OUR NEXT DOOR NEIGHBORS.

The more sensitive the mortal the more likely is he to have the very experiences we are seeking. But, usually, these very experiences are gained when he is most abnormal. Such a sensitive is generally unfortunate in his relation to our every day life, so is at once counted as a mere visionary, and his statements are viewed with a suspicion and doubt that destroys their value. For such reasons many an author whose works we gladly lend to some investigating friend utterly fails to convince the

sceptic, who merely sneers at our easy confidence in statements that are not supported by evidential proof. So we find ourselves to-day largely basing our beliefs on evidence either so personal we cannot present it to others, or else sadly destitute of proofs which alone could satisfy the honest but critical unbeliever. For such reasons a book recently written by a trained lawyer has a value not possessed by any other work known to the present writer. The author kept a diary of his experiences through several years with the needed names, dates, and names of witnesses now living; and although to himself much he has written must be humiliating, it is still a record of an honest man of over-confidence in spirit friends. These visitors proved themselves as honest and truthful as himself, but ultimately failed in the work they had enthusiastically commenced. The phenomena produced were startling and convincing, even to hardened sceptics, as proof of spirit power and presence. The name of the book is "Death: the Meaning and result." Its author is John K. Wilson, a member of the Pennsylvania bar. It is published at Lily Dale, N. Y., and is, I presume, for sale wherever such works are held in stock.

I am not proposing to criticise the work. Every reader who chooses can do that for himself. But I propose to use its statements of fact in this article, because I know of no other similar experience which would not be counted as too personal for publication. Its real value for this purpose is that it presents facts which are really glimpses of the life lived by those who are only seperated by a degree or two of temperature from our world of to day.

LESSONS ON THE BIBLE

PREPARED BY MOSES HULL.

MR. EDITOR, the following is an abbreviation of one of our lessons in the Morris Pratt School Bible class—the lesson promised your readers week before last. I hope it may at least start your readers to thinking along the lines here marked out.

Q. 1.—What is there in Matthew and Luke that is not in Mark?

A.—The stories of the birth of Jesus and the miracles connected with that supposed event. The genealogy of Jesus, the killing of little children by Herod, the flight of Jesus' parents into Egypt, and other things related by either Matthew or Luke, or both of them, have been omitted by Mark.

Q. 2.—Do Matthew and Luke differ in their records of these supposed events?

A.—Yes, in many instances their records are utterly irreconcilable.

Q. 3.—State some of the differances in their records of events which occurred in the birth and childhood of Jesus.

A.—The differences are numerous. Here are a few of the many points.

1. Matthew does not know but that Jesus was born at home in Bethlehem, as, according to his record. Jesus' parents never lived in Nazareth until after their return from Egypt. See Matthew ii. 23. Luke has the parents of Jesus reside in Nazareth, and his birth appears to have been an accident which occurred when they were away from home in Bethlehem, where they had gone to pay their taxes. See Luke i. 31—33.

2. Luke has an angel make the annunciation to Mary, an event of which Matthew knows or, at least, says nothing. Luke ii. 8—14.

3. Luke tells of the song of the angels heard by the shepherds, an event of which Matthew is apparearently ignorant. Luke ii. 8—14.

4. The words of Simeon and those of Anna the prophetess are told by Luke. Matthew appearently knows nothing of the existence of such people. Luke ii. 25—36.

5. Matthew tells of Joseph taking his wife and child Jesus and going down into Egypt, an event of which

Luke knew nothing. On the contrary, Luke has the child Jesus at the age of twelve years in the temple in Jerusalem asking and answering questions. Matthew ii. 11—13. Luke ii. 46—52.

6. Matthew has Herod kill all the babies two years old and under. Of this terrible slaughter Luke knew nothing. Matthew ii. 16.

7. Matthew has an angel visit Joseph in five different dreams. Of this Luke knew nothing. See Matt. i. 20, ii. 12—22.

8. Matthew tells of a star doing very strange things at the birth of Jesus. See Matt. ii. 16. Of this star and its queer behaviour Luke apparently knew nothing.

9. Matthew and Luke both give the genealogy of Jesus, or rather of Joseph. whom they both deny being his father. Matthew traces this genealogy only to Abraham, in order to prove that Jesus was a descendent of Abraham. Luke supposes that he traces these genealogies back to Adam. These genealogies are not at all alike.

Q. 4.—In what do these genealogies differ?

A.—Matthew has forty-two generations from Abraham to Jesus, while Luke has fifty seven. Luke does not trace the genealogy of Jesus through Solomon as Matthew does, but through Nathan. Luke iii. 31. Matthew 1. 6 Matthew says Joseph was the son of Jacob. Matthew ii. 16. Luke says he was the son of Heli. Luke iii. 2.

Q. 5.—Do Matthew and Luke differ on other points beside those already mentioned?

A.—Yes, they differ in many things which they both relate; besides that, each relates things not related by the other.

Q. 6.—Give us an instance of these differences in their narratives.

A.—The sermon which is commonly called "The Sermon on the Mount." Matthew v. 1. Luke says it was delivered on the plain after he came down from the mount. Luke vi. 1—7.

Q. 7.—What does Luke relate not related by Matthew?

A.—He relates the miracle of the raising of the widow's son from the dead. Luke viii. 11—14. He gives the parable of the Good Samaritan. Luke x. 30—36. He also gives the

parable of the lost sheep, the lost silver, the prodigal son, the nnjust judge, the unjust steward, etc., etc. See Luke xv., xvi., and xvii. Whole chapters. There are many similar instances to these related, but it is thought better to leave them for a future lesson. Perhaps until we get into the book of Luke.

This, reader, is one of the dozens of Bible lessons as presented to the students at the Morris Pratt Institute. If this answers some of the numerous questions which come up in the discussions concerning the birth of Jesus I am content.




