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THE TEMPLE

COSMICALLY The Temple of the People corresponds to the Femple of Humanity.

THE TEMPLE of Humanity consists of all humans who, having awakened into a knowledge of their own divinity, have undertaken to tread the Path, and of those who devote their lives to the unselfish service of mankind.

SPECIFICALLY The Temple of the People is one of the bodies or vehicles for the manifestation of the Avatar or Christos for the New Dispensation, the dawn of the New Civilization for the races of the earth. It was founded in New York State in the second cycle of the Great Lodge movement in November, 1898, by three Masters assisted by others for the laying of the mental, physical, and spiritual foundations of the coming Sixth Race.

THE OBJECTS of the Temple are:

First: To formulate the truths of religion as the fundamental factor in the evolution of the human race. And this does not mean the formulation of a creed.

Second: To set forth a philosophy of life that is in accord with natural and divine law.

Third: To promote the study of the sciences and the fundamental facts and laws up n which the sciences are based which will permit us to extend our belief and knowledge from what is known to the unknown.

Fourth: To promote the study and practice of Art on fundamental lines, showing that Art is in reality the application of knowledge to human good and welfare, and that the Christos can speak to humanity through Art as well as through any other fundamental line of manifestation.

Fifth: The promotion of a knowledge of true social science based on immutable law, showing the relationship between man and man, and man and God and nature. When these relationships are understood we will instinctively formulate and follow the law of true brotherhood.

RELIGION, SCIENCE, AND ECONOMICS, these are the foundation stones of The Temple. There can be no true religion without its scientific basis, and there can be no right economic system not based on a science that is religious and a religion that is scientific.

SYMPOSIUM ON BROTHERHOOD

The last week in February was set aside as Brotherhood week in the United States and was observed throughout the country.

On February 29 the Temple members held a symposium on Brotherhood at the Sunday afternoon service. The following papers were read at that meeting; the talk of the Guardian-in-Chief appears under the Editorial Mirror.

BROTHERHOOD—THE LAW OF LIFE

In all great movements launched for the good of humanity there is at least one force and goal to be recognised, put into form and practiced. With the coming in of Theosophy came the advancement of that basic principle, the Brotherhood of Man, adopted as absolutely essential to the support and growth of the superstructure of the Lodge. This Brotherhood is indigenous to the life of the planet and all its peoples and is sustained by bonds of Divine Love, loyalty, devotion, sacrifice, service and equal-mindedness. Together as brothers we stand, divided we fall.

Many efforts have been made by the Lodge at various times to establish and develop this principle in a nucleus group of disciples and then universally between man and man. And H. P. B. speaks of this in the following passage: "We are not working merely that people may call themselves Theosophists but that the doctrines we cherish may affect and leaven the whole mind of this century. This alone can be accomplished by a small, earnest band of workers, who work for no human reward, no earthly recognition, but who, supported and sustained by a belief in that universal Brotherhood of which our Masters are a part, work steadily, faithfully, in understanding and putting forth for consideration the doctrines of life and duty that have come down to us from immemorial times. Falter not so long as a few devoted ones will work to keep the nucleus existing. You were not directed to found and realize a universal Brotherhood, but to form the nucleus for one; for it is only when the nucleus is formed that the accumulations can begin that will end in future years, however far, in the formation of that body which we have in view."

Thus said H. P. B., and when the Temple line of the Lodge came into outward action this principle was revitalised and carried forward with renewed power and purpose. In his last communication to a Temple convention Dr. Dower, then Guardian in Chief of The Temple, said: "With One Heart, many hands and feet, we go forth to battle with the powers of darkness whose one and only mission is to attempt to disintegrate the work of the White Lodge whose great mission is to bring all true disciples back to their spiritual source in the heart of God through the formation of a true Brotherhood of Souls on Earth."

Brotherhood is based on the fundamental truth of life, that from the inner, higher standpoint we all are one, all children of the one spiritual Father and therefore all brothers, and should treat each other as though we were of blood kin.

Brotherhood means helpfulness to and for all, without

thought of reward.

However, the Law is such that you cannot help another

without helping yourself through it.

Nature takes advantage of that law in all realms of being, in many ways. A great many plants depend on insects carrying the pollen from plant to plant as they stop to gather nectar from the flowers. Cows are often seen washing with their tongues each other's ears. The great planets of solar systems are held in place by one another: the magnetic pull of one balancing the magnetic pull of another. Squirrels gather nuts and bury them, one nut in a hole, in a 75 or 100 foot circle around the nut tree. If the squirrels forget to dig up the nuts for eating, new trees will sprout and grow from them. And so, as insects, birds, and animals help nature, they help themselves.

Likewise with us human beings. Helpfulness to and for all is what Brotherhood is, and through it alone can man truly advance himself. The Christ returns to earth periodically to help humanity through spiritual guidance; it is a part of His work under the Law of Primogeniture, the Law of Brotherhood, that unites the whole human family. And thus He is with us again as the Avatar, to unite the races of the earth in bonds of Brotherhood. When He—as Jesus of Nazareth—left us in his last incarnation, He stated: "This is my commandment, that ye love one another, as I have loved you."

President Roosevelt caught the spirit of Brotherhood in putting it forth for the nations when he established the Good Neighbor Policy, as Prime Minister McKenzie King and others

also practiced it for international purposes.

Applying the spirit of helpfulness—Brotherhood—to and for all; and all the nations doing the same; sharing each other's world problems; aiding destitute nations where there are crop failures, earthquakes and disasters—thus practicing international Brotherhood, leads to the beautiful heavenly spirit of the Great White Lodge of Brotherhood, in which complete Oneness and Unity in all things reign supremely.

The plan for this dark star—our earth—is to unite the whole into one great international Brotherhood, as Master Morya stated in His message to The Temple given in 1915, under the

title Many in One:

"To you, sworn neophytes of the Sons of Wisdom, to you, I,

Morva speak.

"Once CHILDREN of many races, now MEN of One race the race of Universal Brotherhood; once subjects of MANY kings, citizens of MANY countries, now subjects of ONE King, citizens of ONE country—the Kingly Hierophant and the

country of the Great White Lodge.

"Shall ye abjure that race, that king, that country and sink into the state of raceless, countryless wanderers of past ages at the behest of the demons of Pride, Passion and Avarice,—or shall ye raise high the banner of your Brotherhood and turn your faces toward the only foes who have power to rob you of your birthright?

"You stand at the parting of two ways. Is it to be the right hand path of TOLERANCE, SYMPATHY and UNDERSTAND-ING,—or the left hand path of HATE, CONTENTION and

VIOLENCE?

The Law of Brotherhood can be summed up in one phrase from the Bible: "If ye love not your brother whom ye have seen, how can you love God whom ye have not seen?"

Brotherhood—Love—Unity, are practically synonymous as qualities and attributes, without which there can be neither

Real brotherhood is of the heart and not of the head, i. e., creeds, whether political or religious, and back of real brotherhood is the Christos himself—the coming Avatar—the Architect of the New Race and Age, around whom all the races and nations of the earth will finally cluster.

This week has been set aside in the United States in commemoration of Brotherhood. Special emphasis is being placed throughout our land on what to us here in Halcyon is a very familiar term. We use the expression "Brotherhood" constantly in our teachings and everyday living, not as something set apart, but as something for us to be aware of constantly and to incorporate into all our dealings with others.

The primary reason our movement was brought into being

was to build up a nucleus of the Brotherhood of Man.

What do we mean by Brotherhood?, one may ask. The true meaning is, that we are to be closely united—to be as blood kin; "to love one another" as Jesus commanded us. He also said, "He who hateth or defendeth not his brother whom he hath seen, how can he love and suffer God whom he hath not seen?"

Much of what happens between us and our "brother" in our everyday living depends on our true motives. Master Hilarion has cautioned us to be careful of our motives: "Be careful of your dealings with others, for what you do to others that you surely will receive for yourselves in return. Your 'brethren' are a part of your own vital essence, and the degradation of anyone of them means a much longer wait for them—and for you. So watch ever within and without yourselves. Watch your daily conduct, your voice, your tone of living toward one another. It may seem overemphasized to you, you may think your acts and words should be understood by one another after long years of comradeship together, and you permit certain gruffness,

familiarity and crudity—it should not be so. If you cannot apply the spiritual qualities, if you cannot give the loving voice, the understanding helpfulness to one another with whom you have worked and associated in season and out, under fire and torment as well as in hours of gladness and ecstacy, how can you expect to feel the soothing Hand of the Christ upon your own brows or hear the joyous voice of spiritual happiness within your hearts and souls. We administer justice, the seed of which must be planted in your own breasts and lives. Within your hearts lies fundamentally the earnest desire to mount the throne of Life, by love, simplicity, and purity of living."

Brotherhood is a very definite pattern for our daily living. We cannot presume to dictate the role someone else has to play in his life cycle, for how do we know what his karma is? But we can each of us try to follow the Golden Rule in our lives and

thus bring Brotherhood in direct focus in our own lives.

To quote from the Service of the Order of the Thirty Six: "If thy brother hath offended go to him in peace, that both he and thou may be reconciled." If we adhered to this advice any friction between us and our Temple Brother could be dissipated

immediately.

If the representatives of the Nations of the World could truthfully talk about their problems together and discuss the differences which arise in open forum without malice toward one another, as is laid down in the rules of the United Nations, wars would disappear from the face of the earth; and if this were followed by the people of the earth, the "Golden Age" which we are looking forward to could be right around the corner.

The Master has said many times that the world looks to us here at our Center in Halcyon more than any of us can realize. Knowing this to be true, and knowing that the vibrations set up in our Center radiate out into the world, let us endeavor to help humanity by putting our unified forces constructively together in Brotherhood, for Brotherhood.

Now, more than ever before, does America represent a melting pot of opportunity to the world. For this unprecedented turmoil of man America is the alchemist's crucible, dedicated even by these lines on the pedestal of the Statue of Liberty:

THE CAUSE OF FAILURE

Temple Teachings, Open Series, Lesson No. 244

How many of your number have ever fathomed the underlying cause of some individual, family, or national effort to thwart the execution of any commonly accepted social or religious custom or law?

How many realize the futility of pitting your individual, feeble will and desire against cosmic or national Will and Desire?

You may be able to convince yourself that you are entirely in the right, and that the great majority are in the wrong, if so be you are involved in a controversy where such a question is called up; but you know you are merely trying to deceive yourself and others if you attempt to justify some personal, social or religious offense, by loudly claiming the right of the individual soul to "lead its own life in its own way," regardless

of the effects of its actions upon others.

You know that the soul impulse of the great majority—that interior force sometimes designated "the public conscience"—working for the greatest good of the human race, has been evolved by means of the blood and the sweat of uncounted millions of human beings—your own forebears— men and women who have gone down into the depths of hell, and who finally crawled out of those depths, shorn of everything that had formerly been held precious in their sight, and who, because of what they had suffered, had been made ready to stand at the foot of the cross of sacrifice, with arms extended in pleading to their descendants—to you and to me—that we spare ourselves and those that will follow us the needless strain, the perfectly avoidable agony, that surely results from contemned and broken law.

When one realizes that he must pass in review before all these "souls crucified," as a rebel against established law and order, on his way to the commission of some act, which if indulged could only momentarily satisfy the changeable part of his lower nature—some impulsive act induced by the opinion he is holding at the moment—it is evident the underlying cause for the commission of that act is something deeper than the revolt against seeming injustice and wrong; and that cause lies at the base of his human nature.

There is much said in these days regarding "the rights of man," and the "Free Soul." My children, there is no such thing or creature in the Universe as a free soul, and there never has been, or ever will be such a soul. Back of all desire or demand for freedom, in the case of every normal human being, there is a still deeper desire, or more correctly speaking, a deeper aspira-

tion—a louder cry for a personal recognition of and a closer unity with God—the Over Soul; a desire to combine individual strength with the energy generated by others, for a definite purpose, and we never can reach such unity as we desire while we willingly tread under foot the rights of the companion souls who are struggling along the path, it may be with us, crying to us to sustain them in their hour of peril.

We never can reach conscious unity with all souls until our feet are firmly fixed on the sacrificial stone at the foot of the Altar of Crucifixion; and I say emphatically, from the depths of whatever knowledge and experience I have gained with the human race, that not a single well developed, mature soul can truthfully deny its knowledge of its responsibility for others, when it bravely faces itself in the silence of its own divinity, however much it may desire to do so.

It knows that as long as another fragment of itself is liable to be worsted in the great fight, by anything it individually has done or left undone, or may do, that sacrificial stone will stand silently pleading for a victim, and until that victim, itself, is

ready, its way to the throne of power is blocked.

Understand me, I speak not of such instances as those which occur when awakened conscience arouses the desire of a nation or a body of people for justice, and, from the demand wrought out from a divine impulse, there arises an overwhelming determination to right a national or social wrong, to free a slave, to overcome the soul-killing, life-sapping lethargy, which sometimes seizes upon a whole people.

I speak of the selfish or corrupting desire of one or more people to overrule some long established, wise, beneficent purpose or law of a nation or race, and when unlicensed, unlimited freedom for one means abject slavery or unnecessary woe for

others, who are to come after them.

If you will seek out the basic reality, the fundamental law, upon which even the most corrupt nation or race was founded, you would find that law true to nature, and to nature's God.

Had it not been so, the nation or race could not have existed for a single century; and only in accordance with a certain measure of obedience to that law, even though such obedience were rendered by a limited number, could that nation or race have any true and normal sustained growth. You find this exemplified in the legend of the destruction of Gomorrah. Could even one righteous man have been found in the city it might have been saved from destruction.

When the demand for such a one comes from God, think well, if you are tempted to teach that any man has the right to overrule the laws and customs of his people for his self-interest, lest you urge on a day in which there could not be a single righteous, law-abiding man left in any body of which you are a part, and that body be doomed thereby.

True it is, that "in freedom lies thy strength," but that freedom is the release of the soul from the ancient bondage of the lower self.

Having paid the price demanded by the Higher Self, by perfect obedience to the law it has previously broken, the soul is free indeed, free of all things save the Law; and having become one with the Law, through that perfect obedience, it is its own lawmaker thereafter.

But irrespective of all disputes as to specific names, there is sufficient argument and proof to show that a body of men having the wonderful knowledge described above has always existed and probably exists today. The older mysteries continually refer to them. Ancient Egypt had them in her great king-Initiates, sons of the sun and friends of great gods. There is a habit of belittling the ideas of the ancients which is in itself belittling to the people of today. Even the Christian who reverently speaks of Abraham as "the friend of God," will scornfully laugh at the idea of the claims of Egyptian rulers to the same friendship being other than childish assumption of dignity and title. But the truth is, these great Egyptians were Initiates, members of the one great lodge which includes all others of whatever degree or operation. The later and declining Egyptians, of course; must have imitated their predecessors, but that was when the true doctrine was beginning once more to be obscured upon the rise of dogma and priesthood.

The story of Apollonius of Tyana is about a member of one of the same ancient orders appearing among men at a descending cycle, and only for the purpose of keeping a witness upon

the scene for future generations.

Abraham and Moses of the Jews are two other Initiates, Adepts who had their work to do with a certain people; and in the history of Abraham we meet with Melchizedek, who was so much beyond Abraham that he had the right to confer upon the latter a dignity, a privilege, or a blessing. The same chapter of human history which contains the names of Moses and Abraham is illuminated also by that of Solomon. And thus

these three make a great Triad of Adepts, the record of whose deeds can not be brushed aside as folly and devoid of basis.

Moses was educated by the Egyptians and in Midian; from both he gained much occult knowledge, and any clear-seeing student of the great Universal Masonry can perceive all through his books the hand, the plan, and the work of a master. Abraham, again, knew all the arts and much of the power in psychical realms that were cultivated in his day, or else he could not have consorted with kings nor have been "the friend of God," and the reference to his conversations with the Almighty in respect to the destruction of cities alone shows him to have been an Adept who had long ago passed beyond the need of ceremonial or other adventitious aids. Solomon completes this triad and stands out in characters of fire. Around him is clustered such a mass of legend and story about his dealings with the elemental powers and of his magic possessions that one must condemn the whole ancient world as a collection of fools who made lies for amusement if a denial is made of his being a great character, a wonderful example of the incarnation among men of a powerful Adept. We do not have to accept the name Solomon nor the pretense that he reigned over the Jews, but we must admit the fact that somewhere in the misty time to which the Jewish records refer there lived and moved among the people of the earth one who was an Adept and given that name afterwards. Peripatetics and microscopic critics may affect to see in the prevalence of universal tradition naught but evidence of the gullibility of men and their power to imitate, but the true student of human nature and life knows that the universal tradition is true and arises from the facts in the history of man.

Turning to India, so long forgotten and ignored by the lusty and egotistical, the fighting and the trading West, we find her full of the lore relating to these wonderful men of whom Noah, Abraham, Moses, and Solomon are only examples. There the people are fitted by temperament and climate to be the preservers of the philosophical, ethical, and psychical jewels that would have been forever lost to us had they been left to the ravages of such Goths and Vandals as western nations were in the early days of their struggle for education and civilization. If the men who wantonly burned up vast masses of historical and ethnological treasures found by the minions of the Catholic rulers of Spain, in Central and South America, could have known of and put their hands upon the books and palm-leaf records of India before the protecting shield of England was raised against them, they would have destroyed them all as they did for the Americans, and as their predecessors attempted to do for the Alexandrian library. Fortunately, events worked otherwise.

All along the stream of Indian literature we can find the names by scores of great adepts who were well known to the

people and who all taught the same story—the great epic of the human soul. Their names are unfamiliar to western ears, but the records of their thoughts, their work and powers remain. Still more, in the quiet unmoveable East there are today, by the hundred, persons who know of their own knowledge that the Great Lodge still exists and has its Mahatmas, Adepts, Initiates, Brothers. And yet further, in that land are such a number of experts in the practical application of minor though still very astonishing power over nature and her forces, that we have an irresistible mass of human evidence to prove the proposition laid down.
