A radiance from the realms of light Flashed for a moment on my sight; 'A still,small voice' came fluttering down; boring children, who, it was supposed, were the culprits. The matter was forgotten for the time being, but on looking over some books that had been kept in a locked trunk, Mrs. Hilleary was surprised and startled to see the same mutilation that had annoyed the family before. The books had not been cut with a knife, as the edges of the paper were rough, but the tear was even, as if the pages had been perforated.

The queer actions of the bookdestroying fiend were not confined to the house, but seemed to follow the members of the family. At one time Miss Mayme was visiting friends at Carbondale. While there she played a great deal on the piano and also read a book or two. After her return home her friends discovered that every sheet of music that Miss Hilleary had used, and also the books she had read, were mutilated in the same unaccountable manner that had proved so annoying at the home here. Interest of the family was immediately aroused, and a closer search made, and other words were discovered on the margins of leaves of several books, among the inscriptions being Bible references of Psalms xix., 11; Psalms xxxiii., 14; Luke, xxi., 21; Luke, xi., 43-44. All of these passages are warnings given to people of ancient times

The warning being given repeatedly to flee, Miss Mayme, the eldest daughter, wrote on a margin, "House or town?" closed the book, placed it in the book-case and locked the door. In a few minutes the book was removed to see, as Miss Hilleary 'laughingly said, "what had happened." To her surprise, the word "Town" appeared written beneath her question. Badly frightened, but determined to investigate further, the young lady wrote the question: "Should papa give up his position?" The answer, "No," was plainly visible a few moments later. These tests "Yes."

A reporter wrote the question: "Why should the family move?" but no answer appeared.

One of the books that had been used more than any other to ask written questions and receive the mysterious replies, was found to be literally torn to pieces, the margins being torn away completely, yet no trace of the missing parts could be found, nor was there a particle of litter about the locked book-case, or the room. In the family Bible was a slip of paper used as a book-mark, and on this slip of paper was found the words, "Proverbs, i., 23; xxviii., and xxx., 33."

The writings are not in pencil or ink, but are of a dim yellow appearance, and fade out entirely in about 24 hours.  $\langle$ 

The Hilleary family is very popular in Murphysboro society, and are members of the M. E. Church. George Hilleary is an engineer on the Mobile and Ohio Railroad, and is a 32nd degree Mason. Miss Mayme, the eldest daughter, who seems to be the especial object of the mysterious communications, is a beautiful brunette, with lustrous brown eyes, and is a general favorite. She is so worked up over the strange warnings that her parents fear nervous prostration will result.—Globe-Democrat.

Mysterious Warnings.

A story, which has stood the proof of every test, comes from Murphysboro, Ill., and the mystery grows deeper day by day. At first little attention was paid to the persistent rumors of the mysterious happenings at the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Hilleary, 2004 Elm St., the popular solution being that some practical joker was at work. That theory, however, has long been exploded, and people have exhausted every plausible explanation of the daily occurrences.

It all began some three years ago, when members of the family began to notice that newspapers and periodicals had been torn in a peculiar way, parts of pages in the middle of the book, or paper, having disappeared. This occurred so often that all books and papers were locked up as soon as used to keep them out of the way of neighMADAME FLORENCE MONTAGUE [See Page 2.]

These strange happenings have been going on for three years, and the family, though very much annoyed, had become accustomed to it, and said very little outside the family about the matter. They scoffed at the theories of Spiritualists that the work was being done by departed members of the family or friends, although they could offer no explanation in contradiction.

Of late, however, the manifestations have assumed a decidedly different form, and the family has really become alarmed. and Mr. Hilleary decided to lock up every book and magazine securely in the book-case. Ruby, their second daughter, was assisting him in collecting the books, and in one of them she noticed the words, "Beware—Hasten," written upon the margin of one of the torn leaves. were made with the other members of the family, together with a reporter, in the room, and all eyes were fastened on the book-case as the answers were eagerly awaited. The question was asked: "Who is writing?" and in answer came the letters "M. H." The family is convinced that the spirit is that of Mrs. Hilleary's mother, Mrs. Mary Holman, who died 13 years ago.

The following weird conversation was carried on in the same way in the presence of witnesses whose testimony is unimpeachable:

"Is the danger to the immediate family?"

"Yes; go."

"Would the family be safe in Carbondale or within 50 miles?" "No."

"Can the family safely defer moving for one month?" ing and closing the doors between. As the phantom passed the window in the second room, it was seen to turn half around and look out, giving to Mr. and Mrs. Thoroughgood a view of the face and figure. Then the chamber became dark and nothing more was seen of the mysterious visitant at that time. The house was examined by the couple, but the doors and windows were found to be bolted and barred, just as they had been left, and nothing had apparently been disturbed.—Ex.

### A Spirit's Confession.

An interesting story is told of a woman in Harlem who moved into a house which had been occupied for many years by a Mr. King.

She relates that she had no sooner crossed the threshold than she was accosted by a beautiful woman in a flowing gray robe, who begged permission to speak through her to her friends. Assent was given and the friends were named and invited to be present at a time agreed upon. When all were assembled they were directed by an invisible presence to kneel. This they did, when the spirit, through the mediumship of the woman, told the story of the tragedy.

The spirit, so she said, was the niece of the murderer, and she was an occupant of the house at the time the crime was committed. She discovered the blood stains on the door of the woodshed, and she told her uncle that she suspected he had murdered their guest, who had mysteriously disappeared. He secured her promise not to betray him, and he sought to destroy all evidences of the murder by hewing the telltale door into a thousand pieces. She had always kept the terrible secret. Although both had been dead for many years, they were chained to the scene of the crime, as was the governess, who had been the man's partner in guilt. A Tragic Dream.

### Mme. Florence Montague.

In Light, of London, England, of Aug. 18, 1900, we find the following concerning the public work of Mme. Florence Montague, who is well known on this Coast as well as in Europe.

During the past six months there has been in London a lady whose remarkable psychic powers have been employed with highly satisfactory results. Early in March last a select company assembled in the parlors of Mrs. Bell Lewis, at 99 Gower St., to meet Madame Montague, a psychic from California. No one at that meeting seemed to know who she was or what she could do, although it afterwards transpired that she was an accredited representative of the National Spiritualist Association of America and also of the California State Association. But before the meeting was over she had made many friends and won the hearts of her hearers by her personal qualities and charm of manner, and by her wonderful gifts of speech and psychic discernment.

The "mysteries of mediumship" are many, indeed, but one of the most striking is the diversity of the phases of psychic susceptibility which are displayed by sensitives. While there are remarkable resemblances, and along general lines, similarities, in the powers possessed by different mediums, yet no two are alike; all have their especial peculiarities, or aptitudes, and this is eminently true in the case of Madame Montague. She is a speaker and a seer, an able advocate, and a psychometrist of exceptional penetration and intuitive perception.

In listening to Madame Montague one cannot fail to be struck by the wonderful fulness and freedom of her speech, the richness of imagery, the aptness in illustration, the readiness in response to questions, the fertility and variety in methods of symbolical mind-picturing, and the clearness and lucidity of statement given with such charm and grace of manner, pose, gesture, intonation, and elocution, that eye, ear and mind are simultaneously appealed to, and interest and attention are aroused and enchained throughout. Evolution, mental science, philosophy, symbolism, theology, mediumship, so-\_cial questions, art, religion, physiology, physical science, psychic development, mythology, (colors, music, morals, human progressthese, and hosts of allied subjects, are involved in the questions propounded to her; yet the réplies which are given are such as indicate knowledge and comprehension on the part of the speaker, whoever it may be that inspires the utterances. In addition to the phenomenal powers that Madame Montague possesses as a speaker, she deals with personal questions, either written or unexpressed. Of course, the responses are mainly in general terms, which are well nigh incomprehensible to all but the inquirer, yet, to those seeking advice, guidance, or comfort, the answers are generally clear and appropriate. In giving psychometrical readings from articles handed up by the audience, Madame is, as a rule, successful in delineating the character and portraying the conditions and tendencies of the one to whom the object belongs, while at times her words are prophetic-her gift of insight being accompanied by that of fore-

sight, so that while expatiating upon the principal incidents of the past and present experiences of the subject of her spiritual analysis, she frequently gives warnings and suggestions, and pictures of probable happenings which it is well for the recipient to heed and remember.

Madame Montague may be regarded as a representative of the new school of mediums. She believes in her own responsibility as a woman and a medium and in the divine possibilities of her own spirit. Like one of old, she would magnify her office, and seeks to live for it, to fit herself to be the intelligent co-worker with—not the mere tool of-the spirit people who use her as their representative. By the earnest study of the conditions requisite for development of body, mind and psychic sense, she endeavors to meet the friends who inspire her, at least half way on theJacob's ladder of communion, and to enter into reciprocal and conscious fellowship with them on the thought plane, so that their inspirations may flow through her instrumentality to others freely, unobstructed by her personality, and yet without loss of consciousness upon her part.

She conducts a class for the development of mediumship along these lines, in which the members are expected to take an active part (not merely to sit, and sit, and let the spirits do all the work), and by systematic preparation and spiritual aspiration and cultivated receptivity prepare themselves to become lucid and capable instruments for the transmission of information and helpful influences from the other side.

Madame Montague also conducts a "circle" in which she is literally the center of attraction, for, seated upon a low chair with the sitters all around her, she yields to the influences which control her, and gives, as far as possible, something of personal interest to each one; description of spirit friend, message, advice, or helpful sympathy and encouragement. In all her work for human good it is but right to say that Madame is ably supported by her husband, who protects and assists her, and supplies that care and sympathy which such sensitives need to enable them to perform their arduous and trying duties. Spiritualists in London have undoubtedly been considerably benefited, and their numbers increased by the valuable services of Madame Montague, who has quietly gone on her way winning many friends, and at the same time serving the cause of Humanity and the Angels.

The following resolutions were reported by the committee // and adopted by the California State Convention in San Jose, Sept. 8, **1900**:

SAN JOSE, CAL., Sept. 8, 1900. The delegates to the fifth annal convention representing the Spiritualists of California, do hereby reaffirm our allegiance to the truths enunciated in the Declaration of Principles adopted by this association and incorporated in our book of By-Laws. We also endorse the statement of principles adopted by the National Association. Believing that a life of rectitude is conducive to the greatest happiness, we exhort our people to observe the highest possible standard of morality, and to study and practice the best system of ethics known to our civilization. A knowledge of the science of right living will be found an invaluable aid in the work of the spiritualization of the gross material conditions of this plane of being, a work in which all true Spiritualists are engaged. We regard man as a mental or spiritual being, and his mental attitudes as of paramount importance, as. our environments are largely the result of our habit of thought. It is our duty to guard well our thoughts, for "as a man thinketh, so is he."

The upward trend of the world's unfoldment is toward altruistic and fraternal co-operation, and away from selfishness and personal aggrandizement. All reformation must begin with the individual, but need not end there, and the present environment and economic conditions are but the reflection of the spiritual and moral character of collective humanity. The "way out" lies by way of spiritual education and the habit of thought and action.

Resolved, That every auxiliary society begin a missionary work among the children of this State by organizing Progressive Lyceums or Ethical Classes, that morality along the lines of integrity may be laid in youthful minds and a spiritual unfoldment prepared conducive ' to give them power to understand and unfold their psychic powers.

To the National Spiritualists' Association of the United States and Canada, in Eighth Annual Convention assembled. Greeting:

We, the California State Spiritualists' Association, assembled in annual convention in San Jose. California, this 8th day of September, 1900, having been officially notified of an intention to change the Constitution of the N.S.A. to the end that biennial, instead of annual conventions shall be held in future, we as an auxiliary society having the best interests of the Cause at heart, believing that all conventions, congresses and assemblies of Spiritualists are worth infinitely more to the Cause than their cost in money, labor or time, do hereby respectfully protest against such change; and in a fraternal spirit would suggest that the tendency of legislation having for its ultimate object the greatest good to the greatest number, should be in the direction of more frequent meetings, and more abundant opportunities for the assembling of the people together; that the cause of truth and justice may be advanced, and the sum of human knowledge be increased.

As there seems to be a want of information regarding some of the religions of the world, a comparison between two of the prominent faiths is proper. Buddhism is nearly  $1,0\bar{0}0$  years older than Christianity, has many more adherents, and also has the commendable record of never having persecuted. The following are the commandments of that faith :

1. Not to destroy life.

2. Not to obtain another's property by unjust means.

3. Not to indulge the passions, so as to invade the legal or natural rights of other men.

4. Not to tell lies.

5. Not to partake of anything intoxicating.

Buddha said : "A man who foolishly does me wrong (or regards me as being or doing wrong), I will return to him the protection of my ungrudging love; the more evil goes from him, the more good shall go from me; the fragrance of these good actions always redounding to me, the harm of the slanderer's words returning to him."

It will be noted that the above embrace substantially the same declarations as taught by Christ, and also forbid the use of intoxicants, which is all important. In his interview with the young man, Christ said, on being addressed as "Good Master": "Why callest thou me good? There is none good but one, God; but if thou wouldst enter into life, keep the Commandments." In Christ's reply to the questioning lawyer he referred him to the keeping of the law as sufficient to save. He also repudiated sacrifice—said "He came not to call the righteous, but sinners, to repentance—the whole need no physician."

It is evident that the inhibition of intoxicants by the Buddhistic and Mohammedan faiths has and is doing a vast good in the world, and it is to be regretted that the Judean prophet did not also prohibit intoxicating beverages. It was the dictum of an eminent scholar who spent a lifetime in investigating the religions of the world, that they all taught "Do good, avoid evil." Perhaps the most compact and comprehensive creed is, "Love the good fand be good." This would meet the commendation of the great religious teachers of all the ages and the eminent statesmen of the world, including Washington, Jefferson, Franklin, Grant and Lincoln. QUAKER.

#### Buddhism and Christianity. Transition of Mrs. Burgess.

Mrs. Elizabeth L. Burgess, wife of Wm. Burgess, well known in San Francisco as well as other portions of the Union. passed to spirit-life on Aug. 30, 1900, at the Industrial School, Carlisle, Pa., after an illness of several weeks, the result of a breaking down of the physical system.

She was born in Bucks county in 1825. In 1846 she was united in marriage with William Burgess, of the same place, who, with six children, five sons and one daughter, survive her.

Hers was an active life. During their labors among the Indians she served as principal of the Pawnee Manual Labor School and as field matron for the Pawnees for four years, and they moved with the tribe from Nøbraska to their allotted reservation in Indian Territory, in 1875, meeting with many hardships and deprivations.

In 1851 they went to Millville, Pa., since which time their names have been very closely and pleasantly associated, with the educational interests especially, of that neighborhood. From Greenwood Seminary, of which they were the founders, have gone out many men and women grateful for the equipment received from their personal instruction. The large attendance and numerous letters from absent ones read at the reunion of teachers, students and friends at the Seminary in 1897, on the return of Mr. and Mrs. Burgess from California, gave evidence of the esteem in which they were held.

Although she was one of the veterans in allottment of years, in heart and spirit she was yet young, and her earnest, witty, helpful remarks and participation will be much missed in various organizations she was wont to attend.

"Yes, when your thoughts are with or upon me, so to speak, and when you are in specially rested condition, I come more easily."-Lilian Whiting.

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

Know the Lord. — What a multitude of people there are who are seeking to "know the Lord," when they do not even know themselves. When we cultivate the good within ourselves, the divine power will manifest in our countenances, and we will be able to "recognize the Lord" in every one we meet.

The Galveston Horror has shocked the world, and is, indeed, a great calamity; but it is from these awful experiences that we learn wisdom. A great lesson in charity and human brotherhood may be learned from this and kindred disasters. The lower strata of society is penetrated, and the necessity for missionary work at our own doors is made apparent.

#### Some Discouragements.

A private correspondent who has just begun the investigation of Spiritualism, sojourning at present in the interior, spending the Summer months, took along some Spiritualist periodicals for study and entertainment. After a month's absence a communication was received, from which the following is an extract:

I find confronting me everywhere these sentiments: "We do not know, and cannot know, that our own can come to us. They may be personated every time by other spirits." I am reading some articles by Charles Dawbarn, and according to him, "there never has been much satisfaction obtained through communication with spirits," owing to changing vibrations. He says that the spirits, in most cases, are not able to see and know what we do any more clearly than a sensative can know what is going on in the spirit-world. This is very disheartening to those who have their all on the "other side."

And yet most of the Spiritualist papers and magazines of the world are vying with one another for the privilege of publishing these and similar articles, which, under the guise of scientific verbiage, are slowly but surely undermining and destroying the work of more than half a century. Truth cannot be destroyed, but it can be "crushed to earth" by secret enemies, and approximately "the eternal years of God" may be required for it to rise again.

The Spiritualist papers which publish every discouraging article which gives promise of sensation, without regard to the harm they may do to investigators, are the ones who are constantly lamenting the lack of progress in our work, and suggesting "phenomena" as the cause. They are those who hint at the possible dissolution of our organization, and our absorption by the liberal Christian churches. A careful scrutiny of the columns of the sensational Spiritualist periodicals will reveal the real cause of the apparent inertia in our ranks. The need of the hour is some fearless soul who dares to tell the truth "though the heavens fall," to lead our people out of bondage. The time is ripe and the man will be forthcoming when the opportunity offers.

Mrs. Lincoln claimed to know, by some psychic processes, superior to medium ship (?) that there are yet seven years of probation, during which mediums may quietly pursue their calling, and—if they will-improve themselves, and become "psychics," occupying a table-land of spiritual exhaltation that will be a protection against all the evils, obsessions, insanity, and lower world horrors that beset the lives of mediums. But after 1907, mediums are to pass through (or into) a flory furnace. They are to suffer the most excruciating tortures and soulharrowing conflicts with obsessing demons; and insane marauders from the lower world of spiritual darkness and disorder.

they have never read any of the teachings of spirits except that published by the enemies of the spiritual hypothesis in a disposition of ridicule and intolerance. If our enemies were honest they would soon be convinced. But "Ephraim is joined to his idols."


