In New York City's famous Greenwich Village, over thirty persons assembled for a direct voice seance. Included were notables, i.e., Helgi Briem, Icelandic Consul to the U.S.A.; Mme. Leopoldine Konstantin, one of the stars in the recent film success, "Notorious"; Captain Michael Gladych, famous Polish aviator; Samuel Markowitz and Sidney Rosenbaum, noted New York lawyers. Prominent business men, mediums, authors, editors and even a detective attended the seance.

No Hollywood Premiere could have been more outstanding than this first seance since Mr. Decker's return to New York City which is to be his permanent residence, a condition urged by his many friends in America as well as some in England who are said to have already scheduled trans-oceanic flights from Lordon to New York.

"Psychic Detective"

Patsy, the merry but vital spirit collaborator of Mr. Decker, and who has modestly accepted the title "Psychic Detective," was more than a master of ceremonies; he was "spokesman colossal" and almost the equivalent of an entire police force. In his characteristic jovial manner, he claimed he had figuratively roped off all of West 12th Street between Hudson and Washington Streets, allowing only spirit relatives and friends of the guests present, to enter; although thousands of spirits had been attracted by the "powerful light" of a seance of this kind.

So that the term "POWERFUL LIGHT" may not be misunderstood, it might be well to explain that upon questioning the spirits as to how they found their way to the seance room, they have repeatedly

said "WE' SAW THE LIGHT."

After the trumpet had whirled around the room with the roar of an airplane in action, Patsy was pleased to allow

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an outstanding American hero in spirit to come and manifest before one of the guests, Captain Michael Gladych a former Polish flyer of the R.A.F. who was witnessing his first seance.

The spirit stood before Capt. Gladych and modestly said: "I have been attracted to your vibration, Sir; and having been a flyer myself, I want to shake your hand. crashed in the Pacific early in the war. My name is COLIN the war. KELLY."

"Psychic Electricity"

And then he went on to explain the details of his passing, naming the Japanese battleship and the exact date of his recorded death. Capt. Gladych seemed thrilled, especially when another spirit manifested, speaking in *Polish*, stating he was just a grateful countryman passing by, attracted by the light of the seance radiating in the spirit world.

The seance began at 3:35 P. M. Bert Wells, another of Mr. Decker's spirit teachers, gave the invocation shortly after the medium had become entranced. Then Patsy took charge — and although he chided several guests for being nervous, he remained aloof, frequently wafting breezes that lowered the temperature in the darkened room.

He was proud too of his new "psychic electricity" which manifested as light to all present, and he even improvised a moon on the ceiling. A scientist, J. F. D. Hoge, among the guests, admitted that no contraption known to science could produce such a subdued glow without reflection of some kind. Mr. Hoge claimed that it would be utterly impossible to produce such an effect with a flash light.

Patsy well recalled Samuel Markowitz, noted New York attorney, who during a seance at

the Taft Hotel early in 1945, had been stubbornly skeptical. But this time the lawyer was practically forced to admit overwhelming evidence on the side of Spiritualism as Patsy escorted the spirit of the lawyer's mother to her son, and she spoke to him. At first Mr. Markowitz tried to simulate an

attitude of nonchalance and thoughtlessly said: "Yes, mother have you something important to

say?"
Instantly the trumpet dropped. mother cannot

overcome non-cooperation of an indifferent and skentical son failing to appreciate the importance a spirit mother making great effort just to be heard, which of itself is of paramount importance to any one who cares.

This riled Patsy who spoke to Markowitz like an irate Judge admonishing a lawyer in contempt of court. Sam melted completely as Patsy continued: "And your loving mother tells me her name is YETTA — that you have two sons —one named RICHARD who recently suffered a bad case of poison ivy.": As Markowitz choked with bewilderment, guests could not help applauding Patsy.

Lawyer Called to Task

But Patsy enthused, turned suddenly on Sam's friend, Bernard Rabin who had come to his first seance just out of curiosity knowing that "there was nothing to it."

Patsy must have sensed some thing, for he asked Rabin to stand up and get ready to take it.
"Listen," said Patsy now laughing with assurance of a young David with a sling-shot. "I know you think Spiritualism is a lot of bunk: but brother I know more about you than you do yourself. Your father is here and he has given me an ear-full."

Then Patsy let him have it, astonishing Rabin who could only sheepishly acquiese with a "yes that's right . . . correct . . . excellent . . . absolutely true . unbelievable . . . as Patsy end as Patsy ended with: "You are in the dyeing and cleaning business You have a son. Talked With Her "Dead" Husband Their Love Brought Them Jogether Again

That feeling of infinite devotion which welled up in their hearts survived the change we call death. Messages from The Other Side of Life proved that it was an immortal feeling, continuing beyond the grave.

For more than thirty years, Ella Wheeler Wilcox and her husband Robert had faithfully promised each other that whichever one of them passed on first that one would try persistently to communicate with the other. Many people have made similar pacts. But few have ever experienced a series of events more outstanding or more dramatic than Mrs. Wilcox.

In their married life Mr. and Wilcox had been ideally suited. Both were deeply interested in advancing science. Yet each possessed a profound interest in spiritual things.

From the beginning of her literary career Ella Wheeler Wilcox had written vividly of reincarnation. Through her writings countless thousands became con-vinced of a life hereafter. In later life Mrs. Wilcox became one of the firmest friends Spiritualism has ever had.

Robert Passes On

At the heighth of her career Ella Wheeler Wilcox was an outstanding woman of the world. Who of us has not heard those words of hers, "Laugh and the world laughs with you. Cry and you cry alone?" Her contributions to the Hearst newspapers and elsewhere attained inter-national recognition. Probably no other woman of her generation achieved such widespread influence. It is certain few modern writers have ever touched the hearts of so many people so

Yet on the morning of May 21st 1916 when her beloved husband Robert passed into The Great Beyond even her own sublime faith deserted her. In her own words she was overwhelmed with grief. For her there followed endless months of deep sor-

In her book, "The Worlds and I." (George M. Doran Co., 1918)
Mrs. Wilcox wrote:

"Over and over, solemnly and sacredly, during three decades of years the promise had been made to me. (Mr. Wilcox repeatedly promised to communicate with her after his death). There was belief in my heart that it would be kept, Yet the awful days went into awful weeks and months, and there was no rift in the clouds, no blowing aside of the dark curtains, no

Spiritualism Bows to the Teachings Great Messiah and Avatars

"Let all those who are thirsty drink the nectar of Spiritualism and be benefited."

It is with feelings of great pleasure that I am placing before my Sisters and Brothers of America. my ideas of the way Spiritualism can spread in India.

My acquaintance with Spiritualism is only two years old. I never knew I was a medium and I never believed that we could so intimately talk with the departed. How eager they are to communicate with us!

Early in 1945, I had the pleasure of sitting in a seance with Mr. and Mrs. V. D. Rishi who had come to preside over the anniversary of The Spiritual Healing Centre, Coimbatore.

I need hardly point out how the Rishis have been doing propa-ganda work in India for the last twenty years and more, without earthly influence, conscious of apparent, insuperable, difficulties.

Be that as it may, my first experience was more out of fun than one of sincerity. My husband, my mother-in-law, a younger brother of mine and myself with the Rishis-formed the circle.

Convinced of Survival

It was decided that the Rishis should call for my father-in-law the late Sirdar Lal Whigg who was the Superintendent of Police Lahore, who passed away in 1942. Police

He was a Punjabi and the Rishis could have known nothing of him. The table tilted four times. Rishi told us that it was an indication of the presence of the spirit, whereupon we burst into laughter and told Mr. Rishi that his shake ing the table himself and saying it was the spirit return, was too good a pill for us to swallow.

This upset Mr. Rishi and he asked us to wait and put questions and test the answers we received. This I thought was something better and began to put several family and personal questions and we got wonderful and accurate answers. I suspected it was a kind of mindreading and that the Rishis had de-

veloped that power.

Later on I thought over the mat-

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ter for several days and had an eager desire to know more of the subject and started reading books on Spiritualism.

I was convinced that there was something scientific about the subject. One day I argued with the Secre ary of the Spiritual Healing Centre and he gave instances from the Hindu Scriptures where such communications had been received and how the Hindu orthodox 'Sradha' ceremonies was only a seance on proper lines.

I said I would like to have some practical demonstrations and that

the messages came through my hand without the help of another, I would be convinced.

Our very first seance with my husband and the Secretary was a decided success. My father-in-law communicated

fairly mediumistic and that daily prayers and meditation, at a fixed time, would improve my powers. I asked him how I am to believe this and he said that on a particular day he would appear in my dream and tell me several things and convince me in all ways.

On the appointed day I sat by myself with the Quija Board and called my father-in-law but to my surprise I got a message from one who signed "Traveler" saying: who signed Traveter saying:
"Your father-in-law is busy and
will appear in your dream on Saturday night." On Saturday I had

I thought the whole thing was a hoax or some such thing. But on Sunday I had one of those finest visions, or was it a prophetic dream, or was it an illusion?

The Owija Board

Call it by any name but he told me the reasons for his delay; that my astral body was not ready to take the impressions and had to be prepared etc., and added he would tell me several things that are going to happen in the family. All these things have come to pass exactly as foretold.

From that day, I found that I could call a spirit and get messages for others as well as myself on the Ouija Board. A certain Revenue Officer who was very much upset over the death of his wife requested us to get into touch with her. I was somehow not sure of the results. I never had seen him before and had not known anything about him.

Strangely enough I consented to sit for a seance with him and I was amazed to find the lady telling the very exact words she gave to her husband just before dying. It was in tamil, a language not known to me. She predicted that her daughter's marriage to a particular boy would take place 22 days later and it did happen.

Since then I have been holding eances for several friends and have been able to remove their sorrows and miseries due to the death of their dear kith and kin. I am extremely happy to know that God has given me some power

to alleviate the sufferings of "OTHERS".

It does seem a strange situation in India, the land of Yogis, Fakirs, and Mystics, that people should not be able to grasp the real meaning and aim of Spiritualism. To the masses it is taboo—for one reason or other. To the few stimulated to interest, it is something as sacred as religion. But Oh! How few!

India's "Purdah System"

The few intelligent persons who have got messages from the departed, and holding high position in life never try to tell others, for fear of ridicule, and the fear of being laughed at, deters them bringing to others their experi-ences. In short they are afraid of being called "Cranky"!

There are plenty of mediums in India but no one would have the courage to proclaim the truths of Spiritualism. I know of one gentleman who is a good medium, but though he printed his messages, he restricted its use to his own circle members.

I know of a young lady who goes into trance every Friday and gives very high philosophical messages but the parents shut her in a room and would not allow even Spiritualists to see her.

India has its purdah system, her prejudices, her strict conservatism, and her conventional fanaticism. respectable Indian father or husband will gladly consent his daughter or wife taking up public work should she discover the God-given gift of Medium-

It Will Be Mine!

Then there is the so-called religious person, who holds that it is harmful for us to communicate with the spirits of the departed. They imagine the dead are somewhere in Heaven and by invoking them they will be sent to Hell.

Another thinks that ill-luck and ill-health is sure to follow and goes to the extent of saying that once the dead men are called the house will get haunted! Some will swear that the mediums are sure to become childless! All Bunkum.

It is safe to say that for some centuries to come, the human race will be actively engaged in defining the laws which regulate psychic affairs. Fortunately it is a line of study with the peculiar advantage to those who indulge in it that they can pursue in it just as well and probably better from the other side of the veil.

Psychic Research Today

Spiritualists knew of Telepathy, Clairvoyance, Psychometry, etc., long before scientific investigators knew. While the latter persistently denied their existence, Spiritualists went on calmly demonstrating them.

In time, one may safely predict that psychic researchers will be obliged to endorse the claims of the Spiritualists.

Horace Leaf

One hears much less about psychical research today than during and just after the war 1914-18; but this does not signify that it has lessened its interest in supernormal phenomena, although it is obviously not so interested in mediumship for the time being.

is important for anyone criticising psychical research to understand its main object, which is not to prove that the human soul survives death so much as to discover whether the evidence on Spiritualists base their belief is reliable. Overlooking this fundamental feature has given rise to a great deal of heart-burning among Spiritualists, who have grown to regard psychical research as a kind of natural opponent.

those who have sat with first-class mediums and experienced the marvels of clairvoyance, materializations, direct-voice, and so on, it seems intolerable that scientists should sit with the same people only to express doubt, and sometimes make charges against the genuineness of the phenomena.

Famous Testimonials

That a very large number of psychical researchers have been unjust to mediumship cannot be denied, but there have also been a great many who admit all the claims of the Spiritualists, and who have done Spiritualism incalculable good.

Indeed, one may safely say that but for the testimonies of such men as Sir William Crookes, Sir Oliver Lodge, Dr. Gustave Geley, Dr. L. R. G. Crandon and Dr. T. Glen Hamilton, Spiritualism would

not be nearly so effective as it is. Admittedly we grow to rely more and more upon ourselves, but whatever may be the strength of the edifice, we are creeting, psychical research has contributed not a little to its foundations.

There has, during recent years, been a considerable change of interest in lines of research scientific investigators have adopted. There has, indeed, been something like a return to the lines along which the English Society for Psychical Research started about fifty-five years ago.

They-the original psychical researchers-attributed immense importance to mental forms of mediumship, notwithstanding there being at the time a galaxy of fine physical mediums in Great Britain, in the United States of America, and on the Continent of Europe.

This attitude shows the deep philosophical interest these remarkable investigators feit in the subject, at a time when materialism might well be said to have been the philosophy of science.

The initial work was done in connection with telepathy and clairvoyance; materialisations and kindred phenomena being relegated to the background. Great praise is owing to these pioneers of psychical research for having the courage to attack the more involved and complicated aspects of mediumship.

What Spiritualism Claims

Subjective phenomena are always more difficult to evaluate than objective, and it is much easier to testify to having seen an object heavier than air levitated by unknown means, or the appearance of an additional mysterious personality at a materializseance, than to prove that a clairvoyant saw the apparition and received a message from one's deceased uncle.

After more than thirty years close study of these mental aspects supernormal psychical research accumulated a vast amount of evidence proving that such faculties exist; and what is more to the point, many of the researchers believed that they supported the claims of Spiritualism.

What may be termed the romantic period of psychical research covers the period which followed, when scientific attention was turned to the manifestations occurring through physical mediums, including Eusapia Palmediums, including Eusapia Pallodino, Mlle Stanislawa Tomczyk, Francesco Carancini and Florence

During and after 1914-18 there was a renaissance of this form of experimentation, with mediums like Kathleen Goligher, "Marg-ery," Frank Decker and other famous voice mediums. These experiments aroused tremendous public interest, and Spiritualism reached a high-water mark of popularity and success.

The S.P.R.'s Position

Since then psychical research has gradually declined, un'il today is heard of it. But its efforts have not been suspended, but redirected towards an examination of mental phenomena, in which mediumship plays a very small

Thus psychical research is back very much where it was when the English Society of Psychical Rearch was founded in the early "80's of last century, but with an important difference. The relationbetween these two periods has, however, been unbroken, because the principle which inspires modern research has sprung from the earlier experiments and findings.

The position is much as follows -Early experiments of the S.P.R. demonstrated the existence of telepathy and clairvoyance. The question then arose whether these faculties are normal ones lying

latent in the human mind, or whether they were stimulated or projected, as it were, by what F.W.H. Myers would have called metetherial beings.

"Hard-Boiled' Skept cs

Spiritualists have always in-clined to the belief that these senses are in some way the creation of the spirits of departed human beings, a theory which in my opinion, will not stand a moment's serious consideration. is, however, perfectly reasonable to maintain that in some instances, those of mediumship, spirits do develop and use them.

But it is equally true that many telepathists and clairvoyants know nothing of Spiritualism or are opposed to it.

In view of this, the position as sumes an aspect different from that which most Spiritualists think; but they need not feel too disappointed since a great con-cession has been gained for them from psychical researchers they have succeeded in convincing some "hardboiled" sceptics that supernormal faculties and powers do exist, and demand serious consideration.

And, incidentally, Spiritualism has, quite inadvertently, been the means of developing a entirely new phase of psychology, one, which, but for Spiritualism would probably never have been thought

Rhine's Experiments

This new branch of psychology is now known as Extra-Sensory Perception, a shorter name now being more and more favored, namely, Psi Faculty. It is to the credit of the United States America that they sponsored this line of investigation from the first, the principal work having been done by Dr. J. B. Rhine of Duke University, Durham, North Caro-

With characteristic tardiness. Britain followed suit with its usual skepticim and at first without success; but the persistence of the American researchers, accompanied by the growing respect which other countries must now pay to them, has resulted in convincing experiments. Now E. S. P., or Psi Faculties have beer proven to exist in Europeans centers which were at first inclined to reject

The situation in England is particularly interesting. Dr. S. G. Soal of London University has become an authority on telepathy; while Dr. J. Hettinger has become an authority on Psychometry, a line of research little favored since Dr. Rhodes Buchanan, of Little Rock, Arkansas, discovered the faculty in 1842.

Reality of Spirit

The story about Dr. liettinger is particularly pleasing. He actually received his Doctor of Science Degree through his thesis on Psychometry, which was published in book form under the title of "The Ultra Perceptive Faculty. For these experiments, he used as his subjects well-known English mediums.

The basis of these studies, as already intimated, is not to prove survival, but to prove that our normal special senses do not comprise all that we have. That beneath the threshold of consciousness there lie others which can be stimulated into partial activity under certain circumstances, and which have the habit of manifest-

ing unexpectedly.

Whether these faculties are merely the vestiges of some that were once normally active in man's primitive state, or whether they are the rudiments of new faculities which are destined in the course of time to rise permanently

above the limit of consciousness and become normal, is not yet decided.

There is, however, a third possibility, one which experienced Spiritualists will most strongly espouse—that they are really spiritual faculties belonging to man's spiritual body, and which will function normally when he passes from earth to his next state of existence.

Reluctant Endorsers

It is not likely that psychical researcher, who prefer the purely material point of view, and who restrict their thinking io this planet of ours, will for a long time be able to appreciate this point of view; but experience has 'aught us not to worry about them, as they already lag far behind Spiritualists.

Spiritualists knew of Telepathy, clairvoyance, psychometry kindred faculties and powers long before scientific investigators knew; and while the later persistently denied their existence, Spiritualists went on calmly demonstrating them.

The present line of cleavage petween Spiritualism and psychical research is, not the existence supernormal faculties, but their scope. Whereas psychical researchers want to restrict them to material world of ours, Spiritualists insist that they also penetrate into the spiritual world, and enable us to communicate with those who once lived on earth, but have since died. One safely predict that in time, psychical researchers will be obliged to endorse this claim also.

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THE DEVIL TO PAY

Some of the arguments which ultra - orthodox religionists use against Spiritualism knock the props out from under the very religion for which they profess such devotion. Two pamphlets have recently come to me through the mails.

One of them is called "Spiritualism and the Bible" and the other bears the startling title, "Spiritualism is the work of the devil.

The first of these booklets contains a list of questions among which I found this: "Do you know that God commanded that a Spiritualist Medium should not be permitted to live?

Then another. "Do you know that death by stoning was God's sentence for Spirit Mediums?"

These are rather amazing ques-tions when propounded by followers of the greatest of all Mediums. What puzzles me is why these devout religionists do not carry out the injunctions laid upon them. Is it possible that they lack faith in their God, or could it be that they are infinitely more humane and kindly than the God who is supposed to have issued the command?

What Do They Fear?

Most of the texts quoted in these booklets are drawn first five books of the Old Testament. Any student of Biblical history knows that the laws of Leviticus and Deuteronomy were pro-pounded by the established Mediums of the Mosaic Order. They were jealous of any competition and laid down laws which would penalize anyone who sought to function spiritually outside the in-stitution of which they were the One seldom comes across a text from the later books of the Old Testament or from the New Testament which can against psychic manifestations.

The second little booklet is

highly amusing, for it argues so vehemently for the *devil* that one is forced to the conclusion that the writer must be personally acquainted with his Satanic Majesty and all his emissaries.

Of course, if he is on intimate terms with the devil he must have first hand information and I cannot dispute him. I enjoy no such interesting friendship with his Satanic Majesty. However, when he drags in texts torn from their context and twists them about to mean what he wants them to mean, I am conviced that he has adopted some of the artiful ways of his unholy pal. The writer frankly tells us that "the devil is adept at making things appear to be something which they are not."

If the arguments used by this writer and by other uninformed persons of his ilk were true they would serve not to destroy Spiritualism alone, but would at one blow destroy the whole foundation of *Christianity*. If modern spirit manifestations are all the work of deceiving devils, how can one be sure that the angels which ap-

peared to the prophets, the Apostles and to Jesus, were not all the works of the devil?

How can we know that the appearance of Jesus after his death was not a deception engineered by the devil? Obviously those disciples who witnessed His appearances, one hundred and twenty are reported to have seen Him on one occasion, were all men and

Jesus met and answered this same devil argument. In Luke 11:19 He said, "If I, by Beelzebub cast out demons (demon in the Greek means Familiar spirit) by whom do your sons cast them out? Therefore shall they be your judges."

So, if modern spirit manifestations are the work of the devil, whose work are all those similar phenomena recorded in the Bible? It seems that the writer of these previously mentioned booklets is "hoist by his own petard."

Gifts of the spirit are generally developed to follow certain well defined lines, such as those associated with physical and mental automatic writing, mediumship. photography, painting and draw-We seem to have reached, or assume that we have done so, the limits in regard to most of these phases and, except for standards of merit. this may be

In regard to art, however, the is such a wide one that it is doubtful if anything beyond the fringe has been touched. There are probably good reasons to explain, if not justify this fact.

In the first place, any expres-sion of psychic art has the disadvantage that it does not prove the existence of a discarnate being in the definite manner that a materialization, direct-voice clairaudient power can, by its evidence, offer proof.

Artistic Mediumship

There is also the further aspect that it is a somewhat intimate form of mediumship only the finished result of which can be of-fered for public appraisal. It also demands conditions rather different from the other forms of phenomena mentioned and, bringing it down to the lowest-but often the most immediately important-consideration, it does not put much butter on the bread of the artist.

All these, and many other factors, tend to limit the scope of artistic mediumship but, lest any-one should think that art has but limited fields of expression, there are before us in the normal chan-

-00 nels the French school of thought which produces the work of *Picas-* so, and in the case of sculpture the work of Epstein.

It is not the object of this article to deal with the merits of such expressions of artistic creation, but merely to use them to illustrate the fact that the method of expression has infinite further possibilities.

Automatic Writing

The work of George Daisley, the London (England) medium, is known to the public of Britain through his powers of clairvoy-ance, clairaudience and psychometry, and only a few personal friends and privileged persons are aware that he is equally at home in regard to automatic writing and in the field of art through his psychic powers.

Generally speaking, his automatic writing is what is known as mirror writing—that is to say, it can only be read by holding it mirror-and occasionally when he has difficulty in public in getting a name clairaudiently (such as that of a Chinese) he calls for paper and pencil and

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writes it in mirror writing for the person concerned.

During the blitz, his seance room at home was badly damaged and when the walls were repaired they were distempered a light col-This gave the spirit world a "blackboard" of which they fine took full advantage. When he was entranced—and at the most the room was only barely lighted by a 5-watt ruby light - they would often write upon the walls and sign their work.

Spirit Painting

Amongst the writers well known to the public was W. T. Stead. The other side have since lost this "blackboard" for the room was papered after the war ended and proper respect has been paid to the fact, so they use paper on a table now just as we do.

George Daisley is ambidextrous but more generally left-handed. In automatic writing only very exceptionally does he use any other hand. On a few occasions, however, he has had very unusual re-For example, one line would read right to left, another left to right, a third upside down, and a fourth right way up in quite normal writing and a whole sheet would thus be filled.

On one occasion, two pencils were in use simultaneously, one in the left hand and the other in the right. Sometimes the result has been a letter from a loved one on the other side. The writings are invariably signed and some people have professed to recog nize not only the signature but also the general characteristics of phrasing and writing. However, as his great ambition is towards physical mediumship this and his artistic work are treated more as hobbies or relaxation.

"Modus Operandi"

I had hoped to reproduce a specimen of his work but black and white do not do justice to the artistry of the colors. He sits upon the floor in front of the fire or in an arm chair, resting the pa per on a piece of stiff material, takes a ruler and divides the pa-per in two. The rest is freehand ntirely.

By his side is a box of colored pencils (actually "Solaqua" water color pencils, designed for entirely different work, but there are artistic materials available yet in Britain), with sharpened points.

Without looking into the box, he takes a pencil and draws or etches, and from time to time changes his crayon. Having completed the right side of the line he proceeds to do the other which always balances perfectly in outline without any erasure or alteration or effort to balance.

In a matter of hours-some one day, some another—the work is finished. It represents the spir-itual horoscope of a soul. One side the past and the other the future. The detail drawings, birds, pyramids, etc., are very small but clear in the original and the mirror writing is very neatly inserted as part of the pattern. Interpretation is given through automatic writing.

Mirror Writing

Over the years he has done a number of paintings some in water colors, others in oils, usually of Guides, but one done in 1937 is a large canvas 3 feet, 6 inch by feet, three inches, which depicts the Christ as the center figure with a Roman soldier on the left and a High Priest to the right.

Another phase was without brushes at all. These paintings were done upside down artist "Roland" signed in mirror writing in pencil. There was no

idea as to what was being created as the medium dipped his fingers into various oil paints and the difficulty of distinguishing the pattern was added to by the use of a ruby light.

George Daisley has not been trained in any way for drawing or painting, but the range of expression thus shown so far seems to add point to the earlier remarks that this is indeed largely an uncharted sea of mediumship to which much more attention may well be given so that some of the treasures of Heaven may find a means of expression to brighten this side of life.

The errors and the sophistries of men can not stifle the onward march of Life from this Planet of Pain to other worlds of everlasting glory.

Natural, Dramatic Style

"They Have Found a Faith" is an excellent book and withal an interesting book. As my search continued, the sociological aspects became more significant, and every discovery argued for a better and more intelligent understanding of the faiths men live by. But underlying any highfalutin analysis, so far as I was concerned, were dramatic elements and exciting episodes that made up one of the most thrilling of America's romances."

Pressing Answers

Every excursion the religious educator made was romantic and thrilling and of great historical if not religious value, but sections or chapters which appeal to me most in "They Have Found a Faith" are those devoted to Spiritualism and Frank B. Robinson's Psychiana.

Dr. Bach, of course, went to Lily Dale, fountainhead of Spiritualism, to get first hand informa-tion, and there he was the guest of Ralph G. Pressing, editor of the PSYCHIC OBSERVER.

Regarding Mr. Pressing, the religious editor said: "He had the keen decisive characteristics of the successful American businessman, and there was an air of confidence and security about everything he did and said."

Dr. Bach may have gone to the mecca of Spiritualism to scoff, but he certainly remained to pray.

I find great interest in a conversation between Mr. Pressing and Dr. Bach as to whether Spiritualism is a philosophy, a science or a religion. The Iowa professor asked him: "Is spiritualism a soil asked init. Is spirituatism a religion?" and the answer came back quickly: "Heavens, yes! Why not? If it isn't a religion, what is it?"

Spiritualism IS Religion

Say, rather, Mr. Pressing told him, that every religion is based on Spiritualism, and that is as true as gospel.

But I would also add my mite here, if so permitted, to that conversation by saying that Spiritualism is not only a religion but a - the science of biology and of life, for if it were not a science it would not be a religion. The true part of any religion is its science

Dr. Bach went with Mr. Press-

ing to witness demonstrations at Chesterfield, Indiana, where there is a "Trail of Religions," symbolizing the unbroken tradition of spiritualism. Remarkable results came through the mediumship of the gifted Clifford Bias and Fanchion Harwood.

Bach's Sister Speaks!

I have said that the scholarly university professor may have come to scoff but remained to pray and this was especially true when his own sister, dead twenty long years, materialized with a "Marc, dear-Marc, dear-Marc, His sister Paula also dear. kissed him goodbye when the seance with Mrs. Harwood endeda touching bit of sentiment for that which must have begun with intellectual coldness.

A Sympathetic Effort

Spiritualists believe in the continuity and the eternity of life. Frank Robinson believes in Life though he calls it God. And so do I believe in that "Be Still and know that I AM God," for I have found in this Eternal Life, call it what you will, something tremendously powerful.

inside and not be indifferent to the Phenomena of Psychism and observations made through Mediums

Far from encouraging such pursuits some of them ridicule their infreres of international reputa-tion by doubting them as "Senile" people. They should not approach subject in a slip-shod manner while being aware of the necessity of persistent efforts in their own domain.

Secondly, aii facts of spiritual phenomena should be collected. analysed and deductions drawn in accordance with laws, not of their senses but the laws of the spirit No knowledge can be acquired without time and study and psychic research, which involves the profoundest questions of vital importance to humanity, has a prior right upon the more intelligent class in the country.

Study and Devotion

Thirdly, home circles should all be contacted and their experience tested and there should be a board of psychic workers to guide them. This requires study and devotion of trained intellects and submission to the domination of a single

Fourthly, there should be a newspaper on Spiritualistic matters, ideas and the philosophy of Spiritualism and the advantages therefrom given in simple language. Imagine there is only one paper in India for 400 millions of people and that in *Hindi* language -a language which is unknown to many and known only in Northern

People talk of God-Almighty and His help to humanity and Spiritualism alone will give them better and concrete grasp. If one is convinced that one's dear ones are living and some of them in higher planes can give wonderful help to their descendants, is it not possible to imagine a little more and think that God, the ruler of spirits and master of Angels can live in our hearts and feel "The kingdom of God is within us."

Hindu Spiritual Magazine

Spiritualism was brought first before the American public, in 1848, by the Fox Sisters and though the Oriental scriptures are full of such manifestations, it was not until 1864 that it was actually studied by a band of Bengali gentlemen in the village of Amrita
Bazaar. The messages were published and it ran to several editions and they called the same "Paraloker Katha."

If people only knew how they can talk to their kith and kin, the description of the various spheres given by them—people who ac-tually live there, that personality survives and all such information by actual contact, what a great change would come over *India*.

A Cry in the Wilderness

I placed this fact before one of my Angelic Guides and his message is typical of his humorous ways of putting things. He said: "Who wants or listens to high spiritual matters when all thoughts are centered on worldly happiness and worldly prosperity. Material possessions seem to satisfy most people. They realize their folly possessions only after they come over here. Our voice is like a cry in the wilderness. Responsive people should invoke and get inspired by High Masters."

How great is the help rendered by spirits will be clear when I say that I have a relation of mine who called his father at one of our seances, and after certain personal questions had been answered the

sound to break the killing silence of empty space.

Somewhere beyond all this I believed my Robert was living and loving me and longing to communicate with me. I knew it must be so. I knew the mere cessation of breath in the body could not destroy such a mighty love as ours. . . That wonderful individuality, even that wonderful personality, I felt, still existed, and with them, memory and love. . . . I believed with my brain but the soul of me cried in anguish for sout of me cried in anguish for the proof, the proof. . . . Every breath was a prayer for Light and Knowledge. I woke with prayer. I lived in prayer. I fell asleep in prayer."

In her search for proof Mrs. Wilcox visited California where she contacted many brilliant souls. scores of the most gifted mediums and all of the leading spiritual movements. At one private seance there were flowers on the table and a small trumpet. The flowers were deftly removed from the table and pinned in her hair; she felt soft lingering touches and heard gentle whispers.

Through the Ouija Board

Near the close of that particular seance a man's voice spoke her name. The voice said that her husband was trying to contact her but that he was not able to do so "To reach a material world by immaterial means is not easy," continued the voice, "It requires study. Your husband will come to you when you return home. He bids me tell you this."

Worn out with suffering Mrs. Wilcox returned to her home at Short Beach, on the Connecticut Sound. There in "The Bungalow" which she and Robert Wilcox had loved so dearly her first message came through from The Great It came through the medium of the ouija board

Describing the occasion in her own words, Mrs. Wilcox said:

"I had tried the ouija board with projessional psychics. Nothing much had come. But one night when a friend, not professionaly psychic came who had never seen a board before, the moment she touched it this tremendous experience came."

Robert Communicates

"It was in the early evening of September 10, 1917, that the door opened, Mrs. B. a New Haven friend came to call. I had just purchased a ouija board of my own which was lying on the table.

I asked my caller if she had ever tried the board.

"No,' she said, 'and I would love to. I think it would be most interesting to experiment with it.

"Both my caller and I were shaken by a power which beggars description. It was like an electric shock. The board seemed to be a thing alive. It moved with such force and speed that we could not follow it.

"I called to my visiting friend, Mrs. Randall, who was in an adjoining room, to come to our assistance. She came, and gave her letters whole attention to the touched by the pointer. Neither of us at the board was able to read them, so great was the speed. The letters were now written down by the watcher, and when the pointer rested she read them out, and they formed these sentences:

"Brave one, keep up your courage. Love is all there is. I " 'Brave

am with you always. I await your arrival.

"when I heard those sentences read out after experiencing the clectric shock of their transmission, there was no longer any question or doubt in my mind. My mcssage had come! I was in touch with my Robert! He had kept his promise!

'I asked how long I must wait. in the body before going to him. The answer was: 'Time is nought; hope for bliss with me; I am incomplete without you. Two halves make a whole; we will finish in Nirvana.'

"This was the beginning of a series of most remarkable conversations with a freed soul in the world beyond. On the next sitting, September 13th, we had perhaps half an hour at the board, receiving remarkable communications when Mrs. B—'s husband came in quietly, trying not to disturb us.

Spirit Communications

"I remarked, 'Robert, can you tell us who has just come into the room? The answer was, 'Then tell me,' I replied. Mrs. Randall who was acting as our scribe, said the letters seemed to make only jargon. They were given again and the sentence was Quinnipac Club, our last game. To us this sentence carried no meaning, but my friend's husband, a practical business man and pop-ular clubman, said quietly, The last time your husband ever appeared at the Quinnipac Club I was his partner at auction.

"Neither his wife nor I knew of this incident. Surely there can be no explanation of 'sub-conscious mind' or 'unconscious muscles' given to this message. I then asked, 'Robert, have you a message for your friend?'

"Instantly the answer came Better try some other game V. W.
B. quitter. I felt embarassed until
Mr. B—, with a quiet laugh said,
That night I played with your husband until after midnight, when I said I must go home. He re-plied, 'You are a quitter, you had better try some other game.'

"One night I asked why, since the communication seemed so fully established now, he had not come to me during those terrible months of lonely search. At once came the reply, Your tears hung a veil between.

plane. My work is different-meeting souls shot into eternity. All is confusion for them. Equanimity is my gift. I supply it to those killed in the shock of battle.'

"Equanimity was his gift here, and it would follow as a matter of course that it was his possession there.

"I asked if he would give me the names of those who were associated with him in his work on the astral plane.

"Answer: 'It is forbidden.' "I asked if he would help me

to retain health while on earth.
"Answer: 'I am but an instrument in His hand. Health is of

the soul. Body is naught." Dictates Book from Beyond

At regular sittings that season Mrs. B and Mrs. Wilcox carried on with the ouija board. Each occasion proved more enlightening than the last. From the other side of life Mr. Wilcox dictated a book on the continuity of their love life for seven incarnations. Because Ella Wheeler Wilcox was to pass on so soon that most remarkable book was never published though parts of it appeared in various magazine articles.

Among the more outstanding chapters of the book was the one which was dictated by Robert Wilcox from The Great Beyond on November 12th 1917. It was dictated in the same maner through the medium of the ouija board to Mrs. B. and Ella Wheeler Wilcox with Mrs. Randall doing the transcribing. The beginning of the chapter read:
"This chapter was revealed to

me by the graciousness of Viavasate Manu by means of pictures stored in the archives of the universe, made by vibrations. Each object, each act, each thought, which ever existed in any world, is recorded in indestructible films of etheric matter by means of vibra-

tion.
"Viavasate Manu permitted me to see unrolled the whole picture. I saw myself and you and all the multitude in the golden city of Atlantis, and our daily lives, our friends, our bridal couch, the pathetic sacrifice of Rhada, High Priestess of the Sun, who gave herself for love of her sister Isis, the temple dancer, beloved and branded by Eiram-Hon, Crown Prince, and only son of Emperor Milidh and Scota.

"You were the lovely Princess

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One blow severed our two heads, so tightly were we clasped together.'

Humorous Messages

All of these sittings with the ouija board took place in "The Bungalow" at Short Beach, Connecticut, where Mrs. Wilcox and Robert had shared so many happy years. Oftentimes humorous incidents came up. In writing of these, Mrs. Wilcox said:

"These very human and characteristic touches gave the experiences more reality, as did a later reproof to me, when I interrupted his dictation by speaking to Mrs. B. He stopped and wrote, 'Ella, don't butt in' (His little imperious ways with me on earth, rebuking me when he felt I needed it, were part of his many attractions for When Mrs. Randall read out this sentence we all burst out laughing, and the pointer scurried over the board, and wrote. 'That sounds good; everybody laughs.

Told To Go Abroad

From the other side of life Robert constantly advised her to, "Go to France." Night after night when seated at the ouija board with Mrs. B. these words were so forcibly repeated that Mrs. Wilcox could no longer disregard them. On February 17th, 1918 she sailed

for France.

That year Europe was aflame with the First World War. In the Atlantic enemy submarines were lurking everywhere. As the S. S. Espagne was sailing out of New York harbor a message from Beyond told her that she would return. Comforting as it was Mrs. Wilcox sensed behind this (Cont. Page 12, Col. 1)

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

message a mystic warning of something she could not explain.

Once in France she threw herself wholeheartedly into war work. At the same time she continued her sittings with the ouija board. messages of instruction on her book and encouragement for herself continued to arrive from Robert on the other side of life.

With the war at its height those were hectic days in France. Even with her abundant energy Mrs. Wilcox could not stand the strain. Forced at last to take a rest in London she fell desperately ill. Doctors brought her back to America on a stretcher.

The Angels Were Calling

At home once more her strength returned for a few weeks. But Ella Wheeler Wilcox was destined to live only a few months more. Despite their most valiant efforts close friends knew that the pen

which had once stirred the hearts of millions would soon be still.

From Summerland the angels were calling. On the morning of October 30th, 1919 Mrs. Wilcox heard the last call. Thus ended one of the most outstanding cases of psychic communication known to modern Spiritualism.

Today at Short Beach, Con-necticut, two silver urns are sealed forever into the rocks high above the beautiful waters of Granite In these are the ashes of Robert and Ella Wheeler Wilcox.

The picture above is a reproduction of one of the rarest psychic pictures on record. The original, presented to the editors of this journal by Evielena P. Bach, is in the offices of Psychic Observer and may be seen at Lily Dale, N. Y. during July and August, 1947. The records show that this picture, displayed in Rochester at the 50th anniversary of Modern Spiritualism, was completed in eight minutes by a medium who was totally blind.

E. P. Bach, editor of the "Sunflower," was present at the seance when this demonstration of psychic intelligence took place. He classified the mediumship as "automatic painting."

All officers and directors of forthcoming celebrations, commemorating the 100th anniversary of Modern Spiritualism, should stress the importance of planning a similar display of interesting phenomena.

Owing to the detail and technique of the flowered script, it is difficult-even from the original, to discipher the wording (i.e.) reading counter-clockwise: "For we even grief or sorrow share"; "Your joys are ours when given '; "We've closely guarded you here"; "To guide your steps to heaven"; We'll meet beyond the grave"; "And when the master calls you"; "For each we humbly crave"; "Heaven's choicest blessings."
