Projected Consciousness.

A lady sojourning in a hotel received a severe nervous attack one day from the sudden appearance of a man's face at the door of the parlor of her suite of rooms, accompanied by the abrupt question: "Are you ready?"

Not long after, wishing to go down, she rang the elevator bell. As the elevator reached her floor, the same face appeared—it was the face of the elevator man--and he asked: "Are you ready?"

Her nervous terror at once returned, and she answered, "No," and returned to her room. The elevator broke on that trip and the operator of it was killed by the fall.

Spirits in a Seminary.

An Episcopal minister died at Benicia, Cal., and was buried there. A few years after, his remains were removed to Nashotah, Wisconsin, he being one of the founders of the theological seminary at that place. After its arrival, the casket containing the remains of Dr. Breck lay for a time in a room on the ground floor of one of the buildings, and watchers sat by it until the time for the reburial came.

On the night before the reburial, one of the watchers was the Rev. Charles P. Dorset, now of Texas, for 15 years rector of St. James' church in Chicago, and a resident of that city from before the fire. His companion was a clergyman, who is at present presiding over a Chicago parish. Along in the hours toward morning, the Chicago clergyman left the building for a little turn in the fresh air, but in a moment came rushing back with the exclamation:

'Dorset, Dorset, the woods are

full of ghosts!"

Both clergymen went out. In every direction through the trees

they saw figures flitting, darting hither and thither in a wild and fitful dance. The clergymen approached the woods, but the figures in front drew back, moving off to the right and left of them. Naturally the clergymen asked themselves: "Are those real men, and, if so, what kind of lonely neighborhood turned out to dance there in the small hours of the morning in the seminary woods?" Were the staid theological students out at that unseemly hour, on a night made solemn as the eve of the second funeral of the founder of their school? And even if farmers or students had been moved to do so

the morning, when the casket was moved, there was a round hole burned right through the floor, on the spot where the casket had stood. A heap of old papers underneath the floor also had been burned. Had fire found its way under the building to this spot in the mass of paper, and so up through the floor? Perhaps. The freaks of the real are often as strange as anything we attribute to the unreal.

But several things must here be noted. If the fire came in under the floor from without, it escaped setting fire to other debris in its transit. Moreover, the appearance

strange a thing, where did they get the untiring strength that made these things in the woods dance so fiercely and so lightly?

The two clergymen did not believe the apparitions were men, nor could they afterward find that any one had been out at that hour or knew of any one who had been abroad in the seminary woods at that time. They were satisfied the figures were ghosts, or that some strange phantasmagoria had deceived not one mind, but two, which an illusion of this sort generally does.

But the strange experience of the watchers had not ended. In

of the hole and the area of the burned paper seemed to indicate that the fire had burned from above downward, like the ray of a burning glass. How did the fire come to burn this hole, apparently from above, directly under the casket, which, it must be explained, rested directly on the floor? No one can answer. No one has yet even hazarded a conjecture to explain this strange occurrence.

But this is not the end of tales of ghosts at Nashotah. At night the faculty of the institution sat in the office of Dr. Gardner, the president, discussing the recent events. Suddenly their discussion was

abruptly terminated by a startling and tremendous racket just outside the door, a clattering and whacking so deafening that it made conversation impossible. Waiting a moment in the vain hope that it would cease, Dr. Gardner threw open the door and looked into the hall. The noise ceased instantly. All was silent in the hall. No one was visible. Whoever it was had taken themselves off with a rapidity that was miraculous. Whoever it was had possessed ears of some sense that made them aware, above the tremendous racket, of the soft turn of the knob of the office door.

After an examination of the premises, Dr. Gardner returned to the office. Whoever the disturbers were they had followed Dr. Gard-ner, unheard, to the door, for hardly had he re-entered the room and seated himself, when the racket began once more just over the threshold. Again the doctor snatched open the door, and the noise ceased instantly and utterly. A third time the noise began, and the doctor spoke out into the empty hall, saying: "If you are gentlemen, you will cease disturbing us."

After the burial of Dr. Breck, a photograph was taken of the cemetery of the seminary. One of the students was the photographer. In the foreground of the picture can be seen two graves, just as they appeared in the cemetery. But at the foot of each grave stands something no visitor has ever seen, and it is to be hoped, for the peace of his mind, none will see. At the foot of one grave stands its occupant, the Rev. Dr. Cole, former president of the seminary, in full canonicals. At the foot of the other grave stands the counterfeit presentiment of its occupant, a lady who, during life, was a great benefactor of the seminary.

When these startling things appeared at the time the photograph was developed, the seminary authorities decided that possibly some well-timed conjunction of sunlight and foliage was the cause of these images; that they had no real existence, but were only shadows. So they had the picture thrown upon a screen by a stereopticon. But the figures only came out more plainly, so plainly that there was no denying that they were the well-remembered features of Dr. Cole and the seminary's benefactor. The possibilities of photography were not so well known then as now.

Sally Eastman.

Some 60 years ago there lived in a rural town in the Granite State, a lady by the name of Sally Eastman. People said she had fits. At church she would sometimes be taken partially, or wholly unconscious, remaining so for days, or weeks, as the case might be, before she became her normal self. At those times she could perform elaborate labor, that at other times she knew nothing about.

In those days ladies spun and wove the cloth to clothe their families. When Sally had her fits (trances) her neighbors would tell her of some difficult pattern that they wanted to have woven. Her ready hands (as we believe, assisted by an angel band) would nimbly start the web in her looms; but when the change passed away, she could do no more, until she became that way again, when she would resume her task, thus continuing until the web was finished.

Whatever she prophesied on such times invariably came to pass. At one time she told her friends that she, herself, would soon take a ride; that her horse would stumble when rising a hill and fall; that beneath his feet would be found many dollars in money. The prophecy proved true, to the letter.

The falling of converts at the Methodist camp-meeting (called at that time the losing of their strength), in which they had beautiful visions of heaven and of the angels, was but the budding of Spiritualism, that blossomed forth through the Fox sisters; that has since mounted the proud horse of Science, and ridden post-haste over both hemispheres, climbed the throne of monarchs, and been the power behind it; entered the sick-room to drive away uisease, lend hand to puzzled physicians, and is marching triumphantly, hand in hand, with skill and power, as we believe, to a grand destiny, to do the healing work that Christ did, as he said: "A greater work shall they do." "Lest we Forget."

Our minds are so much engrossed in the immediate concerns of life that we are apt to forget the grand purposes of life on earth. These remarks are made as introductory to a brief statement of facts concerning the remarkable spirit manifestations that are going on at Spring Hill, Kansas.

For a number of years, a band of spirits had among the leaders, men of well-known character who have removed every doubt as to their identity, notably: Prof. Denton, Dr. Reed, Thomas Paine, Prof. Faraday and many others. Dr. Reed was a skillful chemist while on earth, and has applied his skill in spiritual chemistry so successfully as to utilize the aural emanations of the circle and clothe the attending spirits with some chemical preparation of them so as to make them visible to mortal sight. All that is needed to complete the operation is the presence of a medium to serve as a depository and a channel through which these emanations may pass. Dr. Reed also constructs a larynx (vocal organs) by means of which orations, narratives and experiences of various spirits are given to the circle.

Writing executed with inconceivable rapidity (from 600 to 1200 words in a minute), while at the same time the writer will be talking on a subject entirely different, is a manifestation of spirit power entirely beyond our conception.

Again, pictures—life-size—are executed with the most exquisite skill in the short space of one minute, and are produced as often as once a week, most of which are recognized.

All these operations are carried on by the spirits independent of mortal agency, pure and fresh from the spirit-world. These seances, thus organized, attract many spirits from the higher spheres who see in it an open door and a free platform for the expression of their thoughts.

We have visitors from abroad almost constantly who are allowed to examine the paraphernalia (which consists of dark-colored curtains occupying space on the floor only for a chair and the one who sits on The medium is divested of every thread of white clothing, and yet every materialized form shows white in his clothing; the females in dazzling whiteness; often as many as 20 or 30 at a single seance. The visitors invariably go away 2-11 w satisfied and highly pleased with what they have seen and heard and express a desire and an intention of repeating their visit; Some have obtained portraits of their spirit friends.

This is something, dear reader, that you cannot afford to forget. Every act of your life—whether good or bad—is so much material that goes into your spiritual makeup. You are making conditions while here that will make your weal or woe when you have passed into spirit-life.

In the manner above described, the book, "Rending the Vail," has been produced—a work of the most remarkable character, with not an unmeaning of superfluous word in it. The lessons taught are from competent instructors who have come down the "shining way" to teach us poor benighted souls the grander and higher truths that we so much need.

The same spirit band in the same place (at the house of J. H. Pratt) and the same medium, is engaged in the production of another book whose purpose is to illustrate the principles taught in "Rending the Vail." This is best done by the narration of personal experiences of those who have gone into the other life, and the effects of their earthly career and their influences that tell upon spirit-life. By these we may learn what is best for us to do here. So let us not forget these lessons of the higher life, and thus lose the opportunities so dear and

We read of those who are eager after tests of spirit communion. Here is an opportunity to satisfy their earnest longing. The Sturgis Annual Meeting

It gave us great pleasure last week to attend the Anniversary Meeting, held in Sturgis, Mich., June 16 and 17. Forty-two years ago I delivered the dedicatory address at the opening of this magnificent church edifice. That occasion was one long to be remembered. There were present such distinguished men as Judge Coffinberry, Joel Tiffany, jurist; Selden J. Finney, Frank L. Wadsworth and Giles B. Stebbins (a most valiant defender of the truth now residing in Detroit), and other speakers.

Among the many anniversaries that I have attended in this Southern Michigan city, never was I present at a more earnest, enthusiastic and harmonious meeting than the one just held. The church edifice was packed and Mrs. Sheets was at her best. Her trance addresses under the controlling influence of Ormond, the ancient giver of flowers, were simply magnificent. The singing was very fine and the conference meetings were enthusiastic. The Baptist preacher of the city being present, I made the occasion one of giving the facts, proofs and doctrines of Spiritualism. The platform was beautifully decorated with flowers and palms. It was an occasion long to be remembered.

A most excellent letter was read from Brother R. Spalding of Chicago, who was for many years a resident of Sturgis and a singer in the choir. His soul is still afire with the glories of Spiritualism, and with the living reforms of this present time. Here is a quotation from his letter:

"It is about 50 years since Dr. J. M. Peebles, Giles Stebbins, Warren Chase and Joel Tiffany first stepped. one by one, on to the Spiritualist platform in Sturgis. Tiffany was logical, Finney was eloquent, Chase was sarcastic, Stebbins good and true, but Dr. Peebles was theological, loving and pathetic; and how we used to linger after an address for a hand-shake! I doubt if other speakers could be found who have done so much for the Cause as these workers. Some of them long ago garnered their sheaves, but Dr. Peebles still remains and, we understand, speaks in your convention. Long may this venerable worker be spared to reap the harvest of his toil.

"Truly, he has journeyed a long and dusty road, and many years ago earned the title of 'Pilgrim.' We propose to add another prefix and call him the 'White Pilgrim.' He has seen the result of his early labors, in honest, sturdy Spiritualism all over the world, so rapid has been its growth. It rests with us to evolve some plan for the amelioration of the toiling masses, and render charity unnecessary by releasing for the people those natural opportunities given to man by which to procure the necessities and comforts of life." Is Spiritualism a Sin?

The hostility of the orthodox clergy to Spiritualism is an enigma to me. Why do they denounce it from their pulpits, and consign those who accept it to infamy and unending damnation?

One would think that they would hail with shouts of joy, the advancing proofs that what they have preached, year in and year out, based on faith alone, now is established by overwhelming demonstration! Fact is much better than speculation. Absolute, visible, audible. tangible, reality — such as Spiritualism furnishes to eye, to ear, to sense, and judgment—would seem to be a stronger persuasion to a good life, here; and to the hope of a future life of happiness conditioned upon it, there can be absorbed from sermons on Freewill, Foreordination, Predestination. Infant-damnation; the irrevocable fixity of the spirit's state as death found it, and many other dogmas which have been hammered at on the anvil of many a rustic, as well as cushioned desk, from the era of St. Chrysostom.

But sad as may be their fate, there are many Spiritualists in the pulpits to-day, but they are afraid of the deacons, and dare not avow it. They preach the doctrine, but defame the name. Much as, some hundred years ago, when the savants of France denounced magnetism as a fraud; yet, after a century of demonstration had proved it true, they christen it by another name—hypnotism—and now, all the doctors and learned men of France are enthusiastic hypnotists — nothing but hypnotism. So. sometime in the hereafter, when

another name shall be given to Spiritualism, its doctrines may sweep over the land, with the force and illumination—but not the disaster—of a prairie fire.

Talmage, the orthodox champion, preaches the doctrines of Spiritualism, while he loads the name with obloquy. In his tribute to Neal

Dow he said:

"But he will come back again. 'Yes,' say some of you with Martha about Lazarus to Jesus, 'I know he will rise at the resurrection of the last day.' Ah! I do not mean that. Ministering spirits are all the time coming and going between earth and heaven—the Bible teaches it; and do you suppose the old hero just ascended will not come down and help us in the battle that still goes on? He will!"

Now, that is the very quintessence of Spiritualism; and yet, when he sees the name Spiritualism, he cants his horns like a bull of Bashan at a scarlet banner.

Does not every Episcopalian people and ministers uniting intone these words: I believe in the communion of saints? Nay, more, this is a part of the "Apostle's Creed," so called because its authorship is attributed to the Twelve Apostles, and so has come down to us among the earliest and most generally accepted symbols of the Christian faith. What mean these words? Surely, surely, not that the saints in heaven commune among themselves. No one that believes in heaven ever thought of denying that. They mean that the saintly ones who have left this life, still hold communion with their brethren in the flesh. There can be no other reasonable interpretation.

A great misapprehension prevails in the community generally as to what constitutes Spiritualism. With many people an immense prejudice exists against it-perhaps, I might say, a great fear of it. How astonished many will be when they learn that primitive Christianity, and Modern Spiritualism, are identical. Spiritualism is but a continuation of Scripture and early Christianity. It adopts angelic appearances, and the messages from the spirit-world to mortals in the flesh, as genuine and as actual, and, also, that they did not cease with John, at Patmos, about the year 60 to 80 of our era, but have continued right on-according to the receptivity of the ageto the present time.

It believes that God did not select a few years, nor a few hundred, during which spirits or angels would appear to men to convince them of a spirit-world, and then leave all future ages in darkness. except as hearsay, or a somewhat limited record of a former time, might testify.

It is the same old story: "Neither will they be persuaded, though one rose from the dead."

Still They Come.

The Pittsburg Dispatch tells the following story, which our occult friends will at once proceed to explain as the "operation of the sub-conscious mind," or anything but what it is, viz: spirit control.

There is a woman on the hill who has developed into a spiritualistic medium in spite of herself. Once on a time she visited a neighbor where a little seance was taking place. She had barely gotten into the place when she fell into a trance, and began to talk in strange tongues. She is a little German woman with a thin, piping voice; but when the brawny Scot, or a brawny dead Scot, entered into her, she talked in a deep, rich baritone and with an accent sufficiently pronounced to make Ian Maclaren turn green with envy.

A Fundamental Principle.

We believe that the key to the solution of the problem of life is expressed in these words: "Man is a mental, or spiritual, being." The house in which the real man lives we call a body, and is the expression of the physical plane upon which we are now unfolding. The "philosophers' stone," so long and ardently sought for in ancient times, has, we believe, been found. It is a principle or law of being which is a universal solvent, and can be expressed in these words: "All is mind, or spirit." Spirit is the one substance in the universe, and what we call matter is but the manifestation of mind, or spirit on the physical plane of being.

A materialistic world will be slow to recognize this fact, and acknowledge it, but sooner or later this law will be recognized, and the liberty bell of truth will ring out the death knell of superstition and mystery.

The science of life can never be established until the unit of all things be discovered, and made the

basis of calculation. We have no desire to be dogmatic, but simply suggestive. The awakening of thought in the minds of the people we hold to be one of the functions of the spiritual press.

We Deny it.

Many correspondents of the Spiritualist press, as well as some of those who write editorials for their columns, seem to take special delight in referring to organized Spiritualism as a "tottering, decaying household," declaring that we must all become State Socialists, go into politics, and make laws for the reformation of the economic conditions of the world. We have yet to hear of a case where either individuals or communities have been reformed by law or politics.

Reformation is a mental process, and must begin in the minds of the people. This process is constantly going on through the efforts of the Spiritualist press, platform and mediums, and at no time in the last half century has the outlook been so bright or less reason for "calamity howling."

Dr. Pirogoff, of St. Petersburg, who was regarded by his contemporaries as "the very incarnation of expert science and methods of thought," in his posthumous memoirs affirms his belief in "An intelligent Universe and the activity of forces working in it harmoniously and intelligently."

His Ego is "an embodiment of a common universal mind, infinite and eternal; which rules and governs the ocean of life, directing the forces and elements toward the formation of organisms."

A Mistaken Idea. — Walter Howell, in answer to a question in the *Two Worlds*, says:

It is a gratuitous assumption to suppose that the theater or opera house is the resort of wicked spirits. Bad people go to church as well as to the theater and good people are to be found in all of them. If undeveloped spirits happen to be in a theater, do you not think there are good plays and noble actors and actresses, who help to enlighten and uplift the benighted souls congregated there? If the theatre is not what it should be, why patronize the good plays, and help show that the most moral plays pay the best.




