# LIGHT AS CREATIVE FORCE By ELAINE B. RYCE (Author of "Soul Growth")

When light waves are accepted for particles of solar energy and their radiation through ether clearly understood, man will have grasped one of the great secrets of nature.

IGHT emanates from a great central source beyond finite comprehension. It travels through ether at a terrific rate of speed and as it journeys it accumulates rather than lessens its force. This seems to be contradictory to present theories, nevertheless, it is true. On its journey light takes on power or increased solar energy, gathered by its momentum through ether. It does not lose force by its radiation, thereby proving its power to create within itself. It leaves the original source, which for want of a better term we will call Spirit Essence and travels toward the planet known as the Earth and here precipitates as light, heat and energy.

When we can learn how to link the creative power in us with the creative power in light we will be able to materialize objects by drawing together and solidifying particles of matter contained in ether, corresponding to our light patterns.

To project a light pattern in ether one must be exceptionally strong in creating a thought pattern. He must learn to think to the point of generating an electric current in his brain, or to put it another way, he must learn to start a dynamo in his brain that will pour a stream of energy into the ether to meet the solar energy in light. The two congeal and make a pattern that can be literally photographed or seen by one with clairvoyant sight. This pattern hangs suspended in ether for varying periods of time, dependent upon its solidity. If enough thought force has been put into the pattern, it will continue to float in the ether, constantly gathering to itself particles of matter until it gradually takes physical form. This is the secret process known and followed by the Masters of Wisdom in making any object or vehicle necessary for their expression on the physical plane. They have absolute control over ether and in ether rests every known particle of matter waiting to be brought together into any desired pattern or form.

The secret of creative power, then, is the secret of concentrated mental action to the point of generating an electrical current in the brain, since man, as man, must function through the human brain and by sending this current of energy out to correlate with solar energy as evidenced by light, he becomes master of his destiny.

To learn to generate the necessary

energy within the brain one should follow the instructions given herein and come to fully understand their meaning.

First, one conserves energy on all planes of life—physical, mental, emotional. Next, he learns to bring all energy to a focal point in the brain itself, because make no mistake, the brain is the creative organ in man and as such must be used for the accomplishment of materializing objects out of the ether. Not only must the power be centered in the brain but the brain must be prepared for the focalization of the entire creative energy of the body and this can be done only by having a blood stream so clear that the brain structure is not clogged by poisons from any source.

The form of energy radiating through light waves is electrical in nature and so is the brain energy that man is privileged to generate. When the two combine as a stream of power traversing the ether, the velocity is much greater than when either acts alone. It is creative to a higher degree than is either stream alone. In other words, light waves left alone to play at will on the face of the earth and not merged with the electrical current of the human brain could never bring about the high order of creation that is possible when the two forces act together. This is why no really great thing is created in the land of savages or people of low mental equipment. In such lands light works alone, but in highly civilized lands, light creates and man creates and the merging of the two powers into one mighty force brings to pass our wonderful achievements of the modern world.

Going back to the subject of how to generate electricity in the brain, the next step following a clean blood stream is the controlled breath. Breath in control is like the wheel that spins the dynamo; when released in a certain way it makes the dynamo start throbbing with power. So with breath. It must first be controlled and then released in such a way as to flood certain brain cells with power, starting them to vibrating at terrific rates. Could you actually see what occurs, you would perceive millions of fine particles of light flashing out from the central portion of the forward brain in very much the same way that electrical sparks flash when made visible through certain contacts. Now these brain sparks are actual energy just the same as electrical sparks are tiny portions or concentrated points of electrical current. To learn to start brain waves or vibrations to the point where actual sparks are sent into the ether is the first important factor for one to learn in relationship to creating material things through the use of light force

or energy. And this is done through the power of the controlled breath, instructions for which will be given later on.

The forces of electrical energy generated within the brain itself through its rapid vibration have a direct bearing on every part of the physical organism, because life energy is electric in principle and as this energy permeates the entire body, each cell of the body is thereby renewed. This means that not alone can control of the forces outside oneself be achieved but also control of the entire physical mechanism. By a perpetual recharging of the body cells with electrical energy, old age, decay and death can be deferred or avoided. Not that physical death can be avoided, but control of the physical body to the point where it can be made an effective instrument for the soul's earthly habitat ages longer than is now the custom, may be easily achieved. This is why great Masters have been able to renew and retain their physical bodies over long periods of time. It is claimed that there are on our plane today, three Masters living in physical bodies over three hundred years old and that these Masters plan definitely to retain their same bodies for at least another two hundred year period. Their work on the physical plane is quite definitely mapped out for this length of time. As long as they need to use their present bodies they will constantly renew body tissue by recharging body cells with electrical energy. They will not use the same method that we are discussing, because this method, to them, would be slow and clumsy. They are able to use subtler methods but the essential principles are the same, only the technique is finer.

The forces entering the mind of man and influencing thought and action are so little understood that any attempt to elucidate the mysteries back of thought process is almost futile. The creative forces of the brain are not comprehended because the brain itself is not fully comprehended. It is the one organ of the body that is the most shrouded in mystery. Its functioning is only partially understood in relationship to the body and hardly at all in relationship to the working of the human mind. How, then, can it be expected that the knowledge of the part the brain plays in the electrical life process be understood? Eventually scientists will discover these things, but this may be a long time in the future. It is hardly time that such knowledge be given to the world at large, at least not in its entirety. At present only from occult sources is such knowledge obtainable.

The old way by beginning before and after birth in early life to find the source of one's troubles was like commencing at the foundation of a wall to save the good bricks (traits). When a few layers are removed it tumbles down into a jumbled mess of bricks and mortar making it difficult to assort the good bricks (traits) from bad bricks (traits) that must be cast out (fears). We now have the good bricks (traits) to use for future manpower building, separated from the bad, which we have found destructive, to use in the building of a new man, whom we have started on the road to success, prosperity, health and happiness.

This direct method of mental house-

#### Chief Characteristics

Persons possessing such a hand have very little mental capacity. The palm is

# Light Bringing Masters

T may be seasonable to give some numerological information on those who have brought light to mankind. At the same time to compare the names and give examples, so that a clear understanding may be had by the reader.

Let us begin as early as Krishna. Krishna like the more recent Masters, had a free vibration which, as is the rule in numbers is 8, 9, 11 or 22. This number is 8, found by adding the value of each letter in the name then adding the total together to form a single digit as: KRISHNA

2991851 equals 35 or 3 plus 5 are 8. The numbers beneath the letters are found according to the order of the letter in the alphabet, always remembering to add together the digit to get a single figure. For instance: to help the reader understand, K is the 11th letter and we call it 2. However, when we add up a name and get 11 or 22 we do not reduce them, but let them stand for Mastership.

If we analyze the word GOD, we get

764 8 also, so it seems that the use of the word God may mean a reverance to all of the Gods or Masters, since the term is directed to a principle.

Krishna lacks the numbers 3, 4, 6 and 7, and the whole being 9, these four numhers from 9 equal 5. This 5 is the subconscious urge and stands for regeneration, for psychic powers and great spiritual development. The 8, is found in the place called Ability by the Numerologist, and Krishna then, came to this plane with the ability to be a God, noble, great executive, and a force among people. MOSES

46151 equals 17 or 1 plus 7 equals 8. This shows the ability to be the same in both Krishna and Moses. Then we can come to a living prophet,

#### KRISHNAMURTI

2991851 43929 (equals 62 or 6 plus 2 are 8)

who is here to carry on the same great work in His own way. The Ambition of Krishna, as found by his vowels, shows his inner desire to establish unity among mankind, while the Ambition of Moses was to be the revelator of high spiritual truths. With Krishnamurti, the aim is to bring forth the illumined intellect and to be master of His environment, making religion a practical thing.

This is the ability and expression of Buddha, who was numbered similar to the present day living prophet Baha-u-lla, since both are 22. 22 is a great Master, able to be a wise counselor to others. He has grown in wisdom through suffering and has learned to obey the higher laws. He cannot confine His interests to a limited number of people, but must work for all. The Ambition of Buddha being a number 4, stands for the desire for greater knowledge which He was satisfied to attain by subjecting the physical body to the life in the Forest. Baha-u-lla has the desire to improve education, health and human conditions, the Ambition number being 6.

The Vibration of Mohammed is 9, which reflects deep truths, symbolizing simplicity of thought with a broad Universal love, sympathy and understanding. The whole world was his field of expression which

# Magical Papyri

HESE words were evidently spoken by Isis in a divine legend. A fire had broken out, and the goddess called anxiously to her son Horus to fetch water. As this cry for help had formerly produced the means whereby the fire on the mountain was extinguished, it was to be hoped that the same words in the mouth of the magician would stop the burning of the wound. It was the same with the following exorcism, which was spoken over the inevitable "milk of a woman who has borne a son," in order to make these medicaments—smell-seeds, effective gainst a cold. "Depart cold, son of a cold, thou who breakest the bones, destroyest the skull, partest company with fat, makest ill the seven openings in the head; the servants of Re beseech Thoth-Behold I bring thy recipe to thee, thy remedy to thee: the milk of a woman who has borne a son and the smell-seeds. Let that drive thee away, let that heal thee; let that drive thee away." (Ebers papyrus 90, 16.)

This catarrh incantation is taken from a myth concerning the old age and the illness of the sun-god. Re is suffering from a cold, which confuses his head; his attendants beseech the god of learning for a remedy; the god brings it immediately and announces to the illness that it must yield to it.

In these magical formulae the magician repeated the words of the god, and through them he exercised the magic power of the god; in other cases it would suffice for him to designate himself as that god, whose power he wished to possess. For instance, whoever recited the following words over the water:

"Thou are not above me—I am Amon. I am Anhor, the beautiful slayer. I am the prince, the lord of the sword.

Raise not thyself-I am Mont, etc." (Pap. mag. Harris.)

caused the crocodiles to be as terrified by this formula as if those gods themselves had passed by that way. It was of course especially effective if instead of using the usual name of the god, the magician could name his real name, that special name possessed by each god and each genius in which his power resided; he who knew this name, possessed the power of him who bore it.

The magic formulae were naturally most effective when they were said aloud, but they were of use also even when they were written; this accounts for the zeal with which the magic formulae for the deceased were written everywhere—in the tomb, and on the tomb furniture,—the greater the number of times they were written, the more certainly they took effect.

There was another way of perpetuating the power of the magic formulae; they were recited over objects of a certain kind, which were thus invested with a lasting magical virtue. Thus the above crocodile incantation might be recited over an egg made of clay; if then the pilot of the boat carried this egg in his hand, all the terrible animals that had emerged



from the stream would again sink immediately into the water.

Stories of Magicians were very popular. and of these may be mentioned the group contained in the Westcar Papyrus. This papyrus, which was lately purchased by the Berlin Museum, relates that once upon a time King Chufu ordered his sons-they were all first reciter-priests to the kingto relate tales of the wonderful deeds of certain great magicians at the court of his predecessor. One had caused a faithless wife and her lover to be seized by a small crocodile of wax; another had by a magic formulae fetched up from the depth of the water a jewel which a lady had dropped there, etc. Chufu admired exceedingly the learning of these ancient wise men, and at the end of each story he ordered an offering to be made to the hero of the tale.

When it came to the turn of Prince Hardadaf, he related to his father a tale of a man still living in his own time. "This man is called Ded'e and lives in Ded-Snefru. He is a young man of 110 years and eats 500 cakes of bread together with a joint of beef, and drinks 100 jugs of beer, even at the present day. He knows how to set on a head that has been cut off, and he can cause the lions of the desert to walk behind him."

Chufu immediately sent Hardadaf to fetch the wise man to his court; and soon the wizard stood before the king and his court. Then the king caused a ferocious lion to be brought in, bound with ropes. (Continued on page 22)



## (Continued from May issue) The influence of the various planets in the various Houses

N the first lesson, we had the general influence of each house on the various departments of life. This influence is of course modified by the position and aspects of the Planet ruling the Sign on the cusp of each house.

The influence of the planet ruling the sign on the cusp of a house is secondary to the influence of the planets that may actually occupy a House, unless the ruling Planet is strongly placed by position and aspects.

Each Sign has an influence of the nature of the planet ruling the Sign on the cusp. We have twelve Signs and twelve Houses, but only nine rulers. For that reason some of the Planets have rulership over two Signs.

The new Planet Pluto is said to rule the Sign Scorpio and hence will replace Mars in that Sign and as other planets are discovered, we are going to have new rulers for Taurus and Virgo and then each Sign will have its own ruler.

No matter how strong the ruler of the Sign on the cusp of a House may be, it is certain that the Planet that occupies a House is going to have much to do with the affairs of such House or it would not fall there in the chart. Planetary House positions are said to be destiny.

Following is a brief influence of each Planet in each House and this influence must be judged in the final reading of a chart by considering through what Sign a Planet has to act and how it is influenced by other Planets.

#### Planets in the First House

Sun: Generally good health and long life; good childhood home; optimistic, confident, frank and free; proud and ambitious; gives ability to rise above birth station.

Venus: Popularity, artistic tastes and personal charm; good childhood home; love will play a great part in life but love must not be toyed with.

It would be most difficult, of course, to verify the major's memory, but some time later I chanced upon a partial verification.

About six months after our conversation, the post library received a book that had just been published, describing some of the cities of Arabia that archaeologists had uncovered and explored. Looking through it I came upon a series of photographs of the city of Petra as it is today —a city now in ruins, but evidently important at one time. The outstanding feature of the city was the fact that it was built on the almost perpendicular walls of a gorge and many of the houses were actually built on sites cut out from the solid rock.

This is one of three incidents that have made a deep impression upon me, as evidencing life beyond the grave.

A few months after this conversation, I was with a group of some five or six friends one evening. Our conversation turned to the psychic and occult, though I might say there was no thought of trying to get spiritualistic phenomena.

One of the ladies present said she had had a dream recently and she believed it was a memory of something that had happened in a previous life. She described the dream, or began to describe it.

It was a wedding scene. She was the bride and she was married to a young man—who was apparently none of our group gathered there that evening. But hardly had she begun describing this dream when I saw the whole scene myself, as if it were being enacted before my very eyes. At the same time another one of the ladies present, whom I know to be somewhat psychic, declared she could see the scene too.

Her description of the scene tallied with mine exactly. By this time the woman who had had the dream in the first place had stopped describing it, and was listening to us finish the description of it; she

agreed that our account coincided with her dream.

Can any one explain that to me? I cannot explain it unless it is a fact that the three of us were actually present at that wedding some hundreds of years before that. As a matter of fact, it did seem to me that I was watching the scene as a rather detached spectator, but that the other woman—the one who was psychic seemed to be a man in that earlier life. She agreed with me in this, for this was her impression too.

I puzzled over the phenomenon for some time. The next day, as I was re-casting the matter in my mind, it suddenly came to me that Mrs. M., the "man" in that previous life, was the uncle of the bride.

I immediately called her up on the telephone and asked her if she had any idea of her relationship with the bride, and she said without hesitation, "Yes, I was her uncle." This was the first time the relationship had been mentioned in any way, or at any time.

When we compared further our memories of this dream—which, please remember, had never been described to us in detail—we found another "verification."

We could see the newly married couple drive away after the wedding feast. They mounted a peculiar high-wheeled cart, drawn by a shaggy, disreputable pony. As I looked at it, I was struck by an unusual thing. The groom seated himself on the left instead of on the right, as we should expect one to do when driving a horse.

Again I asked Mrs. M. to look at her "picture" of the event and tell me which side of the seat the young man was sitting on. "Why, he's on the left," she exclaimed, as surprised as I was.

The third psychic incident that has had a profound impression on me did not happen to me directly, though I know two of the principals concerned, one of them being a warm personal friend of mine.

Both of the men concerned principally in the story are distinguished officers in the United States Army. Col. Merrill, at the time of the incident, was Chief of Staff of the Hawaiian Division, holding one of the most important positions in the army. He is now on duty with the Organized Reserves in Milwaukee.

I have his permission to use his name in connection with this story. In fact, at my request he wrote the story himself and I quote from his account, in his own words.

And so with her back to the wall and not one prop to lean upon, Miriam found (Continued on page 25)



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
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
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

school, when generous slices of fresh ginger-bread were forthcoming; the birthday present, her first Bible, with her name on the fly-leaf and the words, "Search the Scriptures, for in them you shall find peace and comfort," written in grandmother's handwriting; her wedding day, the kind words of advice and generous remembrance: a chain of remembrances, floating through the closing strains of "Safely Through Another Week"; precious jewels these memories strung on the thread of time more to be treasured than any earthly possession. How near grandmother seemed.

Dreamily Hester opened her eyes filled with happy tears; a soft mist seemed to fill the room; across in the cherry rocker, resting quietly, was a small filmy figure dimly outlined; a holy hush held Hester motionless save for the smile of welcome and loving recognition wafted to the vaporous figure of the dear grandmother who remained but a brief time as Hester soon regained her physical sight which drew a veil of darkness over the visitor.

The sorcerer approached the powerful beast, and gazed at it fixedly. At first the lion snarled, then lowered its head submissively. The wizard loosed the cords which bound the animal, and the lion was free. But instead of leaping upon the sorcerer, the great brute arose and followed him wherever he led. The papyrus, in speaking of the wizard's accomplishment, states: "He knoweth how to make a lion follow him as if led by a rope."

This wonderful performance was undoubtedly a case of animal hypnotism. The remorkable feature is not the performance itself, but the fact that hypnotism was understood and practically applied in so ancient a day. The Egyptian sorcerers evidently did not understand the fine points of human hypnotism, but were able to apply their knowledge to animals with telling effect.

The magical tales were the literary pabulum of the common people. Such a literature took a firm hold upon the popular imagination, and was handed down orally more than in written form. Like all folk-lore tales, these stories grew with centuries; all legend being fish for the net of the popular raconteurs of Thebes and Memphis, and in later times for those of Alexandria. When religion and priestly tradition had lost their power, and popular faith grew dim, these stories survived. The decadence of the Egyptian faith after the fall of the Theban priesthood, followed by the overthrow of the Saite rule, obliterated much of the canonical literature of Egypt. The "Book of the Dead," a vast emporium of magic, gave place to shorter rituals, such as the "Book of Breathings," or the still shorter rituals of Greco-Roman times; but the magicians held their own. In Ptolemaic and Greco-Roman times there was a great revival of the love of these tales, of the tales "of the things which men of olden time knew," as the prince in the Westcar Papyrus calls them, and several collections were made.

In recent years the sandy dunes of the Fayoum and the Roman cemeteries of Akhmin have yielded up an astonishing amount of buried literature. Fragments of famous classical authors-Homer, Demosthenes, Aristophanes, many writers known to us by name but whose works were lost, such as Hysperides the poethave been brought to light. More important still has been the discovery of some few-as yet very few-fragments of Christian literature. Chief among these are the portions of the Gospel and Apocalypse of St. Peter from Akhmin and the Logia of Jesus from the Fayoum. These fragments at least prove the existence of a Christian literature in Egypt; and when we add to these the numerous fragments of Gospels found at Oxyrhynchus, we may hope for yet more important discoveries. There have, however, been discovered other papri which, while not of Christian origin, belong to a period contemporary with the advent of the gospel preaching in Alexandria, and which certainly seem to throw a side, if not a direct, light upon the earliest traditions of Christianity. According to the best received tradition, the gospel teaching was introduced into Egypt by St. Mark about the year A. D. 67. Of this we have no authentic evidence; but if it is not possible to fix this definitely, there is evidence that the new teaching had been promulgated in Egypt towards the end of the first century, and borne considerable fruit by the early part of the second. The writings of the Gnostics Bassilides and Valentinus contain references and quotations from the Gospels which imply that the pupils of these teachers must have known the books upon which the Christian faith was based.

The Gnostic papyri, written in demotic, contain, as De Groof has shown, (Arch. für Religionwissenschaft) charms in which the names of St. Peter and other apostles occur. We may therefore assume that Christian teachings would be known to a considerable portion of the population of Egypt, at least in Alexandria, between A. D. 67 and A. D. 150. It is hardly to be supposed that the earliest Christian community was one derived from the Greco-Roman population, or from the Hellenized Egyptians but rather from the poorer Jewish-Aramaean, and possibly a few of the lower Egyptians. The only convert we know of from the New Testament is Apollos, an Hellenistic Jew. It was, therefore, to this class the first teaching would be known. Now among this class the Egyptian patois would be the debased tongue which we find in use in the demotic papyri. Moreover, the demotic was the script of the trading community, as we know from the numerous contracts, wills, letters, etc., which have been found. To place the matter clearly, and it will be seen to be of importance, there was probably a small Christian community in Egypt to whom St. Mark went; indeed, De Groof deduces considerable evidence to ascribe the foundation of this nucleus to the preaching of Philip, and the Egyptian language of this community would be that which we found in the demotic papyri.

In conclusion, we have here, within twenty years of the mission of St. Mark, folk tales which present most striking parallels to the Gospel writings, and which, so far as we know, occur nowhere previously in Egyptian literature. It is very tempting to see in them the first echoes of the preaching of the Christian faith in the land where it made its earliest and greatest conquests.

"Yes. I remember the aphorism. But will you tell me who you are and whither bound? I thought that I alone, in this part of the country, was addicted to solitary jaunts."



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

electrical energy has been explained as the initial step to master when seeking to create through merging brain power with the creative force in light. The student must perfectly master the process of beginning and stopping at will, higher degrees of electrical currents in his own brain cells than are ever present under ordinary conditions. All of the first efforts must be in this direction and long and serious attention must be given if one is to be truly master of this creative process-the process of creating through linking the electrical currents of his own brain with the electrical currents or creative energy in light waves emanating from Spirit Essence, the central source or fountain head of all energy, all power.

At the beginning one should try to make certain tests of his own brain vibration, or try to acertain the intensity or velocity of the vibrations in his brain cells. To do this one must become extraordinarily minute in self-examination. He must, as it were, check his own brain pulse or detect by inner sensitiveness much more acute than any purely physical organism can ever become, just how rapid or how slow his brain vibrations are. Here enters the first necessity for a clean blood stream. When poisons are being forced through the brain cells by the constant ebb and flow of blood, there can be no such thing as a so-called normal or rythmic vibration. It is to establish what for the individual is a normal vibration that the first work should be directed. Once this is done, then one must learn to read the metre of his own brain power in much the same way as electrical metres are read in the physical world. A reading of an electric metre tells how much current is being used from day to day or hour to hour; so the brain metre must measure the amount of current being generated and used.

The light waves penetrating ether attract to them particles of matter residing in ether and gradually these various particles of matter coalesce and are held together by the principle of adhesion that is present in every atom of matter. We have an explanation of this principle of adhesion in chemistry in the words "atomic affinity." If this understanding of the laws of chemistry could be applied with equal precision to the exploration of ether, and the gradations of matter residing in ether become as generally known as are the various chemical constituents, the whole world would be suddenly revolutionized. The entire method of manufacture would be changed and everything from the smallest article of human use in the physical world would be produced directly from the ether instead of by the slow methods now in use.

Physical scientists have some faint glimmering of all this and many experiments are made in secret trying to explore the

The focalization of the brain cells with mystery of the atom. Their whole puzzlement is caused by their refusal to accept life principles in any other terms except those of matter and subject only to known physical laws. When scientists will accept that there is a grade of matter beyond the physical and not subject to physical laws as they are now understood, then their explorations will have a sure basis for further procedure. Now they are working in darkness, groping blindly for something their reason tells them is ahead but which their limited human understanding fails to grasp because they childishly refuse to deal with things that cannot be put into test tubes and laboratory retorts. They must work with coarse tools, therefore they cannot touch the fine substance suspended in ether. Not until the proper tools are in use can the workman succeed, and as yet our physical scientists are refusing to recognize the right tools, much less employ them.

> The particles of matter suspended in ether are so irradiated with energy themselves that their drawing together into different forms or patterns depends upon corresponding rates of vibration or energy in motion, since this is the ultimate definition of vibration. It is energy in motion, reduced to the last term that the human mind can comprehend. As waves of light penetrate the ether, particles of matter are broken up into even smaller divisions, only to reshape themselves according to the new patterns. It is the privilege of the individual to say what these patterns shall be-and accordingly as the pattern is sharply drawn by clear and positive thought, will the particles of matter be quickly attracted to it.

> The clearness of the pattern and the ability to keep it suspended in light are the two determining factors in one's power to create or bring from the invisible ether that which one wills to bring into the world of form.

> Much has been written about the spoken word's power to create but it is not so much the spoken word as the will and the power to image that creates, since the force is projected from the brain cells and not from the mouth through the action of the tongue. It is quite true that one often brings about conditions in life like unto the words he constantly speaks, but it is not true that spoken words or audible sound it necessary to precipitate ether particles into material objects. This is a process dependent solely upon the electrical energy generated within the human brain cells, which brings us back to the way in which this energy is generated.

This is one of another of the various forms of mental sickness that produces its own type as the result of wrong thinking and by it a fear is created that prevents normal thinking.

It is the nature of the fears that determine the type of the malady with which one is afflicted. The fear complexes have been developed so far by my method that when I know the type of the disease, I am familiar with the nature of the fear complexes that originate that particular disease. One kind of fear complex will produce one type of disease and another a different disease entirely, thus it is apparent that one should understand the operation of the various fear complexes in order to arrive at the cause of the various maladies either in bodily or mental sickness.

This new and most advanced branch of psychology is known as the science and

from an operation. Before entering the hospital she had visited my home and asked me to look after her husband while she was away.

"I was a pallbearer at the funeral and in other ways was in close touch with the husband and an only daughter until they left for the United States with the remains.

"On the night of June 11, 1929, I retired rather early and was trying to get to sleep when I had the following experience. The better to make clear just what happened, let me say that many people are able to recreate mentally what they have seen and heard. For example, a piece of music may be recreated mentally, that is to say, without any sense of external sound received through the ear. It was in this way that I heard a voice speak to me, and I replied to the voice. I may add that Mrs. Smith had a very distinctive voice-one that could easily be picked out from among a group of women talking.

"In this mental way on the night in question, I heard Mrs. Smith's very distinctive voice say to me, "I am just as much alive as I ever was. Tell William."

"Now William is the first name of her husband. I at once had the idea that I was being addressed by Mrs. Smith, and I realized an injunction had been placed on me to convey certain information to him. At the same time I realized the difficulty of making him believe I had actually received any such message.

"I at once said, mentally, 'How will he know the message is from you?' The answer came at once, "Tell him Mary is one year older than George.'"

"Now I knew the Smiths had a son, George, and I thought he was referred to, and that the Mary she mentioned was the only daughter. However, for the time being I could not recall the daughter's first name, because, following the custom of the family, I had always called her by a nickname. But I assumed she was the Mary referred to. However, I knew she was considerably younger than her brother, George. Thereupon I had the reaction that the message was nonsense. Then my mind asserted a number of times, 'But she said Mary,' Then I realized the daughter's true name was not Mary and that some

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one else might be referred to. Then I got up and wrote down just what had occurred."

"Next day and later I puzzled over who the George and the Mary referred to could be. Neither my memory nor local inquiry afforded any satisfactory answer. When later the husband and daughter returned from the United States I learned that the son, George, had a first cousin, Mary, who was one year older than he, this cousin being the daughter of Mrs. Smith's sister; and that on the exact date I received the message, the husband was either at the home of his son, George, or had just left there: and further that the husband had seen the first cousin, Mary, just a few days before I had the message.'

"The theory that I had knowledge of the relationship of George and Mary is to my mind untenable."

"I may add that I have never to my knowledge received any other communication from one who had died.

"I certify that the foregoing narrative is to the best of my knowledge and belief true, except that fictitious names, dates and places have been substituted for the true ones, because permission to publish has not been obtained from the persons mentioned." (Signed) Thomas E. Merrill, Colonel, General Staff Corps.

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I may add that an army officer's certificate-such as the last paragraph in the colonel's narrative-has the force of an affidavit, and is commonly used in the place of an affidavit for all purposes, even in courts of law.

The three incidents that I have related in this somewhat rambling paper-slight as they may be compared with the experiences of some people-have for me the force of absolute proof, if I needed any, that death is not the end of life.
