

He expounded his philosophy for The Spokesman-Review recently in a series of answers to questions.

Question-What is the secret of all this? Answer-Right thinking.

Q. What do you mean by right thinking.

A. Right thinking is a scientific art that is but little understood. Those who have consciously or unconsciously indulged in it have been the leaders of the world throughout the ages.

Evolves Guiding Rule

Q. How can one master the art?

A. Recently a definite rule has been invented and a copyright obtained that gives the student the right method to apply definitely to organize his thinking.

Q. What is this new method?

A. The new method consists of a chart of the mental faculties of which there are eight. They contain 43 group members. Each faculty receives and registers its particular type of thoughts which are transferred to the group member where it belongs. No other faculty or member of groups will entertain a thought that belongs to any other faculty or its members. When an active thought is received it puts mind in motion which produces the thing that is patterned by the thought.

Q. Do most of us really know how to think?

A. Nicholas Murray Butler and John Ruskin have said people do not know how to think but think they do. They can learn when they start with a knowledge of the thinking machine where thinking begins. I believe I am the first to work this out by means of a chart.

Is Essential to Welfare


Q. Why is right thinking so essential? A. Right thinking is the most vital factor in shaping the health, welfare and happiness of the individual, his own destiny and that of the nation to which he belongs. Everything that we do is done first in mind before it is expressed outwardly in actions that are beyond recall. Fortunately, a divine intelligence has placed within us the power to organize and correct harmful thinking and to atone

The Law of Life

Life is Our Subject

T MIGHT seem to some that writing. upon a theme so well known as LIFE BEFORE DEA'I'H, would be unnecessary. However that may be, it will not be because people know enough about it to properly guide their way. In dealing with this subject, at the start, we intend to lay down, first of all, the LAW OF LIFE, as analyzed by those who have journeyed far beyond us. By doing this we will, so to speak, forge a handle which everyone can grasp and by means of which everyone can easily raise themselves up to the next higher level. This Law of Life is what all scientists are seeking for in vain. It is the "Ultima Thule" of upto-date human ambition and, we doubt not, when promulgated, will be denounced by most as spurious and not to be considered. The few, however, who recognize its truth, will spread the seed; this seed will grow and prosper, and end by causing all those to prosper who eat of its fruit.

LIFE!

What is Life?

It is consciousness of actions and reactions.

What causes these?

They are the manifestation of power throughout all Nature.

What is Consciousness?

It is the registering of the actions and reactions of Nature. This process cannot begin until the repeated registering has produced a continued impression which we call memory. This memory in consciousness begins far down in plant life and reaches its maximum development in man.

What is the power which causes actions and reactions throughout Nature?

It manifests itself as a series of causes which logically flow one from the other.

The question then becomes: Where, how and when was the initial cause?

The swinging of a clock pendulum continues through letting a small portion of this initial energy escape with each swing. Among the many substances in Nature, it can be proved that, through proper selection, a series can be instituted which returns again to its initial point, ready to begin the cycle over again. This being so, the eternity of Life is a logical consequence and the manifestation of the Law of Life resolves itself into any series of actions and reactions which return ultimately to their point of departure. Humanity represents such a cycle as myriads of other streams of energy and power likewise do. Among them, Humanity is a comparatively insignificant one. The Law which we are seeking rests then on the circle as a basis and, by applying it

to Humanity, we may be able to reach an understandable symbol which will allow earth-flesh development to grasp its meaning.

There are many ways of approaching our subject, even if our knowledge be greatly limited by our antagonistic habits of action. Still, if we would have progression, we are mercilessly urged forward, held ever by that steel band of brotherhood which allows no one to lag much behind.

What is this progression that some desire fervently, others accept stoically, and still others strive against vainly with all their strength?

According to the perception of each individual it takes on a different form and meaning. We will show that however diverse these meanings are, they can all be referred to the same principle of growth and thus enable any mind to grasp its position in the human stream and decide for itself the necessary conditions for the next step ahead. This brings us to the necessity of analyzing first, what this perception we talk about means; secondly, what it teaches us, and thirdly, what use it behooves us to make of these teachings.

The above being a rather comprehensive program, in order to maintain both clarity and conciseness, after surveying on all sides the base of the mountain peak we have set ourselves to climb, we will choose the shortest and least encumbered road. If none had preceded us we would probably have to make many attempts before hitting upon the right trail. As it is, however, already more than half of the Human Stream are ahead of us, leaving their mark and instructions as they draw forward on the Path.

What is this shortest route we are seek-ing?

It is evidently only by breaking through the mists which surround us that we will be able to find it.

What is this mist?

As all our physical impressions while encased in this flesh of earth come from outside ourselves through our five physical senses, this mist must represent an inadequate service on their part. Let us see.

In studying these five senses, we find that all impressions through them reach our consciousness through our nervous system. We find further, through our experiences in photography and chemistry, that there are many combinations concerning which our senses bring us no news, as, for instance, the infra-red and the ultra-violet light rays. In delving further under the surface and remembering that all bodies, composed as they are by different combinations of static matter and force,

are, moreover, permeated by currents of fluid matter, so to speak, passing and repassing through them, thus constituting the main sine-qua-non condition of their continued existence, we come to the conclusion that the reason our flesh senses do not bring us news of them is that, forming the very structure of said senses, they cannot be heralded from without our personality. Here then, possibly, is something indicating LIFE beyond the flesh of earth. Let us see again.

Our five physical senses bring their messages to the brain through the nervous system, and they bring them from without. The physical matter composing the nerves must be set in motion in some way and in a recurring way without dislodging it, in order to accomplish this. Science teaches us that the universal method of accomplishing this is through wave energy. To produce a wave, there must be matter and force to move that matter. The introduction of such waves from outside along the nerves, causes the latter to conform in form and rapidity of motion to them, that being the nerves' function, and thus the wave motion reaches the main ganglion, the brain. We have said that, to produce a wave, there must be matter and force to move that matter. Further, these waves come from without the human organism as they impinge upon and follow the course of the physical human nervous system. As a wave is composed of matter moved by force, we must conclude that some form of matter courses along our nervous system to the brain to produce a reaction. This must then be a special case of the general condition we have mentioned whereby all bodies in this physical world are permeated by what we may call "fluid" matter passing and repassing through them and furnishing one of the necessary conditions of their equilibrium. We conclude then that our physical bodies are acted upon from without by differing waves of matter and force, constituting thus messages through the five senses, and that this is a necessary condition of the temporary stability of the Flesh-Life Expression. The above is all contained in what we call "Physical Life." We will show that there is no antithesis between it and what is erroneously termed "spiritual life," but that, on the contrary, the one is merely the continuation of the other. In our reasoning we have already followed physical processes one great step farther than science has as yet done. As far as the latter is concerned, what we have just recounted belongs already to the "Mysterious", the "Unknown"; then why not to the "Supernatural"?

compose the controlling and persuasive influence of the civilized world endeavoring to enter into a pact for the establishment of World Peace. Past ages of civilization have for their mutual benefit endeavored to do the same. The discussion of World Peace by recognized World Powers is not to be considered as a high conception brought about by the advancement of our times. The human race has witnessed these convocations consisting of representatives of World Powers in their attempt to perform the miracle of Universal Peace in the past. They have not all resulted in failure, but history reveals as a tribute to mankind degrees of success in the attempt.

Of outstanding importance in this present conclave for World Peace is the issue of parity or equality. For in a true analysis of equality lies the solution to World Peace or any world problem.

At last it has become fully realized that the participants in the peace conclave must be of like status in their relation to each other; that no discrimination or privilege must be shown or granted. This intention is, of course, to prevent jealousy, hatred, and resulting intrigue. But, an arbitrary equality cannot be established. Therefore, no meeting of the minds has resulted.

Centuries of varied customs, differences in extent of education, and the obvious confliction of religious interests, is the apparent insurmountable barrier. Custom has developed methods of living with all of their complex forms of ethics, commerce, and trade, which have established in the minds and consciousness of the people certain processes of reasoning. The reasoning in turn developed certain characteristics of nature, inherent desires, and mental standards. To all this has been added education.

It would seem that education would be the common ground that all nations and people could meet upon. Unfortunately not, however. Education is quite extensive in the subjects it embraces. History and political science, therefore, without reflection on either of these noble theatres of man's learning, are partly responsible.

The first, in its glorification of the outstanding events of a nation and its people, builds up a spirit of nationalism, which vacillates between pride and selfish egotism for one's country. We find that the very opposite to the customs, beliefs, and habits of a nation may cause a manifestation of hatred and envy on the part of that nation. A country whose background

NCE again are the powers that compose the controlling and persuasive influence of the civilized deavoring to enter into a pact for blishment of World Peace. Past of tradition has caused its people to form a different conception of life than their foreign cousins may by merely living the life they prefer, antagonize their foreign neighbors.

Political science has erected a hypothetical, political wall around each country, and tradition prevents this wall from being removed. Neighboring nations become in the consciousness of the people foreign menaces instead of humans confronted with like problems. A nation is apt to induce self-hypnosis by its continuance of singing its own praises through its political parties, press, and other propaganda channels. It oft times refuses to recognize the virtues of any measure of a political, economical, social, or spiritual nature, adapted by a nation which does not conform to its own rock bound standards.

The first attempt to compel recognition of the opposite view-point is construed as a hostile move, intended to violate the natural rights of the nation. Where nations are dominated by a religious surveillance of any one creed, the condition is still more apprehensible.

The hatred between nations whose national religious beliefs are opposed, is more intensified than that brought about by conflicts of commerce and trade. In the instance of national religious differences, each nation assumes the role of a Divinely appointed guardian of the true faith of mankind. The injustices that a nation can inflict on another over religious differences is greater than in mere commercial rivalry, because at least a sense of fair play may be recognized in the latter. In the former, that is, religious differences, the attitude of, "the end seems to justify the means," applies. These conditions of inequality between nations breed contempt and sus-

It is true that with the extension of the modes of transportation and communication, the world has become more unified, but not nearly enough. These tentacles are still not strong enough to bind the nations together in a compact unit. When all of the old fires are fanned, the bonds are easily consumed; the nations repel each other then as violently as atoms of matter of opposite polarity. Thus, it is not surprising that no lasting success has ever come from the results of a peace conclave. Each intelligent delegate at the conclave senses the true circumstances, but cannot remedy the situation. He is under obligation; under obligation to uphold the traditions, the peculiarities of his people and his nation. The persistence of each

nation that no variation of national standards be tolerated by their representative, results in a deadlock.

It is gratifying to the real student of metaphysics, however, to know that the causes of the unfavorable condition are at least appreciated; that condition being inequality. The recourses to an arbitrary standard of equality, which will compel all nations to conform to it has also proven a failure. It means that some nations represented at the conclave will be obliged to make certain sacrifices. A sacrifice of some assumed right is offensive to national pride. National pride is, of course, the foundation upon which is built the wall of political nationalism. Political nationalism makes nations and people want nations. Nations in turn contribute to the inequality of the human race.

Metaphysics has always recognized the equality of man. It continually expounds that the essence of Soul, which makes man a living being as distinguished from a living machine, is of Divine origin; that all men of all races, of all degrees of intelligence and social cast are possessed of a Soul, that the Soul, being of a Divine origin, is not within the control or domination of man's will. No matter how steeped in sin man becomes, he can not cast his Soul into the same mire. Therefore, the Soul in all men is of Infinite goodness; the Souls of men are equal; the equality of man, therefore, is the exoteric or outer inequality of man; we see it constantly around us. We classify the variations of inequality in many ways, such as rich and poor, intelligent and ignorant, proud and humble, strong and weak, etc. It would seem to be an impossible task to reconcile these differences, to bring them to an equal basis. We, of course, can imagine the obvious advantages of equality to the human race. For instance, it would result in a common understanding of all problems facing the race as a whole; it would mean perfect cooperation in entering into the solution of any outstanding problem; it would also mean the elimination of racial and national prejudices. To these, of course, would be added the elimination of all associated vices, which cling tenaciously to hatreds of any kind. The mutual understanding of mankind would result not in retrogression, as some believe. It would do away with the impelling urge of competition, that is true, but it would substitute a unified desire to advance alike. The advance would be free of the selfish desire to keep its attendant advantages

Complete Course in Astrology

By LAURITZ C. LARSON

N NOVEMBER 18, 1883, Standard Time was adopted in the United States, by a division into time zones of 15 degrees each of longitude in width. This is the distance the Sun travels in one hour. All clocks in each division were set to one time, using the nearest Meridian as Standard Time. All places 7½ degrees East or West of a time zone Meridian show the same time.

In Astrology, we have to do with True Local Time or Sun Time, and it is, therefore, necessary to make an adjustment of four minutes per degree that birth place is distant from the nearest time Meridian. If East of the Meridian, we add to given Standard Time of birth four minutes for each degree, and if West, we deduct four minutes per degree.

Chicago is 88 degrees West Longitude, that is, West from Greenwich, England. The Central time zone Meridian is 90 degrees West Longitude, and we will, therefore, have to add 8 minutes to the given time or Standard time of birth, because Chicago clocks are set for the time when the Sun reaches the 90th Meridian.

A further correction is necessary if birth occurred on a date when Daylight Saving Time was in effect. For instance, a birth at 9:00 A. M. Daylight Saving Time would be at 8:00 Standard Time.

The Eastern Time Zone Meridian is 75 degrees West Longitude.

The Central Time Zone Meridian is 90 degrees West Longitude.

The Mountain Time Zone Meridian is 105 degrees West Longitude.

The Pacific Time Zone Meridian is 120 degrees West Longitude.

Refer to an Atlas Map to find the nearest Meridian to birth place and also to find the Longitude of birth place.

Sidereal Time

Sidereal Time, written S. T., is the Astronomer's measure of time. A clock registering S. T. is in every observatory, and shows 0 hours, 0 minutes, 0 seconds when 0 degrees of Aries is directly overhead, or on the Mid-heaven. This occurs at the Spring Equinox, about March 21, each year.

Sidereal Time is the measure of time of a complete rotation of the earth from a fixed Star's position on one day to the same Star's position on the following day, and increases at the rate of four minutes per day, or about two hours per month. About September 23, each year, at the Autumnal Equinox, the S. T. is 12 hours when 0 degrees of Libra is on the Midheaven.

An Ephemeris is a specially prepared

The necessary equipment is Ephemeris for 1932, a Table of Houses No. 2 and Starcraft Chart Blanks.

almanac giving the positions of the planets for every day of the year, and also gives the S. T. at Greenwich for each day.

Before a chart can be set up, it is necessary to find the S. T. for data, time and place of birth in order to properly locate the degree of the Zodiacal Sign on the cusp of each house.

Following is method for finding the S. T. for time and place of birth:

Take from the Ephemeris for birth date and year, the S. T. for noon previous to birth, Hour.... Min..... Sec...... Add if birth place is west longitude and deduct if east longitude, 10 seconds for each 15 degrees of longitude distant from Greenwich, (two-thirds of this distance).... Min.... Sec..... Add the time interval between the previous noon and the true local time of birth. Hour.... Min.... Sec..... Add a correction of ten seconds per hour of this interval Min..... Sec...... This gives S. T. at birth place, at birth time: Hour.... Min.... Sec...... If in excess of 24 hours, deduct 24 and use remainder as S. T.

Refer to Table of Houses for the desired Latitude, and find the S. T. nearest to this and set in the Signs on cusps of the six houses shown. The cusps of the other six houses will have the opposite Signs. Often a sign falls on the cusps of two houses. In this case there will be some signs missing. Place the missing signs on the chart in their proper order. Such signs are wholly in the houses in which they fall and are called intercepted.

The Latitude of birth place can be found by reference to an Atlas.

The Twelve Houses in Astrology

The circle of the heavens is divided into four equal parts, and each part is composed of 90 degrees, making in all 360 degrees. The commencement of each one of these quarters is called an angle. These angles are the Eastern horizon, or where the Sun appears to rise; the Western horizon, or where the Sun appears to set; the Mid-heaven or where the Sun is at midday, and opposite the Mid-heaven is called the Nadir, and is that point directly under

where we stand or where the Sun is at Midnight.

Each of these quarters is divided into three parts of about thirty degrees each, which are called houses, and with the division as above noted, it will be seen that we have twelve houses.

These houses are counted from 1 to 12, starting at the Eastern horizon and around the circle from the East to the Nadir, then to the West, counter clockwise.

The houses are not all of equal size, but vary with the Latitude of birth place.

The good houses, counting them, in the order of their strength, are 1, 10, 2, 7, 4, 9, 11, 5 and 3. The evil houses are, in the order of strength for evil, 8, 12 and 6.

The houses are divided into angles, succeedent and cadent. The angles in their order of strength are first, tenth, seventh and fourth. The Succeedent are the next in strength, and are the second, fifth, eighth and eleventh. The cadent houses are the weakest of all, and are the third, sixth, ninth and twelfth. However, a planet in the ninth house is quite strong provided it is not too near the eighth house. The nearer it is to the Mid-heaven, the better unless it be a malefic planet and badly aspected.

Each house represents a department of life, and is most influenced by planets in such house and next by the planet ruling the Sign on the cusp.

The influence of the various houses is as follows:

First House: Early environment, physical appearance, the personality, natural disposition, worldly outlook in general. Rules head and face.

Second House: The financial prospects, possessions, investments. Rules the throat and ears.

Third House: Brethren, neighbors, writings, studies, mental ability, all forms of communication. Rules lungs, neck, shoulders, arms, hands and fingers.

Fourth House: Father, home environment, domestic affairs and general condition at close of life. Has to do with mines, lands and property. Rules the breast, stomach and digestive organs.

Fifth House: Education, children, love affairs, pleasures, speculation. Rules the heart, sides and back.

Sixth House: Health, servants or employees, service, small animals, food, hygiene, clothing, aunts and uncles. Rules solar plexus and bowels.

Seventh House: Partnerships, marriage, contracts, lawsuits, open enemies, dealings with others and public in general. Rules reins and kidneys.

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



guessing. We take a chance, thus bringing about unsatisfactory results in personal and business affairs. Man has several kinds of activities operating, machine-like, within him and when any one of them fails to do its work properly, ill effects result and frequently throw other bodily and mental "machines" out of gear. When any one or more of those faculties becomes dormant from lack of use or disease, the motivating powers of his thinking are incapacitated to just that extent.

Can Solve World Ills

Q. What would right thinking do today?

A. If the masses could realize that man today is the product of his past thinking, everybody would at once get busy and investigate his thinking machine. The world would recover quickly from its cycles of hard times if man would direct his mind upon the things that would develop his thinking along constructive lines. Mass thinking about the prevalence of a business depression keeps it alive. On the other hand, forget it, get busy and the mind will cease to dwell on it. It will then pass out of conscious recognition and

Q. What is the effect on our mental condition?

A. When wrong thinking dominates the mental activities, gloom, pessimism and fear becloud the mind and these phantasms lead on to failure and mayhap to disease of the bodily organs or to in-

Q. Is man responsible solely for his thoughts?

A. Man is not wholly responsible for the thoughts he receives but he is responsible for the way he thinks upon them. Hence it behooves one to know what thoughts to think upon and to know those that should be dissolved to avoid passing them into cold storage in the subconscious receiving station, there to remain as a menace to the future peace and tranquility of his soul.

Universal Mind Rules

Q. How can this be done?

A. The process which we call thinking contacts the world without and results in the action and reaction of the individual upon the universal mind. The capacity of the individual to think is his ability to act upon the universal substance and bring into manifestation the object of his desire. Therefore, our thinking must be in accordance with the law of our being. To obtain good results, it must be creative or constructive.

Q. How can we think constructively?

A. We have good and evil because of the dual complexity of the mental faculties. This duality is a general law of nature, so that each mental faculty has its antithesis. Hence, to the constructive faculty which operates in the perfective grouping of mind attributes is opposed the destructive faculty which operates in the group of animal propensities. Right thinking postulates the ability to determine how to avoid thinking in the destructive, which brings wrong results, and how to concentrate on the constructive faculty that works only for good.

How Brain Functions

Q. How does the brain function?

A. The brain is the organ of the mental faculties which, for convenience, may be divided into eight groups. Thoughts operating in the mental faculties make their impress upon the brain cells that coordinate with the impact of the thought vibrations harmonizing therewith. These cells receive and transmit thought impressions like the radio and in accordance with the energy developed by thinking.

Q. How do the brain cells function?

A. Man's physical body is likewise a mass of cells which are also divided into groups and each group, like the brain cells, has it own specific function. No one group will do the work of any other group. The brain cells are the main source of receiving intelligence. Each cell is a unit of that intelligence.

Is Divine Inheritance

Q. Where do we find intelligence?

A. Intelligence is everywhere and because of its omnipresence, no man can have a monopoly of any part of it. It is man's divine inheritance which contacts and appropriates knowledge in accord with his thinking through the vibratory forces which permeate the universe.

Q. Just how are thoughts controlled?

A. By obtaining a knowledge of the functions of the mental faculties and the various types of thought and thinking belonging to each member, the way is found open to the control of the mind through organized thinking.

How We Really Think

Q. Has each thought its own vibration rate?

A. Yes. Each thought has its own rate of vibration and color. When these vibrations are received, they are instantly transferred to the medulla oblongata, then to the faculty group where they contact with the convolutions which is the seat of the particular faculty that responds to their rate of speed or frequency. The mental dynamo is put in motion and the process of thinking becomes active.

Eighth House: Legacies, gain from others, death, all matters connected with the dead, and occult experiences. Financial affairs of the partner. Rules muscular system and generative system, gall bladder and prostate gland.

Ninth House: Long journeys, foreign countries and places remote from birth, education, scientific, philanthropic, philosophic, religious, in-laws, commerce. Rules thighs and liver.

Tenth House. Profession, occupation, honor, fame, promotion, mother, employer, sphere of influence exerted by native. Rules knees.

Eleventh House: Friends, associations, hopes and wishes, income from business, attitude of native toward people. Rules

Twelfth House: Unseen or unexpected troubles, restraint, limitations, exile, seclusion, secrets, sorrows, silent sufferings and woe, secret enemies, hospitals, large animals, occult or hidden side of life; impairment of sense perception; self undoing. Rules the feet.

The twelve Houses of a horoscope should not be confused with the twelve signs of the Zodiac because the houses are divisions in a map or chart and always occupy the same place therein, while the Signs are thirty degree spaces in the Zodiac, and due to the Earth's rotation on its axis, pass through each one of the houses every twenty-four hours.

The Houses relate particularly to the material conditions of life.

Our study chart is for a birth at 12 noon, January 1, 1932, at Chicago, (88° W. Long. and 42° N. Latitude).

We will now proceed to a calculation of the cusps of the various houses, but first we must find the T. L. T. and then the S. T. at birth place at T. L. T.

Standard Time of birth is noon......12:00 Chicago is 88° W. Long. and there-

fore 2° E. of 90th Meridian and following the rule we must add 2x4 to given time.....

True Local Time 12:08 P.M.

(This correction is not necessary for births previous to Nov. 18, 1883, since all clocks were at Local Time before that date.)

H. M. S.

Refer to an Ephemeris for 1932 and on Jan. 1st we find S. T. is....18:40:00 (Always use the S. T. for noon previous to birth.)

Chicago is 88° W. Long. Therefore adding 10 seconds for each 15 degrees is 10x88-15 or (If our birth had been in E. Long., it would be necessary to deduct this correction.)

Add the time that has elapsed between the previous noon and the T. L. T. which is eight minutes

8:00

Add a correction of ten seconds per hour of this interval. 8 minutes is only 8-60 of one hour and the calculation would be 8-60 of 10 seconds, or about 1 second, really too small to even consider. (Had the interval of time been 8 hours instead of 8 minutes, our calculation would have been 8x10=80 seconds or 1 minute and 20 seconds).....

Adding our figures we have......18:48:60 Remember that we are adding hours, minutes and seconds and in this case the 60 seconds we have, make another minute, so that our answer really is 18:49:00 and this is the S. T. at birth.

By reference to a map we find that Chicago is 42° N. Latitude. Refer to your table of houses for this Latitude and find the nearest S. T. to 18 hrs., 49 mins. (18:47:51). In the column for latitude 42 we find several columns headed 10-11-12-1-2-3. These numerals are for the houses and opposite the nearest S. T. to 18:49:00, we will find the sign and degree that belongs on the cusp of each one of these houses. The other six houses will have the same degrees of the opposite signs.

Fill into the chart blank or wheel the information from the table of houses and we have the following beginning of our horoscope. That is we get from the table of houses the signs and degrees on the cusps of 6 of the houses and place the opposite signs on the opposite houses.

If we had found one sign spreading over the cusps of two houses, we would have found when we had all the cusps filled in that there would be two signs missing. In a case of this kind the missing signs must be entered in their proper order. Such signs fall wholly in a house and are called intercepted signs.

Study this lesson carefully because your progress depends entirely upon your learning each lesson as we go along.

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
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
