JEWISH PASTOR DOES NOT BELIEVE IN ORTHODOX HELL.

The Rev. Dr. Bernard M. Caplan of Sacramento has been chosen rabbi of the Bush street temple. The election was made at a meeting of the congregation. He delivered his first sermon at the regular Sabbath service August 6th, taking as the subject "What is Religion?"

Rabbi Caplan was educated in the public schools of New York City and holds the degrees of B. A. and M. A. from Columbia College He pursued special studies in ethics, philosophy, iliterature and education, and later was graduated from the Jewish Theological College of New York. For five years he was rabbi of the leading Jewish congregation in Canada, where he was also Dominion chaplain. He came to Sacramento about two years ago and has ministered there with much success.

In a recent sermon Rabbi Caplan started his congregation by denying the existence of an orthodox hell. He said that it was true that the horrrors of hell were in a way a power for good, as they served to enforce obedience to the moral law, but they were like heavy chains on the human soul, crushing out his freedom, its joy and its true moral beauty. He argued that the belief in hell was inconsistent with the idea of God's love and goodness. The rabbi said he could not love a God who would permit men, women and children to be tortured by fire or in any other way. The ethical idea of punishment was to prevent evil, he said, but not to avenge it.

Rabbi Caplan is only twenty-nine years of age. He succeeds the Rev. Isidor Myers, who resigned from the congregation some time ago.—S. F. Ex.

COLD STORAGE APPLES.

The conditions under which the prolonged storage of apples may be successfully carried out has been studied during the past two years by the United State Department of Agriculture, and the cold storage of apples has now made this fruit available practically the whole year around.

Several hundred different varieties were stored in order to make the tests. It appears that there is no difficulty whatever in storing apples in the autumn and keeping them until late the following spring. All that is apparently necessary is to keep on equable temperature; just about freezing point is the most satisfactory.—Scientific American.

Q How is it that before one is dead, their spirit can appear elsewhere?

A. Because they are just as much spirit in the body as out, nothing is impossible to spirit whether embodied or disembodied. It isn't the flesh that manifests, it's the spirit or llfe within it, for when the spirit takes it's departure the body is powerless to act, or perform its usual functions, that proves its the spiritual essence that animates and manifests through the physical, and people who are still living, do appear in their spirit form to friends etc. Many sensitives go out of the body hundreds of times and as long as the current is not detached from the body, they can return at will.

Q. Do the spirits advocate vegetarianism?

A. Most assuredly yes; fruits, vegetables and cereals are the most nutritious and spiritual diet, it is not right to murder animals and eat their bodies for subsistence. People want to become spiritual and be unimpeded in their growth, and yet partake of the coarse decaying flesh of pigs and other animals. Every particle of flesh of the cow is poisoned from the fear she suffered when butchered. Fear. is what causes a cow to bawl, just before slaughtered, animals sense danger more readily than people do. The time will come when human beings will rise to such spiritual vibrations that they cannot partake of the slaughtered remains of their animal friends, any more than they would wish to eat one another, they will develop such strong love for everything that has the principle of life within it.

So many suffer from deranged stomachs etc., just from improper food, excessive coffee drinking clogs the liver and blood, and meat is worse, clear pure water is the best drink, and while we cannot lay down any special rules, for what is good for one is not good for another yet gradually as people evolve into higher grades of unfoldment, they will not desire coarse flesh foods and hearty drinks.

Q. How do the laws of life differ

A. The laws of life do not differ on other planets. The same laws govern everywhere, in all worlds, but different planets are under different degrees of unfoldment and enlightenment, but all are as one system, whose motor power is the same. That which this planet throws off in its great revolutions is gathered up by the law of attrac-

tion and in time goes toward the production of other worlds yet to be, and they become more perfected as time rolls on and it takes many decades before they are inhabitable by animal or plant life. There are planets which are much more spiritualized and unfolded than the earth, where beings live who are very accomplished and have grand noble characters and aspirations, and some others which are not even ready for animal life yet, but all are governed by the same spirit power.

Q. Did Jesus raised the dead?

A. No, when one is dead, they cannot be brought to life again in the physical body, Jesus worked in accordance with the laws of existence, not against them. No one, not even a Jesus, can go outside or beyond the laws that govern, it would be the same as pushing the world outside of its orbit, everything has a magnetic orbit, human beings as well, and everything has to be done within that orbit or vibration. Jesus simply recalled the spirit into the body, which had been held in a comatose or trance condition, because he had the knowledge of the law, had the silver chord that holds the spirit to the physical form been detached, Jesws nor anyone else could have raised the "dead."

DARK OBSESSING SPIRITS AND THE DEMONISM OF THE AGES.

Such is the title of a brand new book of four hundred pages, elegantly bound, and fresh from the brain and facile pen of Dr. Peetles, known because of his extensive travels as the 'spiritual pilgrim.'

This bulky, thought provoking volume is unlike any other book of its contents ever brought before the public by a Spiritualist writer.

It takes spirit communion to have been a fact, a scientifically established truth under some name in all past historic time. Hence, the book deals with demoniac spirits in China India, Korea, Europe, and in this country from the witchcraft period in New England to the present, and as often manifest among Spiritualists and undeveloped mediums and sometimes pronounced insanity.

The twenty-four letters from obsessed persons are as thrillingly as painfully interesting.

Here are the headings of some of the thirty-three chapters constituting the book:—

"Evil Spirts and their Influences; Demoniac Obsessions in China; Hindoo Demonism; Judean Demonism; The Haunting Places of Evil Spirits; Pitiful Letters from Obsessed Persons; Obsession Witch craft and Insanity; Shall We Pray for Wicked Obsessing Spirits; What These Lower Demon Spirits Say About Themselves, Etc.

Chapter twenty-nine treats of An Obsessing Spirit Forced Away From His Victim and Imprisoned. Rescue Work on the Borderland: Spiritualism versus Spiritism; Etc.

Here follow several quotations from this new book:—

"This commercial, promiscuous spiritism is a bane and a menace to a true rational and scientific Spiritualism."

This is what an intelligent spirit (see page three hundred and four) says of the philosophy of obsession:

"Psychically clinging to an individual for a time, this spirit, either ignorant or malicious, becomes magnetically and sympathetically so much a part of his or her obsessed life that whatever the person does or thinks, this spirit entity enters still further into relationship with the party, so that ere long it finds itself almost a real

part and factor of the person's life, with many associations to stimulate it to continue in mortal flesh.

Later this familiar or obsessing spirit finds itself in touch with the nerve centers of the brain, still retaining its personality to a certain extent, and when augumented by other entities, they gradually come into full power, swaying the persons mind till it becomes a center for their work, and sometimes for demoniac work and for insanity.

At this stage individuality is impinged upon, if not invalidated, and subjected to a condition so dark that outside guardian influences fail to release the conscious imprisoned spirit. This depends upon the will—the stubborn wills of the obsessing demons. Angels even, are not infinite in power. The most exalted spirits and circles of spirits are neither omniscient nor almighty in power.

We venture to say that this most interesting book will call out some sharp if not severe criticism, especially from such Spiritualists as Mrs. Richmond and Mr. Colville, who believe that there are no evil or evil-disposed spirits in the next stage of existence.

While this volume contains many harrowing tales of low obsessing spirits, it also contains many beautiful passages, here is one:—

"While in foreign lands where Gods' were born I had quenched my thirst at many fountains, I still sought for more crystal waters. Feasting at many luxuriant banquets, I still hungered for that inspirational bread that comes daily out of heave; listening to the solos and orchest as that cheer church and palace, cried out all the more for those fascinating melodies that thrill with joy and ecstasy unspeakable, the blessed homes of the angels.

Earth's incompleteness saddens, tires me. Tarry not, O beautiful death angel, for under your mask is the majesty of immortality. Often the restful face of the corpse is wreathed in a subdued smile, caused by a rift in the cloud, a glimpse of loving, waiting spirit friends, this is the glorious victory of Spiritualism."

DESCRIBES A VISION SEEN AT A LONG DISTANCE.

Toledo (Ohio), August 7.—Long before time for services to begin tonight the East Broadway Church was packed to the doors. Outside a crowd was awaiting for an opportunity to see Earnest Case, the wonderful "man of visions".

DEvery car brought more and pe-

destrians flocked from all parts of the compass. But they were in a measure doomed to disappointment. Earnest Case is just recovering from a severe illness and is a common workingman. He was so nervous and ill he dared not undertake to address the people, but promised to do so in two weeks. At the last moment he feared to face so large a crowd in his weakened condition. A wonderful thing occured to him this week, as related by the Rev. Mr. Shupp tonight in the pulpit and vouched for by several ministers and others.

While sitting at the home of a friend he remarked that a certain man, naming him, whom he had not seen in many years, was just taking the train at Fostoria, thirty-five miles distant to come to Toledo to see him. He related just what conversation he had with brakemen and conductor on entering the train, which has today been verified to a word.

CHRIST.

Mr. John Murphy in the Jour-NALS of July 16th and 23rd seems to know a great deal about Christ; and as the book of Mathew which is the oldest and most authentic, gives two statements, as to the birth and parentage of Christ.

In the first chapter, Mathew gives his genealogy from Abraham down, through David to Joseph making him lineal descendant of these two great men, and again, in the same chapter he says: when Joseph took Mary to wife, she had already been espoused by some one, not himself, and when he was about to put her away privately: the angel of the Lord told him not to do so, for what was of her was of the Holy Ghost (or words to that effect.)

Now as these two accounts of his parentage are contradictory and exactly at variance with each other; for if he was a decsendant of Abra-

ham, David and Joseph, he could not possibly have been of the Holy Ghost, and is he not frequently referred to in others chapters of the Testament as the son of David? and if of the Holy Ghost, he could not have be ena descendant of Abraham and David.

So one of these two statements if not both, must be false. Therefore will Mr. Murphy please inform us which of the two is correct and if one is false what evidence can be produced that both are not false? and I ask all the readers of this article to also read the first chapter of Mathew and judge for themselves.

Again supposing Mr. Murphy to be a Spiritualist and more or less associated with mediums, and as we have had communications from spirits of men who lived on earth long before Christ, as well as since: and have, or could have from the spirits of people who were his cotemporarys in life and knew him face to face on earth; why have we not had communications from Christ himself or his contemporary's?

What does Christ say of himself, or his cotemporarys, who new him, say of his parentage? and if communications were had with the spirit of Pontius Pilate himself; is he not sure that he would say that he knew no such person as christ, and never sat upon any such trial as is accorded to him in the Testament? for, I feel sure that he would.

Mr. Murphy thinks it strange that men will believe the history's of such men as Solomon, Aristotle, Solon. Lycurgus, Pythagours, Plato and others, and are reluctant to accept the history of Christ.

The reason of this is, there is no conflicting statements about the birth and parentage of these men as of Christ; their history or their own writings in life, or their contemporaries in life have been left to identify them; their lives were not written as Christ's, God, or the son of God, centuries after their death by Christian Monks and forced upon the people as was Christ.

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
