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# SECOND WEEK IN LONDON

Conclusive Evidence Received Through London's Best Mediums and Psychics.

In the last issue of Psychic Ob-sèrver. I told about "My First Week in London" and related events, seances and meetings experienced. I described interviews and discussions with some of England's foremost Spiritualists and Spiritualist mediums: Harold Sharpe, Shaw Desmond, Hannen Swaffer, Maurice Barbanell, Sylvia Barbanell, Paul Miller, W. H. Lilly, Lillian Bailey, Mrs. W. T. Parish, Harry Edwards, Horace Leaf, Ronald Strong and many others.

In this article, I will conclude my account of experiences of this sort and attempt, in my concluding article of this series, to describe my somewhat exciting flight from London back to the States, the people I met enroute, what they talked about and how Mr. Pressing and I escaped what might have been a most disastrous crossing of the Atlantic.

#### Prophecy Fulfilled

Now to continue, "My Second Week In London' began when, in answer to a previous letter, I received an invitation from Mr. and Mrs. J. Arthur Findlay to come to tea at Stansted Hall, Essex. I was particularly happy to again visit this beautiful place where I had been entertained at a garden party in 1937, after having visited the International Spiritualist Congress which was held in Scotland.

The reason that a trip to Stansted Hall particularly interested me was because of a prophecy that was given to me about a visit to an English country estate.

During the year of 1930, in Louisville, Kentucky, I had my first experience with spirit communication. In this sitting, the medium told me I would go to Europe and while there I would attend a social function held in the country where there would be a large crowd of people.

#### All Data Rechecked

was seated on the terrace and as I walked along, she arose from her the very words the medium in Louisville voiced to me seven I shall join you years before: for a walk and show you the place."

Sometimes we wonder whether prophecies can be accurate, because many times they fail to come to pass. However, in this case, even to the most trivial incident, every word came true.

During this walk around the grounds of Stansted Hall in 1937, I vaguely recalled this prophecy. Upon my return to America, I eagerly checked the notes of my sitting in 1930 and found the record to be accurate to the minutest detail.

#### The Food Problem

So, to again visit Stansted Hall, which to me had a spiritual sig-nificance, was indeed an outstanding pleasure.

went by train to Bishops Stortford, where Mr. Findlay met me in his car. We drove through this quaint little English village where market day was being held. To see the country folk gathered about and to see their little wagons filled with farm produce, eggs, chickens and so on, was rather interesting. In England, there is such an extreme scarcity of food, the sign of anything in bulk is quite a spectacle.

After showing me about his estate which includes an elaborate farm, I was driven to Stansted Hall where Mrs. Findlay welcomed me.

In the library, before a big blazing fire, Mr. and Mrs. Findlay, Mr. Pressing and I engaged in a lengthy discussion on Spiritualism and many current events.

Incidentally, the Findlays turned their home over to the British Red Cross to be used as a hospital, during the recent war. They stayed at Rockingham Castle, some Though no sixty miles distant. bombs actually fell directly on Stansted Hall, an immense crater, made by a falling bomb, could be seen from the library window.

#### "History of Civilization"

As most Spiritualists are familiar with Mr. Findlay's writings, I need not go into details about his books, but I am pleased to report. that "Unfolding Universe," "Torch of Knowledge" and "Psychic Stream" will again be in print within the year.

Mr. Findlay has prepared a new manuscript now ready for the printer. It will be called "History of Civilization." In order to write this book, years of research and study were necessary. I'm sure it be a worthy contribution to the literature of Spiritualism inas-much as the entire theme is based on the significance of religious concepts.


For five years Mr. Findlay made a special study of direct-voice, through the mediumship of *John Sloan*. In 1931, he published "On The Edge Of The Etheric" It ran in 30 impressions within the first year of publication and it has continued to be Spiritualism's best seller. This book and "Rock of Truth" are the only two books of his available at this time.

# IRITUALIS

Says HANNEN SWAFFER

"IS A CONSCIOUSNESS — NOT A DOGMA"

Noted Spiritualist Interviewed By ED BODIN

Hannen Swaffer, England's famous spiritualist, socialist and journalist, was relentlessly critical when interviewed by your reporter at a recent luncheon, in the Algonquin Hotel, New York City, given by Ralph G. Pressing, editor of Psychic Observer.

The so-called "Pope of Fleet Street", whose latest book is titled "My Greatest Story", opened up on all our opponents who are preventing Spiritualism from making a better world for humanity. Said Swaffer: "My Spiritualism has been instrumental in helping the Labor Government of Great Britain come into power in order to abolish poverty."

#### No Authorities

But he was not all "milk and " for all spiritualists. "There are dangers of dogmas and or-thodoxy spoiling Spiritualism as they ruined the Christian Church", he said. "We need home circles, not cathedrals. Christianity began with a group of home circles prac-ticing medium-ship. Then when stepped into orthodoxy, the trouble started, and slavery fol-lowed. A Spiritualist organization should be only the watch-dog for home circles and the rights of mediums—not the whole works or the authority. There is no authority in Spiritualism-only those who may have had more exper-And then he he said: "I ience than others." grew emphatic when he said: would like to see a home established for mediums to work with freedom and love, and not be constantly in fear of persecution.

Swaffer smiled when he mentioned The London Society for Psychical Research and The British College of Psychic Science, accusing such members of always being on the fence of playing safe. "These Societies", he said, 'are bound by a policy of not arriving at any conclusion, no mat-ter how strong the evidence."

And he mentioned another oranization with not flattery when said: "I have been honorary he said: president of the Spiritualist National Union since Conan Doyle. The organization has done good work in the past, but now members seem to waste their time by always formulating by-laws, instead of attending to the business of propaganda.

#### We Need Boosters

And then he said "Spiritualism needs boosters. People who are not afraid to tell what it has meant to them, and who make ef-fort to see home circles established with a call for guides, who are only too willing to guide. And if your motive is true—you will get good guides. You don't have to fear the devil. Guides can take care of those who hunger and

When asked about the conviction of British medium Helen Duncan who was recently tried under the old Wich-craft Act and spent eight months in jail, Swaffer said: "Mrs. Duncan should have been attached to some organization instead of being a lone-wolf. Having been informed on, by some orthodox church enemy and falsely accused of damages, the au-thorities figured they couldn't beat her on the usual Vagrancy Act, so they used the Witch-craft Act and all the miserable testimony they could dig up. The purpose wasn't to fine her or even put her in jail, but to give Spiritualism a body-

#### Millions of Spiritualists

When asked how Spiritualism was progressing in London, Swaf-fer said: 'There are over a mil-lion Englishmen who know and believe in Spiritualism, and it shall not be destroyed. But at the same time, let me warn mediums not to get in the habit of over-charging for their services. Helen Duncan was warned by her guides that there was a trap set for her; but she kept her hand out instead of up—and she paid the consequences. Let mediums listen to their guides before it is too late;

The Love of God Is Even Greater Than We Have Conceived!

ED. NOTE: While in London, the editors of Psychic Observer met Mr. Evans. This noted medium and spiritualist agreed to write regularly and this is the first in a series of articles.

One of the purposes for which the religions of the world exist is to prepare men for a life beyond. systems of religion affirm that man lives beyond death though none of them offer proof. For ages the world was content to go on accepting this belief for many centuries, the majority of people unquestionably accepted it, but it was not until the rise of the rationalistic spirit that men began to doubt its truth.

When they did, it was found that no system of religion was able to offer proof that man is a spirit and survives the change of death; the most they could do was to repeat what tradition had taught them, or what the early founders of their systems had said. Thus, at one time, it semed as if religion would die for want of evidence for its central claim.

#### The "Why" of Phenomena

It is curious that while most scrip'ures record psychic phenomena of various kinds ,and also that history records many things of a rare and strange nature relative to our psychic being, no one seems to have considered why, if these things happened in the past, they no longer did so. or were of such rare occurrence as to be regarded as mere illusions.

But doubtless this was due to the fact that any kird of psychic phenomena were regarded miraculous and therefore ou'side the realm of law. This will account for the reason why some scientists, who believe that the universe is one of law, were yet able to regard miracles as being outside the normal processes of na-

Thus we had the spectacle of men believing in law on weekdays, and miracle on Sundays. They kept the two things separate in their minds and so were not per-

turbed by the contradiction in their beliefs.

On the other hand, were those who carried the logic of their beliefs into the field of religion and for these there could be no such thing as miracle for anyone to assert that they had witnessed things which seemed to deny the supremacy of law was, for them, simly an absurdity.

#### Spiritualists Right!

For instance, how could any object rise from the ground against the law of gravitation, To them the thing was impossible yet every religion has in its records some accounts that seemingly deny the operation of gravitation.

The fact that we do not know all the laws of nature did not occur to them, but the broader minded on hearing of such phenomena determined to examine for themselves, and proving that the spiritualists were right, brought down upon their heads the scorn of their more sceptical and ignorant breth-

Now it is right and proper that enquiry should be made into the claims of religion, and when it as erts that man is a spirit and will live beyond death, the seeker has a right to ask whether there is any evidence of it.

#### Famous Rappings

Today we can point to a great array of unimpeachable testimony to prove the claim, and this in spite of theologians rather than through their support. The evidence comes through innumerable channels of every grade of society, for mediumship is a part of the make-up of mankind.

Mediums are to be found in every sphere of society-from the lowliest to the highest. The spirit people, when they opened the door between the seen and the unseen worlds in 1848, did not go to the Church, they did as they had done long ago in Palestine when they went to one who was of the people and used him as their instrument of enlightenment.

So in 1848, they went to a humble family in Hydesville and knocked at the door of the world. Happily some of the people of the world heard them and listened to their message.

#### There IS a Spiritual Body

By their so doing, there was revealed to the world the vast potencies of our psychic nature which has been a blessing to millions during the past ninety eight years. So while the existing religions were unable to give to the scientists the proof they demanded, the spirit people, through the channel of mediumship, gave that proof in "full measure pressed down and running over."

Today, no one need go without testimony to the life beyond, and may, if they take the trouble, obtain their own proof.

What then is the mechanism of survival? St. Paul told us long ago that there is a spiritual body." He did not say that it was something we should possess

when we die but that it is in existence now.

Everyone who has experienced astral projection is aware of this truth, and even those who have not had that unique experience can gather some notion of the reality of the spiritual body through their dream experiences.

#### A Theory Crumbles

It is a fact, not sufficiently noted, that in our dreams we know ourselves to be real people. We feel such, we act such, and talk and laugh and cry as in our waking Even though we regard this as merely imaginary it has for us a solidity and reality that gives dreams a distinction beyond the merely fanciful. But the evidence which Spiritualism gives clearly proves that St. Paul waright, "there is a spiritual body.

People often wonder what the next stage of being is like. From this fact we may make certain deductions that enable us to form in our minds some conception of the life beyond. Sometimes we hear it said, or we read statements to the effect that in the spirit world there is neither space nor time. That is just nonsense.

A world or body must exist somewhere, they must occupy space. A body must be in correspondence with an appropriate environment, hence space is a ne-

Remember that the spirit body corresponds to the physical body, and when we pass to the next stage of life we shall find our spirit body is as real to us as are our physical bodies now. Likewise the world we enter will be as real. even more so, than this world is

#### Travel Implies Space

The spirit world, although composed of finer substance than this, exists in space; it is in fact re-lated to this world. The spirit world has in it many of the fea-tures of this world. There are mountains and valleys, rivers and seas and lakes, forests and meadows, houses, temples and Halls of Learning. in space? Where are these if not

People in the spirit world travel travel implies a space to traverse. The spirit life is not a purely subjective existence, for subjectivity implies objectivity. The people on the other side live as we do both a mental and an objective life of practical doing. For

# **Psychic Maladjustments**

### What Has Been Done? What Can Be Done?

The few experts in psychology and medicine who have made a serious study of psychic maladjustments have discovered some very enlightening facts, little known or recognized as yet, by the rank and file in their professions.

Professor James H. Hyslop, founder of the American Society for Psychical Research, his family physician, Dr. Titus Bull, founder of the James H. Hyslop Foundation; and Dr. Carl Wickland of California, author of Thirty Years Among the Dead, have been outstanding in this field.

Speaking as one who assisted Dr. Hyslop and Dr. Bull for some years in their pioneering in this research may I give a brief report on some of the outstanding discovthat he or she is in need of help from a psychic angle. The only difficulty they meet may seem to be entirely physical or eries that they made.

First of all, a psychically maladjusted

person may be quite unaware of the fact physiological, giving them no hint whatever that the trouble lies where it does actually lie.

Psychiatrists and physicians are apt to call these people hypochon-driacs, who are morbidly concerned over what seem trifling symptoms and exaggerating the importance of them. They encourage the patient to deny the symptoms and take a more cheerful at-This of course can do no harm, but it often fails to do any

#### A Case In Point

If it fails, what is the psychia-trist to do? He shrugs his mental shoulders and joins the patient in fervently wishing he might be of the whole matter, feeling that there are so many other pat-ients who are in far more urgent need of his attention. And so there are, for he can do little for the type of hypochrondriac who isn't helped by denials.

A talented highly educated and charming lady, who was a member of the American Society for Psychical Research some years ago, came regularly to the Society's rooms to develop her ability as an automatic writer. She was the wife of a prominent jurist and related by marriage to a brilliant member of the medical fraternity. Her life was a busy, normal one,

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#### Experimental Seance

C., devoted three volumes of its Proceedings thirty years ago to the Doris Fischer Case of Mul-tiple Personality—the only case on record of a five-personality type that has ever been restored to normal, so far as we have ever heard.

Psychiatrists, eminent men, consulted in that case were unanimous in the opinion that it was an incurable institutional case. But they were mistaken. The young woman has been able for years to carry on her normal life, earn money, run a home and live usefully and happily.

The field for psychic reconstruc-tion is a vast one and when it is better understood and cultivated the asylum will lose possibly two-thirds of their population, in the opinion of a medical man who is prominent in one of the western states and on its hospital board.

He gave this as his considered judgment to Arthur Ford, several years ago, after a long interview on the problems of the so-called insane who would not really belong in asylums if physicians understood their problems from the psychic angle. Another time we shall perhaps be able to consider briefly one or two such instances that have come under my attention.

\* There is a branch of medicine now known as Psycho-somatic medicine which meets the needs of some patients bordering on this type. Medicine is slowly gaining ground in such matters.

These victims, according to Collins, were forced to dig graves before they were burned to death, later to occupy them.

#### Mediums Are Kind

If. after such experiences, G.I.'s can believe in God and continue to seek an expression of harmony and joy, then all Americans should strive to make our country a haven of peace—the inate desire of all freedom loving people.

To briefly summarize my two weeks survey of London Spiritualism, I'll comment

on a few points that impressed me. Not once did I a medium hear speak disparagingly of a co-worker.
Not once did I hear the word "fake" or "fraud." Mental and trance mediumship are the most popular. Large crowds attend all meetings.

I was impressed by the fact that all English people looked tired. After six years of strenuous war, they need a rest and plenty of food. Severe rationing prevents this and there is so much red tape and government supervision that there is practically no way to help

#### Oaten's Experiences

Since my return, I've sent many food packages to some of the people I met. A package cannot contain over eleven pounds, and in this weight, only 2 pounds of any one kind of food can be sent. The parcel must be marked unsolicited.

In England there are few mediums who demonstrate physical phenomena. It is claimed by some that climatic conditions inhibit the flow of ectoplasm which is neces

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sary to produce physical phenom-

During my chat with Ernest Oaten, this subject was discussed. He repudiated the theory of the climate being responsible for the lack of physical phenomena in lack of physical phenomena in England today. He told of having had wonderful experiences with physical mediumship some thirty years ago.

It appears to me that mediumship runs in cycles. Modern Spiritualism came into expression in America through the raps which a physical demonstration and shortly afterward, many outstanding physical phenomena mediums were developed: The Davenport Brothers, Eddy Brothers, the Bangs Sisters and D. D. Home. Some of these mediums visited England.

Later, a few extraordinary physical mediums were developed in England, such as William Hope, William Eglington and Cecil Husk and according to Mr. Oaten scores of lesser known mediums conducted private seances and home circles where physical phenomena was demonstrated.

#### A Comparison

In later years, in America, physical phenomena seemed to be supplanted by mental and trance mediumship. The outstanding exponents of these phases were Cora L. V. Richmond, May Pepper Vanderbilt, Moses Hull and numerous others.

In England the next psychical development seemed to express mental, i.e. clairvoyance and mental, i.e. clairvoyance and trance. Even to the present time, these phases predominate.

America, some claim the pendulum is swinging back to physical phenomena inasmuch as many of our outstanding mediums possess both mental and physical phenomena.

Perhaps the cycle may return to physical phenomena in England, as several of the younger mediums I met were developing physical phases. And so, it is evident that the spirit people use first one phase and then another to convince the earth people of the truth of personal survival and spirit communication.

#### We Must Do Our Part

When asked by Maurice Barbanell, former Psychic News editor "How do you think British Spiritualism compares with Spiritualism in Amerca"?, I replied, "As I see it, geography forbids a comparison. Some of our states, Pennsylvania or Texas, are as large as the United Kingdom. In America, it would be impossible to visit the scores of outstanding mediums and

centers in less than a year's time."

If all the American mediums lived in New York State, it would be feasible to have large and widely publicized propaganda meet-ings in New York City, where great crowds would be in attend-

If Spiritualism in America was so presented and the prominent people, I know to be interested, were all assembled in one state, we could have many more distinguished people on our platform. But since geography prevents such AUTHOR - HEALER

opportunities for propagation of this great truth, England must continue in her way, and America continue to follow her own path. Each country can only do so much good.

If each individual does his own li'tle bit, thus to make up the whole, the countries can accomplish much. I'll conclude with my simple little Pollyanna philos-ophy. "Each day, live, think and put into action the very best that you can, in accordance with the dictates of your own conscience, which is really the voice of your soul. God nor man can expect more. Whether you be English, American, African or Dutch, is of no importance in the eyes of God."

#### Distances Are Great

As I was not so well acquainted with London, and too, distances are great, I invited many other people to come to the Savoy Hotel to see me. Amongst these callers were persons whose names are familiar to those acquainted with the literature of Psychic Science and Spiritualism as Ernest Oaten, former editor of Two Worlds, Shaw Desmond and Hannen Swaffer.

It was a real pleasure to intimately visit with Mr. and Mrs. Oaten from Manchester. Mr. Oaten is England's grand old man of Spiritualism. To hear him relate some of his forty years research was educational. Both he and his wife are mediums. They have had remarkable experiences and guidance through their entire married life. Mr. Oaten, since his resignation as editor of Two Worlds, expects to devote all of his time to lecturing and writing on the subject of Spiritualism.

#### Kilnascrene Glasses

One of the most fascinating men, I've ever met is Shaw Desmond. with whom I spent an hour or more in conversation. His name was well known in the field of literature before he allied himself with Spiritualism. His books are meritorious. A student should not over-look Shaw Desmond's books: over-took Shaw Desmond's books:
"How You Live When You Die,"
"Spiritualism," "Love After
Death" and his latest is "Jesus or
Paul."

Harry Boddington, a profound student of psychic science came to visit me. He has the rare ability to plainly express, in simple words, the true implications of Spiritualism

Mr. Boddington perfected Kilnascrene glasses that aid the development of clairvoyance. During the war, the manufacture of this device was discontinued, but he expects to resume work on these glasses as soon as materials are procurable.



for no guide can offset the power of a medium's free will. The guide

can only guide—not force."

But Swaffer stuck to his main theme, that Spiritualism must be a consciousness and not an orthodoxy or dogma. "The people who make the best Spiritualists are those who have never had any orthodox religious training, but like agnostics and face facts rather than fancies of creed. Then as they see for themselves the result of home circle help, they accept it without inhibitions. Truth is a personal thing."

#### Make a Better World

Swaffer continued: "Each Spiritualist is an authority unto him-self. He will learn only by what he feels and experiences. less he attends some circle and becomes conscious of spiritual help and healing and inspiration—he cannot be a real pilgrim. The one purpose of Spiritualism is to make a better world of better people. Spiritualism is a consciousness of action, and building heaven on

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Earth. And you'll never find Earth. And you'll never find heaven through believing in ortholoxy, but by feeling God, and by doing God's will."

Mr. Swaffer's final challenge before going back to England "to protect it from the Churchills and with the state."

other orthodox leaders", was to predict the overthrow of the antispiritualist Franco whom Swaffer called "a barrier in the way of a better world."

And as a final word he said: "Silver Birch, the guide of our home circle in London, will visit you frequently. Don't be afraid to welcome him when he shows up at one of your circles. But be careful of what you say, for he comes back and tells us every word. And don't forget the purpose to build an idea of thought, and not an orthodoxy; for Spiritand not an orthodoxy; for spiritualism will win not on quantity but quality . . . the quality of soul . . . yes, the quality of love your neighbor, even if you have to hammer sense into him now and then. But he is still your brother. Cheerio."

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# Obstacles In Mediumship

Students desiring to unfold their psychic faculties should disregard attempts to see what they can "GET" unless they are satisfied they are receiving reasonable collaboration from their spirit helpers.

Spirits are not infallible; they experience extreme difficulty in making clear contact.

Every tudent of mediumship has needed to wrestle with the prob-lem of "self" which may so easily color or influence psychic reception. Indeed, a good many pospropensities abandoned the quest after preliminary efforts—for this one reason

It is, of course, better to do this than to brazenly flaunt so-called messages as a certain number of negligent and unthinking persons have done. In every walk of life, we find the pretentious both responsible and irresponsible.

Fundamental knowledge of Spiritualism should make seekers absolutely honorable. However, even with this grand intent, it is so necessary to be as scientific and as rigid as possible in making sure the contact with spirit is pure and true.

#### Harmony Essential

It is not easy to lay down any conclusive ruling, but I proffer a few thoughts which I feel, could be advantageous.

One should adopt a prayerful state of mind every time contact is Spiritualization of the consciousness at once charges the psychic centers with a rich power so that they can be distinguished from the physical senses and forces of the being.

Every time real effort is made in this direction, the realization of the nature of psychic forces becomes more definite till, in time, there is little difficulty in recognizing when the finer senses are really in action.

Then, to "switch them on" can be done at will providing of course, conditions in other direc-tions are propitious. Mediumship can rarely function successfully or reliably when there is inharmony in the surroundings.

Students for this reason, should disregard attempts to see what they can "get" unless they have reasonable cooperation. It may be tempting to "give" something to please a friend and, too many do this barely realizing that the purported message is likely some kind of concoction from themselves, subconsciously or otherwise.

In careful attempts to receive

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messages from spirit, there need be no fear for the guides and teachers will do wonders in controling the proceedings.

Prayerfulness (not of fanatical kind) plus true effort to clear the mentality of personal ideas, will prepare a fine field for the truth.

#### Eliminate Colorization

It so often is a trial to get messages through for those we know well and especially for ourselves. This is quite a natural condition. The sitter tends to be overly critical because he feels the medium may be projecting himself and the sensitive is ill-at-ease because of this and because he fears he may be unwittingly "filling in" with preconceived notions concerning the points in question.

I think this peculiar state applies to the "mental" phases of mediumship more than to the "physical" types because, in the "physical" types because, in the latter, spirit entities are usually able to function quite independ-antly of the psychic. But, even here, subtle impediments may at work and it is just as well to be careful of what may be acceptable.

I have found a good way to deal with a group seeking ordinary psychic messages is to get them to place articles in numbered envelopes. Then, I "read" the packages without knowing the owners until completion of the delineations. This helps to eliminate. to some extent anyway, coloration which is so possible especially when members of the audience are familiar to me.

#### Study Psychometry

Sometimes, a humorous note has been struck when my wife has surreptitiously placed an article of mine in a numbered envelope for this kind of psychometry. If I may say so, I have found that I have been the bearer of some accurate communications to myself!

I suggest students in unfoldment. classes should occasionally try their powers with articles without knowledge of ownership. Sitters could help by bringing tokens from friends outside the group, for a "reading."

Incidentally the study of psychometry is a good lead in attainment of reception. Spirit con-trols (as well as the potential medium) are helped by the magnetic rays emanating from personal be-longings. Such a method often speeds up the work. But students

must learn to "throw off" any disturbing influences from these objects. Force of will, is usually sufficient. In time, "vibrations" will be realized without any actual personal effect.

#### Emotion a Factor

We can learn to work understandingly with our guides. I have developed a technique of asking the teachers to impart phrases to me in a style foreign to my way of speech—especially if I should be in doubt about the validity of reception. By this method, I can be reasonably sure that I am recciving from the other side.

We must make allowance for the fact that when loved ones strive to communicate they may, because of emotion or over-anxiety, pass through data that would prove to be inaccurate. Perhaps they do not altogether understand the laws governing contact and so become enmeshed in a whirlpool which renders them partially irresponsible. It would be wise to advise sitters of this so they can make all due allowances and considerations on this score.

Experienced mediums will usually find their controls will help to decipher the outpourings these anxious spirit-friends. Students should firmly ask for the aid of their guides when any kind of confusion arises. The act of requesting this gives the guides the power and authority to act.

#### The Laws of Spirit

It is never good to speak sharply to spirit people but to ask with due reverence for their supervision. Becoming curt or demanding will often cause the interpolation of mischievious entities and the trouble set up by these is incalculable, as every advanced occultist knows.

We can face the fact that, although our spirit friends are by no means infallible they do know a great deal. The thing is for them to "get it through" and that is why we must ever aspire and study that we may help them. The line of contact is exceedingly delicate and only love and persistent effort can really hold it intact.

So long as we clean our minds and put aside prejudices, jealous ies and the like, we can be assured of becoming to some degree at any rate, a reliable "receiving set" for the wonderful tidings which are due to this morose world of ours.

The spirit guides know the laws and do their best to work in accordance wi'h them. If we likewise, obey all we can, the principles of spiritual science we need have naught to fear, for then re-markable power and intelligence would be generated and we would just know the Heaven World is successfully interceding with us.

#### Use Common Sense

Each aspirant to the sacred science of mediumship must take it upon himself to place trust in the All Being as he himself, strives with every vestige of vision at his command, to become a discerning instrument for spiritual communications.

"Try the spirits"—but also constantly "try yourselves" that you are honest in every conceivable degree.

Do not thrust aside Divinely given faculties just because you may be too indolent to allow good common-sense to rule your desire to become a medium of real worth! If you are convinced that it is not for you to become a psychic vessel then, by all means, do not tamper with the science but instead, radiate all the love you can that others, with promising qualities may be stimulated and ncouraged.

## Nurse Sees Spirit At Patience's Bedside

In the still hour before dawn Hilda Heymann sat in the darkened room of her patient, an old woman of past eighty, thinking of nothing but her own weariness and desire to sleep.

The patient was sleeping quietly, and was in no immediate danger. There was no light in the room but the small blue one by the nurse's table, only the dim outline of the big bed was visible.

Closing her eyes, Mrs. Heymann decided to sleep for ten minutes, trusting to her trained instinct to waken her.

Waking with a start, she looked at the clock. She had slept for twenty minutes. With a feeling of guilt, she turned her eyes to the bed, and to her horror saw a dim

form above the footboard. Keeping very still, she spoke in a low voice, fearing to startle the patient, for she was quite sure it was the patient, a selfish and cantankerous old woman, trying to make trouble by getting up in bed.

#### She Couldn't Believe

Then, slowly, with an increasing sense of terror, she saw the figure was not that of her patient, whose sleeping form could be seen clear-ly as her own eyes became accustomed to the dim light. Turning her gaze back to the thing by the footboard, every detail of the figure was plainly visible.

It was the head, shoulders and torso to the waist of an old woman. She had a gentle, sorrowful face, and wore a close fitting lace edged cap, a white linen night gown, edged with lace at cuffs and neck. The face seemed alive, the eyes moved, the lashes were visible. There was no question but that this was a human form. There was a definite likeness to the patient in the bed, but it was just as definitely not she.

For several moments the terrified nurse stared, impressing every detail of that sad face into her when, quite suddenly it vanished.

She tried to dismiss the thing as a trick of her overwrought nerves. She told herself that it was imagi-nation, a trick of light. She had been nursing her own husband through pneumonia during the day, while keeping the particularly trying night work, and had but recently arrived as a refugee from Europe.

#### Then She Knew

But her keen mind would not accept this explanation. She knew what she had seen, and had to speak to someone, hear a human voice. Going to the room in the large apartment where her patient's companion was sleeping, she awakened her, and in an apologetic voice said:

"I must talk to someone, my nerves have just played such a trick on me."

The companion listened with interest, asked questions, then said:

"You saw it alright. That's Mrs. A's sister. She died in Europe, some years ago, in an institution. She was a good soul, but a mental case. Though the doctors aren't expecting it, I think Mrs. A. will die

Very soon Mrs. A. did die. Now several years have passed. The image she saw that night is as clear as ever in the mind of Hilda Heymann, who does not "believe in spirits—or anything like that," and has never, before or since, had anything like a similar experience, and can only say. "I saw her alright."

# What They Say About Us

Noted Woman Psychic Researcher Reports Her Experiences With Some American "High Thought" Institutions

No Organization Has a Monopoly On Higher Truth.

#### By BARBARA McKENZIE

That the truths of Spiritualism and interest in Psychic Science is growing cannot be denied. It is vouchsafed by the fact that literally hundreds of professional men and distinguished scholars see its true place in the scheme of things. Narrowness towards the whole subject is expressed by some oc-cult and New Thoughts groups in the States, an attitude which I took occasion vigorously to combat as revealing complete ignorance of the aspects of the subject.

To spread fear and mistrust is certainly not the business of New Thought-though we are at one with them if they will suggest a wise caution in undertaking psychic investigation.

#### The Rosicrucians

I spent a few days at the "Rosi-crucian Fellowship" at Oceanside, California. In a leaflet, I found

"The Rosicrucian Philosophy teaches that man possesses a latent sixth sense which has been developed in some, and which will eventually be developed by all. This sense enables its possessor to perceive and investigate the super-physical realms where those live whom we call dead. However, we strongly disapprove of mediumistic methods of contacting these realms."

There is only one way of "contact," by mediumship at one level or another. It is still medium-ship even if it is not the profes-sional order, and even when accomplished by oneself, and most persons can only open the door by the opportunities offered with the simpler aspects which psychic science advocates.

At the Unity School in Kansas City where I met many pleasant people, two leaflets for free distribution purport to be a reply to the question, "Would you advise me to investigate Spiritualism?"

anyone to investigate Spiritualism. A large number of the people who appeal to us for help, attribute their trouble to dabbling in Spir itualism, to sitting in circles and to following the advice given by mediums. We do not advocate Spiritualism, it is our work to tell our students that they will escape much hard experience by having nothing to do with it. No spiritualistic ideas are ever sent out from this center . . . Spiritual truth and Spiritualism are as wide apart as the poles. The Bible is an exponent of Spiritual truth and in every instance where the sub-ject of Spiritualism is mentioned in the Bible it is with disapproval No truth can be discerned in îts purity by seeking through me-diumship the advice of those who have fallen asleep.

#### Spiritualist 20 Years

Many of our Spiritualist friends write that we are ignorant of Spiritualism. I was a Spiritualist for about twenty years before coming into the understanding of Truth. was more or less acquainted with mediums and speakers in the Spiritualistic cult during that time. or many years I thought that Spiritualism solved all the problems of existence, but I now see that it falls short of a comprehension of the absolute.

So Charles Fillmore, the respected leader of this movement which numbers millions in the States, and into whose offices thousands of dollars pour daily in freewill offerings for absent healing treatments, Mr. Fillmore, if a ing treatments, Mr. Fillmore, if a Spiritualist for twenty years, should know better than to speak of "advice from our friends who have 'fallen asleep'."

I had personal talks both with him and with Mrs. Max Heindel,

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pointing out that with many other Spiritualists, we were deeply in-terested in the advance of Truth in every respect, and that our end of it the borderline where people stepped off from the materialistic outlook into the world of the subtler senses, was a most impor-tant strategical point, embarrassed with many difficulties, but which, safely passed, resulted in their own and other New Thought movements being constantly fed by such students. Neither of them seemed to be aware of the serious work going on in Psychic Sci-

The great Christian Science Movement adopts a similar attitude. No guidance is given on the uprisings of psychic activity, which visit individuals and which have to be dealt with, only warn-- "Keep off" — "Beware" Evil"!

One Sunday in San Francisco in a church crowded with an audience of upper and middle class ence of upper and middle class people. I listened to an address, or rather readings on "Modern Necromancy and Its Dangers." the subject for the day not only there, but in every Christian Science church throughout the world. Happily the matter, in my estimawas thoroughly innocuous, reflecting the atmosphere of Mrs. Eddy's early days in its references to "animal magnetism," etc. If the handling had been an "informed" one, Spiritualists might well fear such a mass attack, listened to by millions of sincere souls.

#### Unworthy Attitude

It is well that Spiritualists should realize that not only have we to answer the attacks of orthodoxy, but many branches of new-er thought. This attitude is un-worthy, and in the name of the message they themselves are seeking, in the face of many difficulties to bring to the world, I would call their attention to this matter. Happily, however, we have interested students among individual members in all those bodies.

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The Church believes that Spiritualism is large enough for all its organizations, publications, churches and individual workers; and further, that there is room That the truth which all of for more. us teach is far greater than any of us.

The Church affirms that it has tried to do its best for the religion of Spiritualism, irrespective of the group affiliation enjoyed by churches or the particular beliefs of individual Spiritualists.

The Church hopes that all Spiritualists, everywhere, will attain whatever high goals they may have set, and will do so in the friendly and enthusiastic though dignified manner which our great religion deserves and demands.
