To set a Clock or Watch by this Table.—Example, Jan. 1st. It will be found by looking into the Table, that a Clock to be right must be 3 minutes 37 seconds faster than a sun-dial; therefore set it so much faster accordingly, and so of the rest. Correct the Watch when the Dial marks just an hour, as 9, 10, 11, 2, 3, or 5 o'clock. Noon is not the best time for this purpose, nor near sun-rise or sun-set.

N.B.—Venus is never more than 48 degrees, and Mercury is never more than 28 degrees distant from the Sun.

CLOUDS;

Their Classification and Predictory Qualifications.

1st. CIRRUS.—These are of the least density and at the greatest elevation. They are generally seen first in pencilled lines, when the barometer is high. This is the most beautiful cloud, and is prognosticatory of approaching *winds*.

2nd. CUMULUS.—The common large white clouds, like wool-packs. This is the "day cloud" of scripture, as it generally forms a few hours after sun-rise, and diminishes at sun-set. Multangular cumuli (many cornered) portend *showers*.

3rd. STRATUS.—This is the *lowest* of all clouds, and denominated "the night cloud :" a mist in the evening, and a frost in the morning. When it dispels with the morning breezes it denotes fine serene weather.

4th. CIRROCUMULUS.—Sometimes called *Sonder cloud*, a mass of small roundish clouds, sometimes like a flock of sheep, in close horizontal arrangement. When it abounds in winter, gives occasional showers with gusts of wind.

5th. CIRROSTRATUS.—Often termed *Wane cloud*. In the zenith it is a mere bed of haze; and on the horizon it resembles shoals of fish, and sometimes it appears mottled. It generally precedes *wind* and *rain*; and is seen at the intervals of storms. Solar and lunar halos, parhelia, &c., are formed in this cloud.

6th. CUMULOSTRATUS.—Irregular heaped, or multangular clouds, appearing like rocks and towers, or mountains of snow, tinged at the edges with a dark cast; often termed the "thunder cloud." When this cloud prevails expect *sudden and heavy showers*.

7th. NIMBUS.—This is the rain cloud. It frequently obscures the face of our hemisphere, and in this case seldom produces any great quantity of continued rain. It frequently passes into the *thunder* cloud, when electricity abounds, we then experience drenching rains.

MISTS.—If mists vanish rapidly, without rising to the hills, they also indicate fine weather; but when they ascend, and are suspended over the hill tops, rain will generally follow within two days.

RAINBOWS.—A rainbow seen in the morning gives small rain; if seen at noon, settled and heavy rain; if seen at night, fair weather.

SKY.—In the winter months, a red sky at sun-rise indicates steady rain before the sun rises on the following morning. The same appearances in the summer months indicate occasional showers; and squalls of wind generally accompany in both cases.

HORTICULTURE.

QUANTITIES OF CERTAIN SEEDS NECESSARY.

It will be useful to all holders of allotments to be instructed as to the smallest quantity requisite, as good seeds are expensive; and to sow too many is not only a waste, but even injurious. Be economical with your seed as to quantity, but not spare as to quality; take care to insure this at whatever cost.

STRIKING CUTTINGS.

The following are half-a-dozen general rules relative to the selection and preparation of slips or cuttings: 1st. Let all slips be cut off as near a joint as possible without injuring it. 2nd. For autumn or winter make choice of well-ripened, firm wood. 3rd. In spring or summer half-ripened young shoots are best, as they strike quicker than old wood. 4th. All succulents, such as cactuses, geraniums, &c., should remain a few days to dry, until their wounds are closed up, before they are potted. 5th. Never allow cuttings to remain in water; if they cannot be planted immediately, lay the ends in moist sand. 6th. In winter or summer, always let a few of the leaves remain on evergreens.

Horticultural, Botanical, and Herbal Guide, For 1868.

JANUARY.—In open and dry weather, sow in mild exposure for a succession, a few early frame peas, common beans, short-topped radishes, lettuces, carrots, onions, spinach, and curled parsley, protecting them from the frost by mats or straw. Plant, prune, and train fruit trees and bushes. Form new flower gardens, and shelter from frost tender evergreens, tulips, &c. Plant snowdrops, crocuses, &c. *Herbs* to be gathered are groundsel, chickweed, archangel, and others which are in flower.

FEBRUARY.—Make ready all the ground intended for early crops; and when the weather is favourable, continue to sow every fortnight, peas, beans, onions, spinachs, savoys, lettuces, celery, cauliflowers, carrots, parsnips, and radishes. Cut early kidney potatoes for seed, and put them in a stove or hot-bed in order to start them for planting out. Plant out evergreens and shrubs of all kinds, particularly roses, &c. Prune vine and fruit trees. *Herbs* to be gathered: foalfoot, lingwort, pilewort, speedwell, chickweed, shepherd's-purse, and broom.

MARCH.—The principal crops of vegetables should be put into the ground this month. Sow asparagus, celery, cauliflowers, broccoli, spinach, onions, carrots, peas, beans, savoys, parsnips, radishes, &c. Plant red cabbage and sea-kale: sow cucumbers and melons in hot beds. Finish pruning, dress borders and strawberry beds. This is the best time for grafting fruit trees, perpetual and moss roses, &c. Pot dahlias and cuttings. Plant pinks, polyanthus, carnations, &c. *Herbs* to be gathered for medicinal purposes: coltsfoot, fumitory, pilewort, ladyfrocks, lesser celandine, violet and comfrey roots, and all kinds of herbal bark.

APRIL.—Continue to sow and plant rhubarb, artichokes, asparagus, sea-kale, Dutch turnips, German greens, and small salading. Earth up peas, tie up lettuces, and in very dry weather water seedling beds. Finish the grafting of fruit trees, and train and clean walks and edgings. Sow annuals, biennials, and perennials. Plant evergreens and propagate by cutting, jasmine, lavender, sage, rosemary, rue, &c. Sow early Dutch turnips. *Herbs* to be gathered: ground ivy, dandelions, avens, buttercup, and others which are in flower, as well as all kinds of bark.

MAY.—Sow peas, cucumber, red beet for pickling, and a full crop for kidney beans. Transplant cabbages, winter greens, cauliflowers, and celery. Hoe and stake peas, water newly-planted crops, and propagate aromatic plants by slips or cuttings. Plant dahlias, if there be no appearance of frost, and protect from wind and rain choice tulips, &c. Propagate herbaceous plants by dividing the roots. *Herbs* to be cut: celandine, milkwort, moonwort, wood sorrel, and adder's tongue.

JUNE.—Top beans and peas to assist the filling of the pods. Set kidney beans, and transplant cabbage, savoys, broccoli, and sow turnips. Thin out onions, leeks, carrots, parsnips, and early turnips. Gather and preserve kitchen herbs. Shade and air melon plants, &c. Bulbous roots that have done flowering should now be taken up, and the off-sets separated. *Herbs* to be cut: avens, brooklime, centuary, comfrey, woodbine, valerian, eyebright, pimpernel, speedwell, and elecampane.

Horticultural, Botanical, and Herbal Guide, For 1868.

JULY.—In this month prepare all unoccupied plots of ground for autumn and winter crops. Sow turnips, radishes, &c. Plant out broccoli, cauliflower, savoys, leeks, and winter cabbages, and earth up celery. Lift full grown winter onions, and prepare mushroom spawn. In fine weather, gather medicinal flowers and sweet herbs, when in bloom, dressing them first in the sun, & then in the shade for winter use. *Herbs* to be cut are all that are in flower, as lavender, tansey, vervain, bedstraw, agrimony, cinquefoil, mountain flax, foxglove, and meadow sweet.

AUGUST.—Sow early cabbages and parsley for the succeeding year; also spinach, broccoli, and cauliflower to stand the winter; earth celery; hoe and thin turnips; transplant broccoli, savoys, and cauliflower, and the principal crop of celery into the trenches for blanching. Make mushroom beds: propagate kitchen herbs by slips, and take up all onions, garlic and shallots that are withered in the stem. Sow the seed of bulbous flowers in pots. *Herbs* to be cut: all mints and sage, golden rod, pond weed, yellow gentian, tansy, mugwort, and loosestrife.

SEPTEMBER.—Plant savoys, broccoli, cauliflower, leeks, celery, and perennial aromatic, and pot herbs. Hoe winter spinach and turnips, earth up celery and cardoons, prick out cabbage plants, gather ripe seed, &c. Pull onions if the tops appear dying. Plant cuttings of gooseberries, currants, raspberries, and strawberries, taking out the old stools which have twice produced fruit. *Herbs* to be gathered: angelica, field gentian, valerian, feverfew, southernwood, briony, and wild berries.

OCTOBER.—Plant home radishes, early cabbages, and other greens neglected last month, in sheltered situations; also cauliflower, mint, and tarragon, in frames for winter use. Earth up savoys and cabbages as high as the leaves. Take up carrots and parsnips, cut off their tops and bury them in dry sand. Crop the tops of parsley, to make fresh leaves for winter. Transplant fruit trees and shrubs, after the 10th day. Gather tree seeds: and sow for stocks. *Herbs* to be gathered: ivy, yarrow, wall rue, shepherd's purse, broom, rape, wall cress, and wild berries.

NOVEMBER.—Dig the ground where the crops are carried off, and which is not intended to plant again till spring: manure and prune fruit trees. Shallots are readily propagated by offsets. A stiffish soil, and open aspect should be preferred. These offsets, or "claws," should have their basis only pressed into the ground, without being covered. Tulip and hyacinth roots may be planted. *Herbs*: not many to be gathered this month for medicinal uses, except rose moss, rock fern, and polypody.

DECEMBER.—In this month forward the business of manuring, digging, or trenching vacant ground. Set all sorts of stones, kernels, &c. Complete tree planting, and forward all winter pruning. Continue planting various hardy roots, bulbs and shrubs. If frosty weather, be particular to protect all tender plants, trees, &c. Earth up celery. Sow small salad in warm borders, covered with mats. *Herbs* to be gathered: rose moss, rock fern, polypody, evergreens, and the mistletoe.

CELESTIAL PHENOMENA.

♂. MERCURY, from his proximity to the Sun, is seldom visible, except at or about the times of his *greatest elongations*; so that we may be able to see him about an hour before sun-rise, near the *eastern* horizon, about the 4th of *April*, 3rd of *August*, and the 21st of *November*. Again he may be seen a little after sun-set, near the *western* horizon, about the 20th of *February*, 16th of *June*, and the 13th of *October*.

♀. VENUS will be seen in the *western* sky during the *evenings* until the 16th of *July*; after which she will be visible in the *eastern* sky during *mornings*. The times of her greatest brilliancy, will be about the 9th of *June*, and the 21st of *August*.

♂. MARS does not come to a conjunction with the Earth this year, therefore he will not be very favourably situated for telescopic observation. The most favourable times to observe him will be during the *mornings* of *November* and *December*.

♀. JUPITER will appear brilliant in the *evenings* of *January* and continue visible after sun-set until the beginning of *March*. He will be bright in the *mornings* of *July* and *August*, and throughout the nights of *September* and *October*, when his belts, &c., may be seen to advantage by those who are in possession of good telescopes. *Jupiter* will gild the *evenings* with his bright beams throughout the months of *November* and *December*.

♃. SATURN will be in opposition to the Sun on the 23rd of *May*; hence, during this, the two preceding and two following months, he may be frequently observed with a telescope to advantage, though his great southern declination renders both his nocturnal sweep and altitude much less than could be wished.

♄. URANUS. This remote orb, is only a telescopic object, is in opposition to the Sun on the 1st of *January*, and will be best for observation about and after that time.

THE ECLIPSES

IN 1868.

In the year 1868 there will be Two Eclipses of the *Sun*, and a *Transit* of *Mercury* over the *Sun's* disc.

OBSERVE.—No *Visible* Eclipse in *England* this year.

I.—AN ANNULAR ECLIPSE OF THE SUN,

February 23rd, Invisible in England.

Begins on the Earth generally, February 23rd, 11h. 17m. 0s., a.m., Mean Time at Greenwich, in Longitude $78^{\circ} 8'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $12^{\circ} 54'$ S.

Central Eclipse at Noon, February 23rd, 2h. 23m. 30s., p.m., in Longitude $32^{\circ} 29'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $17^{\circ} 59'$ N.

Ends on the earth generally, February 23rd, 5h. 25m. 30s., p.m., in Longitude $8^{\circ} 48'$ E. of Greenwich, and Latitude $17^{\circ} 59'$ N.

From the above data we find that this Phenomenon will be visible to the whole of South America, the Isthmus of Panama, the Atlantic Ocean, the Western Coast of Africa, and the Islands adjacent.

The effects of this Eclipse will be severely felt in South America, and will engender quarrels, dissensions, and discord; much fighting, and the most savage deeds will be perpetrated. This phenomenon will be followed by storms, earthquakes, and diseases of a peculiar nature.

The Sun is Eclipsed in the 4th degree of the sign Pegasus, and will therefore affect *evil* most persons who were born on the 23rd February, or the 27th of August in any year.

II.—A TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN,

August 18th, Invisible in England.

Begins on the Earth generally, August 18th, 2h. 34m. 42s., a.m., Mean Time at Greenwich, in Longitude $49^{\circ} 25'$ E. of Greenwich, and Latitude $12^{\circ} 6'$ N.

Central Eclipse at Noon, August 18th, 5h. 18m. 0s. a.m., in Longitude $102^{\circ} 38'$ E. of Greenwich, and Latitude $10^{\circ} 27'$ N.

Ends on the Earth generally, August 18th, 7h. 49m. 12s. a.m., in Longitude $149^{\circ} 59'$ E. of Greenwich, and Latitude $15^{\circ} 23'$ S.

The Eclipse will be visible to the East coast of Africa, India, China, Australia, and the Coasts and Islands adjacent.

This Eclipse bodes little good to our Eastern possessions ; seditions, famine, and sickness, as well as typhoons, and earthquakes, will be witnessed in the East generally.

The countries ruled more directly by the sign in which the Eclipse falls are Italy, Rome, and France. Hence this Eclipse points to the Pope and the Emperor of the French, if living, as liable to feel its effects.

The Eclipse falls in the 25th degree of *Leo*, and will afflict all persons (more especially French and Italians), born on or near the day of the Eclipse, or when the Sun was opposite thereto, on the 14th of February.

A TRANSIT OF MERCURY OVER THE SUN'S DISC,

November 5th, 1868, partly visible in England.

This phenomenon happens on *Thursday*, the 5th of November ; but it will only be partly visible in this country, as it commences some time before sun-rise. The *ingress* takes place below the horizon at 5h. 25m. in the morning ; the Sun rises at 7h. 3m. ; the least distance of the centres of the Sun and Mercury (12' 15'') occurs at 7h. 14m. ; and the final *egress* of the planet, or *end* of the Transit, occurs at 9h. 3m. a.m.

In the present instance should the morning prove clear, Mercury will be seen projected upon the Sun's face, or rather on his southern or lower limb, in the form of a circular well-defined black spot, from about 7 o'clock until 9 in the morning.

As regards our terrestrial globe, the bodies, during the Transit, will be vertically over the Indian Ocean, so that this interesting phenomenon will be visible throughout Europe, Asia, Africa, Australia, Sumatra, Borneo, New Guinea, and in the North Pacific, Indian, and Southern Oceans.

These transits are peculiar to the inferior planets *Mercury* and *Venus*, whose orbits fall within that of the Earth, and the opacity of the planets is thus displayed in a remarkable manner.

The next transits of *Mercury* will occur in the years 1878 and 1881 ; and of *Venus*, in the years 1874 and 1882.

THE RECENT EARTHQUAKE.

"The terrible Earthquake which occurred at Mytilene, in the Levant, at 6 p.m. of the 6th of March, and the successive shocks which followed on the 7th, 8th, 9th, 15th and 16th, which so alarmed the inhabitants of Smyrna, Magnesia, Adramiti, the Dardanelles, Gallipoli, Constantinople, and other places, were in exact Fulfilment of Astrological deductions, based, (as we suppose, upon the magnetic or electric conditions arising,) from the recent Solar Eclipse, and its relation to certain angular formations of the greater planets of our Solar system. As viewed from the British Isles the Eclipse was but a partial one, but as seen from a more southerly geographical position, it was *annular*, and therefore of greater obscuration. Commencing in the Atlantic Ocean (a little to the west of Madeira), the central line of the Eclipse pursued its course eastward on a parallel of about 32 degrees north latitude to Algiers and other parts of Northern Africa; thence across the Mediterranean Sea in a north-easterly direction, and over Southern Europe, into Asia. It took place, as already stated, on the 6th of March, and it was previously recorded by a Gentleman of the Astrological profession that the phenomenon would be a forerunner of dire effects in some of those countries over which the Central Eclipse ran its course. These effects (*vide* ORION'S ALMANAC, pp. 11 and 69) were to include high winds, storms, *earthquakes*, destruction of buildings, depopulation, &c, some or all of which were to follow on the "heels" of the Eclipse. Now it turned out on the very 6th of March, within a few hours of the *Eclipse*, and during a heavy snow storm in England and France, that the town of Mytilene, which lay in the direct path of the *Eclipse*, (and

which it is said had not been subject to earthquakes within the memory of its inhabitants,) was suddenly shaken to its centre by a double shock, which flung down whole blocks of solid stone houses. The castle, the cathedral, the governor's house, the prison, the mosque, and all the Consular residences were reduced to heaps of ruins. Half the town was destroyed, some 900 people were buried, and in the lower part of the town the Earth opened and swallowed a broad belt of buildings, while the sea rushed into the slope inland. This coincidence of actuality and Prediction is only one of many that we have, from time to time, observed.

Having touched upon matters whose bearings are such as many journalists affect to contemn, but whose mundane importance we hold to be greater than that of a vast number of topics daily put before the public, there needs no apology for slightly extending our gossip in the same direction. Passing over the events of the first two months in the year as being more or less in agreement with Astronomic or Astrologic foreshadowings, we note just a few in addition to those already touched upon as applying to the month of March. We are told by ORION, that "Jupiter being a ruler of the Eclipse, and going to a square of Saturn, denotes religious contests respecting Church-rates"—[Abolition of Church-rates by a majority of 76] "Some peculiar legal cases arising from Church matters."—[Lord Shaftesbury's Bill for the settlement of the Vestment question.] "The month will be productive of some great change in legislative proceedings, a new era comes forth but not without a struggle."—[Unusual proceedings of Government in reference to the Reform Bill; a shifting of the political kaleidoscope no less than five times, the whole procedure attended by a Parliamentary struggle.] "The signifiers of the Government are now strongly posited, the public voice is raised against them."—[A great clamour against the Government, both from without and within, but an unusual amount of forbearance on the part of the Opposition, and a generally expressed desire to keep the Ministry in Office.] "The star of England is strong, but there will be some serious troubles in Ireland"—[The Fenian outbreaks, and military suppression.]

Where savage discord howls in threat'ning form,
And wild ambition leads the madd'ning throng!

Explanation of the Scenes in the Hieroglyphic For 1867.

On the left-hand is the Angel of Wrath emptying the phial of destruction on the Earth under the influence of Mars and Uranus in the sign Cancer. The fearful Colliery explosions, and the immense sacrifice of human beings during the Winter—The Regent's Park Tragedy—The terrific Storms and disastrous Shipwrecks in the Atlantic Ocean, and elsewhere—The destructive Earthquakes—And the fearful ravages of disease and death both among Mankind and Cattle, in many parts abroad, respond to this Pictorial Illustration of the future.

To the right is an Ethereal Messenger bearing a Scroll, on which is written "Strife," "Reform," "Peace," all of which we have witnessed. Below this TAURUS, the Bull (typical of Ireland,)—bestriden by a figure slightly armed and nearly naked, but still pressing "on—to the rescue—on,"—represents the onward, strenuous, and determined march of Fenianism both in America and Ireland, which the current year has witnessed.

This frigid Quarter of the year, so trying to the invalid, the aged, and the destitute, begins on *Sunday* the 22nd of December, 1867, at 6h. 46m. A.M., when 8 degrees of Capricorn will be on the ascendant, and 14 degrees of Scorpio on the mid-heaven. At this Ingress both the Sun and Mars are near the cusp of the ascendant in direct opposition to Uranus, who is located in the house of the nation's foes. These are certainly ominous positions, and on that account we may expect to hear of wars and bickerings amongst states and neighbouring nations: nevertheless, it is to be hoped that the prudence of our ministers will prevent our being drawn into the vortex of contention and strife, at the present critical state of affairs in Europe, and some other parts of the world. In spite of her enemies in Europe and America, *France* will again at some future time astonish the world by her prowess in arms, and the celerity of her movements. All is not right in Spain, Italy, and other places which I could name, that are sighing for a more liberal form of government. Mars the planet of strife is moving forward in the sign Capricorn, where he encounters the baneful rays of Uranus, an influence so repugnant to his nature, pointing out the prevalence of the worst passions of man especially in those countries ruled by that sign, which are Greece, India, and Mexico. The latter country, alas ! can hope for no amelioration of existing evils under present influences. Those countries suffer by storms, and probably shocks of earthquake, as well as other physical evils. The Sun with Mars indicates numerous and extensive fires both at home and abroad; and also numerous deaths by fire, and explosions. Strife visits the city of Oxford, and religious sentiments are warmly discussed. Evil reigns in Turkey.

THE SPRING QUARTER.

Soon shall the wintry storms be o'er,
And all the floods and rains be past
The vines shall blush with grapes once more,
And flowers upon the earth be cast,
And for the sad and howling blast,
Our land shall hear the turtle's voice,
And the glad time when birds rejoice.

The Vernal Equinox, which Astrologers esteem as the basis for their Grand Horoscope, whereby the Fate of Nations is read in the Starry Heavens, commences on the 20th of March, 1868, at 7h. 43m. A.M., at which time 19 degrees of the sign Taurus are oriental, and 22 degrees of Capricorn, culminate; Venus has just risen, whilst the Sun, Mars, and Jupiter, are ascending in the south eastern quadrant. The conjunction of Mars and Mercury in the sign Pegasus, and squared by the ponderous orb of Saturn from the sign of the Archer, point with unerring precision to nations and kingdoms ruled by those signs, which are parts of France, Portugal, Spain, Egypt, Arabia, Italy, Hungary, and the southern parts of Asia Minor. Great physical evils fall upon those lands and WAR imprints his bloody footsteps on their coasts. The conjunction of Mars and Mercury in the 11th house will create much mischief to the people, through spies or informers. This quarter will be remarkable for much misfortune to the shipping interests, caused by the electrical emanations of both Saturn and Mars. Ireland will enjoy for a time the benefic influence of Venus in her ruling sign, the condition of the people will be improved. The Sun in trine to Saturn is favourable for the agricultural community, but I fear more powerful influences will deteriorate the grass and seed crops. The lucid and fleeting sign Cancer on the cusp of the 3rd house points to considerable extension and improvement in the postal ramifications, as also corresponding increase in the revenue of that department. The *Emperor of France* has conflicting influences operating in his *Nativity*; the benefic tendency of Jupiter greatly counteracts Saturn's influence and strengthens the Emperor's hands. *The year 1873 will be a momentous period*, if he should be spared until then. Europe will feel amazed!

THE SUMMER QUARTER.

Here, midst the boldest triumphs of her worth,
NATURE herself invites the REAPERS forth;
Dares the keen sickle from its twelvemonth's rest,
And gives that ardour which in every breast,
From infancy to age alike appears,
When the first sheaf its plumpy top uprears;
No rake take here what Heaven to all bestows,
Children of want, for you the bounty flows.

The refulgency of the Summer may be said to have its Astronomical commencement on the 21st of June, at 4h. 9m. in the A.M. The Sun then enters the constellation Cancer, and the celestial limits of his diurnal arc are extended to their greatest length. The theme of Heaven has the 4th degree of the sign Cancer on the ascendant; the 30th degree of Aquarius on the south meridian; and the 4th degree of Capricorn on the angle of the west. The Moon claims dominion over the ascendant; she is rising in the east, in conjunction with Uranus, and in square to Jupiter. I decipher these heavenly omens to denote a time of singular importance in evil to those countries and regions under the sign Cancer, which are Holland, Brabant, and Belgium, also Algiers, Constantinople, Venice, and part of the German States. The fiery star of Mars is rushing through the ascendant of Ireland, but when on the verge of leaving that sign he is opposed to the malignant beams of Saturn. These are direful omens for the sons of Erin. The dungeons teem with wretched victims, and the wailing of the oppressed is long and loud. Tyranny rides triumphant and blood may flow beneath his iron hoofs. In America are witnessed scenes of disorder and confusion, the elements of secession still burn, and the time will come when its advocates will be in the ascendant. The next quadrature of Uranus and Saturn will stir up the strife. Religion appears to be the subject of much excitement, much disputation thereon, and the secession of some eminent persons from the Church as established, will create grave anxiety in orthodox minds. Saturn rules the mid-heaven of the Figure, and also the house of death, and afflicting the Solar orb by his malignant rays. The great must bow to these influences, and mourning is heard through the land of Britain.

THE AUTUMN QUARTER.

Behold, the shifting seasons take their turns !
First blooms the Spring, then sultry Summer burns,
Autumn succeeds with loaded plenty crown'd,
And torpid Winter lags his lazy round :
The silver Moon soon riseth from her night,
And fills her horns afresh with borrow'd light :
But when we launch, and reach the unknown shore,
Our Sun is set, and will return no more !

The Sun this year crosses the Equatorial Line, and enters **Libra** on the 22nd of September, at 6h. 32m. p.m. The Figure of the expanse for this period of time, exhibits the 9th degree of Aries rising ; and the 9th degree of Capricorn culminating. Mars is the ruling planet of the Ascendant in conjunction with Uranus near the cusp of the 5th house.

The most important feature for comment is the happy position of Jupiter ascending in the sign of the Ram. This brings many advantages to this country ; honours, improving trade, &c, and a desire with those who have power "to do justice and love mercy." But the lowering nature of the stellar positions in the *Royal Horoscope*, give rise to some gloomy forebodings—the nature of the evil time must unfold. The planet Venus is ruler of the 7th house, in trine to Jupiter and sextile to Mercury ; whence I judge that this will be a noted time for wedlock and nuptial ceremonials. One or more of these, too, bedecked with the pagentry of state, or splendour of wealth ; many widows, and middle aged of the fair sex, will have good cause to think of the Autumn of 1868. Storms are frequent—the elements obtain mastery over the efforts of man to restrain them. Such is an unexaggerated interpretation of the predominant aspects. In going through the predictions for 1868, let the reader bear in mind that Mundane Astrology is a comprehensive science, both as regards the view taken and result indicated ; Kingdoms, States, and Classes being considered, to the exclusion of detail, except as to the rise or fall of a chief, the success or defeat of a leader, or some prominent act in the great drama of life. May Providence guard our beloved Sovereign from every casualty, and the mighty empire over which she rules from disunion or infraction of whatever kind !

REASONS FOR

Belief in Judicial Astrology.

When we were young we were quite sure that man was a free agent. It was very agreeable to believe we could win fame, wealth—anything we wished to win and took proper means to obtain. When therefore we heard of a certain person whom we shall call *Mr. S.*, and his wonderful revelations, we laughed at the notion that any one could tell a man what he himself would choose to do at some future time.

But it happened that we heard of *Mr. S.* so often that we felt curious to write to him, and have proof of his talent of Astrological learning. We wrote to *Mr. S.* and requested him to calculate our NATIVITY, to the time and place of birth inclosed. In about a week we received a written reply, wherein was described the stature, complexion, contour of the face, peculiarities of figure, walk, teeth, hair, and eyes of persons we had been and were then acquainted with, and the nature of the acquaintance, with singular accuracy. He also informed us of certain events which had occurred to us, and of others that would occur. At last we concluded that some one must have told him all he told us of our past life, and having accepted this apology to ourselves for our incapability of accounting for his knowledge, we thought little more of the matter. But after a time one of the predicted events occurred; this we thought a lucky hit. But another occurred; and we began to feel some doubts of the correctness of our first view. Eventually we determined to examine the subject further as soon as we had an opportunity. We believe that *Mr. S.* was *imprisoned* more than once for describing the results of Laws, which the CREATOR has ordained for the *government* of the *created*; and that by the *Law of ENGLAND* he was called a "*rogue and vagabond!*" He predicted what would happen in *this World*, the *truth* of his *Predictions* could be *verified* by *living men*, and they sent him to *jail* as a "*cheat!*" If he had *Predicted* what would happen in the *next World*, the

truth of his *Predictions* could never have been *tested* by living men; but they would have approached him with awe, and bowed down to him with "idolatrous homage."

To return to our narration.
