It is with extreme interest that Psychic Observer presents the following descriptive study of a verbal term called "Nengraphy." The ensuing article is derived from a paper written some time ago by the great, and late Dr. Tomokichi Fukurai (1869-1952), a noted and famous Japanese psychologist.—(Ed. Note)

PR. FUKURAI discovered the theory of "thoughtography" in 1910, and subsequently carried out with extreme care and diligence, more than a hundred experiments for the research of this phenomena . . which he later termed "Nengraphy."

What It Is

Mrs. Ada Emma Deane first received Spirit "extras" on her exposed photographic plates in 1920 and for the next decade and a half continued to do so. She was considered responsible for hundreds of permanent records of loved ones for families over the world.

It was in 1922 that Mrs. Deane actually made recognized psychic history. Then it was that she conducted a series of tests showing Spirit extras appearing on color plates! This, as the reader is undoubtedly aware, was many years before color film had left the laboratory stage, and was the unknown for common photographic usage as we experience it today! On her colored plates loved ones who had passed on appeared in natural colors, refuting in advance any attempt at scoffing.

Doctor's Test

A thrilling result was effected through the chance presence in England of an American medic, Dr. Allertôn Cushman, a widely-known and highly respected medical man who, at the time, was director of the National Laboratories in Washington, D. C.

Concentration Power

Concentration Power

To the editorial staff here the term "Nengraphy" came to mean use of one's power of concentration, which ultimately impressed itself upon the sensitive emulsion of a photographic plate. One thus, actually "writes" . . through thought power, or psychic effort, on the plate in question.

An interesting note here is that all of Dr. Fukurai's experiments were conducted under the most meticulous and guarded of conditions. The plates were offered for placement, often miles apart, by Fukurai alone. A medium, known as Mr. Mita, "nenned" to act upon the plate at a distant place far beyond (often miles) Fukurai's hand, and after the psychic work, the nengraphy, was completed, Dr. Fukurai directly developed the plates without assistance from any other person.

Thus:—if a nengraph is produced in this careful manner at a seance, sometimes the same picture is obtained and produced repeated at later seances!


In such cases, the nengraph produced at the first seance is termed "original" and those produced at later seances are termed "duplicates." According to the duplicates." According to the duplicate on the seance are termed to the seance of the same idea can be verified, which is the main conclusion of this article.

1931 Experiment

Regarding an original experiment conducted at 8:30 A. M. on June 24, 1931, Fukurai writes, "At this time I placed two sensitive plates, piled up and packed in a pasteboard box, in the upstairs room of my house in Mino village, Osaka prefecture.

On the other hand, and at the same time, Mr. Mita the medium, in his house at Suma, Hyogo prefecture, twenty miles from my house, tranced to observe the back side of the moon and to "nen" its form upon the two plates in my house, and a close and trusted friend of mine, Mr. Kawada, watched the behavior of the medium during the work.

It is of course to be readily admitted, in light of today's science, that it is difficult to determine whether or not the pictures depict the back side of the moon as it really appears.

pears.
"In spite of such a matter, however, the "nengraph" itself can be affirmed as a real fact. This result, obtained from the experiment, was repeatedly produced in a following "duplicate" experiment conducted the night of November 12, 1933, in the auditorium at Gifucity.

"A notable result of this latter experiment is that the "nengraph" (in the Auditorium) of the back side of the moon appeared to be an exact duplicate of the original experiment."

Another Experiment

In another experiment, Dr. Fu-kurai conducted, a photograph of Mr. Makino was registered in the same manner as the experiment just described.

just described.

Dr. Fukurai writes, "The original experiment was conducted the morning of October 2, 1930, at the house of Mrs. Makino in Tokyo. Exactly the same portrait of Mr. Makino was impressed on three plates in a package containing a dozen plates. The duplicate package was acted upon during the afternoon of March 29, 1931, at the same residence. Six duplicate pictures were produced in this experiment!"

"As soon as the promised time was over, I developed the plates | 1917! This was divided into three

component efforts and some of the nengraphs produced in this case were synthetically duplicated in a later experiment in 1932! All the nengraphs and detailed records of these experiments are presently preserved in my collection, "care of Mrs. Tatsu Fukurai, 70 Higashi-6-Bancho, Sendai City, Japan)."

Fukurai's Conclusion

Fukurai's Conclusion

Based on the experiments above described, several new theories of psychic science may be induced and inferred. Exclusive of other problems, Dr. Fukurai affirms an important conclusion. That is, acording to the duplicate nengraphy of the same picture, it is considered that a nen of a definite idea is a vital being, which, once appeared to produce a nengraph at a seance, continues to exist for a considerable length of time and acts to produce repeatedly the exact and same nengraph pictures as before, at later seances.

Far from redundant, it is of high interest to Spiritualists over the world to know the background of the famed Dr. Fukurai. He was president of the Psychical Institute of Japan, professor of Kohyassan University, former professor at the Imperial University of Tokyo. He was obliged to resign owing to the book which he published in 1913 on his experiments with Miss Chizuko Mifune and Mrs. Kuko Nagao, declaring clairvoyance to be a fact. With Mrs. Nagao, Dr. Fukurai also conducted very interesting experiments in thought photography, described in the above story. Other mediums with whom he experimented were Miss Tetsuko Moritake, Mrs. Sadako Takahashi, Mrs. Tenshin Takeuchi and Kohichi Mita.—His results were embodied in a volume, translated into English in 1921, under the title "Clairvoyance and Thoughtography."

Cleric-Writer Says Vital Theological Questions Aren't Being Answered

MANY questions in the Chris-MANY questions in the Christian doctrine are unanswered by the clergy and professors of theology. Evasion and hedging constitute the attitude of every evangelist who preaches about the tenets of his religion and the dogmatic affirmations concerning Jesus Christ which are given forth by the Christian Church — Catholic and Protestant.

The theme of personal salvation.

The theme of personal salvation being the central foundation of a faith in the teachings of the Man of Nazareth, let us examine a few of the points which conern it.

'Insurance'

All spiritual philosophy is a sort of 'spiritual insurance'. It is critically so with the 'Gospel of Salvation'. Every converted sinner becomes so because he wishes to be safe in the Kingdom of God. He hopes that his faith and creed will enable him to safely pass by that old gentleman of the splithoof and horns—The Devil—and transgressions. His evil past is completely blotted out and atoned for by his acceptance of the blood of Christ who was betrayed and taken by sinners and unbelievers and crucified upon the cross of Calvary. Calvary.

So, a spiritual life insurance becomes the selfish aim of every Christian. It is emphasized by the Christian Church that faith, and faith alone, is to be the purchasing ticket to this salvation. Under the blanket of faith is given the guarantee and advocacy of the Pope himself!

sin, are condemned and damned. Their lot is one with evil spirits and the denizens of hell itself.

This is putting it very bluntly, but if you hedge the Parson and demand a statement, he will be constrained to affirm that this is so.

The Unitarians, who are refused to stand within the ranks of the Evangelical Faith—used to publish a pamphlet called "Good Men in Hell. This cited many of the world's reformers and spiritual personages, who, because of their freethought leaning stamped them as condemned by the Christian Church. This is worse than visiting the sins of the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generations.

But how was the death of Jesus Christ to affect or alter the case? Did God thirst for blood? If so, would it not have been better to have crucified Adam upon the forbidden tree, and make a new man? Why do not the Christians, to be consistent, make saints of Judas and Pontius Pilate, for they were the persons who accomplished the act of salvation. World-Wide Healing Service Some Would Try Electronic Path To See Unknown

PROBABLY little noticed and as little read was a story fed to the nation's papers a recent night by one of the major

as little read was a story fed to the nation's papers a recent night by one of the major services.

This four or five paragraph story dealt with the desires of some men of advanced thought, who, given time, feel they might peer around the corner into the fourth dimension. Being realists as far as machinery goes, they insisted that they "just might."

What these creators of mechanical brains (electric computors), wish to do is to make an electronic brain that will actually be able to "see" around the corner of the unknown, as they term it. They believe that should this be done in this way, man will be able to "see" what is ahead, whether it be in weather, stocks, his own personal affairs or what have you.

This does nothing much but sound like a dream of tomorrow, but it does show that the more scientific a man's work, the more he wonders about the unknown. It is very likely that some day, some how, man will be able to peer around the corner of the unseen in a mechanical sort of way, but psychic research still remains the best and most effective means of peering around the corner of the fourth dimention.

telligence. They grow big and powerful according to the times—they wax and wane. Once the Religion of Rome constituted all the myths and gods, some borrowed from Greece, to which men superstitiously bowed down in splict worship. superstitiously abject worship.

Jesus severely rebuked the Hebrew church of His day and called its leaders "hypocrites and generations of vipers." No more enraging pronouncement against a church and its followers could possibly be made!

Out of the tangle of theological dogmas comes the supposition that Jesus Christ was God, and that Hemust be considered the Savior of the world because He was sacrificed on the cross at Calvary; that God Himself died there to redeem lost sinners. As I read the Gospels, Jesus meant only that the following of His teachings (preachments) would redeem a man from his sins. He said "Whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." Jesus knew that the Divine law of cause and effect could not be thwarted. If a man was evil, he remained evil until such time as he himself chose to reform and evolve into a state of righteousness.

Trinity Evolves

The Doctrine of the Trinity was not known, nor discussed, nor adopted until about the middle of the fourth century. Professor Smith, in his "Man and His Gods" (page 221) tells us:

(page 221) tells us:

"The main struggle for the unification of belief (the Trinity), necessarily concerned the fundamental nature of the godhead. Every attempt to establish that Jesus and Jehovah were one, the latter having descended into the Virgin in order to be born, then only to die on the cross was vigorously condemned. They expressed the conviction that Jehovah could not appear substantially on earth and consequently could not become a person in Jesus."

rould not become a person in Jesus."

Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, became the law of the church only after much argument and debate, and some bloodshed. Evidently Jesus in His time had never thought of such a thing as being considered God.

He did say that He 'came down from the Father.' But such a statement in no way implied that He was the Father. He prayed on the cross, "My God, why hast thou forsaken me," and He further said "Into Thy hands I commend my spirit." In the Garden of Gethsamane He several times addresses Himself to God, saying "My Father." When the young man came to Him, as recorded in Matthew, and said "Good master," Jesus rebuked him, saying "Why callest thou me good? There is none good but God." These statements of Jesus cannot possibly be consistently working into any declaration of Father, Son, and Holy Ghost.

How often one meets a man who is in doubt about a certain thing. You refer him to certain facts which are beyond all doubt, and which show that his own doubt is entirely without foundation. Yet, years after you may find this man entertaining exactly the same doubt, not having paid the slightest attention to the facts you brought to his notice. That is the kind of thing to which Ruskin refers. And such hobby-horse thinking does untold damage to the brain for it uses up its energies to no purpose, causing the brain to become stunted and devoid of elasticity. It is at our peril that we continue to indulge in that form of thinking which is aimless and purposeless, and which never arrives at a definite conclusion.

Let us then be determined to "make up our minds," to investigate with due care, to examine with due reverence, and then to come to a conclusion and to register our verdict.

Reaching for his English-German dictionary, Ballbusch slipped a piece of paper between two pages. To make sure the effort wasn't wasted, ne sat on the book! This brought out a chuckle of amusement from the communicator, who remarked that this was certainly a peculiar way in which to guard a secret.

Then, the communicator carefully and distinctly, the first word on the top left page and the first word on the top right page. Ballbusch checked and sure enough, the words matched!

Second Test

In spite of this, Ballbusch was not satisfied. Perhaps subconsciously he had glanced into the dictionary thus enabling the communicator to read the words from his mind.

He proposed to repeat the experiment. This time he would open the dictionary behind his back and slip the paper between the pages. In this way, there would be no chance of Ballbusch glancing into the opened book.

Talks With Great Composers

THE above, of course, is the title of Arthur M. Abell's new book (Philosophical Library, New York \$2.75), on which "Two Worlds" has another interesting article.

Richard Strauss said that, when spired, he had "definite compel-Richard Strauss said that, when inspired, he had "definite compelling visions," being convinced that they emanated from a higher source. The ability to register such ideas, in his view, was a divine gift, a mandate from God, a charge entrusted, a man's highest duty being to make the most of this gift.

a charge entrusted, a man's highest duty being to make the most of this gift.

With that, I think, we can all agree, and, in fact, go further, and generalize on Strauss' conception.

Accepting, as I think we all do, that we all originate from the same Our Source, this must apply also to all our 'gifts' and faculties. Hence, not only is it our "highest" duty, but we might say it is the least we can do, to co-operate with the One Source, and, in Its service, make the most of every gift or faculty we have, every moment of our lives.

Commenting on the inspiration he received for "Rosenkavalier" and for "Elektra," so entirely different in motives, themes, melodies, harmonies and instrumentation, Strauss said that it seemed that "I was dictated to by two wholly different omnipotent entities." While composing these two operas, he said he was "definitely conscious of being aided by a more than earthly power, and it was responsive to my determined suggestions." The, ability to tap this force, he considered, was the main consideration in this world.

Puccini also said that geniuses possessed the power to appropriate the beauty, wealth, grandeur and sublimity within their own souls, which were part of Omnipotence, and to communicate these riches to others, the supreme secret being the conscious appropriations of one's own soul-forces. In other words, to "express what you are."

He said that the music of Madam Butterfly was "dictated to me by God." Abell makes the good point that, to enable a man to make practical use of, that is, to communicate to others, what comes to him by inspiration, he must do his part, which is to acquire technical mastery of his craft. He must not expect the Source to do everything, or "God" to do for man what man can quite well do for himself. That is a principle that is often forgotten, and seems to be a variant of the lazy attitude: "Let George do it!"

Puccini considered Toscanini's interpretations "miracles," and his unrivaled memory a "cosmic manifestation," adding: "Toscanini is close to God when he is conducting."

BORDERLINE Sciences Review "BORDERLINE Sciences Review" prints notes of Moonlight, by J. S. Clever, who says that medical research, on a scale larger than ever before, will this year be undertaken, to study the influence of the moon on humans and plants, especially in the tropics.

Some scientists think it possible the full moon may affect the vital fluids in brain and spine cavities. French scientists have much evidence that most births occur when the moon is near the horizon.

In Assam, tea planters have learned by experience that leaf growth increases as the moon waxes, and that the heaviest leaf crop is gathered when the moon is full.

In a court case, a solicitor argued that his client was "ruled by the moon," saying that, when the moon was full, the man lost control of himself, was more quarrelsome, and did strange things.
