Psychic Drawings Declared "Exquisite In Balance, Design and Color."

One hears rumors. It is amazing the number of rumors we hear in a magazine office. Which is exactly as it should be. For though such rumors often lead up blind alleys, there are many occa-sions on which they are the foundation stone for a good and interesting story.

"A New Zealand lady artists has been invited to exhibit her paint-ings first in New York, and later to take her work on a tour through the United States. Arrangements are being made for the showing of these paintings from our own soil in various important towns and cities."

We hardly believed the rumor. But it is perfectly true. The lady in question is Kathleen Alma Philpott, who is now preparing for the first exhibition in U.S.A. to be planned for July 4, 1948.

#### Not An Artist

Naturally we located Mrs. Philpott and visited her in her home. We found Mrs. Philpott, a quiet, middle-aged person, awaiting us with a most delightful afternoon

tea. "I thought you'd enjoy a cup on a rainy day like this," she said, smilingly, and for a while we just sipped the excellent brew and nibbled little home-made cakes before a cheery wood fire. Naturally, it was easy to talk in this peaceful home atmosphere, and we found that this time jade Rumor had been correct. "We learned from our hostess that she was a rurse in the past, was married and has brought up a family of four. She never thought Kathleen Alma PHILPOTT of painting or drawing until she

had reached the age of thirtyseven, and her family was already old enough to give her the free dom required for the work she is doing now ..

"But I can't draw a line, I know nothing about technique, paints or color, I've never had a lesson in my life," protested Mrs. Philpott.

"Then how did you manage to make paintings, which apparently, to say the least, have aroused cur-iosity in the States?" This was a very logical question to ask at this juncture. Our hostess smiled once more.

"Didn't you know?" she queried. "The paintings I have done are mediumistic. I am simply the tool and I am being used for a purpose.

### "What purpose?"

"That I cannot say. I simply have to go on and on, and one day the meaning will be clear to me. At present I do not understand what I am doing or what it is all about.

Naturally, one feels a bit skep-tical when such a statement is made. It flashes through the mind that it is very well possible that

though the conscious mind does not plan to do a thing, the sub-conscious mind takes control of an individual. It is not for us to state what inspired these paintings we saw at a later stage, or how they came into being. We can they can at a later stage, of non-they can being. We can only repeat Mrs. Philpott's story. I often work at night, ex-plained this lady. "I wake up

with a queer feeling in the upper arm. It is as if a battery is switched on resulting in constant little electric shocks in the muscles. This will not leave me until I have taken to my drawing boards, or, as has happened once or twice, when I felt exceedingly tired, I fell asleep again.

#### The Modus Operandi

"As a rule, whether this peculiar sensation takes hold of me during my day or night hours, it goes on till my arm is positively painful, and only subsides when I sit be-fore my board. Even so, it goes on for a time. Sometimes I'd give anything to rest my arm for a while, when painting or drawing. But I know it is no good. I must go on until the drawing is com-pleted."

"How long does this take you?" "It varies," explained Mrs. Phil-"Sometimes I do a drawing pott. or painting in from ten minutes to half an hour, sometimes it takes a

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little longer. But the strain is ter-rific whilst I am working, or rather, when my body is being used."

#### Nothing To Fear

"Tell me how it started?" was the next question.

" "The knowledge of spirit con munion was first known to me when I was about ten years of age. My father was definitely psychic. He did some automatic writing and drawing, but mother used to say it was Devil's work and immediately burnt it.

Thinking it was all evil, I prayed hard when a child to "be a good girl" and endeavored to ignore the mysterious promptings which seemed to come to me quite naturally.

"I was seventeen and passing through a very worrying time, when I again heard voices, yet it was nine years later before I began to pay more attention and learn more about psychic matters.

"My husband always encouraged me in this respect. But not until I was thirty-seven did I start these drawings. I was told that I had nothing to fear, that even-tually I would go out into the world with my work and far across the sea.

Who are the Master Teachersthe teachers who have been talked about by so many and understood by so few?

Are they the angels and archangels of the *Bible?* Are they the saints of the church? Or are they the mahatmas of *India* and the gurus who guide their disciples along a mystic path toward en-lightenment? Or are they like the Greek heroes who have become *demi-gods*, wise in the ways of gods and men?

Then again, are they master al-chemists, capable of transmuting the base metal of ignorance into



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the gold of understanding? Or are they the builders of the pyramids and the master masons of the secret temples of initiation?

Are they the initiates of the ancient mysteries, surviving in their tradition but teaching in new ways through modern channels the arcana of the ages?

Or are they the simple, humble men of all time . .

men who have glimpsed the fact of Isis through the thinner veil of inner (A) truth and by charity and compassion, through ZENOR R compassion, information peace and understanding by humility and simplicity become the arisen ones point the way to the and by have who place prepared for men of accom-plished virtue?

#### Satisfying Explanation

Like religions which are apart but together in their separateness, the Master Teachers can be said to be all of these things and more. They are not duplicates of each other, clothed in the sameness of a higher light, but as various as the infinite facets of their enlightenment, and only as same, as their light is a reflection of and expression of a single total source. That is what they themselves tell us.

The whole subject of the Master Teachers is a perfectly practical matter. Those who have attended the classes of Rev. Richard Zenor in Los Angeles have been given some simple, satisfying explanations of their spiritual capabilities and origins without detracting from the dignity and transcenden-tal quality of their advanced state. As Agasha, the principal teacher of the Zenor classes, puts it:

"Your teacher can do nothing for you that you cannot do for yourself."

The reason is plain, he says, when it is realized that the real master teacher of every individ-ual is himself. That is:

"Your soul is your greatest teacher, and all the efforts of any outside teacher are bent toward unfolding the wisdom of the soul and bringing it to your objective consciousness. In reality, your soul knows everything, for it is a part of the great universal Godconsciousnes. When you

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ready, the master will appear-the master within you." This does not mean that we do

not receive help and inspiration of a substantial nature from individual teachers of a high order. Those whose consciousness is attuned to that order respond ac-cordingly and are thereby stimulated to release within themselves those powers and that realization which seek objective expression in the world of material experience.

## A Matter of Unfoldment

The musician listening to the work of a master musician is inspired to release from within himself that which may be a new mas ter work. Yet the teacher may point the way and mark the pitfalls, even prescribe techniques and educate by reciting the history and experience of others, but never, according to Agasha, may he substitute his actions for the responsibility of the individual.

For the truth is that all the angels and all the mahatmas, all the masters and all the gurus are but individuals like ourselves-like we are in our universal aspect and unlike us only to the extent that our unfoldment through solution of the problems of experience has left us here still encased in a darker aura of illusive separation from the Oneness of the universe.

Agasha tells this story of his own advancement to a state which occultists term mastership:

Thousands of years ago when the valley of the *Nile* was broader its area of fertility, the land in called Egypt was divided into many counties or semi-independent dominions, each with a ruler or king. Wars were frequent, and religious differences were complicated, narrow and bitterly irritating, due to a general misunder-standing of the god-symbols and local traditions of each locality.

#### Spiritual Growth

There were some wise men, however, among the priest-kings of the time. Inspired by his own master teacher, who had advanced beyond the restrictions of material concerns, Agasha and the other ruling priests brought their followers together in one confederation, based upon the religious con-cept of a universal spirit and the concept of individual opportunity to advance toward perfect harmony with that spirit.

Eventually all of Egypt was brought within the federation and harmonious understanding of the principles of spiritual growth, as well as communication with advanced personalities in spirit, ex-

isted for many years. At the end of his earthly life time, because of his great understanding and wise living, Agasha was able to join his own teacher in the spiritual worlds beyond the astral spheres and even beyond the more advanced planes of conHarwood-Stilwell Seance Room at Chesterfield

#### sciousness surrounding this earth. They Have Made Good

It then became his duty to inspire and assist those of his associates and followers who were still bound by the imperfections of their understanding to the wheel of material development until they, too, as the centuries progressed could rise by their own efforts and their own realization to a higher state beyond the errors of materiality.

But Agasha emphasizes time and again that neither he nor any other Master Teacher (of whom there are thousands and thousands attempting to inspire and awaken the benighted souls of these "latter days") has reached a final state, a spiritual dead-end. Seemingly, there is always progress and progression. There is always a teacher on the path ahead to light the way for a willing disciple. Agasha still has his own teacher in the far-reaches of the mother of worlds he calls "Immensity," just as he in his turn seeks to urge up the Jacob's ladder of advancement those who are behind him.

The Master Teachers, then, are but men who have made good; who have tried to perfect themselves through experience and understanding . . . even as each of us is inspired toward perfection through unfoldment.

They are masters only because they have, to a great degree, achieved *self-mastery*.

They are gods . . . only to the extent that we are all gods and sons of God, in the sense that all are irreplaceable extensions and incorporations of the one God-consciousness.

#### Universal Principles

Like the cell is a part of the god that is the individual, so all of us are joined together within the unfolding principle of life and consciousness with an interdependence and integrity of purpose that provide each of us with the potentialities of mastership.

This is the teaching of Agasha and an abridged summation of the teaching of all true masters. It is neither apart from, nor entirely a part of, the physical expression of the universe. And the angels and teachers are not so much the administrators as the interpreters or translators of the law, stating and re-stating it in terms of our own experience so that we may bring into focus our own understanding in the light of universal principles.

Not, as we have said, that there is no protection nor tangible help from these teachers, as well as from many lesser guides. There are seven associated solar systems, of which ours is one, says Agasha, and there are seven associated Master Teachers who spread their benevolent regency, their light and understanding to the myriad teachers of all these systems in order that they and we may remain "on the path."

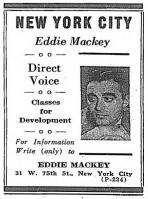
#### No Man Escapes Himself

But always the extent to which we may be aided is conditioned by the breadth of our understanding, or, more correctly, our realization. We begin to realize objectively what our souls intuitively already know, and the lessons of experience become easier, and the understanding is accelerated, as pure realization substitutes for the harder lessons of trial and error.

It is the teacher's function to promote that realization to the full extent of our consciousness, and with it comes assistance of a personal and concrete nature according to what we have earned by our own development. Thus do we prove the rule that the God-consciousness helps us most when we help ourselves, for then do we attract to ourselves that which will also objectively be of help.

For, says Agasha, no man es-capes himself, and no man can escape his own responsibility to himself-to release that which is within himself, the unfolding expression of the whole. No teach-er can substitute his wisdom for that which comes through individual understanding, but there will be great teachers, even in this age and in the flesh, who will inspire within men the realization of their spiritual destiny.

Something for Nothing?

But while we await this longpromised age of peace, of material advancement of marvelous proportions and general prosperity (not now too far away, they predict), these things will be added to us according to the degree that our consciousness and our conscience break through the mists of mis-understanding and reach out the veiled truths that are really searching for expression through us.

The messenger or the teacher who is authentic will not substitute his will for your own; will only seek to guide and inspire you to a full self-realization of your own pow-ers and opportunities which you have earned, while offering you such additional help and protec-tion as is within the law. flopped over the pages. Yes, un-doubtedly *Mrs. Philpott* had not exaggerated. Her home must have been more or less a private muse-Several art critics have inum. spected her work and highly commended it, while photos have trav-eled to many different parts of the world

#### . Rhyme Nor Reason

Tea being over and a cigarette enjoyed, it was time to see Mrs. Philpott's work. Her first drawings and chalk paintings were done on any odd piece of material, such as the back of wallpaper, which had already yellowed. Later, the inspired artist realized the need for more durable material and consequently the color is infinitely subtler and inspiring.

There is hardly rhyme or reason in many of the earlier paint-ings, and yet they are perfection. In fact, there are few artists on this world who could draw with such certainty of line or create such perfection of design, without perhaps hours of thought needed for the construction of the design, and then perhaps days of work in making the lines perfect.

Ancient Indian artists achieved something of the beauty of detail which appear in some of the paintings showing budding, or flowering plant designs.

# Amazing Work

Among the work is one large canvas of what may be called a number of twigs intertwining in perfect harmony. Just three fruit appear among this amazing arabesque design, the vivid green of the foliage blending magnificently with the vibrating color of the mysterious fruit.

Every leaf of this amazing work can be inspected with a magnifying glass. It shows the most delicate tracing of the nerves of the And yet they twine and inleaf. tertwine in a pattern delicate as cobweb lace. All this has been achieved without any forethought or construction and is entirely automatic, accomplished in a record time of feverish labor.

Sometimes, the artist waking up at night and loathe to disturb anyone in the household, sits down in the dark, working away with her materials. She is desperately tired and falls asleep the moment the urge ceases and the prickling sensation in her upper arm subsides. But she has not the vaguest notion of what she has done until on awakening in the morning.

#### Drawings Analyzed

At a later stage, Mrs. Philpott started to draw heads. These, too, are mazing. Executed in the technique of primitive painting, they are amazingly vivid and character-istics, with a clarity of vision of which the 20th century seems incapable.

Mrs. Philpott's work ranges from a few inches to five or six feet squares. She showed us a notebook in which was a little pencil drawing only a few inches square. At first it seemed rather a lot of scrawls made by a child, reminiscent of that popular tune, "The Music Goes Round and Round."

Mrs. Philpott silently handed us Mrs. Philpott shently handed us a magnifying glass and we rein-spected the drawing. There were dozens, perhaps hundreds, of faces in that design. It did not matter which way it was turned, the faces appeared everywhere. Faces drawn

with just a line and a few dots, but depicting youth, age, wisdom, evil, in fact betraying the whole gamut of human emotions.

### Perfect Blending

Mrs. Philpott has signed all her work "R.A.," for so she says, this is the name of the spirit who works through her arm and hand.

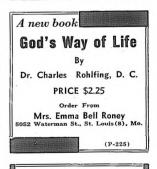
Bar one piece of work, Mrs. Philpott's inspired work is throughout harmonious. Color and line blend, swoop follows swoop sym-bolizing life eternal, and out of what has fallen, spring up new-er, more vigorous lines and shapes. That there is a marked Oriental influence in the work, however, seems undeniable.

Mrs. Philpott declares that she can quite clearly see the figure, whom she calls her guiding spirit, who is doing the work. Psychia-trists may talk about sub-limenal uprushes! But there is no doubt about the quality of the work, which is exquisite in balance, design and color, and no doubt it will be of great interest for America.

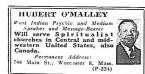
Thoughts and Feelings collect around the physical frame in the form of rays of color . . . The Aura.

#### By S. G. J. OUSELEY

The aura is the sum-total of thought forces and emotions etheric, astral, mental and spiritual-of the individual. We shall now see how the aura expresses itself in terms of color vibration, and discuss the means that can be employed to develop auric sight ourselves.

The basis of the study and interpretation of the aura is the fact that the thoughts and feelings coilect around the physical frame in the form of fine, vibratory waves or rays of color. Vibration is an important word.

Science is discovering much about the X-Ray, the Violet and Ultra-violet Ray, the Infra-red Ray and the little-understood Cosmic Ray. Rays and, in fact, the entire phenomena of the Universe, are the manifestations of different rates of vibration. Actually



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color is really vibration, possessing a symbology entirely its own.

#### Vibratory Rays

The world of Nature is really a symphony of color expressing emanations of various light-rays, whether it be the delicate hues of dawn, the vivid tints of sunset, the glory of the rainbow, or the gleaming intensity of the midday sun in summer.

Occult science teaches that the Central Sun emanates great vibratory rays or wavelengths of light, termed the seven major vibratory rays from which spring the seven basic main types of human mentalities and temperaments. In order of degree they comprise:

(i)	Violet	_	Spiritual Power
(ii)	Indigo		Purity
(iii)	Blue	_	Inspiration
(iv)	Green		Energy (Supply)
(v)	Yellow		Wisdom
(vi)	Orange	_	Health
(vii)	Red		Life

As everyone knows, these basic colors compose the spectrum, but each of these seven great rays is divided into many sub-hues; the violet ray, for example, proceeding from the shorter to longer wavelength, is divided into heliotrope, amethyst, orchid, royal purple, wistaria, and lavender.

In addition to these science admits of many rays which are invisible to normal physical sight; as, for example, the ultra-violet. Cosmically speaking, the aura

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#### call a "magnetic personality." It is seen in pioneers and leaders of daring enterprises.

The darker the shades of red the less favorable are the aspects. Crimson in the aura indicates a propensity to sensuality and the lower passions and desires, whilst deep scarlet signifies lust.

Deep crimson shot with black is the indication of a low, sensual nature-one whose mind is under the control of the animal passions. In all reddish auras there is an inherent tendency towards sense-experience rather than towards the mental or spiritual.

The negative aspects of red are seen in the domineering and bombastic natures of certain individuals in the group. Flattery and vanity are further aspects of the type.

Orange

The orange ray comprises all shades of orange from the dull reddish-orange denoting selfishness and pride to the bright clear tones of health and vitality. Orange expresses the vital force the energy of the sun. The Yogi's call it the "soul of energy."

The presence of strong orange hues in the aura bespeaks a personality that is vital, energetic and active-the "live wire" in fact. Such people frequently dominate their fellows by the sheer force of their vital qualities.

They are generally born for positions of responsibility, and find it easier to rule than to serve, but there is usually an absence of the lust for power. They are good masters-the type of person who tactfully manages others.

They are excellent mixers and can usually get on with any class of person, rich or poor. The orange ray is, however, seldom found without a certain amount of pride which is generally subordinated to common sense.

Ancient writers regarded orange as expressive of wisdom and the reasoning powers. People coming under the orange ray are usually well-balanced individuals.

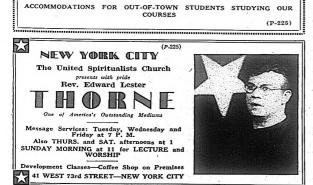
#### Yellow

Yellow, except for certain dark, muddy shades, is a good aspect in the aura. The golden shades particularly denote soul qualities, the astral-mental forces. Yellow symbolizes thought and mental concentration. Where yellow predominates it shows the presence of intellect. It personifies light, representing the sun.

Bright-golden yellow has a spiritual significance, which ac-

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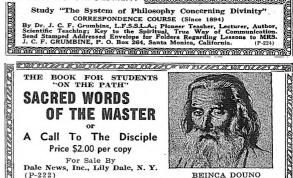

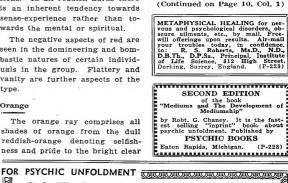

vitality. People with a great deal of red in their auras have strong physical propensities, strong minds and wills, and usually a materialistic outlook on life. They often manifest a very warm and affectionate nature. Red denotes the deepest of human passions — passionate love, courage, hatred, revenge, etc.

Varying shades of red signify different qualities. The presence of very dark, rich tones shows a tendency to selfishness. Cloudy reds are an indicate of greed and cruelty. Bright, clear reds are the best of the red group-such colortones reveal the possession of generosity and praiseworthy ambition.

Where red suffuses the aura very heavily it shows a strong commanding nature-the type we

counts for its use in religious ceremonies and sacred mysteries, as, for example, the use of golden vessels and altar fittings.

The vellow rays are most beneficial, possessing the power to dispel fear and worry. It has a tonic element which is valuable in certain forms of nervousness. It is stimulating both to health and mind.

This color appears in the aura of bright, optimistic types of people. It is seen round people who are intelligent and capable, especially in business matters. The pale-yellow type are, as a rule, high-spirited as well as thoughtful.

The dark, dingy shades of yellow are bad-they denote jealousy and suspicion. Certain dull yelhues appearing in the aura bespeak unpractical natures-people who "dream the idle hours away" in purposeless visions and useless reveries. Such people are not optimists but visionaries.

As a rule yellow shading to gold denotes a soul that is developing spiritual qualities.

#### Green

The presence of green in the aura, with the exception of olivegreen and certain dark shades, is a good sign. The color in general indicates individualism, regeneration, energy and supply. It is the keynote of the ego. The green ray governs individual growthas, for example, the growing seed.

People who have achieved prosperity and success in life invariably display strong green tints in their auras. Green also governs the mental realm and indicates a multiplicity of ideas. Bright clear green appears in the auras of people who- are naturally animated, versatile, thoughtful and adapt-It typifies freedom from able. bondage, independence, new life. If nervous, highly strung people

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effects of green on the mind and nerves they would surround themselves with this soothing color. Its vibrations are extremely refreshing to the soul.

In the East green is the color of mourning, but this idea is based on the belief that it is the color of growth and new life rather than a symbol of death and sadness. The Chinese (a philosophical peouse green lavishly at their nle) festivals of joy and gladness.

The negative aspects of green are envy and jealousy denoted by dark green, and deceit and treachery by olive green.

#### Blue

"Heaven's own hue." Blue represents inspiration-the spiritual color. Its spiritual power and significance have long been known. In Eastern countries blue-colored objects were placed in tombs to ward off evil spirits.

In China and Japan it is the color of fortune.

The presence of much blue in the aura signifies an artistic and harmonious nature, and spiritual understanding. It is the ray of Venus and has always been associated with the feminine aspect. Blue figured prominently in the temples of Isis in Ancient Egypt. In the Roman Church it is the color of the Virgin Mary.

Bright-blue denotes self-reliance and confidence; it indicates a more positive character than those whose auras radiate the paler shades of blue. People with a great deal of bright-blue as a rule are loyal friends and sincere characters.

The darker shades of blue show spiritual qualities. Indigo in the aura shows a high degree of spiruality-integrity and deep sincer-Wisdom and saintliness are ity. represented by dark-blue auras. Certain shades of light blue indicate idealism.

#### Violet

The violet ray is a phenomenon that is rarely seen in the average aura. It is the most highly spiritual color. Violet contains the spirituality of blue with the addition of the red elements of vitality and power. It is the color of the initiate and the adept-indeed it hardly belongs to the earth plane

It has long been regarded as the royal color-the ray of power and influence. All great souls come under its benign dominion.

Its presence in the aura denotes true greatness and worthiness. People remarkable for their disinterested love and wisdom radiate beautiful violet color-tones. The more blue shades of purple are a sign of transcendent idealism.

People with an inborn love of convention; formality-the "redtape mind"-have varying degrees of grey in their auras. Its presence is held to indicate a lack of imagination, a tendency to narrowmindedness—a heavy, opaque grey may be taken as showing meanness and dullness.

Some writers regard grev as denoting deep power of concentration and perseverance. Grey-aura people are certainly very persistent-the plodding type who will leave no task undone. Among these people we find the "lone and folk who love to carry wolf" out life in their own way.

#### Black MIRACLE HEAL

Beware of this "color". Strictly speaking it is not a color but the negation of color. From the most ancient times black has been associated with dark deeds and devilry, and its presence in the aura is always evil and vicious. The trend of the early churchmen and ecclesiastics to a fondness for black is not understood.

The religions of the East have not made this mistake. The occult influence of black stand low in the scale; it indicates hatred, discord and evil thoughts of all types. That most deplorable of beings whom we call a "lost soul" has a black aura denoting the loss or negation of all good.

In the most devilish and depraved souls the aura is sometimes seen to glow with a crimson red shot with black-the most vicious combination of evil known.

Pink

By the, ancient philosophers pink was regarded as a mystic color because it is neither one shade nor the other and as such could not be explained or under stood. A pink aura denotes a

quiet, refined, modest type of character.

One seldom sees pink in the aura of positive, dogmatic or ag-gressive people. It manifests frequently in people who like a quiet life and are fond of beauty and artistic surroundings. People of the pink-aura type will evince great and lasting devotion. The retiring and self-sacrificing nun has a strong admixture of pink with the heavenly blue of her mystic aura.

#### Silver

A silver-streaked aura shows the possessor to be a volatile and lively but unreliable personality. The color goes with people who are versatile, active and gifted in all matters pertaining to movement speech, travel, etc.

Silver-aura folk are very often dabblers in all trades and professions, but masters of none. Expect feebleness, inconstancy and changeful moods where silver predominates. And be on your guard!

#### Brown

Brown denotes capacity for organization and orderly management. It is the business-man's It stands for industry color. for example the brown earth which ceaselessly strives to bring forth fruit and plant life. Do not expect strong emotional feelings or tendencies in brown-tinged auras.

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#### Spiritual Guidance

"National Republic The October Magazine" published an article "We Need Spiritual Guidance." The author, P. L. Franklin, states pointedly what the United Nations need: "When the historic conference for the building of the new United Nations was called to order at San Francisco, religious leaders were shocked and disappointed to hear that the world-important gath-ering was opened without a prayer . . . for Spiritual guidance in the deliberations which were to follow. As the days went by, general disappointment increased when this neglect was not remedied.

"Since these meetings were held in the enlightened United States of America, we cannot escape our responsibil-Our own prestige and influence were greatest in the bringing forth of the new organization. American patri-ots had an historic precedent to follow. It is well remembered by all students of history that when the Constitutional Convention was called following the chaos subsequent to the Revolution. doubt, bickering and bitterness in creased until the patriot Benjamin Franklin, with his ripened experience, called attention to the fact that the sessions were being held without prayer for Spiritual guidance.

"This error of omission was remedied. and soon the doubts and bitterness be-gan to disappear. There sprang forth There sprang forth in Philadelphia the document which, because we have cherished it and obeyed it, has made this the greatest nation in all history.

The reason given in San Francisco for the failure to seek Spiritual guid-ance was that so many creeds were represented in the conference. Yet the representatives of only one important power at the conference denied the existence of the Almighty . . . Certainly this was a poor excuse why Spiritual assistance should not be invoked at the meeting.

"Since that time, the experiences of "Since that time, the experiences of the United Nations organization have not been happy. And curiously enough it is the representatives of the ideology which denies the blessings of Divine Faith that have caused most of the trouble." \* \* \*

on August 8th, 1947, of polio and that his home was in Spartansburg, South Carolina. Like any presiding officer, he bowed

el's father-in-law: He advises me that he was a Lieu-tenant Colonel in the United States Army, having been continuously in its service since he was graduated from West Point in 1937. The correct name West Point in 1931. The correct name is Weikel, and he was in charge of parachute troops during the war. His death occurred from polio in Tokyo August 8, 1947, and he was buried in Arlington National Cemetery on the 17th day of this month past. As I have had no reply to my letter

to the attorney, thanking him for his verification of the facts and stating why I am interested, it may be he and the colonel's family are as skeptical as was the colonel prior to his death.

If this panel is taken as an approx-imate cross-section of the British pub-lic, then this means that more than 15,000,000 people in Great Britain accept Spiritualism.

# Noted St. Louis Spiritualists.



Mr. and Mrs. Robert C. Kroll, founders of The Progressive Spiritualist Ly-ceum and Research Society, 4349 Manchester Ave., St. Louis, Missouri . chartered by the State Spiritualist sociation of Missouri (N.S.A.) February 7th, 1946.

The society, actually founded December. 1945, by R. C. Kroll, lyceum conductor, now has ninety members. of whom are not otherwise affiliated with organized Spiritualism.

Mr. Kroll says the lyceum sessions are built around lectures and forum discussions in which all members par-ticipate. Messages are not given but members are encouraged and guided the development of various phases of mediumship. The membership includes many professional people.

Mrs. Kroll, secretary of her own society, is also State Lyceum Superintendent of Missouri, a position she has occcupied for the past two years. During this time, the number of Lyceums has been increased from two to seven. By purchasing and distributing spiritualist literature, she has been able, in her section of the country, to create considerable interest not only in the Lyceum movement but also in Spir-itualism as a living religion.

The Krolls visited the offices of Psychic Observer recently. They also were delegates at the recent N.S.A. convention at Detroit.

Oliver Lodge's in "Phantom Walls, with reference to psycho-physical phe-

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nomena. "The facts seem to indicate," he says, "that we do, through the agency of certain individuals (who, by the way, "The facts seem to indicate," seem rather pitiable than otherwise), get into touch with agencies which are get into touch with agencies which are able to perform things beyond present human powers." Why should Sir Oliver allude to mediums as "pitiable"?—A. R. Newport.

I gather from the context, what Sir Oliver Lodge meant was that, whereas one would expect mediums to be highly developed both mentally and morally they are not invariably so; they may in not a few instances strike one as being rather feeble-minded, weak-willed, emo tional, and far too susceptible to flat-tery. The physical medium, when in a state of deep trance, has no control over the phenomena, but is as helpless as a ventriloquist's dummy; with head hanging heavily, features distorted, and ectoplasm exuding from the person, he or she can be positively repulsive to the sight—a truly pitiable object. None the less, Sir Oliver had a sincere respect for the finer type of medium such as Mrs. Piper and Mrs. Leonard. There is a further imporant point, which the great scientist may also have had in mind; mediums, particularly physical ones, have endured much at the hands of scientific investigators, who have inflicted upon them all sorts of trials and indignities in order to prove the genuineness of their claims. These hyper-sensitive folk, who might have led ordinary, simple and peaceful lives without their unusual gifts, but who by virtue of them have thus been lifted out of their normal circumstances and suffered in consequence, are surely to some extent worthy of our pity.

#### Too Many Gods

Why is it that some people accuse Spiritualists and those interested in psychic phenomena, of playing with fire, branding them as black magicians?-J.S., Liverpool.

Spirit-communication is forbidden in the pages of the Old Testament be-cause those of the early Israelites who got into touch with the departed were disposed to worship them as gods, which is evinced by the fact that the Witch of Endor, after calling up Samuel, ex-claimed "I see a god (*elohim*) coming up out of the earth." This encouraged polytheism, while Moses and other religious authorities preached that there was but One who must be worshipped, the Lord Jahwe, who had commanded: "Thou shalt have none other gods before me." Consequently all persons continuing the prohibited practice were stigmatized as workers of evil, who consorted with demons. This idea has persisted up to the present day; it is doubtless kept alive by fear of the unknown, by horrific ghost stories, and accounts of "possession" by evil spirits. Furthermore, it is probable that the belief, commonly held by primitive peoples, that the dead are envious of the living, whom they take every opportu-nity to harm, is inherent in the racememory. Some folk ignorantly confuse Spiritualism, likewise psychic phenom-ena *en bloc*, with black magic and necromancy.
