How To Improve Public Relations

One of the most enlightening addresses ever to be presented before a group of Spiritualists, was delivered by JOHN WILSON HOOD, New York City attorney, at a recent convention of THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF SPIRIT-UALISTS. This address, delivered at PYTHIAN TEM-PLE, N. Y. C., As published with special permission of the General Assembly of Spiritualists and cannot be republished without their written consent.

JOHN WILSON HOOD'S ADDRESS

Officers of the General Assembly and Friends: It is customary officers of the General Assembly and Friends: It is customary at this time to report on the legal situation, and I intend to do so, but most of the time available should be devoted to a discussion of the more fundamental problem of public relations, for any permanent solution of our legal troubles requires a basic analysis and improvement of our reputation with the public.

At the moment, moreover, we are free from legal difficulties.

There has not been a single new elimination of arrest of a General Assembly min, any so-called

arrest of a General Assembly minister since the decision of the New York Court of Appeals acquiting one of our General Assem-bly ordained ministers. rendered in July of last year.

Value of Organization

At one time, however, there were perding in the New York City Magistrate's Courts alone, six cases against our ministers. Without going into the details, I might say in a general way that the decision of the New York Court of Appeals determined that under New York laws a Spiritualist meeting, properly conducted—that is in a way that you and I would say is proper—is legal.

The decision in that case is of the greatest benefit to all of you, and it should profoundly impress you with a very important lesson—the value of organization. There is too much of a tendency among Spiritualists to be individualistic, to assume that they do not need any organization.

It was solely General Assembly effort, and General Assembly money, which made possible this very advantageous position in which you now find yourselves. The arrested minister alone, did not even have the money required to pay the printing bills in the Court of Appeals. Spiritualists should become organization-minded, and present a united front to the world, not only for common defense, but for common progressive action. Help one another, and you help yourselves.

What the Church Needs

Loyalty to your organization, loyalty in interest, effort, and money contributions, will make that organization strong, and able to do an increasing number of beneficial things for you. Assured of financial stability through existing support, your organization need not be too lenient in the admission of newcomers, and can be severe with malefactors within ranks, to the ultimate end: all the reputable psychics, in; all

the disreputable ones, out.

In fact, what the Spiritualist Church needs is more sound, solvent, and responsible organizations like your General Assembly, and any so-called governing bodies that exist chiefly on pa-per, and whose faults range all the way from being merely insolvent, to being more or less irresponsible, n.in.aining no



disciplinary HOOD control, and ordaining almost anyone for a small cash consideration.

Another great benefit of organization is that it enables us, continuously, through comparing the ideas of all of us, to solve the common problem of how to conduct our affairs. There must necessarily be some right way to conduct a Spiritualist Church. That way can be found, and as we jointly find it, and make up our what it is, and what stand for, we should all stick to it.

Get Your People Together

In making up our minds about the proper way to conduct our own churches, we would do well to study the practices of the older and more orthodox churches. Some Spiritualists think that their work is different, and that they may more or less disregard the procedure in the other faiths. They overlook the fact that the procedure in other churches, aside from specific dogmatic ritual, is the result of long experience with certain problems which we also face.

One might almost say that as evolution has given the lion strength, and the antelope speed, to enable them to solve the problems of their existence, so evolution has given the dominant and successful churches forms of procedure which best enable them to meet the problems confronting a

What, then, are the things about other churches which are worth of our imitation? The first thing that comes to mind is group activities. Other churches constantly get their people together. Anyone who reads the religious press will find one article after another expressing approval of methods adopted for getting the congregation together

for various purposes, quite aside

from public worship.

There are not enough group activities in the average Spiritualist Church. Everyone knows the Pastor, and there is a personal social relationship of greater or less strength between the Pastor and various members of the congregation, but ordinarily not enough social relationship between the members of the congregation themselves.

Making a big success of a Spiritualist Church, or any Church, is not a one man job; it calls for a lot of teamwork among interested persons, to do the work, and raise the money, which a big church re-

Your Church Must Satisfy

The Pastors should not only make an effort to know personally the visitors to their churches, but should introduce such persons to one another when opportunity permits, and endeavor to build up group sentiment among the people who come regularly to the church. They should feel that the church is their church, and its activities are their activities, and its progress is their progress.

This effort can be aided by keeping the atmosphere of the church as inspirational as possible. There are many people who go to church, no rom a sense of duty or a conscious choice to en-gage in public worship, but from deep and definite feeling that they always leave the church more inspired than when they came in.

Be Courteous

Such an inspirational atmosphere is, to begin with, one of dignity. A religious meeting, as distinguished from a social gathering, is treated in other churches as a solemn occasion, and it should be in ours. There has been a regrettable tendency in a very few Spiritualist churches, for the Pas-tor to handle the message service in a rather flippant manner, with remarks that would only be appropriate to a stage performance.

This may be entertaining to


This may be entertaining to some visitors, but it gives the average person the wrong idea of both Pastor and the Spiritualist Church. Flippancy in a minister is an aggravation to pious people. It hurts our reputation and creates unnecessary opposition.

An individual minister has no more right to injure the reputa-tion of the whole Church by such conduct, than the engineer of a passenger train has to get drunk at his post on the theory that getting drunk is his own business.

Difficulties To Meet

We should endeavor to improve the quality of the music in our churches. If music is, as Plato said, the parent of love, so it is the nurse of religious feeling. In churches of other denominations it has been noticed that an improvement in the music at the service has been accompanied by an increase in church attendance

Of course, there are practical difficulties; good music is expensive. We are not prepared to install any pipe organs, but the most successful churches can probably (Contnued on Page 4, Col. 1) Dr. Alexander Jonathan McIvor-Tyndall (1850-1943)



The picture above, Dr. A. J. McIvor-Tyndall, was reproduced from large photograph, loaned to Psychic Observer by Lillian Stillman, life-long friend of the great English psychologist and spiritualist,

Thousands throughout United States, Canada and Great Britain will recall having witnessed Mclvor-Tyndall's public demonstrations of clairvoyance and what some choose to call "thought-transference." He was a colorful figure attracting capacity audiences wherever he was scheduled to appear.

For many years, Mclvor-Tyndall spent the summer months at Lily Dale, N. Y. and when he passed away several years ago at Santa Barbara, California, his wife, C. Laura Mclvor-Tyndall returned to Lily Dale where she disposed of her husband's scrap-book chronicles and an immense library.

Mclvor-Tyndall was something more and something less than a Spiritualist. He accepted telepathy both as a scientific fact and as a guiding influence in his own personality. He did believe in the survival of the human spirit and the possibility of its communication, but he constantly urged that the exercise of such powers be subjected to keen scrutiny.

The origin and age of McIvor Tyndall were the subject of speculation even among his intimate friends. He had a striking personality and appeared to be the offspring of a family of standing in England.

He admitted an age varying from 80 to 90 years, and there are records where, on several occasion, heated arguments ensued when the subject of his age was mentioned. When called to settle the matter, McIvor-Tyndall would smile and say he was "full of life and joy and health" . . . his age wasn't important.

In looking over his scrap-book, there are accounts of his activities on five continents. He was heralded as: "A Great Psychologist", "The Owl of Ancient and Modern Wisdom", "The Sherlock Holmes of Psychology," "A Great Student of Human Life and Destiny", "Supreme Interpreter of Life's Expression" and "A Master of Mysticism".

The Denver Post, in 1906, published every week for over three months, a full page account of Mclvor-Tyndall's philosophical teachings ... attributing to him many feats of mental gymnastics (i.e.) that he was able to "straighten the tangled webs of life"; "cut through the wilderness of experience"; "connect the finite with the infinite"; "solve nan's mysteries"; "prove that everyone was right from their own view-point"; "man is his brother's keeper"; "analyze the religious instinct of the human race" and "dissect human experience by psychological

McIvor-Tyndall, pen name "Ali Nomad", was the author of two books: "Cosmic Consciousness" and "Sex", The Unknown Quantity". Both books are now out of print.

The logic of his philosophical viewpoints was profound . . . see "FAMOUS TYNDALLISMS" on page 4.

I do not suppose it will be given to anyone on earth ever to understand fully all the varieties of mediumship and their manifold ways of manifesting.

But, within the limits, Leaf has set himself, he has given a very good summary of mediumship a practiced today by Spiritualist all over the world.

And while our truths are spreading at increasing pace, it is well that our writers should concentrate on showing that we are working in a natural sphere governed by nat-ural laws which must be obeyed before they are conquered.

If we are to prove to the world that we have a teaching of endless benefit, we must explain very simply our reasons.

Appeal to Reason

Leaf has chosen to explain, rather than to expound, and to appeal to reason rather than to raise controversies.

And when he has described each main type of mediumship, he tells how that particular faculty which produces it may be developed, from astral traveling to clairvoyance and healing.

If there is any criticism, it is

that Leaf has not taken full notice in this book of the very many ex-cellent mediums, of whom he is one, and the work they are doing

The "Crewe Circle"

There is hardly any kind of mediumship that is not practiced generally throughout England and America, yet I find very few acknowledgments of that fact.

But perhaps he did not want to mention one in case he would be Still I accused of partisanship. would rather have had that than give the impression that nothing new has happened since the days of Eva C. or Hope of Crewe.

Leaf has travelled widely and has met with corroboration of psychic teaching all over the world, showing again that we have every-thing to gain by spreading our teaching over the widest possible sphere.

For wherever there are men and women, and children, there are mediums. And where there are psychics they ought to be taught how to develop the powers by which we make and maintain contact with the Spirit world, thus proving Survival and all that depends on it.

'What Mediumship Is" is a very good book to have ready for the eager inquirer and the skeptic.

manage to install an electronic organ, and those of less affluence could provide a piano, to accompany the congregation, and to furnish incidental music.

Even a phonograph is better than no music at all, though the use of phonograph records has something incongruous about it to some churchgoers, and this is certainly the case where the phonographic equipment is not good, and the record is worn and scratched.

The inspirational quality of music cannot be denied, whether it is played during a period of meditation, or it accompanies congregational singing. Congregational singing is a rather modern development in religious ritual, but many people get a lift, and a sense of personal participation, from it that will make them glad that they came to your church. Keep it in mind in planning a service.

Value of Prayer

Along with this, I suggest that you remember the value of common prayer, as distinguished from individual prayer. You know the psychic value of people grouped together, acting in unison, and from that knowledge you can appreciate the inspirational and psychic value of common prayer.

The Lords Prayer, a common prayer for the healing of the sick, come to mind, and other simple common prayers could be taught to the regular members of your congregations.

In addition to studying the methods of other churches, you

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should observe the traits and practices of successful ministers of other denominations. Some of us are inclined to place too much faith on our psychic ability and fail to develop our ministerial qualities.

I call to your attention two related facts: first, one does not have to be clairvoyant to make a success of the ministry; second, the mere fact that you are clairvoyant will not of itself make you a successful minister. The proof of these two statements is all around you in the careers of various persons within your own sphere of observation.

Moral Leadership

Consequently you should study and imitate the traits of other successful ministers. It is within your ability to do this, for such traits are not inborn, but acquired by observation, experiment, and practice, in the same way that a woman, for instance, learns to become a good hostess. You should learn the necessary traits, and practice them, and the more they become a habit, the easier they will be for you.

A final thing worth mentioning about the ministers of other denominations is their ability to exert moral leadership in the community. Our ministers need not be too retiring, nor afraid to stand up for things they know to be right.

We should constantly bear in mind that our words and actions influence the life of our community, and that we have a community responsibility to make sure that our influence and advice exerted in a beneficial manner. In giving advice to people, we should have constantly in mind — what will be the consequences of this advice?

Education Necessary

I would especially like to point out here the fact that it is not necessary for you to have a high degree of formal education in order to command the respect of the community. Some of you may feel inferior and backward because you are not graduates of a divinity school. There is no need to feel like that. Billy Sunday, and many of the greatest preachers, had no such training.

You can amply educate yourself by regular reading and study. The important thing in attaining your proper position in the community is not education, but character character that shines like a beacon light.

Now, quite aside from the problems of our own churches and ministers, the Spiritualist movement in general has certain specific faults, which is holding it

back, but which can be corrected.

One need not know very much about Spiritualism to see that something must be wrong with the movement, when it has so much to offer the world, and yet occupies a rather weak position.

It is clear from the history of the movement since the middle of the last century that it has not justified its early promise, and that certain powerful support which it once had has drifted

For example, the Census Bureau makes it clear that both the Christian Scientists and the Seventh Day Adventists, whose movements were started later than that of Modern Spiritualism, have made much greater progress in this country, in finances, prestige, and numbers of adherents, in spite of the fact that, from our point of view, Spiritualism has something to offer the public which is more acceptable and more consoling.

How To Improve

Also, at the beginning of the movement many of the most prominent people in this country and abroad were Spiritualism's ardent advocates and supporters. This support has more or less ebbed away, and at the present time most of the adherents come from the poorer classes, while the more substantial element in the community seems to hesitate to become connected with the movement.

This condition must be corrected if Spiritualism is to substantially improve its position. It has occurred to me that some mediums, at the present time, occupy about the same position in the public eye as stock promoters. The public has been warned against both by long and intensive educational campaigns in the American Press, with the result that the public tends to assume that either a medium or a stock promoter is a fraud.

The truth of the matter, of course, is that there are honest people in both lines of activity, and that the honest and well-intentioned ones suffer financially and in reputation from the evil activities of the dishonest ones.

Having this in mind, I questioned a client of mine who throughout his life had enjoyed rather exceptional success in sell-

ing promotion stock. He had raised money for many mining enterprises, including the largest Tungsten mine in the United States, and had raised hundreds of thousands of dollars to manufacture some of his own inventions.

In the course of this work, he had made some very prominent friends, including the late inventor, Thomas Edison, and the builder of the Panama Canal, General Goethals, and he used to boast that in spite of all the difficult business he had done, and the failure of some of his enterprises, he had never in his life been sued.

Be Careful of Details

This struck me as so remarkable, in view of my common observation that stock promoters usually enjoy poor success and have a hard time staying out of trouble, that I asked him how in the world he ever did it.

He thought for a moment, trying to analyze the matter himself. Finally he came up with this conclusion. "Well," said he, "I think it was because I was always meticulously honest."

I want particularly to call your attention to the word, meticulously, as it explains a good deal. It means to be excessively careful of small details.

In other words, this man was extremely careful not to mislead or be unfair to anyone, even down to small details. People did not mind failure on his part, as long as the facts, the risks and difficulties had previously been made clear to them.

What people would have obobjected to in his case, and what they object to now, in the case of mediums, is someone regarding them as fools and trying to take unfair advantage of them.

Meticulous Honesty

It is clear to me that the individual Spiritualist, who has any psychical ability at all, can overcome the handicap of the "bad reputation" of Spiritualists in general, and achieve personal success, by adopting the same tactics of meticulous honesty.

The world is so warned against dishonest mediums that the world would flock to one that was surely honest. By being meticulous about it, the honest and intelligent Spiritualist can make it obvious to even the most stupid and propagandized person that this particular medium is an exception to what is thought to be the general situation.

there are certain concrete things which the individual Spiritualist can start doing immediately. First is to make perfectly clear to the public the actual limitations on the medium's psychic powers.

We tend to judge other people by ourselves, and to assume that the general public knows as much about such limitations as we do. This is not the case.

Competitive Pressure

Most people really do not know what to expect, and tend to run to extremes in their thinking; one group thinks that the medium has no powers at all, and all results are produced by trickery; and the other group thinks that the mediums powers are considerably in excess of what they are, and expects a corresponding impossible performance.

By properly presenting the truth, we could win the support of both groups. The sceptics would realize that there is something to it. after all, and would cease to be our enemies, while the gullible would cease putting competitive pressure on mediums for impossible phenomena.

This competitive pressure caused by the ignorance of the public drives down the whole standards of the movement, just as sweat-shop conditions in an industry used to drive down wages, because one employer wouldn't cut wages to the bone, some other emplover would, and undersell him in the market.

Spirits Have Opinions

This program of educating the public as to what the medium cannot be expected to do, must necessarily vary somewhat with the talent of the particular medium. but certain general points pertain to the conduct of our own churches, and I should mention them.

First of all. it must be made clear to the public that spirit messages cannot always be relied upon for accuracy, whether in regard to present or future events. For various reasons, mistakes are made

Concerning future events, it is perhaps best to regard the average message as an expres sion of spir't opinion, though this opinion may have value because of superior knowledge of the pres ent, gained telepathically or in some other way.

This is indicated by our experience that some prophecies fail and also by the fact that one can go to any half-dozen mediums, and ask a question about the future, and sometimes get different answers.

Public Must Be Educated

This is to be expected if future messages are, as I say, usually spirit opinion, but would not be the case if a spirit could always say with certainty what the future is going to be. This point should be made very clear to the public.

If it is made clear, you will retain your friends even though your messages fail at times. If it is not made clear, people disappointed in one message will think that you just invented it, and will never come back to see you. What is worse, they will go around giv-ing you a bad reputation.

I think that some Spiritualists. as well as the general public, need some education on this topic, for they place entirely too much reliance upon messages themselves.

Communication Misunderstood

For example, Life Magazine recorded a couple of weeks ago, that the Navy Department received many letters of advice prior to the holding of the Bikini Atom Bomb Tests, and among them, was a letter from a lady Spiritualist in San Francisco that the test must not be held, because she had received a neid, because she had received a spirit message from a Doctor Cushing to the effect that the test would cause the entire Pacific Ocean to turn yellow.

Naturally, the change of color did not occur, and the entire movement is more or less held up to ridicule because of the actions of one Spiritualist, who seems to have thought that the message was infallible

Next in importance to educating the public that messages are subject to error and can be wrong, is the need for telling the public that the medium cannot be expected off-hand to contact any specified spirit upon demand. Some people have the idea that a medium is like a telephone through which they can contact any desired spirit at any time.

Discuss the Phenomena

The public needs to be disabused promptly of this erroneous idea by the collective and general action of all of us. If they hear this fact preached to them in all our Churches, they will believe it, and they not go running from medium to medium trying to find one willing to give them off-hand at any time a purported message from a specified spirit.

Allowing the present condition of ignorance to continue creates a

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

The continuance of communication over such a long period, too, with the accumulation of facts, must assist in carrying complete conviction.

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competitive situation which tends to keep standards low and prevent progress.

The foregoing information, as well as other accurate information and advice about the movement, and phenomena, can be given to the public in several ways. It can form the subject matter of brief talks at meetings. It can be explained informally to individuals. It can be written upon a sign which may be posted in the Church or Meeting Room, for the benefit of ignorant visitors.

I composed such signs for sev eral prominent churches, and will be glad to do the same for any of you, without charge, if you correspond with me on the subject.

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the movement can realize its po tential growth. This growth think, will be as a religion rather than a science. In the scientific world, we are among enemies; in the theological world, among natural friends.

Scientific men, pushing their research in biology and the allied sciences, have arrived at certain metaphysical postulates which are wholly inconsistent with our basic position. To accept our would require a reorientation of all their ideas, and there is a natural resistance to this.

Phenomena Exists!

Scientific research in the field is inadequate and conducted in a sceptical manner, a manner which might be described as unscientific it is not open-minded. One of the very latest books on psychology expresses no clear cut opinion about clairvoyance, but merely gives the tabulated results of a questionnaire sent to a large number of psychologists.

A small percentage of them believed in it, a larger percentage denied its existence, and the great majority couldn't make up their minds whether it existed or not. A group of men who adopt this attitude toward the available evidence are hardly good prospective converts to our point of view.

In the religious world, on the other hand, the majority of theo-logians, if not all of them, concede that the phenomena in which we are interested exists, though they may disagree as to its interpretation, or disapprove the uses made of it.

Theologians, therefore, are and must be the natural friends of our viewpoint. We need them and they need us. They need us, for our practical and present day proofs of the existence of the supernat-ural; we need them for their scholarship, their organization, and their standing in the community. We should close ranks with them against the common enemies of religion.

The enmities which Spiritualism has made among other religious sects are entirely artificial, could have been avoided. We can cure this situation by refraining from criticizing other sects and their beliefs. We must realize that they cannot believe less than we do, for with our limited dogma we are almost a common denominator of religion in general, and we must grant that it is their privilege to believe more than we do, without criticism from us.

All Should Be Honored

The specific suggestions I have made can be easily and quickly put into practice, and the more that this is done, the greater the cumulative effect and the individual benefit to you all.

There is no reason, with proper attention to your public relations, such as I have outlined, why any talented Spiritualist cannot be honored and successful.

Trouble with the police will disappear. The forces of authority, instead of being arrayed against you, will be on your side. The early promise of the Spiritualist movement will be fulfilled, to the great benefit of the world.

At the present time, the world is holding Spiritualism's promissory note, on which too little has been paid on account. It is now long past duc. Let us proceed to pay it in full.

Allan Kardec Psychic Researcher

The Great French

Allan Kardec, the Father of Spiritism in France. His real name was Hypolyte Leon Denizard Rivail. His pseudonym originated in mediumistic communications. Both Allan and Kardec were said to have been his names in previous incarnations.

The story of his first investigation into spirit manifestation is ewhat obscure. Le Livre des Esprits (the Spirits' Book), which expounded a new theory of human life and destiny, was published in 1856.

According to an article by Alexander Aksakof in The Spiritualist in 1875, the book is based on trance communications received through Mlle. Celina Bequet, a professional somnambulist who, for family rea-

sons took the name of Celina laphet and controlled by her grandfather M. Hahnemann and Mesmer, gave under his name medical advice.

Her mesmerist, M. Roustan believed in the plurality of existences. This may or may not have had an influence. The fact is that in her automatic scripts the spirits communicated the doctrine of reincarnation.

In 1856, Rivail was introduced to the circle by Victorian Sardou. He was entrusted with the scripts, correlated the material by a number of questions and published it without mentioning the name of the medium.

It is difficult to state how far Aksakof's information, covered the truth.. He obtained them in the same course of a personal interview with Celina Japhet in Paris. It was she who revealed that the name Allan was born in a previous incarnation by Rivail. Kardec was revealed by Rose, another medium by whose help he formed a circle of his own.

In 1867, Le Livre des Esprits was issued in a revised form and later attained to more than twenty editions. It has become the rec-

ognized text book of spiritistic philosophy in France. This philosophy is distinct from *Spiritualism* as it is built on the main tenet that spiritual progress is effected by a series of compulsory reincarnations.

Allan Kardec became so dogmatic on this point that he always disparaged physical mediumship, the objective phenomena of which did not bear out his doctrine, and encouraged automatic writing, where the danger of contradiction owing to the psychological influence of pre-conceived ideas, was less. As a consequence experimental psychic remained twenty years behind in France.

The few French physical mediums were never mentioned by La Revue Spirite, the monthly magazine that Allan Kardec, founded. Nor did the Society of Psychologic Studies, of which he was the President, devote attention to them.

Camile Bredil, a very good physical medium, only acquired celebrity in St. Petersburg and Allan Kardec ignored the important mediumship of D. D. Home after he declared himself against reincar-

In 1864, he published Le Livre des Mediums. In it the unpublished portion of the Japhet scripts are said to have been liberally used. His next books were: The Gospel as Explained by Spirits, 1864,

Heaven and Hell, 1865, Genesis. 1867, Experimental Spiritism and Spiritualist Philosophy.

In England, Anna Blackwell was the most prominent exponent of the philosophy of Allan Kardec. She translated his books into English. In 1881 a three volume work was published in London on the esoteric side of the gospel, under the title *The Four Gospels*. This book, with the publication of which Miss Blackwell was associated, was described as a further development of Allan Kardec's religious philosophy.

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HUNDREDS WITNESS RARE DEMONSTRATION

UNDER TEST CONDITIONS

The pictures on this page tell the story. Exhibit No. 3 is a reproduction of a spirit picture taken by J. EDWARD at CAMP SILVER BELLE, Ephrata, Pa., last July. This picture was taken under strict test conditions. The editors of Psychic Pleasant Observer supervised the comrecognized her son, Ensign Normittees in charge of the films and the development of the negatives. was lost in an airplane accident abroad the U.S.S. Wasp in 1942.

During an afternoon service, at which time this picture (No. 3) was taken, several hundred persons were in attendance. The picture shows the audience assembled in Silver Belle's auditorium. The medium, J. Edward, delivered a short address . . . stressing the "seems" of psychic photography and then took three pictures; No. 3 on this page being one of the three.

Shortly after, the picture was developed and two persons were recognized positively (i.e.) Grace S. Kieb. 318 Broadway, Point THE PROOF!

No More Doubt

As you know her face appeared (see No. 3, upper right center) on the group auditorium picture taken by I. Edward at Camp Silver Belle on that memorable afternoon. The next day, her face again appeared once on a group picture and once on a private picture taken by Mr. Edward of myself alone (a total three times) hope this picture will serve as positive identification

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so that your readers will know that our dear ones can, under certain conditions, prove that they still live and never lose their identities."

And now the story has been told, except that some may wonder why the other three spirit pictuses on No. 3 were not recognized. All three have, but an earth picture for identification, has not as yet been submitted for comparison.

About the "Seems"

In any case, according to Mr. Edward, that is one of the "Seems" of spirit photography. No one can tell why a spirit would take the trouble to manifest if they did not think that some one present would recognize them and make an effort to prove their claim. It would "seem" quite a simple matter for most anyone in spirit to manifest in this way . . . since some "seem" to have no difficulty. Another 100 years of research in this field may bring the answer to all of these "seems" but I am afraid we'll have to, at least during this era, be satisfied with spirit manifestations as they are and thank the Lord that we are blessed with so much.


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
