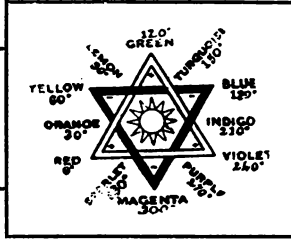

STIRRING MESSAGE FROM DINSHAH BROUGHT TEARS IN MANY EYES

First Day Morning Session

At Yellow 15 White, President Irene Grace Dinshah's gavel called the Convention to order.

The minutes of the Sixth Annual Convention, were presented by the Secretary Kashmira Dinshah, S. C. T., as reported in SPECTRO-CHROME issue of R-O-Yellow, 1927. On motion of Frank E. Kaufman, S. C. T., seconded by Bessie A. Hasenau, S. C. T., the minutes were unanimously accepted as recorded.

Irene Grace Dinshah read the Resignation of Dinshah P. Ghadiali as President-Treasurer of the Association as follows:

The new President Irene told about the former President Dinshah being in the Federal Penitentiary in Atlanta, Georgia; that he was taken away from the 48th SPECTRO-CHROME THERAPY Class, and he went—not as a coward, but, unafraid, bold and fearless, just like the Dinshah the Associates had always known. He was penalized—as is the lot of *all* pioneers. She stated that religiously speaking, she should have been in childbed, her third son having been born on the 30th of October, 1927, but that she bowed to the call of Duty which she would cheerfully perform and try to grace the chair she had the honor to occupy. The President thanked the two Vice-Presidents for their gracious cooperation in every respect and the faithful Associates for their continued interest and zeal; she thanked also the Secretary-Treasurer for her cheerful labors. The Association was more prosperous this year than last, there being more Associates in 1927 than 1926 and more money in the Treasury. She said that Colonel Dinshah started such a wonderful, humanitarian work and we must continue; he worked hard even in the Penitentiary. From prison walls he sent a great Message and she requested the kind presence of the Associates at the evening session to hear it.

The Secretary Kashmir Dinshah presented her Annual Report. There were thirteen Centres of the Association, located at Baltimore Md., Boston Mass., Cleveland O., Detroit Mich., Los Angeles Cal., Malaga, N. J., New York, N. Y., Philadelphia Pa., Portland Ore., Providence R. I., San Francisco Cal., Seattle Wash., and Vineland N. J.

There were two deaths and four violations, which were under investigation. There were no resignations. There was an increase of 25 Associates. On motion of Bessie A. Hasenau, S. C. T., seconded by Earl Broadbent, S. C. T., the Annual Report of the Secretary was voted upon and unanimously passed.

The Annual Reports from various Centres were then read.

First Cleveland Ohio Centre was reported by the Centre Secretary, Margaret A. Morris. They had eleven meetings during the year, all of which were very interesting.

First Detroit Michigan Centre was reported by the Centre Secretary E. Norman Pearson. They were proud of being Associates and had interesting meetings.

First Philadelphia Pennsylvania Centre, the largest Centre of the Association, was reported by the Centre Secretary Lettie Allen Ward. They had eight meetings during the year. There seemed to be no end to the wonderful cases reported. They felt very grateful that Spectro-Chrome Therapy was placed in their hands as a means of helping others.

First Vineland New Jersey Centre, the latest created Centre, was reported by the Centre Secretary Janet Izola Mole. Since the Authorization in May 1927, a meeting was held each month. Their average attendance was large.

First Baltimore Maryland Centre was reported by the Centre Secretary George A. Lentz. They had a very good representation of the Associateship.

First Los Angeles California Centre was reported by the Centre President Henry Gross. They had seven interesting meetings during the year. Through their President, they sent a communication of greetings, cheer and kind thoughts.

Margaret A. Morris of Cleveland, O., regretted not being able to attend the Convention personally.

Richard E. Sandbach of Wellsboro Pa., reported a case of a man whose condition was diagnosed by a doctor as pernicious anemia and who was at first very unwilling to take Spectro-Chrome tonations; after being urged, the person

took 76 tonations and felt much better; he later went to a sanitarium. He is entirely better now; his wife gives all the credit to Spectro-Chrome. The man, however, having been a skeptic from the start, is willing to give Spectro-Chrome about half of the credit only, but, the former sufferer was set right and that is all that matters. Sandbach said he felt that Spectro-Chrome did much for this man, who was described by many as being "nearly a dead man." Another man was given strychnine and digitalis for heart trouble and was very weak. Spectro-Chrome normalated him. Another with ulcer on the eye improved under Spectro-Chrome tonations. A diabetic for thirty years is now healthy due to Spectro-Chrome. A sufferer with prostatic gland trouble was under medical care. After leaving medicine, he had twenty-five tonations with Spectro-Chrome and is now healthy. An infected toe was normalated by twenty tonations. A sufferer had trouble with the teeth; after a few tonations the condition was normalated and he sent a letter to Sandbach saying he was "sold" on Spectro-Chrome, because, he did not have a toothache since the time he had been tonated with Spectro-Chrome. A man was pronounced suffering from gall bladder trouble; he had twelve tonations and now feels better than ever. A woman with neuritis was normalated after having Spectro-Chrome tonations. The back of a twenty-four-year-old man was injured when a child and he was suffering from too frequent frontelim (urine); he was operated on for what Medical Doctors said were ulcers of the bladder; there was no relief. He suffered severe pain. After ten or twelve tonations with Spectro-Chrome, he had no more pain and frontelim was normal. A boy was hit by an automobile and his leg was bruised; he could not stand on it and could not sleep the first night. After one tonation he slept all night; Indigo was the Wave used. The leg that was bruised is now better.

Dr. Kate W. Baldwin said that Spectro-Chrome would do the work regardless of whether a person had faith or not. She had a severe hiccough case and the man said that he had no faith in Spectro-Chrome. Would it work without faith? Dr. Baldwin replied, "You take the color and I'll have the faith." She stated that in bruises remarkable results were obtained, by tonating with Green and later Indigo.

Esther Jennings had a case of a child that had imbackelim (constipation); she had told the mother to prepare vegetarian food including "dal" and she had given Yellow tonation. There was no improvement. She asked for suggestions.

Dr. Martha J. Peebles responded, saying there were many factors involved in imbackelim; the diet was very important; there was not sufficient roughage in food oftentimes; bananas are excellent food; give food that has bulk. Give plenty of fluids, including lemonade.

Dr. Kate W. Baldwin told about the value of drinking plenty of water and fruit juices. The bowels can form habits just like anything else. Backelimation should be performed regularly and once a day is not enough. Train the bowels to evacuate twice or thrice a day always at the same time and you will find a freedom—a cleanliness. Tell your sufferers not to read or smoke at such times, but, to concentrate the mind on the action and never neglect Nature's calls. The morning is the time when you will get your freer action, but, the morning action is not sufficient. You should never wait. If there is a large family there ought to be more than one toilet in the house. She always put stress on this point. She said that if ever she went "insane," she believed it would be on this subject. Breathing is important; the skin breathes. To have the proper elements, you must have the proper food. Many times Green acts well for imbackelim.

A few minutes of Indigo sometimes helps. She told favorably about squatter toilets, such as were used in Spectro-Chrome Institute's Resident Quarters. Gas in the stomach makes action of the heart erratic. She had never been much of a drug giver and if she had Spectro-Chrome in former times she could have used it to great advantage.

W. Frank Bailey spoke about a type of toilet for children.

Martha J. Peebles told about a woman of 35 years, who had a nervous breakdown. She had to have the bed-pan every hour and produced a defecation sheerly by keeping her mind on the idea. Dr. Peebles thought that the woman had induced a habit and therefore had the sister lock the woman in her room. The first night she called all night for the bed-pan which was not given to her. The second night she called only a few times, but, after that she was all right. Dr. Peebles further said that there was no imbackelim in the army because there they automatically used the proper posture. They dug trenches and squatted on the ground on planks for the purpose. She said that cases of imbackelim were due many times to mechanical trouble and in such cases use Turquoise or Indigo on Areas 8-9 and 18-19.

Frank E. Kaufman said a child had imbackelim and Lemon, Yellow and Orange were used but there were no results. The child was "high-strung and nervous." Turquoise and Blue were used and the child felt better. Yellow was then used on 8 and 9 and the child was restored to health.

Dr. Alice M. Norton said that she had been practising dentistry for twenty-seven years. She found invariably when children had "acid mouth," the trouble was due to faulty backelim and that the root of this trouble was wrong toilet conditions. She told of the advice she gave in this connection, to mothers of the children.

Bessie A. Hasenau told of a stubborn case of imbackelim, where the sufferer was not co-operating and was using enemas. She cautioned the Associates about such cases.

Frank E. Kaufman was present as Delegate from Baltimore, Md. Centre; Erma I. Kyte as Delegate from Vineland, N. J. Centre, and Ruth O. Sinclair as Alternate from Vineland, N. J. Centre.

The morning session adjourned at Green 00 White.

First Day Afternoon Session

The afternoon session began at Blue 00 Black.

Irene Grace Dinshah read a telegram of good wishes from four New York Centre Associates who regretted their inability to attend the Convention.

The first speaker of this session was Dr. Kate W. Baldwin, who told about the horrible injustice of the outcome of Colonel Dinshah's case. Spectro-Chrome Therapy had done more for her than anything else in regard to helping others; she said that in the medical profession you need a vision, which, if you do not have you get nowhere; Spectro-Chrome is the most wonderful Healing Art in this century. She told about the serious burns produced by Arc Lamps and X-Rays and of the importance of the Magnetic Meridian; that any old position for tonation would not do. She said that we owe much to our leader Colonel Dinshah; that he performed superhuman efforts; she advised everyone to make the trip to Malaga to see the new additions to the buildings and told the Associates to do their level best, by putting their prejudices, (if they had any) in their pockets and seeing the thing through! She said she still hoped there might be some means of pardon or commutation of sentence for Colonel Dinshah. On the matter of diet, she explained the absurdity of throwing away the water in which foods were cooked and that foods should not be cooked very long. Dr. Baldwin

cited numerous serious cases that were normalated by Spectro-Chrome. One was an advanced T. B. sufferer. Her lungs were full of matter and she was expecting much. She came right up under Spectro-Chrome tonations; she changed so much for the better that people did not recognize her. She became so well that she cooked for and waited on a table of twelve. Another case was a man with a cyst in his throat; he was much relieved by Spectro-Chrome; the cyst became smaller and he gained in weight and health. Dr. Baldwin warned those present about "Stool pigeons" and told of a man who was very ill, sent for Spectro-Chrome tonations; he was supposed to die on her hands and the blame would redound on Spectro-Chrome! However, the man became better and that ended the farcical incident! She advised to get rid of one's sufferers if they are going to die, before they do die. She told of an eye case in a woman. The eyes were horrible looking—red and sore; she tested her on the Itisometer but did not dare to give Red tonation according to the dictation of the Itisometer, thinking perhaps something was wrong with the instrument. She gave Turquoise and there seemed to be no improvement. She tested the Itisometer and it was in perfect working order and it again indicated Red tonation for those eyes. Dr. Baldwin hesitatingly gave three Red tonations and lo! It was miraculous. The congestion disappeared and the pain left. The Itisometer had not failed! From that day to this, the person has had no trouble with her eyes. A man who had been gassed in the army was suffering from pneumonia and pleurisy. He was practically lifeless; his face at times became a clouded, dark color that might be compared to a light-mahogany. The spleen was very large and the liver was tender; he ate and slept very little. Dr. Baldwin said she had never seen anybody come up so well as he did. In a very short time, the spleen became decidedly smaller and he said he felt ever so much better under Spectro-Chrome. A woman had cancer

and had been operated on; it seemed to be a hopeless case. Her husband did not approve of her being tonated with Spectro-Chrome by Dr. Baldwin. He wanted to know what a *woman* could do in the case when all the best men doctors in town could do nothing! Dr. Baldwin clearly proved to him that women *can* do something, by normalating his wife through Spectro-Chrome. A case of cancer of the larynx where there was a swelling on the outside as large as an orange, and the sufferer could barely breathe, responded very well to Spectro-Chrome. The woman laid her hand on Dr. Baldwin's arm and said, "Dr. Baldwin, you are so good to me. You make me feel so comfortable." The audience was all attention and gave tremendous applause when Dr. Baldwin had finished.

Following Dr. Baldwin, was Dr. Martha J. Peebles. She extended a hand toward the portrait of Dinshah and said she deplored the resignation of Colonel Dinshah as President. She spoke of the beauty of Spectro-Chrome system as being within the visible spectrum whereas the systems that produced burns were beyond the visible spectrum, either on the Infra-Red side or the Ultra-Violet side. She said there is no need whatever for using the destructive rays when we have Spectro-Chrome Therapy. Always remove the cause or causes of trouble. Never promise too much to your sufferers; let them judge for themselves. She advised everyone to have an Itisometer if at all possible and said that she did not know what she would do without it. She warned that in accident cases an X-Ray picture should always be taken to determine if there be any fracture so that no blame could come on the head of the Therapist. She told of several serious abdominal cases normalated by Spectro-Chrome; also a fibroid case; the woman is now normal due to Spectro-Chrome. The audience appreciated the address of Dr. Martha J. Peebles.

Kashmira Dinshah spoke about the four violators who will soon be put on

trial in their Centre, in Vineland, N. J. She told also of rascality on the part of two residents of Vineland, N. J., (non-Associates) who dealt unfairly with the Institute who would never under any condition be awarded the Diploma of Spectro-Chrome Institute. Ernest Carreiro, a Graduate of the Boston, Massachusetts Class in Spectro-Chrome Therapy had disappeared with several of our Equipments only partly paid for and we were unable to locate him. Any advice as to his whereabouts would be appreciated. He had lectured in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, some time last October on so-called "Occult Breathing." Dr. Baldwin said that Carreiro asserted in his lecture, "When you hear me, your hear Dinshah!"

The afternoon session adjourned at Purple 00 Black.

First Day Evening Session

The first day evening session commenced at Red 00 Black.

By special permission of the Chief Executive Council, Dr. Emma H. Gabriel presented two sufferers, who would have been unable to appear the following day according to program. One was a young woman who had digestive disorder and had been on a milk diet. She had an attack and was very weak; she had almost given up hope. Dr. Gabriel gave her two tonations every day with the Graduate Equipment; according to the Itisometer, she used Turquoise on Areas 8 and 9. Around Thanksgiving time she took solid foods. She slowly gained in weight; she was 108 lbs., then 113 and now 138.

In April she was so much improved that she took a position and under Dr. Gabriel's supervision was using an Intermediate Equipment in her home. Dr. Gabriel said Spectro-Chrome saved that woman's life. She then introduced another sufferer whose entire right side was paralyzed as well as her left arm. She could not walk at all and was practically

helpless. After Spectro-Chrome tonation she can now use her arms and with assistance can walk. Dr. Gabriel explained that the improvement was indeed great and that she hoped to present this sufferer next year entirely well, walking herself. Dr. Baldwin said that she had seen the sufferer in the beginning and the improvement was so remarkable that it could hardly be described. President Irene Grace Dinshah stated that with Colonel Dinshah present at the next Convention and this gracious sufferer, a sufferer no longer, to her mind such would be "The Victory Convention." The sufferers then departed, as the session was open to Associates only.

The program was then followed.

Kashmira Dinshah rose as the representative of Colonel Dinshah and impressed upon the audience the fact that absolutely no notes were to be taken of his Message, because according to prison rules nothing written by a prisoner was released and that he had pledged his word of honor to that effect to the Penitentiary Warden John Wilson Snook. She then read aloud that Message to the Associates. It was in the usual emphatic and masterful style of Dinshah and was so realistic and truthful in its representation of the facts, that one after another handkerchieves were brought into use by the Associates. The hearts of all were full and their eyes welled with tears. Having visited her father in the Penitentiary on October 10, 1927, when she came to that part, the Secretary was overcome with strong filial emotion and could barely proceed. She, however, did justice to her duty and delivered the Message in a voice that carried the words of the incarcerated Originator to the attention of her hearers perfectly.

The Message had no bitterness and was purely businesslike, but, its human character showed the philanthropic feeling of its sender. In it he had good words for even his opponents, whom he wished good thoughts. On conclusion, the

Treasurer Kashmira Dinshah presented the Annual Report as of November 1, 1927. It showed a large increase in funds over that of last year. On motion of Rebecca Berenson, seconded by Esther Jennings, the Treasurer's Report was accepted by unanimous vote.

In Colonel Dinshah's Message, certain Eight Plans for the good of the Spectro-Chrome Cause were laid before the Associates. A Committee of seven was to go over the plans thoroughly and render a report to the Convention the next day, thrash the matter out carefully in the Convention and make the decision by vote, accepting one or more of the Plans outlined. The Associates decided it would be best for the President to appoint the Committee. Accordingly, Irene Grace Dinshah appointed a Committee composed of Frank E. Kaufman, Richard E. Sandbach, Bessie A. Hasenau, Maude B. Crans, Rebecca Berenson, Jennette J. Deemer and John F. Coyle. The Committee left the room, to discuss the Plans and it was voted that the meeting adjourn. The time was Orange 45 Black.

Second Day Morning Session

Tuesday the 29th, at Yellow 00 White, on suggestion of Associates the President requested Kashmira Dinshah to tell of her trip to see Colonel Dinshah in the Atlanta Penitentiary. Kashmira said that some horrible rumors were being circulated in Vineland and nearby in regard to "terrible treatment" being given Colonel Dinshah because he was supposed to have resisted injections for a certain disorder which he was supposed to have. With the determination to receive first-hand information, she went to visit the Colonel and to save expense did not take a Pullman, but, went by coach, sitting up all the way there and back. A prisoner there is allowed only two visits a month and as a Graduate of ours living in Atlanta, had been to see him twice that month, Kashmira said

they were not going to admit her. She finally prevailed on the Guard to admit her to the Warden's Office; when the Warden found that she was "one of the family from out of the State," (Georgia) he permitted her to see her father who was perfectly healthy as usual; he was resigned to his fate and had no complaints whatever. The Warden, Chaplain, Guards and other men were all very friendly toward the Colonel and they respected him for his learning. She told about the immaculate cleanliness of the penitentiary. She said that even though imprisoned, Colonel Dinshah adhered strictly to his high principles and through the kind courtesy of the Warden, had been supplied with vegetarian food. He was working there in the Power House, which was the work he had chosen. In conclusion, she said, "Colonel Dinshah is in constant touch with us and even directs work here, from there. He thinks constantly of the Associates and of the day when he will be again free to serve humanity." Kashmir was heard with rapt attention and appreciation.

The President called on Frank E. Kaufman, Chairman of the Committee appointed to report on the Plans, who gave the preliminary report accepting Plan Three and Plan Five, rejecting Plan Sixth and Plan Eighth. Dr. Kate W. Baldwin requested everyone to have his or her say right then and there so there would be no chance of confusion afterwards. There was much discussion and the subject was left open for the afternoon session. At Green 05 Black the morning session adjourned.

Second Day Afternoon Session

The second day afternoon session commenced at Blue 00 Black.

Earl Broadbent presented a Mr. Ferris, who appeared happy; the man showed radiant health and spoke about his own case. He had been a vegetarian

thirty-two years. He had always been healthy, but, in the Spring of 1927, he was "forced to call for help." He had contracts outside that required physical labor and he knew he was not in a condition to fulfill them. He was unable to sleep and suffered much pain. He called on Earl Broadbent on the last Sunday of May, 1927. He said he had been a very weak and sick man; Spectro-Chrome was used on him night and day. In two days he was free from pain and in three weeks was entirely well. Spectro-Chrome was a revelation to him. Broadbent told the Associates the Attuned Color Waves that were used in the case.

Dr. Kate W. Baldwin explained the difference between nudity and nakedness. She said there was no reason whatever for the practitioner to cause the sufferer embarrassment and that it is unethical, to say the least, to speak to anyone no matter who it was, about the marks, scars, deformities and the like that they as sufferers might have. She spoke also about the use of false Slides and Bulbs. She said that users of such false Slides were not real Spectro-Chrome Therapists; that they might save a few cents by buying other Bulbs than those supplied by the Institute, but, they would crack their Slides. It would certainly be no advantage in the long-run and it is against the Integrity Policies.

William I. Newbold told about his own case. He was at Spectro-Chrome Institute for a month, became well and took the Course, graduated and is now practising. Twice he was overcome by illuminating gas, once in his garage, another time in his cellar. He felt so weak, he was barely able to get up the stairs. He told his wife to give him the Slides to make the necessary combination and used Magenta on 4. Later he used Scarlet on 4. He soon became well and strong.

Esther Jennings reported a case pronounced as of cancer; the case was so far advanced, the doctors refused to operate;

the sufferer was given only ten days to live; he had very much pain and could not sleep. She tonated him for one month; the pain left and he improved; however, when she learned he was smoking 42 cigarettes a day and would not live up to the diet, she dismissed him, because such action was not fair to Spectro-Chrome. A woman aged 48 had terrible hemorrhages from Area 11. In four days' tonation the hemorrhages stopped entirely. The Waves given were Green Systemic, Indigo on 19 and 11, and Magenta on 4. Mrs. Jennings said the woman is very grateful to Spectro-Chrome and today is one of her very best friends.

Dr. Emma H. Gabriel presented Anna Schoener the paralysis case which was reported in SPECTRO-CHROME of Scarlet 1925. The father of the little girl had to assist her in walking, when she appeared at the Meeting held to take the place of the Fifth Annual Convention, on December 27, 1925. Not two years elapsed, yet the girl so improved by Spectro-Chrome tonations that she now walks to school. Dr. Gabriel requested the child to walk clear across the Convention Hall, which she did without any assistance. The father said that before he heard of Dr. Gabriel and Spectro-Chrome, he thought there was no hope for his little Anna; at first she could not move at all; her legs were so stiff. After only one tonation of Lemon she stretched her legs out! This convinced him that there was hope for his child.

Benjamin Kessler told about his aged father who was bedridden and was advised to be operated. After a few Spectro-Chrome tonations he became so spry that he walked several miles a day. He then visited Spectro-Chrome Institute.

David C. Bosworth described a case of a man, 56 years of age, still under his care, who could not walk, had very little use of his arms and had imbackelim. For

over thirty years he took physics. The tonations being given are Yellow on 8-9-10-19; Magenta on 4 and Orange on 17. The sufferer is getting along very well and the use of his limbs is gradually returning. He expects to recover totally.

Frank E. Kaufman spoke about a girl two years of age said to have had whooping cough. Besides the cough, her backelim was affected. He used Orange on 18 and 19 and backelim became normal. He gave two weeks of Green and Lemon systemic and Magenta on 4 and the child slept through the entire night without a single spell of coughing. One night, he failed to give Magenta in conjunction with the other Wave and the baby coughed. This proved to him that Magenta plays even a more vital part in Spectro-Chrome, than he had hitherto thought, thus, confirming the teachings of the Originator.

As Chairman of the Plan Committee, Kaufman then said that the final decision of the Committee would be given in the evening session.

Jennie Edelstein proved a very humorous reporter of cases. She had been asked why she took up Spectro-Chrome. In her reply she told of sad experiences in her own family; her husband and her children who died, she claims, owing to the ignorance of the Medical Doctors. Her husband was in an automobile accident; soon after, he began to lose weight and to "sink" in health; the doctors had twelve X-Ray pictures taken and endeavored to locate "cancers and ulcers;" they said they found *nothing*. Soon after such expert "diagnosis," he died with cancer of the stomach! One Medical Doctor said her daughter had spleen trouble and another said it was tonsil trouble; he removed the tonsils, after which she had trouble in the throat and later died, a victim of the humbug of medical "diagnosis." Mrs. Edelstein had a son who was accidentally thrown out of a boat and not wishing to worry

his mother did not tell her of the incident. Two weeks later, he "came home with a headache." The Medical Doctor said, "It looks like a case of appendicitis." The next morning he said it was something different. The result was as usual—"the boy died!" She said she wished she had Spectro-Chrome in those trying times. She reported a case of a woman who could not speak; the sufferer indicated that she had a pain at the back of her head. Indigo was given on the painful Area and Lemon systemic; the woman soon began to utter words. Another case of a woman whom she met casually, had severe pain in her shoulder, for which there seemed to be no remedy. Indigo systemic, relieved her. A man thirty-two years of age had his tonsils removed when fifteen. He breathed heavily and was worse than ever. Spectro-Chrome tonations normalated him. Her son (the only one of her children now alive) had trouble with his eyes; she used Blue, which made them smart; she switched to Indigo and in a very short time the eyes were normalated.

At this point, Dr. Martha J. Peebles asked the President what had happened to the Plan proposition, which should have been continued in the afternoon. Frank E. Kaufman said he had explained that the final decision would be reached and given at the evening meeting. Dr. Peebles said she must have missed the remark. The President then said the meeting would progress according to the program.

Kashmira Dinshah said there appeared to be some misunderstanding about Colonel Dinshah's stand in regard to the medical profession. His battle is waged against the "Octopus" and not any specific individual. It is the Medical Trust that is persecuting him and Spectro-Chrome and not the Medical Doctor as an individual. She further stated that work is going on at the Institute as usual, with the exception, of course, of

the teaching of new Classes. Equipment orders, Bulbs, Slides, the Printing of Stationery and the like, were being taken care of as ordinary routine.

Dr. Martha J. Peebles here voiced her opinion about orders, saying that within the last three months, Literature, Bulbs, Slides, etc., were coming through even quicker than before.

Elmer C. Heath spoke about certain peculiar indications of the Itisometer and requested enlightenment from one who had more experience in Itisometry. Dr. Martha J. Peebles gave satisfactory explanations.

Alice M. Norton, S. C. T., D. D. S., reported a dental case known as Bell's Palsy. After the dental work was finished, she tonated with Indigo; the tissues healed quickly and the Palsy condition was soon relieved. Dr. Norton said the case responded wonderfully.

Dr. Maude B. Crans told about a young man who had taken an active part during the World War; he had been subjected to the usual serum injections; he had fallen over an embankment; the sufferer was given up as hopeless; the expression had gone from his face, his appearance was one of dullness and listlessness and his relatives thought if the condition kept on, he would become an idiot, even though he was an intelligent lad and far from being a "dummy." Dr. Crans took him to Dr. Kate W. Baldwin for titisation and according to the indication, Dr. Crans tonated him with Red and Orange. He now looks bright and cheerful and is again taking an interest in life much to the delight of his family. A woman about seventy years of age had neuritis; she was suffering intensely. She was normalated by Orange, Yellow, Lemon and Magenta. A chemist had very severe burns and was normalated by Turquoise. Dr. Crans said, "I should not care to go on with my par-

ticular kind of work, which is Chiropody, unless I had my Spectro-Chrome." She stated that she found Yellow, Lemon and Orange very effective for strengthening arches, for fallen arches, and the like, rather than Indigo.

Erma Kyte told about the only case she tonated as yet and which is still under her care; the sufferer's ratio was 1 to 3; he was in such a terrible condition that she hesitated to take the case; she is now tonating the man with Lemon systemic and Magenta on Area 4 and he is responding very well. The President introduced Miss Kyte as having been graduated from one of the more recent Spectro-Chrome Therapy Classes. She stated Miss Kyte (being a shy young girl) made the request that she be not called on to address the Convention, but, the fact that she voluntarily reported her first case showed her interest in the system. The audience agreed that she had done very well and applauded her.

The afternoon session adjourned at Purple 03 Black.

Second Day Evening Session

The second day evening session opened at Red 00 Black.

Dinshah P. Ghadiali, Irene Grace Dinshah and Kashmiria Dinshah, of Spectro-Chrome Institute were unanimously re-elected as the Board of Trustees for the Association. The Trustees were installed in office by Dr. Kate W. Baldwin.

As to the appointment of Vice-Presidents the President said that Colonel Dinshah the third member of the Board of Trustees would have to be consulted. Dr. Martha J. Peebles said the Vice-Presidents, according to rules, would have to be appointed at the Convention. If this were not done, she moved that the Convention be held as null and void. Whereupon, Dr. Kate W. Baldwin said such procedure of shutting the meeting down would not be proper. There was some

discussion and argument between the two Vice-Presidents. Dr. Peebles asked if the Vice-Presidents were still in office and was informed they were. At this time, Red 40 Black, to the obvious surprise of the assembly, Martha J. Peebles resigned Second Vice-Presidentship in the Association. The President announced that the Board of Trustees accepted the resignation of Dr. Martha J. Peebles. Dr. Baldwin said since there were two of the three members of the Board of Trustees present, it would be in order to appoint the Vice-Presidents. A vote was taken and unanimously passed that the Vice-Presidents be appointed.

The Board of Trustees desired to re-appoint Dr. Kate W. Baldwin as First Vice-President, but, the worthy friend gracefully declined acceptance, stating it had always been her opinion and she had said many times that people should not hold an office too many terms; she could and would do just as much for the Cause as hitherto; she would always be our friend. She further stated that there were many good, honest Associates just as capable to choose from.

The Board of Trustees then selected Bessie A. Hasenau as First Vice-President of the Association, and Richard E. Sandbach Second Vice-President, both of whom accepted.

Dr. Martha J. Peebles asked the President where those two Associates belonged, where they came from, how they would attend Executive Meetings and so on. The President replied that Bessie A. Hasenau is affiliated with the First Cleveland Ohio Centre and Richard E. Sandbach with the First Philadelphia Pennsylvania Centre. Dr. Peebles said Cleveland was pretty far off.

The Vice-Presidents were then installed in office by the President.

Some Associates being present at this session, who had not attended the previous ones, the President requested Frank E. Kaufman, Chairman of the Plan Committee in regard to the Plans, to re-read all Eight and then to announce the final decision of the Committee. This was done and Mr. Kaufman said the Committee accepted Plan Three, Plan Five and Plan One; Plan two and Plan Seven were agreed upon favorably insofar as the Associates were able to comply. The floor was then opened for discussion. As there were no further comments or views, on motion of Dr. Alice M. Norton, seconded by Harriette M. Roberts, the final decision of the Plan Committee was voted upon and passed unanimously.

The President thanked Dr. Kate W. Baldwin and Dr. Martha J. Peebles for their devotion to the Cause and services in the past and requested a rising vote of thanks in honor of the retired Vice-Presidents, which was duly accorded.

Esther Jennings requested, and a rising vote of thanks was given Irene Grace Dinshah for her dutiful and able performances as the new President.

Dr. Martha J. Peebles said if the Associates present did not need another

Equipment, they might each be able to place one with a sufferer.

The newly installed Vice-Presidents Bessie A. Hasenau and Richard E. Sandbach said they would be dutiful and conscientious.

Kashmira Dinshah said the Association was taking orders for gold or silver pins with the Association insignia at \$2.00 each. If sufficient orders were received they would be manufactured; if not, the matter would be held in abeyance until Colonel Dinshah returns.

There being no further work on the program, the Convention was dissolved at Orange 18 Black, with invitation to visit the Principal Office, the next day, at Malaga, N. J.

After the Convention was dissolved, several Associates surrounded the President's table and congratulated her and the Treasurer-Secretary for the successful way in which they had conducted the meeting through a severe ordeal. It proved to them that Spectro-Chrome would live beyond the life of the Originator and further that it was a work worthy of the great efforts put forward to propagate it.
