# What Dies At Death?

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HERE is life in the human body for many years after death. This is a bold assertion which looks rather startling in cold print. The reader, at once, calls for proof, but what is proof when applied to life or death. We have no definition of life acceptable to science and death is but a condition with a question mark. If we do not know what life it, how can we define death? Here we get into a blind alley of intangibles, but the mind is capable of putting the unknown, at times, to very effective use. We do not know what electricity is, even light is not scientifically understood, but both are in universal use, as in life. Death offers a different problem. It would be hard to find any practical use for death, but, in it, the undertaker and military leader finds an important valuation.

When we seek to answer the question-"What Dies at Death " we are bound to include the entire realm of animated nature, but this so enlarges our thesis that only a suggestive, fragment of the subject can be presented at this time. Before even this can be offered, it becomes necessary to state that the animal unit, our body, is composed of millions of individual cells. Each cell is, in itself, a dependent but complete life, ever changing and adapting itself to altering conditions of environment. Each cell has a definite span of life, peculiar to its kind. When in health, the full cell functions have been performed; it dies and another cell takes its place. Every kind of substance of the mass of the body is composed of ensheathed colonies of this kind. There is, therefore, birth, the joy of living and death within the human body for every second of our long lives. The sum total of this immense realm of activities in our bundle of self we call life; its end is death, but in death, as in life's beginning, there is a gradual approach. Not all ends at once nor does all begin at once, but what is the mechanism before birth; what is the mechanism before and after death, these are the greatest unknown problems of mankind.

When the end comes, the breath eases off to nothingness; the heart stops, the blood coagulates; a few tense moments of icy silence; then we say death is here; but what has happened? We write a death certificate; we put down names for diseases and contributary causes that are acceptable, but we have not explained the phenomena of death. The remains are placed in a coffin. Let us omit the embalming fluid and place six feet of ground above the box. Now all is over, we say,

but is it? How about the ancient instinct that places food and implements in the grave? Why do we visit graveyards with mingled awe, fear and reverence? Is there

nothing in an instinct that is universal? A year later, we open the grave; and with a good deal of interest and excitement and reverence, leading to a vague, but impressive, fear that challenges explanation, one brave mortal, with nerves of steel, opens the box. The other observers are at a distance. Their position and expression is that of expected tragedy; cold shivers run to their fingers and toes and there is an iciness up the spine. If death is the end of things, why all of this excitement? The brave worker, who, with rare courage and steady hands, opens the box, jumps back. In his face, there is the terror of an age of agony-his eyes seem to pop from the sockets-his breath stops. He feels his hair rise-his knees cavethose, that are looking on, are ready to run, but no one dares to be a coward. If this body is dead, buried for a year, what inflicts terror into the living?

There is a whispered, jerky conversation; a long exciting wait, with the chill of death in everyone of the group. The silence of eternity among the living. With guarded steps, they come closer; faces become pale; eyes reach out; knees

tremble; a nervous peep at him, long dead; and back again for a consultation far enough away that the ears of death cannot listen. If death is death, why all this living death in those that see death.

Now, with the icy resolutions of a united front of those who would see they have nothing to fear, all go close to the box. For a full ten minutes, not a word is said. The undead picture of the dead is taking form in chilled brains. What has happened? asks one. Was this man dead when he was buried? asks another. The sight is unbelievable. No words can describe the face of the dead man. If death is death, why this fear of death?

Let's take another breath, find some courage and take another look. The man was buried, cleanly shaven. Now, his whiskers have grown; his hair is long and his body is turned side-ways. Horror of horrors, was the man buried alive? They rip the clothing down; touch the skin and step back, as if fearing a living jump from him long dead. The skin is cold, clammy, but it has not the feel of death. Again, all step aside to compare opinions. Now, at least, fear has become a settled frozen passion and all have voices and opinions. Again they go back and press hard the body within the coffin. One exclaims, "it is warm" and there are further tests and all agree that the inner body is warm. There is more excitement; more mystery: more terror. Leave the cover off to let him have breath, says one, but he walked off a good distance to get some long breaths himself.

Now what has happened to that excavated body? Exactly what happens to all after death. The hair, the finger and toe-nails unders some conditions, continue to grow for years. The interior of the body takes on a new life after death; we call it "putrification," but no one knows what part the still living cells of the body take in this process, but call his condition by whatever name we will, the cells which caused putrefaction were a part of the living body and nothing was added after death. It is real life, with the process of cell-birth and cell-death still going on for many years after death.

Just how much of the vast amount of microscopic life of the intestinal tract lives after death, no one knows, but we do know that fermentation continues with the formation of gas which gas often so distends and distorts the body that its position sometimes changes and rolls sideways.

The Eskimos bury a part of their seal catch under a pile of stones each year and these carcasses remain frozen on the out-

It is no accident that words such as horn, heart, quern, corn and EARTH all come from the same root. If you know your "Mother Goose" or the Emerald Tabletperhaps the latter will enable us to be more independent of philology-vou will remember these words: "Its Father is the Sun; its mother is the Moon. It is the cause of all perfection (i.e. APOTHEO-SIS) throughout the whole EARTH. (Meaning that in Man's hands, or rather in his Heart, is placed the destiny of all created things.) # Mass Unemployment, Its Causes and Probable End

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HE causes and probable end of mass unemployment is a matter of interest to mortals in general and a matter of special interest to Occultists and Spiritualists. This is so, for the reason that the human soul is imprisoned in an animal-like body that must have a reasonably steady supply of food, shelter and clothing before mortals can afford to continue their interest in occult and spiritual matters.

In any event, the panic that began in 1929 means that all civilization has reached a point of balance from whence it can not continue without greatly altering the system of interest on money, or unearned, unequally circulated money, that grew faster than civilization could support it. True enough, many experiments will be made under the vain hope of keeping up the system; and, National election years can bring, or an elected administration can offer, a period of prosperity temporarily borrowed from future generations; but such financial juggling will not forever purge panics from the bowels of civilization.

In other words, history records the present period of mass unemployment and those of the past, simply because a number of mortals exceeding one half of the population did never band together as true brothers for the purpose of removing the cause of panics. Therefore, while waiting for that far off date when unemployment will end, because every person will have exercised their Christ or subconscious mind within, the most practical step toward the end of panics, is for the individual to realize that effects can not be ended until their causes are intelligently understood.

But, one obstacle to the end of panics through methods of peace, resides in the fact that those who profit from the cause of panics as well as those who profit from sacrifices of unemployment, are selfish and greedy enough to do all within their power to prevent the forming of a true brotherhood of man; since such ghouls are those convinced that a harsh survival of the fittest is Nature's true bible. Therefore, since it is next to impossible to prove clearly that mass unemployment is due to a form of plotting, we must be content to understand the principles that

do not cause a feeling of brotherhood among divided groups of our citizens.

For instance, during mass unemployment the members, of churches differing in creed, of secret orders, labor unions, together with members of the American Legion and the more limited Overseas Veterans, are all so busy taking care of their divided brethren that the outsider is not favorably impressed with the half brother idea. Again, during panics, relief or the dole is mainly offered to those who are married, as if the single man and woman has no right whatever; and, persons so divided by this pet idea of politics do not regard each other as brothers. At all times, the principles of stockholding employees and the pieceworker operating labor eliminating machinery, does it's bit toward turning brother against brother. (See St. Mark 13: Verse 12.) Likewise, those who would like to take a drink of Christ's marriage feast wine or the like, are totally unwilling to regard the flint hearted fanatic of Volstead law as a brother. (See St. John 2: Verses 1 to 10.) Thusly, the paying of a soldier's bonus, and many other causes of a divided people, so satisfies one favored class that the other class does not appeal to them as a desirable brother of a common cause.

All things considered, it is easy enough to see that the individual can do but little else to remedy these states of being except to keep informed so as to become a worthy member of any organization qualified to end panics for all time to come. Meanwhile, we may derive comfort from the fact that mass unemployment will end when the judgment day of scripture begins. (St. Mark 13: Verse 32.) Indeed, since the people were divided by a subtle propaganda of selfishness that entitles them to relief, this and many facts indicate that some kind of judgment day is very near.

And, when that period of judgment ends, the only survivors will be those who have, and hence are brothers enough to be worthy of continuing a safe and sane form of civilization, by means of such as the telephone, electric light, radio, motor car, aeroplane and the like. (See Matthew 25: Verse 29.) Therefore, from now on, study the unfolding of future world wide events and learn, believe or disbelieve and yet learn, for this life is a school of experience and it's final diploma is membership in a true brotherhood of man.

When we seek for the solution of a problem we should not be satisfied with the answer as it appears on the surface of things. We should look for the underlying motive or principle. Question it, analyze it, work on the same lines as does a chemist who must be absolutely sure of each step of his work. We bring success into our lives by analytical thinking.— W. F. Poole.

When the Editor asked me for an article on healing, little did she know how hard a task she had set me to do. When our work started I had no intention whatsoever of stressing the healing end of the teaching. It seems, however, that this end is destined to become a very important part of our work whether we want it that way or not. I consider the healing of the human body of very secondary importance to the spiritual healing, which is the breaking of the true light of God. For when that light breaks, then of course physical healing follows as naturally as the morning sun chases away the shadows and the gloom of the night. I am somewhat disappointed too, that so much effort should have to be expended on the healing phase of our ministry, but as the cards have fallen that way we shall play as the cards fall. What I wanted to do though was to have people grasp the great spiritual power behind all healing first-and then the bodily healing would come. Probably it will all work out for the best though.-F.B.R.

OW as for the healing itself, and how we do it-I am at a complete loss to explain it. In fact I cannot explain it. Neither can any one else practicing real and Godly healing. I know how I put the Law into operation, but even that is hard to describe. For in the first place may I say that all healing is simply a placing one's self in the path of the LAW-GOD. There is no other sort of healing. One can gaze into crystal balls and anoint with oil till the crack of doom and when it cracks there will still be no permanent healing. There are those who, by sheer will power, force themselves into an unnatural healing, and there are those who use "talismans" and other "hocus-pocus" and through self-hypnosis more than through anything, it seems for a while that such an one may be getting some benefit. But it soon passes for the unnatural mental strain cannot be long kept up. What I mean by healing is the quiet, sweet, lasting, and permanent healing which the mighty God-Law behind this universe gives, and gives automatically, the very moment the Law has been complied with. Now that the myth of Jesus being a one-third part of God has been exploded, with practically all the other religious myths, and by the way the Jesus story never was anything other than the story of Chrishna who lived and maybe died 1200 years before Christ. Now that

these myths are out of the way it leaves the human race with only one alternative. It places them face to face with God-the mighty Maker and Ruler of the universe. And that opens untold possibilities. For when the very fraudulent and asinine claims of the bible and the preaching peasant of Palestine are discarded, then man can, and automatically will reach out for the correct and real power behind the scheme of things as it exists. And when man does that-he finds God. He doesn't find any holy ghost or any Jesus-he just simply finds the God Law. And that law means health. It means Life-eternal Life. It means peace, it means success. It means a full and complete understanding of everything existing. I know that. I know beyond cavil or shadow of a doubt that such a Law exists-and I use it of course.

Probably the explanation may be a little better understood if I tell the Occult Digest readers just how these healings of ours, which are considered quite miraculous, many of them, are accomplished. Let me take the first case I think of: a case of cerebro-spinal-meningitis. The doctors have pronounced death but a matter of a few hours and the relatives are wired for and have arrived. I receive, or one of my associates receives a telegram stating the conditions, and an appeal for help. Speaking personally-the very moment I receive that wire, I look at it, and instinctively and automatically I quietly direct my thoughts to the mighty power of God-the great ineffable loveand there comes to me at once the correct wire to send in return. Usually it is to the effect that marked improvement may be immediately looked for. Sometimes it is an instantaneous healing, no matter whether the patient is dying or not. But I receive at once the answer to the telegram, and at once send the answer back. What I actually do is this-I know beyond any doubt that the mighty power of God IS. I know that it is the LAW that no manner of disease can stand against that power. And all I do is to throw that knowledge against that illness and the results are usually very sure. Then I forget it entirely until the letter or the telegram comes in telling me that the patient is better.

Our students and associates are making the same remarkable demonstrations. There is one lady in Twin Falls whose experiences are phenomenal. She has not yet finished her course with me, but immediately after commencing it she grasped

the principle involved-and the results are certainly amazing. But if you ask me to tell you "how"-I must confess that I do not know. I cannot give any physiological reason how these diseases disappear. Nor am I interested in such a reason. I know they do-and that's all I am interested in. Last night, after ten o'clock, my door bell rang, and on answering it a man from Seattle on crutches with a paralyzed leg for 26 years stood there. He had crutches and a steel brace on the leg. We talked for quite a while. Inside of 30 days that man will be able to go without crutches. In fact we made plans last night for him to take over our work in the Dominion of Canada as soon as he is healed. It might seem funny to others to hear us sitting there discussing the future Canadian program with this fellow, a paralytic. But the question of the healing never once entered into the conversation after I had assured him it would soon be. There is the part of the Law which works. He does not doubt the power at all-and certainly I don't-and the cure will be affected. I'm wondering as I write this what the "orthodox church" will think when they find out what a hollow sham their religion has been to date. A big preacher said to me yesterday, after having gone through some letters and telegrams I received-"Well, brother-you have something the church hasn't gotsomething entirely new too." We assured him that it was not new at all-but that it was the power Jesus spoke of and usedalthough he was nothing more than a man and a very unimportant man at that, for out of over 300 authentic histories of his country, all of which were written by men living at the time, and in the country-not a single mention does any historian ever make of either Jesus Christ or any of the supposed miracles he worked. That's significant surely. However-if he livedwhich I think he did, he certainly knew the great God-Law which we are beginning to understand today. It's not new. All it takes is a demolishing of the heathen and pagan "church" institutions with their man-made gods, for the true Light to shine.

(3) THE third center is "Manipoorka," a little below the navel, this is the epigastric ganglion, energized by the spleen glands.
(4.) The fourth centre is "Anahata"

in the chest. This is the cardiac ganglion, energized by Thymus Glands. (5.) The fifth centre is "Vishuddhi" in

the throat. This is the Laryngeal ganglicn, energized by the Thyroid glands.

(6.) The sixth centre is "Ajna," midway between the Brows. This is the convernous ganglion, energized by Pituitary glands.

(7.) The seventh centre is "Sahasfar" in the mid-brain. This is the crown ganglion, energized by the Pincal gland.

25. Now, these centres or glands, as you may prefer to call them, are the crystallized Radio-Vortices of the vital vehicle in man which constantly transmute their internal vital secretions into units of spiritual force. It is the evolution of this spiritual potentiality in man that can immortalize him in the physical with all the adjuncts of perpetual youth and peace profound.

26. Mention has already been made of other glands with "ducts," which are also essential for the normal up-keep of man. But then the difference between the "ductless" glands and glands with "ducts" is this:—that while the former are capable of internal secretions alone, the latter are capable of forming both internal and external secretions. Of these glands which form both external and internal secretions, the testicular gland has been recognized as being the most important one for regulating procreation of progeny or physical rejuvenation of the individual.

27. It has now been established on empirical basis that the pronounced virility, generally observed in both sexes, is the direct result of the constant production and natural absorption of the vital secretions of the sex glands. It therefore follows that, where there are signs of greater strength, health, beauty, and optimism, there verily should exist a greater capacity of the sex glands and a greater facility for ready absorption of the secretions into the system. Inversely, then, old age and decrepitude are the inevitable results of the shrinking of the Gonads and of the consequent poverty of vital secretion and re-absorption.

28. In several cases, experiments in

transplantation of the sex glands of monkeys into persons whose glands have become atrophied have proved quite successful. Instances there are many where impotent persons have become all right after being injected with the testicular extracts of other beings. This medical process of curing the physical defects and of restoring lost manhood, which is in effect nothing but a process of rejuveating the depleted system, throws a world of light upon the sublime conception of physical longevity, by and through strict observance of "Brahmaschariyam" or celibacy.

29. "Brahmaschariyam" is a physical and moral training ground wherein the Neophyte is taught how best to control and re-absorb the secretions of the sex glands; to exercise and keep them always in a healthy condition so that he may learn to live the "life superlative," through regenesis. The internal, vital secretions of the sex glands begin to form from a very young age and are being naturally absorbed into the system. But then the external secretions of these glands appear to form rather late in life with the maturity of the sperm and are largely used by the animal man for purposes of fertilization through the complicated reproductive apparatus in him. The internal secretions of the sex glands, which are automatically obsorbed into the lymph and the blood are naturally carried to the brain and all other parts of the body for giving them nourishment and strength, which, in turn, impart tone and character to the individual. For the harmonious development in symmetrical beauty, solidarity, health and strength, constant production and reabsorption of the internal secretions of the sex glands is absolutely essential.

30. Filthy thoughts, bad associations, may prompt in one sexual stimulation. which is the primary cause for the generation of the external secretion! But production of such external secretions, incontinently, under sex stimuli, will, as a rule, stop formation of internal secretions which are so vitally important for the prolongation of human existence. This internal secretion of the sex glands is known as "Vojas," and the external secretion of the sex glands is called "beejas." 'As already explained, the former gets naturally reabsorbed into the system without any voluntary, conscious effort, but the latter is never so; it has

a tendency, after filling up the seminal vesicles, to empty itself out at the slightest provocation.

31. Now, then, the Immortals have cheered humanity with a hopeful message to the effect that even this external secretion of the sex glands which is ever ready to flow out of the system, can be effectively prevented from wasting itself away through emission, voluntary or involuntary and be reabsorbed by practice of yoga and Kalpa austerities with marvellous results. Mark well, this external secretion of the Gonads, which is the real cause of life to a new being in the human foetus, is not only capable of giving life, but also, of "re-newing" life. This truth is hardly recognized by the religionists. The immortals were thoroughly conversant with certain mystic exercises and practices by which this external secretion was reabsorbed into the system. The Siddhas have given out many such valuable secrets to the world through their apostles.

32. In the present "Manual" there are hints and suggestions as to how the external secretions of the sex glands may best be reabsorbed, by and through individual efforts, which are of paramount importance for rooting the aspirant on the vantage ground of physical re-generation and longevity.

**33.** In "gnana sankitinee" Tantra, it is laid down:—"Na tapastapa ityahur brahmascharyum tapottamam, — Oordhareta vabedyastu sa Deva natu Manusha—ha." The sum and substance of this pithy quotation is that the real penance or religious austerity is "brahmascharayum," and nothing short of it. He who actually allows his vital semen to be re-absorbed into his system without giving it any chance for emission is not a man but *verily a God!* Such is the supreme ideal of Bramhmascharyam, upheld by the South Indian Supernals.

34. Dear lover of light, wisdom, and power heed to the message and be advised in time to get equipped properly, so that you may be the better able to carry thy cross in a manly fashion; I mean thy mystic cross with its seven mysterious roses of the Rosicrucians, which in very truth symbolizes thy own individual being with its seven spiritual centres, or seven scales of notes with which you are to play the symphony of your life's music on the stage of being.

As soon as they got close enough I started my tirade.


"That Jim Evans was here," I flung at them.

This experience I am about to relate occurred some twenty years ago.

WAS at that time a Forest Ranger, stationed in the central part of Idaho. It was during the summer season and I was on fire patrol duty some thirtyfive or forty miles from my station or headquarters and in a section of the country I was not familiar with, and far off the beaten trails of civilization.

That night I made camp on a small grassy flat on the edge of a little mountain stream. When I rode in to this flat, I noticed the remains of a stone chimney, and promised myself that after I had made camp and had supper I would take a look at it, as any kind of an old ruin always held a fascination for me; so after supper there still being an hour or more of daylight, I walked over to the old chimney and casually looked it over, but it appeared to be only the remains of what was once a log cabin although no vestage of the logs remained; only a slight raised place on the grass and weed covered earth in a rectangular shape indicated where the four walls had once stood. I concluded it was built originally by a placer miner and this theory was borne out later upon discovering evidence of placer work having been done along the stream at some time in the far distant past.

I returned to camp, replenished the fire and sat down to write up my daily report. After finishing my writing I thought I would smoke one more pipe before I turned in. I was reclining near the fire with my back resting against my saddle, facing toward the old chimney which stood only a few yards distant when, upon glancing in that direction I was amazed to see what appeared to be a cabin standing there in perfect form. I raised to a sitting position, rubbed my eyes to make sure I was awake; but there it stood. While I sat there dumbfounded, watching, it appeared to take on a bluish gray or smoke color and became sufficiently transparent to distinctly see the interior. A small fire was burning in the fire place which cast a redish glow over the room and reflected many dark shadows. The furnishings were of the crudest sort such as I had seen many times in prospectors' and hunters' cabins, consisting only of a bunk, table, bench and a sort of cupboard on the wall, all made from roughly hewn timbers.

Sitting at the table was a man probably sixty or sixty-five years old, with long hair and beard, dressed in the ordinary rough clothing of mountain men. He was engaged in transferring what appeared to be gold dust from a small vial to a buckskin sack. My attention was drawn in some way to look at the single small window and there I saw the outlines of a dark face with two gleaming eyes, peering intently at the old man holding the sack of gold.

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## 1881—The Story of the American Red Cross

\*\*\*Fiftieth Anniversary Roll Call\*\*\*

HE originator of the Red Cross move-ment was Henri Dunant, a young Swiss idealist who had been moved by the horrors of the battlefield of Solferino in 1859, where he aided the wounded as a volunteer.

The Red Cross organization grew out of an international conference called at Geneva, Switzerland, in 1864. But the success of the conference in formulating and securing the adherence of leading powers to the international agreement or convention which it drew up, neutralizing the treatment of the wounded in war, was in large part due to two other influences. One influence was general knowledge of the work done by Florence Nightingale and her devoted nurses in the Crimean War (1854-56). The other was the story of the accomplishments of the United States Sanitary Commission in the American Civil War, as told by its two representatives in the conference.

This conference adopted as its insignia the flag of Switzerland with reversed colors. Instead of a white cross on a red shield, it became a red cross on a white shield. This was the origin of the name, "Red Cross."

Attending the conference were two representatives of the United States-George C. Fogg, U. S. Minister to Switzerland, and Charles S. P. Bowles, European agent of the U.S. Sanitary Commission. Their story of the commission's work in the Civil War exerted a powerful influence on the delegates. Nevertheless, these two Americans lacked authority to commit their government, which did not give its adhesion to the agreement until 18 years later.

As this Government remained cold toward the Treaty of Geneva, nothing more was done toward founding an American Red Cross Society until 1881, when Clara Barton succeeded in securing the interest of the Garfield administration in the treaty. Miss Barton, accordingly, held a meeting and organized a society called the American Association of the Red Cross. This was on May 21, 1881.

Although the U. S. Sanitary Commission and the Association for Relief of Misery of Battlefields were forerunners of the American Red Cross, it was Clara Barton (1821-1912), famous for her volunteer work among wounded in the Civil War, who had the honor of founding the society in this country.

In 1877, Miss Barton received an appointment as representative of the International Red Cross Committee of Geneva, and went to Washington to work for American adherence. Unable to make progress with the Government, in the following year she issued a leaflet on the Red Cross and its purposes, which was given to all members of Congress. A number of friends associated themselves at this time with her efforts, including the Swiss diplomatic representative.

When President Garfield took office in 1881, both he and his Secretary of State, James G. Blaine, endorsed the movement. Thus, the way was cleared for organizing an American society.

The Red Cross in the United States dates from the evening of Saturday, May 21, 1881, when a group of well-known residents of Washington, D. C., met in Miss Barton's dwelling in the Capital City. Miss Barton read papers to show what the Red Cross was doing in the countries then adhering to the Geneva Treaty, all with their own national societies.

At a second meeting on June 9, the organization was completed. The new society called itself "The American Association of the Red Cross" and elected Miss Barton as its president. Plans for prompt recognition by the Government were upset, however, by the tragic death of President Garfield.

In the summer of 1881, Miss Barton, who was a patient at a sanitarium at Dansville, N. Y., organized there the first local Red Cross unit in the United States, known today as the Clara Barton Chapter. This was on August 22, 1881.

President Arthur in December, 1881, sent a message to the Senate, urging adherence to the Geneva convention. Opposition melted away as soon as the objects of the Red Cross were studied and understood. On March 1, 1882, President Arthur, acting with the consent of the Senate, by his signature gave the accession of the United States to the Geneva Treaty. On June 9, the Swiss Federation accepted American adherence and on July 26, President Arthur announced the fact in a public proclamation. Thus, was the American Association of the Red Cross welcomed into fellowship with kindred societies of 31 other countries.

In 1902, Miss Barton attended the International Conference of the Red Cross at St. Petersburg (Leningrad), where she was decorated by the Czar. Miss Barton, however, was reaching the advanced age at which she was entitled to retire from active serice. On May 14, 1904, she handed in her resignation, after 23 years (Continued on Page 29)

# Reflections

### Reprint from The Seer

F the questions which calls ever more and more clamorously for an answer in the realm of modern thought, is the problem of determining the precise relation between the closely similar phenomena variously classed as "esoteric," "occult," "psychic," "metapsychic," "mediumistic" and spiritistic" or "spiritualistic." It is utterly useless to deny that there is a very strong likeness in them all, that in a large proportion of cases there is a striking parallelism, but it would be equally foolish to blind one's eyes to the sad truth that this parallelism is not always admitted. Professor Richet and Sir Oliver Lodge, Professor Rutot and Professor Bozzano, Edward Carpenter and Maurice Maeterlinck will all report a given phenomenon in much the same terms; all will bear witness to the existence of psychic gifts, of supernormal powers; all will admit to the unquestioned proof of numberless happenings to which no materialistic hypothesis will apply; yet each will explain that phenomenon in a different way. There is a dangerous tendency to emphasize the difference in explanation of cause, and to diminish the solidarity in point of observed and registered fact.

Let us admit that the Spiritualists, the Metapsychists and some of the Occultists -the Theosophists, for example-are arrayed in their several camps, and it would not be difficult to overhear criticisms of each in the camp of the other; yet the bond between them all is far deeper than the superficial differences, for all these camps belong to the same army, all of them marching (together with all believers of all religious creeds) under the banner of "Survival," and all doing valiant battle against one or the other corps of the opposing army of Materialism. It may well be true that variances of opinion are helpful to a finer distinction of the forms and phrasings of Truth, but a consciousness of union is also necessary for spiritual activity in the mass. Label men how you will, but two great divisions will still remain, the spiritually-minded or the beholders of the Crown, and the materialminded whose eyes are set upon the Muck-Rake. All those who are convinced that the grave does not end all, will rally to the cry of: "Life-and Beauty that lies beyond !"

Fundamentally, what counts the most is the simple but sublime assurance that the life of the Individuality does not cease at death. Fundamentally in the work of the Bible Society is the conviction that in the Bible is to be found the way to immortal joy; fundamental to the Roman


Catholic is the belief that Holy Church is the way to salvation; fundamental to Buddhist faith is the knowledge that the Wheel of Life and of Lives turns ever; fundamental to the Spirit doctrine is the evidence that those who have undergone that change known as death still find means to prove the continuity of identity; fundamental to the most careful Psychical Research observer is the maintenance of a hypothesis that certain powers-still regarded as supernormal-do not come to an end at the same instant as the stoppage of the heart. Let us clearly have in mind the universality of belief in survival or in some form of personal super-mortality. The sheer materialist is coming to be in such a lone and shivering minority, that one grows sorry for him.

The second and most consoling certainty which has come upon the Twentieth Century is the realization that Man is not alone, and that human beings are helped and guided (or hindered and led astray) by forces superior (and inferior) to Man. The Materialists have grown rather tired of shouting, "We have found one blind alley that doesn't Lead to God!" They have also begun to be a little bit more modest in their claims that they are the very apex and pinnacle of all power and knowledge, that the human being is the lord of all creation, and the materialist the lord of all human beings-all others being benighted souls in the darkness of superstition. For the Twentieth Century finds incontestable evidence of "entities" other that mortal-human in the world, and equally potent evidence that higher entities are actively engaged in such matters as human development, race development, and evolution. That fact is much more important than is a discussion whether these should be called: (a) discarnate human beings, who, in the spirit world, have acquired the right to be "missionaries of the astral," "guides" or " controls"; (b) "guardian angels," "thrones," "seraphim," according to Christian belief; (c) "elder brothers," "masters," initiators," "mahadevas," according to differing forms of oriental belief; or (d) "nature-forceforms," or "transcendental leaders," as certain schools of metapsychists term them. The fact is more important than the name.

All these beliefs, and all these theories may be synthetized into two simple affirmations, into two plain axioms:

(1) Some part of man survives after "death" in another world or plane.

(2) There is direction and protection of man coming from another world or plane. (Continued on Page 31)

"Yes Jim, I have been shown," I said aloud. "I'll never doubt again."


I knew he was happy. His contentment was wafted to me on the breeze. Then he spoke to me and his voice issued from where he had always sat of an evening.

Another very strong point of sympathy -one which should endure through all the years of married life-is when the wife's month and day, total the same as the husband's month and day. For example, October 2, 11, 20 or 29 has the same vibration (3) as February 1, 10, 19 or 28, (3); or May 4, 13, 22 or 31 has the same vibration (9) as January 8, 17, 26 (9) or August 1, 10, 19 or 28 (9). This indicates that both will be influenced by the same vibrations-month by month-and indicates a strong point of harmony.

As "all mankind loves a lover"; and as the whole world knows the deep love that existed between Elizabeth Barrett Browning and her husband, Robert Browning, both of them famous poets, suppose we analyze their names and see what vibrations indicate this unusually harmonious union.

Elizabeth Barrett was born March 6, 1806 (3-6-6=6) and her husband, Robert Browning, was born May 7, 1812 (5-7-3 =6). So you can see that their Birth Paths are identical, which, as has been stated, is one of the strongest points of harmony. Now let us write down the vibrations of each name.

Note first that their Vowels both vibrate to 8, showing that they were true soul-mates. His Personality (10) was her Destiny (10). with the Red Cross. She died April 12, 1012

The American National Red Cross, as we know it today, with its semi-governmental status, its wide-spread organization extending to outlying possessions of the United States, and its peace-time program, dates from its Congressional charter of January 5, 1905.

The work of reorganization and of drawing up the new charter was led by Miss Mabel T. Boardman, now secretary of the Central Committee and national director of volunteer service. For the drafting of the charter, the Red Cross was chiefly indebted to Miss Boardman, to John W. Foster, former Secretary of

State, and to William H. Taft, who became the first president of the new society. Mr. Taft was at that time Secretary of War.

Reorganization on a new plan gave the Red Cross increased opportunities for usefulness. From an enrollment of 3,337 members at the end of 1905, it now has a normal enrollment of 4,100,000 members, with a Junior Red Cross membership in the schools that reached more than 7,000,-000 in 1931.

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

Hindus, or the Kwan-se-on of the Mongols. Thus the stories of the Adepts differ. They use different symbols and names, all for one miracle. side, but for three years the interior is warm. When these seal remains are opened in mid-winter, when the cold is indicated at, perhaps 60 below the freezing point, the inner body steams like boiled meat. If all had died at death, when the seal ceased to breathe, how could this prolonged heat be generated, in the presence of extreme cold, for a period of years?

This will be answered by the statement that the intestinal tract is always charged with bacteria of many varieties and death would stop the glandular production of substances antagonistic to these putrefying germs; all of which is true, but the fact still remains that the germ life was a part of the life of the living and it did not die with death.
