### EIGHTH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF SPECTRO-CHROME THERAPISTS

#### Opening of New Auditorium by the President Colonel Dinshah with Simple Impressive Ceremony - Spectro-Chrome Entered the Second Seven Cycle

The Eighth Annual Convention of the American Association of Spectro-Chrome Therapists, which was to be held on November 28, 1928, was purposely delayed, by request of Colonel Dinshah, the Originator of Spectro-Chrome Therapy, because he expected release from incarceration and desired to attend the Convention.

Later, the following notice was issued by the Secretary of the Chief Executive Council, Kashmira Dinshah:—

#### *Notice of Eighth Annual Convention*

Dear Friend:

1. The Honorable President of the United States, Calvin Coolidge, having further considered the case of Dinshah P. Ghadiali and having in his gracious judgment decided to extend his Executive Clemency, another Commutation of Sentence was granted, with immediate expiration of the Sentence.

2. Thus, at last, our dear Dinshah received his vindication and will be home soon.

3. We have pleasure in notifying

you, under Article 15 of our By-Laws, that our deferred Eighth Annual Convention will assemble on Saturday, March 30, 1929, and two subsequent days, at the new Auditorium of Spectro-Chrome Institute, at Malaga, N. J.

4. Full particulars will follow in a few days. N. B.:—SMOKING IS NOT PERMITTED ANYWHERE ON OUR PREMISES

The response to these notices and invitations was encouraging and gratifying. Associates from distant parts of the United States of America were present to participate in the reunion and to greet Dinshah on his obtaining freedom.

The Convention opened at Yellow 05 White, on Saturday, March 30, 1929, in the Auditorium of Spectro-Chrome Institute, at Malaga, N. J. President Irene Grace Dinshah, having resigned the day previous, the Board of Trustees had unanimously chosen Colonel Dinshah P. Ghadiali, to fill the vacancy. Dinshah, therefore, was in the chair; the Vice-Presidents

Bessie A. Hasenau and Richard Sandbach were engaged in receiving the Associates.

### First Day Morning Session

As soon as the gavel knocked, an impressive silence pervaded the audience. Dinshah played on the organ "Invocation To The Benign Master" and sang to the Hindustani tune of Bhairavi.

As soon as the song was over, Dinshah made a short ceremony: "Friends, it gives me great pleasure to open this new Auditorium, dedicated to the service of suffering humanity, in the name of Those Benign Masters of Occult Wisdom, Whose humble messenger and servant I merely am. Although I originated Spectro-Chrome Therapy and its message was delivered by me to the World, its full credit should go to Those Grand Masters Whose Effulgent Omniscience guided me to evolve the Light of Precision from the Chaos in Therapeutics. Spectro-Chrome Therapy is the result of the untiring efforts of devoted souls, of ages past and I esteem it an honor to be the culminating entity for final presentation. I declare this Auditorium now open for service and you have recess of five minutes, to become acquainted with the new premises."

The Auditorium is fifty feet long and forty feet wide, with a double enclosed entrance, to keep out the wintry breezes. The entrance is on the East side, the speaker facing the East, from the platform, which is forty feet long and fifteen feet wide. On the ceiling is suspended a duplex dissolving view projector, for throwing diagrams on a screen twelve feet away, behind the speaker. It is a singular piece of apparatus, designed to avoid having the projector on the platform obstructing the free view and impeding the speaker. A similar housing suspends

the special three-color projector built by Dinshah; there is nothing to strain the necks of the audience, because, the four main beams are hung on trestles, supported by the roof and the Auditorium thus, has no pillars, which arrangement makes it convenient and imposing. To facilitate vision, the floor is slanted, which gives another advantage.

At the back of the platform, is located the large double console organ by Mason and Hamlin, blown by a powerful electric motor. The mercury vapor Cooper-Hewitt Lamp for demonstration of Fraunhofer Lines in the Spectrum, is hung on the right side of the speaker. The glass case containing the numerous surgical instruments, styled by Dinshah, "The Grave of Surgery," meets the eye of the visitor on entering the hall. On one side of the platform is a glass case containing the valuable Element Tubes and such other apparatus; on another side is a similar case with prisms and optical instruments. The right and left of the platform are arranged to open into the wings of the main building; therein much of the X-Ray and High Tension machinery as well as the High Frequency apparatus are housed, obviating the necessity of moving the tables for experimental work, during the teaching of a class.

The Associates went over the plant. The new Resident Quarters too, interested them. Each room is commodious and airy and has a bath room and toilet attached. The "squatter" system instead of the usual plumbing fixtures drew their attention; this is a sanitary system and removes the chance of the physical body coming into contact with any part of the fixture, the flush being operated by the pressure of a foot.

The kitchen is fitted with a new electric range of 13,600 watts, with

automatic cookers for preparing vegetarian meals for about a hundred persons. The hot water is supplied night and day, by an electric heater, fitted with thermostatic control, the water being taken from a driven well underground, by a turbine pump. The heating is done by electrically regulated Quiet May Oil Burners, installed by John E. Watson, of Woodstown, N. J.; thus, the entire system worked by electricity forms an up-to-date equipment insuring comfort with convenience.

The main power supply of 4,000 volts taken from the High Tension Lines of the Atlantic City Electric Company, enters through a transformer of 50,000 watts, the basement of the Research Laboratory of Spectro-Chrome Institute. It is thence distributed through a 14 feet main switchboard to the different points, for the supply of heat, light and power.

In speaking of this equipment, The Pitman Grove Review, of Pitman, N. J., dated Wednesday, April 3, 1929, commented as follows:—

“Local Contractor John F. Albers, is now installing one of the largest Hot Point Electric ranges and water heaters made by the General Electric Company, at the Spectro-Chrome Institute, at Malaga, N. J.

The above merchandise is being furnished by the Atlantic City Electric Company, distributors for Hot Point equipment.

The service and meter board necessary for this and other equipment is one of the largest installations in this section.

Col. Dinshah firmly believes in everything electrical, having one 13,600 watt Hot Point Range, one 7,500 watt range, one 5,000 watt water heater, three electric-driven oil burners,

three electric-driven water pumps, many motors, projecting machines, testing equipment of all kinds, furnishing plenty of light around the whole property.

He also is expecting to install a large beacon light for aviators and a completely-lighted landing field.”

After the short recess the Convention reassembled and the Minutes of the last Annual Convention (the Seventh) were presented as printed in the Red to Violet 1928 issue of Spectro--Chrome, volume 6, numbers 1 to 9.

Proposed by Bessie A. Hasenau, seconded by Clara Sandbach that the said Minutes be accepted as correct. The President in putting it to the vote, said that in the printed Minutes, his Annual Address was purposely omitted, because, it was against the prison rules to allow any matter to be sent out by a prisoner for publication and that he had pledged his word of honor last year, not to publish it, till he was out. Being now free, he was at liberty to publish it and that part would therefore appear in the present Convention records. It was as follows:—

Annual Address of the President of Spectro-Chrome Institute

American Association of Spectro-Chrome Therapists

In Seventh Convention Assembled.  
My Esteemed And Beloved Associates:

1. That on the Seventh Step of our collaboration, some unusual phenomenon should occur was expected, but, my being imprisoned at such juncture was unthought.

2. However, for me, “Iron Bars

do not a prison make," as my physical emotional and mental healths are absolutely unchanged, the powers energizing me through life being still the same, if not more.

3. This day, as I write, I complete 54 years on the Physical Plane, in this incarnation, according to the Zoroastrian Calendar; on the 28th current, when this message will be delivered unto you, I shall complete that age according to the Solar calculation. I have many more yet to pass for your service—human service—and I am looking forward to that time when having duly accomplished my Masters' mission, I may not be needed on the Physical Plane. His orders shall be obeyed at all costs.

4. What glory do I see for Spectro-Chrome! This Science Of Therapeutical Precision is the heritage of humanity's most precious evolution. It is incomparable, unrefutable, unchangeable, unchallengeable—it is destined to be the uplifter of the entire race and the uprooter of the false gods who have been for 6,000 years exacting the homage of the suffering humanity. It will outlive all!

5. We had our First Convention in 1921; within three years from its origination in 1920, the banner of Spectro-Chrome had waved from the Atlantic to the Pacific Coast, unopposed and successful. We started with a single room office in New York, N. Y., to-day we have an organized working institution of learning, occupying over 23 Acres. This was accomplished by dint of tremendous labor, perseverance and expenditure of all our earnings for propaganda. The Originator and his family were content to live in the simplest quarters, spending less than \$1,000 per year for their personal needs.

6. During that quick expansion and

success, just as I had laid by several thousand dollars to establish the Plant on the Malaga, N. J., estate, came into our life an entity from Portland, Oregon, which in 1925, schemed through the Octopus and other powerful organizations my ruin, financial and otherwise and well-nigh succeeded in wiping out my name, family and work. To save our noble cause cost me over \$25,000; my savings were lost, all plans for furtherance were shattered, my liberty was jeopardized, my reputation suffered in all directions and the waves of prosperity for the Institute turned into storms of debts.

7. I need not defend myself or my motives; you who know me and have worked with me, fully cognize my integrity of purpose and undivided faithfulness to my duties and obligations. I need no defense or defender; my conscience has nothing to answer or defend in the immutable laws of Occult Philosophy and though branded by the decree of the august Government of the United States, I shall continue to face you and the World without any fear or shame; in my sentence and consequent disgrace, the glory of America for ever shall stand disgraced and fallen.

8. The inventions of the Itisometer and the Sympathometer were the results of ceaseless labor and large expenses; however, the calamity wiped out every available resource and over \$20,000 had to be borrowed to fulfill the Leases of the Institute and fill the deficit. All Itisometer orders were delivered and building the new Sympathometer commenced.

9. When I took the Sympathometer orders last year, there was strong expectation that the learned judges of the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals would see through the deliberate perjury and reverse the conviction; but, that tribunal ruled against me on the absurd ground of "mesmeric control"

and piled on me further loss.

10. At such critical moment, all my lawyers deserted me after draining me dry; I had no means left to hire others; all talked in \$5,000 and \$10,000 terms and no guarantee or certainty of the issues. Money was pouring out and I was earning nothing but distraction in mind. I was faced with the alternative of either losing the entire Institute's resources or losing my liberty for want of money; I chose to lose my neck to save the Institute—my pet life-work of Spectro-Chrome and cut out all legal expenses by taking the reins of the case in my hands and dispensing with the legal sharks. Would that I had never employed a lawyer and fought myself from the start!

11. I was already very heavily obligated; a beloved friend had put up security to cover my Appeal Bond of \$10,000; I had to borrow \$9,000 here and more there to keep up the overhead expenses; it was all going out and not much coming in; I leave you to judge what my darling wife and sweet daughter were living on when I say that since the case started they did not have even a new suit of dress; many of you who saw my white jackets in the classwork would judge of my own "extravagance." We did it gladly and without grumble; we were bound to our duty unflinchingly.

12. The Secret Organization that was one of the corrupt means employed to encompass my destruction, being finally convinced of my innocence, tried hard to interest its Headquarters in Georgia: but, to protect their so-called "National Policies," their Washington, D. C. Chief Counselor refused to intercede with the U. S. Attorney General, although he believed that justice had miscarried. He pushed me out of his office—helpless; the air around me as it were went dark before me; I saw my doom approaching, when an etheric

hand guided me to the Headquarters of the Department of Justice, on a Saturday afternoon.

13. I succeeded in getting exceedingly courteous, sympathetic and human hearing from the responsible high officers of the department; except the Hon. Attorney General himself, I met practically all those who could help me solve the tangle, until I reached the Pardon Attorney James A. Finch, who was struck at the serious outlook of the case; he read the important Affidavits printed in "Railroading A Citizen"; he went over the two volumes and the whole Transcript of Record. He was determined to investigate fully and give me justice. He asked to produce the persons who had sworn the Affidavits; I visited him 14 times in all and each time he gave very long and patient interviews. I took there by automobiles witnesses from Florida and New York, involving large expenses and much loss of time and energy. Even the negro friend of the Complaining witness testified before him in my favor; deliberate perjury was clearly brought out; the Pardon Attorney spent much time on the case, to fathom it.

14. Meanwhile, the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals had rejected my Petition For Rehearing, in San Francisco, California. I petitioned that Court to grant me permission for a Writ of Certiorari to the U. S. Supreme Court and to stay the Mandate. Such permission being graciously given, I went to Washington, D. C. and petitioned the U. S. Supreme Court for final redress.

15. The Annual Convention of the Octopus Trust, assembled in Washington, D. C. on May 12, 1927; two days later, the august tribunal of equal justice to the rich and poor which holds the scales of the Blind Goddess, denied my Petition, without giving me hearing!

16. The Mandate was handed by the Circuit Court of Appeals to the Trial Court; the Trial Judge refused intervention; by order issued by the Department of Justice, the U. S. District Attorney in Portland, Oregon, held the Mandate from entry. I requested the Pardon Attorney to prevent my incarceration in McNeil Island by transferring the order to Atlanta, Georgia. This was done and a few days later, the Commitment Order was signed and Oregon ordered me to surrender voluntarily to the U. S. Marshal in Atlanta, Ga., by or before June 10, 1927.

17. The death knell was rung to finish my career, but the good Pardon Attorney was still investigating. I wired the Trial Judge to put me on probation; he rejected my Petition. The U. S. District Attorney denied my right to any Executive Clemency. The Pardon Attorney was not satisfied though with their denials and just the time when I was to surrender, a Respite of 60 days was granted by the Hon. President Calvin Coolidge to keep me out.

18. I was temporarily saved, but, that started me thinking as to what would support my family should the worst happen. After due deliberation, I decided to establish properly equipped Resident quarters and enlarge my lecturing facilities. It put the Institute into further obligations, but, it was to be a profitable project to save the situation.

19. I desire to leave this subject here and go back to the time when I started on my disastrous tour to Portland, Oregon in April, 1925. Upto that time, the Institute was clear of any considerable debts; there was a business loan of \$5,000 on a Note in the hands of our Bank, but, when I was tried and sentenced the quick financial needs necessitated further support. While the former transaction was

secured by a mortgage on the estate, the Bank now wanted the Deed of the whole property for securing a loan of \$10,000. I gave it—there was no other way.

20. This Note was repeatedly renewed; a year later, the Circuit Court of Appeals confirmed my sentence just as the Note was due for payment on February 21, 1927. The Bank served its Notice on February 17, 1927 that its Board refused renewal and asked for satisfaction. If I should not pay \$10,055 within the four days, the Bank insisted on eviction, putting the Institute out of the premises by right of possession.

21. I faced a veritable impossibility. I held an urgent consultation with all the members of the Chief Executive Council. You will remember the regulation we approved of last year about the consolidation of all the funds of the Association. That foresight came to our rescue. A kind friend loaned \$6,000 for 12 months on a Second mortgage, there being already a First mortgage of \$7,500 on the estate; a three year Third mortgage was taken by the Association at the usual 6%, as an investment of idle funds, for \$4,000 and once more the property of Spectro-Chrome Institute was in its own name.

22. The 60 days of Respite passed and President Calvin Coolidge granted another Respite of 30 days. I was being eaten up by tortures, financial and mental, yet, I kept on with my services to mankind, the Institute and the Association. The expansion and future provisioning needed voluminous expenses, but, I dared not stop the work. I realized keenly what it was to maintain my honor and reputation for integrity unsullied. I could not throw up my hands and dishonor my Leases with my Associates. The President of the United States and the Pardon Attorney as well as the U. S. Attorney General were out of the city

on their vacations and just as I thought I should receive a favorable termination, the papers pertaining to my pardon went before Acting Attorney General Hon. George Farnum. A legal cog in the intricate machinery of Justice missed its mesh and over the signature "Sargent" came a thunderbolt of a telegram denying submission of my Application For Executive Clemency to President Coolidge. A day later, my Respite expired. I pleaded for reconsideration of the adverse decision, but, instead of receiving a reply, I was arrested by two U. S. Marshals from my lecture room, on Saturday afternoon of September 10, 1927, on a Warrant as a "fugitive from justice!" I was taken to the Mercer County Jail in Trenton, N. J., whence I was removed three days later and transported to the U. S. Penitentiary in Atlanta, Georgia, absolutely unprepared and penniless. I am now there working in the Power House.

23. My imprisonment cut off at one blow practically the entire revenue of the Institute. To benefit my Graduates, I had signed the Integrity Policies preventing the sale or lease of any Equipment to the non-Associate and the denial of all services of the Institute to the general public. Though facing dire consequences, I am maintaining the Integrity Policies inviolate. Everything may be destroyed, but, my word of honor must stand. The past can not be recalled, the present is keeping me behind bars and for the shaping of the future, I am held responsible by The Benign Masters Whose message Spectro-Chrome Therapy is and of Whose Sacred Trust I am the repository. I must not fail.

24. Beset with numerous unexpected difficulties, surrounded by losses of all kinds, I endeavored hard by constant prayer and concentration to seek the right way out. On October 1, 1927, Saturday night, I received my response from Those Who Know

Better, commanding me to "leave the United States for India," if certain plans of mine should fail to materialize or my supporters and friends should turn their back on my work at this critical juncture. This address is in obedience to that order. There is no middle way with the Lords of Karma. It is either Yes or No. Spectro-Chrome Therapy depends on Spectro-Chrome Institute and our Association depends on the maintenance of the system intact. I need not remind that the future of our Cause depends solely on the prosperity of the Institute; the Association is a creation of the Institute and its policies are subservient to those of the Institute. It is the labor of the devoted workers of the Institute that gave life to and keeps alive our Association, the interests of the two being mutual. I therefore approach you, the representative components of the great Cause of Therapeutical Emancipation to come to the rescue in this hour of peril.

25. Notwithstanding all the annoyances and losses I passed through in this year, see what actual work was put in! The total number of Associates which was 259 then, is now 281, an increase of 22; the total of our funds then was \$853.39; now it stands at \$6019.66. This in spite of the cessation of our Centres in Portland, Oregon and Seattle, Washington, both of which neither sent any reports nor the funds and will have to be disciplined to recover the Association property they are unlawfully holding back.

26. To add to my hardships, many of those who subscribed for a Symptomometer, are canceling their order and demanding prompt repayment of their money. Under the Lease terms, though immune from legal complications, the pure name and high ethics for which the Institute is justly respected impose a duty that such repayment be granted. The final model is actually ready in the factory; it was

tested for months for accuracy and found perfect, but, until I am out of jail, the delivery can not be made, because, none else except myself knows the standardization of the astronomical details. Forget not, dear friends, for a moment, that I am a Federal Prisoner, a convict, a felon, a man without even citizenship rights under the laws of this country. While I am active as ever mentally, I am restricted on the Physical Plane by the powers that are on the Physical Plane. It was for such and other cogent reasons that I resigned as your President and left the control to the Board Of Trustees to do the right.

27. I am—we are—fighting the biggest battle ever waged against the Forces Of Evil controlling human lives and human health. They control large resources, untold millions of dollars and immeasurable influence to do what they please. We are a small, humble, struggling few trying to save true spirit of the Brotherhood of Man, by sacrificial services. Either we keep on, or we stop; and if you wish to stop, it is necessary that I know your wishes promptly, so I may take the steps proper to save a financial disaster which may perhaps land my family into the cold streets and destroy the reputation of the Institute.

28. I believe firmly however, that you, one and all, sincerely wish me to carry on the noble work, until the desired goal is reached. It needs money—cold solid cash. It needs as much money as each can spare, afford or float. I ask for no gifts, presents, contributions or donations; I positively will accept no such propositions. I *must* have money to keep the Institute alive and *must* plan the future long ahead—long before I leave this penitentiary. If you wish to co:operate with me as your teacher and guide in Spectro-Chrome, you will have to agree to one or several of the plans outlined herein. No other way appears feasible

or meritorious or which I can agree to without sacrificing my honor and principles and that never will be. The Masters have spoken their command and it has to be obeyed by me. On January 11 of next year, 1928, I enter upon the 21st year of my departure from the land of birth. The three cycles of 7 piled on my head enough troubles to crush a less dominant soul, but, I am still as vigorous in every way and with your kind backing and co:operation am able and willing to face all that may come hereafter. *Without* you, I refuse to stay in this country and shall seek other fields of activity, to fulfill my destiny and work for humanity.

29. Spectro-Chrome Institute as it stands today, is a living proof of our labors, a silent monument of what it can be if saved now from destruction. It is a potential university of learning and healing, saving the lives of the coming generations for ages untold. A few years only and it will be given the homage of the whole World, scientific and otherwise. I know its future and have no worry about that; my worry is only of *today*. What I gave the World in the past is nothing to what I have in me to give in the near future, but, with frozen large assets and without working capital, the inevitable ruin of the Institute will take place, if I slip a single step.

30. I can not in that crash involve my friends from whom I borrowed and who look to me for payment. While I gave *all* I had to America, you know what America gave me and where she put me. Yet, 1928 is a banner year for me and I expect to be with you then for a special session. Save meanwhile our Alma Mater, our Institute, our seat of future happiness, our dear ones who have toiled for you without any compensation except friendship. I care nothing for myself, because, the august Government is liberally caring for me, but, my

thoughts are only for those whom I left on the outside, the sharers of my sorrows, for joys I had none to offer them at any time.

31. I now place before you the Plans for securing the fulfillment of the objects sought and ask for your consideration.

#### PLAN FIRST

*Each of you buy at least One Hundred Dollars of the 8% Preferred Stock of the Institute. You may pay so much down and the balance in about three months. Thus, the Institute will have ample working capital provided to carry on the work and also relieve the pressing needs. It will be a good investment.*

#### PLAN SECOND

*Each of you lease at least One extra Equipment either for your use or sub-lease to a sufferer. Use your surplus cash for this purpose. To encourage you, the Institute agrees hereby to lease such Equipments at a 10% reduction during the current year, 1927.*

#### PLAN THIRD

Your Secretary has worked hard till now without any compensation. Under Article 36, the Chief Executive Council could have given her the reasonable sum of say \$25.00 per week, for clerical services during the last nearly three years. The Institute has taken care of all her requirements and of course will take care of in the future. However, it would be within the By-Laws, if the Chief Executive Council gave her the sum of \$3,900.00 for past services and also \$25.00 per week for the future. Such procedure would relieve the Third Mortgage for the Institute, which might be introduced as a condition for her past services, the future going to her in full rights. This will be payable as *clerical services*.

#### PLAN FOURTH

I have acted in a similar honorary way, as your President till now; a similar compensation at this time may smooth many matters; the future may be given to your new President by changing the By-Laws. Please remember that the Chief Executive Council *has all this power without asking you*, but, I am proving to you our sincerity and faithfulness by putting the matter for your approval, without setting precedent or prejudice.

#### PLAN FIFTH

You may voice your approval to allowing the Institute to be given loans at 6 per cent interest, from the Treasury of the Association. This will be a good feature, as, soon the Annual Dues being collected it will release a sum of money for tiding over a part of the difficulties, until better times arrive.

#### PLAN SIXTH

Take steps to purchase the entire Spectro-Chrome Institute and run it yourselves. For years, the exemplary strictly disciplinarian business methods of the Institute, have given rise to grumbles in certain quarters. Here is *your opportunity* to do better. Collect capital enough to support my family's needs till I am released from prison; give us only \$20,000.00 to pay for our emigration costs and the like; provide a reasonable Indemnity Bond that you will *not* sell the property or Spectro-Chrome to the Octopus Trust or otherwise and I shall turn over the full rights, titles, property, trade marks, copyrights, patents, everything *as is* and leave the United States without any delay. If any one or you can do better than my family and I did, I am ready to sacrifice my interests for the benefit of the World.

#### PLAN SEVENTH

The Institute has Resident Quarters,

where proper food and tonation are given at reasonable cost. Send sufferers who need such care and for whom you may have no facilities, to the Institute. If you will take a little trouble to do only *this*, very soon the tangles will all straighten out, without your spending a dollar.

#### PLAN EIGHTH

Should you *fail* to agree on any one or more of the stated seven plans, then, the only and *final* course rests with me exclusively. To pay off the liabilities and obligations of the Institute, in an honorable manner, to save my reputation and fulfill my promises, I *must* sell off the Real Estate of the Corporation, pay off the Mortgages and debts, disbanding all expansions and removing all the heavy machinery through quick sale from the premises. Then, should I see the daylight again, I may start the battle of life over again; otherwise, it could not be done. Until I am released from incarceration, my family will conduct the business in that case from some small quarters; afterwards, I shall provide suitably for the maintenance of the leases and the like and shall leave this country which disowned me. It is left up to your judgment and discretion to approve and indicate *your* wishes. I suggest nothing, enforce nothing; I did my duty, may you do yours as conscientiously.

32. A few words now in regard to my most worthy colleagues on the Chief Executive Council. Our First Vice-President Kate W. Baldwin, performed her duties since the year of her joining, very devotedly; I doubt whether there could be any *better*; she stood by me through my hardships like a true friend and I express to her my sincere and cordial thanks. Similar expression of my best regards I offer the Second Vice-President Martha J. Peebles, who helped the Cause in many ways during the past.

33. However, in completing our Seven Year Cycle, I find that our future work lies in a slightly different direction. I *know positively* that the medical profession and Spectro-Chrome *never will go together*; it is to be a survival of the fitter and Spectro-Chrome *must win by placing "A Spectro-Chrome, In Every Home."* My plans for this are matured and I am taking all precautions and steps to save embarrassment to those beloved friends who are connected with the Octopus Trust while giving us their level best. The work of my Institute is for human service and the Institute will *not* hereafter receive as its student anyone connected with that ruinous Trust. This step is vital to the safety of my mission and will prove highly beneficial to the lay practitioner, avoiding all confusion of ideas, views, therapies and consequent production of complications. Later, the same will apply to all other healing systems, leaving the field of Spectro-Chrome for exclusive services. It will benefit you.

34. I can not close this address without speaking about two others; I allude to my wife Irene and daughter Kashmir. I beseech you to give your new President Irene your undivided loyalty. If America gave me nothing else than this girl, who was instrumental in bringing to life my three sons, then, I say may America live and be blessed for ever. Irene is a darling sweet wife and a devoted mother and I feel sure that she will prove a loveable and firm-minded President of our Association. Kashmir has given me the most dutiful assistance since her youngest days and has suffered with me all the privations and miseries. My heart is sad that she has had no time in working for Spectro-Chrome to use her life for more profitable development. She is the light of my eyes and if something be done to encourage her to keep to her task, it will be warmly appreciated. I thank cordially both these colleagues for their love, patience

and devotion.

35. In conclusion, I ask you to give your very concentrated attention to this message which will be delivered through the mouth of your Secretary who will represent me. She knows what my instructions are and has my confidence. Appoint a "Plan Committee" of Seven Associates to go over this matter thoroughly and render a report to you tomorrow. Then, thrash out the whole in the Convention carefully. Make your decision by usual vote and let me know through the Board of Trustees. I shall act accordingly as is fit.

36. I bow to the Divine Will and the Laws of Karma. I bow to the command of The Benign Masters of Occult Wisdom Whose Effulgent Radiant Powers made me the humble messenger of Spectro-Chrome. I bow to you.

37. I have gone through my acid test and survived it; I shall emerge from incarceration a stronger and more powerful individual—stronger than ever in my faith, better in every way to serve you and mankind for decades to come. It is left to you to prove your loyalty and steadfastness to the Cause by staying at the helm of public service. The World needs you and Spectro-Chrome; if you will stand *your* acid test in this emergency, this Convention may safely be styled the "Victory Convention"—the evil forces will have been conquered.

38. A timely warning from One Who Knows. The Institute has Sublease Form for Self-Use of Equipment. I urge you to follow that system rigidly to escape spite work of the Octopus, to avoid "tonation" technicalities.

39. A request is made for you to visit Malaga, N. J., on Wednesday,

the 30th current and look at your Spectro-Chrome Institute; you will be amazed and delighted.

40. Under Prison Regulations, I am not allowed to write for publication; hence, our monthly Spectro-Chrome will have to wait until I am out.

41. A few words to those who are looking forward to the Post-Graduate Courses. They will have *one* important requirement as qualification for enrollment; the Applicant shall have adhered strictly to the dietetic system of Spectro-Chrome Therapy to receive consideration. Begin now if you did not before.

42. The outcome of this Seventh Convention will have a wide influence on the future of the Healing Art. It will also test our stability after my death; there is a deeper import in all this; you may learn it later. Use your discretion; prove our strength.

43. My liberty can be easily secured, if someone by proper means may prevail upon the Hon. President Calvin Coolidge *to request* the Attorney General of the United States to submit my papers to him. Before being imprisoned, I completed all the voluminous preparations for that purpose and left them with the Department of Justice in Washington, D. C. Is there *any* among you who will do this great service? Single-handed, I finished my work; can you and will you all jointly find a channel to see the President?

44. I have spoken; though physically 1,000 miles away, I am with you—right here—otherwise. I am following your steps; the All-Seeing Eye of Heaven is watching me and I am watching your welfare. May we soon be joined in the furtherance of the only cause worth living for in the World—unselfish service to humanity. Peace and happiness to you, my dear friends; may all joy be yours *according*

to merits; may the same good thoughts follow our opponents.

The minutes were unanimously accepted.

Reports of the First Philadelphia Pennsylvania Centre and the First Vineland New Jersey Centre were read and accepted. A rising vote of honor, in silence was accorded to the memory of Josephine B. Twichell, Eleanor Holwick, Oscar Hesse and other associates who died during the preceding year.

Drs. Nissin S. Hanoka and Simon Weissburg spoke about the First New York New York Centre and regretted that the conditions around New York hampered the progress of Spectro-Chrome Therapy.

Dr. Kate W. Baldwin said there was no system equal to Spectro-Chrome, but, it had to be used according to technique; it was necessary to use horse sense; the Itisometer was a marvelous instrument: she had an eye case in which the Itisometer persistently indicated that the Red At-tuned Color Wave should be used; she hesitated; finally, she used it and the disorder disappeared; she would not do without the Itisometer; she suggested every Spectro-Chrome Therapist should have an Itisometer.

T. Bayard Brunt said that Spectro-Chrome needed a leader; in every Centre there was need of a leader; during the absence of Colonel Dinshah, the Associates were left without guidance and Dr. Kate W. Baldwin's assistance at such time was very helpful.

Dr. Charles Grapek stated that he

did not push Spectro-Chrome much, because, he did not see his way clear to getting supplies, if anything happened to the Originator; it was no use creating a following in such case.

Dinshah said that such contingency was provided against and that the business of Spectro-Chrome Institute would go on even after his death.

After a few casual suggestions, the Convention adjourned till Blue 00 Black.

### First Day Afternoon Session

The Convention reassembled at Blue 10 Black. This session being open to invited guests, the Auditorium was full. Many cases were introduced personally by the Spectro-Chrome Therapists attending them. The interest of the audience did not flag for a moment and all enjoyed the information given.

The President greeted the guests on behalf of the Association, thanking them for their presence and introduced as the first speaker of the afternoon, Dr. Kate W. Baldwin. He extolled her services to the cause, her steadfast adherence to Spectro-Chrome and the good work she did among sufferers. She was given enthusiastic applause.

Dr. Baldwin spoke at length of the benefits of Spectro-Chrome, even in surgery—constructive surgery. The bones healed quicker, post-surgical complications being also avoided and the formation of harmful adhesions was rendered less likely. One doctor wants Spectro-Chrome used to prevent adhesions.

Ruth Sinclair spoke of a case of a boy, corroborating the facts.

Esther Jennings introduced one of the sufferers under her care; she was Mabel McCullough of 17. She was in

bed for 6 years; could not help herself; she could not turn over in bed; was like a newborn infant; she had what they joked as "sleeping sickness of a waking kind"; weighed only 60 pounds when Mrs. Jennings took her; she was then not digesting much food; was restless 24 hours of the day. Now, after a few months of Spectro-Chrome care and food she ate well, slept with comfort and talked some; her Backelim was in order; she walked some too; her weight went to 86 pound Mabel was "put through the steps" by Esther Jennings, who gave much credit to the guidance given her by Kate Baldwin. The case was listened to and Mabel's talk and walk observed with rapt attention by the audience. The Association extended a hearty vote of thanks to Esther Jennings. Mrs. Jennings also reported the case of a girl who was pronounced by the Medical Doctors as having a "leaky heart." Under the Magenta, this case was brought to normalcy by Spectro-Chrome, the ache in her joints, the rash on her body and other conditions which kept her out of school disappearing quickly.

Dr. Nissin S. Hanoka introduced a sufferer Zelda Hananel of about 5. This girl had fever two years ago and in five days five Medical Doctors were called to care for her; they did not know what the illness was and the girl was bedridden with infantile paralysis. Nissin S. Hanoka undertook the case and in about two months, the girl began to walk around, thanks to Spectro-Chrome. Zelda was asked to walk and she moved about to the applause of those present. The parents of the girl are staunchly for Spectro-Chrome.

Mrs. Ida Souder introduced the case of her son William of 21. He had a partly collapsed right lung, was suffering seriously from pulmonary phthisis three years ago and was sent to the New Jersey State Sanatorium. He had 23 hemorrhages of 8 to 10 ounces of

blood each time and even with 20 enemas his bowels could not be brought into action. His father pleaded with Colonel Dinshah, to receive the boy under the care of Spectro-Chrome Institute on the opening of the Resident Quarters of the school. On July 4, 1927, William Souder was brought into Spectro-Chrome Institute, in a hopeless state. The Medical Doctors of the sanatorium had given the father to understand that the boy would not live three weeks. When William was taken out of the automobile and placed on a chair, he crumpled onto the floor. Dinshah received him, after sizing the gravity of the situation, at Turquoise 00 Black and promptly used Spectro-Chrome measures. Within one hour and a half, the boy sat up in bed and by four hours had Backelim. Soon after, he ate a hearty meal and the next day went downstairs to dine! On Monday July 11, 1927, just a week after admission to the Resident Quarters, William Souder joined the 46th class in Spectro-Chrome Therapy and graduated with his mother in due course!!!

While William was studying, the Medical Doctor of the Sanatorium called to see him and was surprised to find William in the class; he could hardly believe his eyes when he saw William's right lung, which was formerly partly collapsed, breathing normally! He admitted he did not comprehend what did it, but, the fact was there. William is still alive.

Dr. Emma Gabriel spoke of a boy who went through an automobile accident and had infection; he was under Spectro-Chrome 24 hours of the day. Mrs. Agnes Russell, his mother spoke at length, how it was a case for a surgeon; the boy recovered.

Jokes were cracked about Spectro-Chrome abscesses being broken with Spectro-Chrome. Esther Jennings described a case of abscess.

Dr. Welcome A. Hanor said he was about the only Medical Doctor of twenty who graduated in Spectro-Chrome, from the class in Bradford, Pa. He spoke of the valuable aid Spectro-Chrome was; he described a case of a woman who was discharging from ankle to hip and had no relief for 10 years; 12 tonations of Spectro-Chrome restored her to normalcy.

Allusion was made about the Resident Quarters of Spectro-Chrome Institute. Here, the sufferers were taken in hand under exclusive Spectro-Chrome methods and restored to equilibrium in very short time; the rate was moderate; only \$35.00 a week and no extras, tips or gratuities.

Dr. Margaret Morris spoke of the wonderful relief Spectro-Chrome gave in her broken ankle case; stayed day and night under Attuned Clor Waves; son was furious, but, no surgeon was called.

Bessie A. Hasenau, First Vice-President of the Association, spoke of an interesting case of a woman who was the Principal in a school in Lakewood, Ohio. She was declared suffering from Chronic Nephritis and had trouble in walking. Spectro-Chrome set her right; she would take the next Course.

Nachman Diamond, of Wildwood, N. J., then told the audience, how he suffered with illness and went to the best Medical Doctors, but, could obtain no relief. He was 71 years old, but, thanks to Spectro-Chrome he was restored to health in 4 weeks whereas the Medical Doctors wanted at least 5 months. He weighed 148 lbs. He normalated a boy of 11 suffering from Tonsilitis; they wanted to operate on him; tonations set him right and the tonsils stayed in. Toothache in a girl was relieved by one tonation of

Indigo. Many troubles of his wife were normalated by Spectro-Chrome.

Richard E. Sandbach, Second Vice-President of the Association, spoke of a man of 36 years, who collapsed and was injured in his back. He laid flat paralyzed. Several Medical Doctors were in attendance; chiropractors helped some; he recovered under Spectro-Chrome. Many other cases were described.

## FIRST DAY EVENING SESSION

Kate W. Baldwin, M.D., F.A.C.S., the champion advocate of Spectro-Chrome, opened the evening session, amidst loud and continued applause. She enumerated several bad cases of hiccough, heart disorders and cataract which all responded to Spectro-Chrome; she trusted Spectro-Chrome in cataract cases. She described a case of a woman who was operated upon without benefit by someone prior. She had a severe heart disorder; the Medical Societies will not believe it, but, one hour under Spectro-Chrome acted like a miracle; the heart became normal. She spoke of the case of the burnt girl Grace Shirlow and described at length how Spectro-Chrome took care of all the requirements step by step, including the action of the kidneys. She said, "Any burn will yield to Spectro-Chrome; the pain disappears in half an hour. It is no use going on with description of cases; they all act the same way. In cancer, the knife does no good; if taken early, Spectro-Chrome will normalate them. Cutting into normal tissue is not good. Even in cases where ether is to be administered in surgery, the use of Spectro-Chrome prevents nausea. Spectro-Chrome knits bones together quickly. I am opposed to serums and antitoxins. It makes me sick to think of so much suffering; Spectro-Chrome can do much good."

Her address was heard with rapt attention; it contained many suggestions and encouraging points.

Dinshah spoke caustically against Vaccination; he would not countenance the introduction of any foreign bodies in the blood stream. He said the law was not about compulsory vaccination, but, compulsory education. He said, "Let your children keep on going to school and let the school teacher keep on sending them home; then the blame of truancy will not be on the heads of the parents. No power on Earth can ever justify compulsory puncturing with a tool; it is assault, battery and mayhem; it is nothing but a rape on the body."

Bessie A. Hasenau spoke of her mother's case; she had not been healthy in 16 years; her heart had no rhythm; in less than 2 days, Spectro-Chrome showed its good effects; her mother was in good health now. She spoke about a case of arthritis in an old woman, where actually crystals like rock-salt were appearing on the body; Spectro-Chrome normalated her.

The session adjourned at Yellow 20 Black.

## SECOND DAY SESSIONS

The second day was all devoted to the relation of the experiences of Dinshah in Atlanta, Georgia and what difficulties he surmounted to preserve his health and principles in diet and otherwise. He tendered the highest praises to the indefatigable investigation of his case by the United States Pardon Attorney James A. Finch, Assistant Attorney General Mabel Walker Willebrandt and Director U. S. Bureau of Investigation J. Edgar Hoover. He also spoke of the considerate action of the U. S. Attorney General John G. Sargent, who recommended his re-

lease and the President Calvin Coolidge, who ordered him freed from incarceration. He was vindicated. He declined to speak openly or publish anything about certain of his activities while there, hinting that what he did was his duty as a citizen and as a demonstration of his loyalty to the Government of the United States.

Moved by Dr. Welcome A. Hanor and seconded by Ruth Verbeck "That this Association hereby expresses its most grateful appreciation and thankfulness, to U. S. President Calvin Coolidge, U. S. Attorney General John G. Sargent, U. S. Assistant Attorney General Mabel Walker Willebrandt, Director U. S. Bureau of Investigation J. Edgar Hoover and U. S. Pardon Attorney James A. Finch, for their careful consideration of the case of our President Dinshah P. Ghadiali, which resulted in his receiving the extension of Executive Clemency and release from incarceration in the United States Penitentiary, at Atlanta, Georgia." Unanimously passed.

Dinshah showed diagrams of his many new inventions, among which were the Caloreg, Kaspiramer, Pranamer, Shvasayantra, Sanslide, Currecut, Leasemer, Irradiator, Collocoin, Causetone, Tonepan and the like. He was working on combining them all with the Itisometer and Sympathometer in panel boards, so Spectro-Chrome may be lifted from being separate Equipments to a complete System of Automatic Precision. He designed all this in captivity; he also wrote about 3,000 pages.

He then spoke of the dishonesty of several Spectro-Chrome practitioners in Vineland, N. J. and hinted that the time was ripe to change the name of the system from Spectro-Chrome Therapy to Spectro-Chrome Metry, because Spectro-Chrome was now a

complete system of measurement of the imbalance.

Moved by Clara Sandbach and seconded by Milda Steinharter that the Convention approved the name Spectro-Chrome Metry. Unanimously passed.

Moved by Margaret Morris and seconded by Simon Weissberg that the Convention also approved the name Spectro-Chrome Metrists. Unanimously approved.

Dinshah promised that as soon as the Spectro-Chrome Institute was ready he would act upon the suggested changes; Spectro-Chrome Metry was to be considered at once and when the Panel Board System would be ready, the designation of such Graduates would be Spectro-Chrome Metrists.

Moved by David McKibbin and seconded by Benjamin Kessler that Spectro-Chrome Institute be asked to establish a preliminary training course; John A. Cohalan and Raymond Blegen advocated the raising of standards. Unanimously passed.

Dinshah said that as the system was a machine-worked system, longer courses would serve no purpose; however, when the Panel Board would be inaugurated, he would have a Preliminary Home Training Course, before the Resident Course be taken, so as to save the teaching time of Spectro-Chrome Institute in the theoretics.

### THIRD DAY SESSION

The Third Day of the Convention had only a single session in the morning, but, it was full of events; there was warm discussion.

The Secretary-Treasurer Kashmira

Dinshah having resigned her office, Irene Grace Dinshah was appointed by the Board of Trustees as Secretary-Treasurer. Her report as Secretary was read and unanimously accepted by motion of Bessie A. Hasenau, seconded by Nissin S. Hanoka.

The Treasurer Irene Grace Dinshah submitted her report; it was unanimously accepted by motion of Simon Weissberg, seconded by Bessie A. Hasenau.

Dinshah then suggested certain changes in By-Laws, to protect the lay practitioners of Spectro-Chrome, by having all sufferers join as Collaborators of the Association and the like. Very interesting and pungent discussion ensued; the practitioners of Spectro-Chrome who were licensed under their State Laws for their system of therapy, raised strong objections. Martha J. Peebles, M.D., raised the biggest objections against such "dictatorship" on the part of Dinshah. She did not care two hoots for medicine, but, she thought it was not fair to compel such measures.

Dinshah said that the attitude of the Medical Trust against Spectro-Chrome forced him to take some definite steps to protect the lay practitioners. The Medical Doctors and Osteopaths were self-protected; they did not need him to protect, but, he had to consider the lay practitioners for justice.

Charles Grapek, M.D., D.O., raised objection to "dictatorship."

Bessie A. Hasenau spoke in favor of protection; Nissin A. Hanoka D.D. S., spoke in favor of devising some way to protect those who needed such assistance.

Dinshah said that he was far from being a czar, but, it was our duty to

protect ourselves. He was bound to take every possible step to prevent persecution of his Graduates, at the hands of the Medical Trust. He was not a dictator, but, it needed a steady hand and iron nerves to fight the Medical Octopus, by steering the ship of Spectro-Chrome to success.

Benjamin Kessler moved and Simon Weissberg seconded that a hearty vote of thanks be tendered to Kashmira Dinshah our retired Secretary-Treasurer, for the able way in which she conducted the duties of her offices. Unanimously passed.

Moved by Marguerite Sait-La Roe and seconded by Clara Sandbach that a hearty vote of thanks be tendered to Irene Grace Dinshah for the efficient way in which she managed the affairs of the Association, during the absence of Dinshah. Unanimously carried.

At this point, Dinshah stood up and offered to the Chief Executive Council his resignation as President and Trustee and as a Fellow of the Association. He said the rules of common sense, decency and corporations, made it imperative that he resign to prevent embarrassment to his worthy colleagues and co-workers, owing to his incarceration.

Dinshah's resignation, so sudden and unexpected, produced an electrical effect upon the Convention; there were murmurs of amazement and regret all through; Bessie A. Hasenau moved and Yetta Kessler seconded that an unconditional and absolute vote of confidence be given to Dinshah for his unselfish and loyal services to Spectro-Chrome and that he be requested to reconsider the resignation and withdraw it. The motion was further supported by Clara Sandbach

and Margaret Morris. On being put to the vote by the Vice-President, the motion was unanimously carried amidst the applause of the Convention which rose to its feet to honor the Originator of Spectro-Chrome.

Dinshah withdrew his resignation and expressed his cordial thanks and appreciation for the confidence. He gave his life to Spectro-Chrome and would do his level best to serve his Associates.

Martha J. Peebles said she realized what heartaches the wife and daughter had to go through in his absence; but, they managed the business of the Institute devotedly and she was glad the days of trials were over. She said, "To look upon the marvelous instruments evolved by the man, as shown on the screen, would suggest to anyone that they are the results of a master mind. It simply floors one to look at those charts that will be used in the future. I have been nearly eight years in Spectro-Chrome. After 22 years of straight medicine and surgery, I went into Spectro-Chrome and I found that nothing in medicine even approached Spectro-Chrome. I want Colonel Dinshah and Spectro-Chrome Institute to reap their rewards so justly deserved."

Dinshah thanked the worthy doctor for her sympathetic expressions and assured her that in the new system he was designing for the protection of his lay Graduates, he would have nothing that would do any injury to the professionally licensed practitioners. He promised a just, fair and equitable dealing to all.

William Flick, M.D., expressed his pleasure in coming to the Convention. He was not a speechmaker. He was starting to use Spectro-Chrome in a

new territory. He wished all success.

Dinshah P. Ghadiali, Irene Grace Dinshah and Bessie A. Hasenau were elected Trustees for the year. They were duly installed.

The Board of Trustees, appointed Richard E. Sandbach as First Vice-

President and Ruth Verbeck as Second Vice-President. They were promptly installed.

There being no further business the Convention dissolved around noon.

The meeting of the Chief Executive Council took place right after.
