NATURE OF THE ASPECTS, &c.

Aspects from *aspicio*, to behold, the being placed at a certain distance from a planet, these are either *good* or *evil* aspects. As the *conjunction* (\circ) or being in the same sign or degree of the zodiac, *good* with the good planets; as *Jupiter*, *Venus*, the *Sun*, the *Moon*. Any planet is *afflicted* when in *conjunction* (\circ) of *Saturn*, *Mars*, or *Uranus*. *Semisextile* (S. \ast), *Sextile* (\ast), and *Trine* (Δ), are *good* aspects, with *all* the planets; and those days are said to be *lucky* when the *Moon* forms any of these aspects. See the "Lunar Aspects," commencing at page 8. The *Semisquare* (S. \square), 45 degrees; the *Square* (\square), 90 degrees; the *Sesquisquare* (SS. \square), 135 degrees; and the *Opposition* (\circ), 180 degrees; are *ill aspects* with *any* of the planets, therefore unfavourable to mankind in any honourable undertaking. *Parallel*, or *P*, signifies an equal distance from the Equator, or being in the same degree of *Declination*; whether of the same name, *North* or *South*, is of no consequence. The effect of this position is exactly the same as that of a *conjunction* (\circ), being *good* with *good* planets, as *Jupiter* (\mathbb{J}), *Venus* (\mathbb{F}), the *Sun* (\mathbb{O}), the *Moon* (\mathbb{D}); and *evil* with the planets *Saturn* (\mathbb{h}), *Mars* (\mathbb{g}), and *Uranus* (\mathbb{H}). A DIVINING MENTOR,

OR THE ORACLE OF THE RING AND CUP.

How to divine the Initials of a future Wife or Husband, and also to answer several curious Questions; being an amusing method of passing a Winter's Evening.

Take a wedding ring that has been worn a year and a day, or more, and suspend it by means of a hair from the head of a virgin, then hold it, the hair, between the finger and thumb, and let the ring hang about six or seven inches from the fingers in the centre of a silver goblet or drinking glass. When the ring is perfectly steady, let the holder ask the initial letter of the *christian* name of his or her future wife or husband. The ring will begin to oscillate, and soon strike against the side of the goblet, &c. Then repeat very carefully, at each stroke, the letters of the alphabet, A, B, C, D, &c., till the ring cease to strike: and the last letter named will be the one quesited. Thus, if the ring strike 5 times, the initial letter will be E; and if 10 times, J, &c. The initial letters of the *surname* may be learned in the same way; and if the question be the number of years the party is old, or the number of years before the asker's marriage, &c., the number of strokes the ring makes will be the answer. In the same way the hour of the day and the minute even of the hour may be learned, by asking, "how many hours is it since noon?" and then, "how many minutes since that hour? Many curious questions may be put by asking them, "yea or nay?" and then, if the ring strike 14, the number of the letter N, take that to imply "No;" and if it strike 25, let that signify "Yes."

One thing must be particularly attended to in this operation, which is that there can be only *one demand* made for *one thing*, and that the *first* response must be accepted as the true one; for, if the quesited be varied, so as to try to get another answer, in any case, **THAT IS ERROR.** Faith and seriousness are essential.

This operation is found to fail very rarely indeed. It is perfectly inexplicable; and the fact of the ring oscillating and striking against the goblet, after being held perfectly steady, without any apparent *cause*, remains a mystery, which modern philosophy can by no means explain: nor can we see why it will at times strike only once or twice, and at other times go on rapidly striking the goblet forty or fifty times.

To Set a Clock or Watch by this Table—Example, Jan. 1st. It will be found by looking into the Table, that a Clock to be right must be 3 minutes 45 seconds faster than a sun-dial; therefore set it so much faster accordingly, and so of the rest. Correct the Watch when the Dial marks just an hour, 9, 10, 11, 2, 3, or 4 o'clock. Noon is not the best time for this purpose, nor near sun-rise or sun-set.

THE ECLIPSES, &c., IN 1879.

In the year 1879, there will be *two* Eclipses of the *Sun* and *one* of the *Moon*.

I.—AN ANNULAR ECLIPSE OF THE SUN,

January 22nd, *invisible* to England.

Begins on the Earth generally January 22nd, 8h. 59m. 30s. a.m., in Longitude 51° 3' W. of Greenwich, and Latitude 24° 0' S.

Central Eclipse at Noon January 22nd, 11h. 45m. 54s. a.m., in Longitude 6° 28' E. of Greenwich, and Latitude 31° 0' S.

Ends on the Earth generally January 22nd, 2h. 46m. 12s. p.m., in Longitude 47° 18' E. of Greenwich, and Latitude 11° 20' N.

The central line of this Eclipse leaves the South American Continent between Monte Video and Rio Grande; it then dashes across the South Atlantic Ocean, and strikes the African Continent near the mouth of the great Orange River in South Africa; still passing with great rapidity in a North-easterly direction over a large section of South Africa, it finally leaves that Continent near Melinda in Zanguebar; enters the Indian Ocean, where it finally disappears at Sunset. This Eclipse will be *visible* to the Eastern Coast of South America, the South Atlantic Ocean, South and Central Africa, and also to the Coasts and Islands adjacent. This Eclipse will doubtless cause the Government of England much anxiety in connection with South African affairs generally, and I fear that the settlers will again experience the ireful risings in the savages' breasts.

II.—AN ANNULAR ECLIPSE OF THE SUN,

July 19th, *invisible to England.*

Begins on the Earth generally July 19th, 6h. 10m. 42s., a.m., in Longitude $5^{\circ} 13'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $10^{\circ} 32'$ N.

Central Eclipse at Noon, July 19th, 9h. 9m. 12s., a.m., in Longitude $44^{\circ} 13'$ E. of Greenwich, and Latitude $12^{\circ} 18'$ N.

Ends on the Earth generally July 19th, 11h. 58m. 0s., a.m., in Longitude $83^{\circ} 50'$ E. of Greenwich, and Latitude $20^{\circ} 31'$ S.

The Central Track of this Eclipse will enter upon the Western Coast of Africa to the North of Sierra Leone; then passing over Teembo, the Niger country, Lake Tchad, the upper Tributaries of the River Nile, the Red Sea, near the Straits of Babelmandel, and the Indian Ocean. This phenomenon will be visible to North and Central Africa, the Indian Ocean, the Red Sea, Arabian Sea, and to the Coasts and Islands adjacent. We observe the violent planet Mars in square to the luminaries, which prognosticates much mischief and destruction. In Central and Western Africa the most savage deeds will be perpetrated.

OF ECLIPSES,

THE PRODIGIES OF HEAVEN.


Eclipses, especially of the Sun, have been always considered as events of the most remarkable kind. *Isaiah*, and others of the sacred writers, speak of them as indicative of the wrath of the Almighty. *Homer*, *Pindar*, *Pliny*, and many of the ancients, also make mention of them in a similar way; and it used to be noticed, more particularly by Astronomers, that an Eclipse was often accompanied by a national calamity, or an occurrence of a very striking nature. An Eclipse of the Sun presents a spectacle of a most awful nature, and it cannot be deemed irrelevant to describe the phenomena that have attended one or two of the most remarkable. *Clavius* observes, that at the Total Eclipse of the Sun of 1560, the darkness at Coimbra was greater, or at least more striking than that of the night, and that the birds fell to the earth through terror. The grand Total Eclipse of the Sun on the 22nd of April, 1715, presented a most interesting phenomenon; and from its having been the only Total Eclipse of the Sun visible at London since the year 1140, its approach was awaited with no small degree of anxiety, especially among the scientific. *Dr. Halley*, who observed this Eclipse at London, says, "both planets and fixed stars were seen, the birds went to roost in terror, the bats came out of their holes, and the fishes swam wildly about, a sensation of cold was experienced, and the dew fell upon the grass, upon the extinction of the Sun, since ourselves could not behold it without some sense of horror."

III.—A PARTIAL ECLIPSE OF THE MOON,

December 28th, *visible to England.*

Eclipse begins Dec. 28th, 3h. 37m. 24s., p.m. } Mean Time
 Middle of the Eclipse ... „ 28th, 4h. 26m. 6s., p.m. } at
 Eclipse ends ... „ 28th, 5h. 14m. 48s., p.m. } Greenwich.
 Magnitude of the Eclipse (Moon's Diameter = 1) $0^{\circ} 167 = 2^{\circ} 0' 14''$

At the Middle of the Eclipse the Moon will be vertical, or directly overhead, in Longitude $114^{\circ} 4'$ East of Greenwich, and Latitude $24^{\circ} 14'$ North, which place falls near Canton in China.



B denotes the *Beginning*; **M** the *Middle*; and **E** the *End*.

At Greenwich the Moon will rise at 3h. 46m. p.m., just immersed in the Earth's Dark Shadow.

This Eclipse will be visible to Japan, China, India, Arabia, Persia, Turkey, Europe, Eastern, Central, and Southern Africa, and to the Seas and Islands adjacent. The Moon will be Eclipsed in the 7th degree of *Cancer*, and forthwith will its evil effects be felt by those countries ruled by that sign, which are all Africa, Constantinople, Algeria, Amsterdam, Cadiz, &c. The Eastern nations will suffer from fires, tumults, and evils of a physical nature.

THE WINTER QUARTER;

Or the Sun's Transit through Capricorn, Aquarius, and Pegasus.

Winter attacks us now in front and rear :
 Without some fence, her weapons who can bear ?
 Strong Beer, good Fires, warm Garments will oppose,
 And ward the Darts of nitrous Frost and snows :
 But for the Poor, how wretched are they now !
 More wretched those, who nothing them allow.

In an Astronomical point of view, this gloomy season of the year is considered to begin in northern latitudes, when the Sun in its annual course arrives at the first point of Capricorn; and which, in the present instance, will be on *Saturday*, December the 21st, 1878, at 10h. 41m., p.m., when I find the 16th degree of Virgo on the ascendant, and the 12th degree of Gemini Meridianal. The most important aspects, &c., at this Ingress are the conjunction of the Sun and Venus, and that of the Moon and Mars. Uranus ascending in the 12th house, and the ponderous orb of Saturn descending in the Western angle. The Moon separating from a conjunction of Mars in the third "house" threatens some sad catastrophe on railways, especially on or near the 21st, 23rd, 28th, or 30th of December; unless great caution be used. Venus ruling the 9th house in square to Saturn brings to light some licentious and immoral practices perpetrated under the cloak of religion. Internal discord, or hostilities with foreign countries, threaten to disturb the peace of England. Daring robberies and acts of violence occur in London, where we also hear of extensive cases of swindling, and important trials. Fires are numerous and extensive. Rash speculations ruin numbers. Uranus in the 12th house indicates disease and mortality amongst cattle. In Paris the full effects of this position of Uranus will be felt. Turkey will also participate in the full influence of Uranus. Pestilence and tumults will reign in the land of the Crescent. The influences are evil for the eastern Kingdoms and Nations generally; and we hear of the ill effects in the shape of typhoons, famine, and destructive shocks of earthquake. Saturn, ruler of the 6th house, and descending in the west indicates a very sickly season, *consumption* and *bronchitis* being more than usually prevalent and fatal; both the old and the young succumb.

THE SPRING QUARTER;

Or the Sun's Transit through Aries, Taurus, and Gemini.

Now rise, and haste to yonder woodbine bow'rs,
A soft retreat from sudden vernal show'rs;
The turf with rural dainties shall be crown'd,
While op'ning blooms diffuse their sweets around.
For see ! the gath'ring flocks to shelter tend,
And from the Pleiads fruitful show'rs descend.

According to the Sun's apparent motion in the Ecliptic, I find that this Quarter will begin on *Thursday*, March the 20th, at 11h. 18m., p.m.; when the 24th degree of Scorpio cuts the eastern Horoscope, and the 15th degree of Virgo the southern Angle. At the same time Mars occupies the 2nd "house," Jupiter and the Moon the 3rd, and the Sun and Saturn the 4th. It does not appear that there is any thing at this Ingress that is likely to put England into an hostile attitude. Look, however, at the aspects at the Summer quarter. Burdened with a heavy debt and taxes, we are not exactly in a condition for War. By our keeping on friendly terms with France, Belgium, and the Netherlands are preserved, and some check put to the ambitious views of Russia, Prussia, and Austria, at least in that part of Europe. But Ursa Major still shakes his paw over Turkey, while he glances a scowl at Persia, and even beyond, towards India. Ah ! Czar, be moderate ! Is not your own extensive Empire enough ? The fate of ambition in all ages is the fate of ambition still. Humble thyself, and call to mind in time the declaration of Him who hath said, "*All the trees of the field shall know that I the Lord have brought down the high tree, have exalted the low tree, have dried up the green tree, and have made the dry tree to flourish.*" Jupiter still benefits nations under the dominion of Aquarius, but as Mars is passing into that sign, he will for a time stir up discord and violence in Russia, Prussia, Turkey, France, Germany, Ireland, Sicily, Asia Minor, and other places under the dominion of Taurus, Leo, and Aquarius. This Quarter will not pass by without one or more *remarkable deaths* being placed upon its records. "*Who may resist thy power, Oh King of Terrors.*" Atmospheric phenomena will prevail this Quarter, and very probably convulsions of the earth, in some parts: shipwrecks are likely round the coasts. There will be railway mishaps and coal-pit accidents in various ways.



THE SUMMER QUARTER;

Or the Sun's Transit through Cancer, Leo, and Virgo.

Jove and Mavors cloud the spangled sky,
Hermes and Chronos raise the winds and showers,
Many a storm and tempest from on high,
Help'd on by Mars and Saturn's blustering powers,
The Electric Charge rends the clouds asunder,
With storms of Rain, Lightning, and claps of Thunder.

This Tropical Ingress takes place on *Saturday*, June the 21st, at 7h. 43m., p.m., when the culminating point cuts the 28th degree of Libra, and the Eastern angle the 23rd degree or Sagittarius. Jupiter is ruler of the Ascendant, and posted in the 2nd "house," in sextile to Neptune; the Sun is in conjunction with Mercury, and in sextile to Uranus. These rays do not appear to be of an unfriendly disposition: but we have in this Quarter an inimical conjunction of Saturn and Mars, which position has always been considered of deadly import by the oldest Astrologers, which it is to be hoped, the benign rays will in a great measure avert. Still I judge some great cause of death will be operating, and probably numbers swept off the scene of life by accident this quarter. Let the workers in iron and mines beware of accidents, as some fearful explosions and other casualties may be apprehended. Saturn and Mars in the 3rd house denote depression amongst engineers, with extensive railway accidents. Also accidents or annoyances to pleasure parties. The Mahometan countries, from Egypt to "the city of the Sultan," will suffer under the prevailing aspects. Jupiter moving forward in the sign Pegasus will benefit places ruled by that sign; these are chiefly Portugal, Calabria, Normandy, Calicia in Spain, Cilicia, Alexandria, Ratisbon, Seville, Farnham (Surrey), and Tiverton. The chief feature during this quarter will be Mars in Taurus, and its effects will be visible for many months to come. It will be a means of opening a new era to many places under the dominion of the sign Taurus: these are Ireland, Great Poland, part of Russia, Germany, Holland, Turkey, Persia, Asia Minor, the Archipelago, Suez, Lorraine, &c. These parts of the world will be fearfully affected, pestilence, famine, and war, as well as storms and earthquakes of a destructive nature, will be fearfully visible.

THE AUTUMN QUARTER;

Or the Sun's Transit through Libra, Scorpio, and Sagittarius.

How great is thy beneficence, O Lord !
Which flows from mercy's vast unbounded sea ;
Thy hands innumerable gifts afford,
Seed-time and harvest answer to thy word ;
Worthy thou art to be by all adored,
Author of goodness and felicity.

In the present year, I find that this Quarter will commence on *Tuesday*, the 23rd of September, at 10h. 9m. a.m., at which time the 16th degree of Scorpio is on the Ascendant, and the 3rd degree of Virgo on the Midheaven ; all the planets, with the exception of Uranus, are below our horizon. The planets Mercury and Mars must be considered the most powerful at this Ingress, being both angular ; the former also being dignified by sign, and conjoin with Uranus ; Mars moreover, is lord of the Ascendant, and in the 7th house of the Autumnal figure, and in semi-square to Saturn. From the effects of these momentous circumstances, we must naturally expect this will be a quarter of much bustle and activity in many parts of the world ; deep consultations, superlative transactions, most remarkable changes, wherein the greatest monarchs and persons in the world are concerned. The effects here signified will be more or less felt in Europe, America, and India. The countries most concerned in this quarter of the Globe, are England, Ireland, France, Germany, Holland, &c. The potent position of Mars in Taurus will not fail to spread a feeling of dissatisfaction among the various tribes that form a portion of the Russian empire, which will only be changed for the note of war. The feeling of revenge which has so long slept in the breast of the Polander will now burst forth with all its fury, but I fear, only to place themselves more fully within the tyrant's grasp. The number of deaths registered during the Autumn Quarter will be much above the average ; consumption, bronchitis, fevers, and disorders arising from colds and obstructions will prove very destructive, sweeping away both youth and age. Saturn in the 5th house, foreshows much trouble to theatres, schools, and places of amusement ; and shall scarcely escape a terrible accident or fire. Children will suffer from inflammatory attacks.

Horticultural, Botanical, and Herbal Guide, For 1879.

JANUARY.—In open and dry weather sow in mild exposure for a succession a few early frame peas common beans, short-topped radishes, lettuces, carrots, onions, spinach, and curled parsley, protecting them from the frost by mats or straw. Plant, prune, and train fruit trees and bushes. Form new flower gardens, and shelter from frost tender evergreens, tulips, &c. Plant snowdrops, crocuses, &c. *Herbs* to be gathered are groundsel, chickweed, archangel, and others which are in flower.

FEBRUARY.—Make ready all the ground intended for early crops; and when the weather is favourable, continue to sow every fortnight peas, beans, onions, spinach, savoys, lettuce, celery, cauliflowers, carrots, parsnips, and radishes. Cut early kidney potatoes for seed, and put them in a stove or hot-bed in order to start them for planting out. Plant out evergreens and shrubs of all kinds, particularly roses, &c. Prune vine and fruit trees. *Herbs* to be gathered: foalfoot, lingwort, pilewort, speedwell, chickweed, shepherd's purse, and broom.

MARCH.—The principal crops of vegetables should be put into the ground this month. Sow asparagus, celery, cauliflowers, broccoli, spinach, onions, carrots, peas, beans, savoys, parsnips, radishes, &c. Plant red cabbage and sea-kale: sow cucumbers and melons in hot beds. Finish pruning, dress borders and strawberry beds. This is the best time for grafting fruit trees, perpetual and moss roses, &c. Pot dahlias and cuttings. Plant pinks, polyanthus, carnations, &c. *Herbs* to be gathered for medicinal purposes: coltsfoot, fumitory, pilewort, ladyfrock, lesser celandine, violet and comfrey roots, and all kinds of herbal bark.

APRIL.—Continue to sow and plant rhubarb, artichokes, asparagus, sea-kale, Dutch turnips, German greens, and small salading. Earth up peas, tie up lettuce, and in very dry weather water seedling beds. Finish the grafting of fruit trees, and train and clean walks and edgings. Sow annuals, biennials, and perennials. Plant evergreens and propagate by cutting, jasmine, lavender, sage, rosemary, rue, &c. Sow early Dutch turnips. *Herbs* to be gathered: ground ivy, dandelions, avens, buttercups, and others which are in flower, as well as all kinds of bark.

MAY.—Sow peas, cucumber, red beet for pickling, and a full crop for kidney beans. Transplant cabbages, winter greens, cauliflowers, and celery. Hoe and stake peas, water newly-planted crops, and propagate aromatic plants by slips or cuttings. Plant dahlias, if there be no appearance of frost, and protect from wind and rain choice tulips, &c. Propagate herbaceous plants by dividing the roots. *Herbs* to be cut: celandine, milkwort, moonwort, wood sorrel, and adder's tongue.

JUNE.—Top beans and peas to assist the filling of the pods. Set kidney beans, and transplant cabbage, savoys, broccoli, and sow turnips. Thin out onions, leeks, carrots, parsnips, and early turnips. Gather and preserve kitchen herbs. Shade and air melon plants, &c. Bulbous roots that have done flowering should now be taken up, and the off-sets separated. *Herbs* to be cut: avens, brooklime, centuary, cumfrey, woodbine, valerian, eyebright, pimpernel, speedwell, and elecampane.

Horticultural, Botanical, and Herbal Guide,

For 1879.

JULY.—In this month prepare all unoccupied plots of ground for autumn and winter crops. Sow turnips, radishes, &c. Plant out broccoli, cauliflower, savoys, leeks, and winter cabbages, and earth up celery. Lift full grown winter onions, and prepare mushroom spawn. In fine weather, gather medicinal flowers and sweet herbs, when in bloom, dressing them first in the sun, and then in the shade for winter use. *Herbs* to be cut are all that are in flower, as lavender, tansey, vervain, bedstraw, agrimony, cinquefoil mountain flax, foxglove, and meadow sweet.

AUGUST.—Sow early cabbages and parsley for the succeeding year; also spinach, broccoli, and cauliflower to stand the winter; earth celery; hoe and thin turnips; transplant broccoli, savoys, and cauliflower, and the principal crop of celery into the trenches for blanching. Make mushroom beds: propagate kitchen herbs by slips, and take up all onions, garlic and shallots that are withered in the stem. Sow the seed of bulbous flowers in pots. *Herbs* to be cut: all mints and sage, golden rod, pond weed, yellow gentian, tansey, mugwort, and loosestrife.

SEPTEMBER.—Plants savoys, broccoli, cauliflower, leeks, celery & perennial aromatic and pot herbs. Hoe winter spinach and turnips, earth up celery and cardoons, prick out cabbage plants, gather ripe seed, &c. Pull onions if the tops appear dying. Plant cuttings of gooseberries, currants, raspberries, and strawberries, taking out the old stools which have twice produced fruit. *Herbs* to be gathered: angelica, field gentian, valerian, feverfew, southernwood, briony, and wild berries.

OCTOBER.—Plant home radishes, early cabbages, and other greens neglected last month, in sheltered situations; also cauliflower, mint, and tarragon, in frames for winter use. Earth up savoys and cabbages as high as the leaves. Take up carrots and parsnips, cut off their tops and bury them in dry sand. Crop the tops of parsley, to make fresh leaves for winter. Transplant fruit trees and shrubs after the 10th day. Gather tree seeds: and sow for stocks. *Herbs* to be gathered: ivy, yarrow, wall rue, shepherd's purse, broom, rape, wall cress, and wild berries.

NOVEMBER.—Dig the ground where the crops are carried off, and which is not intended to plant again till spring: manure and prune fruit trees. Shallots are readily propagated by offsets. A stiffish soil and open aspect should be preferred. These offsets, or "claws," should have their bases only pressed into the ground, without being covered. Tulips and hyacinth roots may be planted. *Herbs*: not many to be gathered this month for medicinal uses, except rose moss, rock fern, and polypody.

DECEMBER.—In this month forward the business of manuring, digging, or trenching vacant ground. Set all sorts of stones, kernels, &c. Complete tree planting, and forward all winter pruning. Continue planting various hardy roots, bulbs and shrubs. If frosty weather, be particular to protect all tender plants, trees, &c. Earth up celery. Sow small salad in warm borders, covered with mats. *Herbs* to be gathered: rose moss, rock fern, polypody, evergreens, and the mistletoe.

CLIMACTERICAL YEARS.

ASTROLOGICAL OBSERVATION HAS ESTABLISHED THE FOLLOWING TRUTHS:—As the Moon comes to an aspect good or bad with the point of the ecliptic ascending at birth, corresponding impressions upon health or circumstances assuredly take effect. The periodical revolution of the Moon is performed in 27 days, 7 hours, 43 minutes; hence about every seventh day she is Moon to her place in the radiacal figure; and thus, some time in the course of her seventh year, she becomes *quartile* to her own place, and causes a *quartile climacteric*, which unless its effects be restrained by counter aspects of the benefice stars, is an unfortunate transit. Again, some time in the course of each ninth year, the Moon occupies a place *trine* to the aspect of her place in the nativity, which is favourable, unless greatly molested by counteracting rays. Hence, it will be understood that a seventh, fourteenth, twenty-first, twenty-eighth, &c., year is a *quartile*, or an evil climacteric; and the ninth, eighteenth, twenty-seventh, thirty-sixth, &c., are *trine* climacterics, and promise good. The forty-ninth and sixty-third are termed grand climacterics, the former being the square of that term which constitutes the quartile, as seven times seven are forty-nine; and the latter being the time multiplied into the quartile, as seven-times nine are sixty-three; which are both periods of a person's life commonly productive of constitutional or other change.



LUNAR INFLUENCE ON VEGETABLES.

It is a maxim among gardeners, that cabbages and lettuces which are desired to shoot forth early, flowers which are to be double, trees which it is desired should produce early ripe fruit, should severally be sown, planted, and pruned during the decrease of the Moon, and that on the contrary, trees which are expected to grow with vigour should be sown, planted, grafted, and pruned during the increase of the Moon. The increase or decrease of the Moon has appreciable influence on the phenomena of vegetation; and the observations and experiments of several French agriculturalists, have clearly established this.

THE STAR OF OUR SAVIOUR.

"Haste ! ye Magi ! come and worship !
See the orient star before !
Bring your presents, gold, and spices,—
Blest be Arabia's balmy store."—*Christmas Hymn.*

A correspondent, writing from Lismore, Ireland, has very kindly forwarded to us the result of a lengthened investigation of his, identifying the "star" which appeared in 1572 as the same which appeared at the birth of Jesus Christ. Its period is, as near as can be calculated, 315 years, and our correspondent anticipates its re-appearance in the course of the summer or autumn of 1887. The same star, according to popular chronology, appeared in 943, and again in 1264; but these dates require rectification, the first should be 942, and the other 1257. Our correspondent also states that "the aspects of the planets, and the eclipses in the year 1887, particularly the great eclipse of the 19th August, indicate events of very startling importance."

THE SATELLITES OF MARS.

The two Moons of the planet Mars were discovered in August, 1877. The outer satellite was first observed by Professor Asaph Hall, at Washington Observatory, on the night of August 11th, though cloudy weather prevented the recognition of its true character at that time. It was again observed on the 16th, and its motion was established by observation extending over two hours. The inner satellite was first remarked by the same astronomer on August 17th. From observations to August 20th, Professor Newcomb calculated approximate circular elements. The period of revolution of the outer satellite was found to be 30 hours 14 minutes, and the major axis of its orbit subtends an angle of 32 seconds, at the mean distance of the earth from the Sun. The second satellite appeared to revolve round the primary in the extraordinary short period of 7 hours, 38 minutes, the major axis of its orbit, similarly referred, being 18 seconds. The true orbit of the first satellite is inclined to the ecliptic 25 degrees, the longitude of the ascending node being 83 degrees.

When Galileo announced the discovery of the Jovian satellites, Kepler, after congratulating him, said, "I please myself with the thought that you will discover two moons attending on Mars, and many attending on Saturn."—*Times.*

USEFUL HINTS.—LEGAL & COMMERCIAL.

L. O. U.'s. are received in evidence as acknowledgments of debts.

The penalty attaches only to a person giving a receipt on *unstamped paper*.

A copyright extends to 42 years.

A Judge's Order is not superseded by the Statute of Limitations.

Employers are not obliged to give characters to servants, or to assign a reason for their refusal.

The Statute of Limitations does not avail a debtor living beyond the seas part of the time.

Waste Land by the side of the road belongs to the adjoining freeholder or the Lord of the Manor.

Copper coin is not a *legal tender* beyond 1s., or silver beyond 20s., but gold may be tendered to any amount.

A person giving a *false character* with a servant, renders himself liable to an action.

Payment of *interest* on a debt takes it out of the operation of the Statute of Limitations.

Wearing apparel and tools are protected from seizure under an *execution* from the County Court.

The *Bank of England* does not allow interest on money deposited for security.

A *guarantee* for payment of a debt must be in writing.

Tradesmen cannot be compelled to sell their goods at the prices marked in the windows.

Goods *pledged* to a pawnbroker are considered forfeited after the lapse of a year and a day.

Legatees under a will should not be witnesses to its execution as the legacy is thereby rendered void.

One half of the personal property of an *intestate*, dying without children, goes to his widow.

A verbal *death-bed gift* of property is of no avail.

Persons may be married at any time within three months after the publication of *banns*.

Card-playing is not allowed in public houses.

An action may be sustained in the County Court for *defamation* of character.

The rules of a *Loan Society* must be submitted for certificate to Mr. J. M. Ludlow.

Persons acting as *jurors* in criminal cases are not paid anything for so doing.

County Court *witnesses* who reside within a certain distance are allowed mileage.

Publicans cannot recover for *beer, &c.*, consumed upon the premises.

An *Income Tax collector* is bound to demand the money only once.

Money won at *billiards* cannot be recovered.

The deposit of *Title Deeds*, with a letter or memorandum of the object, will operate as a mortgage.

Persons exposing *fireworks* for sale without a licence, are liable to a penalty of £5.

A *promise of marriage* need not be in writing to sustain an action for a breach of it.

A master is not bound to pay his apprentice *wages* during illness or absence.

The death of a *legatee* during the lifetime of a testator renders the legacy void.

A *funeral procession* passing over land does not constitute a right of way.

No master can require more than reasonable *hours of servitude* from an apprentice.

An *entail* can be cut off by the present possessor and next heir.

Quarter Sessions in Counties.

These Sessions are to be held in the first whole weeks respectively after March 31, June 24, Oct. 11, and Dec. 28, the magistrates determining the day of the week on which the Sessions shall commence at each place. But the Easter Sessions may be altered to any time between March 7 and April 22, so as to prevent interference with the Spring Assizes.

NOTES ON TEMPERATURE.



The mean temperature of the whole earth is 50° ; at the equator it is 84° ; at latitude 30° it is 71° ; at latitude 80° it is 34° . The annual mean of the coldest hour in Europe is 5 a.m., and the warmest 2 or 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The greatest daily range of temperature in Europe is in July and the least in December. Water seldom freezes till the meridian altitude of the sun is less than 45° . In latitude 46° to 48° the heat at sun setting is the mean of the day.

While the air above snow is 40° below Zero, the temperature of the ground under the snow is only 32° .

The temperature sometimes varies in South Carolina 50° in 24 hours, and ranges about 85° in the year; the rainfall is about 50 inches. In China and Africa the temperature is frequently 110° to 113° in the shade, and sometimes even higher: whilst in Hudson's Bay it sometimes falls to 50° or 60° below Zero.

There is constant snow on the mountains near the equator, at 15,600 feet high, at latitude 20° , 15,000 feet; at latitude 45° , 8,300 feet, and at latitude 60° , 4,900 feet.

The solar heat in the year is sufficient to melt a coating of ice spread over the globe 46 feet thick.

At London the mean annual temperature is 50° , at Dublin 49° , and at Edinburgh, 47° . Devonshire and Cornwall are about 4° warmer than London.

The 14th of January on an average is the coldest day in the year.

America is 14° colder in the latitude of London than Europe.

In New South Wales the coldest months average 54° , and the hottest 75° . It rains 100 days in the year.

The thermometer in Italy ranges in summer from 75° to 96° , and in winter it is seldom under 40° .

At sea the thermometer never rises above 85° .

The temperature is lower in the southern than the northern hemisphere, and ice extends 400 or 500 miles farther from the South Pole than the North; and Sandwich Land in the latitude of Scotland is covered with snow all the year. The mean temperature at the North Pole is estimated at 4° ; some take a mean of 1° .

At Bear Lake Captain Franklin found the thermometer 58° below Zero, and for two days it had been $57\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$. In Siberia and Hudson's Bay mercury becomes solid, and spirits become thick and spongy.

Spring is the most rapid in the Arctic Zone, the snow disappears, and within a few days the trees burst into foliage, the ground is covered with flowers, and spiders, frogs, fish, &c., frozen as brittle as ice, revive with the thaw.

The German Ocean is about 3° colder in winter, and 5° warmer in summer than the Atlantic. Variation does not usually take place in water below 120 feet deep.

The mean temperature of the whole year at St Petersburgh is 38° ; at Quebec, 42° ; at Vienna, 50° ; at Paris, 51° ; New York, 53° ; Rome, 60° ; and Cairo, 72° .

THE APPARITION OF A SHIP IN THE AIR.

[In a Letter from the Rev. James Pierpoint.]

REV. AND DEAR SIR,—In compliance with your desires, I now give you the relation of that apparition of a ship in the air, which I have received from the most credible, judicious, and curious surviving observers of it.

In the year 1647, besides much other lading, a rich treasure of passengers, five or six of whom were persons of chief note in Newhaven, put themselves on board a new ship, built at Rhode Island, of about 150 tons, but so faulty that the master (Lamberton) often said she would prove their grave. In the month of January, cutting their way through much ice, on which they were accompanied by the Rev. Mr. Davenport with many other friends, with many fears as well as prayers and tears, they set sail. The Spring following no tidings of these friends arrived with the ships from England, Newhaven's heart began to fail her. This put the godly people on much prayer, both public and private, that the Lord would, if it was his pleasure, let them hear what He had done with their dear friends, and prepare them with a suitable submission to his will. In June ensuing a great thunder-storm arose out of the north, after which the hemisphere being serene, about an hour before sun-set, a ship of like dimensions with aforesaid, with her canvas and colours abroad, though the wind was northerly, appeared in the air, coming up from our harbour's mouth, which lies southward from the town, seemingly with her sails filled under a fresh gale, holding her course north, and continuing under observation, sailing against the wind for the space of half-an-hour. Many were drawn to behold this great work of God, yea, the very children cried out "There's a brave ship!" At length crowding up as far as there is usually water sufficient for such a vessel, and so near some of the spectators that they imagined a man might hurl a stone on board her, her maintop seemed to be blown off, but left hanging in the shrouds; then her mizentop, then all her masting seemed blown away by the board. Soon after the hull brought into a careen, she overset, and so vanished into a smoky cloud, which in some time dissipated, leaving, as everywhere else, a clear air. The admiring spectators could distinguish the several colours of each part, the principal rigging, and such proportions as not only caused the generality of persons to say "This was the mould of their ship, and this was her tragic end," but also led Mr. Davenport in public to declare that God had condescended, for the quieting of their afflicted spirits, this extraordinary account of His sovereign disposal of those for whom so many fervant prayers were made continually.—Thus I am, Sir, your humble Servant,

METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVATIONS,

DRAWN FROM PLANTS, ANIMALS, &c.



The sensitive indications afforded us by many plants first claim attention, and will be found amply to repay the time that may be bestowed upon the singular properties inherent in many. The common chickweed possesses this property in an eminent degree. "The flowers are upright, and open from nine in the morning until noon; but if it rains, they remain closed. After rain they become pendant, but in the course of a few days they again rise.

What more certain harbinger of Summer have we than the May shrub, opening its elegant flowers amid all changes, and blossoming as freely in the poor man's garden as in the rich man's domain?

Wet summers, it has been found, are generally attended with an unusual quantity of seed in the hawthorn, their unusual fruitfulness being a sure sign of a hard winter. The seeds of the dog-rose prognosticate the coming severity of the winter in a like manner. The corollas of the Germanander Speedwell are all securely closed at the approach of rain, and they as surely open again when the storm is overpast.

"Not for thy azure tint, though bright,
Nor form so elegantly light,
I single thee, thou lovely flower,
From others of the sylvan bower,—
Thy *name* alone is like a spell,
And whispers Love in "Speed thee Well."

HORSES.—When Horses stretch forth their necks, snuffing the air with distended nostrils, assembling in the corner of a field with their heads to leeward, rain may be expected. The following anecdote was communicated by an eye witness of the fact:—"About the period of the first American War, the horses of a heavy dragoon regiment, which was turned out to grass at Havercroft, a village between Barnsley and Pontefract, where observed at the commencement of a very heavy thunder-storm to collect in a body and form a line with as much exactitude and precision as on a field day, continuing their position steadily as long as the storm lasted."

BIRDS.—Before rain, ducks and geese, and other fowls, wash and dive in the water more than usual. When pigeons return slowly to the dove-house, it is also said to indicate rain. The early appearance of woodcocks, snipes, fieldfares, &c., are prognostics of severe winters. When owls hoot and screech during bad weather, it is a sign of coming fine weather. The mistletoe thrush frequently sings particularly loud and long before rain, and sometimes during severe storms; hence it is termed the "storm cock."

DEATH MEMORIALS.

This month, the tide of mortality sweeps unrelentingly over many; three of 'busy note and known to fame' are among the number."—*Orion's Prophetic Observations for May*.

The last week of May—to say nothing of the entire month—was prolific in the annals of death, and the last day of the month was the one of all others on which the grim king held his most potential sway. In that one week the tide of mortality did in real earnest "sweep over many of busy note," and at least "three who are known to fame" were of that number. The deaths of that short period included those of the Duchess of Argyll, the Dowager Lady Williams, the Baroness Gray, the Countess of Buckinghamshire, the Countess of Newburgh, Dr. Carruthers (a literary veteran of repute), the Rt. Honorable Russell Gurney, and—last but not least—the venerable Earl Russell. But the gloom which pervaded the air of many a noted household during the principal portion of that week was greatly intensified by Death's holocaust on the last day. Totally unlooked-for in a calm sea and the brightest of weather was that terrible disaster to the *Grosser Kurfurst* which sent the giant iron-clad to the bottom of the English Channel, and at one fell swoop found a watery grave for some 290 of her officers and crew. The telegraphic wires were active all that day in flashing the sad intelligence to the Emperor at Berlin, to the Crown Prince of Prussia at Buckingham Palace, to hundreds of families on the Continent, and to all whom it might concern throughout the length and breadth of the British Isles.

August Meteors.—The passage of the August Meteors in 1879, will take place on *Monday*, the 11th of August, shortly before 6h. in the afternoon, at which time the Meteors will be obscured in consequence of the superior light of the Sun. For the earth generally, they will this year be most favourably seen in the East Indian Islands.

GERMANIC TROUBLES.

"From May to September the ponderous orb of Saturn will be hanging about the Sun's place in the horoscope of the Emperor of Germany, and he will experience national and family troubles of a serious nature."—*Orion's Almanac, 1878.*

He had but just escaped the blow intended for him by a would-be assassin when his Government were beaten by an immense majority on the Bill which they endeavoured to pass, authorizing summary proceedings against meetings and publications having Socialistic aims and tendencies. Since then, while some loyal Germans residing in London were presenting to the Crown Prince a congratulatory address on his father's escape from assassination, a numerous body of German Socialists forced their way into the Embassy, and on being ejected by the police and other officials, hissed the deputaion, sang the "Marseillaise," shouted "Down with the Prince," and attempted personal violence to the loyalists. Then followed on the heels of this public exhibition of animosity a trouble of a more national character in the loss of a great war-ship and two-thirds of its crew. This is truly a great calamity for Germany, apart from the injury to a second ship which will put it out of commission for six months. At best the German navy is but a comparatively small one, and as even before the present troublous times in connection with Eastern affairs the Emperor William was credited with wishing to make Germany a considerable naval as well as a great military Power, he cannot but feel such a serious loss of men and material as a great blow to his cherished ambition. Already the Emperor's misfortunes have followed thickly and quickly. Within three days of the heavy loss of German lives in English waters, which had a depressing effect on the Emperor, his own life was again placed in peril by the act of a would-be assassin. He was wounded, it is said, from two discharges of firearms in the face, neck, arms, and back, and although the wounds were found to be less serious than at first they were imagined to be, there is no surety that to a man of four-score, the shock will not have a serious, if not fatal, result. The dastardly deed had the effect of abruptly terminating the visit to England of the Crown Prince and Princess; and whether it be traced to Socialism, to religious fanaticism, to antagonism to the Russian propclivities of the Court, or to simple luancy, it adds one more to the number of "national and family troubles of a serious nature."

November Meteors.—I calculate that the November Meteors will pass the Earth on *Friday*, November the 14th, at about 1h. in the afternoon, when of course the meteors must be totally obscured by sun-light. For the Earth generally, they will this year be seen to the best advantage in Australia.
