about things, "Why not try God?" as Mary Pickford, America's Little Sweetheart, said.

Meditation is a necessary form of development, as also is imagination, . . . the latter the power to make images, pictures of things. All art, finance, business, all religion, every airplane, every ship, every bridge, every discovery of science, its origin, its inception, its first impulse to the exercise of that strange gift of imagination . . . all are concerned. Little is the power of imagination realized. Try to cultivate it by meditation. Have a definite place where any time thoughts or questions that require answers can be thrown and solved, in the work and locality of the day.

The Bible, still the best seller among all books, a Book that has stood the test of time, tells us to "Seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness and all things will be added unto you." Exodus 20:3.

There are certain rules of life we should follow if we intend to conquer our problems and succeed. Here are a few of them:

At the end of the day it is well to take account of ourselves, to see if we are making progress. See if we can answer "yes" to most of the following questions, and assert that we will strive to do better next time.

QUESTIONS

1. Have we done something creative and worth while that could help people today . . . or have we wasted the day with petty things for self?
2. Have we enlarged our mental and spiritual horizon, expanded our personality, read an article along helpful lines in a magazine or book?
3. Have we been fair and square in all that we have done today?
4. Have we been kind and thoughtful of all we have met today, . . . or mean, neglectful, thoughtless?
5. Have we increased the happiness-moments in the lives of others, helping with some of their problems, or have we thought only of ourselves?
6. Have we kept an even temper, or have we lost our temper when things have gone wrong and it was no fault of ours?
7. Have we been pleasant . . . or grouchy, bad company for any visitors?
8. Have we inspired those we have met, . . . or have we depressed and discouraged them?
9. Have we been able to help materially with the problems brought us today?
10. In helping others, have we felt uplifted ourselves, and glad we can be of help to others . . . and spend extra time in thinking of their problems with great interest in further help to them?
11. Have we thought that probably God put us in this world to develop character and to be of help to others in doing this?
12. When people visit us and need information, . . . and digress and tell us stories about other people (often their enemies), have we learned to attend our own affairs, and not become involved by comment or criticism of others, apart from the work we are doing?

Here are a few helpful suggestions for your dealings with others. Share your experiences, psychic and otherwise constructive. Everyone loves a good story. Be sure you have many at your command, to tell a short one here and there, that will break and relieve too much study work. The same is true of preaching and sermon work. Be sure your stories have a good point. Do not weary one in listening to them or tell such that are not worthy of memory, or will not be recalled.

In your reading are many illustrations, good for stories. Have a small notebook to keep them in, told in your own way and language, that will interest others. Practice these stories before you give them.

Now for a few true stories to show how things get done by spiritual forces.

The writer in her missionary work and the visiting of certain people and lecturing to groups, travelled all over the United States alone, with an old car that had seen many years of service. But I always had with me a discarnate Cherochi Indian Chief, a Spirit that was a trouble shooter that could do wonderful things. But one time I had come safely from Florida to Lily Dale, New York, where I summered when not lecturing. I decided to visit a friend in Cattaraugus, New York. With the directions I had been given I thought I could find the place allright, and started out with a prayer and fond hopes.

I allowed plenty of time, so as to arrive in the late afternoon, and was to watch for a sign, one of four at four corners, showing which road of the four I was to take. I got to the four corners, but all four signs had been broken down and thrown about, so I did not know which road to take.

It was growing late and I wondered what to do. I asked God and the Spirit World to help me . . . and sat and waited in the wilderness, many miles from any place to stay that night. I thought about how anxious my friend would be about me. It was "Ah Wilderness!"

There was another road leading off from the road I was on, and in a little while a truck loaded with peaches came along. The driver stopped, gave me a handful of peaches and offered to help. I thanked him for the fruit and showed him the signs that had been destroyed, and asked the way to Cattaraugus. "Follow me and I'll show you where to turn off, and the rest of the way will be clear to you. But", he hesitated, "let me ask you something first, for I HAD to come this way, rather than my usual way. Do you know anything about Lily Dale and the meetings, and the angels that give messages there?"

I told him I lived there for many summers after teaching in college the rest of the seasons.

"Well," he said, "now I understand why I had to come this way . . . to get you on the right and safe road. You could have wandered around these four roads all night and never have found

your destination! I'm sure glad I followed my "hunch" . . . you might call it preparation meeting opportunity, because I just followed Spirit guidance. Yes, I know the way to Cattaraugus, and I'll set you on the right road." I arrived at my friend's house without further mishap, safe by the grace of God, and very grateful.

Another instance of Spirit help occurred at Yucca Valley, California. There had been a terrible wind storm, and when our meeting closed most of the people left by a road that was unfamiliar to me. I asked a gentleman if the road I usually took was all right now, and he said he believed it was. I started down the road in my car with my usual prayer, and repeating a favorite psalm. (When I was younger I tried to learn a psalm a day, so these came in handy riding alone, recalling these lovely scripture poems or psalms.)

It was ten miles to my motel. I got out only a little way on the road to a place that was always sanded in a little, but not dangerously so. But now with the afternoon story, the sand was deep and my car got stuck. I kept the motor running, but could not get out. I was still singing, and now was asking God's help. I called upon my special friends in the Spirit world. My Cherokee Indian Chief had never failed me in all my trips across the country.

Suddenly I felt my car being levitated, perhaps ten feet or more above the sanded-in place, and the motor was still going! "Oh, thanks, thanks, thanks!" I repeated, as my car was moved (about thirty feet forward) and then gently let down to the ground. Then, with more expressions of gratitude, I was really on my way to the motel. I could do nothing, while driving, but sing praises to God and thank my spiritual helpers, and went on my way repeating the 23rd Psalm. I arrived safely, prepared a light meal, readied my things for an early morning trip I had planned for the next day, and retired.

At six the next morning I started a 350-mile drive up beyond Sacramento, California, to see some land which a friend was considering donating for my Universal Faith and Wisdom Association. I was to follow his car. It was a hard and weary drive, but the last part of it was in near darkness and there were cliffs on the right side that seemed to go down thousands of feet. The path was narrow and most dangerous. I was unspeakably weary with the day's driving. It seemed I could not go another inch, but the car I was following was too far ahead to be within sound of any horn signal I might attempt. And so I drove on, almost unconscious with weariness.

At last we arrived at my friend's home. When we entered it, we found his wife very upset over an illness which had overtaken their

son. He had a high fever which had raged for several days without relief. The father asked me to pray for the boy, for healing, which I gladly did, believing he could be cured. The parents were worried and weary, but I tried to encourage them by telling them of my feeling that the boy would be healed. I told them that worry would do harm, when **faith** was needed, and trust in God and our angel helpers.

In the morning we found the boy sitting up in bed, saying he was all well! We thanked God, and gave the boy something light to eat. Then he got up and went about his usual work!

And now one more, brief story. A friend was a student at the College Hospital School of Nursing, and planned to spend part of her four week vacation period with her family. She was in line for the Lake Shore Limited train, in Grand Central Station, with her ticket in one hand and her luggage in the other. The gate slid back and the conductor called, "All aboard!" My friend stood fourth in line to board the New York Central train. The first person went through and the second was handing her ticket in when my friend was seized with panic. A cold chill crept down her spine, and the hand with the ticket in it shook. She could not move. Then she was impressed that she **MUST** get out of that line! Mumbling, "Excuse me" she went back to safety in the big terminal and leaned against a big marble shelf. She felt relief beyond words, but she didn't understand why, and then she began to tremble all over. Her hands were wet with perspiration, and the suitcase slid out of her hand to the floor. Nothing mattered but that she must not be on that train!

The girl's family had expected her at 7:30 in the morning, so she phoned them to say she would take a morning train instead, and explain later. She returned to the Nurses' Home for the night. At 6 a.m. she awoke and dressed, then ran to the nearest corner to buy a newspaper. The headlines seemed to scream at her, "LAKE SHORE LEAVES TRACK AT LITTLE FALLS!" Then further on there was a report of those killed. The pullman cars were ripped open, smashed and piled along the right of way. But my friend was safe, for she had followed Spirit guidance.

If we are to conquer problems and succeed as we are intended, we must be alert to God, His guidance through His spirit world, and trust that our prayers are answered. We are to serve God and humanity, putting ourselves last, and as far as possible, achieving the goals God has planned for us. "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all things will be added unto you" the Scripture promises.

NSAC HEALING CENTER

Fellow Spiritualists:

The National Spiritualist Association of Churches holds its Eighty First Annual Convention in Los Angeles, California beginning Monday October 8th. through October 12, 1973. A report of the principle proceedings will be published in The Summit as in previous years, but to a great extent you will miss the "heart-beat" of the Convention. We want to share with you the fellowship but even more the heart of the convention and the interest shown in our fellowman.

Though it is always wise to make plans for the future, let us remember that first of all we must make the best possible use of today. Each new day brings with it new opportunities, new tasks and the promise of new blessings. It may bring also new temptations, and possibly new burdens. Have we learned to begin each day in a new way that will enable us to use it as we should?

We have many standards of value concerning the things of daily life, but have we ever asked ourselves whether our standards are as high as they ought to be? Our lives are made up largely of commonplace things. The daily tasks of the home and office and shop and field are almost never spectacular. If we do them only because they have to be done, they may become drudgery. But if they are done in the spirit of love, and because we believe Spirit has intrusted them to, our hands, then they become great and beautiful. Commonplace things are no longer common when they are recognized as a part of God's great work for mankind.

The moral and spiritual decisions that we make day after day may seem small and insignificant at the time we make them. They are not so, however, for each of them either brings

us closer to Infinite Intelligence—God or drives us further away.

How can we share what we have with people we know who have needs they cannot fill? How can we share with people we do not know who are in need? Prayer is the only satisfaction for all these needs. These needs and their fulfillment are not interchangeable. If we are hungry, a new hat will not satisfy. If we are thirsty, a cracker will not meet the need. If we want or need something in a store window, sleep will not help. If we are tired a drink of water will not restore our strength. These are material and physical needs. We also have spiritual needs. Sometimes we do not recognize this. Jesus talked about these spiritual needs, but the people had a difficult time hearing and understanding.

Today in our Organization it is difficult for our ministers and laymembers to realize the great needs and value of our Healing Center and Prayer Groups in a world that is filled with fears and suspicions and anxieties and uncertainties and antagonisms. A faith great enough to live by—that is our need in a world like the one in which we live today. We need to pray for those with physical, mental and spiritual needs. The basic test of our prayers is not their eloquence or their form or any other external manifestation, but are our petitions in accordance with the laws of God-Spirit and are we willing that they shall be so?

One of the blessings of prayer is that it is "a source of released power." The power is not ours, of course, but comes to us from boundless spirit energy, whose work in us may often be delayed by our failure to have the spirit of prayer and by our neglect to engage in the act of prayer. But that in prayer spiritual energy, which otherwise would slumber, does become active, and spiritual work of some kind is effected. Are we hindering the work of the NSAC Healing Center by our failure to co-operate and support and pray for its growth?

The time that we take for prayer, even though it be observed regularly, occupies but a very small proportion of our days. Nevertheless, this fraction of time is of tremendous importance, because it largely determines our attitudes, the direction in which we travel, and the spiritual growth we attain. One who includes prayer in his life is headed in one direction, while one who omits it travels a different course. A daily prayer time, sincerely and faithfully observed, changes life in every particular. It is inevitable that through such fellowship with spirit we shall come to dwell on a higher spiritual plane of understanding.

We do not know how intercessory prayer works, but no one who is familiar with the story of the Gospel Records can doubt that it does work. The New Testament is full of records of

prayers of intercession that were answered. Christ touched people with transforming power wherever He went. He touched the blind and they saw. He touched the lame and they walked. He touched the lepers and they were healed. Jesus said, "Greater things than I do shall ye do if ye believe." As Spiritualists we do believe and let us as individuals support our Healing Center.

None of us can foresee all the changes what tomorrow will bring. We have our plans and hopes, even our expectations, for tomorrow, or next month, or next year. But they are only plans, hopes, never certainties. We have no choice but to go forward, but in a real sense we go forward "in the dark." Yet it is also true that we do not have to venture into tomorrow's uncertainties without guidance.




