AFTER DEATH-WHAT?

CHAPTER SECOND.

It has been universally assumed and believed that life in the spirit world for those, at least, not tied to earth, combines all that mortal man could conceive as an improvement upon our life and surroundings of today.

We are told that the spirit finds himself on solid ground, with mountains, valleys, rivers, lakes, oceans and a fertile soil producing everything but weeds. He walks or floats in the atmosphere as he may choose, yet transports himself to enormous distances almost instantly

he has boats for his water, carriages for his land, and, and motors for his excursions in the air.

The land is dotted with his structures, from the charming cottage for the individual home to the grand temples where the spirits gather in masses for instruction and amusement.

Flowers, green grass, wide spreading trees, and the most luscious fruits are his to command. They have a land of peace and plenty; at least it is so called by one of Mrs. Piper's controls. Every thing responds to the will power of the spirit. And we are told, yet

by the enthusiastic believer. Everything a spirit said was counted as from a being altogether superior to mortal man. Death was the wizzard who changed the fool into a wise man. And when there were discrepencies in stories told by different returning spirits concerning their personal experiences in spirit life plausable explanations were invited to silence the critic. Spirits who proved very objectionable were enrolled in a class to themselves, and said to be 'earth bound'. The others were counted as more or less advanced, and therefore with vary-

further, that as the spirit progresses he finds new and improved editions of a spirit's power over his surroundings.

Every spirit claims all this, and much more of the same sort, as a most satisfactory answer to our question 'After death—What?' So much, at least, has leaked through 'fog-land' for our benefit and bless iug by comforting us in our hours of earthly sorrow, suffering, and unsatisfied cravings.

In the early days of spirit intercourse the limitations of 'fog-land' were not known, or even guessed

ing degress of knowledge of spirit life and its details.

The existence of a 'fog-land' as a mental state into which a returning spirit must pass, and herein he must meet a mortal if he wished to communicate, is still, for the most part counted by the believer as a poor attempt to explain the confusions and contradictions of spirit return.

Husband, wife, son, daughter, friend, have each contributed to the perplexity when attempting to to communicate. They could not tell the same tale through different mediums; and the wisest mortal of today, evidently had become three parts a fool by the process of death. The usual spirit talk was what Huxley called 'the babble of country parsons'.

The believer knew by personal experience that returning spirits often healed the sick by magnetic treatments; they lectured through unlearned lips, and even wrote and told thrilling tales of spirit life in Beulah Land. Still everything alike was of the earth, earthy. They could prescribe for the sick. but just as the herbs and minerals were drugs belonging to earth life, so even their talk about the hereafter might be an attempt to tell the truth, but it was always put up in a capsule of mortal manufacture and flavor.

Fog land does not exclude spirit truth of spirit experience 'over there', save with a Swedenborgian flavor of Heaven and Hell, that leaves a bad taste in the mouth after you swallow it. It has been taken in liberal doses from every medium, and at every seance, but the real trouble is that it will not digest and assimilate.

The reader may here interpose and ask 'why will it not assimilate? He thinks he believes all about the naturalness of the next life, and its little details worked in by controls and guides who inspire mediums, and perhaps write and talk through himself. Therein is great trouble for the present unfortunate student who is writing down these thoughts. He is perpetually knocking his head against what Spiritualists call 'facts in their own experience'. He would undoubtedly become a 'slain man' were it not that the facts thrown at him cannot get through even a thin coating of common sense, at least with sufficient solidity to injure him.

We know that spirit life must be passed amid conditions very different to those of earth. This is proved by the fact that the normal mortal has no sense by which he can recognize the spirit of spirit man. Even his lungs cannot breathe any atmosphere less dense than that of earth. The mortal entering earth life takes nine months to develop a form with organs shaped to the

conditions of this planet. And this is so, no matter how many or few are the years to be spent here. But somehomew, and in some unexplained way, when the mortal body is dropped we are told he is already with another body adapted to a very different kind of life. He is not to be Born into that new life, as he was here, but is to 'burst in' already to become a citizen, save, perhaps, that he needs a few hours sleep to enable him to forget the old way of doing things in this life's 'fitful dream.'

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QUESTIONS ANSWERS.

MISS MAE HUNT, MEDIUM.

- Q. What keeps the body alive and the heart beating when the spirit is out of a trance medium.
- A. The spirit itself is not detached from the body, it is simply withdrawn and is attached to the body by a magnetic current which appears like a silver cord, were this current to be broken the heart would cease to be and physical life would be extinct.
- Q. Why do spirits manifest to strangers rather than directly to their own loved ones?
- A. They do manifest to there loved ones, but they are not always attuned to receive their messages. Great doubt, or deep mourning, effects the spirit after passing out, which holds them at a distance from those whom they are trying to reach. Harmony cannot be produced from an instrument that is out of tune, neither can a spirit project their influence or presence upon the vibrations of one who is not sensitive, as they must be to receive the presence of the spirit. Soft wax will receive the impression of ones hand, while other substances receive no impression. So it is with the brain force of different people. One cannot send telegraphic messages on a clothesline,. neither can messages be sent directly to one who is not developed? to receive them.
- Q. Do physical deformities and afflictions effect our spiritual bodies hereafter?
- A. No, they do not, that condition effects the physical only. Spirits appear many times with their limbs gone and with deformities with which they suffered through life, simply for identification. Those who have been blind here will have perfect vision when they rise in the spiritual body, the spirit is perfect in form. Many times children are born with deformities having been injured before birth, from cruel treatment toward the mother, and sometimes from insufficient nourishment during the period of gestation, but this only applies to the physical.
- Q. Why is it that metal and rocks exhibits the "X" ray, the same as mortals when under the influence of an anaesthetic?
- A. Because, rocks and metals are alive, the same as animals or mortals, they are imbued with that life force called God, and have consciousness according to their present state of evolution. There are no dead objects in the economy of God's nature, all is teeming with life from the tiny pebble at your feet to the majestic stars in the firmanent above.

A FRIENDLY REVIEW.

I, an ordinary Spiritualist, happy in the belief that those upon the spirit side of life were better situated and far wiser than their brethren of earth, was much astonished and not a little dismayed to discover when reading Charles Dawbarn's article entitled "After Death-What?" that spirits "have never yet startled the world with any new grand discovery or invention," This is indeed a lamentable condition of affairs, calculated to strike terror to the heart of the timid believer who has a more or less decided faith in the potency and value of inspiration from a spiritual source. And then, as if to make his declaration more em phatic, Mr. Dawborn informs us further that "Radium and the Xray were not announced by spirits, and we look to mortal genius for whatever may be our next advance in knowledge and its powers for good or ill upon earth life."

This ought to make us lose faith in Spiritualism entirely and cause us to reiterate that unanswerable questsion so often hurled at us by the hardened skeptic. - "What good is Spiritualism anyhow?" But somehow or other it fails to have the desired effect. It is merely the old, old objection presented in a different form, and to meet it in its new form is not at all difficult.

If Mr. Dawbarn will step into his library, take down a volume bearing the title "The Arcana of Spiritualism," brush off the accumulated dust and open the book at page 223, 224, 229 and 230 he will gain some enlightenment upon this subject that may cause him to doubt whether mortal genius is responsible for every invention, discovery or gain in knowledge. I quote from the above mentioned source.

"Often it is said in scrrow or with a sneer, that if the utterances of the trance speaker are those of Webster or Parker they have lost their wits; and that the prescriptions of once eminent physicians are the recipes of quacks and pretenders. Think of this subject for a moment! Would the spirit Webster follow the wanderings of a frail woman for the purpose of speaking to an audience effected only with wonder at his name? * * *"

"It is not correct in reason to suppose that the statesmen of the past will gather at the Capitol, and impart their ideas to those who can at once place them before the country? But is said in reply, the Senators and Representatives are not mediums. True, not the passive tools mediums are popularly supposed to be, but who shall say that the far-reaching statemenship, which at times cuts through the fog and darkness, is not impression from a superior source? The spirits of statesmen would be drawn to those who made government a study, and to them would they impart their ideas.

The passive medium may write or speak in verse, claiming some great Loet as the source, to the disgust of those who read or listen, and Spiritualism is scorned for the barrenness of thought and rudeness of expression, not so fast. The spirit poet would seek the poet, and with responsive soul enlarge and beautify his thoughts. * * *

"If an inventor departed to the spirit world, and having some invention with which to benefit mankind, wished to impart it, he could not do so through an ignorant boor, unless he could induce absolute automatic trance, which will be scarcely possible. He would find inventors with minds turned in the same direction as his own, with whom he could become enrapport, and by stimulating their minds impart his ideas. They would not be conscious of any superior power, and would refer the result to their own unaided mentality. * * *

"The great souls standing along the stream of time like beacon flames, lighting the wastes of darkness, were of this class. Thought, intense study, self-absorption, unconsciously to themselves prepared their minds for the inflowing of the tide of spiritual intelligence, and also for its understanding and radiation."

But enough has already been said to show the meaning I wish to convey, or in other words to prove that because man departs this visible world he does not necessarily cease to be a factor in its growth and development. The following story comes from Russia, where, of course, yellow journalism is unknown. It is, moreover, printed in the Novoe Vremya, which is as conservative a sheet as one would want to read.

It concerns a girl of 12, named Lisuba, living in Vladicaucasus, who is said to possess radio active qualities. She has been trying to earn her living as a servant, but has been dismissed from every situation she secured on account of this unhappy endowment.

Every object she approaches is set in motion. Plates on a dresser rattle, linen hung out to dry falls on the ground, bottles rise from the table and are upset. The general condition of the girl is normal; she is quite healthy, free from any nervous trouble, and disposed to regard her magnetic powers as a huge joke.

Her parents, however, are in despair about her, as most of their neighbors declare that Lisuba is possessed by evil spirits. The local doctors have studied their case without being able to solve the enigma, so the unfortunate child will shortly be sent to St. Petersburg, to be dealt with by specialists.

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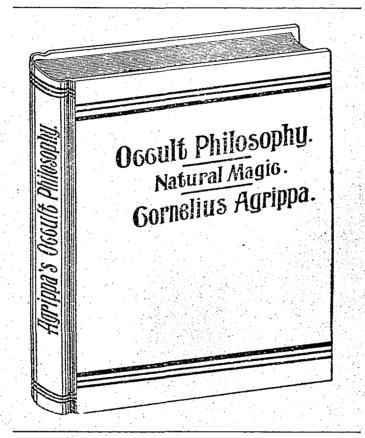
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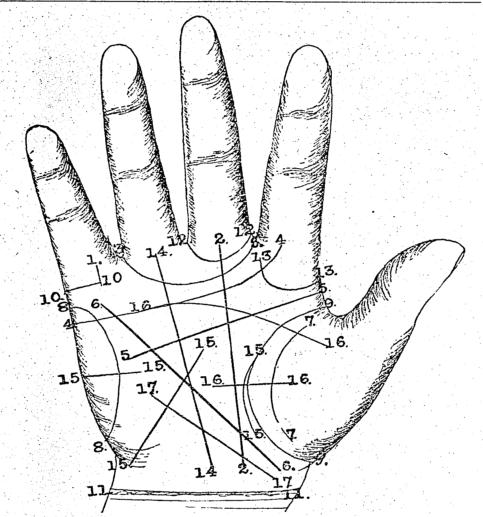
