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

FORD'S BROADCAST

Spiritualism is the most *rapidly* growing religious movement in this country. It is also one of the most widely *misunderstood* movements. It numbers, among its millions of adherents, many of the best known people in the world.

Spiritualists have every sort of racial. religious and cultural backgrounds. They have one thing in common . . . they have all witnessed and studied *psychic phenomena*, and through these phenomena proved. to *their own satisfaction*, the fact of personal conscious survival after death, and communication between the living and the so-called dead.

Thus they have a scientific basis for believing that the cardinal tenets of whatever religion they profess are true. All the great world religions have taught that man has within him a spiritual quality that survives physical death.

There Is Something More

onstrable fact. Sir Oliver Lodge once wrote. "No modern science rests upon a greater body of ascertained fact than does Spiritualism."

WHAT IS SPIRITUALISM? Literally it is the antithesis of materialism. In a strict sense, every person is either a spiritualist or a materialist. From the most learned scholar down to the most

It was through his psychic faculties that Houdini's agreed upon code was received in 1929 by his wife, Beatrice Houdini. ION: It is a *science* because it deals with *facts*. It is concerned with phenomena occurring in the material world, and with the inferences to be drawn therefrom. It observes, records, classifies and then states an explanatory hypothesis.

That is what all the inductive sciences do: that is. the science which are concerned with large masses of facts from which inferences are made. *Spiritualism relies on observation*. Scientists cannot attack it on the score of its method, for its method is scientific.

Sir Oliver Lodge says. "I have never known an honest man who seriously investigated our claims and then gave an honest verdict, who did not admit that these phenomena occur: neither have I ever known a man who carried his investigations to the point of making an interpretation, who did not agree that the only interpretation comprehensive enough to cover all the facts is the simple one we believe to be true; that through these phenomena those who once loved reach back to those still living on earth."

Letters Jo a Soldier

This is the second in a series of articles, written by ARTHUR J. WILLS 224 Herrick Road, Riverside, Illinois. In these "LETTERS TO A SOLDIER," Mr. Wills, author of the book "NOW and FOR-EVER," explains some of the "WHYS and WHEREFORES" of spirit communication.

Second Letter

Dear Friend:

In our first letter, we tried to briefly outline some idea of God. naturally inadequate, since we are but limited atoms of being and can only understand small items of Spiritual knowledge. "For revelation is less TO a man than IN a man."

However, this attempt lifts us out of the castiron groove of environment and the foggy knowledge of our childhood and enables us to see the wondrous vision of realities "beyond physics".

Any feeble explanation may also take us beyond the grasp of the backwardlooking leaders of our youth (and today) who are marking time in the footprints of the past. Many of these leaders are hypnotised by the notion of a static (and therefore DEAD) faith "once delivered to the saints" (whoever they may be). This faith was established by the shortsighted vision of their predecessors.

Reflection on the past developments of humanity assures us that, "God gives his message to EVERY age, with revelations suited to its growth," whether it be in those rare moments of overpowering illumination when, for an all too brief flash, we "see and hear unutterable things" as Paul puts it; or whether it be more prosaic, material revelations, such as Galileo and his telescope opened up, despite the blind 'authorities?' of his day, who "seeing. see not, hearing. hear not, neither can they understand."

As to the soul, its birth, etc., "There is a spirit in man," says the ancient writer, "He hath given us of His Spirit," "The spirit giveth understanding" (the spirit, not the mind). Today Psychic Science has confirmed these statements, though few heed the message.

Here let us clear up one greatly misunderstood point, Psychic Science is not a religion of itself, although it is the basis for a sublime concept of a spiritual religion. Psychic Science (science being ordered knowledge) seeks to study and understand those obscure and generally misunderstood phenomena.

The Soul—An Independent Reality

These phenomena were common in all ages, among all peoples and religions, from time immemorial. These phenomena will illuminate our minds and reveal the truth of spirit communication and continuing life after we "shuffle off this mortal coil." "Religion is NOT an institution, book, creed. dogma, theology, form or ceremony, but is a CORRECT WAY OF LIFE in our relationship to God and our fellowmen."

We have been misled and continue to mislead others by talking "My souls" as if the body-was-the reality and owned a soul. we must re-learn and Know that "I 'AM' A SOUL" and own a material body, not vice versa.

As the great Teacher said, "YE are the Temple of God and the Spirit of God DWELLETH IN YOU." That is, an individuated atom of INEFFABLE SPIRIT becomes clothed with a psychic, ethereal or spiritual body, and together they constitute what we call "the soul". When this soul combination enters into and permeates the physical body, a human being is born.

(A) "At the moment of conception life begins (in the sense of 'livingness' vitality, not consciousness) in the physical embryo, and also in the etheric, psychic or spiritual state, all developing simultaneously. These phases evolve parallel to each other, the physical-not having vet reached the stage of developed nerves to transmit sensation, or brain to register or enable the soul to permeate it and become conscious and interpret the brain records—has only vitality to continue to the ultimate stage of birth."

"As the physical embryo develops so does the soul (spirit and

come focalized and individualized. Hence, the conclusion is clear, that even with those children who are still-born, the Spirit has unfolded sufficiently to have 'fixed its individuality'. It is an immortal being.' ANDREW JACKSON DAVIS.

In general we are apt to "concentrate too exclusively on physical phenomena," the outward manifestation, and ignore the noumena, the reality, the inward essence behind all manifestations.

"The mind is an instrument through which the real entity, the T. or spirit, contacts the brain and, operating through it, causes the physical phenomena we recognize as life, thought, action. Matter and mind are different phases in the manifestation of one and the same being, which is neither mind nor matter, but spirit, imminent in. yet transcending its physical and mental instruments."

The Destiny and Purpose of Man's Being

"The individual 'I', or noumenon, or entity, being a something of itself, is apart from and independent of mind, its instrument (as the body is also its physical instrument, via the mind and brain) and, at least at present, equally indefinable and transcends the limits of the mind it uses, being an individual point, as it were, of Ineffable Spirit. with infinite gradations and combinations between such point and the mental and physical components of man as we normally cognize him. The 'I' is not merely the summation of our fluctuating memories."

"Consciousness, the awareness of being (as. I am that which I am becoming, since we are never static), and of other individual beings is inherent in the essential individual entity, and is therefore apart from the mind which memorizes and formulates ideas in earth terms, impressing them on the brain which receives the ideas impressed upon it by the mind, its nearest of kin, so to speak.

"The exact process of this mind activation we do not yet know. But we know that the 'I' does not go with the body, though that is our accustomed and habitual impression from appearances. The 'I' moves the body to go where it, the 'I.' desires or need calls it."

The subject is too great to be adequately dealt with in a brief letter but we have touched upon some salient points that may help you to think out the problem further.

It seems more important to inquire into the destiny and purpose of man's being, that we may be able to guide ourselves into a COR-**RECT WAY OF LIFE** in our relationships to God and our fellowman. That will be the theme of our next letter.

tion." It has only been in the last twenty-five or thirty years that this association has been known as Lily Dale Assembly, "The Largest Spiritualist Camp in the World.'

Lily Dale is, in reality, a city in itself. The assembly controls and operates this little village comprising some eight hundred acres. There are two hundred and fifty fire department, and up-to-date

visitors to Lily Dale are reasonably sure to find suitable living quarters during the hot summer months. The Cafeteria. where very good food is served, is also centrally located.

In the large Auditorium, located a short distance from the assembly entrance overlooking the lake, daily lectures and message services are held each summer throughout the entire months of July and August.

She Convinces Thousands

The Fox Cottage, in its original form and structure is without a doubt one of Lily Dale's outstanding attractions. It was transferred from Hydesville. N. Y., in 1916, at which time. Flo Cottrell. famous rapping medium was engaged because she possessed the same phase of mediumship accredited to the Fox sisters.

The Fox Cottage is a quaint little house and Miss Cottrell is well qualified to meet and, through her mediumship. to convince thousands of visitors each year. She is a sincere unassuming woman -patience incarnate.

Day in and day out, each summer it can be proven. through her mediumship, that not only did the spirit people use a code. by rapping out intelligent messages in 1848, but that this same power continues to operate, proving over and over again that the dead do cottages, two hotels, a cafeteria, a live, and can, under proper condi-

osychic body). The soul, as in adults, IS THE REALITY independent of the physical body in which it is immersed and to which it is attached by the psychic cord (silver cord of the Psalmist) through which the life force passes, as electric current passes through a wire. It is cared for in the spirit world by those best fitted to care for it and foster its development paralleled to that of the physical body, until birth takes place.'

"At birth (the physical vehicle being then fully formed and developed), simultaneously with the first breath and cry, the spirit enters into and permeates its earthly temple and the child becomes "a living soul," no longer attached to and dependent on the mother. The very first breath and cry shows the first rudimentary physical consciousness responding to sensations, via the newly developed nerves and brain.

An Immortal Being With Fixed Personality

"The child in psychic life, though otherwise living, has no physical body until born into its new tenement of flesh, coincidally developed (page 26) though the embryonic physical body of the child, perishes unborn and the individual. Spiritual, real life continues and develops like all others.

"This is why children, who pass away prematurely without living physically, still continue to exist and develop in spirit life, to the surprise and amazement of mothers who have forgotten the loss, when their unknown children return and talk to them, through a good medium" (in spite of popular prejudice and incredulity).

'Years afterwards, the grown up children they never knew in earthlife, talks and joys with them like their other normally born children. These children ask to be given names and participate in the family life, which they have shared unseen, from the time of the separation of the 'silver cord'; which released them from the immature physical body. And so, they come to gain some necessary contact with earth-life, through the medium, by contacting their loved ones."

"Children are never allowed to forget or lose their love for their earth parents. Often and often they are brought to meet them in the appointed meeting-place, where many separated souls are reunited--during the hours of sleep." - TEACHINGS OF LOVE.

"Man is composed of the essences of God and Nature. The completion of the human form is an indication that these essences have bemy observations witnessed at Lily Dale during the 1914 season.

My third and fourth articles will describe my visits to Camp Chesterfield in the state of Indiana and the Lake Brady Spiritualist Camp at Brady Lake, Ohio.

In the first place, I must explain that during the last seven years, I have had numerous inquiries from persons who never visited a spiritualist camp. These people are anxious to know just what takes place at these summer meetings and how they are conducted.

The word "Camp" is definitely a misnomer. The phrase originated some seventy years ago, when Spiritualists first assembled at various places in this country. The "City of Light"

These meetings took place on consecutive Sundays during the summer months. Their purpose was to demonstrate and preach spiritual philosophy.

At the very beginning some of these visitors actually did use tents and hence they were called "camps", but today, these assemblies and associations have many modern buildings and hundreds of first rate cottages.

What is known today as Lily Dale Assembly was first called the "City of Light," then "The Cassadaga Free Spiritualist Associa-

library and a large auditorium with seating capacity of two thousand.

A Training Ground

The entire community is located some fourteen hundred feet above sea level. It is completely surrounded by lakes and channels and bordered by the famous Leolyn Woods, where the virgin pine and hemlock trees afford a magnificent background for health and recreation. And then, too, the woods, with their paths of tan tark, provide unparalleled opportunity for communion with nature.

In the very heart of these woods. there is an old stump converted into a pulpit where mediums and speakers discuss our philosophy and demonstrate their various psychic gifts.

In pioneer days, it is claimed that, at this spot many potential mediums first unfolded their psychic power for message work. This particular haven is called "Inspiration Stump," and the meetings held there are referred to as the Leolyn Wood services.

The Maplewood Hotel, located in the heart of the assembly grounds has been modernized to a great extent and now provides comfortable accommodations for summer visitors. Many cottage owners have paying guests, consequently

tions, prove their identity.

Miss Cottrell. also a splendid mental medium, is perhaps the only living woman in the world. possessing this unique phase of psychic power. Of course, what is known as spirit raps has occurred and does occur through other mediums, but no one has been able to so consistently demonstrate this phase of mediumship.

World's Greatest Slate-Writer

Pierre L. O. A. Keeler. a dear old gentleman, almost ninety years old, has possibly, during his fiftyseven consecutive years of service as a Lily Dale medium, attracted more people than any one clse. Thousands, from all parts of the world, have found their way to Mr. Keeler, who is without a doubt. the world's outstanding slatewriter.

Incidentally. Mr. Keeler is still carrying on his work and, to my knowledge, he is the oldest active. physical medium in America.

Last summer. I had a remarkable sitting with Mr. Keeler. Not only were my written spirit messages valuable, but the conditions under which these messages were received proved incontrovertably that agencies beyond the physical realm most certainly did the writing.

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The Importance of Guides In Psychic Unfoldment

In this article, written by EMILY GRANT HI TCHINGS, 2336 Tower Grove Ave., St. Louis. Missouri, the author fulfills a definite desire by outlining incidents prior to her association with the medium. MYRTLE LARSON BROWN, and her spirit collaborator, DR. WILLIAM ELLIOTT PARKER. Mrs. Hutchings, author of the book, "I HERE DO I E GO FROM HERE," tells the circumstances under which Mrs. Brown discovered her mediumship in 1920.

In a letter to the editor, Mrs. Hutchings says: "The unfoldment of Mrs. Brown's mediumship consumed five years. She met a Mr. Discher from Sullivan, Missouri, in 1926. I went to her the first time on the 10th of June, 1931. In the meantime, it had not occurred to her to check Dr. Parker's personal history as outlined by him to her. I never doubted it for a moment; but I have the kind of mind that has to get at the facts. Harold Graham, who used to be in Mrs. Brown's Tues. day night class, drove to Washington, Mo., in 1934 and he told me Dr. Parker's grave was still in the old cometery, which has since been turned into town lots."

Now read the complete story . . .

With the increasing interest in Survival. a natural result of this ghastly war, more and better mediums are needed. Life offers no equivalent, in comfort and relief from suffering. to the bereaved parent, wife or sweetheart, comparable with the voice of the loved one or the reassuring touch of his hand.

Mental mediumship is valuable as far as it goes but independent voices and warm materialized hands are, in most instances, so much more human. The reason for this is quite obvious. It is difficult for any clairaudient or clairyoyant to bring through testimony that will convey "that something" to a hungry soul who needs positive conviction. At the same time, I know of many cases when testimony relayed through mental mediums has been definitely convincing because, in no other way. would the entities have had an opportunity to make contact. Why? Simply because some people, even good Spiritualists, shy at seance room phenomena and rarely. if ever, take the opportunity to allow their spirit friends to manifest

Etheric Influences

In the course of my long training in psychic investigation, under the direction of Dr. James Hervey Hyslop. I had the advantage of what he had learned concerning the modus operandi of the spirit forces working behind the scenes. He made a clear distinction between mental and physical mediumship. automatic writing and raps.

by means of physical mediumship.

The scientific principles underlying all these forms are too intricate for discussion in a popular article, dealing primarily with another phase of the subject. For the present we are concerned with the entities who surround the physical medium and regulate or direct the sittings.

would unfold practical mediumship establishes the conditions.

Low, coarse persons naturally attract spirits from the earth stratum. Such a combination may produce dramatic phenomena. And, for certain classes of investigators, nothing finer or more spiritual could be appreciated. The instrument, in this grade is sometimes called a Psychic, not a Medium.

Health Essential

The distinction is not easy to draw. At one stage of her career, the instrument may be a true medium. with the faculty of soulprojective, and the resulting ability to establish contact, with spirits in the etheric. This faculty may be temporarily or permanently lost, through one of several causes. One of these is ill health. When the system can no longer rebuild its chemicals, mediumship declines. Physical phenomena depend on the medium's ability to produce ectoplasm, and to draw on the emanations of the sitters. to the end that the high-vibrating spirits may clothe their bodies and vocal cords with this chemical substance, to slow down their vibration and make themselves manifest to our dull senses. This requires a healthy body. free from alcohol and narcotics.

quent failure of phenomena. The teacher is not an arbitrary tyrant. forcing his way of life on the human being who serves him. He is an understanding friend, who has not been in spirit long enough to have forgotten our mortal limitations.

Parker Proves Identity

From the beginning of my research, this Outside Personality who opens and closes all classes and seances has interested me deeply. Since my association with Myrtle Larson Brown, my standard in spirit guides is her teacher. Dr. William Elliot Parker, the former Methodist minister who first collaborated with her when she was twelve years old, but did not fully reveal himself for sixteen years. The relationship between them is that of a wise and benignant father, and a highly intelligent daughter whose greatest pride is in her service to humanity.

The first time I heard Dr. Parker's voice. I vearned to know something definite about him. But it was not until after Dr. Hyslop had spoken to me, in one of the early sittings, that I plucked up my courage to the point of asking questions. Myrtle told me freely all she knew. This was simply what Dr. Parker had told her. She knew that everything about him was noble and fine. and she asked for nothing more.

Sunflower's Part

When, after five years of unfoldment, she began to preside over groups of investigators, in her East St. Louis home, it was her custom to give a brief explanatory talk. This was six years before I had the great privilege of knowing her. and getting acquainted with her inimitable Sunflower. She would admit to novices, that she really did not know much more about her gift than they did. It had been revealed to her on the first day of January, 1920, when she was the mother of two small children. and had had no acquaintance with Spiritualism.

It is a beautiful and dramatic story. which I have told at length in my book. WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE? (*). Sunflower had taken her on a soul-flight, and had informed her that if she was found worthy a great and good man would be her guide and teacher. But she must study, and prove her worth.

name on a piece of paper in the seance room. It was not until she had unfolded an unusual phase of physical mediumship that he told her his story.

Dr. William Elliott Parker was born in the north of England in October, 1787. His parents and an older brother were killed in an accident in 1794. and as he had no near relatives he was placed in a Methodist orphan asylum. where he was reared and educated for the foreign mission field. A part of his training was in Homeopathy, and in 1810 he came to America-a country the English regarded as in great need of missionaries. He was surprised, on reaching Maryland, not to be met by Indians.

Dr. Parker's History

Sunflower. destined to be his helper and the sunlight of our seances, was not born until 1821. but there were Cherokee Indians in the Maryland hills, and her parents may have been in his audience when he preached his first sermon to the Aborigines. This is pure speculation. I have never asked him about it.

We learned from Sunflower herself. that her people were driven from their homes in Maryland and Virginia, and one branch of the he had. He has told us what hapribe went to the northwest. to what is now Idaho. Washington and Oregon. Here she died of lung fever at the age of sixteen. It was the 25th of January. 1840. A year from that day, Dr. Parker died in Washington. Missouri, at the age of 53. He had been preaching and practicing medicine in and around Washington for four years.

funeral of a Dr. Parker, and his mother had afterward told him all about it, and that it took place when he was five years old. It was the first corpse he had ever seen."

The result of this revelation was that Myrtle and her husband went to Sullivan for a week-end visit. called on the aged farmer, and looked up the grave of the first protestant minister in Franklin County, Missouri. There was a sagging headstone, but the inscription was still legible. At the next seance. Dr. Parker said to her: I led you to the spot where my worn-out body was laid."

Proof Positive

This should have sufficed for any reasonable investigator. But Dr. Hyslop set me the task of further confirmation. He and the genial librarian of the Mercantile Library in St. Louis "led me" to many spots where evidence had been buried by historians who were not interested in survival.

Dr. Parker had told the inquisitive members of the Friday morning class, that there was no church of any kind in Washington when he went there. However, he spoke of a town hall, where lodge, political and religious meetings were held, and here he used to preach on Sunday mornings. On otherdays, he rode horseback to the Sullivan farm, many years before: the town came into existence, and to the homes of other rich farmers who were glad to have him holds services.

Returned To Serve

From the official history of Franklin County I verified every word he had said. There was no record of Dr. Parker, in fact no statistics of any kind were kept until many years later. But in a popular article, the reminiscences of an old settler, I found the statement that "an itinerant Methodist minister disputed the Town Hall with minstrel troups who came up the Missouri River, and the rowdy element who liked to have hoedown dances on Sunday night."

Dr. Parker died 104 years ago, on the 25th of January, as was recorded on his grave stone. He had had the hard life of a medical missionary, a life consecrated to the service of sin-sick humanity. If the gospel he preached was not in harmony with what he now teaches. at least he lived up to all the light pened to him, at the moment of his transition. and how he set about learning the truths he was not taught in a Methodist seminary. This implied finding a medium through whom he could voice these truths.

One night, when Myrtle's popularity had spread to other cities, a prominent shoe factory executive from Sullivan. Mo., attended an open seance in her East St. Louis home. When it was over, and he had been convinced that the dead do not die. he made himself known and asked:

"Would you like to know something definite about your Dr. Parker? Two years ago. I attended the nincticth birthday celebration of a man who lives on a farm between Sullivan and Washington. He told us many things about his boyhood. At that time his mind was clear and his memory was phenomenal. The last time I saw him he had grown deaf and stupid; but none of us had forgotten what he had said about the earliest thing he could remember. It was the

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

The same holds good for Lord Hugh Doucding in this war. His interest did not begin with the loss of his brave young flyers.

The public seldom reads about Spiritualism until some charlatan gets into trouble with the law. The devoted work of millions of honest and intelligent people all over the world who never get their names in the press is too little known to the people who most need their message of hope and consolation.

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

Clairvoyance illustrates the fact that space and optic nerves do not always need to co-ordinate in the common way if we are to see events happen.

We cannot confidently state that there is no such thing as Space -even in the spirit world.

By HORACE LEAF, R.F.G.S.

The study of mediumship has already considerably modified our knowledge of the nature of the human mind, and a great deal of evidence has been obtained which throws light upon one of the principal doctrines of religion, namely, the immortality of the soul.

Religion is not merely concerned with man's survival of death; it is deeply concerned with what happens to him after death, especially in regard to his persistent existence, his eternal happiness or eternal misery.

Perhaps the most important contribution that Spiritualism has made to this subject, is that telepathy is the chief mode of communication between this world and the next. Records prove that recent experiments by normal psychologists in telepathy, has confirmed the possibility of it being the normal method of communication for the inhabitants of the spirit world.

The "Brain-wave" Theory

It is generally agreed by thinkers that the Universe is perfectly co-ordinated, and that if we could trace all the connections we should discover that everything depends on everything else; telepathy should, therefore, indicate something of man's nature in its complete sense. A significant contribution in this is that the facts point to there being no physical organ for telepathy; telepathy appears to be purely a mental attribute.

The old popular "brain wave" theory is, therefore, not so acceptable as that of the direct action of mind on mind, without regard to time or space. This theory offers a suitable explanation for the interesting fact that telepathic "impacts" may be received more strongly than they were dispatched, thus violating the scientific belief that energy must lessen in intensity by the square of the

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distance, growing weaker the farther it recedes from its source.

It is, indeed, largely this which has led to the idea that there is no physical organ for telepathy. as such an organ would involve normal reactions conforming with the Newtonian Law.

At first sight, the direct contact theory seems absurd, as we are in the habit of believing that the mind must be where the brain is. but this is merely an assumption sacred to materialists: it cannot be absolutely proven even from common experience.

What Berkeley Said

Materialists maintain that Space is an actuality containing the objects that we perceive, in which case the mind must surely be where the objects of its perceptions are, and it must therefore include within its radius even the sun, moon and stars!

If this be true, then the mind must extend far beyond the limits of the physical body. The materialistic theory is the old error pointed out long ago by Berkeley, who maintained that it is more in accordance with facts to say that the body is in the mind than that the mind is in the body. All physical organisms are perceptions, and perceptions are states of the mind.

The materialistic idea leads to a number of logical absurdities. the chief of them being that minds, like the body, is extensive; while as a matter of fact it is intensive. Its nature is qualitative not quantitative.

Scientific Arguments

A number of simple questions will decide the matter . If mind is extensive, it must have a shape. What shape is it? Is it globular, is it angular, is it like a cube?

If it has a shape, it must have weight. How much does it weigh? It might even be reasonably argued that it has color if so, what color is it?

and can be better accounted for as having thought, emotion, sensations. awareness and will. all of which are qualitative and not quantitative.

The scientific arguments adduced in support of the objectivity of Space and its material contents. shows that materialism must remain an unsubstantiated assumption. All perceptions. says Science, are received by the mind through nerve reactions. If. for example, we see a house, it is because light rays have been reflected from its and impinged on the optic nerves, stimulating in them an appropriate molecular change.

Dreams and Delusions

This molecular disturbance is supposed to travel along the optic nerves at a measurable speed until it reaches the sensorium, and there it is transformed by the mind into an image which the mind throws out into space. This image is believed to be an accurate representation of the actual house supposed to be existing in Space.

Obviously we never can be sure of this owing to the optic nerves intervening between the object and the mind: indeed. we know that the representation may not truly represent the house because optic nerves do not all act in identically the same way.

Furthermore, we know that an objective stimulant is not essential to an optical image. Dreams and delusions amply demonstrate this. In dreams, we people a space of our own making with objects of our own creation. and they seem quite as real as anything we perceive during the waking state.

What I have Seen

Science, unfortunately. leaves the subject open to serious doubts. and it requires no small amount of faith to accept its dictum in the positive way in which science lays it down.

Clairvoyance further illustrates the fact that Space and optic nerves do not always need to coordinate in the common way if we are to see events happen. I once saw an incident happen four miles away just as if I were present in the room. yet hundreds of houses intervened.

My mother once saw my brother lying in a hospital bed in San Francisco, while she was dressing her hair in her bedroom in London.

At the time, no one in England new where my brother was. This could not have been a case of telepathy, as my mother declared that she had stood at the foot of the bed in which my brother lay, and noticed that the bedclothes partly covered his chin.

tions is a body similar to the physical organism. and may actually see the physical body, as I have done.

Sometimes, however, the extrusion takes one to a superior state of existence from which it seems impossible to bring back a clear memory, except that for an all too short period one has been somewhere which, compared with earthlife, is much more real. Its reality cannot be doubted, but owing to its extra-dimensional nature the normal consciousness cannot comprehend it in explanatory terms.

The "After-death" State

Space and Time must be vastly different from Space and Time here---if they exist at all. The crucial fact is. this transcendental state is definitely cut off from our earthly consciousness, and even those who have been fortunate in having experienced it, are unable to recall what it is really like.

It seems, therefore, that Nature has determined never to reveal to embodied man the truth about a Space-Time existence.

I once heard a lecturer who had made the after-death state his special study, declare that in the beyond man cannot possibly exist without an organism of some kind. Remarks of this kind are not altogether justified and may be very misleading: but they show how definitely we are conditioned by

matter. Nevertheless, the question must remain unanswered because it is unanswerable.

If Space should turn out to be nothing more than a creation of the human mind in which it places the objects of its perception, there need be no difficulty in appreciating that man's destiny lies in Spacelessness, in which he can continue to put any perception he is capable of forming. We can do this now by imagining any number of things in a space of our own imagining. Doubtless this seems paradoxical. but Existence is just like that.

She was smiling, and called him by his pet name from infancy, "Davy, Davy, Davy." She stooped over him. made a gesture of embracing him. and said, "Do not grieve. All is well, and I am happy." Then she walked towards the door and disappeared.

Next morning Belasco told his family about this vision and said, "I believe my mother is dead." He went to the theater. set himself to work, and soon forgot the sinister presage.

But. by-and-by, a telegram was sent him from his house. It had come from San Francisco, and told him that his mother had died the previous night about the time he had seen her in his room.

He learned later that his mother at the moment of expiring had pronounced the words, "Davy, Davy. Davy."

Mr. Belasco did not consider this a mere transmission of thought, but believed that the spirit of his mother had actually come to him at the moment of her passing. It was during that period in his life when he was so dolefully affected by this psychic experience and the loss of his mother that he wrote. "The Return of Peter Grimm."

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A Sitter's Influence Upon A Medium

DON'T BLAME the UNSEEN for YOUR TROUBLES

Valuable Results Would More Often Be Obtained If the Sitters' Personal Influence Could Be Subdued.

By W. H. EVANS

One of the problems that presents itself to the student of mediumship is, to what extent does the personality of the sitter influence the medium with whom he is having an interview?

That the sitter does exercise some influence is certain, and in cases a sitter with a strong and dominant personality sits frequently with the same medium, that influence can be very potent.

Where a medium conveys definite evidence of an excarnate being, the influence of the sitter is probably at its minimum, but it is still there and, it may be, affords a bridge for the communicator to cross.

We all know that a sympathetic sitter generally gets the best results because he goes out to meet the communicator. He is a great help to the unseen guest in helping to supply those conditions that make the work easy for him.

It is not in such cases that the influence of the sitter distorts or deflects what is coming through the medium; but in those cases where teaching is given the sitter may play a more important part in what purports to come through, than is realized.

Cremation

What Morticians Say

In the past twenty years, people have been less hesitant to express their views on "Cremation." Statements from reliable morticians show that the ratio is now one for cremation to four for burial.

In the "Annales du Spiritisme." a record of a seance at Rochefortsur-mer, quotes what M. Gabriel Delanne. well-known French Spiritualist has to say on this subject. Here is the message credited to the spirit of Delanne:

"Certain people believe that I left my mortal body painfully. That is not so. I did not suffer at the time of my deliverance, and my first spiritual vision was clarified by the efforts made by charitable spirits who surrounded my deathbed. Then there was the easy flight, aided by former friends who had sustained me in my daily life; they encircled me with their pure forces. to lead me towards my happy home.

dium under control may be influenced by the dominating personalities of his sitters, especially if the medium has a strong streak of vanity in his make-up. This, while it may not be apparent in the medium's normal self, is one of the determining factors which causes him to assume the role of special ·acher.

Subject to the Prophets

The control may be desirous of helping his sitters, but as Paul pointed out long ago, "The spirits of the prophets are subject to the prophets," a fact which we are low in realizing.

Thus the control has to do his best with the sensitive at his disposal and can only hope that something of his influence may get through and in some measure counteract the power of the mediums' conceit and that of his sitters' vanity in receiving the message.

We must not blame the unseen for faults that are our own.

* * *

Mediums are sometimes praised. when they should be criticized in a sympathetic and helpful manner. One sometimes hears a piffling address spoken of as 'marvellous" and "wonderful."

This fulsome flattery does harm to the medium as it tends to stop any effort for real improvement. We live in an age of superlatives, in which such adjectives lose all meaning.

If commonplace speeches are marvellous what can we say of a really good address? Mediums have to develop as most of them know, and some are satisfied with toe iow a level of achievement and never make any real progress.

In such cases one may hazard a guess that the sensitive has been unfortunate in his sitters. The level of inspiration is, as a general rule, that of the highest mentality in a circle, but as water tends to find its own level, so the average intelligence of any circle will determine the level of inspiration coming through a medium.

There Are Two Aspects

That is why a medium needs to be careful of the kind of circle he sits in for development. A wise circle leader can do a great deal in getting good results and can do much to nullify the influence of the sitters upon the medium, and get the fullest response from the control.

In such a circle platitudes will not be accepted as marvellous, and original statements will be seen at their true value. A critical and alert mind must be kept in all these matters.

dium, wherein he tends to reflect the mentality of the sitters, the other is true mediumship, where he is a definite channel for communication.

But as these two states are so closely intertwined they have an influence upon each other, so that what comes through is a mixture of control and the sitters' influence.

How often one can detect the reflection of a sitter in the message given. Yet with it comes veridical messages. It is a problem for the sitter no less than the medium. For a sitter often becomes, without his realizing it, an active partner in the seance.

all Mediums **ARE PSYCHIC** But all Psychics **ARE NOT MEDIUMS** AN EXPLANATION

Dr. J. C. F. Grumbine, noted lecturer and writer, was one of the most outstanding Spiritualist philosophers of his day. He has written numerous books on the science, philosophy and religion of Spiritualism (*).

Some of the most enlightening literature on the subject of mediums and mediumship has been contributed by Dr. Grumbine for he said:

"All mediums are psychics, but all psychics are not mediums. The word 'medium' should be employed only by one who receives mental and physical phenomena under the control and guidance of excarnate spirit. or spirits.

"A psychic is one who uses his own supernormal or psychic powers INDEPENDENTLY-free of spirit control. He develops his own powers, or rather extends them subjectively until he can SEE clairvoyantly, HEAR clairaudiently, and FEEL clairsentiently.

Constitutional Fitness

"Impressionable mediumship is a form of mediumship where the medium gets impressions under trance, or semi-trance control.

"In psychic unfoldment, the psychic is conscious of the expression of his powers. He can see into the spiritual spheres of the spirit world, forecast events of the future, or gaze in retrospect into the past. (Swedenborg was this type of psychic.)

"Mediumship depends upon a constitutional fitness for such expression. At birth the medium has obtained his powers, however latent it may be, yet developed afterward.

The great physical medium DANIEL HOME, was this sort of medium, and possessed that mediumship which allowed of spirit levitation. The results of all these expressions of psychic and mediumistic powers make Spiritualism the great movement that it is."

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Earnestness of Purpose

To keep a reasonably passive state of mind and "wait" upon the influence of the unseen is not easy, but it should be done when and wherever possible. All messages that do not give evidence, but deal with any form of teaching, or where predictions may be made, should be carefully scrutinized.

Of course in the latter case one has to wait and see whether the predictions come true or not. It is where a sitter often sits with the same medium that this tendency to influence the messages must be watched.

Earnestness of purpose may even increase the danger, for he or she will be so anxious to get really good results, and so, quite unconsciously, exert a powerful influence upon the medium. Then we get what I may call a reflective, or looking-glass type of mediumship.

If these thoughts are kept in mind and an endeavor made to subdue the personal influence of the sitter, there can be very valuable results gained. Acquaintance with the medium should be of help to the sitter, but he must always be on guard against himself influencing the sensitive.

follows: The sitter writes the names of his or her spirit friends, the friends with whom they would like to communicate. The slips of paper, upon which these names are written, are folded and Mr. Keeler does not, at any time. look at these slips.

The next procedure is for the sitter to select from a packet of perfectly plain white cards, eight or nine of his choosing. These cards are about the size of the inside measurements of ordinary school slates. After the cards are selected by the sitter at random, they are placed inside the slates, together with a small piece of lead. sometimes scarcely the size of a grain of wheat.

A rubber band is placed around the slates in order that they may be securely held together. Then the folded slips, upon which the names are written, are placed upon the slates beneath the rubber band.

Keeler's Rare Mediumship

The skeptic must bear in mind that all these preparations for the demonstration are made in *broad daylight*—in full view of the sitter. Rarely, does Mr. Keeler give private sittings after four or five o'clock in the afternoon.

For those with a scientific trend of mind, the fact must be stressed that the actual production of such phenomena is made possible only because of the darkness between the slates. The slates act as sort of a cabinet. It is the same principle as that of spirit photography, when the phenomena takes place within the darkness of the camera which serves as a cabinet.

Returning to the phenomena taking place between the slates. I have observed that the top and bottom card are never used for spirit writing. This is, I believe. due to the fact that light penetration prevents any manifestation on the outer cards.

When the phenomena is about to take place, Mr. Keeler and the

this type is a most convincing phase of mediumship. Each time I sit with Mr. Keeler, I am amazed because I have had one fact proven to me positively. The manifestations are extraneous of the medium.

Now to return to my discussion of Lily Dale, it would be well to explain its magnitude. Owing to the fact that a consecutive sixty day program of services necessitates a wide variety of speakers and mediums. some fifty to one hundred are engaged each year for public and private lectures, demonstrations and classes.

Evidential Messages

I have received very evidential messages from *Albert E. Vaughn Strode* of Enid. Oklahoma, and *Bertha Marx*, Springfield. Ohio. They both served Lily Dale Assembly during the entire 1944 season.

One of Mr. Vaughn Strode's methods of making contact with spirit people has a definite appeal to many people. From vases, filled with flowers, he makes a selection and calls out the name of someone in the audience who goes to the rostrum and at that moment, receives a short clairvoyant message. The flower selected is then given to the person receiving the spirit greeting.


Mr. Vaughn Strode is also a trance medium and on rare occasions. he will sit for a chosen group. I have had the privilege of sitting in some of these seances and find that, in most instances, evidential messages were received —many proving the continuity of spirit intelligence.

Bertha Marx, a direct-voice medium. also has exceptional ability as a clairvoyant. She is able to give messages rapidly and place spirit people in almost every instance. I particularly recall where a message, received through Mrs. Marx's mediumship, was the means of giving an entirely new vision and philosophy of life to a heart broken couple whose only son had been lost in the present war.

What Skeptics Think

This incident was so outstanding that an additional word of explanation may help others. One day, this couple came into my office. Expressions of grief and tragedy were stamped upon their faces. The man was so utterly dejected he could not even join in the conversation. They stated they had heard about Spiritualism

and *Lily Dale* and that they had traveled quite a distance to see a medium.

When this couple started to relate their story, 1 interrupted abruptly, saying. "Please, please, my dear, tell me nothing."

"You see Spiritualism claims to be able to prove that the dead live and can communicate with the earth people. Furthermore, I realize the workings of the mind especially the skeptical ones. and even if a medium gives perfect evidence. all will be for naught if details are related beforehand."

1 Try To Advise

Now to return to the inquiring couple. I told them that even if they did receive evidence. and even if they might be momentarily convinced, yet all would be "thrown overboard" if any part of messages received later included things they had told me. I also told them that they may even go so far as to cast out the whole reading if they discussed their affairs with anyone.

Before they left my office, I told them to select some medium listed in the assembly program, and attend a meeting of public clairvoyance or have a private consultation.

They followed my advice and *Mrs. Marx* was the medium whom I presume appealed to them. for they received definite proof through her. It was some time later in the day, that with smiling faces, they returned to tell me that their son had *proven* his identity — giving details and incidents relative to his effects that had been returned to them after his passing.

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Florida and Philadelphia. The subjects for discussion are chosen by the audience. Various people express their views and opinions relative to these subjects and at the close Mr. Hammond sums up and usually is able to clear up a great deal of misunderstanding.

These *Thought Exchange* meetings are well attended and provide an opportunity for all to express their views. At the same time, everyone in attendance is able to learn more of what Spiritualism is. as well as what it is not.

Each Message Placed

Another medium, scheduled at Lily Dale throughout the 1911 season, was Yuba Riggins of Bing hamton. N. Y. The method of contact used by her spirit collaborators is rather unusual. Persons in the audience were requested to write billets with an identification on the outside. Before the seance begins. she requests those whose identity is called to remain perfectly quiet and not to indicate in any way for whom she is reading. Miss Riggins begins by selecting a billet. Then she calls the identification written on the outside of the paper, after which she proceeds to relay the messages which usually bring comfort to the recipient as well as proof and other evidential information.

leaving the person, details are enlarged upon to such an extent, that the recipient acknowledges satisfaction, and at the same time definitely denotes that the message is perfectly clear and understandable.

It is most interesting and instructive to observe the various methods used by hundreds of mediums when demonstrating mental mediumship before the public.

Gertrude Valentine Proves

On one occasion, G. Ralph Ceppi of Syracuse. N. Y., gave me a message at Lily Dale which typifies tremendous evidence frequently coming through evidence which at the time, may seem trivial.

In this instance, the billets were brought to the rostrum after Mr. Ceppi was securely blindfolded. This blindfolding was handled by a stranger in the audience who saw to it that he could not "peek." I wrote a billet to a friend who had been in the spirit only a few weeks. My question was: "Gertrude Valentine, how do you like the spirit world?"

When my billet was chosen, the medium said: "I am contacting a new spirit. She seems rather bewildered and has not become acclimated. She requests that you send her your prayers." Then the medium said. "I see a large heart. It must have something to do with Valentine Day." The new spirit was evidently unable to give her name. And yet. she was showing a symbol of a valentine. Had not this symbol been given out correctly by the medium. proof of actual contact with the spirit may not have been so reassuring to me.

sitter hold the slates above the table. Then after a short interval (the length of time depending upon the quality and receptibility of the sitter) a peculiar dull tapping sound is heard. This sound indicates that *George Christy*. Keeler's principle spirit collaborator. has completed the demonstration.

Amazing Demonstrations

Oftimes, during the course of a sitting, Mr. Keeler will pick up a lead or chalk and write out initial names or even messages on the slate lying on the table in full view of the sitter. In some instances, Mr. Keeler writes the same names that have been written on the slips by the sitters.

Whether he hears these names or whether his arm is controlled by spirit entities, I do not know, and for that matter, according to Mr. Keeler, the answer is also a puzzle to him.

Now, about George Christy. My experience with him, in perhaps fifteen or twenty sittings, has been that George usually writes one card. Of course, on the other cards, there may be messages from many whose names were written by the sitter on the slips of paper. I do not. at the moment recall the exact message, but perhaps some day, this couple will write their own story of what Spiritualism has meant to them.

Suffice to say, since that sitting they have read hundreds of books on the subject and visited several spiritualist camps where they have been privileged to witness many other phases of mental and physical mediumship. In most cases, they report wonderful results.

Robert McDonald of Rochester. N. Y., who is chairman at all auditorium services delivered many excellent lectures on the philosophy of Spiritualism last summer.

One of Lily Dale's interesting features is the *Thought Exchange* every Wednesday and Saturday evenings. The chairman each Saturday last summer was *William Elliot Hammond* of Cassadaga, After each greeting is finished. she asked "For whom was I reading?" The person either answers aloud or raises his or her hand. Then she says. "Do you understand your message?"

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Others Received Favorably

During the demonstration. Mr. Ceppi is either entranced or overshadowed by a spirit. This spirit speaks in a semi-foreign accent. The medium's manner changes noticably. There is a slight hesitation but even so, he is able to reach many people in large audiences.

There were many other mediums and lecturers who. I understand. were received favorably by the Lilv Dale visitors, but owing to my duties in the PSYCHIC OB-SERVER office. I was unable to attend all the services in the Lily Dale Auditorium. And then. too. my visits to the various camps caused me to miss the demonstrations of many of the fine mediums and speakers who were scheduled during my absence. In the next issue of PSYCHIC OBSERVER I shall describe my visit to Chesterfield during August. 1944.

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
