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APPORT PHENOMENA

How? When?

Since 1839, when, according to the records, apports were first reported to have been received, there has been an unusual amount of interest shown in this rare phase of mediumship.

In this article, Grace Schafer, outlines her personal experiences with apports and cites much present-day evidence as well as numerous case histories.

What We Know and Don't Know About APPORTS.

A number of unusual objects are on and over my desk. What a strange assortment they are! Not particularly decorative, nevertheless they have a magnetic fascination for me. To anyone else they are just: Indian arrow-heads, an ancient coin, a small conch shell. a white eagle feather, a red and a gray feather, a pressed orchid, and a small but heavy, lava-rock bowl. How the collective articles came into my possession seems to be a great insolvable mystery.

Of all phases of psychic phenomena, not including materializations, apport manifestations excite the greatest wonderment and controversies. In materializations. the spirit forms appear and disappear, but in apport phenomena. materialized objects remain to testify that their being is an actuality. The objects before me are constant reminders of God's illimitable power; His "many mansions": and that all things are possible through His grace and at "His pleasure,"


Some Appreciate

Often I sit and meditate on the significance and spiritual value of the apports, and the possible causes of their being in my possession. As I review incidents relative to these unusual gifts, they may contain messages apropos to Psychic Observer readers who are not personally acquainted with apport phenomena.

Frequently (in the past) my stories of mediums and their work appeared in this paper. Sometimes, unexpectedly, I received responses of appreciation from mediums, but in most cases I did not receive an expression of any kind: however, the mediums' spirit "guides" have never missed an opportunity to enter seances and thank me, personally . . . offering their assistance to me, whenever I am in need.

Selected Individuals

The apports before me are mostly, tokens of appreciation from the "spirit controls" of different mediums: given to me as meritorious recognition for work they had deemed worthy. An outstanding virtue of spirits who help mankind is: appreciation. Sometimes they speak regretfully of their mediums who totally disregard what they consider to be of vital im-

portance. Their missions are impersonal: and are directed in convincing the world of immortality; they work through certain selected individuals whose bodies are highly sensitized for their work.

Flowers Apported

The apports which I have received are not a circumstance to what has been given, via spirit agency, to Mr. and Mrs. Pressing (editors of this paper), by grateful spirits for their unselfish work in the behalf of Spiritualism. They have an interesting collection of apport gifts at their home in Lily Dale, N. Y. I have been present in seances when some of them were

Mrs. Pressing and I were each. recipients of very ancient coins, at one of Frank Decker's seances in New York, "Patsy" (Mr. Decker's well-known spirit helper) opened our purses and dropped them in.

At a private materialization given by Edward Lester Thorne, for his class, in New York. I received a beautiful fresh orchid from little "Sunbeam." Another spirithelper appeared: she called herself "The White Sister" and was dressed in a white nun's uniform. Her arms were laden with flowers (in January); some of the pansies were the largest I have ever seen. There were also, lovely snapdragons, gladiolus and many other varieties distributed to the class members.

An Indian Paint-bowl

At different times, through the mediumship of Leonard Stott, in Philadelphia, I received feathers from grateful spirits. One entity belonged to the spirit-group of another medium and he grasped the opportunity to thank me for helping his medium.

I received the primitive lavarock bowl from an Indian who said he is interested in helping me (at a later time, through Mr. Stott also). The bowl was covered with hard dry earth and, although the Indian said it was his personal. paint boul. I had to use a chisel to remove the dirt before I could see what it was. He told me that I might find "flecks of paint" on the bowl after it was cleaned. I did find spots of white and red paint on its porous surface.

To illustrate how the law of attraction operates: Several years ago Mr. Pressing and I were present at Leonard Stott's direct-voice seance. After the seance Mr. Pressing presented Mr. Stott with a book: "The Mediumship of Jack Webber," (*) by Harry Edwards. Mr. Webber had passed into the spirit world a few months previ-

One of the strangest experiences in my life commenced rather prosaically last autumn when Halsey Raines, a publicity man for M-G-M in New York, telephoned and asked me if I knew of Mrs. Sophia Williams. She said she was the Chicago medium who, some years ago, engaged in a remarkable series of experiments with Hamlin Garland, during which various voices identified themselves as the spirits of ancient Spanish missionaries in California and related

Witness Phenomena In where and how forgotten mission crosses and old Christian relics could be found. Garland, on her instruction, had dug and found several hundred crosses. The incidents are related in full in Garlands "Mystery of the Buried Crosses".

Since Mrs. Williams was to be in Manhattan for only one day, I told Raines that I would like to meet her socially and, she being agreeable, both of them came to my home that evening.

Houdini and D. D. Home

No seances or experiments were planned or intended. To meet Mrs. Williams, I invited two friends also interested in psychic research: Stewart Robb. the author of a book on Nostradamus, and Walter B. Gibson, a magician.

Mrs. Williams did not know or suspect that either Robb or Gibson were to be present at my house. She had never 'met either gentleman, nor had she ever met myself. or my wife.

Mrs. Williams turned out to be a worldly and utterly charming lady. She is not classed as a professional medium and rarely accepts fees for her psychic work, as she is said to have an independent income.

We spoke of mediumship, of vaudeville-in her youth she had. been a stage dancer, of Houdini and of Daniel Dunglas Home.

Gibson and she reminisced about vaudeville artists they had both known.

Stewart Robb Inquires

Mrs. Williams said all her phenomena had occurred in full light. We were then sitting in the livingroom of my apartment, which was brilliantly illuminated by an indirect-lighting lamp and a bridge

As we sat and chatted desultorily, Robb, rather restless and determined not to miss an opportunity to witness some psychic demonstration, said he had (Continued on Page 9, Col. 8)

Paychic Observes

Not all students of Spiritual phenomena have access to the "Encyclopedia of Psychic Science," written by NANDOR FODOR, LL. D. In this volume, the author devotes over 7000 words to the subject of APPORTS-saying in part: "When certain physical mediums are present, various objects arrive through apparent penetration of matter. This is one of the most baffling phenomena of Spiritualism. The objects differ in size, may be both inanimate and living and appear none the worse for their journey. The phenomena was first observed in 1839 by DR. G. P. BILLET, Paris, France when, through the mediumship of Madame "J," a dove was heard flying around the seance room. This dove was described by the control as being 'white as snow."

"There are two theories on which the phenomena of apport may be brought within understanding. One is the fourth dimension and the other now generally favored by spiritualists, the disintegration and reintegration of the apported objects. The former was first advocated by PROFESSOR JOHANN ZOLLNER to explain the phenomenon of interpenetration of matter which he observed with HENRY SLADE. It was approved by PRO-FESSOR CEASAR LOMBROSO and PROFESSOR CAMILLE FLAMMARION. It means that there is a higher form of space of which we are not cognizant." The objects to be apported are, lifted into this dimension, brought to the desired spot and (Continued on Page 4, lower left)

INSPIRATION

...Is Usually Preceded by Desire, Practice, Perseverance and Perspiration.

Inspiration is that answer which comes down to us from The Unseen when a question wells up in the heart. Even in a work-a-day world we continually ask questions of the Soul and if we listen unhurriedly we are told what to do to solve our problems. Poets. playwrights, musicians, artists, and every department of life--are continually asking questions in the heart and those questions are. "How shall I make this masterpiece?" and the answers are what the world calls inspiration.

"I See Myself"

"Inspiration," a lead pencil drawing of a beautiful being which Pfc. Martin Breithaupt created and sent to The Psychic Observer from far-off The Netherlands East Indies, is undoubtedly the answer to questions in the heart of a lonely lad. The drawing (*) was inspired. It is an esoteric symbol of a postwar plan for a better world, he wrote Juliette Ewing Pressing, the editor. The drawing is a young warrior's dream of what the world should be — an artist's symbolic ideal of a better world.

'The drawing," he wrote, "came to me step by step in hours of slumber and quiet meditation. Nearly all of my work comes to my attention combined with a definite story. At intervals I get clearer visions of the design and the colors to be used. Sometimes 1 feel the inward personality impressing me to use a particular color. This is usually presented to me in a mental concept such as is the case when one visualizes a

house, or flowers, only the impression was more definite."

Private First Class Breithaupt asserts that in conceiving his masterpieces he steps out of the physical habitation into a distinctly different realm.

"I can plainly see myself drawing a certain kind of design beginning with one or two colors," he writes . . . "As the picture progresses I see where I should begin creating it in material reality. So I begin with the simplest lines and concentrate on that part of the picture. All that time I see myself creating advanced portions of the drawing."

Cannot Be Denied

strong and impulsive thought until the picture is well under way. "I am sure." he adds, "that I have recognized the details before they are set down-" has painted them in deed and in truth in the spiritual realm before they are put to canvas.

The characters always seem to come to life," he adds. That is true art of course, of fiction writer as well as painter or sculptorto make character come to life.

Instances of psychical assistance for those of artistic bent of mind are too frequent to be lightly denied; for those who ask, those who desire to create the beauties of The Unseen, receive their answers in the mundane things of

life. Instances of psychical aid were oft told by Evelyn De Morgan, who became a skilful executor of paintings in the pre-Raphaelite style.

Sense Unseen Influence

Evelyn's mother decided to give her brother, Sir Walter Spencer-Stanhope, a present and commissioned her daughter to paint a picture for him. Sir Walter, his wishes questioned, said he could not decide on a suitable subject.

Evelyn, drawing in her studio one evening, felt an urge to paint a picture from the text, "Mercy and Truth have met together: Righteousness and Peace have kissed each other." Afterward she related in London that the theme came in a flash and at the same time she completely visualized the

A letter was received the following morning from her Yorkshire uncle asking her to paint a picture from the text she had decided the evening before to put on canvas!

Inspirational Drawing

Inspiration came to Evelyn from The Unseen. That which she painted was perhaps etched there before she received it a design upon the canvas of the higher consciousness. As I write this I pause. not knowing what to say, I get upon my feet, I so to the door, I look out upon the far-flore, wideflung Pelta, and, as I gaze, my mind works a me i ask upon this theme.

I had come to a stalemate as to what I should put upon the page and my conscious mind reaches for guidance. I am not aware of all these process until I return to my chair and begin to write again. but then I perceive that the things I should say are already written in The Unseen! That thought so needed to prepare in some degree a finished product at this point is given me and I shall write as I am guided, knowing there is no faltering in the Etheric World around me.

Not A Dabbler

Captain Alfred Pearse, artist, author and inventor and designer for England's king and queen, relates an odd incident that is warp and woof of conditions and circumstances that are fashioned by psychical influences.

"After I came back from Breithaupt works under a very France," he observes, "a doctor. who was attending my wounded foot in London, began talking about what was called 'the Belgian murder which had recently occurred, explaining that a woman had been killed and her body thrown over the railing in Russell Square in a sack. I felt an unseen influence; I picked up a newspaper giving an account of her murder and in which her picture was presented. I kept looking at the picture.but I did not look at her likeness, but saw nothing but a man's Jace. Nobody then knew the identity of the murderer. I drew the face of the man I had seen in the woman's picture and handed it to the physician. He said: 'This is Spiritualism. You must not dabble

The spirit of a woman of oval face and fair hair appeared to the President, Alois J. Hetticar: Secartist the next morning. The apparition said: 'I want you to understand I did not die through dabbling in Spiritualism."

Thousands of Cases

The entity from the unseen world then explained that she had been murdered. The man who took her life was not discovered for some time after that incident. But when his identity was established the amazing thing was revealed—the drawing produced by the artist was an accurate picture of the murderer. This was admitted not only by the physician but by others.

"Sometimes." observes Breithaupt, "I lose trace of myself cnough to realize that I have an inner personality of a higher authority which seems to come forth most in the mind and govern my actions, or I just feel as though I am that particular personality, and while I am working on a drawing I go through all the experiences that one would expect if that personality."

This is not an uncommon exthere are thousands of well-authenticated cases of this kind. We seem to be guided in all the mundane affairs of life if we will but listen and obey. There are tides in the affairs of life which taken at their flood lead on to fortune and they are spiritual tides. Man is inspired, rough-hew life as he will. Victorien Sardou, famous French dramatist, wrote under spirit or divine guidance. He produced an engraving of Moliere's house on copper under psychical influence.

Alfred Tennyson

He explains his genius under mystic spell.

"I was seated at my table," he explains, when I fell into a reverie and unconsciously took up the graver and impelled by secret influence let my hand follow its own direction over that plate. The engraving of Moliere's house was the result of several hours of purely mechanical toil. I could not of my own will make such a picture to save my life."

Alfred Tennyson, the poet, occasionally drifted into the ecstatic state in which inspiration came. His individuality seemed to dissolve, leaving only the poet, a boundless being, unhampered by matter.

Are There **PSYCHIC** LAWS?

When Men Agree Upon Where We Go When We Die . . . Then Efforts Should Be Made To Discover Whence We Came.

One almost despairs of finding law and order in psychic experiences of the supernormal kind. Just as there are no two minds alike there appear to be no two psychic experiences alike. although they may often belong to the same class or order.

I once experimented with a view to seeing whether it was possible to leave the physical body and be aware of the fact. My efforts were rewarded, but never to order. The extrusion of my phythic double concurred when least expected and the mental reactions were never alike.

On occasion I found myself in the room in which my body lay: and once I found myself in a state of existence in no sense corresponding with what I had ever read or thought possible.

Reaction Differs

Time and space were so different that I cannot find adequate thought. let alone words to express it: and what struck me as still more remarkable. I had no relations. Mother, father, sister. brother, wife and child did not exist for me. The feeling was that I had an equal relationship with all human beings.

This doubtless was not the world to which we ordinarily pass at death; nevertheless, its reality was so great that I knew. and have ever since been compelled to believe, that the life we live on earth is so unreal as to be nothing more important than a dream, an illusion.

At Camp Chesterfield (Chesterfield, Indiana), when Mr. and Mrs. Pressing and I attended one of John Bunker's "Pow Wow" seances (which is a direct-voice seance by Indian spirits), there were about thirty in the group and each person received an apport.

Mr. Bunker is noted for his apport phenomena. Some received cut stones, arrow-heads, shells, and other things. My gift was a small conch shell. Friends have shown me cut stones received at Mr. Bunker's seances, which they have had set into rings, lavalieres and brooches; jewelers appraised the stones as "precious gems".

"Precious Gems"

Mr. Bunker once told me that he had always been curious as to how the apports were received, and often pondered over it. One day, at his home in Eaton Rapids, Michigan, he started up the stairs tfrom the reception hall to the second floor) and as he slowly mounted the first step, suddenly, he felt a strange sensation in his solar plexus. At the same time he noticed a thick, cloudy-white substance, directly in front of his plexus. When he reached the third step he heard something fall. He stooped to pick up the object and found it to be a fossilifrous rock

How Do We Know?

Last summer, when I was visiting at "Camp Silver Belle," Ephrata, Pa., a guest from Washington, D. C., showed me a very ancient silver cross which was an apport gift, received through the mediumship of Hugh Gordon Burroughs. Later, when I asked Mr. Burroughs about it, he told me that apport phenomena was not a regular procedure at his "circles." He said, "Strange as it may seem, each member in that particular class had, at different times, received a CROSS. Each cross being of an individual design and of a different era." Miss Helen Hollbrook's apported cross was given to her by a spirit helper who had once been a Crusader"; and the cross was worn by him at the time,

Friends ask, "How do you know those things are APPORTS? Don't you suppose the mediums could have them hidden in their pockets? Of course they could! . . . but I don't believe it. Why? Because my personal conviction has been strengthened by an experience Mr. Schafer and I had, three years ago. We were sitting

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in silent communion together. We had made a practice of sitting regularly, and sometimes a few friends joined us. On that momentous night (after sitting for three uneventful years), imagine our surprise to receive an Indian arrow head! (See Page 1)

Whatever anyone says about other apports, we can vouch for the authenticity of this one! Somehow I felt the event was of portentious significance and it later, proved to be. On that date, something of major importance happened but we did not learn about it until five months later. In their own way the spirit helpers had given us a sign which we could not

O.K.'ed by Police

The greatest known apport medium is, Charles Bailey of Sydney, Australia. A large collection of Mr. Bailey's apports are now at Leland Stanford University, Polo Alto, California. They were willed by T. W. Stanford, to his brother, Leland. It is known that many homes of Sydney, Australia, are filled with apports of rare geological interest; specimens for students and objects for museums.

H. L. Williams (Police Magistrate of Norfolk Island, South Pacific), a successful criminal investigator, used his professional knowledge and experience in investigating Charles Bailey's mediumship; and pronounced his mediumship to be genuine.

Mr. Williams reported that among the apports he has seen were: "A Saracen helmet of scale armour, each scale a silver coin with inscription, containing more than 3000 such coins; 30 to 10 Chinese carved figures in ivory of exquisite workmanship and draped in silk, arranged to represent a royal court. The other theory was put forward in seance room communications. According to this, spirits by an act of will-power, disintegrate the matter to be transported into its molecular elements without altering the form. In this state the object may cass through the interstices of intervening matter and become re-integrated by a second act of willpower. This theory essentially means that there is, beyond the solid, liquid and gaseous state, a fourth or fluidic state, in which matter becomes invisible, impalpable and possesses, conjointly with the former solid state."

castle. After a futile search throughout the castle, in desperation the select group of persons. who had been sitting with him, implored Mrs. Hack to use her automatic-writing medium-hip to locate the Marquis.

Charles Victor Miller

Through Mrs. Hack's writing they were told that "the Marquis will be found at the place he loves most." His wife exclaimed, "Oh. that means we will find him at the stables, for he loves his horses most." A diagram of directions was drawn which indicated a direct route to the stables on the estate, about a quarter of a mile distance. They proceeded en masse (eight of them) to the stables. After unlocking three heavy doors to gain entrance, they found the noble dignitary, still in deep trance, lying in one of the stalls.

A similar experience is told of the dematerialization of Charles Victor Miller, who passed away in New York last year. It is recorded in W. Reichel's book, "An Occultist Travels" (written in 1908). The seance took place in San Francisco, with twenty-seven persons present. Mr. Miller was apported through the enclosed walls of a seance room and found later . . . still in trance, on the second floor. The seance was under test conditions. Mr. Miller was well known for his spectacular materializations.

Charles Bailey is one of the few mediams in the world that can produce results worthy of sci-ntific investigation. brought a Ouija board along and would Mrs. Williams care to attempt a session with the planchette.

She seemed bored, but consented and she and Robb sat with the board for half-an-hour. No phenomena resulted. She then tried automatic writing, but received only a few messages of a very general nature.

Gibson Amazed

Then Mrs. Williams turned to Gibson and, still smiling, said she might give some clairvoyance. She asked him if it were not true that he had been married before and divorced and that he had a son by his first wife.

Rather amazed, Gibson nodded in the affirmative. She then said he had been an insurance agent ome 25 years ago. (Even I had not known this fact.) Gibson affirmed the truth of the statement. She then went on to tell him a remarkable series of evidential fac's about his family, his brothers and sisters, and more distant relatives.

She concluded by speaking of a gold-watch she said he had and gave the background as to how he ad received the watch. Gibson later told me that in his varied experience with mediums and psychies, he had never seen such an incredible demonstration of clairvovance.

We Heard!!

I then said that I felt we ought to discontinue this as Mrs. Williams was a guest and I did not feel we ought to tire her. She said she suffered no ill effects. We then discussed the source of her psychic energy, which Mrs. Williams seemed to believe was somewhere in the region of her solar plexis. We talked some more. It was about eleven-thirty and then Mrs. Williams, who was sitting on the couch, suddenly cocked her head, and said.

"Did you hear that?"

We all said we had heard nothing. My wife listened carefully.

'There," said Mrs. Williams, "It spoke again."

I asked Raines to remain at the other side of the room. Robb and Gibson also kept at least five feet away. My wife and I, jumping up, flanked Mrs. Williams on both

And then we heard it! . . . a timid etheric voice in the air. It seemed to be speaking about two feet above Mrs. Williams' head. It sounded like the faint whistling rhythmic noise of a cricket, rather similar to some of the accounts describing the voicing of Walter, Margery's control.

She said she was willing to do this and would grant me several interviews on her next trip to New York. She is now engaged in clearing up some private affairs on the west coast and I am looking forward to Mrs. Williams return to New York and another visit from the etheric messenger.

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EVIDENCE OF SPIRIT ACTIVITY

The following article from the writings of W. T. STEAD is interesting as illustrating the problem of prevision, and showing that memory persists beyond death.

I Do Not Doubt the Possibility of Communication With the Socalled Dead.

Some years ago I had in my employment a lady of remarkable talent, but of a very uncertain temper and of anything but robust health. She became so difficult that one January I was seriously thinking of parting with her, when Julia wrote with my hand, "Be. very patient with E. M.; she is coming over to our side before the end of the year."

I was rather startled, for there was nothing to make me think that she was likely to pass away. I said nothing about the message, and continued her in my employ: It was, I think, about January 15th or 16th when the warning was given.

It was repeated in February, March, April, May and June, each time the passage being written as a kind of reminder in the body of a longer communication about other matters. "Remember. E. M. is going to pass over before the end of the year."

Warning of Approaching Death

In July E. M. inadvertently swallowed a tack. It lodged in her appendix, and she became dangerously ill. The two doctors by whom she was attended did not expect her to recover.

When Julia was writing with my hand, I remarked, "I suppose this is what you foresaw when you predicted E. M. would pass over?"

To my infinite surprise she wrote, "No; she will get better of this, but all the same she will pass over before the year is out."

E. M. did recover suddenly, to the amazement of the doctors, and was soon doing her usual work. In August, in September, in October, and in November, the warning of her approaching death was each month communicated through my hand.

In December E. M. fell ill with influenza. "So it itas this." I remarked to Julia. "that you fore-

Again I was destined to be surprised, for Julia wrote, "No; she will not come over here naturally. But she will come before the year is out." I was alarmed, but I was told I could not prevent it.

Was Iulia Mistaken

Christmas came. E. M. was very ill. But the old year passed, and she was still alive. "You see you were wrong," I said to Julia, "E. M. is still alive." Julia replied. "I may be a few days out, but what I said is true."

About January 10th Julia wrote to me, "You are going to see E. M. tomorrow. Bid her farewell. Make all necessary arrangements. You will never'see her again on earth." I went to see her.

She was feverish, coughed bad-

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
ly, and was expecting to be removed to a nursing hospital, where she could receive better attention. All the time I was with her she talked of what she was going to do to carry out her work. When I bade her good-bye I wondered if Julia was not mistaken.

Picked Up Dead

Two days later 1 received a telegram informing me that E. M. had thrown herself out of a four-story window in delirium, and had been picked up dead. It was within a day or two of the end of the twelve months since the first warning was given.

This narrative can be proved by the manuscript of the original messages, and by the signed statement of my two secretaries, to whom, under the seal of secrecy. I communicated the warnings of

I have just described, had pron.i ed me that if she died before me, the would do four things.

JULIA

First, that she would use my hand, if she could, after death, to tell me how it fared with her on the other side.

Secondly, she promised that, if she could, she would appear to one or more of her friends to whom she could show herself

In the third place, she would come to be photographed, and fourthly, she would send me a riessage through a medium, authenticating the message by countersigning it with the simple mathematical figure of a cross within a

1 Could Not Help Myself

E. M. did all four(1) She has repeatedly written with my hand. apparently finding it just as easy to use my hand now as she d'd when still in the body.

(2) She has repeatedly appearεd to two friends of mine, one a woman, the other a man. She appeared once in a dining-room full of people. She passed unseen by any but her friend, who declares that she saw her distinctly. On another occasion she appeared in the street in broad daylight, walked for a little distance, and then vanished. I may say that her appearance was so original it would be difficult to mistake her for anybody else.

(3) She has been photographed at least half a dozen times after her death. All her portraits are plainly recognizable, but none of them are copies of any photographs taken in earth life.

(4) There remains the test of a message accompanied by the sign of a cross within a circle I did not

get this for several months. I had almost given up all hopes, when one day a medium who was lunching with a friend of mine received it on the first attempt she made at automatic writing. "Tell Wil. liam not to blame me for what I did. I could not help myself," was the message.

Then came a plainly but roughly drawn circle, and inside it the cross. No one knew of our agreement as to the test but myself. I did not know the medium. I was not present, nor was my friend expecting any message from E. M.

mony from my informers that spirits often participated in their extrusions from the physical body. Sometimes difficulties arose which made it possible that the etheric body might not be able to return to the physical, and then every effort was made by the spirits to ensure that the return was accomplished.

What is this "work" people have to do? The matter is not adequately answered by saving that they had to develop their characters. Mostly their spiritual characters were much better than their earthly ones, and in some cases no appreciable improvement seems to have taken place by prolonging earth-life. Indeed. I have observed that in some instances the character became worse.

One is constrained to answer the question in an ethical way, but I suspect that there is something else about it which has not yet been revealed to us.

Perhaps when we have satisfactorily established the question of where we go when we die. we may make efforts to discover from whence we came. The solution of that question will. I feel sure. do much to solve the mystery of why so many people should be compelled to reside for so long in a state of illusion.

The editor of Psychic Observer has known John W. (Jack) Baxter for the past twenty years. They both lived on the same street at Lily Dale, N. Y. Today he is known at T-3 John W. Baxter. His mother is the noted trance medium and psychic artist, Katherine (Kitty) Baxter of Camden, Maine.

It is matter of record that Sgt. Baxter landed in France on D-Day, very soon after H-Hour. Here is his story:

"At first it didn't seem real," the soldier continues, "Strange-ly, it seemed comparable to watching a technicolor movie. Everything seemed more vivid than usual. Colors instead of blending, clashed in sharp contrast. The blue water, the white beach.

ing orange streaks of gunffre surrounded with black smoke of powder as they fired broadside after broadside bombarding strongpoints on the shore. Then there was the red of blood, a brilliant scarlet hue against white flesh.

"That day will live forever in my memory.

Baxter continues. "However. though death and destruction was all around me. no harm or danger has come near me since. Love and prayers have formed an impenetrable armor around me. shielding me from all harm."

However, the soldier's armor failed to ward off one shell for he was wounded in France sometime afterward and was awarded the Purple Heart by his commanding officer He was wounded on October 25.

Now Baxter wears the Purple Heart ribbon next to his Bronze Star ribbon, won 20 days before being wounded for extreme valor in action. Modestly enough, he has not revealed the action that won him that prized decoration.

He entered the service in Janary 1941 and went overseas in September 1942. After almost two years in England he took part in the invasion of Normandy. His unit won the Presidential Citation for action in the D-Day landings.

Some Notes on **SPIRITUALISM**

THE IMPORTANCE OF Physical. Phenomena

MRS. PHILIP CHAMPION DE CRESPIGNY

There is a good and a bad side to most things, and that this applies to Spiritualism no one will be inclined to deny; in fact, as action and reaction are equal and opposite, the very badness of the bad side argues a corresponding superlativeness on the good.

Spiritualism, unlike the whited sepulchre, presents its less attractive side to the casual observer, reserving the inner goodness and sweetness for those who think it worth while to probe its secrets. The bad side gives us charlatans. dishonesty, desecration and most sacred feelings, cupidity, simony. and a host of the evils to which humanity is prone. It thrives on the credulity, vanity, and curiosity of others. But the accredited professions of all countries have their bad sides and thrive on the weaknesses of their neighbors.

Christianity Unshaken?

Because there have been dishonest lawyers no one would throw discredit on the basic principles of equity and justice or cavil at their further administration: because doctors have in some instances abused the confidence of their patients or extorted unjustifiable sums of money, no one would suggest the abandonment of the practice of medicine; a priest might break every law in the decologue, but the beauty and principles of Christianity would remain

It is through this outer shell of unloveliness that we must burrow for the loveliness within. Nothing worth winning has ever been won easily: if we are going to be discouraged by an outer presentment that may appear unattractive. even squalid, we're not worthy to win the pearl of great price that lies within.

The mastery of the ocean, electricity, and the air has extorted its dole of lives and suffering; the mastery of the next step, far more stupendous than any before—the opening of communication between Here and There—is to cost as much and more.

Banal Communications?

As in the case of every other line of advance in knowledge of the laws of God, we shall not find until we seek-but seeking we assuredly shall find.

Man's consciousness has been plunged into matter to find his own solution of the riddles set him, and just as he has been left to solve the riddles of aeroplanes, motors, wireless telepathy, the wonders of the stars, and the infinitesimal undulations of light, so must he find the answer to this greatest of all-how to link up this world with that other subtler world, surrounding and interpenetrating our own, and convert into something more than a mere parrot cry the assertion: "There is no death!"

One of the objections so often

SENSED HIS OWN PASSING



WILLIAM T. STEAD, the well known journalist, was born at Embleton, North. umberland, July 5, 1849, and was the son of a Congregational minister.

First manifestation of his interest in psychic subjects was the publication in the Christmas Number of the RE-VIEW OF REVIEWS of his "REAL GHOST" Stories in 1891.

In 1892 he discovered his gift of receiving communications in automatic writing. In 1893 he began the publication of "BORDERLAND," a quarterly psychic magazine which continued until 1897.

He was invited to speak at Carnegie Hall, New York, on April 21, 1912, on the subject of the World's Peace. Before his departure on the Titanic he wrote to his secretary: "I FEEL AS IF SOMETHING WAS GOING TO HAP-PEN. SOMEWHERE, OR SOMEHOW. AND THAT IT WILL BE FOR GOOD. . . '

urged is that all communications obtained through mediums are so banal.

But this is not so. Surely a study of the literature would tell that much. We get from the other side information which has proved both instructive and interesting: consolation which has lightened many aching hearts, and often very beautiful descriptions, and hints of conditions opening up quite new lines of thought, and proving very illuminating.

What Will You Say?

It depends upon who speaks. Anyone who thinks and talks trivialities here will talk trivialities there. If we learn to say things worth saving here we shall say them when we get there. The terms of greeting are again a stumbling block; but surely not reasonably so? It may seem on the surface that for anyone intimately dear to you merely to say, "How are you?" on finding himself in communication. is eminently unlikely.

But what would he say? On this plane, in such emotional moments, we say nothing-a handclasp, a flash from eye to eye, a long-drawn-out embrace, expresses far more than words. Moreover, in the seance room there is the presence of the medium of which they on the other side are quite as conscious as ourselves, the third person, a stranger, before whom it is impossible to feel entirely frank and untrammeled. We should have felt the gene of it on this plane.

The Right To Criticize

A process of earnest investigation is the only means of earning a right to criticism. The man in the street should pause before offering an opinion on what is to him a sealed book. The man who knows the earth is round because

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others have discovered it for him is quite ready to deliver an ultimatum on a field of scientific discovery upon the threshold of which those who know just a little more stand trembling with an eager question in their eyes.

"Lyes That See Not"

At this stage it is the scientific side of the facts gleaned by experience that should be insisted on rather than the mystic, as appealing to man's reason and intellect; when physical phenomena have done their work no doubt the other espects, through clairvoyance and clairaudience, of the inner knowledge will be recognized. At the present stage the appeal must be made to the eyes that see; the "eyes that see not," latent in all of us, and already developed in some, will doubtless be quickened into activity in the years before us.

These traits, coupled with marvelous psychic power, enabled her to raise the standard, dignity and self respect of our religion. To the very last, she held her STANDARD VERY HIGH.
