The veil for him was lifted and he saw without the mist and glamor that clouded the eyes of those present. He listened to the sermon, and, having a keen sense of humor, he smiled as he thought how they were being de-

luded, for he could look down the dark vistas of the past, and step by step he could follow the life of the "dead."

"Pure in heart," the preacher said, but he could see the evil thoughts, the unclean deeds, the weeping of girls wronged. could see how the wife had become hardened, how her love had died when she found that he gave no appreciation, and he saw that the one who would have loved and almost worshipped him could not on account of deeds that the legal law sanctioned, but the moral law forbade.

Again the preacher's words sounded in his ear, "A kind and loving father is taken from his family." The unseen looked down the past and saw how, one by one, the children had become estranged; how their love had been lost because the father had not tried to become acquainted with them; how it had been unkind and harsh words instead of loving companionship, and now there was only the shock that death always occasions, and not sorrow that filled their hearts.

Proportional Representation

ALFRED CRIDGE,

At the Fourth Annual Convention of the California State Spiritualists' Association held in Odd Fellows' Hall in September, 1899, Mrs. Dr. Astor, Mr. M. S. Norton and myself were appointed a committee to investigate the Proportional Preferential system of voting, with a view to its adoption by the State Association.

Ever since Spiritualism began to acquire prominence, there have been systematic and bitter attempts to obstruct public mediums by prohibitory licenses. To be an open and prominent Spiritualist means to be tabooed from the possibility of being elected, or the probability of being appointed to any position. And this is a necessary outcome of our political system, under which a mere handful of voters can turn the scale one way or another. Under Proportional Representation it would not necessarily follow that Spiritualists could or would be elected, but the method would ensure the election of a broader type of manhood or womanhood.

As far back as 1854, I wrote in Brittons' Spiritual Telegraph (the first periodical devoted to that subject) an article setting forth the incompatibility of our industrial conditions for the phenomena proving intercourse between the present life and that "beyond the veil," by reason of our cares, perplexities and antagonisms disturbing the surface of the elements used to secure the communications, just as the breeze agitating the still lake disturbs the reflections of the trees, the rocks and the sky in the water. I advocated co-operation as a

remedy. In after years I investigated thoroughly every phase of what might be called "reform," or the methods and measures advocated to bring happiness to earth. It was not long before I discovered that these industrial methods which generate hatred, war, poverty, crime, insanity and disease were based upon a political system which, from base to summit, is organized crime. And it is therefore my desire to bring together the usually separated elements of progress—the material and the spiritual; to bring the psychic forces to aid material progress, peace and plenty in their turn supplying the bases for the growth of the spiritual in man, and thus enabling him to reach out, by community of spirit and purpose, those gone before, to the benefit of both. In no manner can this purpose be so aided as by the use of Spiritualists of Proportional Representation in their organizations.

For some years Spiritualism marched on with gigantic strides. But then it outgrew its base, like a tree which had exhausted the soil from which it grew, or that, by reason of rock or other impediments, it could no longer penetrate to the increasing depths required for its increasing height. Man is as a tree. To secure adequate growth of either, the roots must go deep down into the soil, that its branches may reach high into the

heavens. Let man's feet be firmly planted in material justice, as exemplified in Proportional Representation, and his head can reach high into the heavens of spirituality, and then we have all the conditions of the millenium, which is at our gates, if we only knew enough to take hold of it.

Proportional Representation is one of the live things of the world, which to ignore is to become dead. It may not show conspicuously in press news or on the exchange, but it is coming. Since the last session of the Spiritualists of this State, Proportional Representation on Dec. 30 became law in Belgium, and under it, on May 27, both Houses of the Legislature of that kingdom were elected, with the result of reducing the representation of the Catholic, or clerical party in the House from 112 to 85, while the 12 Liberals, or Radicals, have increased under it to 33, and the Socialists from 28 to 35. For half a century Belgium has been dominated by the Catholic party, with the result that the monasteries, the monks, the nuns, and the property owned by them have nearly tripled during that period, while illiteracy is increasing. They still retain a majority of 16, instead of 43; but their power will henceforth decline and Belgium's prosperity will correspondingly increase.

In Australia the subject is most vigorously agitated, the leading spirits being Mrs. Jeanne Young and Miss C. H. Spence, with whom I am in continuous correspondence. It is sure to succed there within

two years. In short, Proportional Representation is the most advanced thought of the world. Both as a Spiritualist and a citizen you are in duty bound to give it thorough investigation. I have simplified it down to where "common folks" can master it easily, and learn more political science in two hours than the universities can begin to teach in 40 years. My business is to make difficult things simple, as is that of Spiritualists; while that of the university professors and the orthodox clergy is to make simple

Unless competent organizers are equipped and maintained constantly in the field, next to nothing will be accomplished. There is no use saying "it can't be done," for it can and must be done.

Morals of Spiritualists.

At the Monday morning Methodist Ministers' Meeting on Aug. 20, Rev. W. M. Woodward said:

There is no standard of morals established by Spiritualists; no life of righteousness is required. The vilest debaucher may be as good a Spiritualist as the best moral man in the land. These facts not only prove the absolute unreliability of such methods of obtaining information from the other world, but also their moral instability.

It has been said that one of the chief requisites of a successful falsifier is a good memory. Brother Woodward forgets that the penitentiaries and reformatory institutions of this country are crowded with men and women who call themselves Christians and believe in the orthodox creeds; while Spiritualists are conspicuous by their absence. Not one person out of a million who believes in the philosophy of Modern Spiritualism belongs to the criminal class. The great teacher of Galilee, who Mr. Woodward ignorantly worships, once said: "By their fruits ye shall know them." We will accept the result of the test.

Noble Motives.

Too many people seek the development of mediumship, or unfoldment and culture along any line for selfish motives. To gratify ambition, to satisfy the longing for wealth and power, ought not to be the purpose of self-culture; but it should be a means to an end—that we may be of service to our fellow-man.

The system of ethics taught by Modern Spiritualism transcends the self-interest of the Golden Rule; for not only do we teach to "do unto others as we would have them do unto us," but, forgetting self, do all for others. For "He that loseth his life shall find it." Our standard of morals takes root in the constitution of the universe, and is evolved from the organic law of Being. To be impelled by noble motives in all the activities of life, makes for heaven; but to do right for fear of punishment or hope of reward, makes men slaves to selfishness and fear.

For 1900 years the Christian has been singing, shouting and praying for the blood to wash away his sins. The world has been holding the thought of blood for centuries.

If the new philosophy be true, that thought creates the thing thought of, then the present bloody rioting and savage wars are but the effect of a potent cause. We have had enough blood; it never washed away a sin, nor ever will. What the world needs is not blood, but a better quality of life in the indi-

vidual. Never mind about the blood of Jesus; but be careful of the quality of your own blood and its proper circulation, for "the blood is the life."

Proposed Amendments.

The following amendments to the constitution and by laws of the National Spiritualists' Association will be voted upon at the Eighth Annual Convention in Cleveland, Ohio, October 16 to 19 inclusive:

Article IX, substituting "Biennial" in place of "Annual Conventions," thus making the Convention meet every two years instead of annually.

Amend Constitution by adding: "Any good Spiritualist paying \$100 into the treasury of the National Spiritualists' Association shall be entitled to a life membership in the Association, with a right to vote in all of its business transactions."

Amend Constitution: "To allow honorary or lay members the privileges of delegates; also that provivisions be made for five-year members, with Convention privileges, for the sum of \$25."

Article XI, Section 2, of the bylaws, by inserting after 'local associations' the words, 'holding State charters.'

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LESSON 6-EXPRESSION.

You are now made conscious of a New Thing in the world; that is, yourself. The world has been waiting a long time for you—a Man. Wrestle as a true scientist with the problem. Realize that a part can only express part-ness, or separateness, and that it takes All human ideas arranged in orderly sequences to make the Humanity that you are becoming. You are not going to denounce and destroy the members or old ideas. On the contrary, you are to manifest a degree of beauty and harmony quite impossible to any one of the Thoughts which you have hitherto been express-

ing. This is your lesson to-day.
This is the Law of expression. Unity expresses thro'Unity. A concrete Idea must have a concrete form. Your mind is the form for the expression of you. I am inferring that you have it unified. This brings me to the thought of displacement referred to in last lesson. You perceive clearly that your mind is undergoing a process of removal of all entities, ideas or personifications of ideas tending to separateness, and necessarily of conjunction of particles working towards union.

The end will be a state of union, or union of states, wherein all the citizens, made conscious by obedience or acceptance of the one grand purpose, are made partakers of the joy of co-operating in the grand scheme of continuous being.

I am desirous that you should consider the words, "continuous being." Do you see the need of a continuous consciousness in order to make a continued existence? Do you see that your ideas about immortality are crude and all too selfconscious?

Do you see the immodest assurance with which you have made assertions about there being no death? Are you awake to the fact that the entire absence of consciousness of where you came from and who and what you are, is a positive guarantee that your unconsciousness shall continue, and that you shall not regain after laying off the body what you never had? Remember all these thoughts belong to the awakening Man and must be scientifically expressed by the Man. All the separate parts must give their story of where they came from, and then you have a connected or continuous knowledge of the original Home.

This is your problem now. Whence am 1? When you have entered into an intelligent knowledge of this; when you have demonstrated to yourself by the perfect consciousness of the impelling purpose what State you emerged from in the grand hierarchies within, you will naturally know with certainty whither you shall return. Do you see my meaning? It is not a question of return in the old sense. It is a question of orbit. It is a question of revolution in that orbit. Become conscious of your orbit. Do not remain subject to any mode of motion but your own. Do not remain a servant, but a Man—a Master. Let your Light so shine before men, etc. Your supreme duty to yourself, is to express yourself.
