He had preceded his friend "Jack" to the great unknown by a little over 11 hours. The Wednesday following, the funerals of both were held.—Utica (N. Y.) Post.

Occult Phenomena.

In La Lumiere we find the following items of interest:

A girl of M. Jungnickl in Ladung, Bohemia, 10 years of age, suddenly disappeared at about 3 in the afternoon of Aug. 10, 1900, and could not be found, after long and anxious searches made during the night. The next day at 4 a.m. the grandfather of little Anna fell asleep and dreamed that a white form had described to him the place where the little girl had perished. He armed himself with a long pole having a hook at the end, and in company with several persons went to the place described, a well, distant about onehalf kilometre, and at the place designated in the dream plunged his pole into the water and withdrew the corpse of the little girl.

Some years ago a joiner fell very ill, and in consequence the mill in which he worked was stopped. It was midnight. Silence reigned, broken only by the hooting of owls from the neighboring woods; when suddenly a voice was heard: "Brother, come; our time is finished." All the persons present were astounded, but still more so when they discovered that the joiner had died. At the same hour, at a great distance from there, the best friend of the joiner, at the same hour had also died.

Case of Telepathy.

The family of M. N. consisted of himself, wife, daughter and son. The brother and sister were very warmly attached to each other. The son being a midshipman, was compelled to leave the family and go to sea, but before leaving he said to his sister: "Promise me to think often of me! My dear Vera, you are my faith, and who says faith, says safety. Your thought shall be a guarantee of safety." The sister made the promise, with many misgivings, however.

The Autumn came with its tempests. Vera was very anxious. One evening while a terrible tempest was raging she retired earlier than usual, and at 10 o'clock everybody was asleep in the house. All at once a piercing cry was heard coming from the chamber of Vera, and she was discovered struggling with a severe nervous attack.

When she had come to herself, she related that she had had a frightful dream; that everything was still before her as if she had not fallen asleep, so that she seemed to have really been present at the events which she had seen.

All at once she found herself surrounded by thick darkness; the wind howled, the thunder roared, the lightning lighted up the troubled sea. Suddenly she distinguished a bright red light, lighting a large scope of the sea. Looking at it with more attention, she saw her brother struggling with difficulty in the waves and finally thrust against a cliff, his head covered with blood. Thereupon she cried and awoke. The next day a telegram came saying: "Thanks to the help of Vera, I am alive. I shall reach home soon."

It was then learned that his vessel had been wrecked. On his reaching home, he related the details of the wreck.—He invoked Vera during the tempest, and after the striking of the ship on a reef he found himself thrown into the sea. He swam around for some time and then saw a misty, luminous form, in which gradually he recognized Vera. She smiled, and with her arm indicated a certain direction he should take, which he did, and came in contact with something hard, and lost consciousness. and was found upon a sand bank. Dr. Richard Hodgson, secretary of the American branch of the Society, for Psychical Research, is one of the busiest men in Boston, and to secure an opportunity to chat with him is almost as difficult as to arrange for a sitting with Mrs. Piper, the famous medium whom Dr. Hodgson's society retains. It was with something of triumph in his breast; therefore, that the Boston Herald's representative the other day climbed the steep stairs that lead to the society's rooms, at 19 Boylston Place: Boston, on his way to keep an appointment with the very busy

The work of psychical research, however, seems to Dr. Hodgson to be the greatest in the world. And in this opinion Gladstone was agreed. 'Gladstone,' said the speaker early in the talk, 'was an honorary member of the English branch of our society, and he said once in speaking of this work: I regard it as the most important work in the world. And so it seems to me, too, else I would not be in it as I am. We have almost no money, but we labor on in search of truth,

Accident Foretold.

To see in a vision the frightful death of his close companion and friend, and then to pass over to the great beyond, so as to be ready a few hours later to welcome that friend and companion to another shore, was the remarkable experience of a young Utican.

Frederick Karl Vogt and John B. Jacquemin were intimate friends, spending all their leisure time in each other's society. Vogt was a railroad man, employed by the New York Central, and a short time before the tragic event to be noted, Jacquemin had connected himself with the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western Railroad, to learn the duties of a fireman.

One Sunday evening at 11:10 o'clock the freight train upon which Jacquemin was working was run into by a passenger train. The accident occurred at Poolville, Madison county, N. Y. Jacquemin was caught between the tender and engine of the freight train and was instantly killed, his death being the only one to occur. Prior to this, at his home in Utica, had occurred the death of Vogt. He had been stricken with typhoid pneumonia and during part of the preceding week had been delirious.

Saturday night preceding the railroad accident Vogt saw in his delirium the accident that was to be the cause of his friend's death. He described in his incoherent way the collision of the engines; he

caring not at all whether our search shall bring us out believing more profoundly than ever in another life, or wholly persuaded that the grave ends it all. Personally, I am now convinced by proofs, too intimate and too recent to be given out, that we have absolutely proved immortality."

This brought us at once to the reason for the visitor's call, an inquiry concerning the society's returns from the questionnaire about immortality, sent out some seven weeks ago to people of every kind and creed all over the country.

"The idea of the questions did not originate with me," said Dr. Hodgson, "but with an English friend of mine, an Oxford man, who believed that there is not nearly so widespread an interest in immortality as seemed to me to obtain. We found that the thing would not go in England, because people would consider such searching inquiries into their personal beliefs in the nature of an attack upon their orthodoxy as well as something of an impertinence. So I determined to start it myself in this newer and franker country.

"We are now sending out the sixth thousand of our questionnaire, and we have received already some 2,000 replies. The questions were many of them my own, but that one about the 'mental' comfort' of a belief in immortality was suggested by Prof. James of Harvard. Of course, the answers vary widely, and I am unable as yet even to generalize about them. They will be carefully tabulated and made the subject of a special report. But I have been rather surprised to find, as my English friend suspected, that there are a large number of thinking men who are not interested in the least, they say, in immortality. Probably these men find the present life all they can attend to.

"Nor do so many people as I expected feel that a positive knowledge of immortality would contribute to their mental comfort. A lot of the answers show utter indifference concerning this, and a lot more 'prefer to leave the question a matter of faith,' yet there are naturally many others—men and women who have suffered bereavements—who are most anxious for actual proof about the life

beyond the grave.

"I don't know that you are familiar with the case I have called 'George Pelham,' but I have made it the subject of a special report, and to many others, as well as to myself, that case has proved immortality. I believe absolutely now in the sincerity of our medium, Mrs. Piper. She is of the quiet, domestic, New England type, much occupied with her household and her children, and not particularly interested in psychical questions or anything else strictly intellectual. Mrs. Piper has been giving sittings for over 15 years now, and for about 14 of those years she has been largely under my own supervision. I look after her physically, and I know her for a thoroughly healthy woman. She enters the trance state as if she were going to sleep, and unless the sitting has been too prolonged she feels no ill effects whatever. In my opinion, her occasional control by intellgences above her own has

increased her stability and serenity.

of mine, and to me he has absolutely proved his individuality by special manifestations. And that brings me to explain why such trivial things are so often the subject of messages through mediums. Very frequently I am asked why the spirits concern themselves with cigar cases and such mere trifles. But don't you see that a trifle would be much more conclusive proof than a bigger thing, if it were proof at all? If I should communicate with you to morrow, having died in the night, and should say to you: 'Don't you remember that as you and I were talking together yesterday I was toying with a pair of scissors, and I got up to get you some more paper with the remark: "You are out of paper for your notes, are you not?" 'that would be to you proof conclusive that the communicating spirit was none other than I. For you and I are absolutely alone here, and so trifling a thing as the scissors and your lack of paper would not be mentioned by me to anyone who might enter after you are gone.

"Professor Hyslop recently set up some telegraphic instruments in Columbia College, and the people at either end selected, quite without thought, just such an intimate, trivial thing as a cigar case to establish identity over the wire with. Some of the best of my communications have to do with things so intimate that I cannot tell the public about them. George Pelham's communications with 'Mr. Howard, 'too-who is a well-known and able man of professional status, a definite disbeliever in a future life until G. P. convinced him—were absolutely conclusive. The 'holding turn' to that conviction was given by a message which came in my presence in response to a request for some incident which no one save G. P. and Mr. Howard, his most intimate elder friend and adviser, could possibly have known.

"Several statements were read by me that day and asserted to by Mr. Howard. And then the handwriting, through Mrs. Piper, inscribed the word 'private' and gently pushed me away. I retired and Mr. Howard took my place, where he could read the writing. He did not read it aloud as it was too private for my perusal. The hand. as it reached the end of each sheet, tore it off from the block-book and thrust it wildly at Mr. Howard, and then continued writing. The circumstances narrated, Mr. Howard informed me, contained precisely the kind of test for which he had asked, and he said that he was 'perfectly satisfied—perfectly.'"

Dr. Hodgson, in his report concerning George Pelham, has given many convincing facts and figures. G. P., we learn, recognizes at the first manifestation "John Hart," an old friend, gives intimate facts and names concerning articles brought by Hart, as, for instance, that stud Mr. Hart wears were taken by G. P.'s stepmother from his body after his accidental death and handed by her to his father, with an earnest suggestion to send them to Hart. There are, too, 30 cases of recognition out of at least 150 persons who have had sittings with Mrs. Piper since the first appearance of G. P.

"One of the most interesting single instances that I can give you, however, has to do with another personality," continued Dr. Hodgson. "Not long ago, on my way out to keep an appointment with Mrs. Piper for a sitting,

read in the morning newspaper of the death of a certain friend of mine, whose niece had already passed beyond. At the house of the medium this niece told me through automatic writing that her uncle had just come over. 'I was with uncle at the last,' the communicator went on to say, 'and I told him not to be disturbed, that he would be even happier over here than in the world with auntie.' This seemed to me very interesting, and I was anxious to verify it if I could, but I naturally felt the impossibility of speaking to the widow about the matter at that

"It happened, however, that a friend of mine was sent for by the widow to come and stay with her, and in their conversation the widow said: 'Our niece came to him at the end, he told me, and said: 'Don't be disturbed; you'll be even happier here than in the world with auntie.'" Precisely the same form of words, you see!

"If you ask me just what this society has accomplished," said Dr. Hodgson, with a smile, as his visitor rose to leave, "I would say that we have proved telepathy, established the fact that there is such a thing as clairvoyance, detected and explained the methods used by various trickster mediums who pretended to be possessed of supernormal powers, demonstrated (in 1885) that Mme. Blavatsky's pretensions were founded on spurious marvels, and now established to the satisfaction of many people, who, like myself, were skeptical of the thing to start with, the presumption that individuals may and do communicate after death with friends still on this side of the dividing veil."

My wife (Martha E. Root) and I are making appointments with increasing frequency, in some cases years in advance (as it has proved), to conduct spiritual services after the person so engaging us shall pass to spirit-life.

Again and again have relatives interfered to prevent these wishes being filled. Extreme grief has been caused, even to the husband who disregarded his wife's wishes because of being a Spiritualist. This poor spirit stood in tears by her bier through the church service by a Presbyterian, and she talked with my wife while the congregation "viewed the corpse."

The funeral of Judge Sanford M. Green of Bay City, Mich., was a most flagrant violation of his wishes. He was probably the oldest Spiritualist in the State, being in his 95th year, for he embraced the truth of spirit communion near the introduction of raps by the Fox sisters.

He was president of the Bay City Society of Spiritualists more than 30 years ago. It cost much in that vicinity then to declare one's self a Spiritualist. He was as fully convinced to his latest hours.

He gave Michigan its first revised statutes in 1846, which stand to the present. He wrote works on law and court practice, which continue to be authority. For more than 40 years he presided on the Circuit and Supreme benches of Michigan, which facts rank him foremost among the jurists of this State. He was eminently fitted by nature and experience to sift evidence, and he wrote in 1897:"From the most indubitable evidence I have long been convinced of the truth of what is called Spiritualism."

I nursed him 15 of the 19 last days and nights, and then he renewed this expression and his wish for spiritual service and cremation. The family in which had been his home the last dozen years, his children, our family and other confidential friends knew well his wishes.

His original letter charging my wife and me to execute his wishes was put in possession of his two daughters and daughter-in law in time for them to consult him had they wished so to do many days while he was talking freely with all about his bed. They did not open the subject to him, although they talked of it to me and my wife in the sick-room.

Blind Force at Random.

W. J. COWEN.

The different forces of thought are seeking expression through the various channels of communication in an endeavor to solve the questions which are constantly thrusting themselves before the notice of the inquiring mind. The paramount question of the age, a question which has engrossed the thoughts of the past and is still apparently unsolved, is the question: "Shall a man live again?" This is the one question which the religious and the scientific domains of thought are striving to solve in a satisfactory manner. Religious thought pertaining to the future existence of the human race, based, as it is, upon the uncertain source of so-called God given inspirational records, is at variance with the scientific thought, by the world, called materialism.

The mysterious and invisible part of man. called the soul, has never been found within the physical structure of the body. What the real seat of life is, or where it is located, are questions which have never been satisfactorily settled. If the seat of life and the power which governs the activity and consciousness of existence is located in the heart; if the heart, that organ which propels the lifegiving blood to every part of the human body, is life itself, why. upon the death of the body, does not the heart still exist as an independent conscious organ, capable of sustaining itself independent of the decay of matter?

If the mind is the seat of life, that wonderful organ of consciousness which reasons and plans and directs the movements of the whole body, why does not the mind, or brain, remain to represent the real man after the physical structure has been reduced to the dust of the earth? We see the physical structure of man, with all of its intelligent consciousness, a being with life expressing itself in every action; we come in contact with that intelligent thought force which impresses us with the fact that we stand before an active, intelligent something. Call it a man, a force, or a mechanism, according to the conception we have of life. By and by, this, this same structure with which we have always associated activity and that thought force which has impressed itself upon us with its individuality,

undergoes a change. The life force, the thought force has left the physical structure, and we say the man is dead. We examine the structure of man, lying stiff and cold before us upon the dissection table, and find the component parts of the wonderful structure of man still intact. The heart, the blood vessels, the organs which perform the functions of life, the brain, still remain the same as if the body still existed as an active, conscious individual.

No power, no force known to the scientific world of knowledge can ever restore this lifeless form to its former condition. That mysterious force, that agency which governs and controls the physical structure of man, has departed, has left the body behind, and we know not where to look for it.

For this reason materialists claim that the death of the physical structure of man is the end of life. They fail to find that force, that impalpable essence of life, which is a part of life itself-nay, is the real life, and say: There is no existence after the decay of matter. But we, in our opinion, differ from the thoughts of materialism and think that if there is a force which governs and controls life, that force still exists. Because we have never found the real spiritual force of life, we need not say that such a force does not exist.

Materialism, or the blind force working at random, is seeking knowledge of the spiritual within the domain of the physical. The physical and spiritual forces of nature are separate and distinct from each other. The plant and the life which sustains it are separate and individual forces. The one is a machine, the other is the power which operates the machine. The force can exist without the physical expression of itself, but the plant can not exist without the force which sustains it. The materialist, then, to find this life which he seeks must look for it within the spiritual domain of nature and not within the physical.

For instance, the spiritual forces of nature govern the actions of the horse. The horse itself is but a mechanism, a machine, so constructed as to perform a certain work. The spiritual forces of the universe express themselves through and by means of the mechanism which we call a horse. The machine, in course of time, wears out and is discarded and another takes its place, but the spiritual force which operates the machine still exists as an indestructible, everlasting and imperishable essence of life. To look for the divine essence of life within the structure of man, after it has ceased to perform the functions of its existence, would be like looking for the operator of a machine within its ruins when it is no longer capable of performing the duties for which it had been created. The man is dead, the machine is useless; but life still exists, and the power which directs the machine still remains the same active spiritual force. The forces of the cosmos existed before the creation of worlds and will continue to exist after matter has perished. The spiritual existed before the physical and was the means of creating the physical.

The forces of the cosmos are ever existent and are co-existent with the God of the universe. The spiritual exists side by side with the physical, but is a distinct force which governs and directs the

physical. The spiritual counterpart of man which governs the physical structure of life, is the imperishable essence of life, while the body is but the machine.

Materialism, therefore, which deals solely with the physical, is not competent to solve the problems pertaining to the spiritual forces. Materialism, which treats of matter, as matter only, is blind to the real forces of nature which control matter. To the materialist a rock is simply a rock, but to the student of the spiritual science, a rock is the expression of the handiwork of nature. Materialism is blind when it attempts to substitute the life force for the structure which is governed by the life force. Man is the machine.

Materialism fails to solve the problems pertaining to the spiritual, because hitherto it has only studied the physical. But let the materialist come in contact with the spiritual forces of nature, and a vast area of new thought conception will at once be opened up for his consideration. Dealing only with matter as controlled by the physical forces of nature,, he can have no proper conception of the spiritual forces which control matter. The materialist is right as far as he has gone with his investigations of natural phenomena. but he has stopped upon the threshold of a great scope of scientific research. There is a vast field of knowledge just beyond the halting place of materialistic thought, a vast field of spiritual knowledge of which the materialist can have no conception.

The subject, "Materialism, or the blind force working at random," should be changed to "Spiritualism, or the key to truth, light and knowledge." Materialism deals with the present and the past; Spiritualism treats of the past, present and the future life of the human race. Materialism treats of matter as matter only. Spiritualism treats of the spiritual forces of nature governing and directing the cosmos. Spiritualism is a grade higher than materialism, a step upward into the brighter realms of knowledge. Materialism may satisfy the mind for the present, but the spiritual nature of man craves food which can not be supplied by materialism. This craving for more light, a more definite knowledge of life and its governing forces, for something which shall suit the spiritual tastes of man is satisfied by Spiritualism, the science which treats of life, which treats of the future condition of man, and which explains the problems pertaining to the spiritual forces of nature.

Y., a cowardly assassin, while extending his left hand to salute the President, had a pistol under a handkerchief in his right hand and shot twice with deadly aim, one ball going through his stomach; the other, aimed for his heart, struck a rib and glanced off. The ball was not extracted; the case is a critical one, and may yet prove fatal—but we hope not.

The cowardly assassin was a Polish anarchist, and gloats over the deed. It was with difficulty that the police saved him from being lynched — so exasperated were those who witnessed the villainous act.

This reminds us of the prophecy of Dr. Muchlenbruch, filed in this office on March 31, 1898, which reads thus:

A dark cloud is resting over President William McKinley. I will describe a vision which was shown to me on May 25, 1898. A bright spirit came to me and said: "See what we have to shock you concerning our country, America, (for I am an American.") He stepped aside, and the White House at Washington, D. C., came in front of me, draped in black. Seeing it, I turned to my visitor and said: "What meanest thou by showing this scene?" He again pointed for me to look, but did not explain. I began to show signs of restlessness, when he pointed to a coffin heavily araped in black. Then all faded away. I looked for my visi-

tor; he reached out his hand to me saying: "Danger!" and then faded away. As an American citizen I should have been glad had this been otherwise. Though being used to visions ever since childhood, this left me in a very excited condition.

The people all over the country are aroused, and steps will no doubt be taken to prevent a repetition of such dastardly acts.

The most helpful thoughts and earnest prayers of millions are sent out for the President's recovery, and as this JOURNAL is sent to press, every indication is that he will do so.

Jewish Restriction.

The Jews have made a move towards forming a nation again. A meeting was lately held in Basle, Switzerland, and a society formed called "Zionists," with \$20,000,000 capital, with which it is proposed to buy Palestine and inaugurate "The Jewish State." Already 60 square miles of territory have been purchased in India and Galilee, and colonists are gathering there to form a government under the suzerainty of Turkey and the protection of the "Great Powers of Europe."

This looks much like the fulfillment of the prophecies of the Jewish seers that Israel should be restored, after the end of the 2,000 years of "the times of the Gentiles."

These people have been persecuted, defamed and tortured with great ferocity, and the time has fully come for them to be vindicated and restored to national existence, and to occupy a place among the nations of the world. Let us hope this is a part of the Twentieth Century progression.

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
