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

## EDITORIAL

NCE MORE we sit down to write an editorial; but this time we are stumped. There are times when we don't have the foggiest idea of what to write when we sit down, but we just begin, and something comes out. Sometimes it is good, sometimes mediocre. sometimes bad. Today we can't risk that sort of procedure, because if we do, what comes out will be the bitterest words of a lifetime, Ray Palmer is a Leo, Leo people are never bitter. No matter what happens to them, they bounce right up off the floor with a grin, and start over. So, in order to keep astrologers from tearing out their hair, trying to figure out what malific planet is kicking up its heels in Ray's Moon or his Sun, we'll try to avoid this problem by being very careful of what we write.

Before beginning this editorial, it might be a good idea to learn what an editorial is. So, let's go to old faithful, the dictionary. Let's see: "Editorial - written or sanctioned

by an editor; as, editorial policy. An article in a newspaper or magazine giving the editor's views; or those of the person or persons in control of the paper.'

For goodness sake! Is THAT what an editorial is?

For thirty years your editor has been writing editorials, and he has never really known what it was that he should have been writing! "Editorial policy." That must mean like "playing politics" and advising the readers to vote for Joe because the editor of the paper thinks he's the man for the job, and he writes an "editorial" to sway the judgment of the voter. Or maybe it's like saying to the reader: "We publish certain articles and reject because....' How about "giving the editor's views"? This editor's readers are always accusing him of keeping his REAL views to himself. Maybe he's never come out and spoken "editorially" about his views. Maybe he should? But no! Down that road today lies a

40-year cul-de-sac, a blind alley! Let's skip that definition!

Come to think of it, your editor has always wondered about other editors and why they wrote as they did. For instance, there is the editor (who apparently is in the great majority) who keeps a newspaper clipping file, and when it comes time to write his editorial, he selects a few timely and interesting bits of news and makes some kind of comment on them, possibly giving his opinion, or maybe merely putting a question mark after each of them. He sort of "picks the brains" of other people, and fills his portion of the magazine with "interesting material". Next there is the editor who believes that because he is the editor, his mission in life is to "sway the public" along specific roadways of "opinion". He tries to "mole" the thinking of his readers, pointing in a specific direction, often with a definite "axe to grind". He is really the enemy of free thinking, free speech, because he uses his position in a sort of power ploy. He is really taking unfair advantage, because he has the podium and it is unapproachable by the "opposition". Then there is the editor who is really looking at sales figures, and every wordhe says is designed to "sell" his product; so he acts as a sort of "contents page", and repeats item for item what is in this issue, and tells you how good it is, and why you are lucky to

have the opportunity to read it because he is such a wonderful procurer of the "things you should read". There is, lastly, the editor who never says anything that could be controversial, and is careful to offend no one. He sits on the fence, not in an editorial chair. He is a despicable coward. He contends that the customer is always right, and he will never disagree with him. He will weasel first one way, then the other - just so he cannot be criticized, and can always claim to be that wonderful "guiding light" who maintains true and honorable neutrality.

Are those the kind of editorials we must resort to, this time, to prevent that tremendous backlash that has been building up in this editor for nearly two years? It would seem so, but first, let's put into words what Ray Palmer has always thought an editorial was. First, he has believed that while the rest of the magazine belongs to the readers, these few pages in the front belong to him. They are where he can "get into the act", and be a part of the magazine, and "one of the gang". In the editorial, he can get up out of his "Editorial Chair" and leave his Lofty Sanctum Sanctorum, so as to put himself on even terms with the readers, who are his friends. In the editorial he can speak from his heart, make lasting friendships, mingle and learn by the wonderful opportunity he has to be the recipient of the thoughts, opinions, learning, experience and good will of many thousands of people.

Let's go back to the dictionary and quote the final definition we neglected (purposefully) to mention, 'That definition is: "A leader". There we have the crux of Ray Palmer's entire conception of an "editorial". An editorial is not a "leading", it is a sharing! Because your editor happens to be in the "seat of authority" gives him no license to lead you! He would not "influence" you in spite of yourself. He would not attempt to "sway you, or your vote". He would not attempt to play god, and use the word editor as a "title". He would not "lord it over you". He WOULD share his magazine with you, and he WOULD use his portion of it to make friends with you, and to gain, with you, all the knowledge that can be gained by sharing experiences, theories, ideals, and ideas.

Do you know why Ray Palmer is editor of magazines like SEARCH, Flying Saucers, Forum, The Hidden World, Space World, Amazing Stories, Fantastic Adventures, Universe, Science Stories, Other Worlds, Mystic, Fate - and books like "Other Tongues, Other Flesh": "He Walked The Americas'': "'I Remember Lemuria''; "Beyond Tomorrow"; "Gods Or Spacemen?"; "The Ancient Atlantic"; "A Doctor Is Born"; "Coming Of The Saucers"; "Flying Saucer

Pilgrimage''; "The Advent Of The Cosmic Viewpoint"; and many others?

Because he believes in them!

Because Ray Palmer believes that a man must do what he thinks is important, and what he enjoys doing, and what will do the most good for the most people.

Ray Palmer believes that "truth" is important, But "truth" placed in 'quotes, because "truth" is not always (or never?) definable. It usually means what we believe to be true, but can't really prove to be true. And here is where one of the initial problems comes up; everybody. "believes" in one thing or another, or many things. And it is just that - belief. True, it is reinforced by "evidence", by "facts", by demonstrable and re-"laboratory" experipeatable ments. All of these things depend on "acceptance", of course, and this acceptance is guided by our "reason" and by "logic". But in the final analysis, what we arrive at as "truth" is really only "opinion". And it is acceptable to many of us to a degree of 100%, depending on how closed our minds are, or a lesser percentage, depending on whether we write the word like this: "truth"; or this: truth.

When it comes to the editorial "opinion" that the editor expresses, it generally turns out to be what that editor deems to be truth. The very connotation of the word editorial means that this truth, is written without quotation marks. It is "authority", editorial leadership.

Your editor has always stopped short of writing truthful editorials. He has preferred to be truthful in labeling his opinions "truth". He has, in fact, insisted that nothing he says be accepted, only considered! Because, more than anyone else, he knows that he is MORE THAN LIKELY, wrong! If not entirely wrong, possibly better than 50% wrong. If you must have a figure, he thinks that perhaps he MIGHT be 10% right. He hopes so, because he considers that a very good percentage!

But you, the readers, put quotes around "editor"! You don't really believe him when he says he is not using his high position to "lead" you. You strongly suspect that he might just be USING you, to make You say, because he money! charges a fee for his magazines and his books, that is actually his motive. He is out to make a buck, Just the other day a reader called on us - a man named Shanon. He makes a practice of going around speaking on the very subjects in this magazine. And, he told us, there was one thing he heard whereever he went - Ray Palmer must be very wealthy; so why is he always talking about his money troubles, and conning his readers for more and more money?

. Psychometrist Dorothy Lauer

says we SHOULD be rich, but we let money slip through our fingers. Is that really what she means? Is she saying that Ray Palmer should NOT let money slip through his fingers, but should actually make himself rich by being more practical with his money?

Let's see what we would logically do, if we decided right now to "make money". First, we would discontinue SEARCH. It has NEVER made money! Now, this would be hard to do, because we happen to LOVE the magazine, and the people who read it. To give them up would be a hardship we would not like to endure. Another thing we would do is, NEVER, under any circumstances, publish ANYONE ELSE's books (such as Bryant Reeve and his two wonderful books) because paying an author royalty adds to the cost of the book, and in fact, in this particular case, was a matter of "letting money slip through our fingers", because while we took in thousands of dollars (the money Lauer is always predicting will come to us - and it does!), we paid it out! We should have kept it! We should have given Bryant and his lovely wife a "contract" with all the fine print that other publishers give to authors, so that they wind up with a pittance, because every conceivable cost is charged to the author; telephone calls, postage, picking up the tab at a restaurant when wining and dining a critic, gasoline, wear and tear on tires, etc.

Did you know that we DON'T HAVE A CONTRACT with L. Tavlor Hansen on "He Walked The Americas", and also copyrighted it in the AUTHOR'S name, so that it is legally the author's SOLE notwithstanding the property, months and months of work your editor put into the book which has resulted in it being acclaimed a "work of art" by several of the world's leading universities? But the author will receive a good income for the rest of the author's life! Actually, we will NOW give the author a contract, but it wasn't (and isn't) necessary, because we are FRIENDS, and we TRUST each other. But of course, it SHOULD be made legal.

If we wanted to make money, we would write our OWN books. Ray Palmer has a great talent for writing books. Also, he could be a clever thief - he could steal your idea, your book, paraphrase it, publish it under his own name, and you couldn't do a thing about it, because there would not be seven consecutive words identical to your manuscript (that's the legal definition of plagiarism). Or, considering that he was honest, and wrote his own books, he could save the "middle man" and the royalty. Oh, he could be so very business-like and practical, and never let a dime pass through his fingers.

Instead, however, he pours out these "books" in editorials, in answers to your letters, inarticles in the magazine, all FREE. He WASTES his material in this way, instead of being canny, and putting it into a book and selling it to you.

Because your editor believes himself to be your friend, he has recently decided that he WILL tell you his opinions, and give you his "truths" as he sees them. One result of that decision was the formation of the new magazine. FORUM. In it, we are having an exchange of minds like nothing we've ever had before. And the results have been very encouraging (but NOT from a money standpoint! We realize now that THIS is one of the SURE losing propositions!). We are encouraged because a hard core of original subscribers swear by the magazine. It is a money loser because there are shockingly too many who REALLY DIDN'T WANT THE TRUTH! In fact, if you give them the truth, they will renounce their friendship. If you persist in giving them the truth, they will even go so far as to KILL YOU, if that is the only way to shut you up!

You don't believe that?

In this business, we have always run up against a certain percentage of "nuts", of people actually insane. They are a danger that we have always recognized. We have had some narrow escapes. And we have learned to detect the symptoms in-

stantly, and be on our guard. But an insane person can be dealt with. You KNOW the danger he represents. But 'you DO NOT KNOW the danger that exists in the act of a "friend"! He may not kill you, but he certainly will hurt you! In actuality, he has NEVER believed you. He has been the kind of a person who says (in effect): "I have an open mind. I will listen to your opinions and respect them. Until they disagree with mine - then it is YOU who has the closed mind! And this I will not tolerate!

This editor could explain to you in detail the events of the past two years. But that would present us with a paradoxical "Leo". So we'll leave it all remain a mystery, and ask only one question: Is it really important that a man make money? Should he lock himself in a single room like a miser-hermit, and proceed to prostitute his talents for the almighty dollar?

Could it be that Ray Palmer has been wrong all along, and that there's no room in this world for a "slap happy" Martian? -- Rap.

#### THE SIGNS OF THE ZODIAC



Anthony on the dashboard of his car will save his life if that car crashes into a wall at 70 mph?

Well, it's easy to crack jokes about Catholicism and other Christian religions. They're such an easy and inviting target.

But the truth is there's nothing funny about the actual effect of religion on young people.

I believe it is the conflict between the hogwash of religion and the reality of the world's present mess that has so many teenagers in rebellion.

First, let's look at the teen image.

Some adults can't understand why high school and college kids engage in pot parties, promiscuity and a headlong search for reality through misbehavior.

"Such goings-on never happened when I was young!" they say. And it's true: such goings-on didn't used to be common.

Why are such problems so frequent now?

You might start by remembering that teens are expected to question ritual, custom and accepted doctrines. Parents, teachers and even clergymen encourage it.

The trouble is, teenagers are actually beginning to do this!

Many young people find it necessary to question the religion which has satisfied their less scientifically minded ancestors for ages.

And as soon as the Bible and the

religion of our fathers is explored, discussed and dissected they both fall to pieces, since neither is based on reason.

Yet many teens have been previously trained to accept the impossibilities set forth in the Bible.

Finding out the truth about religion is too great a threat to their security, so they try to forget their questions in alcohol, pep-pills, thrills or worst of all, apathy.

But it isn't all a matter of teens finding religion a fraud in its own right.

There is also the way it has been used to promote crimes against other peoples.

An index of the atrocities committed by Christians on non-believers throughout history would take all the space in this paper, so I won't try to list them here.

But do let me give two contemporary examples: the war in Viet Nam and racial segregation right here in America.

The American Christian supposedly believes in loving his enemies, turning the other cheek, fighting for truth and freedom, etc.

He makes a big issue out of passing a non-profanity rule in Army training camps, but sees nothing wrong in dropping napalm bombs on defenseless women and children in Viet Nam. After all, the Vietnamese are the "enemy", and the Christian forgets he's supposed to love them.

Then there is segregation.

It's a known fact that the most rabid segregationists are found in the "Bible Belt" which is most influenced by a literal interpretation of the Scriptures.

You might think that there's real schizophrenia here - that it's incomprehensible how the most avid Bible readers and the greatest Negro-haters are one and the same people.

But is it surprising, Hardly, when you consider that the Bible condones slavery despite its self-contradictory command to "love ye one another."

Teenagers are no fools. They see the things I've been writing about, and they see the cause: a smug, self-righteous religion.

The true result of Christianity is exemplified by the situation in my own home town in Minnesota.

Here, the Catholic priest has the best house in town, an expensive boat and a brand new Oldsmobile Toronado - despite the fact that many children in his parish are without shoes and adequate clothing.

How many other young people see in their towns what I see in mine? Very likely there are millions.

So, adding up all the abuses of religion and the ability of youth to see through the sham of it, no wonder the young are restless.

The trouble is that they express their rebellion too often in dissipation instead of constructive action.

It's time we teens of 1966, who will be running the country in another decade or two, began working to put the reins of power into the the hands of intelligent men instead of the puppets of religion.

Why? Because the 20th Century has seen more outstanding scientific advances than nearly any other era.

A bomb has been developed which is capable of sending every soul on earth to oblivion.

Man is fast on the road to discovering the innermost secrets of the human mind.

At such a time, it is reasonable to stick to the ancient rituals instituted by people so backward that they believed (and still believe) /that a piece of wood in the shape of an instrument of execution is an object to be worshiped?

In the days when modern industry is making our life increasingly rich and good, is it rational to pay homage to a doctrine which worships death?

Can we, the youth of America, afford to let churches lead backward the civilization which has been thousands of years in the making, and which has progressed despite the dead weight of religion?

No, we can't. And it's up to the American teenager to see to it that we don't.

# DOROTHY LAUER REPLIES TO RAY PALMER-

WHEN I opened the pages of the November issue to your editorial, the more I read on the more angry I became, because I have in my file many instances where you have said that I had been proven 88 to 90 per cent correct. This is why I will not let anyone use a by-line or my name as their byline. You say you used to be quite popular as the Man Tomorrow. You say predicting the future is a haphazard thing and dangerous.

You say another thing. I do not fill up my page with impressions. Why should I give up my life with filling pages of so-called impressions and generalities? I think I am quite a direct person and I do not guess at my work.

You say what good are predictions if the events cannot be avoided? Well this person was forewarned a long time ago and as I say, I wouldn't want it on my

shoulders that I did not have sense enough to follow the prediction. It cannot cause mental anguish. because if the person had any sense, they would have looked into the situation. Just remember, Rav. this young girl could be alive today had the person followed that prediction. What is the use of these analyses if they don't point out the saving of a life, or the saving of money? But remember, it is not sadistic on my part when I predict such a thing. This gift is not dished out for sadistic usage, it is true, and there was no sadistic thought on my mind, Ray, when I gave that prediction. How horrible to think that I would be accused of such a thing. This is so unfair! I can't imagine anyone being so stupid as to not take the time out to look and see what is wrong with the stove.

Many times people ask me about signing important papers and I tell them not to do so under certain circumstances. So, therefore, these people are sensible enough to do so. If I tell a person to see a competent physician in regards to a symptom, I have hundreds of letters on file where people have said their life had actually been saved because they had taken my word.

These generalities you speak of--I give my important impressions to a person and each one is individually given. Remember,

Five percent good generalities well, that is generous of you, and 25 percent wrong. You say that 10 percent is worth it. Well, that is generous of you, too, Ray, because according to polls in other magazines, I have again been judged 88 to 90 percent correct. So how come I am so wrong all of a sudden, especially when you never mentioned this before? Don't worry about my gift leaving me because remember, I am using it right. I am not using it for horseracing, for making money in the stock market, or slot machines or anything like that. I wouldn't use it in that manner and I resent very much even when a person writes and asks me to predict the stock market. I don't like to do it and I may insist that nobody ask me to do this in the future. So you see, I don't use my gift wrong; therefore, it won't leave me. # JAPAN'S Religion of "Gain"

RELING UNDER the blows of atomic bombs and of military defeat, Japan emerged from the second world war with new and urgent problems. The feudal basis of family life had been weakened, old communal standards had been shaken and old-time religion had suffered a big setback. There was a moral and spiritual vacuum that needed to be filled. What would fill this vacuum?

In any other country, communism might have capitalized on the situation. However, communism failed to take hold among the nationally-minded Japanese. Rather, the post-World War II era has witnessed the growth of a multitude of "new religions," often called



"crisis religions," designed to meet the people's immediate wants. Almost one hundred "new religions" have mushroomed during the past twenty years. Their number includes Shinto sects that had been forced previously to conform to state Shinto, as well as offshoots from established Buddhist sects.

For the most part, these "crisis religions" have offered their adherents things that they lost during World War II, such as health, material prosperity, peace of mind and community fellowship.

Riding on this tide of religious revival, one sect has raced ahead of all the others. It is the so-called "Soka Gakkai" ("Value Creation Academic Society"), a development of the 700-year-old "Nichiren Shoshu" sect. Its postwar organizer, Josei Toda, explained that the Nichiren Shoshu sect had declined prior to the war, and, therefore, "as the Great Saint Nichiren predicted, Japan has experienced a crisis which resulted in national ruin." And what was his solution? The militant Soka Gakkai, which has proclaimed itself the savior of Japan, and ultimately of the entire world.

The Nichiren Shoshu sect was founded in the thirteenth century of Nikko, a disciple of the Buddhist monk Nichiren Daishonin. Its head-quarters, which the sect expects to become the center of religion world wide, is a temple called

Daisekiji, at the foot of Mount Fuji. Here are preserved the "Dai-Gohonzon, said to be the original scroll containing Nichiren's sacred formula, and also Nichiren's miraculous tooth, the onikuge. It is reported that Nichiren pulled a loose tooth from his mouth and handed it to Nikko, to be used as a testimony in propagating their religion among all mankind. It is also claimed that a piece of flesh still adheres to the tooth, and that this continues to grow. The sect is to reach its zenith when the flesh covers the tooth in its entirety. The tooth is closely guarded, and no scientific authority is permitted to examine it.

Soka Gakkai was founded in 1937 by Tsunesaburo Makiguchi, an exschool-teacher and student of pedagogy, who converted to Nichiren Shoshu. Nichiren's religious fanaticism and Makiguchi's theory of "value creation" have been combined into one of the most amazing religious crusades in history. Soka Gakkai itself describes the Theory of Value, as taught by Makiguchi and his successor, Josei Toda, in these words: "The goal of human life is happiness, the ideal state for each individual... A happy life is the condition in which whatever is regarded as having value is realized....Truth and value are two very different concepts .... Historically, philosophers have regarded the principal elements of the ideal life

to be truth, goodness and beauty. This is incorrect....The Principle of Value makes the basic ingredients of happiness: gain, goodness and beauty....The criterion of value is gain or loss, not good or evil."

This sounds contradictory to Nichiren's own oft-repeated emphasis on the "Lotus of Truth." Gain is substituted for truth. Devotion to the sacred scroll at Daisekiji and the repetitious chanting of the Lotus Sutra are the "gain-producing values". Financial gain or faith healing often provide the incentive for joining Soka Gakkai. The standard for judging everything is: Do we gain or lose by it?

The Nichiren denounced all other schools of Buddhism as heresv. and established his own new formula for the salvation of all "Namu Myoho-Rengemankind: Kyo" ("Adoration Be to the Lotus of Wonderful Truth!") Followers of Nichiren, and now of Soka Gakkai. are said to reach Buddhahood through the daily chanting of this formula, the Daimoku, "We pray to the Dai Gohonzon ("Holy Scroll") every morning and evening. Look intently at the Gohonzon, and you will find some Chinese characters on the upper left which read: "Those who worship the Gohonzon or those who practice the sutra of the True Buddha can accumulate even greater merits than the ten virtues of Buddha." On the opposite

side it is clearly written that "A person who viciously maligns the Gohonzon will surely have his head broken in seven." A person who has pure faith in the Gohonzon will be bestowed with even greater benefit than the ten good fortunes of Buddha. On the contrary, those who slander either the Gohonzon or true believers (Gakkai members) must undergo such dreadful punishment as having their heads broken in seveni.e., falling into the pit of hell."

One may well ask, How could a religion with these medieval concepts make such strides, as Soka Gakkai has done, in a modern society? For the most part, Soka Gakkai adherents are to be found among the poorer, uneducated classes. The movement has made its appeal, emotionally, to the desire for material betterment. It has used a devastating instrument known as shakubuku, which has variously interpreted as meaning, "destroy and conquer," "bend and flatten" or "crush and throw down". This refers to the practice of Soka Gakkai members in ganging up on households or individuals afflicted with sickness or economic problems, blaming it on their religion, and relentlessly 'brainwashing' them until conversion is achieved. The new convert must then destroy the "abominations" of appendages of his former religion. He is provided with his

scroll, rosary and badge, and is threatened with terrible reprisals should he ever think of leaving the organization.

Shakubuku was organized by president Josei Toda following World War II. It draws strength from Soka Gakkai's militaristic structure, which has been compared to that of the Hitler Youth. Its Youth Division today numbers one and a half-million young people, including a fife-and-drum band of Young Women's Division the described as "second to none in its skilled and beautiful performance". Soka Gakkai describes its Youth Division as "the driving force of the organization". Soon after instituting shakubuku, Toda proclaimed: "The great march for forced conversions, bugun on May 3, 1951, has brought a great many comrades into our camp". By 1953, the number was 1,096,920 households, and by 1964, the claim was for 4,600,965 households.

Soka Gakkai's main goals are political. This is in line with Nichiren's ancient claim: "I will be the pillar of Japan; I will be the eyes of Japan; I will be the great vessel of Japan." As explained in "Seikyo Shimbun" in April 1955, the sect's purpose is that "when, as the result of our great 'shakubuku', our country is rid of all evil religions, the Diet ought to decide to create a national center of worship. For that end, it is

necessary to send our members to the national legislature so that we could command a majority. Of course, it might be 10 or 20 years before this may be realized. Until then, we must train our members in the local legislatures."

After making sensational gains in local municipal and Upper House elections, Soka Gakkai set up the Komeito ("Clean. Government Party") on November 17, 1964. The party immediately called for the abolition of the Japan-U.S. Security Treaty and for Japan to recognize communist China, However, Komeito acts independently of both "right" and "left". According to Soka Gakkai leaders, the party has been organized as a practical means of carrying out obutsu myogo, a merger of government and religion. In elections for the Upper House of the Diet in 1965. Komeito increased its representation to twenty in this body of 250 members. They are planning next to put thirty-two members into the Lower House, Other political parties are voicing concern at this religious invasion of the political arena.

Since 1960, Soka Gakkai has carried its compaign into South-east Asia, and even into the United States. It has been outlawed in South Korea because of its political activity there.

Seven centuries ago, Nichiren himself announced his sect's ob-

jective of building a national temple at the foot of Mount Fuji. Soka Gakkai has espoused this goal, declaring its purpose to establish a "kokuritsu kaidan" ("national instruction hall") for "basic religious training in defense of the nation". In July 1961 a four-day drive among members netted over three billion yen (\$9,000,000), and this was used in building the projected temple's Grand Reception Hall, which was completed April 1, 1964. According to Soka Gakkai's "Seikyo Shimbun, of October 19, 1965, another four-day drive recently raised 35 billion yen (nearly \$100 million), which is to be used for building the shohondo, or main temple hall. This is now under construction.

Soka Gakkai used to make bold the claim that it would convert, first the entire nation of Japan, and then the world. However, in July 1965 the sect's 34-year-old president, Daisaku Ikeda, appeared to make the goal more realistic, when he drew an illustration from the Indian state of Shravasti, mentioned in the "Lotus of Wonderful Truth". According to the Lotus Sutra, onethird of the people of Shravasti saw Buddha and believed him, onethird saw him but did not believe his message, and one-third neither saw nor heardhim. The implication is that the conversion of Japan will be accomplished when shakubuku has claimed one-third of the people for Soka Gakkai, another third is sympathetic, and the remaining third is either indifferent or hostile. A recent Soka Gakkai tabulation asserted that membership was already 5,400,000 out of 25,000,000 households in Japan.

What is the ultimate goal of the movement? To quote Soka Gakkai itself: "The purpose of Soka Gakkai is not world conquest, but absolute world happiness and peace. President Ikeda has always stated that "the purpose of Soka Gakkai is to save the masses from misfortune and misery and to establish happiness and peace throughout the world."

It is with this goal that Soka Gakkai carries forward its militant campaign of shakubuku. Imbued with the idea that people on this earth receive everything from the idol Buddha, they are aiming at centering all worship in Japan around the huge temple that is to be completed at Mount Fuji in 1970. A Gakkai spokesman told the Sunday Mainichi (November 14, 1965) that the temple is scheduled to be completed around 1970. This seems to be a target date for a campaign to "help save" the soul of everyone in the world. It is also in 1970 that the Japan-U.S. Security Treaty is scheduled to come up for revision -- an explosive issue from which radical groups such as Soka Gakkai doubtless hope to make gain.

# "COLD LIGHT", PAST AND FUTURE

WILL SCIENCE and technology come up with a "cold light," obsoleting present methods of lighting for homes and businesses?

In the ancient teachings, there is something that is called "fohat", which we may translate as "electricity," but, unlike the present concept of electricity, considered as alive and conscious. Fohatic force or vibrations included not only electricity as presently understood and employed, but vast extensions of the conventional range. That is, there are fohatic frequencies we presently know absolutely nothing about, whose uses we cannot even surmise as yet.

Madame Blavatsky, in THE SE-CRET DOCTRINE, reported that when ancient Metallanim was excavated, archaeologists found rooms in which glass globes giving off a cold light, without apparent power source, still "burned" after thousands of years. The discoverers broke these globes to see what made them tick, but of course that released whatever had been con-

fined and the light went out forthwith.

In Frederick S. Oliver's A DWELLER ON TWO PLANETS, by PHILOS THE THIBETAN, there is much information about the Maxin, a stone pillar surmounted by a cold, eternal flame. Anything immersed in this sacred fire, of a type not known today, which he says formerly was in use in Atlantis, or as he calls it, Poseid', changed its molecular structure and entirely disappeared from the physical plane.

In the various religious scriptures of the world, there are many references to "light," meaning the astral light, zodiac light or lightof-the-intelligence. On Mount Sinai, Moses was confronted by the Shekinah or divine light in the form of a burning bush. Recently, in something I read somewhere, the author raised the question: Is this "light" which is intelligence similar to, related to, or perhaps even identical to the light we see with our eyes? Just maybe the discovery and mastery of cold light will provide not only insights into the nature of ordinary light as we usually speak of it, but its continuity with human and animal intelligence as well. This is something to think about.

A few years ago, and doubtless still, laboratories in Princeton, New Jersey, working under U.S. government research grants, were experimenting with fireflies (lightning-bugs), attempting to discover the secret of how their cold light was produced and how it was flashed on and off by the insect's nervous system. The scientists collected fireflies on an extensive scale. Youngsters and their elders came bearing bottles and fruit jars full of fireflies. As a result, the chemical involved in the firefly's light was isolated and named "luciferin", after Lucifer "the light-bringer". But at last information, the secret of HOW the firefly was able to produce cold light from luciferin, and how to synthesize the same in the laboratory, had not been found out. No doubt it will be, in time.

In one of his fabulous books, the inimitable Charles Fort recorded instances in which, not hot, but cold meteorites, emitting cold light, had been known to fall to earth in various places. He pointed out that, contrary to the prevailing and accepted belief, therefore not all meteorites are hot. This is something else to work on.

A Dr. J. Rand McNally, down at Oak Ridge, has been gathering data from every available source for several years, on fireballs or ball lightning. These things, apparently consisting of static electricity and ionized air particles, display intelligence. They may enter a room by a door or window, meander slowly around the room, nosing into corners and so on, then turn in leisurely fashion and mosey out the same

way they came. They may be silent, or they may emit a crackling or purring sound. Some explode and people have been seriously burned by them. Apparently Dr. McNally and the U.S. government feel that these fireballs, vehemently denied by orthodox science until a few years ago, may possess secrets valuable to our progress and especially to our military program.

In the late '50s, one of the larger lighting manufacturers -General Electric, Sylvania or Westinghouse - had succeeded in impregnating wallpaper and fabric draperies so that one did not need light bulbs or tubes but received. light evenly throughout a room directly from the walls and drapes. Probably because of the havoc that would have resulted in the lighting industry had they put the new methods into production at once, we hear no more about this remarkable invention.

We know that countless civilizations other than our present one have come and gone, some leaving little trace or even memory, and that at least a few of these reached levels of achievement which we today can little conceive. Fohat is one of the forces known in the pre-Vedic civilization which survive in the secret doctrines of the East. Somewhere in the entire broad spectrum of fohat, there is a region of cold light. It has but to be rediscovered.

# BOOK NEWS AND VIEWS

THE LONG, HOT summer brought a lot of not worth reading junk to this reviewer's desk, so I dug down in my despair barrel and brought out these worthwhile books which are still very much in print.

THE DYNAMIC LAWS OF PROSPERITY by Catherine Ponder. Prentice-Hall, Inc., Engle-

wood Cliffs, N. J., 1962, 253 pages, \$4.95.

Once in a lifetime someone writes in lay language a self-help book of this caliber. Mrs. Ponder has been able to do this for she seems to have lived what she's written. From the first to the last chapter, one is aware of her special brand of vitality which comes only

with successful living.

Many will learn just how shocking the truth about prosperity really is. Others will study the prosperity laws and directions for their use. Some will turn at once to the prosperity law of self-confidence, All readers will be interested in the road to better health through prosperous thinking. Imagine using prosperous thinking to bring about weight loss! Mrs. Ponder even outlines how to stop smoking painlessly. Worry, fear, guilt, sorrow, doubt, crossed conditions, ill health and failure will cease to fascinate you after practicing these laws.

The most important sentence in the book reads thusly: "Many of them thought it was beneath their dignity to say definite prosperous statements and definite words of success for 15 minutes each day, although they did not find it beneath their dignity to speak definite words of hard times, lack and financial difficulty the rest of the day; nor did they find it beneath their dignity to live in indebtedness and financial embarrassment."

Catherine Ponder is a Unity minister, but she practiced before she preached. A MUST book for your library.

SOUTHERN WHITE PROT-ESTANTISM in the Twentieth Century by Kenneth K. Bailey, Ph.D. Harper-Row, Inc., New York, New York, 1964. 180 pages, \$3.75.

This is a thoroughly docu-

mented and skillfully reconstructed map of the evolvement and involvements of Protestantism from 1861 forward. Excellent reading.

Dr. Bailey, in typical Sagittarian fashion, lays it on the line in impeccable grammar without rancor. He sees us through brush arbor meetings, murder, the Coca-Cola dynasty, Darwinism, prohibition, textbook quashing, dead letters, Bible Belts, rotten eggs, beer kegs, Anti-Saloon leagues, Billy Sunday, slander, prophecy, sin, segregation, dancing sans corset, shades of Aimee Semple McPherson and flapping sheets of the Ku-Klux-Klan.

This delightful but scholarly work shows us how theologians braided the split hairs of Church and State and coiled them atop the head of the South. First, a chastity belt was slipped over the eyes and ears of student youth in the matter of Evolution. Then, Dr. Bailey wipes the cobwebs off the 1928 election and ensuing market crash. The chapter entitled "Since 1940" explains how the scales was brought almost into balance, only to be tipped again.

A bland but potent dose of history - this, for Kenneth Bailey has beaten his sword into a penpoint. It is mighty. Like Perseus, we need to look back - ourselves to see.

In the most eloquent last chapter, I seem to hear this Sagittarian author say, "Forgive them, Fa-

ther . . . '''

THE ART OF SELFISHNESS by David Seabury. Julian Messner, Inc., New York, New York, 1964. 317 pages, \$5.95.

Dr. Seabury, an internationally known psychologist, wrote this long overdue book in 1937. It was recently revised, updated would be a better word, by Mrs. Evelyn Seabury.

In spite of occasional clumsy sentence structure, "The Art of Selfishness" will give you a new slant on your importance as an individual. It counsels to say "no" to those who would arrange your life, pilfer your time, sap your energy or rob you of your identity.

Chapter 37 is a most lucid treatise on divorce. Contrary to what you may think, money, sex and/or mother-in-law is not the underlying cause of divorce. Dr. Seabury's insight into the American marriage is well worth your time. His explanations may prevent further or future emotional snarls in the lives of his readers. Scattered throughout the fifty chapters are checklists which can be used as commonsense guides in human relations.

The section entitled "New Skills for Quarreling" will give you many clues for quelling verbal riots, nipping trouble in the bud, or withdrawing from emotional strife with a minimum loss of ace. Highly recommended.

ASTROLOGY by Louis Mac-Neice. Doubleday, Inc., New York, New York, 1964. 351 pages, \$9.95.


You may feel like buying two of this book, one for yourself and one as a gift. It is lavishly illustrated with both black and white and color plates.

Besides a breathtaking history of Astrology, Mr. MacNeice gives a unique interpretation of the Signs of the Zodiac, the Houses and their sphere of influence, major aspects, tables of sidereal time, tables of houses and a simplified ephemerides of the planets. A birthscope can easily be drawn from these tables for anyone born between 1901 and 1964. Too, very simple directions are given for setting up a Southern Hemisphere horoscope.

## MAPS, MAPS AND

## **MORE MAPS!**

ISTORY AS taught in the conventional schools, colleges and universities is as false as the teats on a boar pig! From much study and research on our own, some of us know that history as orthodoxly conceived is a conventionally agreed-upon pack of lies.

History goes much farther back than most people know, in fact it recedes into stupendous stretches of time far beyond ordinary conception. Furthermore, let us pull out into the open and recognize the fact that intelligence and the fruits of intelligence, in the arts, science and technology, are far from being a twentieth-century invention made in America (or Russia) as some naively believe. Man, besides, has not risen in the scale of civilization from cave beings, as history and anthropology insist upon teaching, but actually has "fallen downstairs" from civilizations almost too grand to be comprehended today with our so-limited imagination and understanding. Proofs of these allegations of mine lie right on the surface of the earth, to be seen by

anyone with an eye; and numerous illustrated books have been made available through the years, concerning the remains of these fabulous ancient civilizations. Read them for yourself.

Sometime ago there was excitment concerning the discovery of the first Piri Riis map, a map made shortly after the time of Columbus' voyage of discovery to the "New World." This map was obviously copied from older maps then in existence in the Alexandrian Library, which, for reasons of their own, the Christian Church burned to the ground. The Piri Riis map proves beyond a shadow of a doubt that the Arctic regions and North and South America had previously been mapped FROM THE AIR. By whom?

There are many ancient maps and fragments of maps in existence even today. George Ivanovich Gurdjieff, in his book, MEETINGS WITH REMARKABLE MEN, tells of discovering in the possession of a monk in a secret monastery in Egypt, during his quest all over the Near and Far East for the materials later incorporated into his teachings in the Institute for the Harmonious Development of Man, near Paris, of an ancient map of presands Egypt - that is, Egypt before the Sahara desert came into being. Gurdiieff wrote that he stealthily and secretly got hold of this map and made a copy of it, which is probably among the unpublished papers which he left behind when he said, likely in the hands of one of his more intimate students.

For those who are researchminded, who have a touch of the detective in your makeup, here is a good subject for exploration. A friend of mine, Ray Nelke, of Jennings, Missouri, a regular reader of SEARCH whom I met through the letter columns of this magazine, has corresponded with the Library of Congress, from whom he secured material on the Piri Riis map. He has also been in correspondence with the authors of the various magazine articles on the subject; and even went so far as to work through the Turkish Embassy and get hold of a good pamphlet on the cartographer Piri Riis and a copy of the original map. Dig back, and find out what ancient maps there are ... or if you had rather, look up some of the older books on the subject (these would be available through rare book dealers, probably); then correspond, all over the earth if necessary, with those who might have inside information. It would be interesting to know what success you have. You could write a report for SEARCH . . . and by all means let me know what you find out. An article on the subject of old maps, adequately researched, would be of broad and extreme general interest. Besides, it is the most effective way in the world to broaden your real education.
