



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

IS SPIRITUALISM GROWING? What Has Been Accomplished?

It would be interesting briefly to consider the Spiritualistic move ment as illustrating the glory of achievement. Too many people measure the value and dignity of a movement by its tabulated results They know nothing of silent forces and influences. They cannot appreciate a message without figures. They attach no importance what ever to the signs of the times, to intimations, to tendencies. They are not impressed, for example, by the statement that Spiritualism has en tered the orthodox church as a vitalizing power, that it colors the utterances of many pulpits, and that there are in religious circles upheavals and great mass-movements towards its acceptance.

FALSE STANDARDS OF MATERIALISM

They are blind to the significance of the program of the Confra ternity in England under the leadership of M. A. St. Clair Stobart and Rev. G. Maurice Elliott. They ignore the onrush of deep currents of thought in scientific and philosophical groups. With eyes fixed upon charts and diagrams, with ears dulled by the roar of organized ma chinery, with hands set upon the keys of an adding machine, they are the pitiful victims of the false standards of that very materialism which we are foresworn to destroy. This indictment includes not only the sceptical outsider, but also those who would make of Spiritualisn just another sectarian movement, bound by narrow interpretations and limited by creed.

READ SPIRITUALISTIC LITERATURE ! ! !

We can answer such persons with figures -startling figures but even so we should have but the broad, sweeping outlines of a mighty picture. It requires a long, dispassionate, discriminating view to appreciate the backgrounds and foregrounds of Spiritualism) but every inch of the vast canvas is aglow with meaningful thought colors to the perceiving mind. Most persons who dismiss this Spirit ualism as a thing of momentary importance only are totally ignorant of the subject. They prattle of facts and at the same time refuse to look at those facts which fairly shout at them from every side. In fact, they don't know what a fact is. Facts are concrete things which do not enter into the consciousness of superficial thinkers. A clever man once said, "Many people who think they are thinking are not thinking at all. They are simply rearranging their prejudices!

To those who want to know. I say: Read Spiritualistic literature if you are disposed to think that the days of great things have been superseded by the commonplace. TRUMPET MEDIUMSHIP BEGINS

As Told By FREDERIC HARDING

Many have put in long and apparently fruitless hours in de-now. veloping classes. Nothing happened to any of the hopeful pupils. The floor of the seance room has been littered with long thin-metal megaphones. We have been trying, with a patience that makes that of Job seem like fretful restlessness to develop "directvoice mediumship."

We have all witnessed perfect manifestations of fully developed trumpet mediums, who always admit that the gift had developed gradually. But most of us wonder what the intervening stages, between zero and one hundred percent, were like. The idea whets our curiosity.

"Home Circle" Technique

In Mary Olson's trumpet "getting," she sat at the end of the room. In horseshoe formation, the "circle" faced her. The customary and insulating prayer and hymn singing ended, we would soon hear a voice as of a sleeping giant breathing heavily or sometimes a deep exhalation as of a great bellows being crushed flat. Again, the sound would be thinner as of a steam radiator valve under pressure, more sibilant, suggesting an attempt to form syllables.

Our procedure was to assume that we were in contact with a discarnate spirit who knew one of us present, and who was trying

to break through, like an entombed miner digging his way to the light of day, to effect communication with the earthly entity that was known. By the ancient "trial and error" process of elimination. we would, in turn, one after the other, cry "You're welcome! God bless you! Do you come to me?' This formula set up the voice vibration on a thought wave of encouragement and Divine protection from impersonation.





34 Pupils Rushed to Safety **Before Ceiling Falls**

A teacher's intuition — a message from God, Providence --something like that saved the lives of 34 small children in Joplin, Missouri — could it have been a spirit communication to a medium who did not know that she could receive spirit messages?

It happened in the West Central school of Joplin. A teacher, Miss Dollie Board, had just settled herself and her first grade pupils down for another morning's work when something told her that an awful thing was about to happen in her room - something that would harm the children unless she acted promptly.


Children Warned She called to her 34 tots:

"Run, children; let's see who can get out of the room first!' They responded promptly and without confusion. They all rushed out into the hall in an orderly fashion and with hardly a second to spare down crashed three or four tons of plaster and metal lath from the ceiling of the room. Desks were splintered. The legs of the teacher's desk were liter ally driven into the floor.

Miss Board was excited. She could give no other explantion than that she had a "premonition" of something dreadful and had act ed as any teacher would have done, to save the pupils in her charge.

Miss Board's "hunch" not only saved the lives of her class but it provoked a wholesale examination of the ceilings of other rooms in a new addition to the school. All classes in that part of the building were accommodated elsewhere until the inspection could be completed.



Sir Arthur Conan Doyle was, in his day, Spiritualism's greatest champion. His inquiry into our subject began in 1887, nearly 30 years before the War, and not, as our opponents have said, because of his son's passing in Europe's great carnage.

When, during the War, he saw all around him the sorrow and suffering caused by bereavement, he dedicated the rest of his earthly life to the spreading of the New Knowledge.

We give below excerpts jaken from his two famous books, "The New Revelation" and "The Vital Message."* now published in one volume.

Messages from the dead have been received in many lands at various times, mixed up with a good deal about this world, which we could verify. When messages come thus, it is only fair, I think, to suppose that if what we can test is true then what we cannot test is true also.

When in addition we find a very great uniformity in the messages and an agreement as to details which are not at all in accordance with any pre-existing scheme of thought, then I think the presumption of truth is very-strong.

It is difficult to think that some fifteen or twenty messages from various sources of which I have personal notes, all agree, and yet are all wrong, nor is it easy to ing is usually both easy and painsuppose that spirits can tell the truth about our world but untruth about their own.
