"Well doesn't that worry you?" asked the man.





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Organizations and More Organizations

For a Movement that has one main purpose-proof of survival of the individual after the change called death-it is sometimes difficult to understand why Spiritualists have so many organizations. But then, again, giving more careful consideration to the matter, probably it isn't so difficult to understand

Scanning the by-laws of several of the Spiritualist organizations, the main differences seem to stem from a matter of terminology and approach, but basically they all agree on the two precepts that make the religion breathe and live-"a belief in a Divine Intelligence" and "survival of the personality after death."

Organizations are good. They are needed. Just as each of us has different ideas about how a thing should be done, so do groups of peoples or churches have various ideas on how they would like to handle a situation. Also, freedom of expression for the individual is imperative or we revert to orthodoxy in its most stringent form.

HOWEVER, there is another matter to be considered. We live in an age of organization. And we must be realistic about it-the larger the organization, the more impact it carries. What is one voice crying out as compared to a thousand voices, as compared to a million voices, as compared to several million voices:

Herein lies a new avenue of approach for Spiritualism Herein lies a new avenue of approach for Spiritualism to be given the recognition it so rightly deserves. Keep our individual organizations, by all means have them function independently, but at the same time, some place along the line, we must have a central body that can speak for the millions of Spiritualists across the face of the globe. Somewhere, someone must be able to say: "We (meaning millions) feel this way . . ."

This month, two major conferences are being held, each with this purpose in mind—unity of a people who believe in the same principles. One is national and the other international.

national

To be sure, they will have many rough spots to transcend. As years pass, changes will be made within their functions making for a more effective, more cohesive force.

But now is the time for all Spiritualists, for all organiza-tions to give them their support. Now, while they are still young enough to accept changes, to be wielded into such a body that they will eventually grow into a Congress of all Spiritualists.

In Paris this month, Spiritualists from across the world will meet for the conclave of the International Spiritualist Federation whose purpose is "to foster a closer relationship between Spiritualist organizations as well as between individual Spiritualists in every country of the world."

In Denver, the second group, with a synonymous ideal, will hold their annual convention—the Federation of Spiritual Churches and Organizations.

We look forward to their growth, both spiritually and physically. With the right guidance and leadership, they can become for all of us the way to say "We stand united. We (the millions) feel this . . . "

The echo of these words which were uttered by Master Jesus when delivering to the multitude His Sermon of the Mount has been resounding during nineteen centuries and nowadays these words have become a part of the basic creed of many Spiritualists.

At large and as a code of ethics they are now known to us as the Golden Rule.

Undeniably the Golden Rule is one of the simplest and yet most effective form of guidance that men, collectively as well as individually, can follow if they wish to live peacefully with their neighbors.

For indeed it has been proven, time and time again, that violence, aggressiveness and encroaching upon the will of others has always been and always will be the root of all evil, that is to say, of all strife, disharmony and disunion.

The observance of both Rules would seem to strike the perfect balance and to reach the blessed harmony of the Buddhistic "Middle Road." Eliminating the negative aspect of outer passivity and the detrimental aspect of inner aggressiveness.

My Impressions of The New U. S. A.

"Flock To a Camp" should be the call, obligation and monition to every Spiritualist and all who attempt outfathom the intricacies involved in Spiritualism.
