COOPERATION.

WHEN COOPERATION FAILS.

The common assumption that cooperation fails nine times where it succeeds once is both false and foolish, but it is true that there is a large proportion of failures strewing the "pathway of progress," and it is quite natural that these should perplex and annoy, if not discoura ,e, the devotees of the cause.

It may be that it would be easy to duplicate the list of present active cooperative societies by a parallel list of those that are defunct. This, however, is equally true of men, nations, churches and business houses. They live awhile, and then die. But mankind doesn't die, nor government, nor religion, nor business—nor cooperation.

Cooperation never fails.

Men fail sometimes to cooperate. Cooperaiive societies fail, occasionally, as do individualistic enterhis co workers, and violates the patience and justice and spirit of brotherhood, cooperation fails that is. it fails in him, because he fails to cooperate. Hence it is not cooperation that fails, since it is absent, but a selfish and egotistical man.

Cooperation must always fail to violate natural laws with impunity. It cannot order a carload of canned corn for a market that will not use more than a hundred cases a year. and pay 5 per cent on its capital, without loss. Some cooperators have learned this by sad experience. Cooperation can do many good things that are impossible to competition, but cooperation cannot do the impossible. I have seen it tried. Happy is that man who knows the impossible at first sight. Stupid and gross is he who considers every thing impossible that is not compassed and achieved by competition and selfishness.

WHY COOPERATION FAILS.

When cooperative stores fail in business it is because they fail in cooperation. They fail in cooperation becuause cooperation is adaptable only to a high order of society to which the membership fails to obtain.

Cooperation would be good for everybody if everybody were fit for cooperation. But they are not. Some people choose to fight. They should have the fight taken out of them before they become fellows in an industrial democracy. Theyneed regeneration more than reform. Cooperation presupposes a certain amount of education, culture civilization, tameness, even altruism. Where this is lacking cooperation cannot flourish. Where the essentials are present cooperation cannot be overthrown. The great common explanation of failures, however, may as well be frankly recognized. It is the cold, unsentimental fact that the people or the leaders lacked the necessary simple but high qualifications. It is no more true that everybody is fit for voluntary industrial cooperation than it is that everybody is fit for high school. Every cooperative seciety that has ever passed through the fires of opposition and disloyalty and suspicion and a run on the treasury knows the difference between the fit and the unfit. It is oftener the management that is at fault than it is the membership. Here again the matter of qualifications is of first importance, The need of personal civilization is even greater here. Unfit management has wrecked more cooperative societies than has any other one cause. Unfit management can not always be avoided, but unfit management almost always means uncooperative management, and when this is the cause of the trouble it can be obviated.

WHEN COOPERATION SUCCEEDS.

There is no need that cooperation be forced where the soil is not prepared for it. Hot-house cooperation seldom lives long. But where the preparation is made and the climate congenial and the civilization sufficient, there it should be planted, for it will grow and prosper.

Mr. Carnegie fathered one of the hot house species among his employes at Braddock a number of years ago. It lived just as long as he paid the bills, and then died. There was no sufficient reason why it should have lived any longer. Cooperation does not flourish on that program.

One man cannot make a cooperative society, no matter how intense his zeal.

When the people are done with that crude and cruel competition which restricts their enjoyment of the necessities of life, when they believe in brotherhood and equal opportunity, when they take the money out of their own pockets and place in trust with their organization for capital, when the individual members take the same interest in it that they take in their private business, and when they care more for the common welfare than for private dividends cooper. ation become the completest success known to industrial history. When the members and the officers cooperate cooperation succeeds. When a headstrong and impetuous leader who has habitually said to one "go and he goeth, and to another come and he cometh" remembers his brotherhood obligations and checks himself and learns the patience and wisdom and sweetness of counsel cooperation succeeds. When the wise bear with the foolish and the foolish learn of the wise, when the frugal impart frugality to the indigent, and when the union of many small factors constitutes industrial strength cooperation succeeds. When it teaches men the weakness of selfishness and the folly of fighting cooperation succeeds. When it inspires men with high tdeals of public service and enlist their heartr in a loyal devotion to the common good the success of cooperation is far greater than aught that can be measured by dollars and percents.
