THE UTILITY OF PHRENOL-OGY IN EDUCATION.

We have long been of the opinion that if we could persuade educators to fully investigate phrenological science and convince them of its special utility in their work to say nothing of its general value otherwise, we would perform a lasting as well as a contagions benefit to the rising and future generations.

In our earnest effort in this direction we have, however met with much discouragement from indifference and apparently wilful opposition, and strange to say, the most bitter disappointments come from those whom we should expect to be the most interested and enthusiastic, such as college presidents, professors, teachers, and ministers.

We have felt the great need of help in trying to reach them and make them realize that there is indeed a very much better educational aid than any they have previously used. Strange, passing strange, as investigating and intelligent as the American people are, that we have run on so long without discovering more of the first principles of happiness and starting a fad in applying them! This article assumes, of course, that quondam education has been imperfect and mis-directed, with corresponding unsatisfactory results, and, without recounting the shortcomings, we appeal to the knowledge and judgement of the readers for the correctness of the assumption.

If every individual of society lived aright; if every one knew how and were disposed to care for his health; if the young and old of both sexes were interested in cultivating the very best of morals and refining manners; if all were friendly in their respective ways to a correct degree; if each in both sexes were properly mated so as not only to promote their own happiness in this life, but in that which is to come; and, lastly, if each one were engaged in his adapted pursuit that which will furnish a living as well as enjoyment in prosecuting it,

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what a grand and glorious time there would be! Nor is this a fool's dream.

It is not speculative philosophy; it is not a scientific bauble. These things mean something, and can be obtained among the famiiy of mankind instead of the evils and evil conditions that prevail. They are the true objects of education, the happy privileges of a people who have the prerogatives to bestow them. Influences of this sort, once set in motion, can not be measured by money nor imagination, but only by eternity.

Why not? Have we set the ideal too high? What is the mission of education, if it be not to edify, moralize, and refine, and make mankind useful and happy?

O beloved land, land of liberty and independence, land of knowledge and wisdom, and yet a land of sorrow upon whose history there are some dark blots, canst thou not purge thyself with this mild and gentle cathartic and become, as it were, a garden of Eden?

But the great need is a more perfect definite basis for educational work. The lack of this has been the chief cause of the haphazard and faulty results of the past. This basis is to be found in the constitution of man as expounded by Phenology and kindred sciences. And it is high time that educators who hold influential positions should come to see the good of this science as did the great apostle of education, the Hon. Horace Mann, and apply it accordingly.

the study and reception of truth, though a regular physician in high standing and backed by many years highly successful medical practice, he shows no countenance to the materialistic falacies which so often mar the literature and hamper the practice of medicine.

Dr. Sahler is a philosopher as well as a scientist, and one, moreover, who does not invent a theory to be used as a sort of straight jacket in which to confine facts but he invites facts to occur and accumulate, then he sets to work to propose a theory which will most satisfactorily account for them.

Some resemblance may be traced between Dr. Sahler's idea of human duality and the two minds theory of Prof. Hudson, bnt unlike Hudson, Dr. Sahler has no prejudice against Spiritualism, on the contrary he is very friendly to it, consequently he does not seek to deny any psychic possibilities, but leaves the door of his mind wide open for the acceptance of whatever phenomena may be demonstrated.

Dr. Sanler's book is reverent in tone, sublime in thought, and eloxuent in diction. It commences with some well condenced information on anatomy, every line of which tends to raise the thought of the reader to a justly high appreciation of the worth and beauty of the human body which the soul uses as its temporary habitation.

The following is a fine sample of the author's style. "As the wealth of the owner may be inferred from the character of his dwelling place, so the dignity of the real self may be inferred from the wonderful structure of the physical body, which was designed for a few years use and is then laid aside to perish. The nature of the real self, therefore, and its relation to the physical body from which death seperates it is a point of vast interest and importance. A clear understanding of this point leads to a brief discussion of certain general principals underlying creation of which man is the supremest expression. Creation is a great process of evolution, with these words, Dr. Sahler leads the student of life's tremendous mysteries not into a labyrinth of speculation but into clear fields of cogent reasoning, where intuitive perception and sterling logic walk gravely hand in hand. Then he continues: Man though a product of divine thought is yet a sharer in Deity and there is a striking analogy between the relation of divine thought to the original creation of the universe and the relation of man's thought to its recreation into conventional form. As all things existed in the mind of God before they found expression in the form of the material universe so in the subordinate realm of man's creation the first step lies in that mysterious impulse of his spirit called thought.

If the impulse of the soul is strong enough the thought will represent a force sufficient to work out a visible form, but if the impulse is weak the force will probably be dissipated and lost so far as visible expression is concerned.

The thought in any instance is the force behind the visible symbol it may be regarded as the invisible substance of the visible image.

In the above words Dr. Sahler leads up to a singularly instructive disertation on the dual mind, in the course of which he illustrates the subject largely by means of facts observed in connection with his long and extensive medical practice.

A very interesting account is given of a young man who frequently passed into a self hypnotic state and while in that condition went his way as though he was fully concious of ordinary objective surroundings, while in reality he was in a widely different condition from his companions, and while in that state he displayed marvelous superordinary susceptibility.

Dr. Sahler says: "We are surrounded or immersed in the vibrations of Divine Mind, and we only require proper conditions to be spelled out into human consciousness. The magnetic forces of the body are affected by these vibrations and serve as wires to convey messages to the seat of the soul.

A correspondent of the Sydney Bulletin sends to that paper a remarkable instance of adaption of instinct in a trap-door spider.


Says the writer: "A friend of mine noticed near his camp a trapdoor spider run in front of him and pop into its hole, pulling the 'lid' down as it disappeared.

She was the personification of honesty and benevolence. I shall not see her like again.

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
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
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
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
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
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
