A generous portion of his means And time and strength he gladly gave For others' wealth—the poor to bless, that were the case we should want a furher explanation as to why and how 'he gets rid of certain organs which would of course 'spiritualise' but are not wanted over there.

For instance the entire sexual organs of both sexes, could be of no service over there, for either they are not begotten and born as spirits, or if so born it is by some process of which we have been left totatlly ignorant by the the revelation of spirit return. Yet, if we think a moment, we see the absurdity of supposing liver, heart, and lungs to 'spiritualise' and yet the sexual organs to remain purely mortal, and unable to cross the divide.

Nature in earth life directs all her energies to the continuance of species by propagation, and we are often pointed to the ingenuity by which she effects this result. Every form is designed with end in view, and for this one purpose. It is still another absurdity to suppose that the spirit form can be like ours, for it needs none of these ingenious schemes and designs. Yet we repeat our question, how are they to be left behind, and how am I to recognise my old friend whose new form is unshaped by having all the sexual organs left out? We know by experience on earth that in a refined atmosphere the lungs have to increase in size. Dogs taken to the highlands of Mexico cannot run without immediate exhaustion. But their offspring can. So the lungs will have to change, and the new form must adapt itself to that change. But our mortal form is arranged and planned for a system of mastication, assimilation and excretion which keeps Boards of Health busy selecting and branding eatables and drinkables, and enforcing elaborate systems of sanitation. How the spirit escapes all this we have never learned. But even if a spirit strolls up to a ripe peach, with his hands in his pockets, and just suck its delicious flavor and essence, he must have some way of assimilating the necessary, and rejecting the rest, that requires organs very differently constituted to ours. We cannot suppose he just lives on 'baby food' such as is loudly recommended here, for that is far too course

for entrance into spirit life. His eyes may become microscopes or telescopes; his ears audiphones; and he may go around catching thoughts as they fly, and sorting them for his private perusal, but all this demands organs very different to ours, and would make us shout 'ghost' if we happened to meet a spirit loved one at some midnight hour.

In a word since the spirits are living in an atmosphere, and amid conditions impossible to us, they must have bodies so different to ours that we cannot even guess how they got them by any process of evolution. And most certainly we would not recognize them if we came across old friends strolling in one of the parks of the New Jerusalem. Of course we get all sorts of guesses how its done, by way of learned explanation, but we want solid fac's that will 'hitch on', as every effect must 'hitch on' to its cause.

This is a little peep into the coming mysteries, it is only the beginning of our troubles. We accept spirit return as a fact demonstrated by abundant experience, but do not let us pretend to be learned and scientific, and know, or even guess how its done, and what shaped garments the yesterday mortal is having made for today. The writer most humbly acknowiedges that he cannot answer questions on this interesting subject, at least from any scientific or common sense standpoint. Theraputies by his "Chistology, Divine Healing, Truth Unchained" etc. "Sacred Science" is a book of only 131 pages, neatly bound in cloth, price \$1.00. It contains valuable information for the advanced student that is worth many times its price.

It comprises a series of lessons on how to control the mind and the \forall arious organs of the body so as to maintain perfect health and treat those who are sick; how to control breath so as to destroy wrinkles and old age and bring peace and harmony; how to clarify the brain and spiritulize the body and surround one self and others with vibratory currents that keep away all disease, disasters and inharmonies.

In this book Mr. Sabin teaches one how to attain the superconscious condition so that inspiration, spiritual illumination and mental and physical vigor may be obtained. When through these teachings this state is reached he says we will know as the Infinite knows and the past and future will be open to us as well as ithe present, and people will not have to tell us what they are thinking about for we will know it without. He warns his students against using these God given powers except for good, as if turned to other uses they will destroy the one so using them. It will be remembered by many that Mr. Sabin revolted from the narrow way laid down by the reg. ular Christian Scientists and started a school of thought of his own in Washington D. C., where he is Bishop of his church, edits the "News Letter" and has a Metaphysical University for students. Since he let the mental bars down he has investigated in many directions and in this book says: "I have no doubt that the spirits that have gone beyond are clothed in their proper spiritual bodies and are progressing with their work and at times are with us." Undoubtedly some of the learned ones from the highest spheres are giving to his mentality the thoughts laid down in the pages of this book. They are worthy of careful perusal by the advanced student.

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CONGRESS OF NATIVE AMERICANS.

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Strange and wonderful people to be seen at the World's Fair.

At the World's Fair in St. Louis are assembled now tribes, groups and families of the strangest and most wonderful people on earth. In no portion of the wonderful display has a finer sense of selection obtained than in the assembly of North American Indians. Chief among these are the Zunis, Mokis and Pueblos to be seen at the Cliff Dwellers Concession.

The North American Indian of the story-books is familiar enough to all Americans, but the Cliff Dwellers descendants have really not been known to the outside world since 1897 when the first effort was made by scientific men to study and describe their manners, habits and customs. This occured at the little settlement of Wolpi, in the so-called Painted Desert of the Colorado in Arizona where the Mokis and Zunis then for the first time consented to dance that miracle working rite known as the Snake Dance. Like all our native races, the Mokis have their priesthood. This is made up of old men who possess the power of divination.

Hokiland is an arid country, rain is scarce and the Mokis and Zunis, never a savage people, live largely by agriculture. Hence the need of rain, hence in the still lapse of ages the cultivation of mysterious rites by which the simple savages of the western continent sought to draw the replenishing waters from the skies to their parched fields. The Snake Dance is that rite. It is danced every year on the 25th day of August at Wolpi in the Painted Desert. After it had been danced, the ceremonial requiring several days of body-racktng labor which no white man would survive, the priests consult and fix a day when rain is asked of their dieties. This rain, strange to relate is never denied the Hoki priests. After their first consultation they annouce the time when their prayers will be answered and lo: unfailingly year after year it rains in Hokiland. The priests, medicine men and dancers use snakes in this dance; not harmless little ones but eight and ten foot rattlers, poison-fanged whose bite would be instant and horrible death to any living white The Indians charm these man. rattlers, they also use gala mon. sters, the very sight of which would give us of Caucasian blood the chill of dissolution. During the dance the priests vex the snakes with feather wands; they tease them to viperous madness and the more the reptiles are aroused say the priests, the surer are the signs of rain. To see the priests and medicine men at the Cliff Dwellers dance all around these

reptiles, knock them about the stage in the Theatre Hoki connected with the Concession until they emit the blood-curdling hiss and then the vipers are at their worst, deftly pick them up and carry them about in priestly mouths is the only sight to be seen at the World's Fair that has not been, in some shape or other exhibited before. Here is a true novelty, one which to witness means to relate to your neighbors, friends and children for many years to come.

This Zuri and Hoki exhibition has attracted scientific men from all parts the world to the Cliff Dwellers Concession. All the big congresses that have convened in the Hall of Congress have had their representatives at these Cliff Dweller dances. The governments of many foreign states have ordered special reports of these eminently curious aboriginal proceedings.

The dances fascinate old and young alike and if there was nothing else whatsoever to be seen in the Cliff Dwellers exhibit, this one act alone would have justified the enormous expense of bringing these natives to St. Louis and building a home for them in which they live just as is their wont on the Mesa out West.

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

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PLEASE TAKE NOTICE.

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Q. What causes petrified wood? A. It is the solidfying of chemical elements, all forms of life come from the same source, but as metals evolve from one form to another becoming higher forms in the process of evolution, so is that which existed as a rock at one time may become gold, in a long process of time, and petrified wood is merely the chemicalization of the atoms that compose the wood, changing it into another form as radium is converted into helium, yet both have the same principle of life. 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

EDITOR JOURNAL:

Some of the Spiritualist papers are publishing articles, as they say from "Master Minds." I make no claim as belonging to such class, possibly however a few thoughts from the servant or slave class may serve to give variety to the menu of the table; Spiritualistic, as weekly prepared in the PHILO-SOPHICAL JOURNAL.

A few words only, I care to say on the hackneyed subject of fraud; all Spiritualists and others, attending materializing, trumpet, or slate writing seances should insist on strict test conditions, if the medium refuses these, do not patronize such mediums the second time, and persuade others to do likewise; this is the quickest and surest way to break up fraud mediumship; if people will not do this, they have no right to complain of fraud. To my mind there are questions affecting Spiritualism far more seriously and vitaly than the fraud question; Spiritualism came to earth to redeem its people from ignorance, error, poverty and crime, it has done much toward the abolishing ignorance and falsehood, what has it done toward the abolition of poverty and crime? little or nothing. The cause of these curses are untouched; few Spiritualist speakers or writers touch upon the primary cause of poverty and crime; why is this? are they fearful of popular opinion? or do they lack the inspiration so vitaly essential to the times in which we live? Under the system in which we live, one man in 40 years is said to have accumulated a thousand millions of dollars, this man has a year old grand daughter, who inheriting this billion of dollars will at the age of 75 years, at present rates of interest own and control thirty two billions worth of property, meantime other individuals are accumulating proportionately, and 60 years hence 90 per cent. of the property of the nation will be in the hands of 3 per cent. of the people; such a condition means abject slavery, for the masses and sensuous luxury and debauchery

for a few masters, and more, it means the loss of national spirit, and death to patriotism. Are we not following in the foot-

steps of ancient India, giving our central and chief thought to the mere occult, and neglecting the industrial and material, which practically constitutes the foundation of all mental, moral, and spiritual activity.
