CHRONOLOGY FROM 1801.

- 1801 (January 1st) Ireland united to England. General peace. Severe thunder storm all night, October 10th.
- 1802 National Debt, £571,000,000. Remarkable hot and dry season during August, September, and October.
- 1803 War with France renewed after a peace of 14 months. A very hot July; honey dews, and awful thunder storms.
- 1804 Napoleon Bonaparte made Emperor of France. Sir Sydney Smith attempted to burn the Boulogne Flotilla. Mangold Wurtzel introduced by Dr. Lettsom. Unusual heat in Sept.
- 1805 Great snow (April 29th) in many parts of England. Battle of Trafalgar, and death of Nelson, October 21st.
- 1806 The changes in the season this year were remarkable: very winterly March. Hot and dry June. Wet July and warm Dec.
- 1807 Copenhagen bombarded and taken by the English. A fine and hot summer in England, with abundance of Wheat.
- 1807 The Portuguese Government emigrated to the Brazils. Gas first used in the streets of London.
- 1808 Louis Napoleon, Emperor of the French, born April 20th.
- 1808 The month of July was so hot, that many men and horses died; the thermometer on the 13th and 14th in many parts of England went up to 99°, the highest ever recorded.
- 1809 A very destructive gale at south-west on the 2nd of June, greatly detrimental to the fruit and foliage.
- 1810 Very cold Winter and Spring. The Summer hot with much thunder. Very warm September and October. Severe gale from the East and very high tide November 10th.
- 1810 (July 1st) Louis Bonaparte (father of Napoleon III) abdicated the Throne of Holland. Flooding rains in Nov. and Dec.
- 1811 A very warm season from March to the early part of November. A very fruitful year. Great comet seen all the autumn.
- 1812 The Prince Regent assumed his full powers. War between France and Russia; battle of Borodino; Moscow burnt.
- 1813 America declared War against Gt. Britain: Alliance of England, &c., against France; Revol. in Holland; Pr. of Orange recalled.
- 1814 Severe frost; Allied armies invaded France; Capitulation of Paris; Buonaparte abdicated, and conveyed to Elba; Emperor of Russia, King of Prussia, &c., visited London; Peace proclaimed. Centenary Jubilee, &c.
- 1815 Return of Buonaparte to France; BATTLE OF WATERLOO; Surrender of Paris to the Allies; Return of Louis XVIII; Buonaparte exiled to St. Helena, where on May 5th, 1821, he died.
- 1816 Princess Charlotte of Wales married Prince Leopold, May 2nd. A cold winter; bad harvest; and much corn spoiled.
- 1817 Waterloo Bridge opened. Nov. 6th, Princess Charlotte died.
- 1818 Awful gale (March 4th and 5th); flooding rains all the Spring; but from the end of May, a severe drought to Sept. 6th.
- 1819 Southwark Bridge opened on the 24th of March. A large and striking Comet appeared in July.
- 1820 George III. died Jan. 29th; Cato-street Conspiracy, Feb. 23rd. Very severe winter; but a most abundant and good harvest.

CHRONOLOGY FROM 1821.

- 1821 Great tumults in London at Q. Caroline's Funeral, Aug. 14th.
- 1822 Great famine in some parts of Ireland. Remarkably mild winter; Flowers bloomed throughout January. Fine Summer.
- 1823 South America independent. Mechanics' Institutions founded by Dr. Birkbeck and Lord Brougham.
- 1824 Lord Byron died at Missolonghi, Greece, April 19th. Destructive hail storm, July 14th; harvest late and not good.
- 1825 (June 15th) The first stone of London Bridge was laid. A very hot July and a tolerably good harvest, well secured.
- 1826 The Summer of this year was the hottest and driest on record. Harvest early and abundant, and well secured.
- 1827 Egyptian Fleet destroyed at Navarino. Severe and snowy Winter, fine summer, and an average harvest yield.
- 1828 Repeal of Test and Corporation Acts. Excessive falls of rain from July the 9th, to August the 15th, lowlands flooded.
- 1829 (April 13th) Roman Catholic Relief Bill passed. June the 19th, the Metropolitan Police Act passed. Stormy Summer.
- 1830 (June 26) George IV. died. Algiers taken by the French. July 27th, Revolution in France and Brussels.
- 1831 Reform Bill introduced March 1st. London Bridge opened August 1st. Bristol Riots, October the 29th.
- 1832 (March 21st) General Fast on account of the Cholera; died in London, 5,275. Reform of Parliament Act.
- 1833 Slave Emancipation Bill passed. Medium Harvest. Very severe Gale from N.W. with much rain, August 31st.
- 1834 (March) Dreadful Fire broke out at PETERBOROUGH, during a strong gale of wind from the West, the property destroyed was estimated at £10,000. Duty on Almanacs repealed.
- 1835 (September) Municipal Corporation Act. Reappearance of Halley's Comet in September, as predicted.
- 1836 Great Eclipse of the Sun on Sunday, the 15th of May. The Commutation Tithe Act passed.
- 1837 The latest Spring on record, and a mortal sickness prevailed. King William IV. died, June the 20th.
- 1838 (January 10th) Royal Exchange burnt. Abolishment of arrest for debt. June 28th, Queen Victoria crowned.
- 1839 Earthquake at Martinique; 700 persons killed, Jan. 12th. Awful gale, Jan. 7th; very cold spring, and stormy summer.
- 1840 (February 10th) Queen Victoria married her cousin Prince Albert of Saxe Coburg Gotha. Harvest good and well secured.
- 1841 (Aug. 12th) The Thames Tunnel completed. It was commenced in 1825, and cost £630,000.
- 1842 A most destructive fire at Hamburg, May 5th. Duke of Orleans, heir to the French Throne, killed, July 13th.
- 1843 (Sept. 24th) Alderman Sir M. Wood, a sincere friend to the ill-starred Queen Caroline, died.
- 1844 Severe drought from Lady-day to Midsummer; very hot June; very productive harvest, and well secured. Severe Winter all December, which continued.
- 1845 Severe frosts and deep snows till the 21st March.

CHRONOLOGY FROM 1845.

- 1845 First appearance of the Potato Blight, July 21st.
- 1846 Remarkably mild winter, early spring, and a very hot summer. Thermometer above 90° on several days. A very early harvest, and a great abundance of corn and fruits.
- 1847 The Quartern Loaf sold in London for 1s. 2d. in May. A dry year; hot summer, and a very abundant harvest.
- 1848 France again a Republic; Abdication of Louis Philippe. Louis Napoleon elected member of the National Assembly, June 12th; and President of the Republic, December 11th.
- 1849 The Cholera very prevalent as in the year 1832. In London alone the deaths from Cholera were 14,137.
- 1850 (July 2nd) Sir Robert Peel died by a fall from his horse, aged 62. Aug. 26th, Louis Philippe died aged 77.
- 1851 (May 1st) General Exhibition opened; closed Oct. 11th. Window Tax repealed, July 24th. A good harvest.
- 1852 (Sept. 14th) The Duke of Wellington died, aged 83. Nov. 17th, Louis Napoleon made Emperor by decree of the Senate.
- 1853 (Feb. 27th) Caffre War ended. October and November, War mutually declared between Turkey and Russia.
- 1854 (March 28th) England declared war against Russia. Battle of the Alma, Sept. 20th. Nov. 5th, battle of Inkerman.
- 1855 (March 2nd) Death of the Czar Nicholas. May 28th, death of Lord Raglan. Sept. 8th, Fall of SEBASTOPOL.
- 1856 (July) English Navy consisted of 27 sailing vessels, carrying 9594 guns, and 258 steam vessels, carrying 6582 guns, also 155 gunboats, and 111 vessels on harbour service.
- 1857 (June 17th) Massacre at Cawnpore. Nov. 13th, Commercial Panic. Bank Charter Act suspended. Dec. 23rd, Cap. of Canton.
- 1858 (Jan. 25th) Marriage of Princess Royal of England. March 15th, Sir C. Campbell captured Lucknow. July 26th, Jews admitted into Parliament. Nov. 1st, Queen proclaimed in India.
- 1859 (April 29th) Austrians cross the Ticino: May 20th, Battle of Montebello; June 4th, Bat. of Magenta; 24th, Bat. of Solferino.
- 1860 (Jan 23rd) Commercial Treaty between England & France, signed at Paris. Vic. Emmanuel accepts sovereignty of the Two Sicilies.
- 1861 (Jan 2nd) Death of the King of Prussia. Oct. 1st, Paper duty repealed. Dec. 14th, Death of the Prince Consort.
- 1862 (July 1st) Marriage of the Princess Alice of England. Peaceful Revolution in Greece; King Otho quits the kingdom.
- 1863 (March 10th) Marriage of the Prince of Wales. June 6th, Prince George of Denmark accepts the Throne of Greece.
- 1864 (Jan.) War between Germany and Denmark. April 10th, the Archduke Maximilian of Austria, accepts the Crown of Mexico.
- 1865 (April 14th) Assass. of Pres. Lincoln. July 6th, dissolution of Parl. Oct. 18th, Ld. Palmerston died, aged 81. Fearful spread of the Cattle Plague. Dec. 9th, death of the K. of the Belgians.
- 1866 (Jan. 11th) Total loss of the steamer "London," and 220 lives! War between Austria, Prussia, and Italy. Renewed outbreak of the Cattle Plague; and fearful spread of the Cholera. July 23rd, Hyde Park Riots. August, Atlantic Cable laid.

Horticultural, Botanical, and Herbal Guide,

FOR 1867.

JANUARY.—In open and dry weather, sow in mild exposure for a succession, a few early frame peas, common beans, short-topped radishes, lettuces, carrots, onions, spinach, and curled parsley, protecting them from the frost by mats or straw. Plant, prune, and train fruit trees and bushes. Form new flower gardens, and shelter from frost tender evergreens, tulips, &c. Plant snowdrops, crocuses, &c. *Herbs* to be gathered are groundsel, chickweed, archangel, and others which are in flower.

FEBRUARY.—Make ready all the ground intended for early crops; and when the weather is favourable, continue to sow every fortnight, peas, beans, onions, spinach, savoys, lettuces, celery, cauliflowers, carrots, parsnips, and radishes. Cut early kidney potatoes for seed, and put them in a stove or hot-bed in order to start them for planting out. Plant out evergreens and shrubs of all kinds, particularly roses, &c. Prune vine and fruit trees. *Herbs* to be gathered: foalfoot, lingwort, pilewort, speedwell, chickweed, shepherd's-purse, and broom.

MARCH.—The principal crops of vegetables should be put into the ground this month. Sow asparagus, celery, cauliflowers, broccoli, spinach, onions, carrots, peas, beans, savoys, parsnips, radishes, &c. Plant red cabbage and sea-kale: sow cucumbers and melons in hot-beds. Finish pruning, dress borders and strawberry beds. This is the best time for grafting fruit trees, perpetual and moss roses, &c. Pot dahlias and cuttings. Plant pinks, polyanthus, carnations, &c. *Herbs* to be gathered for medicinal purposes: coltsfoot, fumitory, pilewort, ladyflocks, lesser celandine, violet and comfrey roots, and all kinds of herbal bark.

APRIL.—Continue to sow and plant rhubarb, artichokes, asparagus, sea-kale, Dutch turnips, German greens, and small salading. Earth up peas, tie up lettuces, and in very dry weather water seedling beds. Finish the grafting of fruit trees, and train and clean walks and edgings. Sow annuals, biennials, and perennials. Plant evergreens and propagate by cutting, jasmine, lavender, sage, rosemary, rue, &c. Sow early Dutch turnips. *Herbs* to be gathered: ground ivy, dandelions, avens, buttercup, and others which are in flower, as well as all kinds of bark.

MAY.—Sow peas, cucumber, red beet for pickling, and a full crop for kidney beans. Transplant cabbages, winter greens, cauliflowers, and celery. Hoe and stake peas, water newly-planted crops, and propagate aromatic plants by slips or cuttings. Plant dahlias, if there be no appearance of frost, and protect from wind and rain choice tulips, &c. Propagate herbaceous plants by dividing the roots. *Herbs* to be cut: celandine, milkwort, moonwort, wood sorrel, and adder's tongue.

JUNE.—Top beans and peas to assist the filling of the pods. Set kidney beans, and transplant cabbage, savoys, broccoli, and sow turnips. Thin out onions, leeks, carrots, parsnips, and early turnips. Gather and preserve kitchen herbs. Shade and air melon plants, &c. Bulbous roots that have done flowering should now be taken up, and the off-sets separated. *Herbs* to be cut: avens, brooklime, centuary, comfrey, woodbine, valerian, eyebright, pimpernel, speedwell, and elecampane.

Horticultural, Botanical, and Herbal Guide,

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JULY.—In this month prepare all unoccupied plots of ground for autumn and winter crops. Sow turnips, radishes, &c. Plant out broccoli, cauliflowers, savoys, leeks, and winter cabbages, and earth up celery. Lift full grown winter onions, and prepare mushroom spawn. In fine weather, gather medicinal flowers and sweet herbs, when in bloom, dressing them first in the sun, & then in the shade for winter use. *Herbs* to be cut are all that are in flower, as lavender, tansy, vervain, bed-straw, agrimony, cinquefoil, mountain flax, foxglove, and meadow sweet.

AUGUST.—Sow early cabbages and parsley for the succeeding year; also spinach, broccoli, and cauliflowers to stand the winter; earth celery; hoe and thin turnips; transplant broccoli, savoys, and cauliflowers, and the principal crop of celery into the trenches for blanching. Make mushroom beds: propagate kitchen herbs by slips, and take up all onions, garlic, and shallots, that are withered in the stem. Sow the seed of bulbous flowers in pots. *Herbs* to be cut: all mints and sage, golden rod, pond weed, yellow gentian, tansy, mugwort, and loosestrife.

SEPTEMBER.—Plant savoys, broccoli, cauliflowers, leeks, celery, and perennial aromatic, and pot herbs. Hoe winter spinach and turnips, earth up celery and cardoons, prick out cabbage plants, gather ripe seeds, &c. Pull onions if the tops appear dying. Plant cuttings of gooseberries, currants; raspberries, and strawberries, taking out the old stools which have twice produced fruit. *Herbs* to be gathered; angelica, field gentian, valerian, feverfew, southernwood, briony, and wild berries,

OCTOBER.—Plant home radishes, early cabbages, and other greens neglected last month, in sheltered situations; also cauliflowers, mint, and tarragon, in frames for winter use. Earth up savoys and cabbages as high as the leaves. Take up carrots and parsnips, cut off their tops and bury them in dry sand. Crop the tops of parsley, to make fresh leaves for winter. Transplant fruit trees and shrubs, after the 10th day. Gather tree seeds: and sow for stocks. *Herbs* to be gathered: ivy, yarrow, wall rue, shepherd's purse, broom, rape, wall cress, and wild berries.

NOVEMBER.—Dig the ground where the crops are carried off, and which is not intended to plant again till spring: manure and prune fruit trees. Shallots are readily propagated by offsets. A stiffish soil, and open aspect should be preferred. These offsets, or "claws," should have their basis only pressed into the ground, without being covered. Tulip and hyacinth roots may be planted. *Herbs*: not many to be gathered this month for medicinal uses, except rose moss, rock fern, and polypody.

DECEMBER.—In this month forward the business of manuring, digging, or trenching vacant ground. Set all sorts of stones, kernels, &c. Complete tree planting, and forward all winter pruning. Continue planting various hardy roots, bulbs and shrubs. If frosty weather, be particular to protect all tender plants, trees, &c. Earth up celery. Sow small salad in warm borders, covered with mats. *Herbs* to be gathered: rose moss, rock fern, polypody, evergreens, and the mistletoe.

THE WEATHER AND ITS PROPHETS.

In a humorous paragraph, a London periodical, treating of "The Englishman and the Weather," says, "Why does Jones—why do I—and, if you come to that, why do you, dear Brown, though you won't admit it—why do we all attach so much importance to the Weather? Why, because it does of a truth really influence our Fate in Life, our chance in success, our health and tempers, in a wondrous way, on this right little, tight little island. Ask the Cornish fisherman, the underwriter at Lloyd's, the Station-master on a junction line, your London physician, tradesman, cabdriver, how far the weather concerns them, their cures and profits, and then remember the difference which a bright summer's morning and a dull November fog will make in your spirits. Yes, let us confess, that in our variable climate the height of the mercury is an important point."

SINGULAR ATMOSPHERIC PHENOMENON.

Shortly before sunrise on *Christmas* morning, 1865, the sky presented, for several minutes, one of the most beautiful, and at the same time extraordinary appearances we ever recollect to have witnessed. Not merely the east, but the whole horizon became tinged with a deep roseate hue, which appeared to diffuse itself through the entire atmosphere, in such a manner as to envelope every object in a garb of crimson. The phenomenon was seen by several persons in this locality (*Peterboro'*), and we also hear that the same atmospheric peculiarity was observed in towns many miles distant herefrom.

EARTHQUAKES, &c., IN ENGLAND.

February 8th, 1750, very severe shock over all London, creating much alarm. The winter was a very warm season. March 8th, another shock occurred, and did much damage in London; felt in Cambridgeshire, and at Northampton. April 2nd, again severely at Liverpool, Chester, and Manchester, and for 40 miles to the North and South. A very stormy and warm Spring at the time, and succeeded by most excessive heat in the Summer of this year. Several persons died from the heat about July 10th to the 16th. The thermometer in the shade was 96 degrees!

Eclipses of the Sun and Moon

IN 1867.

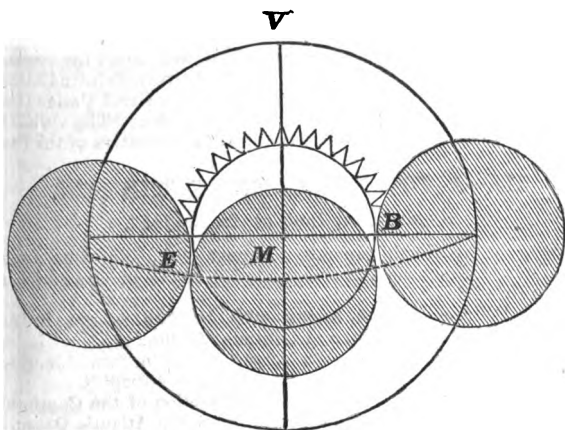
In the Year 1867 there will be *Two* Eclipses of the Sun, and *Two* of the Moon.

I.—A PARTIAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN,

March the 6th, Visible in England.

The first and most interesting in the Northern Hemisphere is an ANNULAR ECLIPSE of the Sun, and happens on "Ash Wednesday," the 6th of *March*, in the *Morning*. Throughout Great Britain it will be a large Partial Eclipse, varying from 8½ to 9 digits, and it will, therefore, be looked forward to as an interesting Phenomenon.

The following TYPE represents the Eclipse for *London*. Here we have B, the point where the dark body of the *Moon* makes the first visible impression on the *Sun's* periphery, and where the Eclipse begins, and E the same where it ends, the magnitude being 9 digits on the *Sun's* lower limb.



For the information of my numerous readers, the following Table is added, showing the Greenwich times at the beginning, middle, and ending for *six* important places in the United Kingdom.

This Eclipse begins on the Earth generally, March 6th, 7h. 16m. 56s. A.M. Mean Time at Greenwich, in Longitude $14^{\circ} 59'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $12^{\circ} 37'$ N.

Central Eclipse at Noon, March 6th, 10h. 12m. 54s. A.M., in Longitude $29^{\circ} 40'$ E. of Greenwich, and Latitude $48^{\circ} 21'$ N.

Ends on the Earth generally, March 6th, 0h. 16m. 24s. P.M., in Longitude $82^{\circ} 40'$ E. of Greenwich, and Latitude $46^{\circ} 45'$ N.

From the above data we find that this interesting Phenomenon will be visible to Europe, Northern and Central Africa, the Western part of Asia, and to the Coasts and Islands adjacent.

NOTE.—Those of my Readers who are not provided with Telescopes, having dark glasses for viewing the Sun, will find a piece of common window-glass, smoked over the flame of a candle or lamp, an excellent and safe medium through which to observe this Phenomenon.

At the *middle* of the Eclipse the Moon will be in the zenith, or directly over head, in Longitude $130^{\circ} 6'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $0^{\circ} 48'$ N., which falls nearly in the middle of the Great Pacific Ocean, and about five-sixths of a degree N. of the Equator. The visibility of this Phenomenon will be chiefly confined to the waters of the Pacific Ocean.

III.—A TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN,

August 29th, Invisible in England.

Begins on the Earth generally, August 29th, 10h. 53m. 0s. A.M. Mean Time at Greenwich, in Longitude $70^{\circ} 29'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $15^{\circ} 0'$ S.

Central Eclipse at Noon, August 29th, 1h. 37m. 6s. P.M., in Longitude $24^{\circ} 3'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $46^{\circ} 39m'$ S.

Ends on the Earth generally, August 29th, 3h. 32m. 54s. P.M., in Longitude $27^{\circ} 0'$ E. of Greenwich, and Latitude $46^{\circ} 26'$ S.

This Eclipse will be visible to a large section of the Continent of South America (including Cape Horn), the South Atlantic Ocean, and a portion of South Africa.

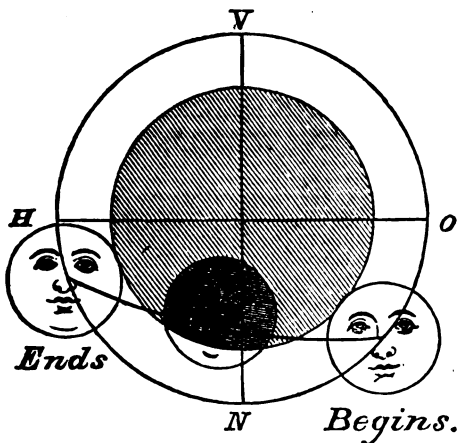

The annexed representation of the relative positions and path of the Moon, as she passes from right to left, through the dark shadow of the Earth, has been sketched for London, and will serve, without sensible error, for the whole of Great Britain.



Magnitude of the Eclipse (Moon's diameter=1) 0.698

The first contact with the shadow occurs at 34° from the Northernmost point of the limb towards the East. The last contact at 69° towards the West.

At the *beginning* of the Eclipse the Moon will be vertical over a terrestrial point in Longitude $14^\circ 4'$ E. of Greenwich, and in Latitude $4^\circ 31'$ S.

At the *middle* of the Eclipse the Moon will be in the zenith, in Longitude $7^\circ 26'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $4^\circ 16'$ S.

At the *end* of the Eclipse the Moon will be vertical, in Longitude $28^\circ 56'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $4^\circ 2'$ S. From this and other data it is evident that this Eclipse will be visible to the whole of Europe, Africa, the Atlantic Ocean, North and South America, and Coasts and Islands adjacent.

ASTRONOMICAL PREDICTIONS,

Or the Planets and when to View them, in 1867.

MERCURY.—This little erratic body may be detected by the naked eye, near the eastern horizon, a short time before sunrise about April 23rd, August 21st, and December 9th. Again he may be seen in the evenings, glowing in the twilight about an hour after sunset about March 9th, July 6th, and October 31st.

VENUS.—This planet, which appears sometimes remarkably splendid in the mornings or evenings, will this year be unfavourably situated for the exhibition of her beauteous rays; the best times for observing her will be in the mornings of January, February, and March, and in the evenings of December. In January, through a good telescope, she will appear a fine crescent, like the moon about two days before her change.

MARS.—This orb is an interesting object for observation for various reasons, and this year he comes to the solar opposition on the 10th of January, and as he will be in Cancer with great northern declination, his semi-arc above the earth will be great, hence he may be advantageously observed during December, 1866, and January and February, 1867. During the Spring and Summer, he will be a conspicuous object in the south and south-western skies. During the Autumn he may be observed descending in the West, after sunset. This planet is easily distinguishable from the other celestial bodies by his lurid appearance.

JUPITER.—This beautiful orb will be seen during the Spring ascending in the South-eastern skies every clear morning. He will be in opposition to the Sun on the 22nd of August, and may be advantageously observed on the meridian at midnight; he will also be a source of interest during the remainder of the year, as he will be visible every clear night, between the midheaven and Western horizon, a few hours after sunset, from August until the end of the year.

SATURN.—This ponderous orb will be in opposition to the Sun on the 11th of May, and in conjunction on the 19th of November; so that the most favourable times for telescopic observation will be during the months of April and May. The splendid rings are gradually opening to our view, and will continue a beautiful object for some time to come.

URANUS.—This distant planet will be in conjunction with the Sun on the 30th of June, and in opposition on the 2nd of January, 1868; so that the most favourable times for telescopic observation will be during the evenings of January, and the mornings and evenings of November and December.

NEPTUNE.—This very distant orb, which, with Uranus, is only a telescopic object, is in opposition to the Sun about the 7th of October, and will be best for observation about and after that time.

NOTE.—The following Table of the Planets' Southings will give the Reader a good idea of the Diurnal motion of those Celestial Bodies as viewed from our globe.

Corresponding Scales of the Magnitudes and Distances of the Earth, Sun, and Planets.

The following will convey an idea as to the relative sizes or diameters of the Sun and primary planets of the Solar System, and the proportionate average distances of those bodies from the Sun, which will probably be interesting.

The Earth being represented by a globe $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches in diameter, the proportionate diameters of the other planets would be

On perusing this attentively, the reader will notice the great disproportion between the distances of Mars and Jupiter. There appears to be a planet wanting. This void appears to be filled by a number of very small planets, termed Asteroids, all of which were undiscovered before the present century. Four of the principal of these Asteroids are named Ceres, Pallas, Juno, and Vesta. There are no less than seventy-nine others, which have been named by the discoverers after characters in Heathen Mythology.

THE MOON.

If the Moon is inhabited, those inhabitants who reside on the other side of the Moon, immediately opposite to us, have to journey one quarter of the circumference of the Moon, or near 1,500 miles, to see our globe, when we appear a most beautiful and gorgeous orb to them in their horizon. The Earth shines to the Moon with far greater brilliancy than the Moon does to the Earth, in consequence of the superiority of our magnitude. The bursting into view of this scene must be indeed truly magnificent.

Striking Illustration of the Effects of the Weather on the Public Health in England.

The first five weeks of the year 1795 were unusually cold; the corresponding weeks of the year following (1796) were unusually mild. Of the two winters the one was the coldest and the other the warmest of which any accurate account was extant. There was a difference between the one January and the other of quite 20 degrees. The mortality in the cold winter month was nearly double that of the mild one. In the first 5 weeks of 1795, there were 2,823 deaths; in the corresponding weeks of the year following (1796), the deaths numbered only 1,471.

What made the difference? Who were the people whom the cold weather killed and the mild weather spared? They were the very young and the very old. In January, '95, of persons above 60 years old there died in London 717; in January, '96, of persons above 60 years old there died only 153, or scarcely more than $\frac{1}{5}$ of the former number. In the cold January, '95, there died in London of consumption 825 persons; in the warm January, '96, the number of deaths from consumption was 342.

In the cold January, '95, of persons afflicted with asthma or shortness of breathing, there died 249; in the warm January, '96, there died of such persons 29. The number of deaths from palsies or apoplexies is also greatest in very cold weather, because the blood is driven from the surface, and, accumulating in internal parts, is liable to press with increased force upon the head. To healthy men this is a cause of increased vital energy; to some unhealthy men it is a cause of death. In January, '95, the deaths from apoplexy and palsy numbered 52; in the same month of the year following they were but 31. Severe cold kills some persons at once; in others it causes diseases which prove fatal in five or six weeks. Aged persons, infants, and persons who have any affection of the chest ought therefore in winter never to sleep in a room of which the temperature falls lower than within 8 degrees of freezing.

Very young children, and old people, who maintain their vital heat with difficulty, are liable to be destroyed by a succession of severe frosts.

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**THE WINTER QUARTER.**

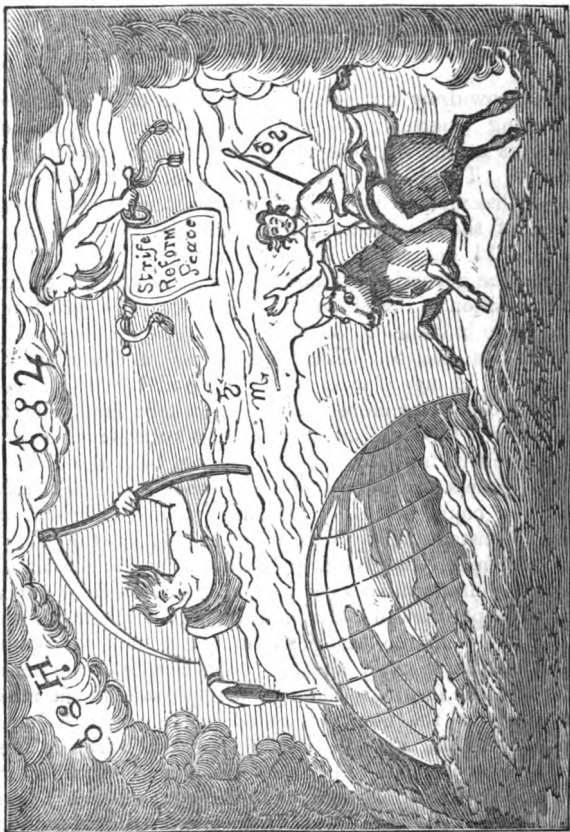
Now stationed ships are from their moorings drove

I shall now draw my general conclusion of the events of the coming Quarter from configurations of the heavenly messengers at the moment of the entrance of the Sun into Capricorn. This Ingress takes place at Oh. 49m. a.m., on the 22nd of December, 1866. At this time, there are 8 degrees 26 min. of the Equinoctial balance, Libra ascending in the East, and 11 degrees of Cancer lustrate the meridian line. The Sun, the general signification of men in power, is going to an opposition of the Moon and Uranus. The great must bow to these influences. They must also share their privileges with the less exalted. There are many of the mighty in London shall change places: the high shall bow the knee to those they despise in more than one northern land, and that right suddenly! Despotism approaches its latter days. Europe, shall not be free from alarms, and may yet hear the tocsin of civil war, unless prevented by speedy concessions. The affairs of the low countries, Holland, Brabant, and Belgium, also Algiers, Constantinople, Venice, and part of the German States are much discussed, probably of a warlike nature: also strange circumstances occur connected with their government. The position of Mars and Uranus will stir up some exciting scenes in the American States; I look for popular tumults, and fierce party warfare. The sextile of the benefic Jupiter and the fleeting Mercury, will prevent much misery for a time, to the countries ruled by the sign Aquarius, which are Russia, Prussia, Poland, Sweden, Tartary, Westphalia, Circassia, &c. The Sun, the general significator of nobles and of kings, is weak and afflicted; whence I judge that the great will still fall back in the grand struggle for dominion among the peoples, & which now divides the civilised world.

# The Grand Solar Eclipse

*Of March 6th, 1867.*

*"Coming Events cast their Shadows before."*

Thus sang the poet: and the Astrologer re-echoes the poet's assertions. A year FULL OF FATE, and pregnant with soul-stirring interest, will be the thirty-first year of the reign of our well-beloved sovereign and most gracious and popular monarch, QUEEN VICTORIA, the first of her name. Jupiter is ruler of the Eclipse, and rather powerful by position, but unfortunately in malignant square to the ponderous orb of Saturn. Hence divisions and hatred will happen in clerical and religious matters; priestcraft and mitred tyranny will receive a check. The Pope (if living) may put his house in order, and prepare for troubles about the middle of April. The star of England is strong, but there will be some serious troubles in Ireland. The regions to which the celestial detonations more particularly extend, are Spain, Portugal, France, Egypt, Normandy, Turkey, the Russian dominions, &c.; although these are not the only parts that will succumb to its extraordinary influence, since the effects will extend themselves even across the mighty waters of the vast Atlantic. At the time of this phenomenon we observe a conjunction of Mars and Uranus in Cancer, the ruling sign of Scotland, Holland, Belgium, Georgia, all Africa, Constantinople, Algiers, Tunis, Amsterdam, Cadiz, Venice, Genoa, New York, Lubeck, Milan, and Manchester. Hence may arise rumours of strife and causes for warfare, sudden deaths, destructive fires, storms, and earthquakes; engenderings of hatred between nations and their rulers; shipwrecks, and accidents by water. Travelling is unusually unsafe; and I fear some sad mishaps to travellers, or excursionists of horrific import. The aspects presage direful storms, and distressing shipwrecks. On land, too, arises some cause for terror. Agriculture may suffer, and even the brute creation. The democracy will flourish, and the oppressors of Liberty will in vain strive to re-unite the links of that iron chain, which the liberal members of our late Parliament have torn asunder! Eventful times are coming!

## THE SPRING QUARTER.

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Another year has passed away, and we begin again,  
 Our course thro' life's uncertain sphere, of pleasure and of pain;  
 Once more we launch our fragile bark on Life's tempestuous sea,  
 Through dangers that we know not of, from which we cannot flee.  
 We tread a path, where flowers and thorns, are scattered in our way,  
 But flowers whose bloom is bright and fair, soon wither and decay:  
 Awhile, and we may meet with naught but flowers of brightest hue,  
 No thorns arrest us on our path, no danger meet our view.

In our Northern Hemisphere this Ingress may be properly called the birth of the year, and which will take place on March the 21st, at 1h. 46m., a.m.; the Sun's centre being then in the plane of the Equator, and at the same time vertical over the Indian Ocean, in Longitude 63 deg. 30 min. East. Another eventful quarter approaches, which will stand conspicuous in the page of history. Jupiter is in the house of wealth, and Saturn, who is in square to him, is retrograde in the 11th house of the figure. Mercantile men will feel the effect, the *Gazette* will teem with "whereas," &c. The public securities will falter, and probably a panic reign triumphant among the gamblers of the Stock Exchange. The 7th house represents the nation's enemies. In it we perceive the two evil planets, Mars and Uranus. Some demonstrations of WAR will be talked of: but the enemies of England are weak, the star of Britain strong. News of an exciting character arrives from Holland, Belgium, and Scotland. The square of Saturn and Jupiter seem to denote many deaths and much scandal, or disgrace, to persons high in the Church or Law. The affairs of such persons seem to be much canvassed, and I judge that important changes will be made in the nature and in the extent of Church Property! Changes are denoted in the cabinet of a powerful nation; a great clamour will be raised in consequence. But London's significator seems a star of some import in these all-important times, perhaps, more so than any other nation, seeing that the signs greatly affect London's constellation. March closes with a conjunction of Jupiter and Venus, which falls nearly on the degree of the zodiac, the Moon occupied in the Horoscope of the Emperor Napoleon, a good omen for that illustrious person; but Saturn in the centre of his 10th house will cause him much anxiety in State matters.



## THE SUMMER QUARTER.

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The clouds pass away, and are leaving the sky,  
 A region of azure unclouded and bright;  
 And the star of the twilight, with tremulous eye,  
 Comes forth like an angel that heralds the night.  
 Not a zephyr is curling the breast of the stream;  
 Not a zephyr is stirring the leaves on the tree;  
 And low hollow sounds, like the hum of a dream,  
 Steal over the vale from the voluble sea.

The Sun's Annual Ingress into the lucid sign Cancer, takes place on the 21st of June, at 10h. 19m., p.m. The Horoscope of the hour presents us with a remarkable position of the Heavens: the 7th degree of Aquarius arises on the house of life, and significator of the community at large, while the 6th degree of Sagittary is meridional. Mars opposes the Moon, and afflicts the Sun with an evil quadrature ray: this tells of enmity and opposition, war and turmoil. A wary and watchful policy will be necessary with some foreign and neighbouring nations. Venus, ruler of the 8th house, or house of death, vibrates on the cusp of the dark angle of the 4th, in square to Jove, which I take to presage the death of females of rank, and of a princess, or one of Royal Blood. France is likely to be in an unsettled state; the ministry there are unhinged, some are for war, others for peace, and of course "divided against themselves cannot stand." Ireland appears to be somewhat agitated; the people are still harassed by their foes, and deserted by some of their friends. When will that unhappy country be allowed to enjoy peace and prosperity; and its fine spirited peasantry become, what it would shortly become, under right culture? The position of Mars and Mercury indicate a stir in the naval affairs, a demonstration of the FLEETS OF ENGLAND, if not their employment in supporting *right* wherever *wrong* uprears a hostile standard. Jupiter in the sign Pegasus, denotes more peace and prosperity to the countries governed by that sign, which are Portugal, Calabria, Normandy, Gallacia in Spain, Egypt, &c. The hostile rays of Mars and the stealthy Uranus will cause martial rumours and exploits both European and Transatlantic. The planetary positions denote a sickly time, and sudden deaths prevalent.

## THE AUTUMN QUARTER.

*Another Spring!* his heart exulting cries;  
*Another YEAR!* with promised blessings rise!  
 ETERNAL POWER! from whom those blessings flow,  
 Teach me still more to wonder, more to know;  
*Seed-time* and *Harvest* let me see again;  
 Wander the *leaf-strewn* wood, the *frozen* plain;  
 And let me ever, 'midst thy bounties, raise  
 A humble note of thankfulness and praise!

The Sun once more pours forth his mild effulgence from the Celestial Balance, which constellation he approaches and enters on the 23rd day of September, 1867, at Oh. 42m. P.M. As he enters among the first Stars of this sign, 25 degrees of Sagittary are *Eastern*, 29 degrees of Libra are *Southern*, 25 degrees of Gemini are *Western*, and 29 degrees of Aries are *Northern*, completing the celestial quadrants. In the celestial Horoscope for the moment of the solar entrance, the student in sidereal Philosophy will perceive indications demanding more than ordinary attention. Jupiter rules the ascendant, and signifies the community at large, or that portion thereof denominated "the people." Most unfortunate it is that this planet is retrogradé, and squared by the evil Saturn, who rules the second house of Heaven, posited on the cusp of the eleventh, and Sol bears dominion in the mansion of death! The head of the Catholic Church (if living) is tormented by mental or bodily sufferings. I judge that he is drawing near the goal which Popes as well as minor mortals must one day attain; and in spite of the Anathemas which Popes have hurled against the doctrine of the Stars, he is about to undergo the effects of Saturn in opposition to his Sun's place at birth; though, as I have only the day, and not the hour of his birth, I do not feel certain as to his *terminus vitæ*. The approaching conjunction of Saturn and Mars in the sign Scorpio will be powerfully felt for some months to come, in India, Barbary, Morocco, Valentia, Catalonia, Messina, and Ireland. Thither let none repair if they would avoid tumults, fires, and crimes of no ordinary character, as well as evils of a physical nature, such as sickness, storms, and earthquakes.
