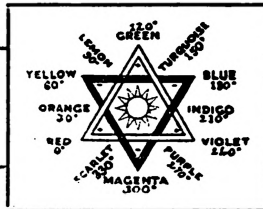

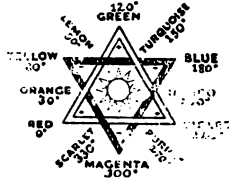

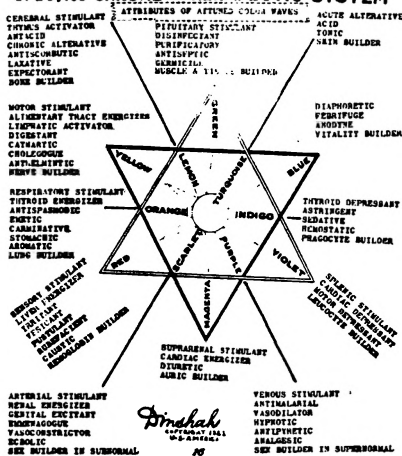

### CHICAGO WETTEST CITY?

C. E. Main, Washington Prohibition Field Superintendent, in his report to Prohibition Commissioner J. Haynes calls Chicago, Ill., the "wettest city in the United States" and lays the blame on the calibre of the government agents whom he calls extortionists. His knowledge interests me in view of the establishment of a branch of the Spectro-Chrome Institute there in September. ### SMOKING AND EYESIGHT

Lord Birkenhead, Lord Chancellor of Great Britain, was informed by his physicians to abandon smoking or lose his eyesight. This has set up an uproar in England. Dr. M. S. Mayou, a noted writer and oculist, says that

cigars and pipes cause blindness, the trouble arising through the blood. Professor Roman, of Syracuse University, expresses a belief that tobacco prohibition should automatically follow alcohol prohibition. Whether tobacco smoking causes eyesight trouble cannot be directly maintained by stating that William E. Gladstone, the late Prime Minister of England had good eyes because he was a non-smoker or the present premier, Lloyd George, has good eyesight because he is a good smoker, but can only be reasoned from the analysis of tobacco smoke and its study. We hear always about one product only—nicotine, but there are other constituents of the smoke about which very little is generally known. Analysis shows that tobacco smoke contains the following important chemicals among other minor ones:

I should like, in view of this analysis, showing an array of exceedingly powerful poisons, any person (layman or professional) to defend or justify their constant introduction into the human organism. It is no use talking nonsense or acting like a bunch of heep, because even doctors smoke. Talk facts; look into direct evidence of science; examine the physiological effects of the above array of poisons on the teeth, tongue, mucous membrane, lungs, heart, brain, stomach, nervous system, blood, everything. ### SENSIBLE MEDICAL OPINION

At the seventy-second convention of the Illinois State Medical Society in Chicago, Dr. Frederick Green voiced that "the use of scientific terms when conversing with patients is not advisable when the ailment can be put in plain terms; mere technical designation of the trouble is enough to frighten any patient." Of course, what does the patient care what you call the ailment? The patient is concerned only in getting better and the less fright is created the quicker the recovery. Ailments are the signals of Nature showing the existence of certain transgressions of her laws; they are semaphores to the healer indicating certain conditions; the removal of those defects removes the ailments or diseases as they term. He came home, learned about the mistreatment and deliberately went after the other fellow. This meant perhaps an extenuation but not a total discharge. The jury was led to a stupid verdict through emotional miscarriage, and was the judge bound to accept it? Trial by jury as it goes at present is a humbug—unwritten law must not cover cold-blooded murder under any circumstances. If nothing else, the accused should have been sent to the "refrigerator" to get cool and

act more sensibly in the future. Compare the above American miscarriage with the following British specimen:

### INDIAN LEADER TO BE JAILED

**Hazrat Mohani, Moslem League President, Convicted of Sedition**

Ahmedabad, May 5 (Associated Press).—Hazrat Mohani, President of the All-India Moslem League, was sentenced to two years' imprisonment today on a charge of sedition after the judge had refused to accept the unanimous verdict of not guilty rendered by a jury which included five Indians. A second charge of inciting to war was referred to a higher court.

The defendant delivered an impassioned address to the jury in which he said the independence he advocated in the All-India Congress was every man's birthright.

The prosecution contended that the defendant had urged the establishment of a parallel Government to usurp the functions of the existing Government, making warfare inevitable.

Which is preferable? And where shall we look for justice? Law is the latest interpretation of the written word by the most whimsical judge and, as things go now, we fail to see which country has worse administration of "law." British or American? Nothing to choose from if the above be samples of "justice."

### IMPOSSIBLE WITH SPECTRO-CHROME

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### EVIL TO HIM WHO EVIL THINKS

The following article appeared in "The Evening Bulletin," of Philadelphia, Pa., June 12, 1922. It speaks for itself:

### PHYSICIAN CAUGHT IN HIS OWN TRAP

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DR. SALTZMANN SAYS HE PLANNED  
TO SNARE CHIROPRACTORS AS  
BRIBERS

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IS NABBED AS TAKER

Dr. Louis A. Saltzmann, registered physician employed by the State Board of Medical Licensure as a special detective, who was held in \$1,000 bail on Saturday in Norristown, charged with extortion from the Chiropractors' Association, says he was planning to expose the chiropractors as bribers when they had him arrested as taker of a bribe.

He was arrested by county detectives working, according to Major S. O. Wynne, their chief, in conjunction with the State Board authorities, at the home of Dr. Merri Mollier, chairman of the legal committee of the chiropractors, in Dr. Mollier's home, at Trappe, Montgomery county. Dr. Mollier charges

that Dr Saltzmann demanded \$200 a month for "protecting" chiropractors from prosecution as unlicensed physicians, and to lobby for a bill licensing them.

Dr. Saltzmann says his idea in taking the money was to worm his way into the secrets of the chiropractors in their plan to have jurisdiction over them taken away from the State Board.

Dr. Saltzmann asserts it was his plan to get all data together and have three witnesses handy to watch the chiropractors hand him money to help them. He then expected to turn the entire case over to the District Attorney's office or to the State Medical Board, in the nature of an expose of what he claimed the chiropractors were doing and how willing they were to pay for it.

He was to receive more than \$700 during the past week, and he planned to have the money turned over to him in a corner of City Hall where his witnesses could watch the proceeding.

But Mollier, he said, insisted that he take the \$100 on account Friday afternoon, and Saltzmann did so, he says, because he believed Mollier would not appear at City Hall with the balance if he refused to accept Friday's "partial payment."

"I had a trap set," said Saltzmann. "but they sprung theirs first. Mollier, after they arrested me said: "Saltzmann, you played a game of chess with us, but we checkmated you. We trapped you in Trappe."

"I got the dope that they had me spotted. The ones I hadn't seen yet were told what I looked like and they had it all fixed up that the first one that got me on the table was to jump on my back and fix it so I wouldn't have any spine left. It is all wrong that I received money from them last year."

### SYPHILITIC TEST OR HUMBUG?

Dr. W. A. Evans, writing in the *Daily News of New York*, May 25, 1922, speaks thus in part about the value of Wassermann test for syphilis:

"When the test is properly made, and the report is interpreted in connection with other features of the case, it is an excellent indication as to whether syphilis is present or absent.

"A positive Wassermann is not given until after about the fifth week of the disease. Diagnosis prior to that stage must be made by the clinical appearance, clinical history, and by microscopic examination.

"The Wassermann reaction is not a test of infectivity. It is not given during the first six weeks of the disease when infectivity is absent or at most only low.

"It is liable to be present in certain diseases and conditions not related to syphilis and where syphilis is not present. Among these are malaria, ether and chloroform narcosis, scarlatina, jaundice, diabetes, pregnancy, nodular leprosy and yaws.

"The blood of a healthy baby less than two weeks old,' Stillians says, 'will give a positive Wassermann.'

"On the other hand, Krauss, of Memphis; Dock, of St. Louis, and Lydston and Stillians, of Chicago, are among the men who have repeatedly called attention to the shortcomings of the Wassermann test.

"Kahn, of Memphis, says: 'It is evident from the foregoing that in every syphilitic stage isolated cases are found which will not respond to the Wassermann test.'

"On the one hand, in alcoholism there may be absence of a Wassermann reaction even though syphilis is not present.

"On the other, there are some cases that seem to get the Wassermann

habit. Having once started to give a Wassermann plus, they keep it up for life, even though the syphilis has been brought under control. The scientists call these cases Wassermann fixed.

"In the competition between laboratories there is some tendency to advertise such claims as 'We get a larger proportion of positive Wassermann's than other laboratories do.' This claim is not untruthful necessarily. By varying the methods one way or other the test can be made more sensitive and the result may be as advertised.

"But there is this to be said: The Wassermann test is not specific for syphilis. It is most dependable when it is just about so sensitive. If, on the other hand, it becomes too sensitive, it loses value, just as it loses it when it is not sensitive enough.

"What is the final conclusion? Shall we pay no attention to Wassermann reactions? Shall we quit having them made? I find practically no one in favor of that. With all its shortcomings, the Wassermann test is a standard procedure and should be continued."

These same questions are frequently asked me and in order to answer them thoroughly for the student to gauge, I append the definition and technic of this (in) famous "test."

Wassermann test was introduced by August V. Wassermann, a Berlin bacteriologist. It is a diagnostic test for syphilis, based upon the theory of complement fixation. Measured quantities of extract from the liver and spleen of a syphilitic fetus (representing the antigen) and of the blood serum of the person to be tested are mixed in a test tube and some fresh normal guinea pig serum (containing the complement) is added; after incubation at body temperature for about an hour the contents of this tube are added to a mixture of the red blood

cells of a sheep or other animal, suspended in physiological saline solution and of the serum of a rabbit which has been immunized to these particular red cells; if the serum mixed with the extract of syphilitic organs in the first test tube is from a syphilitic individual no hemolysis of the red blood cells in the second tube will occur after incubation for one hour. This test was subsequently modified by the Japanese bacteriologist Hideyo Noguchi, but the basic idea is on similar lines. Herein all depends on a crude idea that the physiological and biological actions and reactions of the animals are identical with the human. Herein is a terrible and gross error.

Animals under the human kingdom possess only the physical, auric and psychic vehicles, whereas man has developed mental and causal vehicles also. Therefore, to mix pigs, sheep, rabbits and humans in one bloodpot is more appropriate for ghouls than scientists. If this wretched "test" will fail in one among one hundred tests and an innocent human is thereby branded and treated as a syphilitic, it is a crime against humanity. Man is essentially individual in development by the laws of retributive action and reaction and to pride one's self on the glories of an empty past is ridiculous.

## VOLSTEAD OR SHEPPARD?

The newspapers of the United States have named the Eighteenth Amendment to our Constitution, "Volstead Act." When the originator of Spectro-Chrome Therapy was in Washington, D. C., last winter, teaching the Spectro-Chrome class there, he spoke very forcefully in favor of prohibition, eulogizing the "Volstead Act." A friend, Victor Russell, who was present, kindly sends the following for the true information of the public. It sheds a light on facts not generally recognized and which are interesting. We thank the writer for his correction of statements then made by Dinshah.

MY DEAR SIR: You will recall at the close of your lecture, I brought to your attention the slightly erroneous impression you seemed to have regarding the Eighteenth Amendment and the prohibition situation. You asked me to write you concerning this, and I have therefore endeavored to set forth in brief compass something of the inception, growth, and victory of the prohibition movement in the United States, which will, I believe, be helpful in enabling one to view the present period of adjustment in the proper perspective.

The movement which resulted in having a ban on the traffic in alcoholic beverages written into the organic law of this land, had its inception in the temperance societies of a couple of generations ago. These societies, largely religious in character, pledged their members to abstain personally from indulging in alcoholic liquors. It might be pointed out here that there is a difference between *temperance* and *prohibition*. The temperance movement sought merely to induce individuals to lead pure and temperate lives, basing its appeal upon religious and hygienic grounds. The prohibition movement, on the other hand, made no

particular plea for personal abstinence, but was a collective movement to prohibit and abolish through legislative enactment the traffic in alcoholic beverages, and its appeals were economic and political.

The transition from a temperance to a prohibition movement occurred gradually and was completely effected not over twenty years ago. This came about when the business men and politicians came to the aid of the moral and religious reformers. The business men saw that the efficiency of their employees was impaired by alcoholic drinks, that there was a very direct relation between quantity and quality of output in factories when the neighboring community was "dry" or "wet," and they further saw the vast economic wealth being squandered in the liquor traffic. The men engaged in political life saw that the center of rotten and corrupt politics was the saloon, that it was a menace to the civic and social life of the community, that it was the rendezvous for the old criminals and the chamber of initiation for the younger ones.

The progressive business men put up the money and the progressive political candidates did the campaigning with the result that county after county began going dry all over the country. But prohibition could not be made very effective in any one county or state when the one adjoining it was "wet." It became apparent that it must be made nation wide. Under the Constitution, Congress had no authority to enact such legislation. It therefore became necessary to amend the Constitution, hence the Eighteenth Amendment was passed in the autumn of 1918.

The author of the Eighteenth Amendment and the leader of the fight for its adoption in the Senate was Senator Sheppard, of Texas, who, when he took his seat nine years ago, was about the youngest member in point of age in that august body. He first secured the passage of the bill

establishing prohibition in the District of Columbia, in the face of the most determined opposition. He later put through the Eighteenth Amendment, although the leaders of both political parties were against it. He had been pushing the measure for some years, and it was largely due to his persistent but patient efforts that the measure went through when it did.

It was for this reason that I brought the matter to your attention when, in the course of your talk, you attributed credit for the Eighteenth Amendment to Mr. Volstead. After the Eighteenth Amendment had been ratified by all but three states in the Union, it became necessary to enact an enforcement code, defining violations and prescribing penalties. This was drawn up by the friends of prohibition in both the Senate and House of Representatives. It was referred to the Judiciary Committee of the House and favorably reported by the chairman of the committee, Mr. Volstead, of Minnesota. The measure subsequently passed both the House and Senate, and because it was first referred to as the Volstead Act,

it has continued to bear this name. While full credit is due Congressman Volstead for his efforts in steering this enforcement act through the House, and preventing any weakening amendments to it, the distinction of having first forced the issue and pushed it to a successful consummation belongs to Senator Sheppard.

It might be interesting to know that the attitude with reference to prohibition which one finds in the very large cities where vice parades the streets and virtue dwells in obscurity is not at all representative of the attitude of the great expanse of country west of the Atlantic seaboard, especially in the smaller cities and villages where virtue walks the streets and vice hides in obscurity. Yet somehow our American newspapers have a way of representing things so that it would appear that it is elegant and liberal to poison oneself with alcohol and other forms of dissipation, and that it is narrow, mean, and hypocritical to oppose such practices.

She applied a dressing of olive oil and did not report for treatment until five days later, when it had become infected. The whole arm was red and swollen, the axillary glands very painful, temperature 102° F., pulse 120 and respiration 40. She was given two drachms of Epsom salt in a small

amount of water and put to bed. Spectro-Chrome Turquoise was used every four hours after the first with the 400 watt equipment. At 8 P. M., the temperature was 101° F., pulse 108 and respiration 28. At 6 A. M. on the 23d, the temperature was normal and did not go above that. Between the Spectro-Chrome treatments the involved portions were kept wrapped in a saturated solution of Epsom salt, which was allowed to dry and then rewet. Miss B. went back to duty the fourth day and from that time on she had one Spectro-Chrome treatment a day until the wrist was entirely healed. There is practically no scar.

Vivian F., age 11 years, for some weeks had been treated in one of the clinics for an infection of her hands; later referred to another department and in time the hands were very much better, but not entirely healed. Late in the evening of September 15, 1921, she came to the Woman's Hospital and was admitted for treatment. The entire left arm was swollen and painful, with an indurated area just above the elbow, the axillary glands were swollen and very painful. My interne on duty, when reporting the case, raised the question as to the necessity for an immediate incision above the elbow. Being unable to reach me when the child was admitted, they applied a compress of Epsom salt. It was past ten o'clock when I got in touch with the case. Notwithstanding the lateness of the hour the child was taken to the "dark room" and given Spectro-Chrome Yellow for a half hour. The compresses were continued through the night and by eight o'clock the next morning the area above the elbow was so much improved that there was no necessity for any incision.

On entering, the temperature was 102° F., pulse 90, respiration 28; on the 16th at 1 P. M., temperature was 105° F., pulse 118, respiration 37; at 3 P. M. temperature was 105° F.; at midnight 103° F.; at 6 P. M., the 17th,

the temperature was 104.9° F. From that time the temperature dropped quickly to normal at 4 A. M. the 19th, being less than four days from the time of admission.

Her treatment consisted in Spectro-Chrome twice a day, Epsom salt compresses when not under the Spectro-Chrome. On entering, 2 drams of castor oil was given; on the 19th, 3 ounces of Efferv. Mag. Sulph. On the 16th, 15 drops of Lloyd's Echafolta every three hours; on the 19th every four hours and on the 20th, 10 drops three times a day.

On the 20th she was out of bed for two hours and on the 22nd was discharged to report to clinic. She was perfectly well, hands and all, in a few days.

At the present time I would probably treat this case differently, giving Spectro-Chrome every four hours when the temperature is high or even more frequently; let it take the place of the laxatives and possibly of the Echafolta.

It is a little difficult to have a ward case taken to another floor for treatment more than twice a day. At the present time we have better convenience for the Spectro-Chrome treatments.

Anna W., age 13 years, February 28th had an abscessed tooth extracted under gas. Two days later the child became quite ill, had fever, cough and was very much prostrated. There was pain in the abdomen at a level of the umbilicus, marked constipation with nausea and vomiting of everything eaten.

The family physician was called on March 6th. A temperature of 104.5° F., and the above conditions were present. The dentist was called and he lanced an abscess where the tooth was extracted, but found very little pus. On the 7th the temperature was down to 102.5° F.; on the 8th it went up to 104° F. The bowels were freely opened that morning and about noon the patient was sent to the hospital.

There was every clinical evidence of a very serious condition. For several days it did not seem possible for her to recover.

The sputum showed pneumonia and the throat secretions streptococci. On the 8th the blood culture for twenty-four hours was staphylococci.

On the 20th, the blood culture for twenty-four hours was no growth and at the end of forty-eight hours no growth.

Blood count on the 8th showed Hb 80; R. B. C., 3,700,000; W. B. C., 126,000; Poly , 90; on the 20th it showed Hb 70; R. B. C., 3,510,000; W. B. C., 16,300; Poly , 66.

The patient was very weak and restless and more or less delirious for three days; at times restraint was necessary to keep her in bed. Base of right lung was involved.

A creolin mouth wash was used frequently; an ice cap to the head when restless. When the temperature was 102° or above, the torso was kept in a cool pack. On the 9th, 10 drops of Lloyd's Echafolta was given every four hours. On the 18th this was reduced to 5 drops three times a day. She was given little to eat or drink, but dilute fruit juices.

I personally gave the first Spectro-Chrome treatment and stayed with her during the treatment. She remarked, "I would like to stay here all day; I feel so good!" We used Spectro-Chrome Blue, Turquoise, Lemon and Magenta as symptoms indicated. The Blue quieted the delirium in a few minutes and restraint was not required after the first treatment. At first the patient had to be taken to the "dark room" for the Spectro-Chrome treatments and so had only two a day except the Blue, which was used at night. The third day we were able to put her in a room that could be darkened and after that she had the Spectro-Chrome every four hours for several days and then less frequently.

Just here let me put in a caution to the users of Spectro-Chrome. *You must pay strict attention to orientation.* When the arrangement for the change of rooms was made I was very particular to give careful instructions regarding orientation, for I knew that in the main building nearly every bed was east and west. In some way the instructions did not carry to the next relay of nurses and when I went in the next morning the nurse on duty said, "Dr. Baldwin, Annie did not like her color last night and wanted it turned off; I thought it was only a notion and kept it on for a while, but had to turn it off before the time was up." I found the child with her head to the west and I told them that was the reason she did not like the color. Then the bed was put right and there was no dislike to the treatments. I made the mistake the text for a little talk and I am quite sure that mistake will not happen again with that set of doctors and nurses. The trouble with institution work is, the doctors and nurses frequently change. I have had unusual co-operation at the Woman's Hospital and am sure that each one intended doing just as I requested.

From the time of the more frequent Spectro-Chrome treatments the case improved rapidly and was discharged on the 21st, just thirteen days after admission.

The temperature, pulse and respirations were of interest. After admission to the hospital the highest temperature was 103.4° F., the pulse 120 and respiration 62. Much of the time they were out of proportion to each other. For three days, the rectal temperature was just two degrees higher than by mouth. We usually count only one degree between mouth and rectum. The family physician tells me that the child was able to return to school in time to make her grade.

I have had a goodly number of septic cases where I have used Spectro-

Chrome as the only treatment, except for the local dressing and others where I have considered it wise to combine its use with others previously proven trustworthy. The shortened time and the lessened discomfort where I have used Spectro-Chrome leads me to the conclusion that one of its fields of usefulness is in septic cases and as infection of one sort or another is an element in nearly all pathological conditions, I see a future for its use in very many fields. As I work with Spectro-Chrome I more and more see how I can make it useful. At the present time I am quite positive that I could take the three cases reported above and by the judicious use of diet, cool packs and Spectro-Chrome be able to report as good and possibly quicker results.



Many thanks, Dr. Baldwin, for the encouraging reports. I am delighted to note that you take such a brave stand as to feel that even without the little drugging you could have obtained similarly helpful results. The mass of clinical evidence that is collecting around Spectro-Chrome is daily becoming more and more convincing even to the skeptical-minded and time will prove that the mathematical foundation of the system is not mythical. Meanwhile, to the lay practitioner of Spectro-Chrome Therapy I re-issue this warning that although as a liberal publication, articles about drugs, surgery and other methods are freely admitted for just discussion and enlightenment, Spectro-Chrome Institute does not countenance or authorize the use of anything outside of Spectro-Chrome Therapy pure and simple. Let the graduates of the Spectro-Chrome Institute strictly adhere to the principles laid down, and signed for in their enrollment and they will keep clear of legal and other complications. Those who, like Dr. Kate W. Baldwin, are registered and licensed

to practice medicine and surgery are entitled and privileged to use whatever other treatment they may deem fit or necessary, but to my graduates (who, under the present class legislation healing art system, are laboring under much one-sided disadvantage) I repeat that they stick absolutely to Spectro-Chrome Therapy, without even so much as swerving one way or another onto an outside method. Follow exactly what the State Charter of the Institute shows and success will follow your path.

Keep to the tracks of Spectro-Chrome. In regard to Dr. Baldwin's voice about taking care of the patient's orientation, I concur fully in that direction. The technique described in Compendium of Spectro-Chrome Therapy must be rigidly followed and the dietetic principles should also be carried out, not according to the practitioner's whims, but in accordance with the simple rules taught during the course on Spectro-Chrome Therapy.

He is now established in Lancaster, Pa., as X-ray specialist, and uses Spectro-Chrome Therapy to a large extent, although not a graduate of the Spectro-Chrome Institute. This tends to prove his broad-mindedness, for which I am very highly obliged.

In regard to his stated cases I may say that, with the Spectro-Chrome Attuned Turquoise Wave, excellent results are always reported in treating appendicitis. Should there be severe pain, shift the polarity to Blue and Indigo on Area 9.

Epilepsy has sex relation and, among other troubles, there is always flatulence. Treat with Orange on Area 8 for five or ten minutes after a meal, and go into the sex history of the patient. Start with a Green systemic and, as there is circulatory disturbance, administer Magenta on Area 4. Bromides and drugs are useless and injurious. The convulsions always will yield to the Ultra-Green section. However, as the body is built of the foods eaten, all stimulants like flesh, fish, tea, coffee and alcohol should be rigorously avoided.

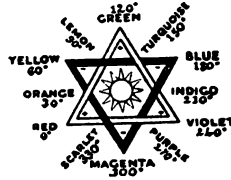
