Impressions Never Die

T is known today that all substance is made up of congeries of electrons.

The impression of the human form as well as all forms, both objective and mental, never dies. Basically speaking, an impression means electrons that have been taught to know the object or thing which it represents by having had experience with it. Then they dwell within the brain and are sent forth to carry the knowledge of that object in the form of a wave, to all spaces upon the earth and perhaps to infinite spaces. When they are sent forth the impression is known as a mental one.

For instance, the light rebounds from a human form, composed of untold numbers of electrons and passes to another thru the optic nerves to the visual area of the brain. This is known as the afferent flow and, under law, it calls for the efferent flow or a reaction of like electrons. The reaction consists of groups of electrons being sent forth that understand about the part of the human form from which they come. This is the time of the impression becoming mental.

We know that this is true of the reaction, for if one keeps up the reaction long enough one can detect the loss of his body on a pair of common scales.

If one sits on a scale for three hours after placing it in balance, it will go out of balance from two to three pounds if one concentrates seriously during the time. Work, under law, always implies a loss of the electrons of one's protoplasmic cells.

Under law, one is never the originator of an impression nor does one ever send forth one's electrons except as a reactionary measure. After the electrons are taught to know an object they never forget it, under the law of Habit. Thus, if one dies, it is only the dissemination of one's electrons, but they never die and they carry on their work elsewhere.

The human voice, whether audible or inaudible, is always objective,—made up of measurable electrons,—so, too, are all sensory vibrations. If one dies one's electrons that know one's form inside and out, are still alive and carry the impression (knowledge) of that form to all brains, every instant of time because they fill all space around the earth as they are in reality the electrons of light. One could not endure without the electrons of light that come from the sun.

This explains why one can remember things of the past, such for instance, the beloved form that has passed. When one recalls the form of a person not present it is the same process as when doing so after one has passed. Electrons come to the brain that had had experience with that form.

For instance, kissing in one's dreams proves that one may have an exact duplicate of the reality if the electrons will pass thru the brain. In fact all dreams prove it. If a person or thing is disseminated the electrons that know that form still continue to endure.

One may realize this statement by thinking of an echo. One sends his voice from him and in many cases the electrons come back bringing the knowledge of what one has said as many as five or six times, yet there is positive knowledge that they never cease to come back. If one dropped dead instantly when one sent forth one's electrons, one may realize that his voice would still be alive as long as it takes for the echo to come back five or six times. Then if that be so and they never cease to come back as science has proven, the voice is infinite.

To make this principle still more realistic: If Polaris is four quadrillion of miles away it takes the electrons from the sun after they have rebounded from that body 682 years to reach the earth. When one looks at it one does not see it but only the reflection of it which has been' on the way 682 years. If Polaris exploded the instant that reflection of it left the body,-meaning of course the light electrons,—then one could not know of it for 682 years. At the end of that time the picture would not come with sufficient vividness for one to see it and so it would be said that it had passed. In reality the electrons would still be everywhere that knew that form. Thus both mentally and objectively, by what one knows, the electrons endure after the form and voice has

Scientists are beginning to realize that if all music is in the atmosphere all of the time when being played it must be there all of the time under the principles above given. They realize fully that all impressions, sound and mental, are also there.

Music records have been placed in vaults to remain there for one hundred years and then to be taken out and played. Can one doubt that the electrons that were sent there directly from the songstress brain will come forth?

Now one can have one's beloved talk into a dictaphone and at anytime thereafter one may hear that familiar voice. If any endure within a record for say, a hundred years, then one knows that the individual electrons of that brain did not

pass with the dissemination of the body and brain. Why should they not endure within the wood and granite and mortar and human forms after death? The Bible says that Eve partook of the forbidden fruit because the serpent tempted her. This is actually true. But the serpent was not upon the ground as many think but within her blood.

The microscope discloses the fact that human beings have three great divisions of bacteria within their blood, namely, coci, spirilli and bacilli bacteria. 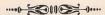

Being such a natural gambler, you may depend upon the certainty of your hunches. This makes you very daring at times, both in physical courage and in your occasional defiance of public opinion.

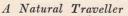
Apt To Be Eccentric

The former refers to any form or expression of individual consciousness—from instinct to intuition—from the "subconscious" to the "superconscious"; while the latter covers a mere single department of this consciousness—the sense-governed, sense-stimulated, sense-instructed brain-mind.

Now, the "Intellectualist" is an individual, who derives his entire knowledge from the material side of nature, as reported and interpreted to him by his five physical senses. In the United States Patent Office, a device is waiting for patent which is on the principle of a nickle-in-the-slot machine and is able to supply accident insurance policies to travelers, performing every detail of secretarial work with the accuracy required for its acceptation as a perfect legal document.

But the introduction of the Robot with its mentalized mechanism is not limited to the fields of industry and commerce; the Robot is entering the field of art itself, where it is masquerading in terms of music and painting, in response to conceptions and fancies of the human intellect. So that you see the phrase in numbers, means exactly what it does in words, understand yourself or mankind; examine your experiences; analyze your character; so that you may know why you are here on this earth and how you can best use your talents and personality to build a satisfactory destiny.

Those of you who are interested in advertising, in finding pen names, stage names, names for some business or enterprise, should use the method explained above to find the right vibrations to express their aim or purpose. They should remember that a business or a firm name may be analyzed exactly as if it were a person.

Now to get back to our subject proper for this lesson-how to set about analyzing a name. This will be a review for those who do understand and a help to the new readers who do not know exactly "what it is all about."

Every Character Analysis must include a few essential points and may include others as one advances in the understanding of Numerology.

First: The ORIGINAL NAME must be analyzed,-for the VOWELS, represent the Talents with which you were born; the CONSONANTS represent your Personality or the effect you have on other people; and the Total Name represents your Destiny or Vocational Qualifications. This original name indicates your early environment. Your original surname shows the qualities and traits you inherited from your father.

Second: The Birth Path indicates the lessons you learned in former incarnations and shows what work you have come to accomplish in this life. From it you can tell what qualities you need to develop, and what your vocation should be.

Third: Your present name or present signature indicates your present environment and present field of activity. It is here that changes should be made, if harmony is lacking. By harmony we mean that the total present name should be odd, if the Birth Path is odd; even, if the Birth Path is even; and the number of the number. It is the number that represents present Destiny should be identical with

or higher than the Birth Path. For example if the Birth Path is 3, the Destiny should be 5, 7 or 9. Both 11 and 22 are considered even numbers because when they are reduced they become 2 and 4. 10 is considered an odd number because when reduced it becomes 1. If either the Birth Path or the Destiny equal 20, 30, 40, etc., the vibration must be considered as 2, 3, 4, etc. Super number 11 and 22 must be considered first as giving super power to the vibration with which it is associated and then it must be reduced to lowest terms. For example 11-6, must first be considered as giving super power to the 6; then it should be reduced, added to the 6 and considered as 8.

Fourth: Look for the TYPE of the person you are analyzing. This is shown by the first vowel of the name, influenced by the preceding consonant (if there is one). For example, Mary is a woman of creative ability and originality (a, 1) along logical (m, 4) lines. Carl shows originality along artistic lines. Any name beginning with a vowel, shows more strongly the characteristic of the vowel than if it were modified by a vowel. For example, Edna is more versatile and restless than Genevieve; Albert is more strongly a pioneer than Gale.

Fifth: Find the KEYNOTE. It is frequently a good plan to find the Keynote of both the original name and present signature. This is done by counting the letters of the entire name or entire signature. For example, Charles Augustus Lindbergh has the original Keynote, 6, which indicates that he was reliable and trustworthy. The Keynote of his present signature-Charles A. Lindbergh is 8, showing that his executive ability has come to the front.

Sixth: Next consider the Angle or Viewpoint. Up to 50 years of age, this is found by adding together the month and day of the Birth Path; from then on, add together the day and the year. For example, Lindbergh was born February 4, 1902. His angle on life, or his viewpoint is 6, showing that he assumes responsibility and is always to be relied upon. Calvin Coolidge was born July 4, 1872. Since his 50th year his angle on life has become 4, analytical and introspective.

Seventh: Everyone wants to know where his Pinnacle of Success lies. This is found by adding together the month and the year of the Birth Path. This shows the line of activity in which the person should find the greatest success. Lindbergh's Pinnacle is 5, showing that his success

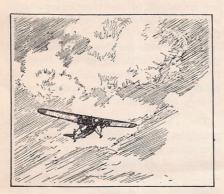

Jewish Elements in Occultism

T is a popular fallacy, and one especially advanced by the opponents of Judaism, that the religion of Israel is a religion of legalism, formalism, and fear. They object to Judaism primarily on the grounds of its lack of mysticism and esoteric tradition. This outlook, of course, is an utterly erroneous one, for not only has mysticism been one of the most popular aspects of Judaism but Jewish esoteric tradition has impressed itself more deeply on occult and mystic thought since the middle ages than any other religion or creed. Jewish mysticism is as old as the Old Testament, or rather, as old as some of the oldest parts of the Old Testament. It prevailed in varying degrees of intensity throughout the centuries comprised in Old Testament history and the current flowed on uninterrupted into the era covered by the Rabbinic period. The religious and philosophical literature, ritual and worship of Jewish medievalism became heirs to it, developing and ramifying its teachings and implications in various manners and impregnating itself on the subsequent mystical thought of the world.

The Kabbalah, in particular, is regarded as the general hypothesis of every school or kind of mystical interpretation since the middle ages. | What drew Christian students and made them seek to fathom the Kabbalistic mystery was assuredly its theosophical but not its thermateugic part. They were attracted to the Kabbalah either through an inordinate passion for the marvelous or mainly through a desire to seek the conversion of the Jews and regarded the Kabbalah as a fitting instrument to effect that conversion, and not in the case of the Jews only, but even of pagans. They came therefore to its study and elucidation, not as investigators of things esoteric, not as seekers for an absolute doctrine of religion, nor even for a higher sense of Christianity, but imbued with a evangelical spirit. Genuine Kabbalists were, in point of fact, of three types: (1) The Jew who had abjured Israel and directed his polemics against it. (2) The born Christian who believed that the Jew was in the wrong for continuing in Judaism. (3) The mystic who recommended the Christian to become a Kabbalist on the ground that the germ of all dogmas could be found in the tradition of Israel. These mystics represented no particular cult or school with the possible exception of Elephas Levi who gave impetus to the founding of the Theosophical movement and who is considered the father of modern occultism. Christian Kabbalists, beginning with Mirandula and going

through to Levi, the egregious exponent of the philosophical position of Jewish secret literature, approached the Kabbalah in various ways stressing either its metapsychic side or dealing with cosmological hypothesis or even to explaining the Kabbalah in the light of Christian esoteric tradition.

Apart from these individual mystics

there are two schools of occult thought which have strongly associated themselves with Jewish esoteric tradition-the Rosicrucians and the Theosophists. Rosicrucianism is not a religious movement, except as to its philosophical discussions, in its rituals and fundamental principles there is a very definite religious theme which more nearly coincided with many of the Jewish doctrines than with any other religion. Its interpretation and presentation of God is much like that of the Jewish concept, even though the Rosicrucian teachings claim to have received this concept from its ancient traditional founder, Amenhotep the Fourth, Pharaoh of Egypt, who is alleged by Rosicrucians to have been the first in the land, if not in the world, to present the concept of. Monotheism. Also, in its presentation of the Shekinah, the Rosicrucians closely approximate the Jewish conception of that holy element in the synagogue. Another symbolic parallel is in the cross of the order which has no connection whatever with the cross of Christianity. Its esoteric meaning is that it represents the physical body of man with its sufferings, trials and tribulations. The budding rose on the cross represents the soul of man in the process of unfoldment through religious, philosophical, ethical, moral and intellectual comprehension and study. Together, the rose and cross present the allegorical picture of the soul of man unfolding through the trials and tribulations of the body. Or, in other words, the Divine and Superior part of man evolves through the lessons learned in earthly experience. This doctrine bears a decided resemblance to the speculations concerning the soul held by the Kabbalists. Whether the Rosicrucian interpretation has been taken directly from the Kabbalah, is problematical. For, although the Rosicrucians are commonly known or believed to possess the key to the real meaning of the Kabbalah, they have avoided public admission of their interests in this esoteric work of the Jews for fear of being associated with what they deem popular mistranslations of the Kabbalah. Among the many statements concerning this mystical fraternity is that it gave great impetus to the study of the Kabbalah, but no statement can be hazarded as to

its truth. While the Rosicrucians have a very high regard for the sacred principles of Jewish philosophy and religion that are contained in the true interpretation of the Kabbalah they understand that the Kabbalah is a science and philosophy originated with the Jews as a result of their contact with Egypt and they give little credence to any claim of a Kabbalah coming out of any other country or race of people.

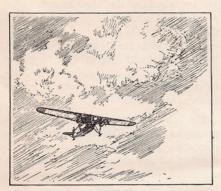
The Theosophists, also, attest to the principles of the Kabbalah but with the conviction that the cosmology and metapsychics of Jewish esoteric tradition are reflections or derivatives from an older knowledge and a higher teaching which has existed from time immemorial in the farther East. Madame Blavatsky, one of the early founders of the Theosophical movement distinguished between an ordinary, or Judaistic, Kabbalah and the universal, or Oriental, Kabbalah. Nothing however, is known of any Oriental Kabbalah and certain occultists indicate the feeling that the Hebrew tradition may have been perverted.

Essentially, the Kabbalah of Theosophy and the Hebrew Kabbalah are analagous. The former, however, is more or less fixed to ancient usage while Theosophy is open to newer interpretations in form and language. On the question of reincarnation, for instance, Theosophists interpret the reincarnation of the Kabbalah as the transmigration of souls, implying that the individual may reincarnate as it pleases him, regardless of the law or of the order of things, while Theosophical reincarnation interprets the law of rebirth as a reincarnation into finer and more suitable bodies, into newer and more suitable opportunities. This may be seen in the light of cause and effect (Karma), in the working of evolution.

The metempsychosis speculations of the Kabbalists have, however, been extremely confused by modern occultists and many mystics maintain that the modern schools have misinterpreted the beliefs of the Kabbalists in regard to the transmigrations of the soul. It is clearly understood by commentators that the theory of reincarnation Kabbalistic stressed that rebirth depends upon the experience gained in life on earth and that man reincarnates, not upon his own will, but upon the extent of this experience gained. He therefore reincarnates until he has gained the totality of experience and if, upon his third rebirth, he has failed to accomplish this mission, he is assisted by some stronger soul which

Modern spiritualism came as a reaction against materialism and the sole idea which gave it birth was that ghosts or spirits were individualized entities subject to law. It is distinguished from the Biblical conception by its sweeping claim that all spiritual phenomena and the evolution and existence of spirits are by the operation of fixed and ascertainable laws. Old spiritualism is believed to be a continuity of miracles; a miraculous God and a spiritual existence maintained by fiat in defiance of the known order of the world.

"Futurism," the Art of the Robot

In the ultra-modern phase of painting, we find the same intellectual mechanistic Robotism at work. "Cubism" or "Futurism," is the intellectualization process of pictorial art, by which the soul and genius of Nature is reduced to expressions of fantastic mental moods.

In this form of art, we meet a defiance of every principle of natural and ethical interpretation. The laws of tonal perspective, the rhythm of color, and the balance of form are completely ignored and brushed aside by the untamed ambitions of this ambiguous art. Being inspired and engineered by the intellect and its sense-life and with no ideality or intuition to guide its course, this attempt to interpret nature can only approach its subject in a crude and elemental form. And it is in this form that the "Intellectualist" has transferred his power of mental and material control into a subconscious center of his own nature-a reflex of his own individual art-life. And this reflex is the subconscious Robot of "Futurism."

The great disadvantage to the "Intellectualist," in his labors of art and music, is this lack of super-sensuous elements in his thought-life. For the very principle and essence of art must always be supersensuous, or spiritual. Without this quality, art is either a mere photography of form, or a phantasy in the formless. Unable by his mere mind to reach the heart of things, while yet disdaining to copy or imitate nature herself, the "Futurist" chooses to conjure with a fantastic dreamworld, in which his speculative faculty tries to create for his fancies a "dwelling and a name." This combination of intellect, fantasy and matter in an effort of constructiveness, constitutes the functioning of the subconscious art-pilot-our psychologized Robot in the so-called "Futuristic" art.

The Robot in the Movies

Modern dramatic art as staged in the Movies is no less grotesque and unbalanced in their interpretation of life than the vagaries of modern painting and music. The same bold and crude attempt to impersonate life, without an understanding of its meaning and purpose. For whenever creative imagination divorces itself from the sense of moral guidance and responsibility, the result can be nothing but rhapsodies in moods and fancies. Art and beauty is as inseparable from moral life, as a flower is inseparable from the soil in which it is rooted. The artist, whether an actor, a painter or a musician, must know himself, not as a clown or automaton, but as a self-conscious, moral

ism, organized into a musical Robot per- entity. An artist, without the power to than a sense of personal vanity or selfpride is an esthetic failure.

> Intuition—the power of consciousness to interpret life itself-is the central factor in all art-life, and the only faculty that can reveal the true values and origins of things. Without intuition art-life is as incomplete and as unreliable as physiological life, without its sympathetic nervous system.

> Now it is this failure of the intellectualist to understand and interpret life beyond the limits of its organic expression that accounts for the incoherence and sordidness of the human emotions as put before us in the exhibitions of modern art and drama. In fact, it is safe to say, that the major part or our present drama, in place of devoting itself to an interpretation of the stream of true, normal emotions, that surge up spontaneously in human life, has become a mere intellectual speculation where reasoned attitudes and ulterior motives are stimulated into the white glow of professional vanities and financial motives.

> As to the public itself, their present interest seems to be centered in the three dominating emotions: "SEX, SPEED and THRILLS."

scious of the source of his being, or of its character.

During the first year, when the child spends the most of its time in sleep, and in dream, it is creating within himself, the consciousness of peaceful innocence, called the habitation of God. At first the child only gives up its happy dreams to take material nourishment, when it again slips back into paradise. It will later be seen that the consciousness of innocence, or the woman, does not leave the garden of paradise, but the man. Gradually the child, under the influence of natural environments, begins to sprout forth intellectually. The intelligence is the image, or male element of being, composed entirely of knowledge. The consciousness is the female element, or the likeness of the intelligence. Before the intelligence becomes too strong, the child is only conscious of innocence; the whole world is innocent, because it is a world within a world. It is only conscious of the inner world, which has been created while it slept, more than of the outer world, in the little time it spent awake. As more time is spent awake and less time spent asleep, the child of intelligence is weaned from the mother consciousness of innocence. The newborn intelligence lives and grows, impelled by the power of desire to know without thought of how it is to be used. This is to

When there is knowledge of how to use knowledge, and that knowledge is put into practice, it will result in joy and gladness. On the other hand: when knowledge is misused, either ignorantly or wilfully, it will result in all manner or disaster, extreme suffering, heartrending disappointment, bitterness and sorrow. When the child of intelligence feels the sting of death, or a guilty conscience, it is because he has slain his brother, the child of innocence. The consciousness of innocence is covered by the intelligence, and becomes a state of sub-consciousness, or the waters under the earth. > The child of consciousness is called Abel. who offers the blood of the lamb, or the life of innocence. As the first shall be last, the second child is called Cain, who offers the fruit of the land, or knowledge, symbolized by grain. When the woman gives birth to Cain, she says, "Now I have a child of the lord," which is to give the lordship of the world to the intelligence, or to rule by the power of knowledge. After the intellectual child has severed his relationship with innocence, innocence becomes a dream, which is dead, because there is no growth.

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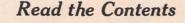
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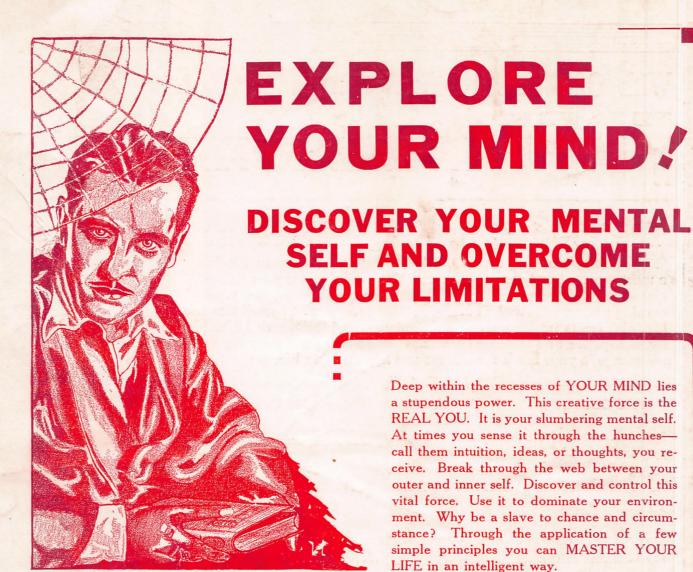
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
