REMARKABLE PREDICTION BY ORION.

Calculated from the Great Eclipse of the Sun, on January 22nd, 1879,
visible to South Africa !

(THE MILITARY DISASTER IN AFRICA.)

"At the New Moon Mars will be on the cusp of the 8th house, and this foretells many sudden and violent deaths." The massacre of 900 British soldiers within a few hours is certainly numerous enough and sudden enough ; and occurring as it did on the very day of the eclipse, is also striking enough.

Orion's Prophetic Almanac says :—"This eclipse will doubtless cause the Government of England much anxiety in connection with South-African affairs generally, and I fear that the settlers will again experience the ireful risings in the savages' breasts." The same Almanac contains a hieroglyphic in which the arrow of death (the assegai) is seen striking down upon a column of soldiers. The Almanac in question was published on the 1st of October preceding —three months before the period referred to in the *Times*, which assures its readers that the war certainly could not have been foreseen at the close of last year. If then, newspapers, which by-the-by are always prophesying but rarely realizing, could not foresee this great trouble, the *Pall-Mall Gazette* and the *Standard* should be a little more fair and a little less funny in their treatment of those who *did* foresee the event. If those politicians who cannot find words too strong with which to abuse a Government when national troubles come upon us, would but reflect that the destiny of worlds and of nations is in the hands of a mightier power than that of premiers, parliaments, or peoples, they would, we think, be less conceited in their views of man's free-agency, and less profuse in their partisan maledictions.

PHYSICAL CALAMITIES.

It may not be given to man to know the full purpose of the Divine Will, yet it may be possible to obtain glimpses of the same by the machinery of the heavens which that Will has created and continues to direct in all its manifold mutations. It may be just as true now as it was of old, that not only "the firmament sheweth His handiwork," but also that the configurations of the heavens are "for signs and for seasons," and "their influence is divided unto all nations."

POST OFFICE REGULATIONS.

TO CORRESPONDENTS.

POST OFFICE LETTERS.—Advertisers should understand that, according to a resolution of the Post Office authorities, letters to be called for, addressed with initials only, are not delivered from local offices, but go to the Dead Letter Office.

RATES OF POSTAGE ON INLAND LETTERS.

The rate of postage on inland letters and parcels of all sorts, closed or open, making no distinction between them, is as follows : *If paid in advance*—Not exceeding 1 oz., 1d.; above 1 oz., but not exceeding 2 oz., 1½d.; above 2 oz., but not exceeding 4 oz., 2d.; above 4 oz., but not exceeding 6 oz., 2½d.; above 6 oz., but not exceeding 8 oz., 3d.; above 8 oz., but not exceeding 10 oz., 3½d.; above 10 oz., but not exceeding 12 oz., 4d. Twelve oz. to be the limit of weight for letters.

REGISTRATION OF LETTERS, &c.

By the prepayment of a fee of 2d. any Letter, Newspaper, Book, or other Packet on which the postage has been prepaid in Stamps, may be “Registered” to any place in the United Kingdom, the British Colonies, the United States of America, Italy, Switzerland, (via Belgium) or Germany. A letter intended to be *registered* must not be dropped into a Letter Box, but must be given to an agent of the Post Office to be registered. If dropped into the Letter Box, they will, as heretofore, be re-registered by the Post Office, and charged on delivery with a Registration fee of 8d.

For the convenience of persons living in Country places, where no Post Office is near, Letters will be Registered by Rural Post Messengers, who will receive Letters for Registration on their outward and on their inwards walks, whenever it is practicable for them to do so.

NATURE OF THE ASPECTS, &c.

Aspects from *aspicio*, to behold, the being placed at a certain distance from a planet, these are either *good* or *evil* aspects. As the conjunction (\wp) or being in the same sign or degree of the zodiac, *good* with the good planets ; as *Jupiter*, *Venus*, the *Sun*, the *Moon*. Any planet is *afflicted* when in conjunction (\wp) of *Saturn*, *Mars*, or *Uranus*. *Semisextile* (S. \times), *Sextile* (\times), and *Trine* (Δ), are *good* aspects, with *all* the planets ; and those days are said to be *lucky* when the *Moon* forms any of these aspects. See the "Lunar Aspects," commencing at page 8. The *Semisquare* (S. \square), 45 degrees ; the *Square* (\square), 90 degrees ; the *Sesquisquare* (SS. \square), 135 degrees ; and the *Opposition* (\wp), 180 degrees ; are *ill aspects* with *any* of the planets, therefore unfavourable to mankind in any honourable undertaking. *Parallel*, or *P*, signifies an equal distance from the Equator, or being in the same degree of *Declination* ; whether of the same name, *North* or *South*, is of no consequence. The effect of this position is exactly the same as that of a conjunction (\wp), being *good* with *good* planets, as *Jupiter* (\mathbb{J}), *Venus* (\mathbb{V}), the *Sun* (\odot), the *Moon* (\wp) ; and *evil* with the planets *Saturn* (\mathbb{S}), *Mars* (\mathbb{M}), and *Uranus* (\mathbb{U}). From the above and other data it is evident that this Eclipse will be chiefly confined to the waters of the North Pacific Ocean.

This Eclipse will be visible in Asia, and the Asiatic Archipelago, Australia, New Zealand; and on the South Pacific, Indian, and Southern Oceans. This Eclipse bodes little good to our Eastern possessions; seditions, famine, and sickness, as well as cyclones and earthquakes will be witnessed in the East generally!

III.—AN ANNULAR ECLIPSE OF THE SUN,*July 7th, invisible to England.*

Begins on the Earth generally July 7th, 10h. 43m. 0s. a.m., in Longitude $59^{\circ} 37'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $22^{\circ} 47'$ S.

Central Eclipse at Noon, July 7th, 1h. 34m. 36s. p.m., in Longitude $22^{\circ} 28'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $52^{\circ} 30'$ S.

Ends on the Earth generally July 7th, 3h. 37m. 24s. p.m., in Longitude $12^{\circ} 44'$ E. of Greenwich, and Latitude $44^{\circ} 43'$ S.

Mean Time at Greenwich.

At the CAPE OF GOOD HOPE a Partial Eclipse is visible.

This Eclipse will be visible to South America, the South Atlantic Ocean; South Africa, and the Coasts and Islands adjacent.

The Sun will be Centrally Eclipsed at Noon, in Longitude $22^{\circ} 28'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $52^{\circ} 30'$ S., which place falls in the South Atlantic Ocean. In both South America and South Africa the effects of this Eclipse will engender quarrels, dissensions, and discord; much fighting, and the most savage deeds will be perpetrated.

IV.—A PARTIAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN,*December 2nd, invisible to England.*

Begins on the Earth generally December 2nd, 2h. 44m. 42s. a.m., in Longitude $13^{\circ} 17'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $65^{\circ} 1'$ S.

Greatest Eclipse, December 2nd, 3h. 11m. 6s. a.m. (Sun's diameter = 1) 0.040, in Longitude $42^{\circ} 43'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $67^{\circ} 56'$ S.

Ends on the Earth generally December 2nd, 3h. 37m. 36s. a.m., in Longitude $74^{\circ} 18'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $67^{\circ} 10'$ S.

Mean Time at Greenwich.

This Eclipse (which will be only a small defect on the Sun's disc) will be visible to Patagonia, Cape Horne; and the Coasts and Islands adjacent.


V.—A TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE MOON,

December 16th, *partly visible* to England.

The letter **M** denotes the *Middle*; and **E** the *End*.

At Greenwich the Moon will rise at 3h. 46m., p.m.

At the Middle of the Eclipse, the Moon will be vertical, or directly overhead, in Longitude $124^{\circ} 22'$ East of Greenwich, and Latitude $23^{\circ} 42'$ North, which place falls to the East of the Island of Formosa, in the North Pacific Ocean.


This Eclipse will be *partly visible* to the inhabitants of Great Britain; the Moon rising with us whilst she is totally eclipsed.

This will prove an interesting Eclipse in those parts of the Globe where the Moon has considerable elevation, and is visible during the whole time of the phenomenon. This Eclipse will be visible in Asia, Australia, New Zealand, Europe, Africa, and on the Pacific and Eastern Oceans.

VI.—A PARTIAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN,

December 31st, visible in England!

The following Type represents the Eclipse at Greenwich; here we have **VN** a vertical, and **HO** an horizontal line, passing through **S**, the Sun's centre; **CMD** the curve described by the Moon's centre; **B** the point where the dark body of the Moon makes the first visible impression on the Sun's periphery, where the Eclipse *begins*, and **E** the same where it *ends*; the former is 84° , and the latter 5° from the Sun's vertix.



The above Type, which represents the Eclipse for London and Greenwich, will practically serve for the whole of Great Britain.

In the Midland Counties it will be visible as a partial Eclipse of about 5 degrees, on the Sun's upper limb. This phenomenon will bring trouble, if not loss, to persons who were born on or near the day of Eclipse. The Eclipse will be visible to the Eastern Coast of North America; to a large Section of the North Atlantic Ocean; the Western parts of Europe; the United Kingdom, and to the Coasts and Islands adjacent. The chief effects of this Eclipse will be violent storms in the Atlantic for the next three months.

THE WINTER QUARTER;

Or the Sun's Transit through Capricorn, Aquarius, and Pegasus.

"Let day improve on day, and year on year,
Without a pain, a trouble, or a fear ;
Till death unfelt, that tender frame destroy,
In some soft dream or ecstasy of joy ;
Peaceful, sleep out the Sabbath of the tomb,
And wake to rapture in a life to come."

"All things are full of God"; thus spoke the great CICERO. We reiterate the mighty truth. Let each of us adopt it as a motto. Time remains stationary for no man, nor lags behind his period to suit any convenience, but pursues his apparently slow though really swift course, regardless of all human wishes. The year 1879, according to astronomical data, has fled !! I will endeavour to shew the meaning of those bright twinkling stars, and the mysteries yet in the womb of 1880. The Horoscope of the firmament at the precise period of the Sun's entrance into the sign Capricorn presents us with the 17th degree of Scorpio on the eastern Horoscope, and the 4th degree of Virgo on the southern angle. At this Ingress Mars is lord of the ascendant, and falling into the house of sickness ; Jupiter is on the cusp of the 4th, the house of the grave, and in direct opposition to Uranus ; and the Moon is conjoined with Saturn in Aries ! What may we judge from these fatal positions but numerous and most fearful diseases—a truly mortal period—coughs, bronchitis, and consumptions, lingering agues, violent pains in the head, and many sudden deaths in old England. And one cause of this melancholy evil will be cold, stormy, and tempestuous weather during the Winter ; and, as *Ramsey* declared to us, "an infectious air." The planet Jupiter, in the 4th house, denotes the death or downfall of some man in power during the ensuing Quarter ; and I apprehend the Ministry will not be very firm in their places. Mars in Taurus still excites violence and warlike feelings in parts of Africa ; our territories at the Cape still demand attention ; the expense of the Zulu war creates much discussion. Those holding the reins of power in India will find much that will give alarm and mistrust. A Royal Personage must succumb to the influence of Mars.

THE SPRING QUARTER;

Or the Sun's Transit through Aries, Taurus and Gemini.

“Who with a tongue profane will dare deny,
That Nature doth employ the orbs on high,
Pests, vigour, famine, bounty to dispense
From world to world?—Mysterious influence!
Light, heat, air, vapour, life, death, peace and wars—
What are they all?—The traffic of the stars.”

The Sun was, with propriety, called by the Ancients the Heart of Heaven. To this glorious luminary, the exhaustless fountain of universal Light and Life, we are indebted for the variations of the Seasons. He now begins to display his genial influence; for on *Saturday*, March the 20th, at 5h. 13m. a.m., he enters the first scruple of the Ram. In the Horoscope before us we find both Jupiter and Venus ascending; hence we judge that the condition of the populace appears to be thriving. Companies are formed, and works of an extensive nature appear to be carried on. Churches or public buildings will be begun or repaired. The Moon is ruler of the Sixth House, and squared by Saturn; at best, this testimony is evil: we may expect much mortality and illness; there are signs of ophthalmic diseases, fevers, and inflammatory complaints; earthquakes and other terrestrial scourges will be heard of. May England be free from the bane of these peculiar planetary influences! but we are fearful that the extent of them will be great. The monied interest appears under a momentary shade. India, Turkey, and many of the European Countries become agitated. Cupid seems to aim his darts rather spitefully this Quarter; the wanderings of the blind god will cause work for many a blue-bagged lawyer. The most afflicting feature is the position of Mars on the cusp of the 4th, which foreshows an evil time both for the landed interests and occupiers of the soil; and serious accidents and commotions in the mining districts. The ranging of Mars through Gemini will, it is to be feared, afflict London with fires and alarms; cruelty, murders, and violence to the female sex will be rife. America, Egypt, Lombardy, Sardinia, and the West of England will have a taste of this martial mischief. Certain indications point to the sudden demise of an exalted personage.



THE SUMMER QUARTER;

Or the Sun's Transit through Cancer, Leo, and Virgo.

“Is there some vast, some hidden magazine,
Where the gross darkness flames of fire supplies ;
Some phosphorous fabric, which the mountains screen,
Whose clouds of light above those mountains rise ;
Where the winds rattle loud around the foaming sea,
And lift the waves to heaven in thundering revelry ?”

The refulgency of the Summer may be said to have its astronomical commencement on *Monday*, the 21st of June, at 1h. 31m. a.m. The Sun then enters the constellation Cancer, and the celestial limits of his diurnal arc are extended to their greatest length. The theme of heaven has the 17th degree of Taurus on the ascendant, and the 20th degree of Capricorn on the culminating point. Venus claims dominion over the ascendant ; she is located in the 2nd house, in the sign Gemini, and in sextile to Saturn, ruler of the 10th and 11th houses. These configurations will excite much speculation in London and the United States of America. The most important feature for comment is the happy position of the Moon in trine to Saturn and Mars. This brings many advantages to this country ; honours, improving trade, &c., and a desire with those who have power “to do justice and love mercy.” Great changes are pending throughout Europe ; the combined efforts of despotism and duplicity must give way to the cause of civilization and enlightenment. The cruel chains of bondage shall be struck off. The current of progress sets in, and although time is necessary for the increase of its power, the cause of freedom must prevail. Some serious trouble and much expense will be witnessed in connection with the naval affairs of the land. Mars on the cusp of the 5th house denotes many troubles in schools, theatres, and places of amusement, some of which will fall to the ground ; or great trouble therein by fire, crowds, death, &c. This position of Mars will cause much trouble to women, miscarriages, and loss of children : this condition will be remarkably prevalent this year. Great excitement prevails in France and Italy, where the ruling powers are troubled and disordered. Uranus in Virgo is stirring up turmoil in Turkey, and the city of Paris will also come in for its share of the evil influence.

THE AUTUMN QUARTER;

Or the Sun's Transit through Libra, Scorpio, and Sagittarius.

“ ‘Tis from high life high characters are drawn ;
A saint in crape is twice a saint in lawn ;
A judge is just, a chanc’llor juster still ;
A gownsman learned ; a bishop what you will :
Wise if a minister ; but if a king
More wise, more learn’d, more just, more ev’rything.”

The Sun this year crosses the equatorial line and enters Libra on the 22nd of September, at 4h. 30m., in the afternoon. The figure of the expanse for this period of time exhibits the 16th degree of Aquarius on the ascendant, and the 11th degree of Sagittarius on the Mid-heaven. Both Jupiter and Saturn rule the Scheme, and those orbs will be found in conjunction in the 2nd house ; this is very ominous, and indicates a very untoward monetary, as also worse evils, for being opposed by Mars in Libra, signifies knaves, impostors, and thieves ; hence I look for a great increase of criminality during the Autumn. Much fraud and commercial delinquency will exist—forgery and swindling will be carried out to a great extent, and no doubt many fires will occur, causing great destruction to property ; let Fire Insurance Companies look thereto. The influences are bad for nearly all classes, particularly dealers in money, brokers, and clerical persons : some glaring acts of fraud or deceit will be brought to light in those circles. I also opine we shall lose an eminent lawyer or divine. Venus in the 8th house, conjoined with Mars and opposed by Jove, is of peculiar import, as Jupiter rules the 10th, the house of Royalty and Aristocracy. Some unexpected occurrences in reference to the highest circles, and some disclosures made which will seriously affect the fame of the fairer sex. The aspects of the Ingress are unfortunate for females ; cruelty and violence to the sex will be rife. Venus in the house of Death ! symbolically declares the demise of females of note ! Scanning the Continent, and the leading men of the age, we find them suffering from evil influences, which are calculated to mislead their judgment. Mars in Libra induces the Chinese to war, the Austrians to rebel ; the Spaniards very discontented—they are still pugnacious and riotous.

This will be a pleasing recreation, as well as to prove the truth, or otherwise, of the Science of Astro-Meteorology.

USEFUL HINTS.—LEGAL & COMMERCIAL.

I. O. U's. are received in evidence as acknowledgments of debts.

The penalty attaches only to a person giving a receipt on *un-stamped paper*.

A copyright extends to 42 years.

A Judge's Order is not superseded by the Statute of Limitations.

Employers are not obliged to give characters to servants, or to assign a reason for their refusal.

The Statute of Limitations does not avail a debtor living beyond the seas part of the time.

Waste Land by the side of the road belongs to the adjoining freehold or the Lord of the Manor.

Copper coin is not a *legal tender* beyond 1s., or silver beyond 20s., but gold may be tendered to any amount.

A person giving a *false character* with a servant, renders himself liable to an action.

Payment of *interest* on a debt takes it out of the operation of the Statute of Limitations.

Wearing apparel and tools are protected from seizure under an *execution* from the County Court.

The *Bank of England* does not allow interest on money deposited for security.

A *guarantee* for payment of a debt must be in writing.

Tradesmen cannot be compelled to sell their goods at the prices marked in the windows.

Goods *pledged* to a pawnbroker are considered forfeited after the lapse of a year and a day.

Legatees under a will should not be witnesses to its execution as the legacy is thereby rendered void.

One half of the personal property of an *intestate*, dying without children, goes to his widow.

A verbal *death-bed gift* of property is of no avail.

Persons may be married at any time within three months after the publication of *banns*.

Card-playing is not allowed in public houses.

An action may be sustained in the County Court for *defamation* of character.

The rules of a *Loan Society* must be submitted for certificate to Mr. J. M. Ludlow.

Persons acting as *jurors* in criminal cases are not paid anything for so doing.

County Court *witnesses* who reside within a certain distance are allowed mileage.

Publicans cannot recover for beer, &c., consumed upon the premises.

An *Income Tax Collector* is bound to demand the money only once.

Horticultural, Botanical, and Herbal Guide, FOR 1880.

JANUARY.—In open and dry weather sow in mild exposure for a succession a few early frame peas, common beans, short-topped radishes, lettuces, carrots, onions, spinach, and curled parsley, protecting them from the frost by mats or straw. Plant, prune, and train fruit trees and bushes. Form new flower gardens, and shelter from frost tender evergreens, tulips, &c. Plant snowdrops, crocuses, &c. *Herbs* to be gathered are groundsel, chickweed, archangel, and others which are in flower.

FEBRUARY.—Make ready all the ground intended for early crops; and when the weather is favourable, continue to sow every fortnight peas, beans, onions, spinach, savoys, lettuce, celery, cauliflowers, carrots, parsnips, and radishes. Cut early kidney potatoes for seed, and put them in a stove or hot-bed in order to start them for planting out. Plant out evergreens and shrubs of all kinds, particularly roses, &c. Prune vine and fruit trees. *Herbs* to be gathered: foalfoot, lingwort, pilewort, speedwell, chickweed, shepherd's purse, and broom.

MARCH.—The principal crops of vegetables should be put into the ground this month. Sow asparagus, celery, cauliflowers, broccoli, spinach, onions, carrots, peas, beans, savoys, parsnips, radishes, &c. Plant red cabbage and sea-kale: sow cucumbers and melons in hot beds. Finish pruning, dress borders and strawberry beds. This is the best time for grafting fruit trees, perpetual and moss roses, &c. Pot dahlias and cuttings. Plant pinks, polyanthus, carnations, &c. *Herbs* to be gathered for medicinal purposes: coltsfoot, fumitory, pilewort, ladyfrock, lesser celandine, violet and comfrey roots, and all kinds of herbal bark.

APRIL.—Continue to sow and plant rhubarb, artichokes, asparagus, sea-kale, Dutch turnips, German greens, and small salading. Earth up peas, tie up lettuce, and in very dry weather water seedling beds. Finish the grafting of fruit trees, and train and clean walks and edgings. Sow annuals, biennials, and perennials. Plant evergreens and propagate by cutting, jasmine, lavender, sage, rosemary, rue, &c. Sow early Dutch turnips. *Herbs* to be gathered: ground ivy, dandelions, avens, buttercups, and others which are in flower, as well as all kinds of bark.

MAY.—Sow peas, cucumber, red beet for pickling, and a full crop for kidney beans. Transplant cabbages, winter greens, cauliflowers, and celery. Hoe and stake peas, water newly-planted crops, and propagate aromatic plants by slips or cuttings. Plant dahlias, if their be no appearance of frost, and protect from wind and rain choice tulips, &c. Propagate herbaceous plants by dividing the roots. *Herbs* to be cut: celandine, milkwort, moonwort, wood sorrel, and adder's tongue.

JUNE.—Top beans and peas to assist the filling of the pods. Set kidney beans, and transplant cabbage, savoys, broccoli, and sow turnips. Thin out onions, leeks, carrots, parsnips, and early turnips. Gather and preserve kitchen herbs. Shade and air melon plants, &c. Bulbous roots that have done flowering should now be taken up, and the off-sets separated. *Herbs* to be cut: avens, brooklime, centuary, comfrey, woodbine, valerian, eyebright, pimpernel, speedwell, and elecampane.

Horticultural, Botanical, and Herbal Guide, FOR 1880.

JULY.—In this month prepare all unoccupied plots of ground for autumn and winter crops. Sow turnips, radishes, &c. Plant out broccoli, cauliflower, savoys, leeks, and winter cabbages, and earth up celery. Lift full grown winter onions, and prepare mushroom spawn. In fine weather, gather medicinal flowers and sweet herbs, when in bloom, dressing them first in the sun, & then in the shade for winter use. *Herbs* to be cut are all that are in flower, as lavender, tansey, vervain, bedstraw, agrimony, cinquefoil, mountainflax, foxglove, and meadow sweet.

AUGUST.—Sow early cabbages and parsley for the succeeding year; also spinach, broccoli, and cauliflower to stand the winter; earth celery; hoe and thin turnips; transplant broccoli, savoys, and cauliflower, and the principal crop of celery into the trenches for blanching. Make mushroom beds: propagate kitchen herbs by slips, and take up all onions, garlic and shallots that are withered in the stem. Sow the seed of bulbous flowers in pots. *Herbs* to be cut: all mints and sage, golden rod, pond weed, yellow gentian, tansey, mugwort, and loosestrife.

SEPTEMBER.—Plant savoys, broccoli, cauliflower, leeks, celery, and perennial aromatic and pot herbs. Hoe winter spinach and turnips, earth up celery and cardoons, prick out cabbage plants, gather ripe seed, &c. Pull onions if the tops appear dying. Plant cuttings of gooseberries, currants, raspberries, and strawberries, taking out the old stools which have twice produced fruit. *Herbs* to be gathered: angelica, field gentian, valerian, feverfew, southernwood, briony, and wild berries.

OCTOBER.—Plant home radishes, early cabbages, and other greens neglected last month, in sheltered situations; also cauliflower, mint, and tarragon, in frames for winter use. Earth up savoys and cabbages as high as the leaves. Take up carrots and parsnips, cut off their tops and bury them in dry sand. Crop the tops of parsley, to make fresh leaves for winter. Transplant fruit trees and shrubs after the 10th day. Gather tree seeds: and sow for stocks. *Herbs* to be gathered: ivy, yarrow, wall rue, shepherd's purse, broom, rape, wall cress, and wild berries.

NOVEMBER.—Dig the ground where the crops are carried off, and which is not intended to plant again till spring: manure and prune fruit trees. Shallots are readily propagated by off-sets. A stiffish soil and open aspect should be preferred. These off-sets, or "claws," should have their bases only pressed into the ground, without being covered. Tulips and hyacinth roots may be planted. *Herbs*: not many to be gathered this month for medicinal uses, except rose moss, rock fern, and polypody.

DECEMBER.—In this month forward the business of manuring, digging, or trenching vacant ground. Set all sorts of stones, kernels, &c. Complete tree planting, and forward all winter pruning. Continue planting various hardy roots, bulb and shrubs. If frosty weather, be particular to protect all tender plants, trees, &c. Earth up celery. Sow small salad in warm borders, covered with mats. *Herbs* to be gathered: rose moss, rock fern, polypody, evergreens, and the mistletoe.

HOW TO TAKE THE TEMPERAMENT.

Take the nature of the sign ascending at the *hour* of birth, the nature of the Sun and Moon with regard to the signs they possess, and the true nature of any planet which may be found in the ascendant, or in conjunction of the Sun or Moon, without any regard to the signs they occupy.

When *heat* and *moisture* predominate, the native is **SANGUINE**; when *cold* and *dryness* predominate, **NERVOUS**; when *cold* and *moisture* predominate, **LYMPHATIC**; when *hot* and *dry* predominate, **BILIOUS**.

When the Sun, Moon, and Ascendant, are in signs of the same nature, and in conjunction of Planets of a similar nature to the signs they occupy, the temperament will be extreme, and prove detrimental to health.

ASPECTS AND THEIR CHARACTERS.

♂ *Conjunction* is good with Jupiter, Venus, and the Moon; but is evil with the Moon to Mars, Saturn, or Uranus; with others moderate. * *Sextile*, and Δ *Trine*, are good configurations with all. S.□ *Semisquare*, and SS.□ *Sesquisquare*, and 8 *Opposition*, are bad aspects with all the planetary bodies.

UNMIXED TEMPERAMENT.

The Sanguine Temperament.

The *Sanguine* person has a *clear, florid, blooming, and pleasant complexion*, what is usually termed *fair complexion*, and has an animated air of the countenance. The more florid the complexion the more sanguine, as far as this singularity is concerned. The *sanguine temperament* is further indicated by *light or chestnut coloured hair, blue eyes, and sparkling*; by the easy and voluble motions of the body, the *muscles hard and firm*; combining grace and variety; *body rather plump and fleshy*. With this temperament, of which the physical circumstances I have stated are the indications combined—*spirits lively and boisterous*; but the feelings are singularly evanescent, and liable to be easily displaced, and succeeded by new impressions.

THE BILIOUS TEMPERAMENT.

The *Bilious* or *Choleric* Temperament is more noble than the *Sanguine*. Is indicated by a darker swarthy complexion, of a ruddy character, dark brown, black, or red bushy hair; harsh skin, the eyes brown or hazel, vigorous, ardent, and piercing; strong and well defined muscular features. They are less than in the *Sanguine*, but harder, and of a fiery confident aspect. *Bilious* persons have in everything a character of vigour and intensity; their susceptibilities, though as easily excited, are more vivid than in the *Sanguine*, and are more under the dominion of real feeling.

THE NERVOUS TEMPERAMENT.

The *Nervous* or *Melancholic* Temperament evinces itself by a dry spare constitution; by a pale sallow complexion, by a sunken eye; by the cold, soft, heavy, languid outline; by its long features; by the delicate feminine form; by the fine black or brown hair; by the smooth skin, with small muscles; and by its unvarying character of permanent emotion. The *Bilious* and *Nervous* man possesses great energy and strong passions, overstepping the low, grovelling law of necessity, by which the bulk of mankind are urged to crawl their little rounds. The *Nervous* Temperament, when mixed with the *bilious*, its sensibilities are refined, which are essential to genius. To these mixed, almost all the great men may be traced, the leaders of mankind, who guide and govern in the arduous struggle of contending interests and passions.

THE LYMPHATIC TEMPERAMENT.

The *Lymphatic* or *Phlegmatic* Temperament is the least excitable of all the temperaments; it seems to be the morbid condition of the *sanguine*; it is characterised by a *clear, soft, doughy skin, with full fleshy body, light hair, light grey eyes, pale complexion*; the countenance is soft undefined outline, heavy, indolent, and unmeaning; abounds with watery, tenacious mucilage; the slimy blood languid. This temperament was very large in the persons of *Daniel Lambert*. The *Sanguine Phlegmatic* is a good combination, producing mild and estimable, if not highly energetic and commanding characters.

OBSERVATIONS ON THE CLIMATE OF THE BRITISH ISLES.

JANUARY.—This is generally our coldest month ; but in our variable climate, it, like other months, has no decided character. There is usually some change of weather near the 6th or 7th of this month, as it is the closing day of the Quarterly Storm period. When colder than usual, the extreme of frost generally occurs between the 13th and 26th days. Strong westerly winds usually prevail in mild winters, near the close of the month. But in variable seasons after mild weather it becomes severe at the end, and goes on for another fit of winterly weather.

FEBRUARY.—In this month we have frequently frost and snow, and more generally chilling rains and sleet, which are yet more uncomfortable than the direct severities of January ; yet occasionally a few days present a singular contrast of brilliancy and clearness. Many severe winters break about the 9th or 24th of this month, either for a time, or entirely.

MARCH.—This month is the opening period of vernal vicissitudes, and violent gales now often occur from any point, but more generally about the 20th, from S.W. If rain and wind prevail much between the 17th and 21st, from S.W., expect a showery summer ; but if N.E. winds prevail, look for a drier summer than usual. Whenever very calm and soft sunny weather comes hastily in March, we may be certain that it will only bring back some of the horrors of winter as suddenly.

APRIL.—This month is the time for the greatest vicissitudes, especially in the temperature. So great are the changes, and often so sudden, that the heat of summer, and the cold of ordinary winter, may make frequent alterations in less than a fortnight, so that at no other period is it so needful as now for the delicate, to guard themselves to meet it. About the 23rd, there is usually a change of weather to very warm, if it has been long previously cold. Sometimes real summer heat comes all at once, between the 23rd and 27th, attended by thunder.

MAY.—This month is almost as changeable as the preceding, and much N.E. wind usually prevails. A strong breeze from the East on or near the 20th, may in some years prevail, and in such case it foreshows a dry and barren time. A marked change to warmer air about the 10th and 15th, and even when the East wind continues late in the month, its chilling effect becomes very much softened, so that we often have hot weather at the close of May, attended by thunder and hail.

JUNE.—A marked difference in the weather is manifest about the 12th day of this month ; summer often fully opens then, and often suddenly, after previous cold and gloom. Severe thunder and hail at times prevail in June, especially during Midsummer week. Whenever the clover crop is forward enough to be cut by the 12th, it generally proves to be the best period to secure it ; from that day to the 20th, rather than afterwards.

OBSERVATIONS ON THE CLIMATE OF THE BRITISH ISLES.

JULY.—During this month the winds usually blow from S.W. and S.E. In showery seasons the former are predominant, and many heavy thunder storms prevail from the 6th to the 8th day, which time must be watched for travelling, pleasure, or haymaking. The aforesaid days, and the 15th, 23rd, and 29th, are generally found to be attended with thunder storms, or some atmospheric disturbance. The hot breezes from the E. and S.E., threaten us with thunder from S.W., which is sure to come if a sudden fall of the barometer occurs during intervals of bright hot weather.

AUGUST.—This month is another important period, both for the farmer and the nation generally, and the barometer must be consulted, and the point of wind regarded. It is usually a month of great heat, owing to the radiation now produced by the heated Earth. The prevalent wind now is S.W., with intervals of E. and N.E. ; and when a breeze at E. or S.E., and much heat prevails at the time we anticipate sudden thunder storms from S.W.

SEPTEMBER.—This month, in some years, we have great heat, like to summer, for the heat of the soil counteracts the shortening of the solar power from above, and cause strong radiation. The weather of this month is mostly opposite to that of May in the same year. We often experience storms and much atmospheric disturbance during the last week of this month, produced by the equinoctial crises, which is the *fourth* period noted for storms, when we should be cautious how we venture on a pleasure trip ; watch the barometer, and avoid the sea.

OCTOBER.—Some atmospheric disturbance usually obtains up to the 7th or 8th of this month, attended with strong winds, thunder, or violent rains. In a few instances we have this month dry and summer like ; but it is more generally a time of great rain than otherwise ; yet bright sunshine and great warmth may intervene. Towards the end the emblems of the dying year present themselves in rapid and melancholy succession, by the fall of the foliage, and the moaning gale heralding the icy car of winter.

NOVEMBER.—The shortened days, and the frequent cold rains and fogs, fully justify the title which has been given to this month, viz.—“The gloomy month of November”—yet in some seasons, we have known many fine and bright days in this month. Near the end we often have some frosty and keen nights, or violent gales, which completes the fall of the foliage.

DECEMBER.—It is noticeable that the 6th, 22nd, and 31st of this month, if mild weather, generally produces violent winds. The last Quarterly Magnetic Storm Period commences on or about the 21st of this month ; and this is one crisis of some great change or fresh establishment of weather. Mild Autumns now give place to cold weather, or cold seasons for a time give up to mildness and storm.

THE AUTUMNAL METEORS IN 1880.

August Meteors.—The passage of the August Meteors in 1880 will take place on *Tuesday*, the 10th of August, at about 30 minutes after midnight. The Meteors may therefore be expected to be favourably observed during the night, as there will be a total absence of Moonlight during the display.

November Meteors.—The near approach of our Earth to the stream of the November Meteors will this year take place on *Saturday*, the 13th of November, at about 8h. in the afternoon, and the Meteors may therefore be expected to be visible during the evening, but many of the *small* Meteors will be obscured by Moonlight.

OBSERVATIONS ON THE SUN.

PROFESSOR RUDOLPH, in a lengthy paper on the Sun, says: "It is a molten or white hot mass, equalling in bulk 1,260,000 worlds like our own, having a surrounding gas on fire 50,000 miles deep, tongues of flame darting up more than 50,000 miles, volcanic forces that hurl into the solar atmosphere luminous matter to the height of 160,000 miles, drawing to itself all the worlds belonging to our family of planets, and holding them all in their proper places; attracting with such superior force the millions of solid stray masses that are wandering in the fathomless abyss, that they rush helplessly towards him, and fall into his fiery embrace! and thus he continues his sublime and restless march through his mighty orbit, having a period of more than 18,000,000 years!"

OBSERVATIONS ON THE MOON.

"SIR W. HERSCHEL has spoken of the lunar seasons as though they resembled our own, but in reality they are very different. Thus day lasts more than a fortnight, and is followed by a night of equal length. Nor is this all. There is neither air nor moisture to produce such effects as are produced by our air and the moisture it contains in mitigating the heat of day and the cold of night. Under the Sun's rays the Moon's surface becomes hotter and hotter as the long lunar day proceeds, until at last its heat exceeds that of boiling water; but soon as the Sun has set, the heat thus received is rapidly radiated away into space (no screen of moisture-laden air checking its escape), and long before lunar midnight a cold exists, compared with which the bitterest weather ever experienced by Arctic voyagers would be oppressively hot. The range of change certainly amounts to about 500° , and in whatever way we distribute it, we must admit, first, that no such life as we are familiar with could possibly exist on the Moon; and secondly, that the Moon's crust must possess a life of its own, so to speak, expanding and contracting unceasingly and energetically."

SHIPWRECKS.

"Diplomacy is active, but the wily schemes of Russia and her secret supporters can only be counteracted by a bold and straightforward course of conduct."—*Orion's Almanac*.

After describing at great length the Russian intrigues at Cairo, and a secret treaty between the Czar and Khedive ; and, as a result the latter's *coup d'etat* against the financial representatives of England and France, the Correspondent of the *Daily Telegraph* writes—Only by one means can the Viceroy's schemes be paralysed, and that is by an absolute and perfect concord between France and England."

MORE RUSSIAN SCHEMING.

"But Urs Major shakes his paw over Turkey, while he glances a scowl at Persia, and even beyond, towards India."—*Orion*, for the spring quarter.—"The Russian Circular has disturbed the temporary sense of security on the everlasting Eastern Question like the explosion of a bomb shell. The revision of the Treaty of Berlin is requested in what is held to be its most vital provision. The Czar declares that when his troops are withdrawn the Bulgarians will resist to the death the erection of the proposed Turkish fortresses along the range of the Balkans. It is impossible to escape the uneasy suspicions that Russian intrigue is at the bottom of this, and that the Zulu war has something to do with the Latitudinarian view which the Russians are inclined to take of the treaty of Berlin."—*St. Leonard's Gazette*. FRENCH DISQUIETUDE.

"France suffers disquiet; attempts are made to inflame the public mind."—*Orion*, for February.

At this time, in addition to the overwhelming defeat of the Legitimists and Imperialists in the French capital, there were riots at Lyons which assumed a peculiarly anti-religious aspect. A crowd, estimated at 25,000, paraded the streets with sticks and lanterns, and bawled revolutionary cries and songs.—*St. Leonard's Gazette*.

MORE TROUBLES FOR OLD ENGLAND.

"On the 6th day [February] Saturn again enters the ruling sign of old England. Sad will be the period of his stay in that sign, which will endure till the beginning of April, 1881; and speedily will the evil effects show themselves."—*Orion*. "The transits for this month do not vary much from those of last. Saturn still works his way into Aries, troubling our country with sundry evils and misfortunes."—*Raphael*, for March.

Troubles and disasters are again coming thickly upon us. Fifty fine fellows of a squadron of Hussars have been carried away by the current while crossing the Cabul River, and another disaster has happened to the British Army at the Cape in the storming of a convoy of waggons by Zulus, and the killing of 60 men, including Captain Moriarty and Surgeon Cobbin. The Egyptian Khedive has also revolted against the British and French financiers, and the French have disquieted us by their seizure of the Island of Matacong. Thus one trouble after another comes to the front, and soon in turn makes way for the next.—*St. Leonard's Gazette*.

STORMS IN FEBRUARY.

"Violent storms in Spain, Portugal, Hungary, Alexandria," &c. "From the 21st to 23rd, cold, dark, and burly atmosphere, with sleet and restless winds."—*Orion's Almanac*.

Winter seems to have returned again in full force over a considerable portion of Western Europe. An extraordinary storm, which in two or three hours on February 21st, covered London and the surrounding counties with a coating of snow, was only the northern skirt of a tempest, or series of tempests, which spent their chief fury over Spain, France and Switzerland. . . . At Bordeaux the storm was spoken of as a repetition of the terrible cyclone of Aug., 1877. It swept the whole country from the Pyrenees to the Alps, and from the Atlantic to the Mediterranean.—*The Week's News*.

Another heavy snowstorm in Madrid. The tempest has lasted over four days, and has caused much damage and loss of life.—*St. Leonard's Gazette*.
