Remarkable Pianiste.

"She is the most wonderful child I ever met, and had I not heard her play I would not have believed what I had been told." Such was Ignace Paderewski's remark during his visit to San Francisco. apropos of the playing of little Phyllida Ashley, a tot of five and a half years, residing with her parents on East 23rd St., Oakland.

The remark means more because Paderewski was pestered to death while he was in San Francisco by the over-ambitious parents of pre-cocious children. There was not an afternoon when the great pianist, tired out from his matinee, was not kept from one to two hours listening to these piano-playing children, until his soul was weary within him. Sometimes the children played at the numbers for which Paderewski is most famous himself, but he was obliged to grind his teeth and endure. He was, however, frank. He warned many of them that they would never be piano-players. To others he held out slight hopes, but of Phyllida Ashley he was enthusiastic.

Fleet F. Strother, who was a prominent figure in San Francisco municipal affairs for many years, has passed to spirit-life.

Mr. Strother came to San Francisco in 1864, accompanied by his wife. Soon after his arrival he engaged in business as a stock broker. In the years when the shares of the Comstock mines were booming, Mr. Strother accumulated a considerable fortune. At the same time he was devoting himself to literary pursuits and the study of the law, so that when the market began to show signs of weakness he was able to retire from the field of speculation and enter practice as an attorney. He was thrice elected Supervisor and served three terms as City Auditor.

Mr. Strother was in ill health for several months, and a severe attack of pneumonia ended his physical life. He leaves a widow, but no children. He was a native of Washington, D. C., aged 61 years.

life and such a world. This something has come from the spiritual nature of men and women, which ever seeks to overcome the material. It is the inner divine consciousness asking for truth, asking for light and knowledge upon this all-important question.

Unfortunately, the great mass of the human family are so engrossed in the material wants and cares of their earthly existence that they allow their material desires to have the supremacy over the spiritual; their spiritual natures are allowed to starve for want of spiritual truth and knowledge, and yet there is in every person—no matter how indifferent they may appear to be—a divine spark from the great infinite soul of the universe, which some time or other will try to make itself felt in the individual's life. That, divine spark is an unquenchable fire, a spark from the eternal creative life forces of the universe, and it will make itself felt to every person sooner or later. It may lie dormant for years; it may seem to be almost crushed out by material prosperity and the grosser needs of the physical body; but some time or other, when a dear relative or friend passes out of that individual's life, then that spark will make itself felt and demand recognition. Then when the loss of that relative or friend is keenly felt, the spiritual nature will demand food of a spiritual kind. The questions which will arise and demand an explanation are such as these: "Where is my friend? Is the grave the final end and goal of all human aspirations, hopes and labor? Are we all simply perishable material manifestations which come upon the scene of action, the earth-life, and then after awhile drop into oblivion?

Is there another world, a spiritual world: another life, a spiritual life; another body, a spiritual body? Where shall we go to have these questions answered? Is there any way by which the misty veil of the future can be at least partially torn aside and our eyes, ears and other organs of sense satisfied of future life? To all these questions the answer comes: "Prove all things. and hold fast that which is good." But how are we going to prove? The answer comes: By the development of your spiritual natures." Take the advice of St. Paul to the Corinthians: "Cultivate charity and desire spiritual gifts." In other words, have charity in your souls for those who have thoroughly investigated this matter. Then do as they have done—cultivate your spiritual powers, investigate spiritual manifestations, read up and educate yourself in the spiritual philosophy.

Give your loving friends upon the spirit side of life a chance to return to you. By refusing to investigate spirit manifestations and by neglecting to cultivate your spiritual powers, you shut the door and refuse to admit those who desire to show their continued love for you, and who are trying to prove to you that they still live and take an interest in your welfare.

If you were to go to a strange city and you had friends in that city whom you wished to communicate with, but they refused to answer your knock at the door, how would you feel? How must our spirit friends feel when they came to our homes and lovingly try to impress us in some way with their presence and we turn a deaf ear to them? We refuse to listen to their knocks for admission by

ignoring mediumship, by ignoring family circles for investigation.

A properly conducted family circle is the most sacred, as well as the most pleasing institution on earth. There broken families can be reunited, the spirit members uniting with those who are still in the flesh.

There, love is shown to be continuous as well as life, and the door of communication between the two worlds kept regularly opened. But someone will ask: How can we open this door? By what means can we be made conscious of our loved one's presence? The answer comes: By the development of the spiritual faculties, the same as we are made cognizant of the presence of material things by the organs of physical sense. Spirit communication with mortal can be demonstrated in so many ways, and new phases of mediumship are constantly showing forth, therefore it is impossible to clearly enumerate all. But a few of the principal phases of mediumship will be explained briefly.

Mediumship, or the development of powers for spiritual communication, consists of two distinct classes termed, mental mediumship and physical mediumship. The principal mental phases are those of clairvoyance, a power of clear seeing, by which the presence of spirit friends is made known, and by which descriptions may be given of such friends. Then comes clairaudience, or clear hearing, a power which enables the possessor to catch sounds of names and messages from the unseen visitors. But these powers in different persons assume different forms and can only be explained by those possessing them, and sometimes it is a matter of extreme difficulty for mediums themselves to make themselves or their phase of mediumship understood. Then there are the phases of inspirational speaking, writing, music, painting and other powers, which prove outside help from higher intelligences. Impressions, dreams, visions, automatic writing, trance mediumship and many other forms of a mental character.

There are probably but a very few families in which some kind of mental mediumship could not be developed if they would give the subject a reasonable amount of time and attention, and much pleasure and satisfaction would come to them from such development.

Besides the mental phases of mediumship already mentioned, there are a number of manifestations which come under the head of physical mediumship. Among those most commonly produced are the moving of tables, furniture and other objects by a power beyond that of the sitters; raps which respond to questions given by those present. Then independent voices are sometimes heard; also telegraphic raps which give intelligent communication to those who understand the telegraphic code; musical instruments which float through the air, at the same time keeping time and tune with those present who sing familiar tunes. Again, there is the very convincing phase of receiving independent slatewriting in broad daylight; also occasionally the wonderful phenomena of materialization where the previously unseen visitor takes on a temporary material appearance visible to all present.

Surely this is a grand work and worthy of our best thought and most earnest effort, to so develop the latent spiritual powers which

are our divine birthright and inheritance, that we may be able to satisfy ourselves of the presence of our angel visitors, and demonstrate to a world of sorrow-stricken mourners that life is continuous and fear of the grave has been swallowed up in victory. And then above and beyond all these manifestations which prove to us the certainty of a life beyond the confines of earthly existence, we have the opportunity of gaining knowledge of our future from those whose experience in the spirit-life enables them to become teachers to those who still inhabit earthly tabernacles.

This knowledge can be gained in no other way but by coming in touch with our friends who have had actual experience. Then why should we hesitate about commencing our investigations? Why not avail ourselves of the opportunity to come into communication? Many difficulties may present them-selves at first; mistakes may occur, as in all the avenues for gathering knowledge; but if we will be patient, if we will perseveringly investigate, the door of knowledge will be opened unto us. Wisdom will be given, which is far above the price of rubies, and a satisfaction will come to us which can be gained in no other way. We shall add to our faith, knowledge; we shall know, "There is no death; what seems so is transition."— Republican.

Ohio Convention.

The Ohio State Spiritualist Association held its annual convention at Columbus, opening on May 23, Hon. E. W. Bond in the chair. Among those present were Hon. Harrison D. Barrett, president of the National Association, and Dr. J. M. Peebles of Battle Creek, Mich.

Mayor Samuel Swartz gave an address of welcome. He humorously referred to the fact that while acting as Police Judge, not having, to his knowledge, a Spiritualist before him for trial during his entire term. "His Honor" took his seat amid a round of applause.

It was decided that the next meeting should be held in Cleveland in October, at the same time as the national convention. At this assemblage the place for the next annual session will be decided upon. The following officers were elected for the coming year:

President, Thomas A. Black, Cleveland; vice-president, W. V. Nicum, Dayton; second vice-president, C. H. Mathews, New Philadelphia; secretary, John C. Hemmeter, Cleveland; treasurer, Carrie Firth Curran, Toledo; delegates—W. J. Hull, Columbus, and G. B. Gould, Cleveland; alternates—Mrs. Zetta L. Eise, Cleveland, and Cora Folsom, Toledo; trustees—J. B. Townsend, Lima; E. A. Kibby, Columbus; E. W. Bond, Willoughby, and H. H. Baxter, Ashley.

The following was adopted: Resolved, That the officers of this association make an effort at the next session of the State Legislature to have enacted, a measure making it a misdemeanor to practice mediumship in the State of Ohio for pay, unless such persons possess a certificate of indorsement from the officers of the Ohio State Spiritualists' Association as to their worthiness, etc.

Resolved, That we are in favor of all reforms, either temporal or spiritual.

Resolved, That 'every person should have the privilege of select-

ing his or her own physician, and therefore, we are opposed to the effort being made to enact so called medical laws at the dictation of the medical fraternity."

"We believe that Church and State should be kept separate; therefore, we deplore all attempts to engraft the word 'God, Christ or Christian' upon the Constitution of the United States."

"That we extend our cordial sympathy to the struggling masses of other countries, as well as our own, in their efforts to achieve larger liberty, a better chance to earn an honest living, thereby to better their condition socially, morally and physically.

"That we are in favor of taxing church property and are opposed to all Sunday laws that are based upon the idea that it is God's holy day."

The ninth section of the resolution reads: "That we hail with joy the rising sentiment in favor of universal peace, manifested at the inception of the recent Peace Congress at The Hague, recognizing thereby peaceful operation between individuals and nations."

To the mass of men this idea lies hidden unknown, often unsuspected, and yet to discern and seize it is the aim of all vital philosophy. To live wholly in it is really the condition of all genuine knowledge and freedom, and is the end of all spiritual and psychic effort in every age with all spiritually-advancing minds.

This view of the universe has such a mass of scientific demonstration and of philosophic and spiritualistic or psychical generalization in its favor that it is coming to be accepted on purely rational grounds, by thoughtful people.

All creation proceeds from the Inner Soul or Spiritual Sun-sphere. The material and spiritual worlds are formed from substances which flow from the Inner light and constitute spheres around it, but perfectly distinct from it. As these substances recede from the Central Life they become less active, their

substances combine and form a grosser substance. 

Self-Reliance.

Mrs. L. E. Rader, in Lucy A. Mallory's monthly gem of "New Thought," offers a suggestion which is worthy of consideration by those who are seeking a solution of social and economic problems:

Instead of wasting time in politics and political reforms, which is like attempting to stay a mighty tide, let us teach humanity to be self-respecting. Let us begin with the little ones, by teaching selfreliance. Let us inculcate the idea that life is not a struggle, with all the odds against them, but, rather, that within each brain lies coiled a magnetic spring which can respond to every heart throb, every desire and every hope. Teach them that thought is the great battery which connects the outer and the inner life; which converts the ideal into the real; which gives us the strength to do and to be.

The New War.

Now that the best intellect of the age has condemned war as we have known it, there has been inaugurated a war in higher realms. The best thought on this subject has been expressed as follows:

The New Dispensation will be established by a war of mental and spiritual forces, in which the higher principles of brotherhood and love will triumph. Wars are destructive, not constructive. Their use is to clear away the rubbish (the fools) to prepare for the new order. Creosote guns, dumdum bullets and lyddite shells are not the weapons of New Dispensationists. Their armor consists of principles. Their weapons are ideas. Those who fail to understand this have not profited much by the teachings of the New Dispensation.

The Right Ring.

We have maintained that no reform has ever been accomplished by statutory law. The American Advocate of Minneapolis, Minn., expresses our sentiments in a short editorial:

Some good people think that the fraternal system will be ushered in by law. In this they are wrong if they refer to man-made law; right if they mean the natural law of growth and development. The fraternal system will begin whenever two or three get together and live a brotherly life. If they are faithful, others will join them. The group will become a dozen, then a score, then three score, then a hundred, then five hundred, then it will become contagious like the small-pox and whole towns and cities will be "down with it" at once. But they will never recover from it. The state will finally succumb, and it will then be discovered that it is—heaven on earth.

The best thought of our day is expressed in these words. One of the very best of our spiritual exchanges gives expression to the following, which we heartily endorse:

We are guided by spiritual undercurrents in all our activities. And yet we are not automatons. It is

man's privilege to co operate with, and actually direct the forces of nature, for man is the ever-destined ruler of all creation; he is God incarnate, the Life-principle individualized. We have nothing to fear. All experiences are valuable. And yet if we are wise we will endeavor to reach the goal of conscious oneness, for nothing else can satisfy the surging desires and love-currents of our being; oneness with all, universal consciousness; and the day of our deliverance from the long dream of separateness may be hastened by our faithful endeavor. The days go on; we are carried by the tide of destiny. The desires of man, like so many electric currents, carry him into the channels of experience which build him up. Oh, long march of existence!

The Question Answered.

We admire frankness, and will acknowledge that this editor of a "new thought" journal called the *Healer* has given expression to the real mental condition of the multitude of writers on occult subjects who have grasped one idea, and think they have a mental mortgage upon the universe.

Do you believe in Spiritualism? This is a question which has been often put to me, and which we now answer. In the first place, what is Spiritualism? We know many so-called Spiritualists, but what is Spiritualism? We do not believe in the Spiritualists; neither do we believe in any particular one's ideas whatever they choose to call themselves. We do not know what Spiritualism is, and we do not believe that any one else knows what it is.

The Names of the Months.

"January was named after the Roman god, Janus; the deity with two faces, one looking into the past and the other gazing forward to the future," writes Clifford Howard, in the June Ladies Home Journal. "February comes from the Latin word februo, to purify. It was customary for the Romans to observe festivals of purification during that month. March owes its name to the old God of War. Among the Saxons this month was known as Lenct, meaning spring, and this is the origin of our word Lent- April was named from the Latin aperio, to open, in signification of the opening of flowers. The Saxons called the month Eastre, in honor of their Goddess of Spring, from which comes our word Easter. May was named after the Roman goddess Maia, and June was socalled in honor of Juno. July was named in honor of Julius Cæsar, and August gets its name from Augustus Cæsar. September is from the Latin septem, seven, this being the seventh month according to the old Roman calendar. October, November and December also retain the names by which they were known under the old calendar, when there were but ten months in the year—octo, novem and decem meaning eight, nine and ten."
