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# JAMESTOWN SUN FAILS TO DUPLICATE PICTURE

It has happened again and this time right here in Jamestown. For years, professional photographers have bragged about their ability to duplicate spirit pictures but when hardpressed, they never go through with the claim.

Last month, the Rev. Robert G. Chaney of Eaton Rapids. Michigan, was engaged by the American Foundation for Psychic Research, Inc., for public and private demonstrations of his mediumship.

The Jamestown Sun, a morning newspaper, was notified of Chaney's visit and handled the straight news story in a commendable fashion. A reporter was sent to the Jamestown Hotel the evening the Rev. Chaney demonstrated blindfold-billet. They took an action picture (see above) and han-

dled the assignment in a noncommital manner.

The Sun was told that the Rev. Chaney would demonstrate spirit photography the next day at the Foundation headquarters and that if interested, they The caption under the picture stated that, according to their own photographers, Edward Hokanson and Elnard Westberg, the spirit picture was "definitely a double exposure".

I went to the Sun office and

would be notified of the results. Left picture, Page 24, taken by Chaney was developed by J. Stewart Husband, owner of the Camp Art Studio, Jamestown. Several hours later, a print was taken to the Jamestown Sun and then published in their morning edition.

challenged them on this point and said: "Can you duplicate it?"

Mr. Hokanson, who admits he's an expert photographer and knows everything there is to know about the business, majestically replied: "Of course, I can duplicate it. It

will be easy. A simple thing like that, I can do in no time at all... no time at all."

Then he grinned at his partner Westberg, winked and swaggered over to an obsolete radio which was in need of his expert attention.

I replied: "That'e fine, Mr. Hokanson, go ahead and do it if it is so easy." Then took a seat on a shipping case in his "modern" studio.

Silence prevailed. I folded my arms and said: "I am waiting, Mr. Hokanson, go ahead and duplicate it."

This attitude irked the master-mind but I felt justified since he had already told me it would be a simple matter to duplicate the spirit picture.

However, I insisted upon waiting for him to follow

through with his threat. But, I was not in there long. The photographer became so upset that he ordered me out of his studio

It's the same old story. These professionals shout to the housetops that they can duplicate this and that, but when called to task, they have

never produced. The fact of the matter is, I am still waiting for the Jamestown Suna-la-Mr. Hokanson-to duplicate the spirit picture and that was ten weeks ago. It was such a simple matter!

This incident recalls to my mind a tussle I had with Howard Marsh of the "Smoky City," my home town. Mr. Marsh also challenged one of Chaney's pictures that appeared in Psychic Observer many years ago. I called upon Mr. Marsh, a man, incidentally, that I have known for over 40 years, and he told me point-blank that the picture I had published was definitely a double exposure. I challenged him to duplicate it. This, he has never done and over 8 years have elapsed.

### All Agree

I have consulted numerous photographers during the last few weeks regarding this spirit picture, saying: "Il you were to attempt to duplicate this, meaning the spirit picture with five 'extras,' how would you go about it?"

They all agreed that each "extra" would have to be photographed separately. In other words, five exposures would have to be made on the same plate before my own personal picture was taken. course, they would not guarantee to have "dead" people as "extras" but would photograph each person, in the living, sep-

### Too Much for Him

In the case of the Jamestown Sun, the photographer would have had to take not only a double exposure, but he would have to photograph five of the office staff. These five exposures would have to be on the same film and then he would have to call me in and take my picture. This would mean six exposures.

Finding he would have to go all through that, I imagine my dear friend Hokanson gave up the idea for even had he gone through with it, the picture would have been such a "hotch" that it would not have looked anything like the one he said he could duplicate.

Furthermore, how was he going to take these five exposures? I suppose he would have to stretch a black cloth across the wall of his studio. and cut holes for the office help to stick their heads through. The procedure would appear

much like the old-time County Fair game where you bought three balls for a nickel and were supposed to hit a man's head and win a cigar.

### Proves Nothing

Had Mr. Hokanson gone through with his silly idea, there is no doubt but that he would have been the laughing stock of the Sun office.

Now as to the time element. For the sake of argument, suppose after days and days of preparation, an expert photogapher could do this. What does it prove? Absolutely nothing!

Now, let us consider Chaney. There was neither fanfare nor uproar during his visit here. From one to four P. M., 32 people had their picture taken (see photograph page 1) and out of all of these, extras appeared on all but one and this sitter's money was refunded. I had two pictures taken within a period of 90 seconds. One had four extras and these four were different from the extras appearing on the other. (See spirit pictures Page 12.)

If our opponents would present the same proof of their claims in ratio to the proof presented by the Spiritualists, then there could be a real controversy. I have yet to see or receive a doped picture that would in any way look like a duplication of spirit photography. All I have received are rank reproductions of paste-ups and obvious double exposures which any eighth grader could detect.

### Books on the Subject

If any of our readers are confronted with the argument that these pictures can be duplicated, merely say to them: "Go ahead. Duplicate them." Then prepare yourself for a long, long wait.

Before my attempt to explain Chaney's phase of mediumship, I will present the result of some library research on the subject. At the moment, there is not a single book in print actually devoted to an explanation of the technique of spirit photogra-

In 1885 a comprehensive book, "Psychography" based on the mediumship of Fred P. Evans, world renowned medium, was published. The sale was limited and less than 500 copies were sold. This book dealt with spirit drawings on slates . . not to be confused with spirit photography.

Doyle's book, "The Case For Spirit Photography" published in the 1900's, has been out-ofprint for over 20 years. Even though the copyright has expired, no publisher has deemed it of sufficient importance to reprint even though used copies of this book sell at a ridiculously high price.

### Mumler Was First

The history of spirit photography is discussed in encyclopedias, some authors devote a chapter or two, but in the main, a discussion of the modusoperandi is by-passed.

The first spirit photographer of any note was William H. Mumler, Boston, Massachusetts, who was investigated by Andrew Jackson Davis. It was through Mumler's mediumship

that Mrs. Lincoln received the famous spirit picture of the martyred president, but it's the same old story, he (Mumler) was condemned in 1868 and arrested when he moved to New York City.

Although acquitted, his career was sufficiently smeared to prevent him from practicing his mediumship. He died · in poverty in 1884 and the story of his life in his book, "Personal Experiences of William H. Mumler in Spirit Photography." Examples of his spirit photos are to be found in Aksakof's, "Animisme et Spiritisme" and James Coates' "Photographing The Invisible."

William Hope (1863-1933) famous Crewe Circle medium was crucified by the late conjurer, Harry Price and the British S. P. R., London. Doyle came to Hope's rescue but not until Price's handiwork had followed the usual pattern trick the medium, then accuse

### Mediums Accustomed

In his defense of Hope, Doyle sums up the mental gymnastics of those who claim to be psychic researchers by saying that "it is an instructive fact that the S.P.R. receives data from conjurors and accepts all these very loose tests (providing they are anti) without question or comment, while when the evidence is the other way, the S.P.R. are ready with extraordinary and unbelievable explanations, rather than admit a positive result."

During Hope's last years, he became so accustomed to accusations that he became casehardened. He, too, passed away a relatively poor man.

No phase of mediumship has been the butt of criticism as has spirit photography and at this point, the reader must be advised that psychic photography per se is definitely not to be cataloged with spirit photography because psychic photography simply means the photographing of objective phenomena · (psychic structures, ectoplasm, materialization, etc.), using a flash or red light.

Psychic photography can be so cataloged even when infra-red is used.

Spirit photography, such as Chaney's, is the photographing of subjective phenomena known as spirit extras. Mumler, Hope, J. Edward, John Myers, William Smith and Clarence Britton come in this category.

### Last Sitter

To explain the real difference between psychic and spirit photography would necessitate using thousands of technical words and then it is questionable whether or not such an explanation would be understood. I am not qualified to take on this assignment.

Since Psychic Observer was launched in 1938, more inquiries regarding this phase of mediumship reach my desk than any other so it was decided to try to obtain up-to-theminute data on the subject.

And so, that is why early in February, Rev. Chaney was asked to come to Jamestown.

I have covered the controversy with the Jamestown Sun and now I propose to explain in detail certain facts supplied by the medium as well as conclusions drawn during his visit

At the close of his demonstration, I was the last sitter. The two pictures I had taken appear on page 24. After Chaney snapped my first picture. I asked him to take another. As before stated, I was permitted to take the second plate to a local photographer, J. Stuart Husband, 121 West 4th Street.

### In 8 Minutes

This second picture was taken by Chaney at 4:55 P. M. We both delivered it to Mr. Husband at 5:00 P. M., and at 5:08 P. M., we (Chaney and myself) were called into the dark room and five extras were

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plainly visible. I was supplied with the original negative and a print the following day.

For over five hours, the following evening, I questioned Chaney regarding the whole procedure. He use an Ansco Triple-S Ortho film, 31/4x41/4. This film was exposed (actual taking of my picture) in the light of a 150 watt bulb for two seconds at F 4.5 lens opening. It was developed by Mr. Husband in Eastman DK-60a developer. Chaney's camera is a "Graphic-View" 4x5. with the reducing back to 31/1x41/1.

### How It Began

Chaney told me that he first learned he possessed the latent psychic power necessary for spirit photography at a seance in 1938. The Rev. John W. Bunker was the medium.

During that seance, Bunker's spirit guides told Chaney to place a folded handkerchief over his solar plexus. He did and, when the seance was over, a spirit extra appeared on the handkerchief. Rev. Chaney says he still has this picture.

At subsequent seances with Bunker an entity, who described himself as a spirit chemist, spoke and promised Chaney he would work with him should he care to perfect to a degree this phase of mediumship.

### Chemist Advises

I asked Chaney the name of this chemist and he responded: "So did I." He continued by 'sayng that the spirit preferred not to give his name but that he (Chaney) should purchase a camera and directions would follow. Chaney was not even told what kind of a camera to buy but it is reasonable to believe that he was impressed or else the chemist felt that it made no difference,

Chaney took his new camera to the next seance with Bunker and on the 35mm film, he was told to take pictures of landscapes. After these landscapes were photographed, he was directed to bring pieces of the film to the seance.

The next procedure, according to Chaney, was when he fol-

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lowed the chemist's direction to have one of these enlarged. but not before both he and Mr. Bunker, or any friend who would agree to the experiment, sat quietly in a room lit by a photo darkroom light (red), each touching an edge of the enlarging paper on which the landscape was being projected. Then the paper would be developed immediately.

### Smith Passed Away

After going through this elaborate experiment for several months, spirit extras began to appear.

Along about this time," says Chaney, "I went to Camp Chesterfield for a definite purpose. I asked Mable Riffle whether or not she would afford me the opportunity to sit with the Board of Directors of the camp in view of their commenting on my phase of mediumship. agreed to sit under test conditions.

It so happened that the following day, before Chaney had an oppotunity to submit to the test, William Smith, the spirit photographer who had been serving the camp for many vears, passed away. And sothat his test was successful and that he was permitted to work at the camp is a matter of his-

For the record, Chaney says that his first phase of mediumship was spirit healing, but when this other phase became evident, he was told to devote his entire time to spirit photography.

### What He Does .

Chaney explained that he has been demonstrating this type of phenomena ever since—over 12 years-excepting the two years during the war when he was unable to get film.

I asked Chaney whether, while taking the picture of a sitter, he ever knew the names or was ever impressed with who would be on the negative. He told me that he was seldom given this information. And then, I asked, "Just what do you do while taking the picture of a sitter?" (See photograph page one, column 4.)

"Well," he said. "There is not much I can do but pray.'

When asked whether or not he would guote the prayer, he said, "Why certainly, although to this day, no one has ever heard it because I repeat it silently to myself.

And this is what he repeats:

"May power divine overshadow us. May the spirit loved ones of this person impress their image upon this film in such a manner as to make (him or her) recognize them. I ask this in the name of the Christ and give thanks for its accomplishment."

After he gives this prayer. Chaney admonishes the sitter to concentrate and sort of tune in. To this, I inquired: "What do you mean, concentrate?"

Chaney replied: "I mean to tune in, not so much for them to exert mental effort in an attempt to project a certain person on the negative but rather to visualize - even feel the presence of their own loved ones in spirit."

"I, too," says Chaney. "must

make every effort to tune in with the sitter. This seems to strengthen or rather intensily the mental and psychic connection-thus affording the spirit people themselves an equal opportunity to tune in."

During his lifetime, Chaney. like all other spirit photographers before him, has been subjected to ridicule and condemnation. Many do not understand why, after a picture is snapped, he does not rush and have it developed. In work of this kind, this would be impossible especially when his engagement calls for him to handle a number of sitters (32 in Jamestown) in a limited time to say nothing of the fact that such a procedure would disturb the smooth operation necessary to obtain results.

To my knowledge, this is the first time, Chaney has allowed a plate to be developed by a professional photographer. In all fairness to him, I cannot say that anyone has asked. My reason for asking another person to develop the negative was solely to break down the argument that he never allows this to be done. I wasn't looking for a test.

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### No Precedent Set

Chaney says that in public work, he has to guard against setting a precedent. In other words, if he allowed everyone the same privilege, he would be continually harrassed by all sorts of cranks and pseudo psychic researchers. Furthermore, Chaney insists that he has no intention of allowing anyone else the same privilege unless they are able to satisfy him that some good purpose is being served.

History already cited in the article shows that unscrupulous psychic researchers have actually tried to tamper with negatives-their sole purpose being their determination to expose the medium one way or another.

In my case, however, I explained to Chaney that generally Spiritualists have been

Inasmuch as weather is uncertain these winter months, I decided to leave for my engagement at Jackson, Michigan, a day ahead of schedule. I had written Rev. James Tingley, pastor of the Goodfellow Spiritualist Church, that I would advise exact time of my arrival because I was afraid either the planes would be grounded or some other factor would keep me from getting to my destination on time.

I stopped over in Buffalo and kept an appointment with my dentist and dressmaker, Michel, on Delaware Avenue. Two extremes . . . pain and pleasure but more about that later.

I checked plane schedules and took off for Detroit where the airfield at Willow Run is thirty-three miles from the center of the great automobile metropolis. I took a cab, four miles, to Ypsilanti, where there is a nice hotel, the Huron.

### Telepathy?

One time, we were grounded at Willow Run, so spent some time at this hotel, hence I readily recalled it. Jackson is beyond Ypsilanti so I was enroute.

Upon arrival, I decided to telephone Rev. Tingley before registering at the hotel. The line was busy so I sauntered into the hotel lobby to await the call.

Then the desk phone rang. The clerk answered: "She may be here. I'll see. She isn't registered." He turned and asked me if my name was Mrs. Pressing. Assured of this he said it was a call from Jackson.

"Oh, yes, I said, "I am on long distance now waiting for the report."

"No, this isn't the operator's call. This is someone calling you," the clerk responded.

When I went to the phone, it was Ruby Olsen, at whose home I was to be a houseguest. She said that Jimmie's little spirit guide, Snow White, told them to call me at the Huron Hotel in Ypsilanti. The spirit was certainly on the alert and eager to prove her efficiency. I had not told anyone of my plans.

### Dr Julia Walton

There are those who would try to explain this happening as telepathy. Perhaps, but in this instance it proved to be a spirit entity. Doubtless, Pink Flower, my little spirit collaborator, rushed on to Jackson to give the message to Snow White, or perhaps spirits can instantaneously establish telepathic 'contact. Whatever the explanation may be, it was very thrilling. To me, this deduction is more sensible than to accept platitudes associated with thoughts jumping hither and yon:

A bit later, Rev. Tingley accompanied by Mrs. Charles Gulick, wife of the president of the Goodfellow Spiritualist Church, arrived and took me to Jackson where I was to be the guest of Mrs. Olsen who resides at 1015 Franklin Street.

Until she passed away in 1940, one of America's outstanding mediums, Dr. Julia Walton lived here with her daughter, Mrs. Olsen. During her long life of 93 years, Dr. Walton served humanity as a licensed physician. She was among the first group accepted by the state to practice at a time when strictest measures were being adopted to have practitioners conform to drastic laws.

She was brought up a Spiritualist and was one of the founders of the Michigan State Spiritualist Association. During these years, the oustanding leaders of Spiritualism served Dr. Walton's church and were guests in her home.

### Noted Spiritualist

During a late supper, after my arrival, Mrs. Olsen reminisced and told me about other pioneer workers: Dr. George B. Warne, Harrison D. Barrett, Rev. E. W. Sprague, W. J. Colville and scores of others who carried the torch for Spiritualism during that time. They were all guests in the home of Dr. Walton.

Spiritualism has often been charged with being fraught with danger both to body and

mind. Dr. Walton is a concrete case to prove that Spiritualist mediums live long and have brilliant minds. She always used her mediumship, in conjunction with her medical practice, to help humanity.

In this home, the very atmosphere is charged with spirit. One morning, in broad daylight, Mrs. Olsen and I were at the breakfast table talking. The medium, Jimmy Tingley was upstairs. There was no one in the house but the three of us.

Plainly, distinctly and clear-

ly, a spirit voice greeted us, "Hello, Hello." Raps were commonplace. Frequently, spirit approval of what we were talking about was made known by a series of raps.

On Saturday afternoon Jimmy took me to the famous Gilbert candy shop and restaurant for tea. I was familiar with their candies as they are nationally advertised in such fine food magazines as Gourmet. Incidentally, the place itself reminded me of Blum's in San Francisco whose candies are also famous throughout the United States.

In a room, crowded with people gaily chatting over afternoon tea, young Tingley gave me a most extraordinary clairvoyant reading. My brother Warren gave a full account of my immediate family, even telling pet names. My husband's family were also accounted for. Bob Gast, a pioneer pilot in American aviation, announced himself and gave remarkably clear evidence. Many of the messages were testproof because no one but myself knew certain details disclosed by the medium.

### Superb Clairvoyance

Young Tingley related to me, word for word, a conversation I had with a man and his wife. This conversation concerned the medium (Tingley). Certainly, I had not uttered a word of it to a living soul. It was amazing! How is it done? I really don't know.

In this instance evidently, the spirits who were present when the chat occurred, must have been present again in the Gilbert tearoom, or had relayed the information to the medium's own guides.

Abruptly, Jimmy said: "Let's go to Elaine's dress shop. Lillian wants you to see it.

I am reasonably sure Jimmy was unaware that this famous movie star, Lillian Tashman, frequently manifests to me. Most certainly he had no way to know what happened in the shop for when we arrived. Jimmy said: "This is very nice, but certainly isn't anything like Michel's in Buffalo."

I asked him how he knew about Michel's. He said: "Lillian says that you were there yesterday before you took the plane." All perfectly true, but I had not told it to a soul.

It is comforting and encouraging to know that our unseen

psalm, we are promised: "And I will give my angels charge over thee."

From Elaine's salon, we went out to the Goodfellow Spiritualist Church at Leroy and are being made to either enlarge the present building or erect a new structure.

Dozens and dozens of meringued covered lemon pies were lined up on a long table. Several large hams were made ready for the oven. Great pans of greens were cut in readiness for the chef salad. Preliminary preparations for the dinner for the "big day" required hours and hours of time.

Installation of a public address system was in progress.



Besides, beautiful as a thought may be, how can it possibly fit into a work containing better than 100,000 words, where every thought must fit like a link in a chain? Puzzled, I hid the business card away among some other papers.

She immediately returned then to her bluntness, sent her eyes across the street and asked: "Is that your car there?"

"Yes." I replied, wondering what goes.

"You have a bad left front tire," she told me, "and you better have it fixed before you leave."

Incredible! How could she have known, that the left tire was my spare, and that the other was at the garage?

"Another thing," she said, most abruptly, "If you don't leave before dark, you'll never get to Los Angeles!"

"But I always drive at night!" I objected. But she quickly came back: "Take it or leave it!" Thus had she spoken, leaving me to my musings on the front porch.

### The Medium Knew

Though I had changed my tire, I resolved, just to be honory, I wouldn't leave until it was dark, as I had planned. And when the night became black and when the shadows commenced to play, I joined a number of other cars on the trek to Los Angeles and just before I had reached the main highway, and at the instance I

commenced gloating, a fog rolled in?

But I had driven in fogs before, I would still prove this Blunt person wrong! However, the fog came in heavier, and the white line of the road was no longer visible. The worst fog that had hit San Diego in sixty years. Cars commenced turning around unable to proceed in the original direction.

### Thanksgiving Alone

Then I thought about this Blunt person again, and wondered what powers her collaborators had with the elements for I too turned around, scarcely finding my way back. And for the first Thanksgiving in ten years, I was absent from home!

I spent Thanksgiving writing. What else could I do? In my novel: "Trembling Bridge," (not finished yet), I came to a blind spot: My leading character is thinking about his mother who'd passed away. She was more than a noble soul. One, whose indomitable courage characterized her life.

### The Spiritual Passage

A writer can spend 100,000 words just describing this one motherly trait, but in my story, this had to be expressed but briefly. And yet, the importance of such a feeling had to be left so well intrenched, that whenever one thought about the son, this singular motherly characteristic had to follow him through the book. Then suddenly as if struck by a bolt, I remembered the spiritual passage my Blunt friend gave me.

And desperately of course, and in frenzy, I hunted all through my papers for that business card, and when I found it, what incomparable joy I experienced! Indeed, what ecstasies of exultations flowed through my soul! It was just what I needed! I read it again: "A single candle burning through the whole power of the world," was what the Blunt medium had given me.

Of course, any writer worth his salt must be able to take a thought not his own, and fit it into his own style, (go ahead and laugh) for how else can he be original? My transposition of the original passage however, can never equal what had been inspired spiritually, but this is how I had fitted it in:

"Dwight remembered her smiling face, smiling though her body was wracked with pain. Pain seemingly purposeful to demonstrate the soul of a single flame, inextinguishable, had the whole world exerted its powers to crush her . . ."

A friend who had read my work, ironically remarked: "This single passage is out of this world!"

### Not In This World

And this friend must have thought that I was being vain, even credulous, or perhaps overworked, when I returned: "You're right! For you can be sure, that this passage did not originate in this world—"

But getting back to the Blunt person, for all of her four feet of boldness, I would like to feel that E. B. Browning had described her better in his immortal words: "As frank as rain on cherryblossoms..."

It is on rare occasions that this type of phenomena manifests through Tingley's mediumship so he was equally excited as I. From time to time, we distinctly heard independent voices. Their insistence became so obvious that I decided something should be done about it so, later in the evening, we darkened the breakfast room and I had a solo sitting for trumpet and independent voice. A record of this seance will be published later.

### The Mayor Was There

Sunday morning dawned reasonably clear. Our great concern of weather conditions was due to telephone calls and letters from people who were coming from a distance to attend the meetings.

About noon, the Rev. Fred L. Felix, pastor of the Spiritualist Episcopal Church, Toledo, Ohio, arrived. He is well known for his startling blindfold billet mediumship which always attracts a large crowd. People came from Lansing, Battle Creek, Coldwater, Detroit, Eaton Rapids, Toledo Ft. Wayne, Chicago and even Portland, Oregon. Mr. Gulick and the Board of Trustees were particularly pleased because many of the city officials, in-

cluding Jackson's Mayor House, attended the services.

After my address, Rev. Felix and Rev. Tingley gave superb demonstrations of mediumship. Their messages were very accurate and detailed. Though I've heard many mediums give a demonstration, I am always spellbound and elated when truly great mediumship is presented.

Between services, my friend, the Rev. Bessie Wells, trustee of the Independent Spiritualist Association, stopped by for a chat. Her own church was having afternoon and evening services with a dinner so she was unable to stay.

### Many Turned Away

Charles Swann with his beautiful wife, Pauline, also called to see me. I often wonder if the development of mediumship is influenced by the locale. In Michigan, there are scores of mediums with superior development. The story of Swann's mediumship has previously been printed in *Psychic Observer*. I

am convinced that environment, atmospheric conditions and even earth chemicalization influences psychic unfoldment.

Between services was indeed a festival. Over 120 persons were served dinner on long tables, decorated with red roses. Later I was informed that over fifty were turned away. Over six hundred people attended the meetings.

Appreciation for the efforts put forth by church boards and ladies' auxiliaries always make me extremely happy. I noticed particularly expressions of thanks being extended to those who furnished the music: Gladys Allen, Thelma and Andrew Thorpe, Lawrence Tinney and Charles Gulick.

### It Started In Michigan

After the service, Mrs. Olsen gave a little supper party for a few friends to meet me personally and then, the following morning, Mr. and Mrs. Gulick, Fred Felix, James Tingley and my hostess took me by motor to Willow Run, Detroit airport, where I boarded a non-stop air craft for Buffalo.

The joys, thrills and pleasures experienced while in Jackson are of great significance to me for in 1930 at a Grand Rapids hospital, my eyes were really opened for the first time after I had a thrilling psychic experience in the operating room. This experience created my intense interest in Spiritualism so you see, it all started (for me) in Michigan, and this is but another chapter.

As her figure swayed lightly before me, I could see the exquisite quality of her dress and (Continued Page 10, Col. 1)

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

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
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EASTER

It is indeed the time of the resurrect on, for the sun—the life giver — has crossed the equator, bringing new light and life to the northern hemisphere. It is the season of revived hope. And despite the conflict and anxiety in which we are immured, hope and promise stir within our hearts.

Nature's recurring seasons have largely determined human reactions and habits, and Eastertide — the re-arising of the Eternal Sun — has been celebrated from time immemorial. All worship traces back to sun worship. Not that these ancients worshipped the golden orb itself: the sun was but a symbol and outward manifestation to them of the life giver.

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Its real meaning and significance constitute the Rock of Truth upon which the religion of Spiritualism stands. What happened 2000 years ago is happening today. Unless personal conscious survival is a fact, the resurrection is meaningless.



Even primitive man held the idea that God expressed himself through material vehicles, and the galaxy of stars and constellations which bestrew the infinity of space were but personifications of Divine Powers.

Thus the twelve signs of the Zodiac became the houses or abiding places through which the cosmic energy expressed itself in its annual pilgrimage, and practically all the Old Testament characters are personified reflections of stars and planets.

Our Christian system is based almost entirely upon star lore, since it evolved from, and was superimposed upon, systems of thought and tradition which were hoary with age long before Moses emerged from Egypt.

These ancient peoples had their slogan "As above — so below." Every change in the skies was expected to produce corresponding changes on earth. Every new star, according to its position and magnitude, must therefore have its corresponding and representative personality on earth, whether he be prophet, priest or king.

Thus every outstanding character in the tribal life became a figure around whom the ancient traditions were wrapped, and these characters in their turn strove to regularize their mission and establish their position by conformity to the standards expected of them.

Small wonder that the early church, with its restricted knowledge of nature's laws. adopted the ancient festival of Easter, together with its many ancient traditions. as the festival of resurrection. There is very little reason to believe that

the crucifixion of Jesus of Nazareth took place at this particular time of year, and, in any case, the fact that it is a moveable festival which varies from year to year stamps it with the die of solar mythology.

How much of the Christian tradition is related to the actual facts in the life of Jesus, and how much to more ancient mythology, is still a moot point. Christendom still regards the resurrection of Jesus Christ as unique. Modern psychic investigation shows that the incident was a perfectly normal and natural one.

The Spiritualist is in a better position than anyone to distinguish between the facts and the myths of this festival, for he has before him the recurring event of the eternal resurrection, which applies equally to every man, be he saint or criminal.

The strength of the Sp. ritualist position is that a man's convictions are based upon observed facts and verified evidence, and the farther he keeps from tradition, sentimentality and ancient shibboleths, the

safer and more reliable will be his outlook on spiritual life. God is revealing Himself today — through His laws — as perfectly as at any time in history!

Of course, the resurrection was a fact because it is a reality for every man. Of course, the reappearance after death was an actual occurrence, since its naturalness has been demonstrated thousands of times in the homes of many of us.

Let others celebrate the resurrection on any given day. To the Spiritualist every morning is an Easter morning, for we live in a Universe of Eternal Life. All who have passed through the transition have entered the larger life, from whence they return to bless and help us and by and through the operation of natural law they companion us along the road and at times may manifest their interest in our well being.

We can say of all our loved ones who have gone before us on the eternal journey:





But our Teachers and our souls may know that to receive what we ask for when we ask, would be the worst thing for us. Does daddy give his razor blade to his child to play with because he asked for it? Does mama let her little girl have her best hat because she wants it?

Oh yes, under the law we find what we seek for - sometime. But it may not have been a wise search.

Knock and the door of opportunity will open - so say the "success schools." Take their course and every door will open at your approach! A

Well, suppose it does, do you fit behind that door? Is that really a good place to be - a better place than the one your soul assigned to you in this term of the school of life? Is it?

The law of cause and effect is no respecter of persons. The "big shot" has nothing over the little fellow who humbly goes about his daily life and enjoys every bit of it.

Taking a fling may give you an evening thrill but when the next morning arrives the effects register their presence in no uncertain way! So we go through life learning wisdom by monkeying with the buzzsaw called the law of cause and effect, fate, karma.

Repeal the law? No, that would bring all mankind to destruction, and all creation would go to pot.

TELEPHONE BETWEEN WORLDS by James Crenshaw — Borden Publishing Company. Distributed by Psychic Observer, Inc., Jamestown, N. Y., \$3.50.

In this book, the author speaks to skeptics and believers alike of the progress made to the scientific and philosophical level in the new and as yet incompletely explored world beyond our physical sight.

The nature of that world and its meaning in terms of our everyday existence are depicted through the instrumentality of a remarkable psychic sensitive, Rev. Richard Zenor of Los Angeles.

Richard Zenor has been known for his unusual psychic faculties since a child of four. When he was twelve years old, he began a new and rarer phase of mediumship. He literally became a telephone link hetween two worlds, the instrument whereby those no longer clothed in the physical garment, as we know it, could speak naturally and directly to those left behind.

Coming at a time when many great scientists and thinkers such as Einstein, Millikan, Compton and Stromberg recognize the existence of something "beyond physics," Telephone Between Worlds will bring a better understanding and inspiration to all who read it.

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accused of not being scientific and, for this reason and to satisfy many who have complained in the past. I felt that this was a good time to dispel their doubts.

When Chaney gave me the second plate to take outside to another photographer to develop, he said that he could not guarantee that any extras would appear. I told him I would take my chances because I felt that a good purpose would be served and that if nothing did appear, it would be just as good a test to me.

Those familiar with Chaney's work in the field, know that on many occasions he has publicly demonstrated his gift under test conditions before hundreds of persons. Pictures have been taken before audiences and developed on the spot before their very eyes. Many times, the sensitized paper used for skotographs is not even exposed in the camera.

For results, each person holds a sensitized paper in the region of their solar plexusthen this paper is lightly touched by the medium's fingertips.

Immediately, right before the audience, these papers have been developed and extras have appeared. Chaney's skotographs are not to be confused with his spirit photography, but both phases require a similar technique, according to the spirit chemists.


Now to sum up the whole present-day case for this phase of mediumship. Since the days of Mumler, the attitude displayed by psychic researchers toward spirit photography has not changed. Chaney will be confronted by the same accusations hurled at those who demonstrated before him, but in this twentieh century, the top-notch mediums in the ranks of Spiritualism have learned to look upon pseudo psychic researchers with scorn.


This simply means that many of them (psychic researchers)

are not to be trusted, at least not until they have been tested as to their honesty of purpose . . . and after that-well, even then, let the Mohammeds go to the MOUNTAIN - the representative Spiritualist seance, church or camp - where our foremost mediums are to be found.

Spiritualists and their mediums have always made it a point to bend over backwards in an attempt to serve upright seekers but have learned (the hard way) to question the integrity of those investigators whose attitude is comparable to the spider who tried to proposition the fly to come into his parlor.







WHERE WORDS FAIL - PICTURES CONVINCE

The picture, directly above, was published in the Jamestown Sun, with the caption "positively a double exposure". The Sun was challenged to duplicate it. To date nothing has happened.

Outsiders, rank skeptics and most newspaper photographers have always claimed they could duplicate spirit photography but they never do.

The pictures above were taken 90 seconds apart. One of the negatives was developed by J. S. Husband, one of Jamestown's commercial photographers and the other (right) was developed by Chaney.

Four of the nine extras are identified as relatives and friends. The others are strangely recognizable. If you can identify any of the spirit extras, write the editor of Psychic Observer.
