Will Science, Citadel of Mechanics, Dispose of the Mechanistic Interpretation of Life?

Noted Psychiatrist Says: "THERE MUST BE A SPIRITUAL ELEMENT."

Psychic research has so long been scientifically on the defensive that those close to the subject often are hardly aware how secure its place in the field of science is becoming.

The men of science who deal with the mind, the men who

are most directly concerned with the practicable problems of consciousness—the nation's psychiatrists and neurologists—are beginning to speak openly of their interest in psychics and to regard such as interest as respectable.

It was a leading psychiatrist himself who brought this to my attention recently. He is Dr. Victor Parkin (*) of Los Angeles, who has probably been called in as an expert psychia-

after some rather complimentary remarks about it, related this story:

Many years ago in New Zealand, he visited a trance medium. He had read J. L. Hudson's LAW OF PSYCHICAL PHENOMENA and, therefore, "knew all the answers."

But this medium did astounding things—talked with many voices, exhibited the traits of numerous unlike personalities, conversed not as one but as

tric witness more times in court cases than any other of his distinguished colleagues in Southern California.

He told me a story and gave me a reprint from a well known psychiatric journal to read. Both brought home to me the fact that the study of spiritistic and other psychic phenomena has emerged from the underground and is now the great new frontier of modern science.

Dr. Parkin had read my book, TELEPHONE BETWEEN WORLDS, (***) and

There was the cockney personality, for instance, who said he had been a railroad engineer and had been in an accident. But when he climbed back into his cab, the fireman took no notice. Nor did his family when he went home.

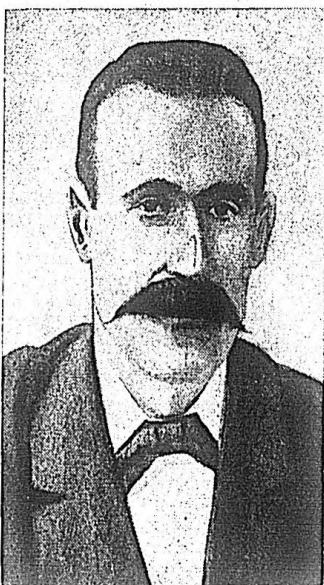

he saw a "beautiful lady," who informed him he was dead and asked him to go with her. It was only then that he realized what had happened to him.

Now, he told the young doctor through the medium, he was helping others in a similar situation to find themselves—others temporarily "lost souls" who were trapped by the confusion of their own ignorance and who needed to be shown the way back to their real homeland beyond the earthly veil.

Dr. Parkin said he recalled all this when he read my book because of the similar experiences and information I had received through the California trance medium, Richard Zenor.

Fictional Creation

The point: reports of the afterlife and its activities always dovetail in many particulars, no matter who may be the medium. It is like travelers' reports of a foreign city . . . as varied and differing as the type and quality of the reporter, but always with some major points in common. We conclude, then, that the city is not imaginery or the fictional creation of wandering minds.

We likewise conclude that so many avowed witnesses from the other world, all relating such similar stories, must have observed something basic and factual no matter how individually distorted are their accounts.

Even more important, such stories emphasize the necessity of understanding the nature and the law of the afterlife, because of the suffering which ignorance often brings.

There was more to Dr. Parkin's story. He had been impressed with his first experience with mediumship, for, as he said, "I went to scoff and came away in a decidedly chastened state of mind."

Name Unknown

Some time later, he induced a friend to accompany him to another medium's "development" class. He was interested to find out how it was conducted, but the friend was very reluctant to go along—afraid that his standing in the community (he was prominent) would be compromised if it were discovered he was interested in spirit communication.

Nevertheless he was persuaded to go. He was assigned a place with the doctor and others at a table in the seance room. During the proceeding, in the blackest darkness, they were instructed to take the pencils and paper which had been

provided and to write down any psychic impressions that came to their minds or to report any other manifestations.

For a time there was complete silence. Then Dr. Parkin heard his friend's pencil start writing on the paper. When lights were turned up, it was found that he had written—in a handwriting other than his own—a masterly philosophic essay couched in a literary style entirely foreign to himself. The essay was signed "Tiglioni" a name he did not know.

A Non-Believer

This man could not explain the strange thing which had happened to him. It was, he said, as if his arm and hand had been taken over by another person, by a person whose thinking, style of composition and handwriting all were different from his.

Although he had been an outspoken non-believer, he went on to develop his automatic writing—to the degree that he would often carry on casual conversations in many different locations, day or night, while his hand would write messages, essays, descriptions and poems that he would know nothing about until he read them.

Moreover, he developed a

further phase: automatic drawing. The first example was a penciled picture of a 17th century Cavalier, done in complete darkness. At the second session of the class he and the doctor attended. The picture was exquisite in detail, even to the fine markings of the ruff collar and the rest of the costume. Yet the lights and shadows were not created by stippling; rather by a remarkable graduation of continuously oval lines, a feat apparently impossible of duplication by any known artist.

One got the impression that the drawing had been "precipitated" on the paper from the lead in the pencil as it passed over in easy curving strokes. And while the costume was typical and complete, the face was a fine portrait—the characteristic face of an English Cavalier of the time of the ill-fated Charles I (who was executed by his people.).

Remarkable Cases

After this first astonishing example of an artistry he never knew existed, Dr. Parkin's friend discovered that he could also frequently do pictures in colors with crayons all automatically.

Again the point: stories of remarkable cases of automatic

writing fill the pages of psychic literature. Here was further corroboration of the inescapable thesis; namely that some personality, some consciousness entirely separate from the writer, the so-called amaneusis, had to be responsible.

In later years, as Dr. Parkin became one of the leaders in his profession, he had reason to reflect on certain other observed phenomena in his own work, pointing to a non-materialistic concept of mind and the existence of a non-physical world.

For example, while dealing with alcoholics afflicted with delerium tremens, he found that in case after case they had something in common: almost always they would see animals, usually reptiles of various kinds and many times other grotesque creatures that were described in detail.

Why did these D.T. patients always seem to see approximately the same thing? Why were there not greater differences in description?

Frequently, the patient would point into the empty air and trace the movements of phantom snakes or animals he claimed to see. Other times, screams of terror would make it apparent that the D.T. patient was experiencing real fear of the animal vision then haunting him.

Not Sufficient

There were too many repetitions of this kind of performance to be regarded as coincidence, the doctor said. The general pattern was too often the same. The word "hallucination," unsatisfactory in meaning anyway, was certainly not a sufficient explanation.

One possible conclusion (coinciding with the teachings of occultist): that the D.T. victim has been so stimulated by excessive use of alcohol that he is able to "tune in" on the part of the non-physical world inhabited by animals.

Spirit teachers say that this is true; that there are many divisions of animals in the

"lower astral" and that this realm is comparatively close to the earth plane, both in location and "rate of vibration."

Alcohol, it is said, may activate the pineal gland (sometimes called the seat of the "all-seeing eye") in the brain so that it becomes responsive to the particular frequencies of the astral animals. And the alcohol seems to cause the response, in many cases, to special types of animals, such as snakes.

"Clear-seeing" Mediums

Thus, like a human television set, the patient truly reproduces a picture of a part of the animal other-world. His is not an hallucination in the usual sense, for he is seeing that which is really there but merely invisible to the normal individual, whose clairvoyant sense is dulled or, on the other hand, tuned to higher frequencies (as in the case of "clear-seeing" mediums).

So much for the personal experiences of a noted American psychiatrist.

He now brought me up to date on the trend of thinking among other leaders in his profession. First, he handed me a copy of an Associated Press dispatch datelined Baltimore, March 26 (1950), quoting Dr. Wilder Penfield, professor of neurology at McGill University in Montreal and director of the Montreal Institute of Neurosurgery.

What Dr. Penfield said was not new, but the fact that he said it and reemphasized it—before doctors at Johns Hopkins Hospital—was important. Speaking of the "central switch-board" action of the brain, with its inconceivable multiplicity of circuits and electrical reactors, the noted surgeon was quoted thus:

The Mind's Mechanism

"What is the real relationship of this mechanism to the mind?"

"Perhaps we will always be forced to visualize a spiritual element that is capable of controlling the mechanism."

How much nearer can a brain

surgeon come to the spiritualistic hypothesis with stating it outright?

Physicists dealing with what Dr. Penfield called the "geography" of the brain have coined new terms (e.g., "feed-back mechanisms," "cybernetics") to explain the electrical action of the nerve cells and the cortex, but the physicist "is in no better position than the physiologist, or psychologist—or even a surgeon, for that matter—to

explain how nerve action becomes thought or . . . how thought is translated into the nerve action we call voluntary."

A patient on the operating table, said Dr. Penfield, may have a portion of his brain electrically stimulated so as to produce a certain reaction. The patient then may produce a similar reaction, say the movement of an arm or leg, voluntarily; in other words, by the action of his own will.

But Dr. Penfield found that the conscious patient always *knows* the difference between a voluntary, willed movement and one which is artificially stimulated and which produces a purely automatic or mechanical reaction.

Who Does the Knowing?

The question: who does the *knowing*?

Sometime the brain-switchboard operates automatically, on impulse induced artificially from the outside. At other times, the impulse is produced voluntarily by the owner of the brain. Are the owner and the brain identical? Is mind just another name for brain?

Obviously Dr. Penfield thinks not.

There must be a "spiritual element" . . . And once again science, citadel of mechanics, disposes of the mechanistic interpretation of life.

The Search for the Master

While modern schools of education stress the fact that any teacher, even in the elementary grades, should try to inspire a love of learning in pupils, there is no controversy on the assertion that learning cannot be coerced. The motions of teaching can be gone through, but there is no effect unless the mind of the student is receptive to the truths which are present. Only those who wish to know learn.

So it is with spiritual truth! The man or woman who has devoted attention to the search for Truth is, the one who will see its light shining in the darkness. He who has looked for the Teacher will discover him. "Seek and ye shall find!" The Teacher, surely you must know, is not hiding. He does not want you to turn your eyes in the other direction. Instead, he does his best to attract your gaze toward him and the wonderful help and guidance which He has to offer. Will you be blind? Will you say, "I am tired and shall just sit here and wait?"

If you are so foolish as to take such an attitude, you are being not only selfish but stupid, for the Teacher has the good of all mankind at heart. He wants you, but He cannot slight others to plead with one person when many are waiting. You but cheat yourself if you imagine that your own initiative and desire are not essential. Will you be chosen as a disciple? That is up to you, for the Teacher seeks constantly for helpers. He sees the suffering and the ignorance which extends over all the world, and his efforts are devoted to guiding those who will carry the torch of His Truth into the dark caves of despair and misery.

Do you think that he cannot find you if you are ready? Does not the lighthouse send its beams over the dark water? Do the stars not shine out in the blackness of night? So you with the inner light in your soul will stand out to the Teacher, and He will come, and you will hear His Voice. Then will he show you what remains to be done. You can draw Him to you by your desire to be his disciple. This is the spark that can grow into a glorious light to make your soul stand out as fit for the Teacher's coming. It is kindled to radiance by the practice of self-control, of meditation and devotion to virtue and truth. When He has come, only the keys of doubt and indifference can keep him from entering into your heart. Remember that you are the one who tends the door.

In short: This is no school of magic. It is a school of progression, for your life is a constant education. When you have renounced material disbelief, when your purpose is pure and sympathetic, when you seek no laurels of personal aggrandizement, then your Teacher will appear. He will, figuratively speaking, lead you up the golden staircase to the Temple of Divine Wisdom. He will raise your arm and assist you in lifting the Veil of Isis so that you may receive for yourself the wonder and the glory of the Great Unknown.

World's Greatest Apport Medium — CHARLES BAILEY

Charles Bailey was an Australian, born of English parents, attended school until old enough to work in a shoe factory. Living near was an old man who kept a small shop. During the week, in his private rooms, he held Spiritualistic meetings which Bailey attended.

The proprietor of the shop was very mediumistic and foretold the wonderful gifts that Bailey would develop. Not long afterwards, Bailey was entranced and to the surprise of the sitters, objects of various kinds began to drop on the table. Bailey was annoyed and denied he was responsible.

As he could not very well keep up with his work in the factory and his mediumship, he decided to give up the latter. His friends did not want him to do this and agreed to pay him a salary. The circle moved to Carlton to the home of Mr. Grey, a Scotchman. Dr. Whitcombe was recognized as chief control. Abdul and Selim being the operators for the phenomena.

Lectures of a high order were given by Professor William Denton, the eminent American geologist, Professor Rhodes Buchanan and others.

Thomas Stanford, a wealthy American Spiritualist, heard of

Bailey and engaged him to give seances at his home. The first meeting 25 persons attended in a room full of fragile bric-a-brac of great value.

A shower of copper ore fell but not one ornament was broken nor one person struck. Near the close of the meeting, the skeptic housekeeper switched on the light from outside, and Bailey fell unconscious. A Dr. Broyer attended him, but he was very ill for three weeks.

Bailey sat regularly with Stanford for 13 years; more than 4,000 lectures were delivered. He later visited Europe, Naples, Rome, Turin, Padua, Venice and in the summer heat, chunks of ice were brought as apports and placed on the table in the seance room.

Bailey also visited Paris, Pisa, Florence, Morocco, Algiers, Canary Islands, Capetown. He then went to Dr. Coates at Scotland where a trumpet was tried and some whiskeys came through. Hearing of this, Mr. Ayling of the *Melbourne Argus*, made a trumpet and then the instrument called the "Shattophone." For the past 16 years, a regular pri-

vate weekly seance was held and only on one occasion, has Bailey not attended.

For some considerable time, Bailey lived under the same roof as myself at Sandringham, Victoria, the next town to Hampton, the residence of the Rev. Jessie Curl who has just completed a successful lecture tour in America. Whilst Bailey lived with us, we regularly held weekly seances at which the following objects were apports: Babylonia tablets with cuneiform inscriptions, live birds from India, beautiful humming bird nests, half a bucket of salt water with sea weed and marine insects, African divining shell, Cyprian papyrus manuscript, 100 Chinese coins, flowers, hot cakes from India, scarabs, etc.

During later years, the mediumship changed somewhat to direct-voice and it was in 1947 that my wife, who had passed on a little while before, spoke with her distinctive manner of speech telling me of the beautiful and real country she was living in and requesting me to continue to work for the Cause of Spiritualism so that when it was my turn to make the great change she would meet me and we could go on together.

Bailey passed away recently. He was over 90.

Spiritualist organs are subsidized by these intellectuals, who would not contribute one dime to publication costs, then the matter could be handled with their suggestions but until that time arrives, every possible source of revenue must be open to those who struggle to give the world a fairly readable publication.

Would You?

Down through the years, there is no record to show that any Spiritualist publication was able to survive on circulation alone. Mrs. M. E. Cadawallder, who for years published the *Progressive Thinker*, told me some time ago that thousands of dollars of her own money was invested in her paper and this only because she was able to finance its publication—she allowed very little advertising.

Many of the top Spiritualist organizations in this country have found that it is hopeless to expect support for their official organs and invariably monies have to be drawn from the treasury,—revenues received from other sources. For years, one of the foremost Spiritualist organs backed by a top Spiritualist organization had to be financed by the editor whose ideals forced an expenditure of a vast amount of money out of his own personal income.

In 1937 the *Psychic Observer* was put on the market to retail for 10c. At that time, the printing costs made it possible to continue to sell the journal at 10c. Today, the *Psychic Observer* printing overhead is two and a half times the original cost. Several years ago the paper was raised to 15c but even at this price, it is a question how long such a figure can remain when continuously for the past three years, printing costs have risen and there is no way to pass this cost to the purchaser unless the retail price is again advanced.

It is very well for people to say that the editors of Spiritualist journals should not do thus and so and it is doubtful whether those people who desire everything so perfect would contribute (5c) toward the

support of a truth they claim to cherish. Whether *Psychic Observer* continues one year, ten years or the entire life of its editors depends upon one thing—sufficient revenue to offset terrific expense in mechanical costs and circulation.

Can You Do It?

It is very easy to tell someone else how to run a Spiritualist publication but to date, none have been able to survive without investing terrific sums personally all along the way and those who have followed this path have never complain-

ed and will make every effort to continue along our chosen path and give to our readers, the best Spiritualist publication of its kind *now in print.*

Spiritualism In Finland

A brief resume of the work and activities of the Finnish Spiritualist Society, submitted by Helmi Krohn, president, reads: "It all started for me when I visited the Grottrian Hall, London, England to attend a Spiritualist service. I was surprised to see the big hall filled to the last seat. There was a devout atmosphere. The people seemed to be waiting for something . . . and then I heard my first lecture and witnessed my first demonstration of clairvoyance.

"When I returned home (Finland) I brought Spiritualism with me and began to talk of it to my friends. Soon a small group gathered and we began to hold seances and soon our circle grew so large, we had to hire a hall for our meetings.

"In 1946, we started a Spiritualist Society, the first in Finland, and still remains, the only one. We hold regular religious services with prayer, singing, lectures and messages. The Society also publishes many books. Some of the classics on Spiritualism have been translated into Finnish."

Mrs. Krohn closed her article with a hopeful note that more and more mediums will visit their country and that they themselves will produce many more workers.

The Finnish Spiritualist Society is a member of the International Spiritualist Federation and of the Northern Spiritualists Union.

He Knew Fay

An interesting sequel to the feature story about Anna Eva Fay which appeared in *Psychic Observer* July 10th 1950, was received from Rev. A. Maham Rouse (see picture, right) of Wood, Wisconsin.

Rev. Rouse says: "I recall very vividly my experience with Anna Eva Fay when she appeared (1900) in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. I responded to her request for volunteers to assist in the preparation of her cabinet demonstration. Miss Fay was securely tied hand and foot, coils secured her to the chair which was fastened to the floor. A cabinet was placed over her and securely anchored. A table knife and chair were placed in the cabinet and Miss Fay requested someone to sit in the chair. All who had mounted the rostrum disappeared when this request was made. I alone remained, took the vacant chair, and before the curtains were closed, was warned of what was in store for me.

"Those who recall Miss Fay's demonstration in those days know that within split seconds, all ropes were cut and things scattered about the stage in less than thirty seconds after the demonstration started.

Rev. Rouse said that he was invited to join with Miss Fay

and tour the country. He declined but says (feels) there is no question but that she possessed marvelous psychic power. Rev Rouse is a member of the First Christ Unity Spiritual Science Church of Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Spiritualism in Athens

From Blackpool, England, John J. Wakeling, submitted a letter by C. Melas president of the Athens Spiritualist Alliance, Greece. Mr. Wakeling says that Mr. Melas is a personal friend of the King and Queen of Greece and that he was a commander during the late war.

Mr. Melas' letter reads:

"Eva was a medium"

"Sometime ago, the president of the S. P. R. of Greece, broadcast a message to the soldiers that there are no proofs that man lives beyond the grave and that intercommunication between the two worlds was a fallacy and that Spiritualist were the tools of a man-existent Satan. As I fortunately have some standing in our country, I asked the Athens Radio Station to broadcast an article of mine to the soldiers in which I stated the fact that for 50 years, I had been a complete agnostic, but had recovered my faith,— thanks to Spiritualism.

A Thousand Proofs

"I stated we had had thousands of proofs collected through the years by men of science. This was received and broadcast. I then was asked to give a lecture on Spiritualism and the proof of survival to the

These strange dreams and visions which have come to me over a period of nearly half a century, are always a source of wonderment. There have been those which raised my faculties to the state of ecstatic exaltation,—sometimes for a week or more.—and then there are those which are dark and foreboding.

I have come to see that life is like that,—here and now,—and also beyond the veil which separates the carnate humanity from the discarnate. This week we may be telling ourselves that we “are in the seventh heaven.” Perhaps we have received extra good news regarding our chief interests. Next week we may be under a great pall of dismal forebodings. Perhaps some adverse news has come to us. The radiant skies of a few days previously have given way to an overcast outlook. And life is like that upon this planet of ours.

“Out of the Blue”

I have heard some individuals express a great desire to obtain clairvoyant or clairsentient faculties. All too many times such persons do not comprehend the magnitude of their requests. It requires much inner stability to cope with the revelations of these spiritual faculties.

I labored for some years under the same delusions. The first dreams and visions were those of beauty and adoration. They came “out of the blue,” as it were, unsolicited and without premonition.

I soon realized, however, that this type of reception was negative and uncontrolled. What I most desired was a positive and volitional functioning. In time I came to possess this. Not completely so,—seldom does one ever come under the sway of the volitional reception.

My Premonitions

For example, one afternoon between four and five o'clock I lay on a cot recuperating from considerable physical fatigue. My mind was occupied largely with considerations of the immediate jobs at hand

tance. My younger brother's face appeared upon my inner screen. Along with the vision of him was a message: “he will die in Mexico. Far from his people.”

He was in Mexico City at the time of my premonition. He did not die there. He returned some months later to the United States. Was the angelic warning wrong? Not at all. One must develop a keen sense of discrimination of intuitional judgment, to correctly read the answers to the problems which are submitted.

Psychic Significance

It was subsequently revealed that my brother was desperately ill at the moment of the reception by me of the message. He thought he was going to die. Many times he and I have demonstrated our close rapport to one another.

At that moment he was thinking of me and I was receiving his thoughts. It seemed to him he could not survive the second siege of yellow jaundice. It was a thin hair that separated him from death. He had already accepted it as inevitable, and that is the way I received his message.

In the Bible there are mention of persons dreaming “a true dream.” Down thru the centuries there has been an acknowledgement of differentiation between dreams of digestive disturbance and those of psychic significance.

In my teen age years I began to set a standard by which to judge the merits of dreams. When they are shot thru with colors,—especially rainbow arrangements,—or when they are especially vivid, they are apt to be very significant.

The prophetic dream will impinge itself upon the consciousness for hours, days, or weeks following its inception.

Between the first and second World Wars, I saw one of America's greatest cities desolated. Its skyscrapers were bent and twisted. The great steel sheathed spires that had reared themselves proudly into the skies were all crumpled and in a shambles. At the time I seemed to discern that, this was to come about by a natural catastrophe. I envisioned an earthquake or tornado as the cause. But neither occurred.

Mental Impulses?

During the crisis of the war, it seemed the devastation would come on that account. It subsequently was revealed that some German minds were very intent on a plan to demolish the city in question. Was I receiving their mental impulses? To some extent yes. But the war has been ended for some years now and a cloud still hovers over that huge city. It is so ominous that had I friends or relatives there

I should exert every effort to have them go elsewhere for the next several years.

It is very difficult to link prophecy to man-made time. Prophecy is correctly recorded in terms of events and has very little connection with years, months and days. A moment, or a million years are the same to God. Measured time is solely a concept of the mortal mind. It has little bearing upon the Divine Plan.

The Infallible Test

The innocent child greets the sunshine shortly after it fell into deep slumber on the night previous. The adult insomniac watches the hour creep slowly by, wondering if the daylight will ever come. They are both enfolded by the same impersonal night.

The most infallible test for a true dream is the ecstasy. If one is raised into a state of ecstasy for hours, or days, following the receipt of such a dream, he, or she, may rest assured its source is not just gastronomic disturbance.

During the darkness which separated the third and fourth of October, 1943, I had a very vivid dream. A huge map of the state of California appeared before me. From the Mexican boundary on the south, to a point about where I resided,

the area was all blacked out. For another eighty miles to the north was a shaded belt. Beyond that the terrain appeared to be normal.

The original dream haunted me for days following its receipt. The blackness indicated a great devastation. I submitted the problem to that source which I have come to designate the "Intelligence." There seemed to be something of violence involved in the desolation, covered by this blackness. When I "tuned in", searching for the solution there was always an indication of elemental violence. There seemed to be winds blowing—with great force.

What I Beheld

The sequels came in broad daylight. Within a few weeks after the receipt of the original dream, there came to vision flashes. In each I beheld several men. They seemed to be

to our lives. Some years ago I became an assistant to the librarian in one of the CCC camps our government was operating. He had been educated for the ministry of the Episcopal faith. He had also done much work for the Catholic Church. But by inherent nature and intelligence he reached far beyond the confines of any one creed or faith.

This man had had some remarkable experiences. For some years he had lived at Palo Alto, California. Over a period of two years, each Friday afternoon an Indian chief came to him, bringing some message from beyond the veil.

On one occasion the guide was very agitated. He insisted that someone had been slain and indicated a culvert a mile or so distant, where the body of the victim would be found. My friend contacted the authorities and an investigation was made. At the place indicat-

ed, the body of an itinerant was found. The motive for his murder was not immediately known.

From this man who had fathomed much of life and its living I learned some valuable lessons. It was he who called to my attention the indication of the presence of the Masters. Each carries with him his distinguishing fragrance.

In subsequent years I was able to determine that, not only Masters, but anyone who has progressed well upon the path of achievement and higher perception, is able to make their presence known by the projection of perfume.

Once, when I was engaged upon a construction project each morning within a few minutes of nine o'clock, a wondrous fragrance as of lovely flowers, came upon the breeze. The region was an arid one; the season late summer, when practically nothing was in bloom. Yet, morning after

morning, that ecstatic fragrance filled my nostrils. It lingered a few moments then was gone. As is my method, I put the query as to the reason for this, to an Intelligence far greater than my own. And I beheld the beautiful soul who was projecting this essence about me. It was that of an aunt. She and I had found a soul affinity for many years in the past. In many respects we "saw thru the same eyes."

Why They Need Rest

This was her method of coming to me to cheer the inner man thru the trials of physical fatigue bordering upon the limits of natural endurance. She had passed beyond the veil some months previously. Knowing the procedure, I had not attempted to make contact with her for several months after her departure. Most newly incarnate ones need several months for rest and adjustment.

When this period was ended she came to me, radiant in her rejuvenation, announced by the fragrance of wondrous flowers. There was a message too, in her coming. She said "Love everyone and everything." For years, before her passing, she had practiced just that. And that is probably the simplest key to spiritual promotion upon this earth. It sounds much like the "last commandment."

Description Difficult

The reception of "true dreams" and visions necessitates a strength to bear their trials and accept their joys. The beautiful ones raise us above the commonplace of our every day existence. The joy of the exaltation is beyond the bounds of our mundane powers of description. There is a vast disparity between the glimpses of Divine glory and the mediocrity of life about us, as men have made it.

Many a sensitive soul has

archeologists,—wandering across the terrain conducting a search. The area involved seemed to be that thru which the great aqueduct from Lake Mead enters southern California.

I heard the explorers remark that "this was a wonderful people, who lived here." They remarked about the steel tower lines which had carried the electricity for hundreds of miles to the great cities,—and about the great aqueduct which had supplied the water to the populace of the area.

Verity of Dreams

In this I discerned that something had befallen the southern portion of my native state which had made it uninhabitable for a considerable length of time. This pointed to atomic attack. The years alone will testify to the verity of this dream and sequel visions.

Strange too, is the manner in which our teachers come in-

fallen into the chasm and been lost to usefulness in the world. By the measurements of mankind, he, or she, is a failure. But God knows differently. God sees His child as it aspires to be; man judges the individual as he, or she, appears to be. And what is more deceptive than appearances?

About the Fundamentalist

I agree with the late Brown Landone, there is nothing more misleading; there is nothing more deceptive than these psychical senses of ours. Alas, how far afield; how far from fundamental truth; is the fundamentalist who relies solely upon these senses for his guidance.

Recounting my friend's experience with the Indian guide reminds me of my own. It was not one but twelve chiefs that came, on a certain night, more than ten years ago.

In the mountains, near Santa Barbara, California, is a phenomenon known as Painted Cave. On a ceiling of a natural grotto in the huge sand stone boulders are pictures in red, black and white colors. They were placed there by unknown people.

The Indians inhabiting the area when the first Spanish Padres arrived know nothing of the significance of these pictures. The same can be said of their knowledge of the people who put them there.

Indian vs. White Man

It was something like twelve years ago that I first looked upon these paintings. Though they have been there for many decades, perhaps for many centuries, they are bright and well defined. I was quite awed and deeply impressed by the reaction to my meditations upon these inscriptions.

I think it was during the week following that I had a very impressive dream. I was seated on the hillside directly in front of the cave which houses the paintings. There it slopes down at, perhaps a fifteen degree angle. I became aware that I sat at the high

point of a circle of human beings.

My companions were all Indians. There were twelve of them; six on my right and six on my left. My position in the gathering,—at the apex of the high point in the circle indicated the prestige delegated to me.

My dark-skinned brothers recited to me the list of the injustices they had suffered at the hands of the white man. They were very earnest,—dignified and impressive. They wished me to champion their cause before my fellow beings; the white men.

At the earliest opportunity I returned to the Cave area. In the late evening hours I sat in the same position I had occupied during the dream. I could not "tune in" with any of the spirit entities I had seen in the dream. Just as I seemed to be dozing off, in a sort of semi-coma,—I heard the sound of soft padding feet behind me.

Spirals of Radiance

Some one of Nature's children had been coming down the steeply descending trail, upon which I sat,—had noted the intruder there,—and as speedily retreated. Probably a fox, a raccoon or a lion.

It was during the presidency of Theodore Roosevelt that I beheld,—one afternoon about four-o'clock,—two huge transparent spheres in the evening sky. They were at an elevation of thirty or thirty-five degrees,

to the south-east of me. Like the dimension of the moon, they could have been almost any size. My judgement was that they were about twenty-five feet in diameter. They appeared to be about a mile distant, suspended in space.

To understand their interpretation we must digress to explain the stress of the times in which they appeared. The nation was in the throes of one of its worst financial depressions. There were many unemployed. In an adjacent area these had formed themselves into a rough organization. They were marching down one of the great interior valleys of California, demanding redress for the conditions confronting them. My mind had been saturated for some days by articles in various newspapers, espousing, or condemning, the motives of these men.

The two transparencies appearing in the sky were permeated with spirals of rainbow radiance. They were huge replicas of the glass marbles that children play with. As I contemplated them with meditative interrogation I became aware of a white cloud-mist forming on my left. Something within me informed me that the Christ was in the heart of it.

I had always wanted to behold the Christ. That was a fundamental desire of my lifetime. So I looked immediately there, to my left, toward that luminous, wondrous white

cloud. Alas, I could not hear it. Clearly I could see the mist-cloud,—but the being in its midst,—I could not tolerate it. It seemed to combine the soft glow of the moonlight with a brilliance like that of the noon day sun.

Who Is to Say?

But even as I gazed,—aware of my incompetence, an arm was extended beyond the periphery of the mist. It pointed to the spheres in the sky. A voice said: "You see, they are both the same. One represents the souls of the mass of humanity; the other of these men who march here. You see, they are exactly alike."

The mist-cloud and the spheres faded away. But something of their presence has remained with me down thru the years. Fundamentally, the souls of men are alike. I cannot look to any group or nationality and say: "these are all good people," or to another and say: "these are all wicked."

A spark of the Divine is in each individual upon this earth. A portion of God's purpose is being worked out by each nationality. Had I the power to speak with all of earth's peoples, I should carry to them two messages.

Firstly, "fear no evil. There is nothing more awesome than death, and death is the most glorious of Life's adventures." Secondly: "All men are broth-

There was no effort involved. Desire was all the motive power necessary. When we have cast off the dense physical body, the remainder of our ego assembly can move almost instantaneously anywhere we wish to go. The astral light illuminates everything.

Being but a child,—I was five then,—I did not desire to go elsewhere than over the same areas in which I had played during the hours of wakefulness. I knew no other world. So by night I frequently sailed above the scenes of my daily activities.

Song From Heaven

No wonder there were, quite obviously, tears in the eyes of the Rev. Mitzie Monroe as she started to speak one night last June before the annual convention of the California State Spiritualists Association in Los Angeles.

She had reason to be deeply affected, says James Crenshaw who is the author of this report. The song that had just been presented on the program, for which she was principal speaker, was one which had come through her own mediumship.

Furthermore, it had been composed by her own son in the spirit world, Sandy Monroe. That was a thrill, indeed!

The story of the song is rich in its implications of the beauty and harmony which a healthy communion between mortal and spirit can engender. It is also an inspiring commentary on the sincerity of purpose, apart from mere evidential demonstrations, which mark the work of leading mediums throughout the country.

For in going to all of the work and expense of having the song transcribed, arranged and printed, Mitzie Monroe was not trying to prove anything more than earnest desire to reproduce it so that others might hear what to her must truly be a "song from heaven."

The setting for the story is the First Temple of Spiritualism in Oakland, California, where Rev. Monroe is the minister. There was more than the usual atmosphere of expectancy, because this was to be a "children's night." On such nights, as a part of the regular lecture period, as many as 30 children with widely differing voices and personalities speak through Rev. Monroe's trance mediumship.

On this occasion, those pres-

ent first heard Harriett, Rev. Monroe's daughter in spirit, who has been her control for 20 years, and then another daughter, Flossie, who introduced some 15 children. These in turn identified themselves and talked with those for whom they came.

There was one mother present who seemed to need more than the usual amount of encouragement. For her, Flossie promised a song and then presented the woman's own daughter to sing it.

These are the words as preserved on a wire recorder that night:

Don't let the blues live in your heart today;
Don't let the sunbeams shine so far away.
And if you can, just think about the things
That mem'ry lends and brings to make you smile.

I'm happy when I'm in your heart;
I know, my love, we'll never part.
For you and me there is no blue to be:

For we're together in the sunshine, Dear.

"loaned" for the occasion to the particular singer, whose mother needed the uplifting words. Afterward Sandy, using his own mother's lips, spoke and made known that he was the author-composer of

"Together in the Sunshine," as the number had been titled.

Later, the wire was played over and over for Lee Victor, a professional arranger, who finally transposed it and arranged it in the key of C, most suitable for the average voice.

Strangely enough, as it was to turn out, the original was sung in the little used key of G flat (six flats), which is much too high for the ordinary vocalist. Yet when plans were made (at the suggestion of President Harold P. Courtney of the State Association, after he had heard the song in San Francisco) for the number to be presented at the convention, it was found advisable to retranspose it back from the key of C to G flat.

There was a good reason for this: Miss Gordone De Lagniel, musical director of the convention, arranged for a talented young singer, Miss Irene Cummings, to do the number, and Miss Cummings' voice is particularly well adapted to the key of G flat.

Says Mrs. Monroe: "The wonder of it all is — didn't Sandy know from the beginning how the song was to be introduced and which key would be suitable to the young lady who sang it?"

About 20 more of Sandy's songs have been recorded on wire, and Mrs. Monroe and her husband, Milton Monroe, art director of the San Francisco Chronicle, hope that these, too, can in time be published.

Rev. Mitzie Monroe has served as an officer of the California State Spiritualists Association for 11 years, having just finished a term as second vice president. She declined nomination this year to devote more time to spiritual unfoldment and teaching.

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Will a Light Flashed on a Medium Cause Death?

I have been a trance medium since the First World War and have conducted seances in both dark and light rooms without harm to me until June of this year.

It all happened when I had a group of thirteen people sitting in half circle in the liv-

ing room. I stood in the archway facing them, my husband near me but in the dining room. My daughter was about six feet from me at one end of the circle of people. I was taken in trance as usual to the music of a religious record. All present agreed on what followed.

First, there was a lecture by one of the teachers. This was followed by the control giving independent messages to each. One guide began at the left side and after about six had accepted their messages, another control took over and gave the others a message. He then asked if there were two who had not been reached.

My daughter replied: "Yes" and he, my guide, told her he saw six spirits back of her and then spoke to another person. At this point, a voice said the vibrations were low and my husband noted the room was darker than usual due to the fact that the light remains with us here until 9 p.m. Mr. Johnson had not turned the usual table light on before the seance started and so slipped into a closet far back of me and just as he turned on a dim ceiling light, a lady near the table became excited and pulled on the table light. It was then that a voice cried out, quite independent of my throat: "That should not have happened!"

I was then already falling but my daughter caught and

held me. I knew nothing but instead of coming back naturally, as I would had it not been for the sudden light on my face, my heart ceased beating. I am told it did not beat for perhaps more than a minute.

As I became conscious, there was a quick jerking in my solar plexus. No pain. I was placed on a low seat with wet cloths on my face and soon hot coffee was given me which I could only swallow in small amounts.

I was numb in several parts of my body and could scarcely speak, could not even walk or even stand alone for hours

after my heart began to beat again. A lady, who has trained for nursing, said the pulse was very weak and slow when she at last could count it.

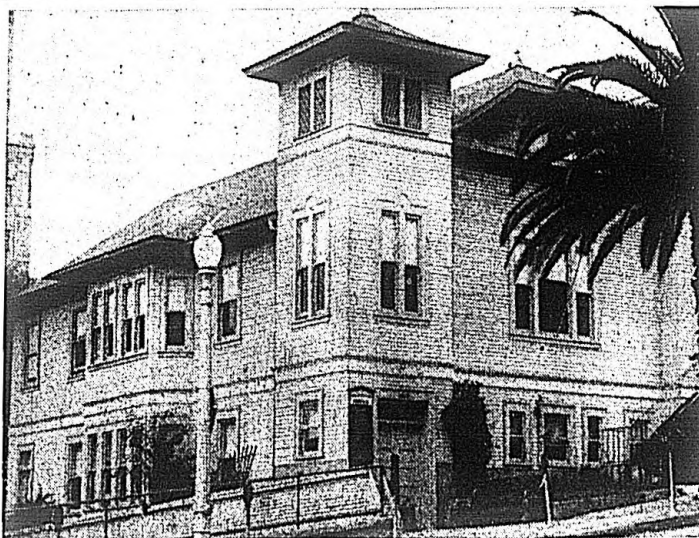

The First Spiritualist Church was granted a charter by the State of California on July 1st, 1885. It was incorporated as "The First Spiritual Society," that name being changed in 1930 to First Spiritualist Church. The founders met in the old Lafayette Hall until 1903 when the present building was constructed.

The property on which the church is built was originally donated by Captain George Fellows who sailed into San Diego harbor in the old days and became interested in Spiritualism. The work on the building was entirely donated by other church people of the city, including Baptists and Catholics. The seats in the auditorium were donated by the Y.M.C.A.

Moses Hull dedicated the church June 10th, 1903 and conducted the first nine services in the new building. He was assisted by Dr. James M. Peebles and Col. James Dryden.

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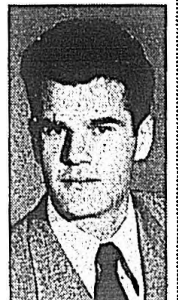

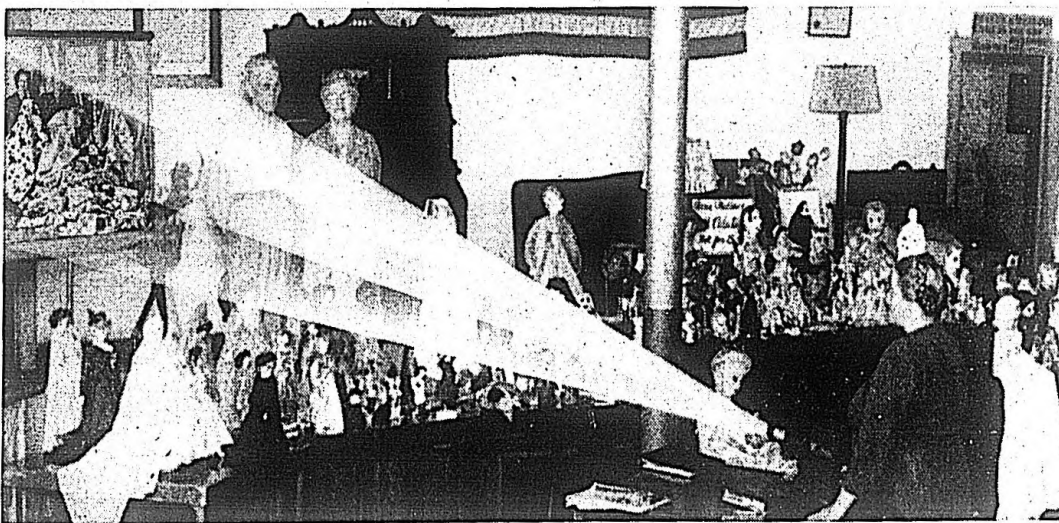
